# Council Gives First Readings to Ordinances

BELLE FOURCHE -The Belle Fourche City Council gave first and second readings to several ordinances and passed a resolution, all at its meeting February 18.

The second reading was for Ordinance 4-2020, section 2.04, Section 2.04.050, which deals with excessive absences from city council and committee meetings.

Mayor Gloria Landphere read the ordinance for clarity in hopes of answering some lingering questions.

"Where the council is concerned, removal is done by the council, not the Mayor. Any issues with committees, since the members are appointed by the Mayor, is brought to the council and they can ratify the removal if they desire," said Landphere.

Some questions arose about how one goes about working through, such as if a member

# **Mayor Outlines State of the City**



# Mayor: City on solid footing as decade comes to a close.

BELLE FOURCHE---The city of Belle Fourche is on solid

footing, according to the State of the City address given by Mayor Gloria Landphere. She gave the address at the regular city council meeting February 18.

"2019 was a good year when you summarize the revenue we received. The department heads did a great job of budgeting. A big concern was to not create a shortfall," she began.

She added that the department heads did a good job of planning ahead to possibly avert any problems.

Sales tax played a role, with a 5% increase that helped with city debt.

city debt.

Some of the debt included

\$153,000 for City Hall that will be serviced until 2023, \$304,000 for the rails sidings that will be satisfied in 2032, Some refinancing to save mon-

ey will likely be arranged.
"We have a list of projects
from 2019 that anyone can take
a look at. All they have to do is
come down to City Hall to read
it," said Landphere.

Some of the other projects included the HVAC repair at the Belle Fourche Area Community Center, which amounted to \$300,000.

Pickle ball courts, street overlays, repairs to water and sewer systems and the Hay Creek Bridge were some of the other work, as well as the Day Street lift station and the rodeo grounds and the grandstand.

Even the Police Department benefited from some work, with

the paving of the parking lot at the station.

For the City Council, the information was proof that the city is in good shape and ready to tackle the work needed. "I think the city is moving in the right direction. The city's budget is handled very well and it's good to always look ahead. There are things that I talk about with my constituents so we're all on the same page," said Ward 2 Councilor Travis Martin

Ward 3 Councilor Vern Hintz was likewise pleased with what he heard from Mayor Landphere

"It's good to get this information to the public. There's a lot of money involved in these various projects, and it shows where the money is going. So when people pay their taxes they see where that money goes," he said.

He added that if a town is not improving itself, it's dying.

"Streets, infrastructure, and other essentials are vital to keep working on to bring in new business. Potholes and water leaks are not conducive to that," he said.

He related that the small town he came from was always chip sealing between 80 and 100 blocks of street because if it isn't done when it needs it, the situation just gets worse.

He jokingly commented that Belle Fourche has three alignment shops, and are kept busy, so maybe the streets need some attention.

"When things come up, you have to move ahead. Ignoring the needs of the community is not an option."


# Red Stegall to Headline Belle Silver Lining July 3rd Fundraiser LEGENDS Breakfast Honformers, Allen and Jill Kirkham

the National Defense Service Medal and was honorable discharged from the military.


John worked on the railroad from 1975 to 1976.







# Streeter Wins 4A Heavyweight Title Seven Broncs to State Tourney

Coach Bill Abell's wrestling squad finished in 5th place at the Region 4A meet in Sturgis.

The Broncs qualified wrestlers in seven of the fourteen weight classes for the 2020 State Wrestling Tournament Feb 27-29 in Sioux Falls.

Coach Abell stated it is the most wrestlers in his coaching career at Belle he has qualified in a single year.

"I really have to give a lot of the credit to our two seniors, Michael Streeter and Chase Bickerdyke." They stepped up, really performed, and led the whole team."

They both not only had wins, but displayed dominating wins on the mat. Wins that were an encouragement to the whole team."

Belle saw Senior Michael Streeter, wrestling at 285# win the first place heavyweight championship match.

Michael who is 27-11 on the year won over Mason Finsterwalder of Douglas with a 5-1 decision

Cayden Wolfe, 18-11 at 145#, placed 3rd at 145 by winning an 8-5 decision over Harrison Good,

Sturgis. Chase Bickerdyke defeated another Sturgis wrestler, Robert Merwin, by decision 12-8. Chase is 24-15on the year.

Also punching tickets to the state tournament in Sioux Falls with 4th place finishes were Colton Shelley at 113; Owyn Schreder, 120; Thomas McCoy, 126; and Cade Bickerdyke at 160. Coach Abell said, "Thomas qualified in spite of an issue with shoulder injury. We expect him to be able to heal up wrestle and win

matches in Sioux Falls." Also winning regional medals and adding points to the 5th place team standings, but not qualifying for state (only top 4 in each weight class go) were 106 #, Elijah Braning 13-13 on the season placed 6th; Hunter Quenzer ended the season 27-24 and earned the 5th Place medal at 132#; Isaac McKenney placed 6th and was 12-16 on the year; Levi Melanson,170#, ended with 25-27 record and won his 5th place match. "Levi lost a narrow 4-3 decision in the Consolation Semifinals to a Little Wound wrestler, remarked Abell. "He achieved an escape right as time ran out. The point would have put the match into overtime."

The balance of the region tournament squad and their season end records are Andy Tonsager, 14-30 at 138#; Sean Wahfledt, 10-28 at 195#; and Aiken Crowley 11-14 at 220#.

The wrestlers will be in action starting 9:00 am Thursday at the Denny Sanford Arena in Sioux Falls.

# Oh the Places You'll Go

BFHS grad Cheyenne Davis: "2020 Vision: Where are you going to be in 2020?

This 2017 Belle Fourche graduate has spent the last year living in Lima, Peru! Why in the world did I decide to go to a different culture, live among people of a different language, and completely interrupt my studies?

After graduating in 2017, I

went to Watertown, Wisconsin to study Social Studies Education and Spanish at Maranatha Baptist University. The goal was (and still is) to become an archaeologist and professor of history. During my second year of school, my mother called to tell me of a wild opportunity- to take a study abroad/ missions' trip

for a year- to PERU. While I marveled at the idea, I was just a small town girl from the West- there was no possible way I could go halfway around the world, dropping my studies for a year, especially when missions was not one of my main goals in life. Don't get me wrong- my love for my Savior is first in my life, but I really didn't think He was calling me to life on the missions' field. I could maybe take a two or three week missions trip, but a year? I didn't have that time, money, or the health.

As the year progressed, I prayed about it, met people who had completed the program, researched it, and figured out what it would do to my studies. While it did tack on a semester more, it actually worked out better to graduate in May rather than in December like I originally planned. So on May 24, 2019, I boarded a plane with six other team members I just met bound to Peru to embark on the journey of a lifetime.

So what is this program I am doing? The ARRIBA program is an eleven-month missions' trip, internship, and study abroad program for juniors and seniors in college through the Baptist Mid Missions Agency out of Cleveland, OH. It is to live the life of a missionary for a year. For the first five months, my teammates and I took a total of 30 college credits separated into two-week module courses. Every day, we started with two hours of Spanish, learning and talking one on one with a native Peruvian speaker. The rest of the day was filled with another class. In total, we took Culture Anthropology, Linguistics, Biology, the Pauline Epistles, Multi- Media and Technology, Latin American History, and Evangelism. I finished my year at Maranatha May 4, and by May 27, had started another five months of classes. Finishing them in October, the last six months of the program is an intense internship in a national church in the Lima area. I cannot begin to describe

how incredible this experience has been. To help grasp the language faster, each of us have been staying with a Peruvian family since the beginning of the program in May. Overall, they don't know any English, so we were forced to learn and use Spanish. I live with my Peruvian pastor and his wife. I had studied Spanish for about five years (two at Belle under

Miss Katie Graue, one at BHSU, and another two at Maranatha), so within a few weeks I was understanding pretty well. However, I lacked in the speech department. You don't want to mix up words like cansada and casada. The first means you are tired while the second means you are married. While

in Lima, I have been serving in my church in several ways. For the first time, I am a Sunday School teacher to a sweet group of 6-8-year old's. I also get to help with music, playing piano during the week and filling in for the main pianist on Sunday's when he's gone.

Probably one of the most challenging aspects has been music. Unlike the United States, Peruvian schools do not put an emphasis on music. Therefore, if someone knows music, it is usually because they taught themselves or have a good ear, not because they have had any formal training. Aside from the five years of piano lessons under Mrs. Diane Brennan and being a part of choir since 6th grade, I didn't think I had formal training myself, especially since I am not studying music in college. However, my Peruvian pastor thought opposite. Since arriving, I have helped teach the church choir, teaching voice lessons and theory, taught piano lessons to the church kids, and sang in many weddings, outreaches, and conferences around Peru. The Lord has stretched me, and it has been so cool to see in how many ways!

I have not just stayed in Lima. Out of the 24 departments (their version of States) that Peru has, I have been privileged to visit 12 of them (it would be 14 if I didn't have a health scare in January). Climbing to 17,000 feet in the tops of the Andes and riding down the Amazon River have definitely been highlights! In each trip, aside from seeing the incredible beauty and history of Peru, my team and I have met all the Baptist Mid Missions missionaries, visited the two Bible seminaries, led Vacation Bible Schools, counseled and taught in camps, and ministered in conferences to Peruvians, visiting all three parts of the country: the coast, the mountains, and the jungle. Before the year is out, I'll travel back to Cusco to work in a creation museum, get started on translating a book, and do another VBS in Ecuador. It has been exciting to meet so many people and interact with so many different cultures throughout Peru! How do I sum up a year like this? I wrote in my diary at the beginning of the year the following-

"To look back on everything God has done in my life this past year- Wow! In Peru, I've trekked mountain peaks, swam in glacial lakes, seen the sunset from the top of the Incan capital, explored Machu Picchu, been to every frontier now: Ecuador, Colombia, and Brazil, gone sandboarding the desert, swam in the Pacific Ocean, stood in front of archaeological tombs waiting to be opened, and ridden on the Amazon River. I've met American missionaries, Peruvian missionaries, young, old, new, and veterans. I've seen so many churches that have grown into faithful ministries. I've been able to teach Sunday School, learn a new language, develop and use my musical talents for the Lord, and teach Vacation Bible School. I've made friends with so many brothers and sisters in Christ all over Peru. I have grown so much in my trust and faith in the Lord seeing His creation in His people and His world. It's incredible! I've learned about an entire other culture and seen how they love God and others too!"

I could go on about so many more aspects, but this article would be way to long. Let me tell you- the food is AMAZ-ING! And living in the 16th largest city was an adjustment: especially when the idea of personal space does not exist. Culture shock is very real. Traveling for fourteen hours by boat was an experience. Language is more than just words. Macchu Pichu is just scratching the surface of the Incan Empire. And the people will forever have my heart.

Within a couple of months, I'll return to Belle Fourche, but this year will be a year I will never forget. I came to Peru hoping to be changed, but I never expected how much.

needed to go to a wedding, and missed a meeting or was sick. The solution would be to explain the absences.

"I don't agree with the wording," said Councilor Troy Shockey. "As I've said before, I work Wednesday and Thursday and if I get sick, then I'll miss Legal and Finance and at that rate, I'll be before you all rather quickly," he said.

Another question dealt with the agenda.

"If this passes, does it become part of the agenda to be excused?" asked Councilor James

Ager. City Attorney Dwight Gubrud stepped in.

"You have to remember this is three consecutive absences. If you have one in September, one in December and one in February, you will need to meet with the Mayor, but your position is not in jeopardy," he said.

"And remember, we're elected officials and adults. This is

what we do," said Landphere. The council voted to approve the second reading, with Troy Shockey voting no. The ordinance will take effect 20 days after publication in the newspaper.

In other action, the council gave first reading to Ordinance 4-2-20, which requires a license to sell fireworks in the city. The old ordinance prohibited the sale of the fireworks, so the redo would change that.

And finally the council adopted a resolution to accept a designation for Highway Commercial, Light Industrial and Heavy Industrial districts.

The districts would allow a wider variety of business and structures, including hospitals, bars, lodges, offices and so on.

And the council approved looking into sales tax revenue refund bonds.

"Keep in mind we are just looking at this. No action is being taken. We're just in the exploratory phase," said Mayor Landphere.

Another activity is Wally Ball, a form of volleyball but played in racquetball courts.

One thing Velander would like to see is more communication with the public, to keep them aware of the things going on at the community center.

"One thing that was lacking was an online presence, so while we do have a website, we are thinking of creating our own website so we have more content control," he said.

He appreciates the support he and his staff is getting from the city and looks forward to any help he gets from the Mayor and council.

He has some plans that include repurposing the lobby space so there is more room for needed uses and from a security aspect and other needs.

Another change being considered is rebranding. "By that I mean new signage, new logo, and maybe even a

new name for the community center. Those changes are a way off, but I feel that could improve our image in the community," he said.

Velander stressed that these are only ideas and nothing official has been decided, but are positive for the community. One challenge is working with

long time members of the community center and informing them of any changes being considered, since some prefer the status quo, so hoping they understand why the changes are needed.

The only things in the hopper for improvements include upgrading the heating and ventilation and getting new equipment for the weight room. Other than that, the building is aging gracefully and no repairs are needed save repainting a wall or changing the look of some rooms.

While only being in Belle Fourche for a month and a half, Velander looks forward to working with the citizens of the town to make the community center the place for people to

## Anything Left in the Barrel?

We stepped out of the safe home community world of a weekly newspaper last week to drive to the State Capitol in Pierre. 200 miles.

There is an old adage attributed to Prince Bismark that states: Law and sausage are two things you do not want to see being made.

Representative Tom Brunner had introduced legislation that would have changed the requirements needed to be a legal newspaper in South Dakota. The House Local Government committee made sausage of the legislation. Chewed it up and spit it out

For those of you keeping score at home, state law mentions six basic requirements for a paper to be eligible to become a "legal" newspaper.

- 1. Publish continually for 1 year. (The Beacon started in June 2018; uninterrupted since Nov. 2018))
- 2. Have a minimum of 200 paid subscribers. (Have that plus many more)
- 3. Maintain a permanent office. (622 State Street)
- 4. Print a minimum of 4 pages no less than 120 square inches in size. (16 pages weekly and over 200 sq. in.)
- 5. 25% of that space, 50% of the time must be non paid news

content with no more than 80% copied from other publications, unless a news service. (Another area we greatly exceed the mini*mum required)* 

> 6. May only give away one free copy for every paid subscriber. (our subscriptions are voluntary and we've not tried to comply)

We distribute the Beacon to what has historically been referred to as the Belle Fourche Tri-State trade area. That service is one we will con-

tinue with. Representative Brunner's HB 1241 would have eliminated #6. the 1:1 ratio on free to paid.

The other five would still be required.

We wish to thank Representatives Brunner and the other co-sponsors of the legislation: Bordeaux; Kirk Chaffee, Caleb Finck, Frye-Mueller, Goodwin, Dayle Hammock, Howard, Jensen (Kevin), Sam Marty, Olson, Perry, Lee Qualm, and Wangsness and Senator Youngberg.

I could list all the reasons the newspaper association lobbyists said it was bad, but I don't think they fully understood what and how we do what we do, nor the process and procedure of the US Postal permit we use to distribute. When we started the Beacon the US Post Office sent people out from the Regional office in Sioux Falls that recommended the type of permit we use.

House Bill 1241 asked the legislature to allow a NEWSPAPER that provides news and events, under South Dakota law, to provide local government legal notices to 100% of its citizens, not just those who subscribe.

Letitia Lister publisher of the Black Hills Pioneer and also current President of the South Dakota Newspaper Association testified against the bill on behalf of herself.

I appreciated that she chose to oppose as "self" instead of on behalf of the SDNA

The Pioneer should oppose the legislation. If the Beacon becomes a "legal" newspaper the County, City, and School districts will no longer have to send our/your local tax dollars that pay to publish the notices to a newspaper in another county. I think even the Pioneer has an ad in its print that states: Shop Local. The Beacon agrees.

The newspaper association should embrace any opportunity to strengthen and encourage local newspapers across the state. It might be any of those other communities that lose their local paper in the future.

I have been working on this session is HB 1241. This bill would change the language in current law to allow a paper to obtain legal newspaper status while only requiring a minimum paid subscription from its readers. With legal newspaper status, a paper is allowed to post important public matter such as city council minutes, school board minutes, and other important legal matter. As many of you know, the Belle Fourche Beacon delivers to all mailing addresses without forcing readers to have a paid subscription.

The bill unfortunately failed in committee and was opposed by the South Dakota Newspaper's Association. One of the reason's the Association was opposed to this bill? "Legal newspapers hold local governments accountable and in turn sub-

scribers hold their local newspaper accountable to keep them well informed with facts and information." This statement signifies two things. First, shoppers and free-distribution publications are not "accountable" enough to publish public

notices. And second, a newspaper that requires subscriptions should not have to compete with a free distributor for these legal notices. Yes, an objection to this bill is the fact that newspapers that require a paid subscription are worried they cannot compete with free distributors. As a free market economy, I would argue that this is the exact opposite of what our American values are. A law should not be in place because you fear you might not be able to compete with another provider. Instead you should innovate to compete against a competitor. This not only makes an equal playing ground for everyone but creates a better product for the consumer. I will continue to fight for our local newspapers to ensure they have an equal

playing field with all newspapers paid or unpaid. Along with this bill, we have also been very busy as the Chairman of the Agriculture and Natural Resource Committee and a member of the Education Committee, I have gotten to listen and help pass through a variety of different bills including the hemp bill,

a bill to allow family members such as grandparents and family friends to mentor youth hunters, bills to give rights back to the parents, and many other bills that help encourage the growth of Agriculture, outdoor recreations, and education in our state. The legislature also received some good news from

the governor's office. The Governor's office latest revenue projections show revenues being 19 million dollars higher than first projected.

# **Camping Reservations Now Open**

PIERRE, S.D. – Campers can begin making reservations for summer stays in South Dakota State Parks.

Feb. 15 was the first day to make camping reservations for a Friday, May 15, arrival – the State Parks' Open House Weekend and traditional kick-off to the summer season.

Reservations for other summer dates will follow in succession, becoming available 90 days before arrival. Over 40 parks offer camping reservations on the 90-day schedule. The exception is Custer State Park, which offers reservations one year before arrival.

State Parks Director Scott Simpson encourages campers to keep an eye on the calendar and make reservations for camping trips as soon as possible. Memorial Day reservations open Feb. 22 for a Friday arrival, and campers can reserve for Father's Day weekend starting March 21.

"The sooner you can plan your camping trip, the better," said Simpson. "Campsites at popular parks go quickly." Campsites become available at



7 a.m. Central Time on the first day of the 90-day window, but reservations for available campsites can be made until the day you arrive. The 90-day window calendar can be found online at campsd.com.

have always known about your flaw, and I took advantage of it. I planted flower seeds on your side of the path, and every day

while we walk back from the stream, you've watered them. For two years I have been able to pick these beautiful flowers to decorate my master's table. Without you being just the way you are, he would not have this beauty to grace his house."

#### Moral:

Each of us has our own unique flaws. We're all cracked pots. But it's the cracks and flaws we each have that make our lives together so very interesting and rewarding. You've just got to take each person for what they are and look for the good in them.

There is a lot of good out there. There is a lot of good in you! Blessed are the flexible, for they shall not be

bent out of shape.

Remember to appreciate all the different people in your life! Or as I like to think of it - if it hadn't been for the crackpots in my life, it would have been pretty boring and not so

#### Tim O'Connell Ties Bareback **Riding World Record**

SAN ANGELO. Texas -There's very little bareback rider Tim O'Connell hasn't accomplished in his career.

The Zwingle, Iowa, cowboy already was a three-time world champion. Now, he owns a share of the bareback riding world record.

O'Connell had a memorable, 94-point ride on Northcott Macza's Stevie Knicks to win the San Angelo Cinch Chute-Out Rodeo, Feb. 15.

"I don't have words for it, truthfully," said O'Connell, who won world titles in 2016, 2017 and 2018. "You are just in awe. You just tied for the best bareback ride in the history of our sport. Who is going to have words for that? I'm very humbled to be in that group. I've dreamed about being 90 in my career, and to accomplish that and now to make a ride six points off perfect and be with those legends, I'm very humbled to have my name in the record book."

O'Connell shares the world record with Wes Stevenson (Kesler Rodeo's Cover Girl, Dallas, 2002); Will Lowe (Kesler Rodeo's Sky Reach, Omaha. Neb., 2003); Ryan Gray (Carr Pro Rodeo's Grass Dancer, Eagle, Colo., 2009); and Tilden Hooper (Classic Pro Rodeo's Big Tex, Silver City, N.M.,

O'Connell, who had never been on Stevie Knicks, earned \$7,500 for the victory.

"I knew it was going to be

big about the fourth jump," O'Connell said. "Her head disappeared and all of a sudden my feet were flying at my ears and I was getting them back in time and I couldn't see a thing. She had her head between her legs, and it was as aggressive as a ride that I could make. It was like an explosion underneath me. She's a little stick of dynamite and she went off. My style of riding tries to mirror the aggressiveness, and we just went at it for eight seconds. I knew it was going to be big, but I didn't know it was going to be that big. It was crazy.'

O'Connell has been red hot since the calendar turned to 2020. He entered the weekend in third place in the PRCA RAM World Standings with \$23,545, a little more than \$1,000 out of first place. The windfall from San Angelo helped him climb to first in the Feb. 18 world standings with \$25,596.

Stevie Knicks is no stranger to shining in the spotlight. In 2019, Clayton Biglow tied the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo record with a 93-point ride on her to win Round 10 at the Thomas & Mack Center in Las Vegas. Stevie Knicks was selected the Canadian Professional Rodeo Association 2019 Bareback Horse of the Year.

You just don't expect it out of her because she's small, but she bucks so big," O'Connell said. "She's electrifying. She's an amazing animal."


A cable foot bridge is being strung across the Belle Fourche River just south of the town of Nisland. Nisland wants a real bridge across the river for vehicles.

123 years ago **Belle Fourche Times** February 27, 1896 Edison And The X Rays The wizard Succeeds in Taking as Instantaneous Pictures

Orange, NJ – Feb. 27 After experimenting for two weeks in his laboratory in West Orange, Thomas A. Edison yesterday succeeded in taking an instantaneous photograph by means of the Roentgen rays from florescent tubes, the rays having penetrated a heavy cardboard and volcanized fibre plated holder. In another experiment a sharply detinned image of a metal strip was made on a plate with four and one-half inches of wood between the plate and the florescent tube, and, after exposure of twelve minutes the photograph was taken. Mr. Edison said by the end of the present week he will be ready to try to take a picture of the human head and make other interesting photographic experiments.






