National Street Closure to Last Until Late January

BELLE FOURCHE - A small section of National Street between Sixth and Eighth Avenue will be closed for at least the next week and a half while work continues on the new city

Bret Olson, Project foreman for Heavy Constructors says the work will require the street to be closed until at least the end of next week.

"The good news is that weather looks to be favorable for us which is really a great thing this time of year," Olson told the Beacon. "The first part of the project is to install the sanitary sewer and water across National Street (this week) and then the next week we'll be repaying the concrete on National."

There will be one scheduled water shutoff, most likely this week. Steve Nafus, Belle Fourche Interim City Engineer, said the shutoff will have minimal effect on residents and should last less than eight hours. "Depending on where the water valves are we'll know more soon how a few of the area businesses will be affected," Nafus said during a

construction update meeting on Jan. 9th. He said the city will do its best to give at least a 24-hour notice of the shutoff.

During the street closure detours are in place for motorists on National Street and those wishing to travel north on Seventh Avenue. (See detour graphic) Detour maps are available on the city's website. The city cautions motorists to especially move slowly through the Lynn's Dakotamart parking lot as delivery trucks may also be periodically moving through the parking area to get to the loading docks at the rear of the store.

Contingency plans are in place for the swift movement of emergency vehicles through the work zones since the BF Volunteer Fire Station is located within the construction area.

As noted in previous Beacon articles driving is now possible on Eighth Ave. from State Street to National Street. Limited concrete work and some topsoil work is still in progress on 8th Ave. Later this spring, 8thAve. will be closed again for the replacement of the Hay Creek

news@bellefourchebeacon.com BELLE FOURCHE - The **Butte County Commissioner** room in the courthouse was packed Thursday morning, January 10, as seven commissioners and other elected officials took their oath of office. Commissioner James Agar, newly elected for District One, had a particularly large support

Also taking the oath of Commissioner was Kim Richards- Chairman, Karrol Herman- Vice-Chair, and Frank Walton- past Chairman. Register of Deeds Paula Walker, Auditor Elaine Jensen and Sheriff Fred Lamphere were also sworn in by Judge Day.

Previous to the oath of office the meeting was called to order, closed for 2018 and re-opened for 2019. That was the point where all commissioners slid a

chair to the right, with Richards occupying the top spot.

A slew of resolutions were approved including annual wages for the fiscal year 2019 for all county employees. Dwight Kitzan was named to the Butte/ Lawrence County Fairboard.

A time of discussion over Indi gent Burial and Cremation costs to the county brought about a motion to approve that the costs remain the same as they have previously been at \$700 for cremation and \$1000 for burial, in the budgeting process for the next year.

"I'm just not comfortable increasing this until we know what other expenses we'll have," said Herman.

"The family of an indigent person with no assets, is not responsible for burial costs for that person," said Jensen. "We do, however, let them choose a funeral home." The motion,

made by Walton to approve an increase, did not pass on roll call vote, with Walton being the only aye.

Tom Davis, local landowner, came before the board to lodge a complaint and ask for compensation for gates and cattle guards he states have been damaged by county highway employees. He had turned in a bill last year that had not yet been compensated. He also requested that the county not maintain Kiplinger road, as no one lives there.

"The public has to request to have it closed," said Richards. Commissioner Stan Harms said the county should probably look into changing the road to minimum maintenance.

Commissioner Ager stated, "Those maps (of roads) should be looked at every four to five years. It's to our benefit."

Carl "Bud" Anderson 92

Rapid City - Carl "Bud" Eugene Anderson, 92, died Wednesday, January 9, 2019 at Clarkson Healthcare Center in Rapid City.

"Bud" was born September 26. 1926 to Carl and Thelma Anderson in Belle Fourche, SD. He graduated from high school in 1944 and was drafted into the United States Army in 1945. He served in the 98th Division, training for the invasion of Japan, which completed its mission in February of 1946. He was honorably discharged by the age of 20, and remarked, "still not old enough to vote!"

Bud returned home to Belle Fourche to learn the carpentry trade with his father. One of their projects was the Herrmann Park Bandshell. Their work was well known in the area, and Bud went on to build many homes and repair or remodel countless others.

Bud was a member of the Methodist Church and loved singing in the choir. He cared



for his mother for many years until her death in 1970. He married Patricia Binney on November 3, 1971 and they lived in Belle Fourche for several years, then moved to Rapid City. Bud has resided at the Clarkson Healthcare Center since Febru-

Patricia Anderson of Rapid City; step-children: John (Brenda) Binney of Missoula, MT and Joni (Billy) Hokams of Rapid City; sister Sue (Don) Paulson of Minneapolis, MN; niece Lisa (Bill) Noziska of Newell; nephew Jay (Jodi) Jarvi of Spearfish; several step-grandchildren, great-grandchildren, and great-great-grandchildren; and several other nieces and nephews. 



Empower Belle Fourche Going Strong One Year Into the Program

BELLE FOURCHE- Belle Fourche is another step closer to being an even better community. At least that's how more than thirty residents representing 8 project teams felt about it.

The group crowded into a jam-packed conference room at the Belle Fourche Development offices to hold a progress and listening session as part of the Empower Belle Fourche community betterment program.

"We should have booked a bigger room," said an enthusiastic Holly Stalder, BFDC Executive Director. "I am very happy to see such a great turnout."

The work session, held on Tues. Jan 8th, marked the beginning of the second year for the project and signaled entry into the most important phase of the program. "This is where we put the ideas into practice, where they become real," said Joe Bartmann, of Dakota Resources who sponsor similar rural development programs in communities throughout South Dakota. "I see great signs here in Belle Fourche that people really want to make their community stronger. I have no doubt they are on the right track here and it gets me very excited. It doesn't always happen like this.'

Belle Fourche Development Corp. with the assistance of the Dakota Resources team began the Empower Belle Fourche project last January with a community involvement meeting. More than 100 residents provided input on everything from how they viewed to the community to ways to improve things. A guide team was formed to

seek further community input and last October a second community meeting was held to form project teams. (See Oct. 25, 2018 Beacon).

From that meeting 10 project teams were formed, ranging from ways to make Belle Fourche a healthier community, to providing new programs for youth, creating conservation space, revitalizing downtown, creating greater housing and food security, improving community marketing, creating a downtown square and building more scenic community entrances along the highways.

"Many of groups have met several times already," Stalder said. "A few have seen their missions change and modify a bit but that's part of the process. The idea is to get grass-roots citizen involvement in projects that they are passionate about and to get others who are like-minded to work together to make great things happen."

One project team working

on creating a "State Street Square" in the downtown area has already applied for a \$4,000 grant to move designs forward. Another group "Youth of Belle Fourche" has scheduled a listening session with parents and teens seeking input on ways to create opportunities for the youth of the community. The "Be Well Belle" committee is working on ways to bring about a healthier citizenship.

The participants were also introduced to new software that will help them schedule meetings, track progress and better communicate within their project teams. "Our goals is to equip the teams with the tools they need to work with," Stalder said. "We want to be able to connect the project teams with the resources they need."

Moving forward Dakota Resources will have a staff member visit Belle Fourche monthly for the next year as the program enters the program planning and implementation stage.

Plans Moving Forward for Security Cameras at **Tri-State Museum**

morning hours of December 23rd may yet have a silver lining for the Tri-State Museum and Center of the Nation Visitor's Center on 5th Avenue in Belle Fourche.

According to Director Kristi Thielen thieves broke in through the deck doors and the only thing that was taken was an undetermined amount of money from the donations box. "Nothing else was touched," Thielen said.

She did have high praise for the response from the Belle Fourche Police Department.

"Officers Bell and Jones could not have been more professional and kinder to me," Thielen said. "We have some wonderful people working with the city here and I have truly learned

The department's investigation of the incident is ongoing. But the break-in served per-

haps a higher purpose as it created a renewed sense of urgency in a project that had been under consideration for the past year; new security cameras.

"We put together a bid early last year hoping that our cameras could be rolled into the

proposals of other city departments but it didn't happen," Thielen said. "We updated the proposal in early December and then we had our break-in. And now we're being told whatever you need do it.'

Currently Thielen is working with her board and the city to put together a new bid for security cameras. As of yet there is no timetable for installation "I'm just glad we're moving forward with it now," Thielen added.

Additionally Thielen hopes their experience will serve to perhaps motivate other Belle Fourche businesses who may want to consider their security needs.

"If this serves as a wake-up call for others to consider their security, then it will be a good

thing," Thielen said.
The Visitor's Center and Museum saw 305 visitors in December, including guests from Australia, the Philippines and India. Once again in 2018 the museum saw year-overyear growth in the number of visitors.

"We had 17,339 visitors in 2018. That was an increase of 4% over the previous year," Thielen said. "And each year we've been seeing a steady growth of 4-5% in that number."

Belle Fourche senior Rylee Young picked up two quick fouls to start the second half and found herself on the bench for most of the third quarter with four personal fouls in a game against Wright, Wyoming on Saturday, January 12th in Belle Fourche. Young made up for her lost minutes, scoring five points in the final 50 seconds to lead the Lady Broncs to a 39-34 come from behind victory over the Panthers.

Wright went on an 8-0 run to start the contest and held that lead until Young hit a three-pointer with 50 seconds

left to play in the fourth quarter, giving the Brones their first lead all day, 35-34. The senior guard then hit both ends of a one-and-one with 26 seconds to play after a Wright turnover, stretching the lead to 37-34. "Rylee is a smart player," Belle Fourche head coach Bill Burr said. "That was big for her to step up and play with those four fouls like that in the fourth quarter. She is just one of those girls who we have confidence in going to at the end of a game." Belle Fourche sophomore Bella Jensen hit her own pair of free throws with just over six seconds left to essentially seal the win for the Broncs (10-0).

"This was a big game but for some reason we didn't take it as a big game to start out," Burr said, as his Lady Broncs fell behind 13-6 after one quarter and trailed 28-22 heading into the final period. "If we would have played the whole game like (those last few minutes) we wouldn't have had any trouble." Wright's aggressive defense forced Belle Fourche into several turnovers throughout the game, but the Lady Broncs used their deeper bench to finally wear down the Panthers late in the fourth quarter.

"At least they didn't quit playing," Burr said of his squad. "When you get in games

like this – shots weren't falling and things weren't going our way - they didn't quit."

It was once again the trio of Belle Fourche seniors leading the way, as Ashley Byrd scored 13 points and grabbed five rebounds, Young scored 12 points including two three-pointers, and Payson Birkeland added seven points. The Lady Broncs shot 79% from the free-throw line (15-for-19). Senior Shelby

benefit." Richards said he felt that the commission was doing a much better job with highway maintenance and that they had been more aggressive in attacking issues.

Highway Superintendent Dwayne Heidrich ran through some issues that had been attended to including the Dillinger Bridge, guard rails on Orman Road bridge, concrete and pit run on a bridge on 3V road and gravel on Snoma road. He also said an ad had been placed in the paper to hire a replacement for Sheldon Sundstrom who is retiring in February. A bid for repair of the Belle Fourche location shop roof was approved. It was awarded to Shaykett Construction as that is the only company who bothered to submit, even though Heidrich had tried to contact others. One big topic of discussion, that may lead to an interview and more information presented through the media, was the issue of the approach policy.

"It's pretty cut and dried," said Richards. "We may need to look at changing our policy rather than provide a variance when people ask to bypass the policy."

A representative from Energiekontor, Brenda Moore, presented information about a possible added wind farm in eastern Butte County.

"It was be adjacent to and east of Willow Creek," said Moore. Willow Creek is in the process of being constructed. Moore represented the company which deals with creating wind and solar energy projects and said this was merely an information-

Living Love: America's Kids Belong

Belle Fourche woman takes the lead in adding a South Dakota chapter to national adoption program.

When Kristi Woolsey and her husband Damen settled in the Black Hills three years ago, they were

anxious to find a support group of adoptive parents since they themselves were the adoptive parents of now 6-year-old son Asa. They found a connection through Facebook, a search that would take the Woolseys, and Kristi in particular, on a far-reaching journey to benefit not just them but the 1,523 children now in South Dakota's foster care system.

Born and raised in Berlin, Wisconsin, Kristi graduated from Viterbo University in La-Crosse with a degree in elementary education. Her teaching career began in Oregon and culminated in Box Elder where she taught ESL (English as a second language).

It was the Facebook inquiry that connected the Woolsevs with Rick and Vicki Furnish of Spearfish, themselves adoptive parents, who in turn connected them with an organization headquartered in Colorado called America's Kids Belong whose mandate, quite simply, is to give every child a loving home.

Kristi's strongest support in pursuing involvement in the organization was and continues to be Damen who told her, "you can do it!" smiles Kristi in the retelling. The meeting in Colorado on June 3, 2017, with Brian Mavis, president of

America's Kids Belong, and his wife Julie, vice president of Programs and Development, was the opening of a door to a new career for Kristi, now the Project Director for South Dakota's Kids Belong, one of seven active state chapters in the USA with the national organization working to recruit

According to the national organization's mission statement:

By uniting government, faith-based, business and creative communities in a coordinated and sustainable movement, we aim to end the foster care and adoption crisis in the United States – state by state."

Working in concert with South Dakota's Department of Social Services, Kristi is concentrating her efforts in a more localized area until, as she stresses, "I can raise enough money to hire someone to help me." Right now she is focused on Region 2, one of seven regions overseen by the state's Child Protection Services.

A significant boost to the program's coffers came last February when South Dakota's Kids Belong held a fundraising banquet in Spearfish which raised \$24,000, \$10,000 of which came from an anonymous donor. One entire table was occupied by staff from the state's Department of Social Services as well as the adoption program manager from Pierre. If anyone needed convincing as to the value and viability of the program, this was the place to be. The evening's speakers included Brian Mavis and Paula

Culver, a local foster mom. So where to effectively communicate the organization's needs and objectives? Why not start with area churches and the Sunday sermon. Talk about a captive audience! That's exactly what happened in April and May of 2018 when the congregations of Connection, Countryside and Grace Fellowship Churches in Spearfish and Connection Churches in Belle Fourche and Sturgis each conducted a four-week program dealing with the foster/adoptive crisis in the state highlighted in the fourth week with a sermon on what the Bible says about caring for vulnerable children. St. Joseph's Church in Spearfish gave a sermon about the program at one Sunday service with an informational meeting held the following week.

Kristi does stress that although statistics show that Christians are three times more likely to foster and two times more likely to adopt, the program is not restrictive. But a very positive result of these four-week programs was the fact that over 200 people attended follow-up informational meetings and 10 area families enrolled in a licensing class in Spearfish last fall to qualify as foster care providers.

And what if a person wants to help with the program without actually fostering a child? There's a place for that, too. It's called the Wrap Around Program to provide support for the foster family so they know they're not alone. Fostering is a big undertaking and without outside support, says Kristi, "fifty percent of foster families drop out."

Kristi's now working on a video program to actually introduce the children eligible for adoption. The program is already being used by other state chapters and will be overseen by the South Dakota Department of Social Services whose permission was obtained last September so that the children could be videoed.

"What a wonderful opportunity for children to speak for themselves and advocate for themselves," stresses Kristi who also wants people to know that while these videos will go on the chapter's Facebook page, they will have a special security device installed so as not to be misused

Who doesn't like a happy ending? And for many of these children, that's what they'll get. But there is a somber reality for those who age out of the system at 18. Left without a family, fewer than half will graduate from high school. Within two years, one in four will be in trouble with the law. Nearly two-thirds of the girls will be pregnant by age 21, one in four will experience PTSD, one in five will be homeless and all will have a much greater risk of becoming a victim of human trafficking.

Something to think about!



Donations have exceeded \$200.000.

The victory marked the first

The victory marked the first time since the 2010-2011 season that the Broncs knocked off the Spartans in a boys' varsity game.

Holding a 17-14 lead midway through the second quarter, Bronc senior Tate Hostetter was fouled hard next to the basket but still managed to get the shot to fall and added the free throw to give Belle Fourche a sixpoint edge.

"We've got a lot of boys that feed off of big plays like that – having one of our senior leaders, a three-year starter come up big in a rivalry game really gave us a lot of energy and momentum," Head coach Clay Pottorff said.

The Broncs were trying to get their lead to double-digits in the fourth quarter when Pottorff called a time out.

"I talked to the boys and said pressure was coming," Pottorff said of the timeout. "We just went into our high-low offense to give that sideline guy a lot of passing options and the boys

did well playing with each other and finding the open man at the end of the game."

Olson led the way offensively for Belle Fourche, as the junior scored a game-high 20 points. Hostetter added 13 points, including a pair of three-pointers. The Broncs were 10-15 from the free-throw line (67%). Spearfish, who fell to 0-9 with the loss, got 11 points from junior John Nickles.

In the JV game, The Broncs outscored Spearfish 18-11 in the fourth quarter to take a 47-44

Aiden Giffin led the way with 14 points, while Keaten Benson added 10 points and Tate Larson scored nine points.

(1-12): Belle and Wright(Wyo) played a tight game Saturday, but in the end the Panthers proved to be too much as they pulled away late for a 63-52 non-conference victory.

The Broncs trailed 11-10 after one quarter but back-to-back three-pointers by Bryce Nicholas and Kelby Olson gave Belle Fourche a 16-11 lead just one minute into the second period. Wright took a slight 24-23 edge into halftime.

The Panthers used a full court zone for much of the game and

Belle hosts Hot Springs (5-1) on Friday in a big Black Hills Conference matchup that Pottorff said could set the tone for the rest of the Broncs' season.

View Snowmobile Trails with Trail Cameras

PIERRE, S.D. - South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks (GFP) officials want to remind snowmobilers that trail cameras offer a visual aid for current trail conditions across the state. Trail cameras are located at Hardy Station, Savoy and the Kirk trailhead in the Black Hills. East River trails are utilizing four of South Dakota Department of Transportation's (DOT) road conditions cameras. Those cameras are located at the junction of Highways 34 and 37 east of Forestburg, Highway 14 east of Cavour,

Highway 81 south of Arling-

ton, the junction of Highways 20 and 25 west of Wallace and the junction of Highways 10 and 25 at Lake City.

"We are excited to offer the trail cameras," said Ryan Raynor, GFP snowmobile trails coordinator. "Oftentimes, areas like Rapid City or Sturgis may not be seeing snow, while the higher elevations are good for riding. The cameras are a great way to show people current conditions."

To view trail conditions, visit gfp.sd.gov and search "snow-mobiling."

GFP Commission Proposes Compromised Approach to Deer Drawing Structure

PIERRE, S.D. – Earlier today, the South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks (GFP) Commission unanimously passed a new deer license allocation proposal that would allow a hunter to apply for two of the six deer seasons in the first draw. These seasons include: East River/Special Buck, West River/Special Buck, Black Hills, Muzzleloader, Refuge and Custer State Park. Special Buck license holders would be limited to one additional application in the first draw as long as that application was not valid for the same season as their Special Buck license.

Nonresident hunters would still be eligible for eight percent of the allocation for West River, Black Hills and Refuge hunting seasons during the first drawing.

"We understand that initially, the intent was to get folks their most preferred tag, more often. While doing so, we lost some support along the way," stated GFP Commissioner Russell Olson of Madison. "The Commission has listened to our resident and nonresident deer hunters; we value public input and respectful dialogue has rewards. Because of this, we now have a compromise for those wanting to hunt East and West River in the same year allowing them

to continue their family and outdoor traditions."

Other details include:
In the second draw, a hunter may not apply for a leftover license if they possess two licenses for any of the East River/Special Buck, West River/Special Buck, Black Hills, Muzzleloader, Refuge and Custer State Park deer hunting units in the first draw. A person with one license for these seasons may submit one application for a season they currently do not possess a license.

In the third draw, a resident hunter (even if they possess 2 licenses) may submit one application for each season they do not possess a license.

In the fourth draw, resident hunters may submit up to five applications. Only those non-residents without a license may apply for a license remaining in pools originally designated (8%) for nonresidents (West

River, Black Hills or Refuge).
After the fourth draw, all remaining resident and nonresident licenses would be pooled and sold first-come, first-served. There will be no limit on the number of licenses that a person

can acquire.

In addition, preference points for the combined deer drawings

would be free to youth age 15 or younger during the calendar year when the preference point is acquired. A first-time applicant for a combined deer drawing that is or was age 15 or younger in the calendar year of the drawing would receive a bonus preference point for that drawing.

Pending finalization of this new proposal, the Commission intends to conduct a comprehensive review of these potential changes in three years.

This proposal is now open for public comment until the next Commission meeting on Feb. 28, 2019. This proposal is subject to change upon finalization.

To comment in person, the public hearing will be held Feb. 28 at 2 p.m. CST at the RedRossa Convention Center in Pierre. Individuals can comment online at https://gfp. sd.gov/forms/positions/ or mail them to 523 E. Capitol Ave., Pierre, SD 57501. To be included in the public record and to be considered by the Commission, comments must include a full name and city of residence and meet the submission deadline of 72 hours before the public hearing (not including the day of the

public hearing) per HB 1006.

Looking Back in Belle

These articles come from newspaper microfilm at the Belle Fourche Public library. The photographs are from the Tri-State Museum.

123 years ago Belle Fourche Times January 23, 1896

Ed Lemmon, of the Flying V Outfit says that owing to a recent ruling at Washington, the range pasture lands in the Indian Nation can be leased of the government agents, and that the move will furnish large stock growers an abundance of range. This practically settles the question of purchasing cattle at that point, because under the new condition of plenty of range the stockman do not care to sell. Bird Rose, now in that section on a purchasing trip, will soon return on that account. The Lake Tomb & Co. people, however, want 9,000 head of stock this spring.

A prominent railroad man in the east who is in touch with leading business men of every class says: "This war scare has been a good thing for us in many ways, Cattle exports will serve to illustrate the point. Before the appearance of the Venezuela question, cattle were being shipped at 30 shillings or \$7.50 a head. A few days ago the Cannard line closed a deal with Armour of Chicago, to take out not to exceed 5,000 cattle before April at 40 shillings or \$11. I understand also that the big firm of Sam Allerton & Co., have engaged the total livestock capacity of the Big White Star freighters, which carry from 800 to 1,000 head of cattle per week for the year of 1896, the price to be the market price. Corresponding with these advances have been advances in all other directions, wheat products included. From this the presumption is to be drawn that not only Great Britain, but also the continental powers are laying in provisions in case of war.

The Western South Dakota Stock Growers' Association, with headquarters at Buffalo Gap, as the co-operation of the Commissioners of Black Hills counties in creating a liberal and uniform bounty for the scalp of gray wolves. The bounty now paid for the entire hide is, in Butte county \$3, Lawrence \$3, Custer \$4, Pennington \$1.50, Meade \$1.50, Fall River \$1.50. The discrepancy is a bounty on dishonesty, says the Pioneer, as the hide taken to the county paying the highest bounty, no matter where the animal was killed. These pests are causing great loss to stock growers and are increasing instead of decreasing.

The million-dollar lawsuit of the United States vs. Homestake Mining company, for cutting timber on government land, which was to have been tried at the coming February term of U.S. court at Deadwood, it is now stated will again be postponed.

100 years ago January 23, 1919 **The Northwest Post** Peace Congress Opens Formally Most Notable Gathering World Has Ever Known Begins With Pomp and Ceremony Five Leading Powers Agree that Nation's Representation by Any Russian Element Is Impossible at This Time Paris – The first formal session of the peace congress opened at three in the afternoon. The Salle d'Horioge now rechristen the Salle de la Paix, and one of the most splendid reception rooms in Europe, was in readiness for the delegations of the various nations as they entered. The congress met in the beautiful Hall de la Paix; the opening was a ceremonial function, the leaders made their first bows, and the delegations exchanged salutations. Charles S Small and Lloyd A. 



That white line represents Butte county's goal of \$422,000 in the fourth war loan campaign. As bonds are purchased by Butte county residents the plane will move eastward toward the German capital. Street Light Destruction Stirs Council A wave of street light destruction that has reached alarming proportions, brought about a special meeting of the city council last night and a resulting determination to put a stop to the action. Wrecking of the street lights reached a new high in the past few days. Monday morning there was only one light bulb on all of the bridges in town. Lights are becoming increasingly difficult to replace. Though new ones may be ordered it might be weeks before the bulbs can be delivered. Someone had unscrewed the bulbs from their sockets on the Belle Fourche bridge. Electricians have warned that this is dangerous, in view of the fact that a powerful current is built up in the bridge wires – powerful enough to kill a person. The council voted Monday night to offer a \$50 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of responsible

persons. Runaway Automobile Crashes into Home Considerable damage resulted yesterday when a runaway car rolled from its parking place atop a hill on Eleventh Avenue South and crashed into the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Gates at the foot of the hill. The car, belonging to Mrs. Ralph Wendelken, slipped away unnoticed, officials reported, and struck the porch of Gates home. A corner of the porch was smashed and the front end of the automobile battered. Officials said Mrs. Wendelken's daughters had parked the car atop the hill, set the emergency brake and walked into the home of their brother, James Wendelken. The brake failed to hold and the car



Oak Valley Riverbank Stabilization **Project Complete**

A project along the Belle Fourche river on the northeast edge of the city designed to stabilize the riverbank has been completed. The Belle Fourche City Council approved the final payment of the project at their regular council meeting on Monday, Jan 7th.

The undertaking, known as the Oak Valley Riverbank stabilization project was necessary to halt potential damaging erosion. "The riverbank had cut to within about eight feet of our sewer force main," said Steve Nafus, Belle Fourche City Engineer. "So this will stabilize the riverbank and protect that."

A force main is a sewage pipeline that is under pressure. They are necessary when gravity flow is not sufficient to move water and sewage naturally. The Belle Fourche force main connects the Day Street lift station with the city's wastewater facility north of town.

About 350 feet of riverbank were stabilized using Class C riprap. The area of stabilization is visible on the east Belle

Fourche River riverbank from the Highway 212 bridge if you look to the south.

Northstar Construction completed the project at a final coast of \$104,573.51 which Nafus says was about \$1,900 under budget.

In a related project the council

also approved a payment of \$4,029.23 to HDR Engineering for design and engineering work that has been completed to date on the new Day Street lift station, which will be constructed this summer. See the Dec. 27th Beacon for details.
