District 28 Legislators Ready for the Challenges of 95th Session

to tend to the people's business. Govenor Kristi Noem's austere budget was proposed just over a month ago and certainly laid out many challenges to be faced in the 37 days of this 95th Session of the South Dakota Legislature.



District 28 State Senator Ryan Maher, Insurance Agent/ Restaurant Owner from Isabel who serves as Vice-Chair of the Appropriations Committee said,

"I was highly please to see the Governor address funding for capping the abandoned gas wells in Harding County."


This is something I have been working on for the past year. Last year I introduced a bill to cleanup these 40 abandoned wells. This summer the GOAC- Government Audit and Operations Committee held hearings on these wells, in November the House and Senate Appropriations Committee went to Harding County and took a tour of the site and abandoned wells. This was a nice added surprise when the Governor included money to clean this up and get these wells plugged. There is a law in the books that says the State has six months to plug a well that is no longer producing. These wells have not produced in about 10 years.

"I totally understand the Governor's 0% increases for state employees and teachers salaries. When you start at zero there is only one direction you can go and that is up."

"As a practical matter we will see updated sales tax revenue

figures mid session and hopefully can address the salaries positively."

"The statutory obligation say 3% or the rate of inflation which ever is less. According, to the State Economist the rate of inflation for the State is 1.9 to 2.1, so in order for the State not to fund K-12 education this law will have to be repealed. Right now in the Senate I don't think we have the votes to repeal the law, therefore we are working on trying to find the money to fund K-12. A one percent increase to education is about \$7 million. We need to free up about 14 million in the budget to get us to where we need to be. December sales are not in yet and those will be calculated by mid-January and we will set new revenue projections in late February. There are lots of moving pieces to the State budget and time will tell what we will be able to find and

In the area of the State I represent, the long distances between schools prohibits many of the cost saving co-opting arrangements that are possible in the more populated eastern parts of the state. Booth Society Inc. Receives Homestake Grant Funds

The Booth Society Inc. has received a grant for \$172,597 in support of its recent acquisition of 64.62 acres of vacant land adjoining the D.C. Booth Historic National Fish Hatchery. The funds were via the Homestake Mining Company Natural Resource Restoration Fund (HMC-NRRF).

A team of representatives from South Dakota Game Fish and Parks, SD Department of Environment and Natural Resources, U.S. Bureau of Land Management, U.S. Bureau of Reclamation, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service reviewed the Booth Society's application utilizing an evaluation process of sixteen weighted criteria. The resulting high score led the team to recommend awarding the grant. Subsequently authorizing officials Kelly Hepler Secretary of the SDGFP and Noreen Walsh from the U.S. Department of Interior both approved releasing the funds to support the project.

One of the HMC-NRRF Fund's most stringent requirements for funding is that the public will benefit. Acquiring the land will protect the hatchery groundwater supply which is important for fish cultural purposes, and will prevent houses from overlooking and ruining the aesthetics of the historic property and popular tourist attraction. In addition, the Society has a variety of conceptual ideas for in-perpetuity public benefits that involve expanding existing visitor and youth education opportunities at the D.C. Booth Fish Hatch-

ery. A management plan for the property will be developed at a later date.

The grant brings the total amount raised for the project to \$554,000. "The mercury in our fundraising thermometer has climbed," stated Booth Society Executive Director Karen Holzer, "This grant along with generous donations from a variety of donors brings the total amount left to fundraise at approximately \$88,000. It is fantastic to have the support of the community as we continue with this project. The donations we have received, along with this grant money, provides us with about 86% of our fundraising goal." The Booth Society purchased the land in July 2019 and kicked off their capital campaign fundraising effort to raise \$642,500 in August

District 29 Legislators Ready for the Challenges of 95th Session

State Representative Thomas Brunner, District 29 of Nisland commented on the Governor's proposed budget. Brunner chairs the Legislature's House Ag & Natural Resources Committee as well as is a member of House Education committee.



Brunner said, "keep in mind these are proposals and a starting place." The 37 day legislative sessions gives us time to take a close look at everything and hear from people back home: how they are affected and their opinions on these proposals.

For education the Governor funded the expected 1% increase in enrollment plus 14 million on re-basing special education disability levels. Final allocation on salaries is likely not to be decided until mid session revenue numbers are in. To improve communication state wide the Governor has budgeted 5 million for Internet access. That amount added to the 5 million from last year is made available for internet access grants.

The 3.7 million for intensive

meth treatment and enforcement is unfortunately a necessity of our times. 5.1 million additional to upgrade statewide communication for law enforcement and 1st responders will cover the map and improve emergency service communication for evervone.

Ten million proposed for loan programs for local governments for disaster recovery. Money is needed because of the record amounts of moisture this past vear

The Governor has committed approximately \$1 million for a much needed cleanup of abandoned gas wells in Harding County.

Our state revenues are certainly flat, as are any that are relying on the ag economy for their living. Our State is doing well but until livestock and grain prices rebound sales tax revenue will be low.

"it looks like we are in a slow growth period compared to last year. I would fully expect this year's legislative appropriations will reflect that. One positive, there appears to be some better financing options available to towns and counties for some much needed road repairs caused by flooding.'

District 29 Representative Kirk Chaffee, Whitewood, is a member of House Taxation and Local Government Committees.

We set aside money last year and this year for State radio. -With this year's payment the project is now fully funded and can move forward. This will benefit the entire state so law enforcement and fire departments and other emergency operations will have the ability



to communicate with one another during a time of crisis."

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

Through the Bible in One Year

There are 1189 chapters in the Bible. If you read 4 chapters a day you can read through the Bible in under a year. It takes a S.M.A.R.T. plan and discipline. If you download a good Bible app to your phone it can keep you on track. It is best to pick a specific time each day to complete your readings, stick to that time as closely as you can.

For example, rather than spending a certain allotted time each day on social media take and read the Bible. For instance, if I usually spend my lunch hour eating and reading social media, I can read my 4 chapters first.

Begin by praying, ask God's Holy Spirit to guide you and then reading a couple chapters out of the Old Testament and a couple out of the New Testament. Me personally, I like to underline important or interesting verses or passages in each chapter as I go, this really helps keep me focused. I will

look up words I may not understand or write out questions that I can ask my pastor friends or research for clarity and application. Write down places, Google them and read about those people and places. Check out pictures

of the areas you read about, make it fun and informative. A "S.M.A.R.T." goal is:

Specific: Start with at least 4 chapters a day. Meaningful: What is your reason for reading through the Bible? Make it personal. Achievable: 4 chapters a day is

achievable and reading through

the Bible can be done in one

Rewarding: You can greatly increase your knowledge of the Word of God.

Timely: One year from start to finish.

2 Timothy 2:15 Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needs not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth.

President Trump Appoints New Director of US Fish & Wildlife Service

Former Belle Fourche alum and now Washington, DC lobbyist, Leo Giacometto's fiancée, Aurelia Skipwith, has been appointed by President Donald Trump to be Director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Skipwith is the first African American to ever serve as director of the USFWS.

The U.S. Senate voted to confirm Aurelia Skipwith as Director of the USFWS with a bipartisan vote of 52-39. Skipwith has served as Deputy Assistant Secretary for Fish and Wildlife and Parks at the Department of the Interior since April 19, 2017.

"Aurelia Skipwith's leadership at the Department of the Interior has been vital in helping us advance the President's priorities for the American people," said U.S. Secretary of the Interior David Bernhardt. "I look forward to working with her in her new capacity."

Previously, she served as Assistant Corporate Counsel at Alltech, Inc., an all-natural animal nutrition company that operates worldwide and has the world's largest algae production system. She then became General Counsel at AVC Global, an agricultural logistics and financing firm that she co-founded. Skipwith earned her B.S. in biology from Howard University, M.S. in molecular biology from Purdue

University, and J.D. from the University of Kentucky College

"I am truly honored to serve the American people under the leadership of President Trump and Secretary Bernhardt," said Director Aurelia Skipwith. "I am grateful for the confidence that the Senate has placed in me, and I look forward to helping advance this Administration's priorities for the Department, for the Service and for American conservation."

In her new role as the Director she will oversee a workforce of over 8,500 personnel charged with the mission of working with others to conserve, protect and enhance fish, wildlife and plants and their habitats.

The Spearfish D.C. Booth Hatchery is under Ms. Skipwith's Departments jurisdiction. **Booth Project Director Carlos** Martinez said, "In her capacity as Deputy Assistant Secretary, Aurelia Skipwith has physically visited the D.C. Booth Historic National Fish Hatchery. I believe she has an understanding of the station's value and potential, and an appreciation of our partnerships and programs."

Local Emergency Planning Committee

Belle Fourche | There is a group of concerned individuals who are making an effort to connect the emergency plans of area city and county governments and the businesses of Butte County. The members of the Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) meet quarterly to discuss various ideas and gather information from businesses and other emergency response teams on how hazardous materials and events are handled.

Recently, LEPC members met with Donnie Walding, Belle Fourche Ambulance Service director. Walding shared that all ambulance members in Butte County are trained on Hazmat to a certain extent. He pointed

out that ambulance personnel's first response is for the safety of the crew and the patient. Each ambulance has an Emergency Response Guide (ERG) that is followed in case of a hazardous

"We are trained to look at the placard and to do what it says. It is paramount to our job," he said. It shows the safe distance ambulance personnel must stay from a hazardous event, the correct way of management of the situation, and the entire protocol that must be followed.

Walding said that precedence is given to law enforcement and fire departments during times when there may be a Hazmat situation.

"We are trained to be aware of our surroundings," he said, "so we listen to what law enforcement says."

We collaborate with the fire departments if protective gear is needed he said when asked by committee members if personal protective gear is needed. There hasn't been a need for protective gear up to this point, but that could change at any time. LEPC is endeavoring to build a Hazmat Plan containing information of businesses using hazardous materials, medical personnel, law enforcement, fire departments, and city officials that will coordinate all the entities in case of a Hazmat event. LEPC covers the entire Butte County, including the towns of Belle Fourche, Newell, Nisland, and Vale.

Everyone is welcome to attend a meeting. The next quarterly meeting is scheduled for March 18, 2020. The time and place are to be determined.

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The "Warrior Trail" Historical Significance Marches Forward

In 2016 the following letter was written by Belle resident Clark Sowers. As we work to grow and promote Belle Fourche its relevance still resounds today.

To whom it may concern: I have been asked by the Belle Fourche Chamber of Commerce to write a letter of support for a grant application to promote "The Warrior Trail." Since my offering for the title was chosen by the Broadus, Montana Chamber of Commerce in 2007 I am happy to share with you the significance of this area. Belle Fourche is the Center of the Nation! We are also the center of the west that records the struggles of the trappers, frontiersmen, pioneers, sheep men and ranchers, real cowboys that are descendants of the 1902 Cowboys, and are surrounded by Custer's 1874 Expedition to the Black Hills!

We have within our grasp an untapped cultural heritage of many nations within a nation. Highway 212 from Belle Fourche to the I-90 Intersection by the Little Bighorn Battlefield is gold mine of western history that is wrapped around by 400 years of history!

You can travel twenty miles west on Hwy 34 and still see wagon ruts from the 7th Cavalry's entrance into the Black Hills. From there go south to Sundance by Inyan Kara and see Custer's name carved on the mountain. You can visit graves of soldiers who died with him. Further on you can follow his trail all the way through the Hills to Custer, SD and his return trip where it exits the hills down Box Elder Creek. You can travel east of I-90 and see 7th Cavalry camp sights before they left the Black Hills.

But there is so much more for Belle Fourche and the Northern Hills to be part of. Travel west from Belle Fourche and we find the modern Warriors as our nation struggles with international terrorism with the Ellsworth Air Force Base B-1 Bomber Radar sight. Next we find Stoneville and the Old West, otherwise known as Alzada and its storied history. Ordinary wildlife to us is extraordinary for the traveler! We see antelope, they see Pronghorn Sheep!

Hammond and Boyes, Montana are next and are testaments to the Homesteader and their struggle to carve out a living in the sage brush of the prairie. Broadus follows on the trail and has the history of the Powder River Expedition which included the Cole Expedition and the running battle in 1865 that not many are aware of. (The Cole Expedition traversed the northern Black Hills, camping on the Redwater River where Highway 85 south of Belle Fourche currently passes.) South of Broadus is the Reynolds Battlefield that had the opening salvo of the 1876 Indian Wars.

West of Broadus we begin to share the Native American experience with the Cheyenne and Crow Reservations and the cultural experiences so many are looking for with our Native brothers. And we arrive at the Little Bighorn Battlefield, the greatest victory of our native tribes over government forces. Unfortunately the victory spelled certain defeat by a government that now took the tribes much more serious than

before the battle. And this is just the "Warrior Trail" highlights! Take off on day trips to Buffalo, SD and the Battle of Slim Buttes, drive to the Battle of the Rosebud south of Busby, Montana, Ft. Abraham Lincoln in Bismarck where the 7th Cavalry began their expeditions. Follow the Yellowstone River and chase the 1876 Expedition as they pursue the largest congregation of Indians ever in the west! Don't forget Orman Dam by Belle Fourche, the irrigation district and its role in taming the West!

As you can see there are these and so many other highlights to capture in being a member of the "Warrior Trail!"

We are all "Warriors" as we continue the same struggle as the Indian nations, the early government and pioneers and fur traders, farmers and ranchers, cowboys and early businessmen of our regions.

Omaha, Neb., to the badlands 1,400-man army had set out to rendezvous with two other military columns taking the field to challenge Sioux, Cheyenne and Arapahoe warriors fighting desperately to stem the westward tide of Euro-Americans. But by the time Cole's command struggled into Montana's Powder River country, it was time to throw in the towel. His troops had skirmished constantly with warriors guarding the plains, faced the worst weather the country had to offer and starved when the supply system failed. Arriving back at Fort Reno in Wyoming that September, Cole made his report. "In its march, it had traversed nearly or quite 1,200 miles through a country almost entirely unknown to white men, in part nothing better than a desert and barren waste, away from the banks of the occasional streams that course through it toward the Missouri. Eightytwo days was this column struggling and fighting its way to this point, making its own roads through valleys and over mountains, encountering furious storms deadly in effect; finding and severely punishing a wary, savage foe, the greater part of the time suffering the torments

of starvation. "Eighty-two days had they subsisted on 60 days rations, which had naturally lost 20 percent of their original proportion. The country passed over in the route traveled, being mostly a waste of "Bad Lands," is destitute of wild game, hence no addition from this source could be made to husband the rations whilst they run their natural course,

nor substituted for them when exhausted." His men were in rags, and many of them were barefoot. They suffered from exposure and scurvy.

The failed Powder River campaign and many other little-known bits of history are only a detour away from Highway 212 as it stretches from Belle Fourche, S.D., through Alzada, Broadus, Ashland, Lame Deer and Busby before it joins Interstate 90 at Little Bighorn Battlefield interchange near Crow Agency. For the past 10 years, businesses along the route, the Northern Chevenne Tribe and local history buffs have been working to elevate the stature of historic country traversed by the two-lane highway. In 2007, the Montana Legislature designated the length of 212 from Little Bighorn southeast to the Montana line the "Warrior Trail." Saturday at 1 p.m., the newly authorized historic route will be christened with a ribbon-cutting ceremony at Courthouse Square in Broadus. Local, tribal and state officials, as well as members of Montana's congressional delegation, have been invited to attend. The ceremony will include a blessing by Charles Little Old Man of the Cheyenne Tribe, native dancers from St. Labre school and talks by Wyoming author Dave Wagner, whose book, "Powder River Odyssey," will be published next spring. It's the first in a two-volume set Wagner is planning on the Powder River Expedition of 1865.

"Among the historic sites along the way are the 1865 battle sites near Powderville, the 1876 Reynolds battle site near Broadus, the 1877 Wolf Mountain battle site, Fort Howes near Ashland, the 1876 Battle of the Rosebud, St. Labre Mission, the graves of chiefs Two Moon and Lame Deer and, of course, Little Bighorn Battlefield at the end of the trail, Ullrich said. Larry Woolston, owner of Larry's IGA in Lame Deer, said he began trying to promote 212 in the late 1990s. He and other business people along the remote stretch of highway wanted to stir up more traffic and business. They started with posters and brochures informing travelers driving between Mount Rushmore in South Dakota and Little Bighorn

Battlefield that if they took 212 instead of Interstate 90, they could shave an hour and 55 to 60 miles off their journey. Major improvements to the highway in recent years have made it an attractive alternative, he said. Although he acknowledges that gas prices may have played a role, efforts to promote the shortcut have increased traffic, Woolston said. He hopes plans for the Warrior Trail will lure travelers in even greater numbers.

Woolston was on the board of Montana's Custer Country tourism region, which helped to promote the route. It was initially called the Custer Country Cut-across, but the title was replaced by "Warrior Trail" after a contest to rename the highway. Because the area was home to tens of thousands of American Indians, the name seemed appropriate, he said. It was tough country for settlers and soldiers, as well, Woolston said. "They were warriors, too," he said.

With legislation renaming the stretch of 212 in Eastern Montana came an allocation of \$25,000 for signs, Ullrich said. The highway will be designated "Warrior Trail" on all new state highway maps, she said. "That was a huge step forward. That's when the whole thing caught fire," she said. "It was happening so fast, I could hardly keep up with it."

Custer Country provided a grant to design a logo and a Web site. Another grant was obtained for brochures and maps. South Dakota residents have ioined Montanans in their effort and are lobbying to get the portion of 212 in South Dakota included officially as part of the Warrior Trail.

Other ideas include roadside kiosks with displays explaining the history. In addition to the original goal of encouraging economic development, promoters have adopted two more goals – preservation of historic sites and education. "People who grow up along this route need to know its rich history," Ullrich said.

Woolston said the group hopes to establish a curriculum that schools can use to tell the story of the largely ignored history of Eastern Montana. "We have a lot to offer," he said.



For Rodeos Sturgis, Deadwood Days of 76 and the oldest of them all, the Black Hills Round Up in Belle Fourche still stand tall. I recall my grandparents telling me of their trip to the second Black Hills Round up and it was a three day wagon ride to town from their homestead by Boyes, Montana! The Black Hills Roundup proved to be a cultural center of the upper Midwest long before tourism became fashionable. We still





NAVFR Helps Local Family Rebuild a Year Later

NISLAND - There's always a little bit of light at the end of the tunnel. At least that's what the Jim Mickelson family of Nisland has experienced. Just one year ago, to the date, the first call went out to Nisland Volunteer Fire and Rescue around 12:05 a.m.

Ben, Jim's son, had been working on an engine and stopped to check the 320 head of ready-to-lamb sheep all tucked inside the nice warm barn. Then he headed for bed.

That was when the barn caught fire, most likely due to a faulty heater. Mickelson said they had just started lambing and the first three of what they hoped would be a bumper crop. It was not to be.

Although it's been a year since the fire, the family still has not recouped their losses, even considering they had insurance.

"I was just about ready to take it (settle) on the insurance," said Mickelson. "But that didn't work out."

So, after showing up in the middle of the night to put out a fire that devastated this local family, the Nisland/Arpan Volunteer Fire & Rescue (NAVFR) once more stepped into the breech.

"I got a call from Barron out of Ruthton (Minn.) saying they had heard about the loss and wanted to know what they could do to help," said Josh



Jan. 13, 1910

Articles of Incorporation have been filed for the second bank at Nisland, on the Belle Fourche Valley Railroad, 18 miles east of Belle Fourche. The new bank will be known as Irrigator State Bank with officers: President J.T. Craig; Vice President M.J. Smiley; Cashier D.J. Hull and other officers John Clay and W.B. Penfold. Capital Stock \$10,000. The new bank will be ready for business March 1.

According to press dispatches sent out from Washington,



Seth Bullock was last week re-appointed as US Marshall for South Dakota for a term of 4 years. Mr. Bullock is a close friend of ex-president T. Roosevelt and the re-appointment is said to be both recognition of what he has done as well as a compliment to the former president.

Jan. 8, 1920

PIERRE, S.D. - The Department of Public Safety today announced that new safety measures that include a security screening process at the South Dakota State Capitol Building will begin Monday, Jan. 13.

'The new safety measures we're implementing are proactive steps to protecting the Capitol and everyone who uses it," said Department of Public Safety Cabinet Secretary Craig Price. "These improvements will enhance public safety while preserving the accessibility of our statehouse."

Frequent visitors to the South Dakota State Capitol will be able to apply for an access pass starting Monday, Jan. 6 through the South Dakota Highway Patrol. The application process, which is

available at no cost to the applicant, will take about five business days to process and includes a state background check.

'These security measures are not designed to restrict the public's access to the Capitol, but to be as least intrusive as possible," added Price. "We want people to be able to get through the screening quickly while also keeping the Capitol safe for all South Dakotans."

People with the Capitol Access pass will enter the security room where they will show their pass to the security staff. Once approved, the card holder will not have to go through the screening process. The Capitol Access pass is valid until Dec. 31 each year and will have to be renewed yearly.

"Our State Capitol is the people's house, and this project ensures everyone who visits the building has a safe, positive experience while enjoying its historic beauty," said Governor Kristi Noem. "Safety is always our top priority, and this modernized approach to Capitol security will help us best serve the hundreds of kids and thousands of visit the Capitol every year."



2020 Private Pesticide Applicator **Training Dates Set**

Private pesticide applicator certification trainings will be held across South Dakota beginning in January and running through March. Private applicators whose certification has expired or anyone interested in receiving a private applicator license is eligible to receive training and become certified in South Dakota.

Private applicator certification is required by any person wishing to purchase or use restricted-use pesticides. It is also required by anyone using pesticides for the purposes of producing agricultural commodities amounting to greater than \$1,000 in gross sales potential per year.

Pesticide applicator trainings provide education that will benefit anyone who is working around or handling pesticides. The training is three hours in length. There is no cost for the training; however, anyone attending will be required to show a government issued picture ID upon arrival. We also ask that applicators seeking recertification bring their expiring applicator cards or the postcard they

received in the mail notifying them that their certification has expired.

Private applicator certification is valid for 5 years after being issued. A complete listing of all private applicator trainings scheduled across South Dakota in 2020 is available on the South Dakota Department of Ag website (sdda.sd.gov)
