Questions Arise About Belle City Liquor Store

BELLE FOURCHE---The search for a manager for the city-owned liquor store continues. Discussion of the interim management of the liquor store arose during the "Informal Discussion" segment of the Council's regular meeting agenda.

Ward 1 Councilor Troy Schockey raised his concerns at that time. His opinion was that Mayor Landphere and City Finance Officer Breanna Scheafer may be "more deeply involved in the operation of the business than is necessary".

The Shockey suggestion was to have a supervisory committee or an oversight committee to create checks and balances.

He added he talked with Landphere and was told that the legal and finance committee has the responsibility.

"I think it would safeguard you and Breanna (Schaefer-City Finance Officer) from any type of legal action," he told Landphere..

He went on to say that in idle discussion, the thought was made that if someone wanted to, they could rob the city blind. Landphere responded to the comments by asserting such a thing is not possible.

"The liquor store falls under Legal and Finance, and if Breanna is asked about numbers and the like she has all the backup data. Right now they have an assistant manager out there and she provides all the things we need for the finance office. Where I fall into play about this is I'm the head of the Administrative team. So right now, in this flux that we are in, all of the information and balancing of the receipts and the bills that come in, we handle that," she said.

She added Schaefer is working with the assistant manager to keep things going.

She continued by telling Shockey that if he was looking for internal controls, they are already in place.

"I do not touch product, I do not take money to City Hall and I do not process any transactions coming from the store," she said.

Shockey replied that he got the impression that Landphere has spent considerable time at the

City Joins Talks on Possible 9-1-1 Call Center Merger

Plans will take careful work to make happen

BELLE FOURCHE - A joint meeting of the Belle Fourche City Council and representatives from Butte County was held last Wednesday night in order for the city to more fully join in the conversation of a possible merger of the Butte County Dispatch Center with the Meade County Dispatch Center.

Up until now the merger talks were being led by Butte County with Sheriff Fred Lamphere taking the point on the effort. But public hearings on the proposed merger have produced largely negative reaction. Since Belle Fourche contracts with the County for the service within city limits Mayor Gloria Landphere thought it was time to get the city more involved in the discussion. "We really need to know how things are going to roll out," the Mayor said.

Dispatch centers serve an important function. When a resident of the city or county make a 9-1-1 call, someone at

the dispatch center, located at the Butte County Courthouse, receives that call and routes appropriate emergency or other resources to respond to that

A merger is seen as way for the new joint call center to qualify for additional state funding (more on that in a moment). According to Butte County Commissioner Kim Richards this is an important consideration when the County's budget is being decimated with law enforcement costs related to prisoner transport, housing and court-related expenses.

However, a merger also means the new call center would in all likelihood be located in Sturgis. That means up to four jobs could be cut and those jobs that remain would be transferred out of town along with the physical equipment, resulting in a loss of tax dollars and status to the Belle Fourche community. "We're on the cusp of growth here," said Councilman Travis Martin. "We need to be looking for ways to keep services here, increase budgets and move forward."

Here are the basics of how the funding of the call centers work. Everyone who has a phone pays a \$1.25 monthly surcharge and

for those with prepaid wireless services there is a 2% fee. That money goes to the State as a 911 Surcharge Fee. Then, the State sends that money back to the dispatch centers to help pay for the center's employees and

operations.

But here's the rub. If the dispatch center covers an area of less than 30,000 in population the State says 70% of the phone fees collected come back. The other 30% goes to help subsidize the state's larger call centers. Belle Fourche and Sturgis serve less than 30,000 each and receive 70%. With the merger it would put the call center over the 30,000 mark meaning they would qualify for the additional funding.

Former Belle Fourche Volunteer Fire Department Chief Oz Hespe says the legislation needs to change. "One hundred percent of that money comes from Belle Fourche and Butte County, then why should Rapid City and Sioux Falls get the other 30%?"

Sheriff Lamphere told the group that five years ago the county performed upgrades of half-a-million dollars to the 9-1-1 system. In another three years he says another upgrade is going to be required. And

every call center in the state is required to keep up with the changes. "In the next two years the state says we will need to increase personnel numbers to have as least two people manning the call center 24 hours a day," the Sheriff said. "Right now we have two people on dispatch for 18 hours a day and one other person for the other six. With the new rules our costs are going to increase by \$150,000 to \$200,000 a year."

Vickie Greenwood is the Butte County Dispatch Coordinator and she feels that as each year goes by the state regulations are pushing dispatch centers toward mergers. As of last June there were 32 dispatch centers in the state, including tribal centers. There has been talk in Pierre that the state would like to eventually get that number down to around 15 or so. "I think the state is going to keep narrowing things down until they get what they want."

Sheriff Lamphere said that he has heard no negative feedback from other mergers that have occurred in the State. Eventually he says, going at it alone will be an issue that Butte County will have to deal with. "We're going to come up against a

news@bellefourchebeacon.com Butte County Deputy Sheriff Casey McKenzie has his roots in Wyoming, imbuing him with a love of the land and a soft-spoken compassion for the people living on either side of the Wyoming/ South Dakota border. The



fact that he was actually born in Arizona doesn't matter. His parents just happened to be there when Casey

came into the world.
"My family ran ranches all across Wyoming and western Nebraska," he relates. "I grew up on ranches, mostly in the Laramie, Encampment and Sheridan areas in Wyoming." His grandfather ran the Dayton headquarters of the renowned Padlock Ranch for 53 years.

Although he actually graduated from high school in Sioux County, Nebraska, Casey has spent a majority of his life on the Wyoming side of the border. He settled in Jackson in 2002, working for an outfitter in the Teton wilderness for several years,

then moving on to a ranch job elsewhere in the state. Casey returned to Jackson in 2011, this time with his wife Danielle, working for the U.S. Forest Service in the same country where he'd previously worked for the outfitter. But now married and starting a family, Casey and Danielle looked for a more family-oriented atmosphere in which to raise their children. The couple now have two daughters, one nearly four and the other six months.

Casey joined the Sheriff's Office nearly three years ago, having completed a 13-week course at the South Dakota Law Enforcement Academy in Pierre. Behind the wheel

or behind the desk, Casey finds his work as a deputy sheriff primarily occupied by drug-related offenses. He concurs with his fellow-deputies that the department rarely has problems with the people they deal with, simply saying "the Sheriff's Office has very good relations with the community." Casey is a saddle maker and had his own shop several years ago. Today he still builds saddles when he's not "back in the saddle" responding to calls over the 410 state (lane) miles and nearly 850 county road miles crisscrossing Butte County.



The Liberator and the Defender



names reading as one way of withdrawing from the world in order to enter into dialogue with the Divine. "Reading is dialogical" (p. 47) he says, and then goes on to recommend Lectio Divina to "apply the content of

our religious beliefs to the concrete circumstance of our life." A theology course challenged me do Lectio Divina by using a timemeld. I was to read a passage and retell the story in a contemporary setting, or to overlay a contemporary event into the era of the passage. Recently, as I read anew the story of Jesus' ministry from baptism to Jerusalem, the television played in another room.

When I read John's question, "Are you the Messiah we've been expecting, or should we keep looking for someone else?" the television asked, "Which presidental candidate should be president?" That juxtaposition inspired a time-meld. Let's recast events from 2000 years ago into a campaign for Messiah.

A messiah is a liberator and a defender of the people; the light-bearer who illuminates the pathway ahead. Consider these four main candidates vying to be the liberator and defender: Herod Antipas, Caiaphas, John the Baptizer, and Jesus of Nazareth. Consider the candidates:

Herod Antipas, tetrach of Galilea and Perea, desired absolute power and eliminated challengers by death at the hands of his military forces. Anti-

pas offered military protection to the regions under his control. He led by fear and incited Romans and Jews to fear one another and fear him

Caiaphas, one of the monied elete Saddaccees, was already president of the Sanhedrim.Appointed to this position by Pontiius Pilate's predecessor, he was successful at currying Rome's favor. He and Antipas had a mutually beneficial relationship. Caiaphas collected temple taxes and operated his own dungeon and flogging floor. He offered protection from Rome and used fear to remain in control John the Baptizer was an ascetic living in the wilderness. Many believed he was Elijah reincarnated. He desired reform of the Jewish people and retribution against Rome. He offered salvation and used fear of condemnation as a motivating force. John withdrew his candidacy and directed his followers to follow Jesus whom he identified as the

"Lamb of God."

Jesus, the Nazarene, was a Pharisee—one whose emphasis was on the keeping of the laws. Jesus' desired that people follow the intent of the Law and live in right relationship to God by living in right relationship to one another. His methodology was compassion--shown through personal conversations and relationships, and through dying to keep his word to make his point.

We can see the division caused by this fear. People ceased viewing others as God's beloved children. They only saw the labels they applied: Pharisee, Sadducee, tax collector, harlot, leper, Samaritian, Nazarene (John 1:46: Can anything good come from Nazareth?"). When presented with fear of danger and when offered protection from that fear, they were led to shout, "Crucify him. Crucify him."

In using the time-meld as Lectio Divina and following Casey's advice to apply "religious beliefs to the concrete circumstance of my life," I am led to question my actions. "Am I being led by fear or by love?" and "Who am I following?'

In the days to come, may we all spend time in a nook, with a book; in a chair, with a prayer; and through our hearts' ears, may we, to God draw near. Amen.



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

"I feel comfortable with the way things are happening and I guess I was wondering if anyone had any questions for me. Other than that, I'm doing what I can to help out until we find a manager," she said.

South Dakota Codified Law 35-4-10 says: the number of off-sale licenses restricted by population. No more than two off-sale licenses may be issued under this chapter to operate in a municipality of one thousand or less and not exceeding one license for every additional fifteen hundred of population or fraction thereof. Belle Fourche with an estimated current population of over 5,500 would be able to issue five licenses.

The Beacon asked three separate Belle businesses if they would have any interest in pursuing an off-sale license if the City privatized. They asked to remain anonymous at this time, but off the record, all three answered in the affirmative of having a strong interest.

wall where we will have to pay more," the sheriff said. "And then what (programs) are we going to take away from to keep the service?"

Even with that sense of inevitability Mayor Landphere said moving forward will not be easy. "I've talked with a lot of people. Doing something like this could really be an uphill battle in Belle," the mayor said. "We need to think this through and figure out how it's going to work for us. Because once it's done, it's done."

If the merger is completed, dividing up the costs of running the new call center was an issue of concern. Sheriff Lamphere said a "user board" would have to be set up that would have representatives from all entities involved. Costs would be divided up according to call volume. In the most recent statistics for Butte County, 65% of 9-1-1 calls came form the city and 35% from the county, according the Sheriff Lamphere.

"Trust me, Meade County is looking out for Meade County here," Hespe said. "We're going to spend a fortune to turn this thing around if it goes south. We have to fight for Belle Fourche.'

Currently the Meade County center operates with eight dispatchers, as does the Butte County center. With the merger, four positions from the Butte County call center in all likeli-


hood would be eliminated. A possible combined 9-1-1

call center based in Sturgis would serve these agencies from Butte County: Belle Fourche Police Department, Belle Fourche Volunteer Fire Department, Butte County Sheriff, Butte County Ambulance Service, Newell Ambulance Service, Newell Fire Department, Nisland Fire Department, Vale Fire Department. The combined facility would continue to serve these Meade County agencies: Meade County Sheriff, Sturgis Police, Faith Police, Summerset Police, Sturgis Volunteer Fire Department, Sturgis Ambulance Service, Vale Fire Department, Union Center and Enning Fire and Ambulance, and Hereford Volunteer Fire Department.

In August of 2019 the State was awarded a \$1.5 million grant from the federal 9-1-1 Grant Program to be distributed among the state's call centers to make digital upgrades to their systems. Tony Mangan, DPS spokesman, says NG911. or "Next Generation 911" will make better use of current technology, including taking full advantage of digital cell phones, and internet-based broadband-enabled technology to coordinate emergency response. NG911 will also improve service during heavy call load times, such as a natural disaster and makes transferring 911 calls within a system easier and more efficient.

At the end of the meeting both sides agreed they would continue discussions on the possible merger with mutual input from both the county and city.

Inspections, appraisals, and automated valuation models, while related, all have different functions but can be easily confused. Let's take a closer look.

Inspections: A property inspection is ordered by the buyer and is meant to be an unbiased look at the condition of the property. The appraisal will consider comparable homes in the area as well as other factors such as lot size, nearby schools and crime rates. The goal of the appraisal is to determine the true value of the property for

the sake of the lender.

The key difference between an inspection and an appraisal is that an inspection aims to assess the physical condition of a home itself, while an appraisal solely determines the market value of the real estate.

AVMs: An automated valuation model is a digital evaluation of the value of a home. An AVM will quickly research the database of similar homes in the area and compare them with the value of the subject property. AVMs are often used to assess the value of a property portfolio, and have the advantage of saving time and money since no one physically visits the property. However, AVMs can't take into account the true condition of a property and often aren't enough to secure a conventional loan for a home buyer.

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Call Center Merger Talks Raise Conflict of Interest Issue

BELLE FOURCHE---A meeting held January 22 between the Belle Fourche City Council and the Butte County Commission revealed possible conflict of interest for James Ager, who serves on both boards. The meeting, to discuss Butte County Dispatch, could have had legal ramifications so a conversation ensued during the City Council meeting January 21.

Ward 4 Councilor Randy Schmidt raised the question about how this all works at the City Council meeting January 21 and City Attorney Dwight Gubbrud tried to explain how the State views such a situation.

"I understand there's a meeting on the 22nd between the city and the county regarding the dispatch center and I understand there are those who have reservations about Councilman Ager's position because he sits on both the City Council and the County Commission. I haven't reviewed an agenda so I don't know what is planned for the meeting but the potential for issues to arise for both the city and the county are real,' said Gubbrud.

He added that the county owns the dispatch center and city contracts with the county for use

"So we have two parties to the contract, and both parties will be at the meeting," he said. "In the event the contract or the services will be discussed, those are two conflicting parties although they may not be in disagreement there is a potential for conflict of interest there," he concluded.

A question arose that if no finances are discussed could Ager take part in the discussion? "Based upon case law the Supreme Court

advised that if any member had a conflict he or she was required to reveal that conflict and abstain from discussing or voting on any items," said Gubbrud.

He did point out that if circumstances prevent a member from participating in the discussion, there is nothing in state statute from engaging in the conversation as a private citizen.

"For instance, if one of you came to the council for a variance, obviously you wouldn't want to sit on the council, but there is nothing pre-

venting that person from speaking as a resident. The member would vacate his or her seat in the dais and come out into the public and that would be acceptable.

James Ager had been listening to the discussion and then began to take part.

"I did call Dwight and had a good discussion and we agreed on some things but on some we didn't. The conflict has yet be determined, as least in my opinion. For the sake of general discussion, I don't see where we'll be discussing a whole lot. I don't just represent the seven of you, and I don't represent the other four of them. I represent the people that voted for me." he said.

He acknowledged that any discussion of finances could create the conflict of interest, but that doesn't seem likely during the meeting. "If this group would rather have me speak as a citizen, then that's something I would consider," he said.

He went on that he was glad the issue came up and hasn't taken anything personally.

He then asked if anyone of his colleagues felt that there was a conflict, and Mayor Gloria Landphere commented that they had a chance to sit down and discuss the issue when Ager mentioned his intention to run for the county

Landphere reiterated her concern about the discussion and possible looking at numbers, and Ager acknowledged that concern.

City Attorney Gubbrud stepped into the discussion again to address there are other types of conflict of interest besides financial considerations and if need be they can be looked at.

He added this is a difficult issue in South Dakota since there a many municipalities that don't have enough people to run for councils or commissions, so some do double duty. "But this is still a fine line that must be walked," he said.

The bottom line then is that all on the council want to avoid any trouble that would damage the image of the city council.

The meeting at Deadwood last Thursday of the mayors and prominent business men of Black Hills towns, resulting in the organization of the "Black Hills Improvement" association, the object of which will be to direct the attention of capital to the advantages, and assist in developing the resources, of the Black Hills country. Arthur H. Marble was elected vice-president in this town, one of his duties being to organize a local branch of the association in Belle Fourche.

Washington, Jan 25 – Mr. Call offered in the Senate today a radical resolution demanding that by either peaceful negotiation or force of arms the Armenian atrocities be stopped. 


