Contract Signed for New City Water Well Design

BELLE FOURCHE - The city of Belle Fourche has signed a contract with Advanced Engineering and Environmental Services (AE2S), with offices in Spearfish and Rapid City, for design and construction administration of a new city water well. The well will be known as Hat Ranch Well #3 and will enhance the supply of freshwater to the city's south side and beyond. It will be located west of Hat Ranch Road in the southwest part of the development.

"This will be another water source for the city, it will serve more than Hat Ranch," Brent Hardy, City Engineer, told the Beacon. "We have two existing wells, one off Water Tank Road and the other off Summit Street on the hill. So this will be a third."

The cost of the project is estimated at \$1.7 million and is a 2023 budgeted item,

according to Jason LaFayette, City Finance Officer. It will be financed with a loan from the **Drinking Water State Revolving** Loan Fund which is distributed through the South Dakota Conservancy District. It will be paid for with a revenue bond that was approved last November. Users who benefit from the project will see a surcharge on their water bill to pay back the bond. According to figures presented to the city last June by Lysann Zeller of the Black Hills Council of Local Governments, with 2,400 water users in Belle Fourche this would mean a "worst-case scenario" \$3.04 per month increase in resident's water bills, if the project cannot be totally funded through grants or loan forgiveness.

Indeed, plans for the well have been in works for quite some time. There are two reasons, Hardy says, the new well is needed. The first is to supply the growing water demands on the city's south side. The second involves needed upgrades to five miles of the city's main springline from Camp Comfort Road north to the Redwater

"And this new well will let us supply water for the south side of town when that line goes down for repairs and upgrades," he said.

Hardy says there is no timeline for the replacement of the five miles of pipeline, which will be a major undertaking. Some sections of the line are already more than 100 years old. An emergency repair was conducted in 2019 on a stretch of the pipe along Old Belle Road. Hardy says smaller repairs had to be made last year. And, he says, when the full reconstruction takes place critical phases

Task Force Created to Study City Employee Wages

BELLE FOURCHE – A plan that was talked about during last year's city budget sessions is now being put in place. Mayor Randy Schmidt has formed a city wage and benefit task force that will look at how competitive the city's wage and benefits package is with surrounding communities and what adjustments, if any, should be recommended to the city council.

The task force will be comprised of the Mayor Schmidt, Bob Nelson, City Administrator, Jason LaFayette, City Finance Officer, Gina Carpenter, City

Human Resources Director, and three council members. Mayor Schmidt contacted the three city council members to sit on the task force last week.

The task force will look at the city's current pay scale, research similar pay scales in surrounding communities and review and make recommendations for updates to any job descriptions.

Rebecca Larson, Ward 4 Councilmember, who is chairperson of the city's Legal and Finance Committee, said this is something her committee

has already begun looking at. The issue of city employee pay came up a bit late during last year's budget hearings in October. At that time Larson proposed what came to be known as the 15/5 compromise plan. It proposed giving 15% across the board raises on Jan. 1, 2023, with a 5% merit-based increase to come in July after employee evaluations by city department heads. The 15/5 was proposed in lieu of a 20% across the board pay increase at the beginning of the year.

"The 15/5 was to give everybody the ability to hopefully make it through this next year with us and to be able to give us time to make a more educated look at the city's pay structure in the future. We need to look at the situation closely." Larson said at the time.

Larry Schmaltz, Ward 3 Councilmember, proposed the idea of a task force as the appropriate vehicle to resolve the issue during a budget work session on Oct 24.

"We really can't go through a process of revamping our entire pay structure as part of our budget process. This should have been done prior to our budget process," Schmaltz said

As Molly Blair prepared to open a variety store in Belle Fourche, advice from the SD CEO Women's Business Center proved to be a game changer.

At their suggestion, she created a chart of product categories and specific brands she might want to stock. She listed local businesses that potentially sold those produc then visited each store to see what was available. Gaps in the grid helped her successfully narrow her product categories and brands to those unavailable locally. Following that plan, toys became her top seller. Other key categories are stationery, CBD products, skin care and electronics.

From the start, she has invited customers to request items. After a local resident complained she had to drive to Beulah, Wyoming for her favorite lotion, Blair added that line and it became her best-selling lotion brand.

Keeping shoppers in town is important to her. If she doesn't have what a customer wants, she calls other local stores to see who has it, and they recipro-

When a new dollar store opened in town, Blair's sales actually increased. One reason, she believes, is that people know if one store doesn't carry something the other likely will – and they no longer feel they have to drive out of town to find what they want.

Offering convenience is another way she keeps shoppers at home. Using back-to-school class requirement lists, she creates a separate bin for each grade, containing every item needed for students in that grade. Customers can just grab the bin for their child's grade and buy everything in it, or use a laminated list she provides to go through the store, pick up items and check them off.

"It's a bit labor intensive, but people are so happy to have it laid out for them and easy,' Blair says. "People got done so fast they would then shop around the store."

Radio provides her most effective marketing. Weekly live interviews on two area radio stations generate attention and traffic.

She welcomes local food makers and custom crafters to market their products in her store. While those items make up a small portion of her sales, people appreciate seeing local brands in the business.

"A lot of people say I have a neat store, with many fun, unique things," she indicated. "Filling those gaps and adding those different pieces is important for me to compete with giant stores – to do the same thing they do, but differently in order to make me relevant."

Belle Fourche Arts Council announces formation of new theatre company

The Belle Fourche Arts Council has formed a new theatre company and its initial performances will take place at the Tri-State Museum and Visitor Center March 17 at 7 p.m. and March 18 at 2 p.m.

The company is called the 1903 Reader's Theatre, a name inspired by the year in which Belle Fourche was founded. The logo for the company, created by Deb Elliott, features colors that were prominent in graphic arts of that era. Prominent Belle Fourche businesses The Olive Branch and Office Emporium helped defray the cost of the logo development and are the first sponsors of the endeavor.

Reader's theatre is an increasingly popular form of theatre as it does not require actors to memorize their lines. Productions typically include some set and prop pieces, simple costumes, sound and stage movement. There is a rehearsal period leading up to production, but it is not lengthy, making it appealing to people who like to do theatre, but have limited time to do so.

The initial production to be performed is Veiller Bayard's classic drama, "Within the Law," which initially appeared on Broadway in 1912. The stage play was revived and performed by companies

throughout the U.S.; it was also filmed as a movie four times between 1917 and 1939.

"Within the Law" was chosen because of its special significance in Belle Fourche: It was performed at the Iris Theatre in Belle, on Christmas Day in 1916 as one of the last staged productions before the theatre was remodeled as a movie house.

Admission to the play will be \$2 per person. Because the Tri-State is collaborating with the Arts Council on this production, those with a museum membership will have free admission.

The cast for this first production of the 1903 Reader's Theatre company is in place, but future productions will be cast by open audition.

The company will house out of the Tri-State Museum and Visitor Center at 415 Fifth Avenue in Belle Fourche. For more information, call 605-723-1200.



Crowd Digs First Saturday Archeology Presentation

news@bellefourchebeacon.com Over 50 guests filled the Tri-State Museum and Visitor Center on the morning of March 4, as archeologist Katie Anderson gave a presentation on her experience with the Dig at Soap Suds Row.

Soap Suds Row is a term given to an area where laundresses would live and work. This dig in particular, was located in Fort Meade, SD and explored the laundresses of the

old cavalry post. In illustrating the importance of an archeological dig such as this, Anderson says, "One of the questions you might have is why should we talk about women washing clothes at the fort? Well, it's pretty important because they didn't have all the big machinery that we have today." After sharing an excerpt from the point of view of a laundress of that time period, which described in detail the amount of work, time, and inconvenience that went into a day's worth of laundry, Anderson summarized, "laundresses' lives were not easy. You're living outside of the fort, you're washing everything by hand, and you're pretty much having to expand all of this dirty clothing everywhere to air it out. So,

you need to build your own area

to make this all work, which is

why we have areas like Soap Suds Row."

Anderson shared photographs of some recovered artifacts from Soap Suds Row, as well as the volunteers who worked tirelessly at the dig site, who ranged from children to the oldest member of the team, aged 91. Artifacts included sawed animal bones and remnants believed to have been used in the making of lye soap, beer bottles, broken pottery, and a wash basin. Possibly one of the most important artifacts were the large amount of nails recovered, which gave a much broader idea of where the buildings once stood.

According to Anderson, archeological data of archeological digs such as Soap Suds Row, even though it may seem trivial, is significant because it helps to give researchers a broader idea of early life on the plains, specifically in a fort. "When we have this kind of data," says Anderson, "even if it's just about lye soap, it's still incredibly important for us because it's just a piece of the puzzle, and we really need that piece of the puzzle."







The 2023 legislative session is nearing the end with only two weeks left. The last day of session is March 9th and March 27th is reserved for gubernatorial vetoes. We made it through Crossover Day and both the Senate and House continue to address the bills that remain. By doing placing 28B in the subject line, this will draw my attention to your email and I will make sure those are priority over the hundreds of other emails that we receive on a daily basis

This week, once again, has been filled with many discussions regarding the 2024 revenue and expense budget. The only difference this week were the big three tax reduction bills were in front of House Appropriations for debate. The first one to arrive, HB 1137, was the sales tax reduction from 4.5% to 4%. This bill was eventually amended to a .3% reduction in the rate therefore landing at 4.2% and passed the House Appropriations committee. This is projected to save the residents of South Dakota \$102,592,908. The next bill to come before the committee was the sales tax reduction on food from 4.5% to 0%. This bill did not fare very well and was defeated in committee. The last big tax reduction bill to be heard was dealing with a \$300 credit per owner occupied property. This bill was also defeated in House Appropriations committee. HB 1137 was heard on the House floor, Wednesday the 22nd, and passed by a 66-3 vote. It is now headed for consideration in the Senate.

HB 1039, revising the payment of tuition for members of the SDNG from 50% to 100% at any in-state institution. The tuition becomes available after the federal tuition program has been exhausted. HB 1200, which require a

constitutional amendment to obtain 1/35th of the signatures required from each of the 35 districts within the state, was heard and passed the House as well. HB 1059, establishing a community paramedic endorsement, was heard and passed the House. This endorsement will expand the duties for paramedics and allow them, especially in rural areas, to assist with other medical related issues.

We are continuing to review appropriation bills as well as tax reduction bills for the next couple weeks. Thank you and please feel free to reach out to me at the email above. If you make it to the Capitol, please send me an email and we will set up a time to visit.



Stetson Wright Sets Record at San Antonio

SAN ANTONIO – Heading into the finals on Saturday at the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo, Stetson Wright was sitting No. 1 in the PRCA | RAM World Standings in both the saddle brone and bull riding.

Three hours before the finals, the roughstock athletes drafted the animals they would ride in the final go-round. Wright was toward the back end of the draw but got the perfect dancing partner in The Cervi Brothers' Ricky Bobby.

In 2021, Wright secured his first saddle brone riding world championship on that same horse to the tune of 93 points in Round 10 of that year's Wran-

gler National Finals Rodeo. It was a matchup he knew could carry him to the win in the Alamo City and that's exactly what happened.

His eight-second ride was good enough for 92.5 points and the new San Antonio Stock

Show & Rodeo arena record. "I actually won my first world title in the saddle bronc riding on him," said Wright, 23. "So, I just figured let's do it again."

Wright knew with the stock up Saturday night, and the cowboys getting on them that he was going to have to be special to take home the coveted San Antonio buckle. The top four finishers in the saddle bronc riding all registered 90-point scores or better.

Stetson Wright earned \$44,750 in saddle bronc riding and bull riding in San Antonio.

Other winners at the \$1,353,600 rodeo were bareback rider Leighton Berry (93 points on Frontier Rodeo's Gunfire); steer wrestler Jesse Brown (3.1 seconds); team ropers Dustin Egusquiza/Levi Lord (4.1 seconds); breakaway roper Shelby Boisjoli (1.7 seconds); tie-down roper Riley Pruitt (7.2 seconds); barrel racer Kassie Mowry (13.95 seconds); and bull rider Jeff Askey (90 points on Pete Carr Pro Rodeo's Bayou Bengal).

BREAKING: USDA Proposes to Close "Product of the USA" Loophole

WASHINGTON) - The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) issued a proposed rulemaking to close the "Product of the U.S.A." loophole that meatpackers use to purposefully mask the identify of their comingled beef products.

Under current regulations, imported beef product can be brought into the US., undergo a "significant transformation," which can be as insignificant as trimming or rewrapping - and then claim the "Product of the U.S.A." label. This is a wholly unacceptable practice that intentionally misleads consumers.

The proposed rule announced today allows the voluntary "Product of USA" or "Made in the USA" label claim to be used on meat, poultry and egg products only when they are derived from animals born, raised, slaughtered and processed in the United States.

The proposed rule follows a request made by the U.S. Cattlemen's Association (USCA) in a petition for rulemaking submitted to USDA's Food Safety and Inspection Service in 2019.

USCA President Justin Tupper issued the following statement: "In our 2019 petition for rulemaking to FSIS, USCA called out the practice of applying 'Product of the USA' and 'Made in the USA' labeling claims on beef products that the food safety agency itself admitted could have come from other countries.

"USCA is pleased to see that the proposed rule finally closes this loophole by accurately defining what these voluntary origin claims mean, something

we have been working to clarify since the repeal of mandatory country-of-origin labeling in 2015. If it says 'Made in the

USA,' then it should be from cattle that have only known USA soil. Consumers have the

right to know where their food comes from, full stop.

"USCA would like to thank the Biden Administration for incorporating this goal in their Action Plan for a Fairer, More Competitive, and More Resilient Meat and Poultry Supply Chain issued in 2022. But, we also need to recognize the relentless work by our champions in Congress, including my home-state Senator Mike Rounds, who sponsored the U.S.A. Beef Act that would have prohibited beef from bearing the phrase "Product of U.S.A." unless it was exclusively derived from U.S. cattle. We could not have elevated this issue without the many voices speaking up in support of the change.

"USCA plans to submit comments supporting this proposed definition.'

So, what exactly does this announcement mean?

This is the first major progress since COOL was originally passed in the 2008 Farm Bill and the first step towards truth in labeling since the program's repeal in 2015.

What about COOL? Mandatory COOL remains USCA's primary goal, and the wishes of the majority of the cattle producers and consumers. USCA members should continue to call and write their elected represen-

tatives and UNITED STATES ask for their support of ican Beef Labeling Act. This bill reinstates mandatory coun-

try-of-origin labeling requirements for beef. Specifically, the bill requires the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative (USTR) to develop a means of reinstating the requirements that complies with the rules of the World Trade Organization. The USTR and the Department of Agriculture must implement the means within one year.

The support of Congress will be a critical part of the pathway forward for COOL, and that will be accomplished through a grassroots push by cattle producers. USCA's request for a clear definition from the USDA FSIS is the first step to securing truthful and accurate labels.

And what happens next? USDA will open a public comment period on this proposed rule. We must rally around definitions - the pathway towards country-of-origin labeling begins with closing the current loopholes. The approach suggested by USDA would get labeling right on beef. Now, we need to work to get it right on cattle. Join us in putting an immediate halt to fraudulent labeling by supporting this definition change.

of the work will likely have to be avoided during high demand usage in the summer months.

When it finally does happen, the timeframe will depend a lot upon when we get the new well completed. And only after that can we begin looking at that bigger project," Hardy said.

Part of the expense of the new Hat Ranch Well #3 is due to the dimensions of the well itself. Engineers expect it will need to be around 2,000 feet deep to maintain current water quality standards.

"It would be drilled into the Madison aquafer, the same as the other two wells," Hardy said. "The Minnelusa aquafer is above it but is generally not as good quality of water. We don't want two different sources."

How wide a service area the well will accommodate will depend on the waterflow that

the well generates.

"Part of our contract with AE2S will be to determine the waterflow we get," Hardy said. "Once we do that, we can then look at how we might have to upsize the water tank at Hat Ranch. And then later on we can look at the springline replacement."

The potential upsizing of the water tank would be a separate project, according to Hardy, and is not part of the \$1.7 million allocated for the well.

According to AE2S, final design of the project should be completed by the end of May. Bids for construction are expected in late May or early June with construction to be completed in the 4th quarter. Testing and closeout to put the new well into service should be completed by the end of the year, depending on well drilling services and material availability, according to Hardy.



at the time. "The correct way I would propose in the future is to establish a committee of HR, City Finance Director, department heads and two or three council members to develop a revised pay structure that is considered equitable across the board. That recommendation would follow the normal path through Legal and Finance and then the council. I think everyone here is in agreement that our employees are underpaid and we need to bring our entire city staff up to a competitive level and make logical adjustments using this new process."

"This was something I took away from a budget session

(last year) and all council agreed we needed to look at this," Schmidt said last week.

Randy Sowers, Ward 3 Councilmember, agreed that the task force was the way to go.

"I think it's a wise decision because in a committee we have a tendency to get bogged down with different issues and this would be more streamlined," Sowers told the Council last week. "I think we'd be more likely of presenting something to council as a solution so I think the task force is the right



THE TIMES March 13, 1897 The Liquor License Bill The license law has now passed both houses and is approved by the governor. It provides: (Sec 1>) Upon the business of selling or offering for sale spiritous or intoxication liquors, or mixed liquors by retail or any mixture or compound, except proprietary patent medicines which in all or any part consists of spirituous or intoxicating liquors, and many malt, brewed or fermented liquors \$300 per annum; upon the business of selling spirituous or intoxicating liquors at wholesale \$400 per annum; upon the business of manufacturing brewed or malt liquors for sale \$100 per annum; upon the business of manufacturing for sale spirituous or intoxicating liquors \$500 per annum. No person, firm or corporation having a manufactory situated within this state, and paying a manufacturer's tax on brewed to malt liquors under this act shall be liable to pay a wholesale dealer's tax on the product of such manufactory. A person, firm or corporation shall pay the tax herein provided, in as many place as he carries on business. Another section of the law provides that all places where liquors are sold (except drug stores) shall be closed on Sundays. On all elections days from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m., and on each day they may remain open from 5 a.m. to 11 p.m. Two thirds of all monies collected for such tax or license shall go to the township, town or city in which it was collected, and the balance shall be placed in the

K. L. Arthur, chairman of the governing board, reports that the contemplated addition and improvements to the John Burns Memorial hospital, Belle Fourche, is estimated at \$105,000. This amount would provide for thirty additional beds which would relieve the present over-crowded condition. "But before any plans can be approved and actual construction started," stated the board chairman, "it is absolutely necessary that all of the funds needed be in the board's hands. We have on hand at the present time approximately \$85,000, which means that about \$20,000 will be needed to carry out our hospital improvement program. The financial contributions which have already been make are in a special fund, and will not be used for any other purpose. If for any reason, the contemplated addition is not built, such monies will be returned to their donors. The board will appreciate contributions as soon as possible, so that the plans for the proposed addition may be shaped up for bids and work of construction started. The need for more hospital facilities in Belle Fourche is urgent. The John Burns Memorial hospital serves a large area and is a vital institution for Belle Fourche. The board is counting on the people of our city and surrounding communities to make its contemplated improvements a reality in the shortest possible time. Contributions may be made to George C. Johnson, who is serving as treasurer of the hospital board."

James Abdnor (R-SD) announced this week that the Economic Development Administration has approved a grant to provide a feasibility study on establishing a wool processing plant in South Dakota. 





Meeting with the Legislators and **Speaking Their Concerns**

February Cracker Barrel Session

NEWELL-Saturday morning Feb. 25 saw a crowd gathered in the Newell City Hall to hear what local legislators had to share about the current legislative session. Whatever It Takes Coalition and the Town of Newell sponsored the event to keep citizens informed about important issues that may concern them. It was an opportunity to talk to representatives and senators on a one to one basis and to hear what they have to say.

Senators Ryan Maher and Dean Wink and Representatives Neal Pinnow and Gary Cammack were available to discuss

Mayor Ken Wetz opened the meeting with introductions and gave each legislator a moment to share specifics on each person legislation.

Senator Ryan Maher has served for 15 years in Pierre. As a senator he has served on the Appropriations Committee. He explained several of the areas he had been working on that included the 2023 budget and beginning on the 2024 budget. He said that when he had started in 2007, the state budget was \$3 billion, today there is an \$8 billion budget. The bulk of which is from federal funding. The estimated revenue of \$2.3 billion comes from taxes that include sales tax, bank franchise taxes, contractors excise tax, and lottery taxes.

Senator Dean Wink serves on the Senate Appropriations committee. He said that they are working on finalizing things this week. Wink is also on the senate Select Committee on Discipline & Expulsion, and chairs the Senate Governor Operation and Audit Committee. He represents Meade County.

Representative Neal Pinnow is the new comer to the state legislature. He is a member of the Commerce and Energy Committee. As part of the Taxation Committee, he explained several tax cuts that the Committee worked on. The property tax and food tax curtailment were both defeated. There is a possibility of the sales tax being reduced from 4.5% to 4.2%. It will be committee this week. Retirement laws are also being considered.

Representative Gary Cammack, who represents Meade County, began by thanking the Whatever It Takes Coalition for sponsoring this event. He also shared that they have reached





the cross-over portion of the legislative session. At this time, bills from the Senate cross to the House and vice versa. His committee has been taking a hard look at taxes. They have passed the plan for disclosure for foreign entities to own South Dakota land.

Questions began from the floor, led by Mayor Wetz. He stated that a lot of bills have been in the House concerning eminent domain. Cammack explained that the concern was about the capture of CO2 from ethanol plants. From the ethanol side, it is important to see how friendly those plants are friendly to the environment. Discussion centered around whether CO2 was a commodity.

Pinnow explained that the House decided that it was not a commodity. Once it is transferred and placed in the ground, it cannot no longer be used. From the crowd, Brian Stambaugh asked about taxation for green energy. He also touched on the absentee voting laws.

Maher would like to see absentee voting changed to 30 days prior to an election. He

also pointed out that wind farms are taxed with local governments receiving that tax money for the first three years. Wink pointed out that 2/3 of revenue in South Dakota comes from sales tax.

Property taxes were brought to the front when Bill Kluck spoke about tax assessments. As a former member of the Brand Board, Kluck mentioned the problems of the State Brand Board. The election on the Brand Board is an "extreme problem" he said.

Representative Cammack agreed that tax assessments needed changed and that land that was Class 4 should not be taxed as cropland.

Opinions on Bill SD40, which has not been voted on, brought remarks from the legislators. The bill would change ho the lieutenant governor and other constitutional offices are chosen. Wink would rather have those people chosen by popular vote. Maher said that he voted for SD40 and that he believes in putting the vote to the people. He added that at least the governor should choose the Lieutenant Governor. Pinnow said that he would vote against it when it goes to the House floor.

Wink would rather have those people chosen by popular vote.

Mayor Wetz said that he thinks it helps county organizations to have more purpose.

Voting roles were discussed next when Bill Wood asked why the roles were not purged more regularly. Maher said that South Dakota purges voter lists on a weekly basis. The only loophole is if the person dies after their absentee ballot has been sent in.

Sherry Hocking and Deputy Jason March both hit on the subject of retirement for EMTs and Emergency Service personnel. Even though EMS has been moved to Class B for retirement, that holds true only for full time EMS not volunteer organizations like Newell. March suggested that perhaps a tax break would help.

A last subject was a question concerning CRT (Critical Race Theory) being taught in local schools. Newell School Superintendent Andrew Fergen assured the crowd that it was not being taught in Newell.

Mayor Wetz conclude the morning's session by expressing his confidence in the legislators that were present.

"We are well represented out here. Thank you," he said.

Newell Boys Move on to Post Season






