Black Hills Stock Show Stockmen of the Year: Ray and Linda Gilbert

Anyone who is lucky enough to take home a pint of Linda Gilbert's canned beef is getting a treat.

And each jar, sealed with cubes of beef and rich gravy in it, is a symbol of what Linda and her husband Ray Gilbert stand for: taking what the grass and the cattle give them, and turning it into sustenance for friends and family.

The Gilberts are honored as the Silver Spur Stockman of the Year for the Black Hills Stock Show.

They ranch ten miles south-east of Buffalo, S.D., with a commercial Angus cattle and a cow/calf operation.

Ray was thirteen years old when his dad, Lloyd, passed away, leaving the fourth generation, Ray, his sister and their mother, Helga, to run the place. Linda was born to Ken and Ruth Halligan in Valentine, Neb., and grew up near Pierre on a ranch.

The two met while in school at South Dakota State University and married in 1970. They came back to Buffalo and began ranching.

It wasn't always easy. Prices were low, days were long, and

there wasn't always enough money to pay bills.

But they persevered, learning and adapting as times changed. The climate in the northwest corner of the state is harsh, nearly arid, with sandy soil.

It required a delicate balance between caring for the land and making a profit on a ranch.

The Gilberts found that balance. Forty years ago, they changed their operation to rotational grazing, adding twenty miles of electric cross fencing and not putting cattle out to graze till June 1, to allow the warm season grasses a chance to get started.

It was a good move. Since then, they've doubled the carrying capacity of the ranch and improved the quality of the grasses, too.

"We had a lot of prairie sand reed grass," Ray said, "so we were just trying to figure out a way to get some use out of it. One of the things we researched was we could rotate graze it, and we did. And we're still getting tremendous use out of it."

They've noticed the native grasses are returning because of the rotational grazing, he said. "We're getting a lot of western wheat grass and blue grama, a variety of grasses coming up within those pastures."

They don't put up a lot of hay, either, allowing cattle to graze instead of feeding them bales. "We feel like the cattle are the best way to harvest that grass," Linda said. "We try to use the resources that are here."

At one time, they added yearlings and sheep to supplement income, and Linda went back to college, cramming 54

credit hours in seven months, so she could teach school. She taught for three years, getting them over the financial hump, "paying for insurance, all those things a ranch wife does."

The couple competed in rodeo in their younger days, Ray as a steer wrestler in high school, college, and the pros, and Linda barrel raced in college. But once they came back to the ranch, they quit. "It was

too hard to travel and be gone" from the ranch, Linda said.

Ray and Linda have two children: a son, Lloyd, who is married to Patty, and a daughter, Andrea. Both of them competed in rodeo; Lloyd won championships in high school and college as a steer wrestler. Now the next generation is getting in on it. Lloyd and Patty's daughter Sawyer and son Grey are rodeo competitors.

Sawyer was just crowned the 2021 WPRA Breakaway World Champion. Ray and Linda were in Las Vegas to watch her compete. "It's pretty fun to cheer for a world champion," she laughed. "I can't deny that."

Grey is a junior in high school and competes in the steer wrestling, like his dad and granddad did. His great-granddad, Ken Halligan, rode broncs. Grey

South Dakota Kids Belong sees Statewide Success

Belle Fourche couple recognized by Gov. Noem at state of the State address.

BELLE FOURCHE – Looking back over the last four years Belle Fourche resident Kristi Woolsey finds it hard to grasp just how far the group she and her husband founded in 2017 has come.

Today, South Dakota Kids Belong (SDKB), an organization to help South Dakota kids in crisis find permanent homes and forever families, has grown from its Belle Fourche base to having an influence across the state - responsible for placing more than 100 children in loving homes, recruiting more than 150 new licensed adoptive parents and earning the praise of South Dakota Gov. Kristi Noem in last month's state of the state address.

"It has really been an amazing thing," Woolsey told the Beacon. "When we started this I literally couldn't even comprehend how to do any of this. But we prayed about it and took it step-by-step and with God's help and the help of so many others it's just grown and grown."

Today SDKB has two full-time employees and four part-time employees. Kristi's husband Damen is Executive Director and one of the two full-time employees. The other was just brought on board and

is based out of Rapid City.

SDKB is a 501c3 organization that is funded by private donations, churches and businesses. Currently SDKB is in the midst of planning its annual fundraising banquet to be held February 25th from 6-8pm at Countryside Church in Spearfish. The keynote speaker will be Mrs. Universe, Tori Petersen, a foster youth and foster care advocate. The dinner will be catered by Cheyenne Crossing and there is no cost to attend. Woolsey says they just want as many people as possible to come learn about their organization and potentially become involved through giving of time or money. The goal is to raise \$100,000 at this year's Rise Up for SD Kids Gala.

"For this coming year our focus is really going to be in Pennington County," Woolsey said. "Pennington County has more kids in care than Sioux Falls does, and Sioux Falls has triple the number of available foster parents. We need to recruit more foster parents there."

In fact SDKB made progress in 2021 in Pennington County with a net increase in foster families from 73 in July to 91 by the end of December 2021. Many of those foster parents took in more than one child.

One of the ways the organization connects kids with foster parents is through the creation of video profiles featuring individual children and sibling groups. The videos are general-

ly recorded in either Rapid City, Pierre or Sioux Falls. They are produced locally by Western Sky Media and are then distributed nationally by the parent organization in Colorado and regionally by SDKB using their platforms. Thus far more than 150 videos have been distributed and last year 90% of the children featured found families to take them in, according to SDKB.

"We hear story after story from the case workers saying that the videos are so helpful in finding families for these kids. That's really encouraging and the team, our volunteers, and supporters are making an impact across the state for those kids and families," Woolsey said.

In 2019 SDKB began a program to work alongside their adoption effort called Wrap Around. Realizing that not every family is ready to foster or adopt, wrap around allows them to be involved in other ways. Wrap teams, as they are known, support adoptive and foster families by providing meals, babysitting, groceries, encouragement and many other creative means of wrapping support around them.

"It's really neat to hear from foster families how just getting a note in the mail or a box of diapers dropped off at their door helps them move forward. It gives them that little bit of encouragement they need to say 'I can keep going,'" Woolsey said. "In fact, there's a Northern Hills foster family who has told us that without their wrap around support they would not have continued fostering."

Woolsey says the wrap around program has three purposes; allowing foster parents to be seen and appreciated; allowing foster children to have more positive adult relationships in their lives; and to recruit future foster parents from wrap team members.

"We just had a wrap team in Mobridge that is made up of four families who started in

The current commissioner, Ryan Brunner, will step down from his position and join Governor Noem's office as a senior policy advisor. Ryan's last day in elected office was January 31, 2022.

"Ryan has been a tireless servant to the people of South Dakota as Commissioner of School and Public Lands, and he has earned respect throughout the halls of the Capitol and across the state.

We are excited to have him join our team in the Governor's

Office," said Governor Kristi Noem. "Jarrod will be a capable and qualified steward of the office until the next commissioner is elected by the people."

"This is a great opportunity to serve the state of South Dakota," said Brunner. "As I term limit this year and transition out of office, it is an honor to be asked by Governor Noem to join her administration."

Ryan grew up on a family farm/feedlot operation in Nisland, SD and graduated from Newell High School.

He received his B.S. in agricultural economics from SDSU in 2007. While he was a student, he also served as the students' association president and was elected to the Brookings City Council. After graduating, Ryan worked for the Brookings Economic Development Corporation before being appointed the Deputy Commissioner of School and Public Lands under former Commissioners Jarrod Johnson and Vern Larson.

In November, 2014, Ryan was elected as South Dakota's 27th Commissioner of School and Public Lands.

Ryan now lives in Pierre with his wife Whitney, their son Callum and daughters Lilah and Reagan.

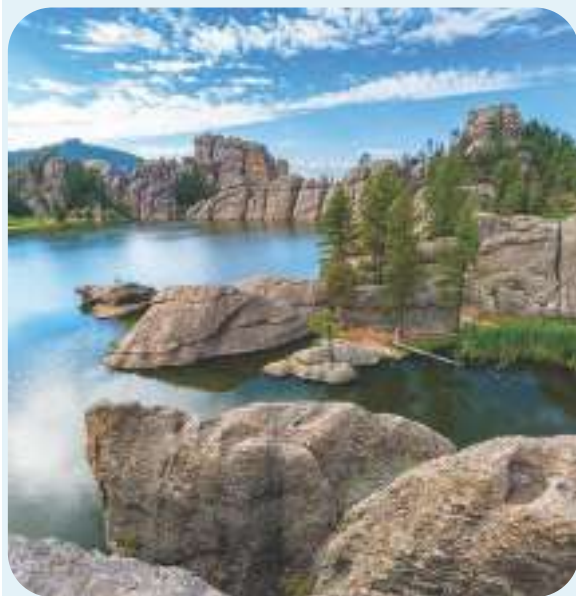

You've probably been hearing a lot about tongue ties lately. But, you may be asking, what is a tongue tie? Simply put, tongue ties, and lip ties, exist when frenums in the oral cavity are too tight. Oral frenums are thin tissues that attach to other tissues in the body. There are two types of frenums in the oral cavity. The lingual frenum is found between the base of your tongue and the floor of your mouth. In your upper and lower dental arches you will find the labial frenums. These are the tissues that connect the gums and cheeks to the lips. They are found in front of your two front upper and lower teeth. If these tissues are too tight it can lead to problems, big and small, for kids and adults.

Let's start at birth - If a baby has a tight frenum and is "lip tied" or "tongue tied", the baby's cheeks, lips or tongue cannot effectively lift and round to make the proper seal needed to breastfeed. This then leads to a deficiency in the tongue's ability to guide the growth of the upper jaw. Crazy, right? But, growth and development of the face and airway really does start that early. This is due to the proper tongue posture while at rest and having a proper swallow. If not caught at infancy, tongue and lip ties can lead to further developmental problems during growth, like speech and breathing concerns as well as neck and shoulder tension. A person with a lip or tongue tie will continue to overuse the other muscles to -

compensate for inefficiencies of the tongue and lip. Tension or pain from overactive muscles in the face can lead to pain in other areas of the body: the head, neck, shoulders, or lower back.

If an oral frenum is too tight, it can be referred to as a tethered oral tissue. Tethered oral tissue should be evaluated by a medical professional. If your infant has trouble latching or if your child has trouble with their speech, they may have a tongue-tie. If you notice functional issues with your small child, like being able to clear the contents of a spoon or if there is a noticeable gap between your child's front teeth, they may be lip tied. Simply lift the tongue or upper lip to see where the frenum connects and if you have concerns, you should seek help from a functional therapist, a lactation consultant, a pediatrician, or a dentist. Often, you may need further evaluation by a myofunctional therapist who deals specifically with tongue and lip function.

Myofunctional therapy can be done to retrain and tone the orofacial muscles and break unknown habits or compensations. Often this needs to be done prior to the release of a frenum in children and adults. The evaluation and myofunctional therapy can be done at any age, but, the sooner the better.

Lip and tongue ties don't have to be a problem, but they can carry a big impact on a person's life.

ilies who started in 2020 and now two of them have decided to become licensed foster parents," Woolsey said. "It's really just that first step into foster care that sometimes leads to greater things."

Another innovation that SDKB introduced came in 2020 when they approached Governor Kristi Noem and the Department of Social Services (DSS) to do a campaign focused on recruiting more foster parents in South Dakota. DSS agreed to the proposal and a collaboration began, known as "Stronger Families Together." The campaign kicked off with an event in Pierre in May of 2021 with Gov. Noem as key-note speaker.

"The amount of support and passion that we've seen from Gov. Noem, Secretary (of Social Services Laurie) Gill, DSS Regional Managers – it's been so impressive," Woolsey said. "They care so much for these kids."

Stronger Families Together set a goal to recruit 300 new foster families statewide by the summer of 2022 and a total of 1200 in the next four years. Thus far they have recruited more than 150 in the past six months. According to DSS they have never added that many families in that amount of time since they've been keeping records. For their efforts, Kristi and Damen were invited to the

capitol and recognized during Gov. Noem's state of the State address in early January with a standing ovation in the house chamber.

"All children deserve to grow up in a family where they are loved and protected. And when I stood at this podium during my first state of the State address in 2019, I promised to talk about foster care at every single opportunity," Noem said. "And we have made tremendous progress. We launched the Stronger Families Together initiative with the DSS along with South Dakota Kids Belong."

"I need faith-based organizations, church leaders, businesses leaders and other community organizations to come alongside me in your hometowns and support those who choose to adopt or foster children," Noem continued. "We have with us today the leaders of South Dakota Kids Belong. Please thank them for all the work they have done in helping families going through crisis here in our state."

Noem credits her passion for fostering and adoption from personal experience. She grew up with a foster brother. She says her parents taught her to support and serve other people, to help put food on their table and keep the lights on.

"Governor Noem continues to be appreciative of what we're doing, and she says she wants to continue to be more involved with what we're doing," Woolsey said.

In 2021 SDKB launched an

initiative through the Foster Friendly app that partners with businesses to provide goods and services at a discount to foster and adoptive families. Thus far they have signed up 70 businesses from across the state, from Rapid City to Sioux Falls and Mitchell. Oddly, none thus far in Belle Fourche, but Woolsey says they continue to work on that.

"This is part of our goal in 2022, to develop more support for foster parents," she said. "We'll continue to develop wrap teams, mainly focused on going through the churches which we have found great success with. And we'd like to add another 70 businesses to the app."

In 2021 SDKB was able to make presentations in 23 churches. In 2022 they'd like to have a presence in 35 churches, either by making a presentation themselves or having a pastor make a presentation. The success in recruiting foster families and support by going through the churches has made an impression on the state's DSS.

"They had never really done that before and we have shown that the churches are an extremely effective way to recruit potential foster parents," Woolsey said. "Now they want to be at every event we do."

could walk away today and Sawyer and Grey could run this ranch. They’ve been out there from the beginning.”

The Gilberts are well-invested in their community, too. Ray and Linda have served as directors of the S.D. Stock Growers Association. Ray was on the Resource Ag Council for the BLM, was a Harding County Stock Growers director, a director and president of the Western S.D. Buckaroos, a volunteer with the group that hosted the Harding County High School Rodeo, and, in college, a regional director for the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association.

Linda was a S.D. High School Rodeo director and state

secretary, was on the Harding County School Board, the Black Hills Stock Show Foundation, the S.D. Grasslands Coalition, and was appointed to the Cattle-men’s Beef Board.

Both she and Ray were 4-H leaders when their kids were young.

“We feel really strongly that you need to give back to your community,” she said.

They are always trying to learn new things. “We try to be lifelong learners,” Linda said. “We utilize what we have, because it’s a gift that we’re given, to have this land, and we need to take care of it.”

Linda’s canned meat ends up at fundraisers and auctions, and in the hands of friends and strangers. She’s given it to people who have never tried it and they are hooked on its good flavor.

She calls it “steak in a jar,” and with a good seal, it lasts indefinitely.

It’s even been found in the trailer of their granddaughter Sawyer, the world champ.

“I sent jars of it with her in her trailer,” Linda said. “So no matter where she is, she has a good protein source. Maybe that’s what made the world title for her,” she laughed.

She and Ray find pleasure in their kids and grandkids.

“It’s exciting to see ideas

come to fruition,” Linda said.

“The beef industry is always a tough one. There’s never been a big margin and you’re always on the edge of being broke, or a big drought, or something.

“But the excitement, when your children can saddle their own horses, and they talk about what bulls they want, and when you see the calves that come in, that makes us feel like we’ve done something right.

“It’s easy to second guess yourself in this business. Your faith has to be strong, that God will

be with you, but also that you’re where you want to be.”

The couple has great hope for the next generations.

“I think our generation was lucky because we could stay so focused. For Lloyd, Patty and Andrea’s generation, they have outside influences, and it’s certainly going to be very different for Sawyer and Grey.

They will all have different goals and that’s a good thing for this industry.

“And there’s room for everybody and everybody’s ideas.”

Sitts, who escaped the previous Sunday from the Hennipin county jail in Minneapolis while awaiting transfer to the Minnesota state penitentiary at Stillwater to serve a life sentence after pleading guilty to charge of second degree murder after his capture near Glencoe, Minnesota. Matthews' services were held Sunday afternoon at the Spearfish Masonic Temple, with the Rev. E. F. Siegfriedt, Lead, officiating, and burial was in the Spearfish cemetery. Last rites for Dave Malcolm were held from the Methodist church in Belle Fourche, Tuesday afternoon with Rev. L. A. Johnson, officiating. The Odd Fellows lodge of Belle Fourche had charge of the graveside services out at the Pine Slope cemetery. Dave was born March 15, 1899 in Glamis, Scotland; came to USA 1905. He was married to Miss Edith Thomson, who survives along with baby daughter Elizabeth Ann. Dave was elected sheriff on the republican ticket at the 1944 general election.

Elmer Conner Named Malcolm's Successor

At a special meeting of the Butte county commissioners, held Friday afternoon, Elmer Conner, a resident of the Orman township community for the past thirty-five years, was appointed to fill out the unexpired term of the late Sheriff Dave Malcolm, who was killed last Thursday night. Mr. Conner was an independent candidate for the sheriff's position at the 1944 election, being defeated at that time by Malcolm. He assumed the duties of the office the same day as his appointment, and is planning to move into the sheriff's living quarters at the county jail building in a few days. Elmer is at present serving as clerk of the Orman school district.

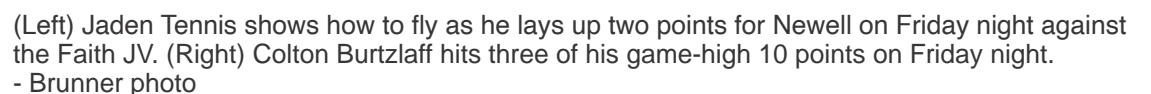

Then and Now in Newell

"Looking Forward to our Past"

February 1, 1912

Post Master N. M. Bratton received a telegram from Congressman Martin Monday informing him that his appointment as Post Master of the Newell Office had been confirmed by Congress and A.E. Richards has been appointed Assistant Post Master. Also, if you want a sheep lined coat hurry to Bratton's, they are selling them very very cheap and are going fast.

This year, the year of 1912, is leap year and great is the opportunity for Newell ladies to lay siege to the blushing and coy young men of the community. This paper is always pleased to be of assistance to the fair sex and for this reason will list the "eligibles" for the edification and enlightenment of the maidens. Stop by the office for a list of the bachelors in our city who are, so far as known, happy and heart free. Study the list carefully and prepare for the conquest girls.

January 26, 1922

Harley Hill has been doing some extensive trapping along Horse Creek this winter, but he reports that just now his traps are buried under 5 feet snow banks. He has caught several skunks and just recently he sent 20 muskrat hides to the furriers. Pretty good for a 7-year-old boy.

The Keene children have been so unfortunate as to fall victims to the eye disease which is so prevalent in the Newell vicinity lately. They were forced to miss several days of school.

February 4, 1932

Howard Sheridan and Alfred Burke came to Newell today

from their ranches near Hoover, to attend the funeral at the Catholic Church for the infant daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Christ Orwick. Betty Jean was born Monday and died shortly thereafter. Burial was in the Hope Cemetery. Mrs. Orwick was Kathryn Sheridan before marriage and sister to Mr. Sheridan.

The Junior class has been meeting lately about the Junior-Senior Banquet. The Jr.s are just beginning work on a new basis. They are working to save money rather than spend it. The simplest idea possible has been chosen as a theme and it will be carried out at a minimum expense. The Jr.s feel that as times are so hard, they should spend as little as possible on the decorations, banquet and orchestra.

January 29, 1942

Day Hoover, well known rancher and pilot of the Hoover community, was reported to have suffered a nose injury when his plane crashed near his home this past Sunday. The extent of damage to the plane, in the crash, in the forced landing, was not known. However the damage that occurred to his nose in the accident is quite evident.

Initial plans for a Power Farming Day to be held in Newell on Tuesday, February 17, were announced this week by Govert Van derBoom of the Newell Implement Company. As in Farming Days of past years, arrangements yet to be included will call for free entertainment, treats, machine demonstrations and talks to be held in two sessions in the City Hall, both morning and evening.

January 31, 1952

About 10 dogs, mostly pets of children, were dead in Newell the first of the week, apparently as a result of poisoning, City Police George Hafner reported. The epidemic of dog deaths had occurred since Saturday. Specimens from one of the initial victims were being sent away for laboratory analysis, he added. The greatest danger is of the existing threat to children. Many poisons do not deteriorate quickly and may be taken by a child chewing on a stick or piece of ice or snow, a great danger to children still exists. Anyone found guilty of such a trick here will be promptly punished as provided by the law.

Friends of this territory of Henry Ulrich, who is now recuperating from an operation at St. Mary's Hospital in Minnesota according to word received. Needed now is blood replacement for 5 pints of blood, Mrs. Ulrich advises. This can be given through any hospital facility set up to receive such replacement donations. Mr. Ulrich was released from the hospital last week and expects to travel home when he is strong enough.

Veron McCarthy tore the clutch out of his tractor Sunday when he attempted to clear a hay stack of drifted snow for Charles McCarthy. Our first bad storm of the season struck here last week. Leaving us with some quite large snow drifts and low temperatures. A low of 28 below zero was noted.

February 1, 1962

Craigg Van derBoom of Newell was among 3 members of the Dakota Athletic Club competing in the Royal Canadi-

an International Track Championship at Winnipeg, Saskatchewan Saturday and placed 4th in the finals of the 880-yard run. Van derBoom had placed 2nd in the preliminaries during the afternoon. Placing 2nd in the same event, which was won in a time of 1 minute and 58 seconds, was Dave Donaldson of Sturgis and Stan Johnson of Brookings tied meet record as he won the 6-0-yard dash in a time of 6.2 seconds. One of the most outstanding individual performances at the meet, Van derBoom reports, was John Rose of Arizona State who tied for the world's pole vault record at 5'10". There were over 100 girls competing in various events at the meet.

Tom DeGarlais was elected President of the Sourdough Mineral & Gem Club at a meet-

ing held at the D.C. Muth home in Belle Fourche. Other officers elected are: Vice President Mrs. E.A. Lindstad Belle Fourche; Secretary-Treasurer Muth and H.T. Caton Newell and E.A. Lindstad Belle Fourche to the Membership Committee. The group discussed a special invitation from the Rapid City Mineral & Gem Club of which the Hot Springs Club is also invited. A new class in Badlands geology will be offered by the Sturgis Rock Club, with Dr. John Clark, a School of Mines Professor, as instructor. Also discussed was participation in the Hobby Show at Belle Fourche in March. Waldo Mueller gave a short talk on ice age archaeology, based on items from his scrapbook. Mrs. Muth served refreshments at the close of the evening.

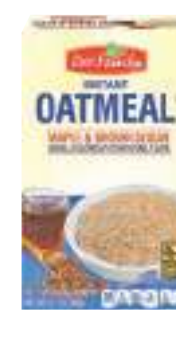
