County Commissioners Close Out 2019 with Some **Good News**

BELLE FOURCHE - The **Butte County Commissioners** met in their first regular session of the year on Tuesday, Jan. 7th. The commissioners had to close out a few items of unfinished business from 2019 and part of that related to the budget as County Auditor Elaine Jensen briefly took the helm.

"I bring you some good news," said Jensen. "Don't expect this windfall every year, but I have been very conservative with my revenues and this year I got more realistic. So, it looks like there's more money. But it will be a lot closer to our budget.'

Jensen reported that the \$150,000 for the grader refund and the \$2,500 transfer from the general fund to domestic abuse doesn't show.

The next order of business was designating Stan Harms as Board Chairman for 2020. This normally would have fallen to Vice Chair Karroll Herman, but she asked for another year's reprieve to "gain more experience." She was re-named to the Vice Chair post. All normal designations for meeting dates, time and depositories were re-affirmed and will remain unchanged from 2019.

A bit of a discussion was held regarding ambulance representatives, with Frank Walton asking for a switch of Kim Richards to remain on the board. Commissioner James Ager took on the building committee.

A travel request was presented to send three dispatch officers for further training, which is required for mental health continuing education.

During the time set aside for itizen comments, three representatives of Bickle's Truck and Diesel came to share with the board concerns they had about





Dear Friend,

When I see a sunrise, I am reminded of who I am as a believer and why I'm here on this earth. The miracle of the sun rising for another day is a physical display of God's power to conquer darkness, and the fact that it happens morning after morning is nature's declaration of His faithfulness to conquer darkness.

The horizon at daybreak is the line where heaven meets earth, and it testifies daily to mankind about God's faithfulness. As believers, we are "people of the horizon." We stand between the promises and provisions of heaven and the hurts and harms of earth. Our actions determine what of heaven is released on

On heaven's side of this line, God's will is that "all men be saved and come to the knowledge of the truth." Tri-State Museum and Visitor Center's To Open New Exhibit "Test Your Mettle"

Tri-State Museum and Visitor Center looks for metal objects for its new exhibit "Test Your Mettle"

The Tri-State Museum and Visitor Center will open a new temporary exhibit on Saturday, January 25th. The exhibit is entitled "Test Your Mettle," and is about the history and culture of metal, metal working and metallurgy.

The museum's permanent collections contain a number of metal items but many if not all are of iron. Items of other metals, including copper, brass, bronze and other metals are less abundant.

"At last our anvil is going to get its moment of glory!" said Director Kristi Thielen. "And we have a number of early mercantile, rural and ranching metal items. But if we could expand on this with additional items of other metals, it would increase the interest in the exhibit. That includes artistic objects of metal, too."

Thielen requests that those



who might have a metal object to loan to the exhibit - temporary exhibit items are always loans, not gifts to the museum should contact Collections Archivist Jada Udager to discuss the item and see if it is something that we can put into "Test Your Mettle."

Thielen adds that large metallic objects can either be placed

in front of story panels or on plinths; smaller or more valuable items can be placed within

Bentz in May of 1979. In those days the parts were listed on card files which later on turned to a microfilm parts


reader and then to computers. Dave has worked through upgrades; updates and changes in computers since John Deere began to utilize the Internet.



If you've made a resolution this year to get your credit on track, getting started can feel a bit daunting. After all, it can sometimes seem as if credit agencies want to keep you in the dark about how scores are calculated. Not to worry - with some diligence on your part and a little insight into the world of credit score-keeping, you can get back on track in 2020.

Paint your credit score on your wall for extra motivation

Credit scores follow an algorithm first developed by the data analytics company FICO years ago. For a while, credit scores weren't the primary force behind a credit decision but over time the impact of a credit score became more and more important. Most every loan program available today has a minimum credit score.


There are five characteristics of your credit history that make up your three-digit score: your payment history, account balances, the length of your credit history, the types of credit used and how often you've applied for new credit. Credit scores will improve much more quickly by paying attention to the two categories that have the greatest impact on a score: payment history and account balances.

Payment history accounts for 35 percent of the total score. When someone makes a payment more than 30 days past the due date, scores will fall. An occasional "late pay" won't do much damage to your score but continued payments made more than 30 days past due definitely will. Preventing late payments is a key to recovering your

score

Account balances compare outstanding loan balances with credit lines and make up 30 percent of your score. If a credit card has a \$10,000 credit line and there is a \$3,300 balance, scores will actually improve, as the ideal balance-to-limit is about one-third of the credit line. As the balance grows and approaches or exceeds the limit, scores will begin to fall.

The remaining three have relatively little impact. How long someone has used credit accounts for 15 percent of the score, but there's really nothing anyone can do to improve this area other than to wait. Types of credit and credit inquiries both make up 10 percent of the score. By concentrating on payment history and account balances, scores will improve significantly over the next few months.

Jan. 15th- National Bagel

Bagel Facts: Bagels are always round; Bagels are also known as beigels; Bagels are boiled before they are baked; The most popular bagel flavor is plain; The second most popular bagel flavor is sesame; The name bagel comes from the German word "bougel," a name which means bracelet.

The modern bagel is believed to have been a direct descendant of a ringed Polish bread product known as obwarzanek - food that was invented during the late 14th century. While it's not known exactly when the bagel was first created, there are records going back to the 17th century when it was given out as gifts to women who had just gone through childbirth in Krakow, Poland. It was around this time that it became a big part of the Slavic diet from the 1600s on. During the 19th century, Eastern European immigrants brought bagels with them when they emigrated to the United States. CRP Enrollment Options

The USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) is currently taking applications to enroll environmentally sensitive agricultural land into perennial cover for 10 to 15 years through the federally funded Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). Participants receive annual rental payments and 50 percent cost-share to establish the perennial cover, which can be grasses, forbs, and/or trees, to control soil erosion, improve water quality and develop wildlife habitat. The 2018 Farm Bill created more having and grazing management opportunities for land enrolled in CRP as well.

A cropping history of 4 out of 6 years from 2012 to 2017 is required to enroll cropland. It also must be physically and legally capable of being planted in a normal manner to an agricultural commodity. Land that was previously enrolled in CRP and expired on Sept. 30 of 2017, 2018 or 2019 that was not allowed to be re-enrolled in those years, has one chance to be re-enrolled this year. Land currently enrolled that will be expiring on Sept. 30, 2020 is also currently eligible to be re-enrolled in CRP.

Through February 28th, 2020, applications can be submitted through the general CRP enrollment period. Each offer is ranked according its Environmental Benefits Index (EBI) score. The EBI assesses the value of each offer for wildlife habitat, air quality, water quality, reduced erosion, and benefits that will likely endure beyond the contract period. After the enrollment period ends, the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture will decide what the EBI score will need to be at or above to be accepted. Offers that are accepted

will have contract start dates of October 1st, 2020.

Here are a few tips to help increase your general CRP offer's EBI score and your chances of it being accepted.

1) Offer a high diversity mix of native species.

2) Establish pollinator friendly habitat or add a food plot. 3) Consider offering only the portions of your fields with the highest erodibility index value. Your local FSA office can help you determine what your erodibility index values are.

4) As a last resort, consider accepting less than the maximum rental rate.

Another option to enroll environmentally sensitive land into CRP is through the non-competitive continuous CRP enrollment. Cropland must meet the same basic eligibility requirements as for a general CRP enrollment, but must also meet additional targeted environmental requirements. Practices like buffer strips, wetland restoration, duck nesting habitat, pollinator habitat, prairie strips, windbreaks, shelterbelts, or living snow fences are eligible to be enrolled through continuous CRP. Marginal pasture land may also be eligible.

Continuous CRP enrolled land also receives an annual rental rate and 50% cost-share. New land enrolled through continuous CRP also receives a Signup Incentive Payment equal to 32.5 percent of the first full year annual rental payment and an additional Practice Incentive Payment of 5 percent for installing the practice. These incentive payments are not available for land enrolled through general



123 years ago Belle Fourche Times, **January 16, 1897** Return of Judge Moody

Judge Moody arrived from Yankton, where he has been in attendance at the Supreme Court last evening. During the term the Court were occupied with hearing many cases of importance. He suggested the holding of one of the terms of the Supreme Court of each year at Deadwood, and while his colleagues would not oppose any such action, yet they were not ready to advoke for it. The necessity of such a change is evident from the fact that at the last term of the Supreme Court there were fourteen cases on the calendar of which eight were from the Hills, and most of them involving valuable property, while those from the other districts were trifling and insignificant. The importance of this matter to every one appear upon a moments reflection and some definite action should at once be taken by our citizens to induce the Legislature to amend the law so that one term of the Supreme Court could be held each year at Deadwood.

100 years ago **Belle Fourche Post** January 15, 1920 World Peace Is Signed By 13 Allies and Germany Put Treaty Into Effect – U. S. Not Party to Ceremony - Signatures To Protocol

Paris, - The treaty of Versailles, making peace between Germany and the 13 ratifying allied powers was put into effect at 4:15 Saturday afternoon, 14 months after the armistice went into effect, by the exchange of ratifications. The entire ceremony, which took place in the hall of the clock at the French foreign ministry, was completed by 4:16. Following the ceremony the documents were handed to French officials for deposit in the archives. The records will be printed on large sheets and the seals of the plenipotentiary will be affixed.

Germany Undone By Own Weapon Had Sold to America Secret of Making Explosive From Air - Big Nitrate Plant Results Built In Eight Months It Convinces Kaiser of His Defeat

One of the most romantic passages in the secret history of the World War is the story of how the Ordinance Department of the United States Army made it possible for America, until then utterly lacking in ammunition and in facilities for making it, to manufacture unlimited quantities of powerful explosives out of air and rock. It was largely the knowledge of this fact, that forced Germany to surrender when she did. The secret was secured from Germany herself. It was a open business transaction between business men, whereby we apparently acquired nothing more than a high grade fertilizer known as Cyanamid.


Turning Air Into a Weapon By this process air, which is a mixture of about four-fifths nitrogen gas and one-fifth oxygen, is placed in containers and subjected to pressure and cold until it turns to liquid. Then the nitrogen is distilled in much the same manner as alcohol is separated from water. But before this nitrogen can be used as a fertilizer it must be combined with a chemical combination of lime and carbon known as calcium carbide, produced by burning ordinary limestone in big rotary kilns and combining it in the electric furnace with carbon supplied in the form of ordinary coke. Cyanamid thus produced contains the elements of ammonium nitrates, one of the most powerful of modern explosives. By one process ammonium is exacted from the Cyanamid. By another process nitric acid is extracted from another batch of this same Cyanamid. Then the ammonia and nitric acid are combined and there you have ammonium nitrate ready for packing into the

Washington, Jan. 14 - Vermont's Senator Aiken is pressing his plea for a food stamp program to guarantee low income

groups an adequate war-time diet. The senator told a senate agriculture sub-committee this morning that the plan is anti-inflationary, would cost about 420 million dollars a year and would help some 16 million persons with annual incomes of \$1100 or less. He recommended the program as an alternative to general consumer subsidies. But he added that it would not stand in the way of subsidies for a price support system. The War Food Administration has approved the





information. Ager asked about the fact that, even though the truck was sold "as is," they were promised paperwork describing the maintenance of the vehicle. That paperwork never arrived. The truck was also supposed to have had an overhaul previous to purchase.

"They (the company from which the truck was purchased) said it had motor work done and now we're having to overhaul this engine," said Commissioner Frank Walton. "If it (the truck) was taking 3-4 gallons of oil per day, that would have been good information to have."

"Was there any mention of that (maintenance paperwork) in the purchase agreement?" questioned Commissioner Kim Richards. In other business Heidrich reported that the concrete beams for the Winkler bridge would be arriving on Tuesday, with the expectation of being placed on Wednesday morning. Once the deck work is done, the county crew will finish the final wing supports and backfill and the bridge will once again be viable.

Wes Wood was in attendance at the meeting for the discussion of the Habeck road and the property line issues

property line issues.

Deputy State's Attorney
LeEllen McCartney explained
the conversation she had with
Sally Sprigler over an agreement Sprigler said where the
county had allegedly agreed to
pay for her fence to be moved.

"I can't tell you if she was promised a fence or wasn't," said McCartney. "Do you want me to talk to her and try to make some kind of agreement or do you want me to take a hard line."

"I don't see how we can make concession to one person and not to another," said Richards.

"The law says if there's encroachment of the property line, compensation needs to be made," McCartney said. "But that's not the case here."

"She should be informed if we are going to move the road to a section line, that it's going to cost her more money," said Herman.

After a period of more discussion, a decision was made to send a letter to Sprigler telling her of the date when she needed to have her fence moved, with no compensation.
