Chamber Banquet Mar. 12

BELLE FOURCHE- The Belle Fourche Chamber of Commerce annual banquet is scheduled for March 12 at the Community Hall.

The Chamber's theme for the banquet is Visions of the 20's, a nod to the 1920's with guests encouraged to dress accordingly.

"We're excited about this event and we wanted to change the threshold of where we want our events to go and be more than a dinner and the recitation of facts and figures. We want this to be a destination event," said Rambow.

He added the annual meeting part of the event will be shorter, but awards will still be given out. Vision 2020 evokes the plans for the next few years and building for the future.

Rambow and the Chamber's Board of Director's choice of caterer for the event has raised some eyebrows and caused some concern among other Chamber members and caterers. The selection of the Cheyenne Crossing Store and Café, an out of town business to many seems in direct conflict with a chambers efforts to "shop local."

Executive Director Mark Rambow outlined the parameters of the selection process and how the board came to its decision.

Requests for services were sent out to the members who cater since the Chamber tries to work exclusively with them if possible. The board received two bids and selected the one that best fit their requirements. Rambow sent emails and visited with each of the caterers and a couple commented they didn't do that type of event and ultimately the two bids were received.

"Some might think a theme for a banquet is hollow, but since our proposal included foods eaten in the 1920's as well as decorations that were era specific, that's how we came to our decision," he said.

Cheyenne Crossing Store and Café was awarded the bid for the banquet.

The choice of the caterer was met with criticism and some

"Our mission is to serve all our members, and we want to give the same opportunity to all our members. You don't necessarily draw a line at the city limits or two miles outside the city limits. If a member is in the business you use them. It was the same for our signage for the new office. You use the member who makes signs," said

He added that the board wanted to put member caterers on a rotation system so there wouldn't be issues of favoritism. The board would take bids and the best one would be given the contract.

He did say there is an emergency clause that allows for no-bid contracts, which is how the Branding Iron became the caterer of liquor for the banquet.

"Normally it would take six months to find an alcohol caterer, but the timing didn't allow for that. It was late January or early February by the time we realized we needed to have a liquor provider. It was similar



The Butte County Commissioners discussed a difficult situation on Tuesday, March 3, at the regular monthly meeting. It included a discourse on garbage, presented by Commissioner James Ager, pertaining to a property in the area where Helmer Road and Ziebach Streets meet. "People live out there," said Ager. "It's a mess. There's got to be a way we can address it. The property owner isn't the one collecting the garbage, but he's allowing it."

The County doesn't have a nuisance ordinance per se, but there is state law that addresses the issue

Commission Chairman Stan
Harms did say that there was one
property that they did process
(in the past) that finally ended up
where a judge ordered the county
to gravel a road so the person (in
violation) could get to the other
side of their property where they
moved the junk causing the issue.

"That was maybe 10 years ago," said Harms.

Ager showed photos of the property, which was about 300 to 400 feet off the roadway.

Chad Pelster, a property owner that lives next to the property in question spoke to the commis-

"There's a lot going on," said Pelster. "It kind of looks like he was getting a bunch of stuff together and then taking it to sell. But now there's couches, exercise bikes, a bumper pull trailer that the shell has collapsed on, with tin and insulation blowing around." Pelster, and another property owner, John Ternes, said that they think people view the site

as a good place to get rid of their junk and that it is definitely an eyesore.

"Years ago, it was a good place," said Ternes. "But it doesn't matter now, they don't care. There's a danger involved for kids riding bikes and it's a serious thing." Pelster said he felt it was an environmental issue as there are many old appliances that could have freon that has not been properly taken care of.

"We've tried nuisance ordinances in the past," said Ager. "Are we willing to try again, bite off little bits at a time? It's not just this property, but there's lots of them. I'd be willing to try to work on it some more. It won't be an imme-

diate fix."

Since Commissioner Kim Richards is an acquaintance of the owner, Troy VanDerBoom, he was asked by Ager if he thought VanDerBoom would at least put up a sign that states there is "no dumping" allowed.

Harms went even further saying he felt the Commission needed to get with the Sheriff and State's Attorney to see where they stood legally.

"We need to put more pressure than we already have," said Harms. Richards said he felt a fence is what is needed. "Once it starts, then people think they can do anything."

Ager also questioned a \$150 bill for paint for the sheriff's department, wondering what it was and if the request had been approved.

"It's only \$150 so its not a big deal, but just wondering," said Ager. He felt the commission should set protocol for purchases to be presented to the Auditor first, then the buildings commissioners (of which Ager is one)

and then to the full commission.

Brief discussion was held once again about the Dispatch potential changes. There will be a City/County Commission meeting on March 24, at 5pm at City Hall.

Sheriff Fred Lamphere said regardless of what came from that meeting or any others with other counties, Butte County needed to start their budget process, acting as if nothing would change. Head Dispatcher Vickie Greenwood said that she had heard that there would be a dispatch area included


Cindy volunteered many hours and in many ways in Belle Fourche. She



Bronc Boys Top Rangers in Regional, Lose to Custer

with the food," said Rambow. He wants the public to know that normally the annual meeting takes six months to plan, but he, the board and staff had six weeks. Thus the quick decisions.

"I saw Toni (Moncur) at a chamber mixer we were attending and I did ask her to provide the alcohol. She agreed and applied to the city to be approved for that," said Rambow.

The board did discuss length the different aspects of the bid process and ultimately chose Cheyenne Crossing Store and Café.

"I realize how this looks. But we were under the gun and I'll take the blame for part of that since I didn't come aboard as Executive Director until November 2019. We should have already been planning this. But with the move and other factors, this is where we are," he said.

He added that projects such as a golf tournament, a taste of Belle Fourche, Fall Flavors are on tap and planning for those will begin so everything will be ready on time.

But for Chamber members like Todd Fierro of American West Steakhouse, this is all unacceptable.

"First and foremost, I've been a member of other chambers and not once have I ever bid on an out of town event. I was asked by another Chamber to put a bid in, but I refused since there were other caterers in the area," said Fierro.

He added he's never felt right going to another town to cater. He believes the money for a city event should stay in that town. He works with American Colloid but it has ties to Belle Fourche.

"I feel that the Chamber went about this all wrong because they sent a bid to Cheyenne Crossing and I don't think they should have. I would think with all of the other Belle Fourche caterers they had plenty of businesses to choose from," he said. He added that he's been asked to cater city events in other locals, but declined since there

are others to hire in their town. He just feels the cities, economic development groups, and membership collecting business organizations should use what is there, and only if all local caterers are unable to provide the service then, and then only consider an out of town business. Fierro also thought it wrong for Mark Rambow to ask any businesses to provide alcohol for a banquet without putting out to bid.

He also says that he heard Cheyenne Crossing only red ly became a chamber member, which doesn't sit well with him. "I've been a member for 25 years. I've paid sales tax and other taxes while in business," said Fierro.

He doesn't accept that Cheyenne Crossing was the only caterer who could have fulfilled the requirements set forth by the Chamber.

"I've done themed banquets. We all can provide the decorations and related table items. So that just doesn't wash," he said. Fierro said Rambow was a little vague about what was wanted aside from the 20's theme. But he says he felt a little rushed

himself. As for different foods, Fierro can alter his menu to anything needed, and that all the Chamber needed to do was articulate if they wanted something different.

He adds there just seemed to be a breakdown in communica-

"All I can tell you is if I was a new director of the chamber the last thing I would have done was take a bid from somebody out of town. The last thing. To me, that's common sense," said Fierro

In addition, he feels Rambow held the reins as director and could have guided the board. He also feels Rambow was naive about how to proceed with the bids for the banquet Finally, Fierro thinks it wrong that Rambow doesn't live in Belle Fourche, that it sends the wrong signal, too. "How does it look to all of our local businesses? Out of town director, hires out of town caterer."

Part of this situation has to be that the director doesn't live in Belle. Your perspective on "local members" must be different if you're from out of town. Not just to me, but a loss of a catering job for any local business. What is the current Chamber Executive and Board of directors going to do to keep current members; sign up more local businesses; and promote plans for "shopping local". I think that is a more than fair question, don't you?

*Another local caterer contacted by the Beacon didn't want to add to the chorus of complaints, but the owner did have some advice to offer for the Chamber:

"You don't go out of town to look for what you need. I am a member of other chambers around the Black Hills, but I wouldn't think of accepting bids from another chamber. It's just not done. This was a bad idea".

They went on to add that fault can't be laid at just Mark Rambow's feet

"There's a board that works with Mark and there should have been someone or several that advised him against hiring an out of town caterer. But they didn't do that. They have to accept some of the responsibility." In addition, it was said that the time for bashing the Chamber should be over."

"Every town needs a Chamber. Yes this was a tough situation for all. But we need to support the chamber, get past this and work at making Belle Fourche the great town it is"

Brian Franke, a chamber board member recently resigned his position from the board and did not wish to comment about the decision

In addition, the Beacon was told by one board member that after the decision was made they tried to get the others to reconsider and hire local. They said they were the single board member that felt that way.



One of the bills we worked on this week was SB66, a bill that would allow charter or community based schools for Native American students. I am a school choice advocate so I found this idea rather appealing. The bill sailed through the Senate without a problem but when it came to my Education committee in the House things got a little more difficult. The local school district, the Oglala-Lakota County schools weren't exactly on board with the idea. After 2+ hours of testimony and committee agonizing we finally killed the bill for this year. It's tough being caught between a politician and his local school board but hopefully they keep working on the idea and come back another year with a bill that everyone likes.

Another tough issue we're looking at is the Governor's zoning bill. It would somewhat streamline and standardize the permitting process for large projects like feedlots, hog barns, wind farms etc. Most of

our west river counties don't have zoning so its a simple process as far as the permitting goes. For the counties that do have zoning there seems to be an unending stream of roadblocks and lawsuits that delay projects. SB157 has certainly generated a lot of e-mails, either for or opposed. My one thought is that there are a lot of counties that would welcome those developments so move west young man. Thanks again and hopefully we can find the money for our budget priorities, the biggest one being public education.

Calgary Stampede Back in the PRCA Fold

Money won will count toward NFR. Event to be televised live.

CALGARY, Alberta – For the first time in more than a decade prize money won by PRCA competitors at the Calgary Stampede in Alberta will count toward qualification for the NFR in Las Vegas.

In 2006 the Stampede changed to an invitation-only format, limiting the number of competitors to 20 in each of the six main events. It also increased the winner's payout to \$100,000 making it the richest tournament-style rodeo in the

world at the time.

Because of the imbalance created in the standings by such a large payout the PRCA would not recognize the bonus money paid. As result the PRCA dropped it's recognizition of the event in 2006.

But all that seems to be changing with new PRCA Director George Taylor and a more forward-looking board. Last year the PRCA re-established ties with Rodeo Houston in a four-year agreement which allowed rodeo's governing body to recognize Houston (now underway) for the first time since 2010. The moves are seen as supporting the ongoing growth of the sport of rodeo in

"Forming this (Calgary) partnership with the PRCA allows for greater collaboration and the chance for the Calgary Stampede to be more actively involved in future developments within the sport of rodeo," says Paul Rosenberg, Chief Operating Officer of the Calgary Stampede, adding, "It also guarantees we'll continue to attract the world's best competitors and stock to Calgary for ten remark-

able days of rodeo in July." "We are incredibly excited by this partnership with the Calgary Stampede and what it means to our membership," says George Taylor, CEO of the

North America, according to the PRCA.

that reality." The move comes at a time when the event's provincial budget was cut by \$670,000 last week. This follows an even larger cut in 2019. But Rosenberg says fans of the rodeo and rodeo competitors should see little to no effect of the budget cuts.





Looking Back in Belle

These articles come from newspaper microfilm from the Belle Fourche Public library, using a new microfilm reader and printer. The photographs are from the Tri-State Museum.

123 years ago **Belle Fourche Times** March 7, 1896

Ranch and Range The condition existing at the present time in the cattle business are favorable for a boom in stock cattle. A recent government live stock report shown that the number of cattle other than milch cows in this country in January was 32,065,000, being the smallest number since 1886. There is now, as there was then, plenty of money to be invested in any enterprise that gives promise of large profits. The people who were then attracted to the business were capitalists who had had no experience in the business, nor any knowledge of the country, being merely interested in profits. They will probably want to buy stock cattle and embark in the breeding business, as did so many in '80 to '86. It should be made the self-imposed duty of those who have lived here during the past ten years to let newcomers know all about what they must expect, should they engage in the stock business, and the cattle raising is not the only business that offers profit-

able investment. J. W. Driskill left on Saturday for St. Louis, where he will spend a few days and then go to Chicago, where he will meet a large number of other cattle buyers and commission men, whom he will accompany to Fort Worth, Texas, to attend a meeting of the Texas Stock Association. 

Pastor's Perspective

This week's Pastor's Perspective is provided by Andy Anderson of Emmanuel Baptist Church.

Our Greatest Need

If you were to ask random people what they think their greatest need is you would get a variety of different answers. An individual might reply that air,

food, water, shelter, clothing, companionship and money are our most important needs. Although each of those things may be important, they fall short of our greatest need.

The greatest question anyone can ask consists of seven words. In the book of Acts 16:30 where the jailer asked Paul and Silas "What must I do to be saved?" The question reveals our greatest need, the need for each of us to be saved, to be forgiven, to make peace with our Creator. Saved from what? From the wages of sin. The Word of God states

that we have all sinned and fall short of the glory of God. Romans 3:23 and that the wages of sin is death, to be more precise hell or eternal separation from God. Romans 6:23. How does one know if they are a sinner, in need of a Savior?

The answer is, If you have ever broken God's law, even just once, you are a sinner. For example, the commandment that you shall not bear false witness against your neighbor. If you have ever lied about someone, you have broken God's law and are a sinner. The Scriptures tell us to honor our father and mother, if you have ever disobeyed or talked back to your parents, even once, you have broken God's law which reveals that we have all sinned. Our sin separates us from God, meaning that we are lost. Jesus told us that He came to

seek and save the lost.

Paul and Silas gave the jailer a

life changing answer, "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved." Jesus is the only way for people to be saved. Act 4:12 states that: Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is no

other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved.

The only name given whereby men must be saved is the Name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Jesus Himself proclaimed in John 14:6 "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me." Access to the Father is possible but it's only through His Son Jesus Christ.

Romans 10:9-13 That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. For with the heart, man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation. For the scripture saith, Whosoever believeth on him shall not be ashamed. For there is no difference between the Jew and the Greek: for the same Lord over all is rich unto all that call upon him. For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved.

What keeps you from making peace with God today? Is what's keeping you from Jesus worth your soul? Mark 8:36 states,

"For what shall it profit a man, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul?" The Savior is waiting for you to call and believe on Him and be saved. What is your answer?


