US 85 Four Lane Development Underway

The North Dakota Department of Transportation (NDDOT) is expanding U.S. Highway 85 to a four-lane highway from Watford City to the Long X Bridge over the Little Missouri River. NDDOT is launching this highway widening project by starting project design, rightof-way acquisitions and utility relocations along the corridor. "Highway 85 is a critical route for transportation and commerce in western North Dakota, yet it continues to see a high number of traffic crashes," Gov. Doug Burgum said. "This expansion project will improve the flow of traffic for the public, business and industry and enhance safety as we work toward Vision Zero in our state."

Located in the energy fields of western North Dakota, this stretch of U.S. 85 moves about 4,500 vehicles a day. The 11-mile, roughly \$104 million expansion project is the second phase of a multi-phase plan to four-lane the corridor.

NDDOT is applying for a federal grant through Infrastructure for Rebuilding America (INFRA) to help fund a portion of the project. This grant along with state funding would assist the Department in widening this segment of U.S. 85.

'On a project of this magnitude we work in collaboration with many stakeholders to make sure we are serving the needs of everyone impacted," said ND-DOT Director Bill Panos. "Our

collaborative approach also benefits the project itself and gives us a better result for the impacted communities, businesses and the State of North Dakota."

It takes time to complete all the steps needed for a major road project, especially one that adds more lanes. Once the four-lane project is designed

and land is secured, the project may be bid in late 2022 with construction starting in 2023.

The first phase of the multiphase U.S. 85 plan is currently underway as construction is progressing on a new four-lane Long X Bridge, approximately 15 miles south of Watford City. The bridge is expected to be completed in 2021.

Dry Cleaning has Long History



Clark and Cathy Sowers, Belle Laundry and Dry Cleaners 711 State Street will celebrate 20 years in business March 6th.

March 6, 2000 was the start of local businessman Clark Sowers soiourn into the dry cleaning business. Watch next week's Beacon for details on how that occasion will be marked. Sowers time line, although very noteworthy, is just a small part of the 199 year history of the dry cleaning industry.

Thomas Jennings, a free-born New Yorker who became a leader of the abolitionist movement, made his fortune as the inventor of a dry-cleaning process called "dry scouring." Born in 1791, Jennings was 30 years old when he received his patent on March 3, 1821 (U.S. patent 3306x), becoming the first African-American inventor to own the rights to his invention.

He started his career as a tailor and eventually opened one of New York's leading clothing shops. Inspired by frequent requests for cleaning advice, he began researching cleaning solutions. He was 30 years old when he was granted a patent for a dry cleaning process. Tragically, the original patent was lost in a fire. But Jennings process was known to use solvents to clean clothes

and heralded in the process now known as dry cleaning.

The first money Thomas Jennings earned from his patent was spent on the legal fees to purchase his family out of slavery. After that, his income went mostly to his abolitionist activities. In 1831, Thomas Jennings became assistant secretary for the First Annual Convention of the People of Color in Philadelphia, PA.

Luckily for Thomas, he filed his patent at the right time. Under the United States patent laws of 1793 and 1836, both slaves and freedman could patent their inventions.

This is a day that has tremendous significance to people in the dry cleaning business. The dry cleaning industry has given so much to us, to our families, and to our communities. It's our

day, and it deserves recognition. Please help us make note this and every March 3rd from now until the end of time, in celebrating what is declared to be National Dry Cleaning Day.



Dwight Sabo 74

On August 15, 1945 Dwight Irving Sabo was born in Buffalo, South Dakota to Irving and Delores Sabo. On the same day, Japan surrendered to the United States, ending World War II. It's been highly debated if the two were related. Dwight joined his older sister Karen, and when he did her life would never be the same. He tricked her into revealing his Christmas present, only to find out that what he told her about her present, was really Dwight Sabo BS. To hear Delores tell it, Dwight was a little bit of a character when he was a child, and he had to taste many flavors of soap from back in the day. Ivory was the worst! Dwight's propensity for curse words apparently started at a young age. For instance, at 3 years old, he wrecked his tricycle and his Mom heard him call his trike a 'ditch hungry SOB!' Younger brother Doug was born, and Dwight liked to brag that it was his chasing Doug around with a bullwhip that helped to make Doug the track star for which he was so well known! Baby sister Rhonda later joined the family, and we say joined because big brother Dwight had convinced Rhonda that she was adopted, and even convinced her to ask their mother to see the birth certificate... because Dwight knew that their Mom had misplaced it!

Dwight attended the rural schools in Reva and spoke of being the youngest by many grades during his first couple of years. The teacher just didn't make much time to teach him things so he would play during the day in the Buttes, or with his horse or toys until the teacher would ring the bell, and it was time to go home. Due to this, Dwight couldn't really read until almost the 3rd grade when Joyce Lee introduced him to Zane Grey books, and it lit a fire to the joy of reading... with the exception of his English book. He would joke that in the pastures between the school and the ranch, that we could still find a few English books buried in a hole somewhere! He told many stories of riding his horse to school, and the games that they would play. He told about being disorientated during a blizzard while riding his horse home from school and thinking that his horse was steering him wrong. He kept yanking the reins in the wrong direction. Finally, he gave the horse its reins and it got him safely back home to the barn.


It was unseasonably hot on November 11, 1960 when Dwight was 15 years old. He was guiding hunters in the north end of the Slim Buttes. He wanted to try a .22 pistol that belonged to one of the hunters. They had just loaded it with hollow points. Dwight's hands were smaller then, and they were sweaty when his hand slipped and the pistol went off, shooting him in the stomach. He said, "I shot myself, boys!" The hunters started shooting their guns into the air to alert help. After a jeep ride, a plane ride, a Cadillac ambulance, and a battle with some gangrene, Dwight made it through, and was on to the next adventure, although the bullet stuck around in his stomach all of these years, along with a pretty impressive scar to show for the walking miracle that he was!

Throughout school Dwight played baseball, football, polo, boxing, and tuba in the school band. He played basketball as well, but only briefly. When his coached asked if he'd bought his shoes, Dwight answered that he hadn't. His coach said, "Sabo, don't bother."

In August 1960, Dwight's focus changed from teasing his siblings, hunting, and school, to the pretty Toft girl in typing class. There was a slight problem, though, because Laurie Toft thought he was annoying and cocky, and she didn't give him the time of day. Years later, Dwight would tell the story that she was stuck-up, but she would reply that she just didn't like him! Eventually his overabundance of charisma, charm and feistiness won over her heart and on June 4, 1962, Dwight & Laurie were married in Reva, SD. On their wedding day, Dwight was 16, and Laurie was 17 years old. Dwight has said his only regret was not doing it sooner. They continued to be each other's sweethearts for almost 58 more years. They held hands, and called each other honey, and lover, and laughed every day. They enjoyed spending their anniversaries taking back roads and chasing tornadoes. They were never short on conversation, but they were also comfortable with the silence. They were true soulmates, ones that very few ever find.

Dwight made a cherry of a deal when he traded a tuba for a 1953 Les Paul Gibson guitar that originally belonged to Stringbean Svenson. Dwight and that guitar made a lot of memories for not only himself and his family, but for so many people throughout the area for many years, playing for dances with the Satellites and the Wheels. He had a smooth voice, commanding presence and a magnetic personality that made him a natural on stage. He would sing "Kiss An Angel Good Morning" for his wife at every dance, and she would wait for it, as if it were the first time she heard him sing the song. Every dance would end with the "Green Green Grass of Home." Even now in 2020, a child or grandchild will run across someone who mentions listening to Dwight sing while they were growing up or hearing their parent's talk about going to the Satellite dances.

Dwight and Laurie were living at the Experiment Station in August 1962 when they became parents for the first time, and they laugh when they talk about always being told to keep the baby warm, make sure the baby's warm, don't let the baby get



cool. Kurk Alan was born in August, and the new parents drove home from Spearfish with the heat on high and Kurk wrapped up in blankets! No chance of catching a chill there!

In August 1963, Josh Dwight added to their growing family and the beautiful, blue eyed boy was happy and adored. Heartbreakingly, Jesus took him home at the age of 4 months.

Dwight was awakened in the middle of the night in April 1965 and told that it was time. He asked Laurie "Time for what?" Wyatt Irving was on his way!

Dwight drove expeditiously to make it on time and met a trooper. When Dwight told him what was going on, the trooper said, "Then what are you doing sitting here?"

Daughter Dallas Wynette was born in January 1971, and Dwight had bet a lot of whiskey that the baby was going to be a girl. He was pretty proud to show off his little girl's curly hair and blue eyeswith extra whiskey to boot!

Waylon Doral completed Dwight & Laurie's family in December 1976. Just to make sure his parents didn't think that they had everything figured out, he was born in the hallway of the hospital. His antics included inhaling a peanut into his lung and Copenhagen up his nose...but they made it through!

Dwight became a Dad four days after he turned 17, but he was a natural at it. He taught his children to love God, and that you didn't have to be in a church to have a relationship with Him. He taught them how to love their country, and he explained history to them in a way that made them want to preserve and honor those who protect its freedoms. He did their homework with them and taught them multiplication and fractions. He taught them how to drive tractors, change oil, pull a lamb, and brand a calf, read a tape, saw a board, hammer a nail, and many other ways to use their hands for work. He showed them how to stand on their head and drink water, how to tell a joke, and more importantly, how to take a joke. He lived a life that displayed that family is most important. He wanted them to watch the sunsets, enjoy the beauty of God's land, and the power of a thunderstorm. He taught them to appreciate what they have and to not be ungrateful, and if you can help another person, you should.

Dwight was born to be a farmer and a rancher. He had an appreciation for the land and love of the animals for which he cared. Dwight and Laurie raised their three sons and daughter on the ranch near Reva. He was sure to come to the games, concerts, activities, and programs. Dwight also ran the down marker for the HCHS football team for 38 years. Birthday parties and weddings had to be planned around the nights he'd be tied up with the chain gang. Not even a heart attack could keep him off the sideline. For the last forty years, carpentry was Dwight's craft and his skills and reputation were well known for miles around. Dwight had a strong work ethic and could outwork kids half his age.

Many young adults came through the doors of the Sabo house. Whether for a weekend, a week, a month or longer, they turned to Dwight & Laurie for guidance or a place to call home for a while when needed, and Dwight's words of wisdom & tough love made a difference.

Dwight enjoyed bowling leagues in Bison and Buffalo, Jaycee Rodeo, and coaching Reva baseball team. The community will miss Dwight's presence as he has emceed the Reva Turtle Races for every year but one. He was a proud member of the Reva-Sorum Volunteer Fire Dept. where he helped to make pancakes at the annual supper for years. He enjoyed golfing, a game of cribbage with anyone willing to play, North Dakota Rummy with relatives, and shaking dice for a pop at Reva. He liked a great conversation with a hot cup of coffee, and to have the time to tell a story and maybe a good joke or two...or NOT so good of a joke!

Dwight relished in the role of Grandpa, Papa, Gramps. Great Grandpa, & Grandpa Great. Smelling like sawdust and Old Spice, dishing out an M&M for a kiss, & making his toothpick disappear inside of his mouth when he got one of those kisses. He loved to tease everybody but especially his grandkids, whether it was about a girlfriend, a haircut, shortpants, kissin' camp, forgetting him, temper tantrums & more. If he knew it got under their skin, he kept poking until it wouldn't. He instilled in them many things, such as not using a knife in the jelly jar, not cutting a Memaw bun, appreciating real country music, and the right way to throw a football. But the one thing that tickled him the most was believing that he had taught each one of his grandkids how to cuss properly!

Dwight is survived by his loving wife Laurie of Reva; sons, , Kurk (Esther) of Trenton TX, Wyatt (Denise) of Reva, Waylon (Sarah) of Buffalo; daughter Dallas Ford (Scott Stiegelmeier) of Pierre; 10 grandchildren, Lacy (Drew), Bo (Kellie), Reba (Lacey), Jade (Tres), Austin (Lacey), Presley, Sage, Jett, Emilee (Cody), and Taryn; 8 great grandchildren, Keely, Kyler, Emelia, Liam, Hayes, Saylor, Kelsy, and Tenlee; two sisters, Karen (Ace) Inghram of Faith and Rhonda Makowiecki of Denver, CO, numerous nieces and nephews, and sister-in-law, Dawn Sabo of Gering, NE.

Waiting to greet Dwight were his parents Irving and Delores; infant son, Josh; infant grandson, Max; younger brother, Doug; father in law Oliv Toft; mother and father in law, Roselle and Loyal "Stub" Carter.

Everyone that knows much about Dwight Irving Sabo knows that in his younger years, he was a fighter. He fought over a nickel, for crying out loud! Dwight even had his favorite fighting spot. Of course, he liked to win! In all ways, Dwight put up an incredible fight. We would like to think that Dwight didn't lose his fight with cancer, because the cancer left his body at the same time, so technically, that's a tie.

They will be featuring saddle building and repair, along with custom leather projects, including portrait carving, sheaths, holster, and belts, and in 2021 they will feature a full boots service.



Becky outlined some of the challenges and hard decisions surrounding this issue, managing to keep the CHAMBER OF COMMERCE conversation light on such a com-



experienced the sting of loss or the memory of loss. Others have been reminded of the challenges of aging. Some have experienced the joy of new life. And, others have been challenged by the changes that have come as they've aged. Some of those times are particularly difficult. Others are fairly easy.

In the seasons of life that we experience, we note that there is a time for everything. In the Old Testament book of Ecclesiastes, King David's son, Solomon writes that "there is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven."

Solomon's musings on the significance and meaning of life as recorded in the book of Ecclesiastes are filled with thoughts and insights as to what matters most in life. Solomon's

observation and first-hand experience. He experimented with riches, pleasure and accomplishments. He surpassed all previous records as to accomplishment. With his personal experience he noted the travails of life

and cycles that we experience are common. He also noted with everything that he tried, his conclusions were that all of these things were meaningless.

For people who listen to Oldies Music, the song 'Turn, Turn, Turn' recorded by the Byrds actually quotes from the book of Ecclesiastes chapter 3. Other than throwing in the words, 'turn, turn, turn,' the song is basically a quoting of Ecclesiastes 3. If you could take the time over the next couple of days, you should read it.

The cycles of life will continue, or 'turn, turn, 'But the challenge is that we find hope and meaning in life in what matters

The greatest lesson that we can learn is that all external efforts to find meaning and significance in life apart from a genuine relationship with God who provides that is destined to disappoint or end up 'meaningless' as the book of Ecclesiastes concludes.

Rather than conclude with a negative, though. Solomon offers us hope and concludes with a positive.



Fitness, with a Side of Dysfunction?

This time of year, many people are focused on fitness so it's worth taking a look at what fitness really means. The dictionary defines fit as "sound physically and mentally, healthy." Using that definition, many "fitness" routines fall short of the goal. If you don't enjoy running and dread every workout, you're probably falling short of the "sound mentally" portion. Exercise should be enjoyable, reduce stress, and leave you

feeling better, not worse. **NO PAIN NO GAIN?**

Exercise should also leave you feeling better physically. If you can run a good time in a 5k, but have aches and pains for days after, you're not "sound physically." 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
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The Good Stuff

Now go into the world and speak positive things. :) - Jim

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

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City Lowers Hall Rental

NEWELL – In a surprising move during the commissioner comments portion of the Newell City Commission meeting on Thursday, February 13, the council recommended, and approved, lowering the hall rent for the Newell City Hall.

Mayor Ken Wetz was the one to first bring it up. He said he was concerned that the rental fee, which was \$100 with a key deposit that was returned when the key came back, was too high and that it was keeping people from renting the hall.

"We have charged \$50 per use from May through September, and \$100 per use from October through April," said Wetz. "We do allow 'not-for-profit' entities to use at \$10, but it's the same issue when we have Festival of Trees, the Crackerbarrels and 4-H skate nights. Do you want to change the policy?"

The city charged more during the winter months due to heating costs and Finance Officer Jen Parrow said it cost to have the hall cleaned after each use.

"It's a city building," said Commissioner Chad Erk.

"Why can't they donate the \$100 to the city for the hall?" asked Commissioner Allen Youngberg, referring to the money taken in during skate nights instead of donating it to a local charity or business. There was skating in the hall on Saturday, February 15, the funds raised to be donated to the Newell Library.

Why do they need to donate it to the library?" questioned Commissioner Connie Humble. "The library is city funded. Also, what constitutes a not-forprofit?"

Erk asked if the council wanted to waive fees for other

"We raised the rates because the NVN was struggling and we wanted to be comparable," said Youngberg. A long discussion about the damage to the floor from roller skating and the fact that the floor needed to be refinished every two years at a cost of \$2300.

"If we didn't allow roller skating would we have to reseal every two years?" questioned

"There's no sense in having it (the building) if it's not going to be used," stated Humble. Wetz proposed and Erk motioned to lower the rate to \$25 per use from May through September and \$50 per use from October to April. The motion passed unanimously.

Parrow reported that the city no longer has an insurance representative with the departure of Max Wetz. A new HUB

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



Steve Clooten, representing his business Western Dakota Waste Solutions, came before the board to present a proposal for a monofil site at the current rubble site southwest of town. He had previously met with county commissioners about a potential site east of Fruitdale, but shared that he felt he had run into a road block with them.

"Kim Richards recommended you folks and your rubble site," said Clooten.

He said the project would be a 300' x 200' x 30' deep site where baled tires would be buried. He said the amount of land needed for a 30-year monofil site of this proportion would be just under an acre. He also stated that the state, referring several times to State Engineer Jim Wendt, was "all onboard." He said the project would mean he would dig the hole, prepare the site and purchase a baler that would remain at the site. He would bring in a gooseneck trailer load per day of tires to bale and place.

The cost to the city would be a permit, held by the city for approximately \$250 per year, as well as engineering costs of \$15,000.

"It would be a win-win situation," said Clooten. "You would start at \$25,000 to \$30,000 income per year for the city, and that could increase." The city would be paid by the ton

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for tires baled and placed and would be weighed or have an average per tire weight utilized.

When questioned why he was not pursuing the county site by Fruitdale he said, "A couple commissioners having difficulty the amount of traffic on the road. (They said) no semi's, and a goose neck trailer once per day. They didn't feel secure."

According to Clooten the state would permit and regulate the site. Clooten would pay all construction costs, approximately \$30,000 with the state inspecting at each step. The engineering company would drill bore holes to make sure there were no environmental issues.

There were lots of questions and the commission said they would check it out with Clooten meeting with them at next months' meeting.

A brief report from City Foreman Larry Parker included him speaking with SD DOT representative Matthew Church about the ongoing soft spot issues on the highway from Fourth Street to Eighth Street, especially on the south-bound side. He said the current plan is to probably dig up and put down geo-mesh on that west side. Parker said there could be many reasons why there are the soft spot issues.

"When they dig it up, if there's something questionable, we should replace it," said Wetz, referring to potential water line breaks or seepage. "We've got money in the water fund/irrigation fund/sewer fund to do it."

Parker also reported that he had met with the SD Wastewater Association and said there are big changes in the future for the town. He said the biggest was

Pioneer Banker of Belle Fourche Dies in California, Fri. Death Comes to Arthur H. Marble at Los Angeles – Resided Here 1891-1903

Word was received the past week by DeWitt Malvin, vice-president of the Belle Fourche office of the First National Bank of Black Hills, that Arthur H. Marble, well-known pioneer banker of this city from 1891-1903, passed away at Los Angeles, California, Friday of last week. Funeral services and interment took place, Tuesday of this week at Forest Lawn, Glendale, California. He was 74 years of age at time of his passing. Mr. Marble began his banking career in Deadwood in 1889, shortly after became connected with the former Butte County Bank, when its offices were at Minnesela, moving to the new town of Belle Fourche in 1891. From 1891 to 1903, he was cashier of the Butte County Bank, now the First National Bank of the Black Hills. In that year he moved to Cheyenne, Wyoming, his place here being taken by the late W. B. Penfold. At Chevenne, he became president of the Stock Growers National Bank, which position he held at the time of his death. He was also president of the Montana National Bank at Billings and banking manager for the John Clay & Company. For 46 years, from 1891 to 1937, he held official connection with the former Butte County Bank, being vice-president of that institution after he left Belle Fourche. Surviving relatives include his wife, one son, Fred Marble, who is vice-president of the Stock Growers National Bank of Cheyenne, one daughter Mrs. Lois Cobb, Glendale, California. Mr. Marble was in the Butte County Bank office at the time that it was robbed June 26, 1897 by a group of bandits, headed by Tom O'Day. In the news item published in the old Belle Fourche Times at that time, it was reported that Marble was the only one who did not take refuge from the flying bullets of the bandits, but stood to shoot it out with them, and came out of the ordeal unscathed. He was one of the early members of Cedar Lodge No. 124, A. F. & A. M., Belle Fourche and continued to hold





Assessment notices will be arriving in your mailbox so please check your assessment notice for an Owner-Occupied Classification. Call the Director of Equalization if this property qualifies but does not have it. Complaint on your assessment may be made to your local Township or Municipal Board of Equalization by filing a written notice of appeal with the clerk of the local board of equalization no later than the Thursday preceding the third Monday in March (postmarked by deadline is considered timely). The local board of equalization meets on the third Monday in March and is in session for five days. From the decision of your local board, you may appeal to the county board by filing a written notice of appeal with the county auditor located at 117 5th Ave. Belle Fourche, SD 57717 on or before the first Tuesday in April (postmarked by deadline is considered timely). County Board of Equalization meets on the second Tuesday in April and shall adjourn no later than three weeks after the second Tuesday in April. Appeal from your County Board may be taken to the State Office of Hearing Examiners. Such

written notice must be filed with the Chief Hearing Examiner, Foss Building, 523 East Capitol, Pierre, South Dakota 57501, no later than the third Friday in May (postmarked by deadline is considered timely). Appeals to the Circuit Court may be taken from the county board or the Office of Hearing Examiners within thirty days from the publication of the decision. An appeal from the county board to circuit court will prevent an appeal to the Office of Hearing Examiners. However, you may appeal the decision of the Office of Hearing Examiners to

circuit court. Required by SDCL 10-6-50 (PT-5C) (7/09) Notice of assessment--Use of uniform information. The director of equalization shall mail or transmit electronically a notice of assessment to each property owner not later than March first. The secretary of revenue shall prescribe uniform information which shall be used by the director of equalization for notification of property owners as required by this section.

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
