Military Munitions Spill from Truck Wreck

Accident west of Belle Fourche blocks Hwy 212 for hours as explosives are moved and detonated.

HAMMOND, Mont. – A crash involving three trucks, one of which was carrying military "projectiles," closed Highway 212, just two miles west of Hammond for hours. Carter County Sheriff Neil Kittleman said the crash shut down a section of the highway on Monday morning, Feb. 11, although he said he was called to the scene late Sunday night.

Two semi-trucks collided, and a third semi crashed into them, Kittleman said. Of the two trucks involved in the initial accident, one was carrying what was described to him by Air Force personnel as "military projectiles." The third semi went into a ditch off the highway. There were no injuries.

"I wasn't involved in the accident investigation," said Kittleman. "The (Montana) Highway Patrol did that." Kittleman said that he kept the nearly 60-mile stretch of heavily truck-traveled road from Broadus to Alzada closed until the accident scene could be cleared. Traffic was rerouted around the area and was reopened Feb. 11th in the late afternoon.

"About 50 projectiles fell out of one of the trucks when the two trucks collided," said the

sheriff. "Because these were Navy projectiles that were being transported, and there's no Navy base close by, the Air Force took care of disposing of the projectiles."

The projectiles that fell to the ground were transported up Crow Creek Road, from the Hammond area, to privately owned land. There, they were detonated by the Air Force personnel. Kittleman said there was a big flash of flame, and lots of smoke. Close neighbors reported pictures falling off the walls of their homes. As far away as 20 miles up the Hammond Road, people related that it sounded like a really loud sonic boom.

Kittleman said the rest of the projectiles were off-loaded to another truck and went on their way to Illinois.

"The accident was right on top of the hill past Aldriches," he said, referring, as many country people do, to the original owners of land in the area. "The road was blocked solid."

The area of the accident sparked memories of another accident in that same area. Duane Richards and his family were visiting in the Boyes area the same night of the truck accident. "It kind of spooked me," said Richards. "Had we stayed another hour, we could have been right in the middle of it."

BFACC Pool to Remain Closed This Week

news@bellefourchebeacon.com BELLE FOURCHE - The indoor pool at the Belle Fourche Area Community Center will be closed at least until the end of this week, perhaps longer, as a new boiler will need to be installed.

Earlier this month workers at the BFACC were relocating the current boiler to an upstairs mechanical room and discovered that the existing unit, which heats the pool water, was corroded beyond repair. It is believed the corrosion came from the boiler's close proximity to pool chemicals in its previous location.

On the regular agenda at this week's Belle Fourche City Council meeting is a request to approve \$19,960 for a new boiler. The request included an offer from Rassmussen Mechanical Services to donate the

Crews working on the 8th Avenue sewer project have crossed under National Street and the replacement paving at grade level has been completed. With single-digit temperatures the pavement curing process was helped along with blankets and ground heaters.

During construction the pavement across the Hay Creek culvert on National was also replaced.

Work continues on 7th Avenue from National south toward the Hay Creek crossing where the project will end.

Moderating temperatures are in the forecast for later this month and early March which should help progress.







Overcoming Discouragement

Devotional writer. Warren Wiersbe, in his classic book, "Walking with the Giants" identifies many of the spiritual leaders, pastors and counselors that had a life-long struggle with discouragement [Martin

Luther, Charles Spurgeon, Alexander Whyte, Andrew Bonar, and G. Campbell Morgan, just to name of few.] I remember the testimony of Jack Hayford at a conference in California as he shared his personal and lengthy struggle with discouragement and depression.

We would probably all admit



to struggles with discouragement if we are honest and it is important as believers that we learn how to approach it and how to defeat in our lives. Discouragement comes from being tired out, bodily illness,

being too idealistic and setting unachievable goals. Some of the causes of discouragement are misinformation, gossip, fomented fear, lies and accusations, too much stuff to deal with at one time, messes, struggling relationships, the personal attacks of the enemy of our soul all can lead to serious discouragement.

G. Campbell Morgan astounded his congregation at London's Westminster Abbey by telling them that he considered himself a failure. Wiersbe tells us that he rescued his church from certain failure and made it the focal point of evangelical bible study in the English-speaking world.

His preaching also inspired a nation to pray and persevere during the dark days of the Battle of Britain. In the Old testament we read of King David and his discouragement as he struggles in the wilderness as a fugitive, away from home and family and the relentless pressure of King Saul's pursuit.

Gary Lee Ager



Tiara and Zachgary. He had eleven grandchildren and eight greatgrandchildren. His family gave him great pride

and joy! He started out working for his father at Ager Auto Parts. He went on to support his family as a carpenter. He became known for his skills as a builder and built several homes in the Belle Fourche area. The family moved to Bismarck, ND in 1978 where he carried on in his trade. Later taking his trade to CA, where he resided in Buena Park AKA the San Hernando Zoo. There at times he worked with his sons and his brother Wayne. He applied his skills all over the greater Los Angeles area.

1993 Gary returned to South Dakota. He was a wheeler dealer by nature and dabbled through out his life from farm animals and cars to antiques.



He owned three different antique stores and a bar in Belle Fourche in his later years.

Bear loved to cook and entertain for large groups of family and friends, whether it was a big buffet or cooking up a huge batch of his famous burritos and salsa, soups, and no lettuce salads but most of all was The Salsa. His conversations often centered around what he was cooking at the time and how good a deal he got on groceries. Being somewhat of a poet he wrote many a yarn. He loved to sing and regularly sang at the Seventh Day Adventist church, where

he even preached a sermon or two. On a Saturday afternoon in his younger years you would likely find him on a hike with his family.

Bear had an eclectic sense of style, a helmet adorned with horns, a custom-made top hat, threepiece suit, cut- offs, cowboy boots and a shabby cowboy hat were all part of his wardrobe.

Gary would help a total stranger out of the blue if it felt right. He had a heart of gold and would anonymously give time and /or money to help someone in need.

He is survived by all his children and his brothers and sisters. He is preceded in death by His parents and two step mothers and one granddaughter.

There will be a celebration of life at March 15th 1-3 at the Belle Fourche Community Hall.







Lady Broncs Finish Regular Season 16-4

Rylee Young and Harley Fischer drained a pair of three-pointers in the final minute of regulation during Thursday's game against New Underwood to force overtime and the Broncs came away with a 59-54 victory on senior night. Young put the Broncs up 8-2 with a three-pointer a little over five minutes into the contest. The early shooting from longrange versus New Underwood's zone defense continued in the first half as Bella Jensen nailed a pull-up three midway through the second quarter to give Belle Fourche a 16-8 advantage. "In the first half we were patient and worked the ball down low, but we struggled a little bit scoring the bottom," Belle Fourche head coach Bill Burr said. "Harley, Rylee, and Bella hit some big shots out front they hit the three-ball really well for us and that's what you need against a zone."

Young's third three-pointer of the game, with six minutes to play put the Broncs back on top, 41-38, but the Belle Fourche offense went quiet as New Underwood used a 9-0 run to hold a 47-41 lead with just one minute left.

Young nailed her fourth three-pointer with 58 seconds left in the game to bring the Broncs within three and after a stop, Belle Fourche worked the ball around the outside with Young passing to Harley Fischer on the right wing and Fischer tying the game (47-47) and sending the large home crowd into a frenzy with a three-pointer with 20 seconds to play. "The fans here are just super." Burr added. "They support us great and we love having them here. It's fun to see the gym full and it's exciting for the girls."

After a missed New Underwood three-point shot the game

went to overtime. Fischer picked up just where she left off in the fourth quarter, hitting a two-point jumper two feet inside the three-point line on the right wing to put the Broncs up 49-47 with 3:30 left

in the extra period. After the teams traded possessions without scoring, Payson Birkeland was fouled on a shot attempt under the basket and made both free throws with 2:04 remaining to put the Broncs up 51-47.

Burr was excited about the defensive effort that his team gave against a strong New Underwood team. "(Rylee and Harley) worked their tails off on the full court press. I've got to give Ashley a lot of credit - she worked her tail off on the bottom and played really well on the defensive end and Payson did some great help defense on the back side as well."

Young led the Broncs in scoring, with 17 points (12 off three-pointers) and added four steals. Fischer had 14 points (also 12 off three-pointers) and two steals while Bella Jensen added eight points (two three-pointers), four rebounds, and four steals.

For New Underwood, who finishes the regular season at 17-3, Jaedyn Finkbeiner scored

Belle Fourche also claimed the JV victory, 40-23. Chloe Crago scored eight of her teamhigh nine points in the second half to lead the Broncs. Kaylin Garza added six points while Dylan Stedillie scored five.

The Belle Fourche Lady Broncs used a strong second half to power past Sturgis by a final of 62-54 on Tuesday night (Feb. 12) in Belle Fourche. Trailing by seven at the half, the Lady Broncs pulled even to 45-45 at the end of the third

quarter. Belle Fourche used their full court defensive pressure to create some turnovers and quick points as the second half opened.

"It (full court pressure) changed the pace of the game a little bit in our favor," Lady Bronc coach Bill Burr said. "Sturgis gets up and down the court well, but we handled their speed and size on the bottom a little better in the

ball really well," Burr added. "We set up our offense and took some time off the clock when we needed to and were able to score a couple times.' Still nursing a three-point lead with under a minute to play, Bronc junior Harley Fischer was fouled and hit both ends of a one-and-one. "Harley is such a great kid - she's always in the gym working on her shot," Burr added. "She is someone we are confident with putting the ball in her hands for shooting. She's been in a little bit of a slump but sometimes you just need to shoot your way out of that."

Payson Birkeland led Belle Fourche with 22 points. Young added 16 points, including five three-pointers. Fischer chipped in 14 points, four rebounds, and a pair of steals.

Belle Fourche was 14-of-17 from the free throw line (82%) while Sturgis was 12-of-20 (60%).

"After the loss to Douglas (a week and a half earlier) we were down a little bit – to get a win against a great club like Sturgis is a confidence builder." In the JV game, Sturgis defeated Belle Fourche, 37-30. Kaylin Garza led the Lady Broncs with 16 points.

The Lady Broncs traveled to Faith Friday, February 15th, one night after the hard fought overtime victory over New Underwood to be handed a 52-42 loss at the hands of the 19-1, Class B, Lady Longhorns.

There have been several other bad accidents, both planes and vehicles in that same area.

The Brown family of Florida crashed their Beechcraft Baron just south of the same area in 2016, killing all three family members.

Richards said he doesn't feel there's anything negative about the area, but he does have concerns about the high truck traffic on Highway 212. There has been quite a bit of discus-

sion about the topic. "The truckers can cut off a lot of miles by taking 212 from Crow Agency in Montana southeast to Spearfish," said Richards. "The road isn't made for it (that much traffic). It needs to be interstate (fourlane). And you never know what some of those trucks are carrying."

As it was, both he and his sister, LaQueta (Richards) Grummons, who with their family ran the Boyes Store for many years during late 1960's and early 1970's, said it reminded them of a plane crash in that very area, just into a field south of the truck accident site.

"It was winter and there was snow," said Richards.

"I recall that the family (involved in the plane crash) were flying to relatives for the holidays," said Grummons. "We got a call (at the store) from Margaret Aldrich telling of a big boom and asking dad (Roy Richards) to check it out.

The weather was bad, with low visibility, just as it was last Sunday night when these three trucks collided. A Mooney aircraft, flying low, due to ice

impacted the ground just off the highway. "I was told (later) that a Mooney is like a flying coffin,"

said Richards. "It's a super-fast, good flying machine; but unforgiving if you screw up." Richards said they took off up the county road on the north

side of the highway, and then saw the plane wreck to the south. When they got to the site, Richards said his father, who was also a pilot, said it looked like the wings had iced and it couldn't make it over the hill.

A man and his wife were killed in the accident, and their two daughters were badly injured.

"One girl was conscious," said Grummonds.

"Those scenes just never leave your head," said Richards, who was still in high school at

Last year we said, 'Things can't go on like this', and they didn't, they got worse.



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



PIERRE, S.D. – The South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks will host public open houses to provide information and awareness on Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) in deer and elk herds within the state.

"The department is developing a draft action plan outlining the state's approach to slowing the spread of this wildlife disease," stated Chad Switzer, wildlife program administrator.

"Not only do we want hunters to attend these events, we encourage game processors, taxidermists, landowners, captive deer and elk operators, conservation leaders and other community members to be part of the discussion. Each event will focus on the biology and history of CWD and preventive measures to reduce the spread. We will also be there to talk about surveillance and outreach strategies as well as answer questions."

In South Dakota, CWD currently is known to exist in Custer, Fall River, Lawrence and Pennington counties.

NEWELL - Newell city commission met on February 11, in their regular meeting. They set an equalization meeting for March 18, 2019 for anyone who has concerns about their property taxes.

An insurance quote was submitted by First Western Insurance of Newell representatives Max Wetz, Harry Stapp and South Dakota Public Assurance Alliance representative Jerry Krambeck.

"There's not a lot of options where you're going to be able to get a quote," said Stapp. "We checked other companies, but this was the only one we got." The city had been working with First Western Insurance of Belle Fourche, but recently asked for and got a new quote. This one included coverage over more property and liability for less money.

"I think it's kind of a no brainer." said Commissioner Andy Howie. The commission approved the insurance expenditure.

Bar Manager Lorri Olson gave her department report, relating a small-town Saturday event on February 16, as well as a cribbage tournament on March 2. City Foreman Larry Parker commented at length on the issue of sewer plugs.

"People are putting stuff down there that shouldn't be put down there," stated Parker. "Just because it says flushable, doesn't mean it will dissolve." He listed things like fiber shop towels, paper towels, hygiene products and the like. He also commented that people needed to be checking sewer pipes during this cold, freezing weather.

"Nine times out of ten, if you

smell sewer gas, it's a plugged sewer pipe," said Parker. He encouraged all residents to check this issue on a regular basis as it can cause health-related risks. The Newell Improvement Committee, represented by Rosemary Johnson and Judy Dague, with other committee members in attendance presented information on the potential city park splashpad and possible an ice-skating rink. The group asked for a motion to approve the project, but were stopped in their tracks when numerous questions arose. Although Dague had presented some information at the previous monthly meeting it was not enough to satisfy the commission. They asked for information on treatment costs for the water for the splashpad, how often it would need to be tested and what insurance costs might be. The idea was discussed but never voted on and Mayor Ken Wetz gave instructions to the group to come back with more information so the council could make an informed decision. Potential construction for the two projects would be in 2020.





123 years ago **Belle Fourche Times** February 21, 1896 Ed Lemmon was in from the Flying V ranch yesterday.

The council, after an informal discussion of proposed plans and means of construction, gave favorable consideration to the matter. Mayor O'Donnell appointed a special bridge committee to make a detailed study of the project. Serving on this committee will be Councilman C. H. Jinkins, G. A. Domnick and Edwin Bushfield. Also City Engineer W. E. Thompson will work with the committee in a advisory position.

National Official Was Guest

Speaker At Townsend Meet J. Harry Kelly, of Kimball, South Dakota, National representative of the Townsend organization, spoke to a good sized, enthusiastic crowd at the regular meeting of the local Townsend club at city hall Friday evening. The meeting was open to everyone and many not members of the organization were present to hear the talk and get information on pending legislation. The Wagner Bill, "Cradle to the Grave Insurance," was discussed in detail in comparison with the bill sponsored by the Townsend movement. The former was shown as merely an amendment to the Social Security act and is proposed to be financed by a six per cent tax on employees and also on employers, while the Townsend bill exempts the first \$1200 and is a tax of three per cent on all income above this figure. A tax such as proposed would mean a lot to South Dakota, a virtual tax of 12 per cent on almost everyone, as not many in this state receive salaries above \$250 per month or \$3000 a year.

Mrs. Lily Brown received the sad news Saturday that her son, Lon, who was recently promoted to a Captaincy according to a release by the war department, is reported missing in action

over New Guinea. Captain Brown's wife and their son are living in King City, Calif., and she called Mrs. Brown to say that the war department had notified her of her husband being listed among the missing. Capt. Brown was in the United States until early in December when he was sent overseas. Since January 14 he has been in New Guinea with a reconnaissance squadron of the air corps. He grew up in Belle Fourche and graduated from the schools of this city after which he went to State College at Brookings, graduating in 1939. When he returned to Belle Fourche he was employed at Belle Drug before enlisting in the army air corps in 1940. He received his wings at Kelly Field, Texas in 1941. Besides his mother and his grandmother, Mrs. Mary Fisher, of Belle Fourche, he has a sister, Bernice attending school in Spokane, Wash., and a brother, Jean, an air cadet at Merced, Calif.

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Bullock Community Players Present Murder Mystery Mar. 1,2,3.

Make plans now to attend the **Bullock Community Center** Players production of "The Mousetrap".

The Mousetrap, a 2-act murder mystery by Agatha Christie, hits the boards March 1,2,3, 2019 at the Bullock Community Center in rural Harding County.

The scene is set when a group of people gathered in a country house cut off by the snow discover, to their horror, that there is a murderer in their midst. Who can it be? One by one the suspicious characters reveal their sordid pasts until at the last, nerve-shredding moment the identity and the motive are finally revealed.

Oops, we forgot to mention that popcorn and other concessions are available at each performance of the play.

The Mousetrap is the longest-running play in the history of London's West End.

Running continuously for over 60 years, The Mousetrap has broken records in London's West End and established Agatha Christie as a playwright in the public eye. Since its debut in 1952 it has become the longest running play in the history of London's West End with the

25,000th performance taking place on 18 November 2012. The 25,000th performance was marked with a one-off star studded performance, introduced by Christie's grandson Mathew Prichard and featuring Patrick Stewart, Julie Walters and Miranda Hart. The performance accompanied the unveiling of the Agatha Christie memorial statue in Leicester Square which commemorated her great works and her contributions to the theatre.

The story was adapted from a radio play, Three Blind Mice, written for the Royal family in 1947. The stage play had to be renamed on the insistence of another producer, Emile Littler, who had used the name on stage before the Second World War, and it was Agatha Christie's son-in-law, Anthony Hicks who suggested the new title. In fact, it refers to Shakespeare's Hamlet, in which Hamlet cryptically calls the play depicting the murder of the king, 'The Mousetrap'.

The original West End cast included Richard Attenborough and his wife Sheila Sim. One actor has been included in every performance since the opening

night and that is Dervck Guyler. whose voice recording reads the radio news bulletin in every show at St Martin's Theatre.

Agatha Christie gave the rights to The Mousetrap to her grandson Mathew Prichard for his 9th birthday, "Mathew, of course, was always the most lucky member of the family, and it would be Mathew's gift that turned out the big money winner." (At the time he wanted a bike.)

In 1954 the play was one of three Christie's running simultaneously in London's West End, a feat which made Agatha Christie the first female playwright to achieve.

In 1997 The Mousetrap Theatre Projects initiative was launched, a charity which helps young people experience London's theatre, and to which the money from the 25,000th performance was donated.

The contract terms of the play state that no film version can be made until the West End show has been closed for at least six months (perhaps no one anticipated the show's success), however an unapproved Russian film version was made in 1990 titled Myshelovka.

then processed, sometimes with additives for school lunches.

"Why don't we take the local fresh beef and use it into our schools instead," he continued. According to McGregor the animals can be slaughtered locally at Tri County Lockers. He has been in contact with the owners of the lockers and they are enthusiastic about the idea. McGregor said there are three things that need to be in place at the locker before it can be used.

First, the locker has to be USDA inspected. Secondly, the locker must be able to grade the meat, and thirdly, the locker must meet USDA nutrition

requirements. Education is going to be a vial part in this process, said Mc-Gregor. "We need to educate the community as to why we are doing this."

"With the conjunction of the lockers, school board, community, students, and the head chef we will be able to make this program succeed," he pointed

McGregor concluded by asking the permission from the school board members to continue researching this program with the help of the head chef.

School board member Todd Youngberg asked McGregor where the beef would come from and whether it would be donated or if the school district would pay for it.

McGregor said that he hoped local farmers and ranchers would donate the meat. This would be similar to the program at Hulett, WY.

Hulett school district has put this opportunity into their school lunch program during this school year. A representative from the school district was present at the Newell School Board meeting, available to answer any questions. The beef used by Hulett school district has been donated at this point. The district usually uses approximately 700 pounds of beef per school year for around 200 students. According to the Hulett advocate, that amount may triple this year since students are more likely to stay for school lunch and fewer students are bringing a sack lunch.

The Newell school board encouraged McGregor to continue his research and report back to the board in the future with his findings.

Superintendent Robin Dutt reported on several bills that are before the South Dakota legislature. House Bill 1066 requires a citizenship test for students before graduation. House Bill 1109 puts other revenue back to the local school district. She encouraged board members to research the bills and notify local congress people.

She also announced that a snow makeup day is set for March 29.

Dutt reminded everyone that there are three open positions for school board. Petitions must be in by February 22. Precincts will be combined for the School Board election as follows: Voters in Newell City #20, Union #8, Horse Creek #13, Newell Independent #14, and Castle Rock #6 will vote in Newell. Nisland #18 and Orman #12 voters will vote at Nisland.

A part-time Special Education Paraprofessional was hired to supervise a student with outof-school placement. Jack Hise will receive \$10 per hour with a maximum of four hours per day.

In other Board business: *Digital cameras will replace current security cameras. *Twenty-five Strider bikes were donated to the school. *The main server was down for a portion of the week causing everything to run at half speed. *The next board meeting will be March 11 at 6:30 p.m. in the
