### City Council to Look at Taking Attendance

news@bellefourchebeacon.com BELLE FOURCHE---The Belle Fourche City Council may begin to take attendance at council and committee meetings, with the first reading of an ordinance designed to make council members accountable for missing more than three meetings during a given year. First reading of the ordinance was at the council meeting February 3.

The Ordinance,4-2020 Section 2.04.050, asks for information relative to attendance by council members at scheduled council meetings and committee meetings

The ordinance reads as follows: Whereas it is in the best interest of the City of Belle Fourche to require attendance at city council and committee meetings, be it resolved to adopt Section 2.04.050 to enact penalties for excessive absences from the scheduled city council and committee meetings.

Attendance at meetings is expected of council and committee members. The chairperson of each committee shall promptly inform the Mayor of any committee member who has failed to attend 3 or more regularly scheduled meetings and shall report the dates of

such absences.

A. Any council or committee member who has missed 3 regularly scheduled meetings in a calendar year shall meet with the Mayor to review their continued service on the council or committee.

B. Any council or committee member who has failed to attend 3 consecutive council or committee meetings or a combination thereof, shall be deemed to have resigned their position from the council or committee. Any such resignation shall create a vacancy within the council or committee.

### Profiles in Service **Veteran Chief Deputy Settles Into New Role**

Being chief deputy in the **Butte County** Sheriff's Office doesn't mean Tristan Clements gets to carry



a bigger gun, just a bigger workload.

A member of Sheriff Fred Lamphere's four-deputy crew since late 2009, Tristan took on the title of chief deputy in June 2018. In addition to the duties he shares with the three other deputies, Tristan is in charge of scheduling, an increased load of paperwork, extra telephone hours and, in the sheriff's absence, emergency management responsibility. He also oversees the department's grant funding from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security.

Approaching his 20th year in law enforcement, the South Dakota native first pinned on a badge at the age of 21 as a reserve police officer in Hot Springs.

#### "I'm originally from the Philip area," Tristan explains, "but my ties are truly in Hot Springs where I graduated from high

school.' Tristan's resume includes stints as a full-time deputy in Mellette County and a city policeman in Winner, where he met his wife Jackie.

Today as a Butte County deputy, Tristan sees the reality of drug (and sometimes human) trafficking on those portions of Highways 85 and 212 within the county. Calls into Butte County dispatch now often involve the ubiquitous fraudsters known as telephone scammers.

'I'd say we get three to four calls a week involving scam calls citizens have received and are concerned enough to report."

While Tristan stresses the best thing a person can do when receiving this type of call is to simply hang up or not answer at all, these complaints can be referred to the state's fraud hotline when reported to law enforcement.

On the home front, Tristan and Jackie, a second grade

teacher in Newell, are the parents of three - Kelsi (15), Charlie (almost 14) and Jorey (10), all attending Newell schools and keeping their dad as active off-duty as he is on.

"There's sports, 4H, FFA," he relates with a proud smile. And then there's the flock of 10 sheep, begun when Kelsi was one of six winners in the 'Catch-A-Sheep' contest at the Butte/Lawrence County Fair in 2014. The Clements children also share their dad's love of hunting and fishing.

### Start of a Sweet 'Corn' Story

The idea of Mayor Gloria Landphere's Boost Belle Committee's "Sweet Corn Days" was brought to the group by Jim Grapentine, owner of Grap's Burgers and Brew.

The concept was started late last summer about the time Ron Keil of Keil's Sweet Corn started bringing his delectable harvest to town.

"When the idea of Sweet Corn Days was presented to me I mentioned that the Mayor had asked me to be on an 'events committee' and would take the idea there," said Grapentine. "We have 'Keil Sweetcorn here. Let's celebrate it!"

Sweetcorn is a crop that has long been produced in the Belle Fourche River irrigation valley and blossomed with the completion of Orman Dam.

The idea to celebrate this "sweet" part of our area's history was begun slowly on a hot August night in 2019 as Belle Fourche restaurants gave free

sweet corn to customers with their meals, courtesy of Ron Keil.

In addition, Scott Peterson's AJ Johnson spearheaded the "1st Annual Scott Peterson Motors Cornhole Tournament and the Beacon sponsored a "Corney Joke" contest.

This year the Mayor wants to get the entire community involved and has invited all to offer input. She intends to do a proclamation officially naming August 13-14-15, Sweet Corn Days in Belle Fourche.

Although the Mayor's announcement sets Herrmann Park as a gathering place, it's hoped that the whole community will be engaged.



Earl H. Neumeyer, age 94 of Belle Fourche, died Monday, February 3, 2020 at Spearfish Regional Hospital.

The funeral service was held 11am Friday, February 7, 2020 at St. James Lutheran Church in Belle Fourche, with visitation held one hour prior to the service at the church. Interment was held 11:30am Saturday at Restlawn Memory Gardens Cemetery in Huron.

Earl Henry Neumeyer was born March 26, 1925 in Beadle County South Dakota, near the town of Alpena. He was the son of Edward and Anna Marie (Pederson) Neumeyer. Earl grew up on a family farm. As a result of growing up in the "Dirty 30's", Earl had a strong work ethic all his life and it began in his youth when he worked hard to help support his family. Earl served his country in the U.S. Army during World War II. He served four years. He was united in marriage to Doris Meisenhelder on October 20, 1946. 

Black Hills Reads of United Way of the Black Hills and multiple organizations, schools, businesses, and individuals hit the (figurative) gas pedal in an effort to "Read Across South Dakota". The Read Across South Dakota Challenge is designed to get people excited about reading. Black Hills Reads is collect-

get people excited about reading Black Hills Reads is collecting cumulative "miles" to help "race" across South Dakota. Starting in Rapid City, the figurative "book mobile" will travel around the state until it loops back to the starting point. For every 100 books read, the "book mobile" will move one mile. Plus, there will be opportunities to earn bonus "miles" by completing different tasks or challenges on Black Hills Reads Facebook Page.

The figurative car departed from Rapid City on January 6th, and in one month, 1,816 participants have read 16,360 books (including bonus books). This equals approximately 163 'miles' driven, approaching Presho.

"Black Hills Reads has had tremendous success getting children and organizations involved through other challenges and events like Race to Read...this challenge aims at getting all of South Dakota involved. We want to share this enthusiasm and see what achievements we can make as a state." says Kayla Klein, director of Black Hills Reads.

Some organizations have been having a blast with this reading challenge, and specifically participating in the bonus challenge. Marty Willms of Northern Hills Federal Credit Union in Sturgis has been consistently posting pictures of fun and unique ways their employees are reading throughout the community.

"I first heard about this challenge when Kayla Klein pre-

sented the idea to the Sturgis United Way Board of which I am a member. Northern Hills believes in giving back to our communities. The challenge was a wonderful opportunity for our staff to provide a service to our communities while having some fun with team building projects. During the month of February our staff will be reading at elementary classrooms and during the Toddler and Preschool Story Hours at the Sturgis Public Library. Our staff is fortunate to have the ability to read and what a wonderful way for us to share that gift with others," says Willms.


The challenge will conclude on March 2nd, which is Read Across America Day.



council may prospectively or retrospectively excuse an absence from the council or committee meeting for good

D. Vacancies on the common council shall be filled as provided by the BF Ordinance 2.04.115. The Mayor shall fill any committee vacancies that are created by committee member absences as provided by city ordinance.

While no action was taken at the first reading, not a lot of discussion ensued, but Councilor Troy Shockey expressed reservations about the ordinance. While he doesn't think anyone is being picked on, he feels that maybe a committee would be a better way to review the absences of a member.

"I'm leaning more toward a committee to pick a replacement for a member if her or she is to resign. Now the Mayor can fill the vacancy and so Part D of the ordinance is irrelevant and needs to be thrown out," said Shockey.

He added that if a committee were tasked with reviewing absences, then the member is question is being looked at by his or her peers.

"I know the state has protocols about lack of attendance, but

unless it's abused, the issue should be taken to the city council" he said.

He gave an example of his committee meetings that he's been late for. The Museum committee meets at 5 P.M. and Legal Finance meets at 5:15. I've been about a minute late at times, so it's hard to make them on time" he added.

Mayor Gloria Landphere made it clear in talking to the Beacon that this ordinance came about just by the council talking about it at a retreat on January 18.

"This is something that came up during discussion of things like a code of ethics and the like. We researched an attendance policy and found that other towns in the area had enacted similar ordinances," she said.

City Attorney Dwight Gubbrud also researched the topic and found that the State of South Dakota had a statute that dealt with the matter as well, so the council could do it as well.

This is also an aspect of doing business. It amounts to a relationship between the city and its employees, so the roles of the parties can be defined in the ordinance," said Landphere.

The second reading of the ordinance is set for February 18 at the scheduled council meeting.

Let's talk about conforming loans vs. jumbo loans in the mortgage world.

The Guidelines

Each year in October, the Federal Housing Finance Agency, or FHFA, collects data on the national median home value and compares that number to October of the previous year. If there is an increase, the conforming loan limit will increase by the same amount.

In October 2019, the yearover-year median home value increase was 5.38%. Therefore, the conforming loan limit for a single-family home in 2020 will rise to \$510,400, up from \$484,350. The loan limits on multi-unit properties will rise to \$653,550, \$789,950 and \$981,700 for a duplex, triplex and fourplex, respectively.

Should you apply for a loan? **Loan Differences** Loans amounts at or under

these limits qualify as conforming loans. They "conform" to guidelines set forth by Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac. Conforming loans make up the majority of residential loans funded. Loan amounts that are above these limits are referred to as jumbo loans. With a conforming loan, lenders are able to sell the mortgage in the secondary market, replenishing their credit lines in order to make more loans. Jumbo loans have no such robust secondary market. When a lender approves a jumbo loan, it assumes the risk should the loan ever go into

Naturally, this makes it more difficult to qualify for a jumbo loan. The minimum credit score for most conforming loans ranges from 580 to 620. Jumbo minimums range from 720 to 740. Some jumbo loans can require a lower score, but the rates and terms are much more stringent.

Down payment requirements for jumbo loans are also much higher. A buyer can secure a conforming loan with a down payment of just 5% (or even 3% for special first-time programs) with the help of private mortgage insurance. Jumbo loans have no such insurance policies available and require a minimum down payment of 20% of the sale price of the home. Providing a down payment of 25% or more will make it easier to qualify.





### **Tom Brunner Legislative Report**

Hello from Pierre! The Legislature has just completed week 4 of session and are now near the halfway mark of this year's session.

These past weeks we have had a lot of important bills come before the House that have been debated and passed through

the House floor. One bill these past couple of weeks that I have been vigorously working on is HB 1008 or better known as the Hemp Bill. This last week there was a clean up amendment added to the bill to include two different licenses in hemp production.

There is now a grower's license and a processor license along with a grower's permit for the transportation of hemp and a general commercial transportation permit. These two changes will help ensure that hemp is properly being grown and transported in a legal fashion. With



information obtained from the summer study, cooperation between the Legislature and the Governor's office, and other public testimony and concerns, the committee on Agriculture and Natural Resources was able to decide unanimously that South


Dakota is ready for the production of hemp and it is time for farmers and processors in the state to have the option to participate in the market.

This bill will be debated on the House Floor next week and we are hoping to get it passed onto the Senate and then eventually signed by Governor Noem so farmers will be able to plant and grow this year.

A couple other issues that have gone through the House these past couple of weeks include HB 1057 and HB 1096. HB 1057 prohibits harmful sex changing treatments and surgeries before

the age of 16. After more than 2 hours of debate, the House was able to pass the bill with a 46-23 vote. This is an important piece of legislation as it will ensure that permanent damage is not caused on children. HB 1096 would ban commercial surrogacy in the state. This would ensure that businesses and individuals are not profiting off the sale of children. This bill would not ban altruistic surrogacy meaning that surrogacy will still be an option for a family if they wish to have a child through these means. This bill passed through the House 46-20 with an amendment that would add a summer study to find out more about the practice of all surrogacy. I will continue to fight against

needless government growth and also to seek ways to properly fund education and other needed infrastructure.



### **Shorty Garrett Sets Record Bronc** Ride in Winning Rodeo Rapid City

RAPID CITY, S.D. – Shorty Garrett is walking tall after shattering the Rodeo Rapid City (S.D.) saddle bronc riding record Feb. 8 to win the iconic rodeo for the second time in his five years of ProRodeo compe-

Garrett's first Rapid City win came in 2017 when he tangoed with Sutton Rodeos' Prom Night for 85.5 points. This time around, the cowboy cashed in with a 90.5-point ride on Sutton Rodeos' South Point - the same bronc his traveling partner Isaac Diaz took for a 90-point ride to win Round 3 of the 2018 Wrangler National Finals Rodeo.

'Sutton has some really nice horses," Garrett said. "In 2017, I was on Prom Night, and then I was fortunate to have South Point. I have lots of family there too and that's nice, it makes a guy want to do a little better.'

With his hometown of Eagle Butte, S.D., less than three hours away Garrett felt as if he had a home-field advantage.

"I could hear everyone hollering, so I thought I'd better not fall off," Garrett said. "It's a good feeling. Shoot, we want to win them all, but any time you can win your hometown one is pretty cool."

Before Garrett's win, Rapid City's record of 87 points was shared by ProRodeo Hall of Famer Dan Mortensen (2006) and Brady Harter (2019).

Garrett broke into the Pro-Rodeo scene by finishing third in the 2015 PRCA | Resistol Rookie Standings for saddle bronc riding and has climbed the world standings each year. He narrowly missed qualifying for his first Wrangler NFR in 2019, finishing 18th in the world standings, \$14,317 shy of breaking into the Top 15.

"I was short last year, but it makes a guy a little more aggressive," Garrett said. "I'm super confident in myself this year."

Garrett's \$4,991 check from Rapid City will give him a healthy boost in the 2020 PRCA RAM World Standings, where he was third with \$15,836. He'll also rake in some valuable points for the ProRodeo Tour.

Garrett, Diaz and Brody Cress didn't stick around for long in Rapid City, heading 1,200 miles south for the San Antonio (Texas) Stock Show & Rodeo, followed by the Los





### The Goose Story by H.C. Noyes

Next fall, when you see Geese heading south for the winter, flying along in V formation, you might consider what science has discovered as to why they fly that way: as each bird flaps its wings, it creates an uplift for the bird immediately following.

By flying in V formation the whole flock adds at least 71% greater flying range than if each bird flew on its own.

People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going more quickly and easily because they are traveling on the thrust of one another.

When a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to go it alone and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird in front.



If we have as much sense as a goose, we will stay in formation with those who are headed the same way we are.

When the Head Goose gets tired, it rotates back in the wing and another goose flies

It is sensible to take turns doing demanding jobs with people or with geese flying Geese honk from behind to encourage

those up front to keep up their speed. What do we say when we honk from behind?

Finally, and this is important, when a goose gets sick, or is wounded by gunshots and falls out of formation, two other geese fall out with that goose and follow it down to lend help and protection. They stay with the fallen goose until it is able to fly, or until it dies. Only then do they launch out on their own, or with another formation to catch up with their group.

### Legislators Field Some Tough Questions at Weekend Cracker Barrel

NEWELL – Around 25 people, most of whom didn't speak, gathered to listen to and ask questions of the District 29 and 30 legislators on Saturday at the Whatever It Takes Coalition sponsored Cracker Barrel.

Moderator Ken Wetz gave each legislator the opportunity to speak about some of things he had been working on most recently in the current session.

Representative Tom Brunner spoke first, addressing the industrial hemp issue.

"A lot of money would have to be spent whether we pass this or not," said Brunner. The congressman is pro-hemp and makes no bones about it. "Next week we'll have budget projects, where we'll be as far as revenue. (There are) a lot of programs that need to be cut, in my opinion."

He also spoke briefly about a bill that is working its way through the process to change the status of what it takes for a newspaper to be able to print legal notices and advertising. Representative Sam Marty also spoke to the newspaper issue.

"I'm a big supporter of having legals in a 'local' newspaper," said Marty. "Not one who doesn't represent our county. Marty said he had been working with Senator Gary Cammack on several issues concerning the Keystone pipeline. He is concerned about the subcontracting to build up the roads and when that subcontractor didn't finish the county put a lien on the landowner.

He said the biggest controversial bill was HB 1057, the legality of gender change.

"The representative that brought that bill has had a few death threats," said Marty. Kirk Chafee spoke to the local government issues as he reminded people he had a background in county government and felt that he could speak to that issue. His motto, he said was, "Assessor, do your job."

Cammack said he introduced SB 104, relating to the issue of lien laws. "We need to clarify that and make sure that (liens on landowners) doesn't happen again."

Finally, Senator Ryan Maher said that he wants to make sure

NEWELL – County crews have been working hard for the past couple of months to get the Winkler Bridge open to traffic. That day has finally come.

"We had a little bit of finish work to do," said Superintendent Dwayne Heidrich. He and his workers did all the preliminary work to prepare for the large concrete beams which were trucked in one at a time from Mitchel, where they were created according to engineers' specs. The company utilized two large cranes to set the beams in place.

Once that was finished the county crews went back to work, finished end and side walls, backfilling rock and gravel and preparing and smoothing the roadway that approached the bridge.

It's important that this bridge was finished as soon as possible due to the fact that the Orman bridge over Horse Creek is continuing to deteriorate.

"Something has shifted under there (the Orman bridge) again," said Heidrich.

Brosz Engineer Jason Hanson said at a recent county meeting that there is the potential for that bridge to be closed, which would heighten the importance of the Winkler bridge being open to traffic as a detour, if needed.

It's a bit of a ways around, but not that far, according to Heidrich. Much better than having someone take a heavy truck or trailer across the Orman bridge and ending up in a bad situation. Currently the Orman bridge has a minimal weight as well as having barriers in place to keep it to one lane. The county asks that people use caution and common sense when attempting to cross the Orman Road bridge.

that if there's leftover revenue that, that number is kept as close as possible to what has been projected. "We don't want the executive branch to spend that extra money." Maher said there was revenue lost when the national age to purchase tobacco went from 18 to 21. "That was a \$20 to \$22 million dollar revenue shortfall."

When the time for questions rolled around, Gary Velder asked the congressmen to be mindful of supporting the electoral college. He also said he was concerned about a senate bill to rescind the constitutional convention, and that he wanted support to abolish this idea. "Through this (constitutional convention) they want to get rid of the electoral college and the second amendment, as well as make abortion part of our constitution," said Velder. One of the biggest issues, brought up by numerous people was the inequality of the assessment of land, compared to the productivity.

Chafee said that bill 1006 will allow for more data to be entered into the system, with price per calf, rather than crop productivity being utilized.

"The price of corn is the model east river," said Chafee. "Our yield west river is a calf. The assessors have the tools they need to do their job. The statute says the assessor may consider making an adjustment (for tax payers)." He said there has to be a trigger to get the assessor to investigate the issue and make a determination.

**Butte County States Attorney** Cassie Wendt asked how the assessor was supposed to find the time to investigate every request that was made. Wendt

said the Director of Equalizatoin is usually behind in assessments, even three to five years, in Butte County, and was concerned that if many came asking for an investigation that would put them even further behind.


"If you're going to mandate that they go to every property, I don't know how you're going to do it," said Wendt.

Chaffee responded, saying, "It can be done, that is the job description, and it's not a task outside of their purview. It shouldn't be inconvenient to do what's required statutorily. We want the value to be right."

Bill Kluck, who owns land in Butte and Meade County said that part of the issue was data applied to crop related soils. He said the acres of production need to be adjusted or it's meaningless. "Assessors have to start representing the home owners," said Kluck.

Brunner responded to Superintendent Robin Dutt's query on what to do when a small school like Newell doesn't get much in state aid and still has to pay a fine when the money doesn't come in. He said, "As far as the fines, we have to figure that out. If we don't have some kind of increase (in funds) we'll slip right back to 50th (place in the nation for teacher pay)."

There were many more questions about various topics, but after more than an hour Wetz shut it down, saving the legislators could stay and talk to individuals but that the session was at an end.

### Feb. 12, 1920

Roy Adams, who is herding for Mr. Russell, left a fire going in the wagon while he went to the Russell ranch for consultation. When he returned the wagon was nothing but a pile of charred remains and twisted irons. The loss is quite a tragedy as the wagon had been freshly stocked with supplies for several

### Feb. 13, 1930

A stalled engine, which backfired while it was being cranked by a companion, cost Emil Turpen of Arpan neighborhood an eye on Friday of last week. Emil was hauling timber from the Hills and in the vicinity of Whitewood the engine went dead. Turpen lifted the hood and was examining the wiring while the companion was attempting to start the engine by cranking when the engine backfired it blew the oil cap, striking Mr. Turpen directly in the eye.



### .ooking Back in Belle

### **How Belle Fourche Started**

The auction sale of lots at the new town of Belle Fourche, commences on Tuesday, June 9 A special train will be run from Deadwood to that town, leaving at 7 each morning of the sale, and returning the same evening, at one fare for the round trip.

#### Pioneer Footprints (pg. 126) Belle Fourche, Bullock's Town

The widely advertised lot sale brought in a crowded threecoach train. The lot auction took place at Middle Creek, away from saloon street attractions. The Butte County Bank, a stockman's institution moved to Belle Fourche and located in a building between the Bee printing shop and Vaughn's store. Arthur H Marble replaced James F. Summers as cashier. The bank, a John Clay enter-

prise, had livestock and ranch investments in the region. James T. Craig, range manager of the VVV outfit, was a bank executive. A lot was donated, funds were promoted, and the Congregational church became a first in Belle Fourche. Arrangements were made to let the Methodists use the building until such time as their own edifice was ready.

Stranger off the train stopped to view the frontier atmosphere around them – muddy streets furrowed with ruts, wagons loaded with supplies, wheel heavily tired with gumbo, and drivers explosive with lurid language.

View of the Townsite Lots -As originally platted the town's east-west streets were to be numbered and the north-south streets named after trees. Present Fifth Avenue (called saloon street) was Maple, Sixth Avenue was Oaks, and Seventh was Spruce. Present State Street was then Second Avenue. One block east of State and one block north of Fifth was designated as the business section. The depot, first new building in town, was opened December 28, 1890 with Harvey A. Giles.

Research at the Butte County Register of Deeds office shows that one of first lots sold was Block 17, Lot 10 which appears to be sold several times first on April 1, 1898 to Bruce Sebastian and Tom McCumsey, who were saloon operators; next deed was between Sarah McCumsey, widow of Tom McCumsey to Joseph DuFran on March 3, 1905. Joseph DuFran was husband of Dora DuFran, famous area madam. Dora DuFran wrote an autobiography The most popular house was called "Diddlin' Dora's", located on Fifth Avenue later in Belle



The above advertisement from June 10, 1891 Black Hills Daily Times reads as follows:

The Pioneer Townsite company has put in the market the new townsite of Belle Fourche, at the northwestern terminus of the Fremont, Elkhorn & Missouri Valley railroad in Butte county.

This town is situated on the original townsite of DeMores, lying between the Redwater and Belle Fourche rivers. The Townsite company has erected two wagon bridges, one across the Redwater and the other across the Belle Fourche, thus making the town accessible from all

WATER

The railroad company is at work and has about completed a canal and flume which taps the Redwater, at or near the mouth of False Bottom river, and empties into the Belle Fourche just above the town. This canal has a sixty-foot fall, thus making one of the best water-powers in the west. This power can be utilized in manufacturing, stamp and flouring mills, and other enterprises requiring an unlimited supply of water, as well as for irrigation. This ditch can also furnish the town fire protection

Trains leave Whitewood daily at 10:30, a.m. for Belle Fourche, soon after the arrival of the through train from the east, returning in time to connect with the east-bound train in the afternoon. All freight for Beulah, Sundance and other northern points is transferred at this station.

STOCK SHIPPING

Immense stock yards have been built two miles north of the town for accommodation of the stock raisers whose ranges extend for hundreds of miles to the north, east and west of this



Fourche. "Diddlin' Dora's advertised itself as 'Three D's -Dining, Drinking, and Dancing - a place where you can bring your mother.' And though the cowboys frequented the popular place, most just wanted to 'get down to business,' with at least one man remarking, 'I wouldn't want my mother to know I had

ever been there.' Block 17, Lot 7 was later sold by Sabastian and Joseph DuFran (signed by a mark) to The Belle Fourche Bee, with a warranty deed dated March 19, 1907. Although on the Sanborn Insurance map, it indicates that the Bee was already located on Lot 10 (address 516 State Street) by 1903.

I don't carry a gun because I'm evil. I carry a gun because I have lived long enough to see the evil in the world.


I don't carry a gun because I hate the government. I carry a gun because I understand the limitations of government.

The local board of equalization meets on the third Monday in March and is in session for five days. From the decision of your local board, you may appeal to the county board by filing a written notice of appeal with the county auditor located at 117 5th Ave. Belle Fourche, SD 57717 on or before the first Tuesday in April (postmarked by deadline is considered timely). County Board of Equalization meets on the second Tuesday in April and shall adjourn no later than three weeks after the second Tuesday in April. Appeal from your County Board may be taken to the State Office of Hearing Examiners. Such

written notice must be filed with the Chief Hearing Examiner, Foss Building, 523 East Capitol, Pierre, South Dakota 57501, no later than the third Friday in May (postmarked by deadline is considered timely). Appeals to the Circuit Court may be taken from the county board or the Office of Hearing Examiners within thirty days from the publication of the decision. An appeal from the county board to circuit court will prevent an appeal to the Office of Hearing Examiners. However, you may appeal the decision of the Office of Hearing Examiners to circuit court.
