Question: What can you tell us about the nine letterwinners that are returning this year?

Coach Doran: Everything defensively starts with your catcher, and we have a great one with Dakota College of Bottineau signee Evan Vissia.

Evan has been our number one catcher ever since I took over the American Legion program back in 2020. Behind him we are fortunate to have Harvey who would probably be the top catcher for about half of the other Region IV teams, which is great if we want to give Evan a rest when we have a varsity doubleheader. Both Evan and Harvey were recognized as All-Region last season. Nolan is poised for a season that could really open some eyes across the state. He finished last year's JR Legion State Tournament as the "Big Stick" award winner that goes to the player with the highest batting average. He is coming off of a self-described down year in last year's high school season where all he did as a sophomore was finished tied for first in the state in homeruns and by himself accounted for 25% of all the homeruns hit in Region IV! Look for big things to come this year from our other seniors too. JT got his bat going last summer hitting a couple of homeruns and has emerged as a solid defensive player at either first or third base. School Board Approves Rehiring of Administration

Two new teaching positions to be added

Monday, Mar. 13, the Belle Fourche School Board unanimously approved new contracts for most of the current administrative staff. The contracts will renew on July 1 of this year.

Those rehired include: Mathew Raba, High School Principal; Kevin Smidt, Middle School Principal; Dr. Julie Hatling, Elementary Principal; Caleb Case, Special Education Director; Adam Nowowiejski, Activities Director; and Tommy Coyle, Director of Facilities and Transportation.

Dr. Steve Willard, Superintendent, and Susan Proefrock, Business Manager are operating under contract terms that run from July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2024.

Also at the board's regular meeting a motion passes to keep the current school lunch provider in place. The food service management contract with Lunchtime Solutions was unanimously approved by vote of the board. The contract will run from July 2023 through June 2024. Lunchtime Solutions also provides the summer food services programs for the

In other school board matters the board voted to approve the recommendation by Mathew Raba, High School Principal, to add a full-time teaching position at the school. Half of the position would be as an alternative school instructor at the Belle Fourche Education Connection. This half of the position would be funded with Title 1 1003 School Improvement dollars, according to Raba.

The other half of the position would be as an academic interventionist at Belle Fourche High School. Raba says this position would focus on academic success and supporting the organization, study habits, and improvement of reading

and math skills, mostly among freshmen and sophomore students. This half of the position would be funded with ARP/ ESSER III Covid dollars.

The position would be funded for one year and Raba says it may be extended if additional funding is secured.

"Since we're coming into the final year of our ESSER funding, and since our alternative school now qualifies for some school improvement dollars, we're just looking for a way to use those dollars to fund a halftime position at the alternative school and use our ESSER III dollars to fund the other half at the high school level to support reading and math skills with our 9th and 10th grade students," Raba said. "That's where we find students that struggle the most and we're trying to support them early on in high school, so they have a little more success as they move through."

The board also approved the addition of a part-time teacher.

The Belle School Board has approved the appointment of election officials to serve in the upcoming school board elections. The elections will be held on Tuesday, April 11.

The board unanimously approved Frances Cleveland, Kay Cooper and Stacey Raisanen to serve as officials for Wards 1 through 4. In the rural areas Gary Helmer, Leona Ruzicka and Mary Wendt were appointed to oversee the voting on election day.

The election officials will receive a stipend of \$175 on election day and \$25 for training prior to the election.

There are two seats on the board that will need to be filled, and three candidates running to fill them. Tammy Clem, current Board President, has decided not to run again. The other term that will be ending is that of Scott Reder, current Board Vice-President.

Reder, the incumbent, will run again. He is a local rancher, former Roundup Committee Chairman and a Commercial

and Ag Lender at Pioneer Bank and Trust.

There were two other candidates who filed before last month's deadline. They are Faye LaDuke-Pelster of Belle Fourche, Chair for the School of Education at Black Hills State University, and Wayne Gilbert, local historian, who served on the school board previously and was the board's legislative liaison.

The polling place will be the Community Hall at 508 6th Ave. This will be the location for all city wards along with the rural districts of Fruitdale, Roman, Minnesela, St. Onge and rural Belle Fourche precincts.

Voting hours begin at 7am and the polls close at 7pm.

Current board members include: Tammy Clem, President , term expiring in 2023; Scott Reder, Vice-President, term expiring in 2023; Greg Krajewski, term expiring in 2024; Nita Justice, term expiring in 2024; Tara Knapp, term expiring in 2024; Mike Tyndall, term expiring in 2025; and Jade Larson, term expiring in 2025.

BF School District Installs New Internet Security Software

BELLE FOURCHE - The BFSD has installed new security software on district computers and laptops that will prevent students from downloading unauthorized browser extensions and give parents greater oversight into what their children are doing while using their devices at home.

The new measures are in response to an incident that occurred on Sunday, Feb. 12, that involved at least two students. By using an unauthorized chat program, a runaway scheme was coordinated that may have ended in a very bad way. Fortunately, the plans were intercepted and with the help of the school superintendent, IT support staff and the Belle Fourche Police Department, a potential tragedy was averted.

"The issue was brought to our attention on February 12 and there were at least two students, possibly more, who were accessing unauthorized social media websites that were being controlled and blocked on the school laptops," said Nathan Schreier, District Technology Coordinator. "The means by which they were accessing the sites were not yet known to us at that time.'

Schreier, along with Andrew Lythgoe, District Technology Coordinator and the school's IT team went to work along with local law enforcement to bring about a positive resolution to the situation and the students involved were reunited with their parents later in the day. "We were very grateful for the support we had leading to the positive resolution of the situation," Schreier said.

The following day Schreier and Lythgoe began investigating how the students were able to access the sites. It did not take them long to determine that they were using a Chrome browser extension called Browsec VPN. The extension allows the internet user to mask the identity of the laptop by changing the devices' internet address. According to Google, this allows unlimited access to music, video, books, games and other blocked sites "so that no one knows what you're doing online," according to the exten-

sion's website. Creating a VPN, or virtual private network for your computer does have its usefulness when trying to prevent unauthorized parties from accessing your personal information or preventing data breeches. It

Helen Irene Ruff was born February 8, 1931, on a farm at Nisland, SD, to David and Lillie (Meyer) Ruff. She was the oldest of five children, followed by David (Dan), Robert, Delores, and John. Helen was baptized into the family of God in the Lutheran Church in Nisland, with Conrad and Emma Schuldies as her Godparents. She was later confirmed in the First Lutheran Church in Newell. Helen's faith was her strength throughout her life.

Helen grew up in the Nisland area, her family living on and working various farms in the area until her father purchased his own farm 3 miles west of Vale, SD, in 1947. During this time, she also attended school in Nisland through the 10th grade. Helen's parents provided a home filled with love, faith, and hard work ethics. Their farm life was the setting for many wonderful experiences and memories, which she often shared with her family over the years. She never forgot the blessing of having her own pony, Star, as a child, nor the hard work in raising chickens, turkeys, hogs, and crops. She helped in the hay fields behind a team of horses and worked in the beet fields alongside her siblings and parents. She developed a talent for resourcefulness and a love of the amazing natural

Her junior and senior years of high school were spent at Vale, SD, high school, where she graduated in a class of five students in 1949. Following her father's wishes, she attended Black Hills State College for 3 months, earning a teaching certificate. Then in the fall of that year she was hired to teach at the Chase country school north of Nisland, near Arpan, SD, for the '49-'50 school term. She had 13 students, and earned \$300 per month. Helen's love of reading remained with her always. And her enjoyment of letter writing blessed everyone she knew throughout her life.

world God created.

On August 16, 1950, Helen married George L. Erk at the Blessed Sacrament Catholic Church in Rapid City, SD, in a 7 A.M., double-ring ceremony conducted by Fr. Bernard Drew. Joe Erk and Ida Mae Renelt were their witnesses. Following a brief honeymoon, the couple made their home on a ranch owned by George and his brother, Joe, two and onehalf miles northwest of the Deer's Ears Buttes in Butte County, north of Newell, SD. Joe lived with them for a time before moving to a farm near Vale, after which Helen and George continued living on their place, raising registered Rambouillet rams and ewe flocks and a ewe flock with premium fine wool fleeces. They also raised crossbred Hereford cattle and later farmed alfalfa, wheat and sorghum.

Their marriage was blessed with three sons: Gregory George, born in 1951; David John, born in 1953; and Mark Allen, born in 1958.

Life on a sheep ranch was hard, even for a seasoned farm girl. In Helen's own words, "We had no electricity or telephone until 1953. There was a 32-volt light plant in the garage that generated current for the lights in the house. I cooked and heated my wash water for clothes in a copper boiler on a 3-burner kerosene stove, did the washing of clothes in a gas motored machine, ironed with a gas iron, had an ice box for the butter and milk and got the ice from the ice house at the Erk homestead, 3 miles away. We hauled our water from Newell, 35 miles away, so there was none wasted. I washed clothes in a wringer type washer until 1985, when I got an automatic washer.'

Helen was not only involved with the ranching, alongside George, but also was a devoted mother, raising three active boys as they attended the nearby country school and then headed off to high school in Newell. When Gregory and David attended high school in Newell, she moved into

town each year during the school months to care for them there. They all lived in the home of Ludwig and Anna Erk, going home on weekends when they were able to. This continued through Mark's freshman year in Newell, but his enrollment in St. Martin's High School in Rapid City as a sophomore, meant she could return home to help George full time. She then spent three years transporting Mark to and from school on weekends, but was finally back at the ranch full time. They remained there until George's failing

health forced them to move into Newell in the fall

After George's death in 2008, Helen remained living in Newell where she greatly enjoyed living across from the school, delighted with the activities of the schoolyard. She also enjoyed multiple weekly games of cards, and coffee, with friends and family, even learning to play Bridge, which she admitted was a great, but enjoyable,

In October 2011, Helen moved to The Sandstone Assisted Living facility in Spearfish. Here she carried on her love of card playing, reading, watching various sports on TV, and sending cards she made herself to family and friends. Like many, she also endured the harshness of the Covid lockdown of nursing facilities in 2019-2021, even celebrating her 90th birthday behind a glass barrier, away from family and friends.

After a short illness/fall, and battling Parkinson's disease, Helen moved to the Avantara Nursing Facility in Rapid City last Sept., where she remained until her death on March 13, 2023, surrounded by loving family.

During Helen's adult life she was a member of St. Mary's Church where she participated in choir, Alter Society, and as Religion teacher, attending workshops and Laywomen's Retreats at St. Martin's in both Sturgis and Rapid City. She also participated in Christian Women in Spearfish, Inter-denominational Bible study, and Right to Life. Other service groups included PTA, Wool Growers Auxiliary, Butte County Historical Society Castle Rock Birthday Club, Newell Seniors, and American Life League. One of her most enjoyable involvements came with her membership in Butte County Extension Homemakers, and as a member of her local extension club, Chix From the Stix,

in which she held many offices and received her

Shirley Moseley 85

A funeral service for Shirley Moseley, 85, of Camp Crook, SD was held 11:00 a.m., Friday, March 17, 2023 at the Camp Crook Community Center. Burial will take place in Fairview Cemetery, Camp

Shirley passed away Tuesday, March 7, 2023 at Fallon Medical Complex, Baker, MT.

Shirley Moseley was the third child of six children born to Arvo and Evelyn Teppo. She grew up on the family farm that Shirley's maternal grandmother, Matlena Lahonen, homesteaded northwest of Newell, South Dakota. Isoäiti (Grandma) lived her days with the Teppo family. The farm was located in a Finnish community where most neighbors spoke Finnish. Shirley didn't speak English until she started in a country school. After finishing the 8th grade in the country, Shirley attended high school in Newell. She worked for her room and board all 4 years of high school, graduating in 1955. Here she developed a deep loathing for pancakes fried in mutton grease.

Shirley attended Black Hills Teaching College and earned a teaching certificate. Shirley taught at several Butte County country schools until she moved to Camp Crook, South Dakota, to teach the "lower room" in 1964. Shirley met Max Moseley, a handsome, quiet rancher. Shirley married Max on August 20, 1966, in Belle Fourche, South Dakota. Shirley taught school until their first daughter was born in 1968. Max and Shirley raised four daughters on the ranch: Maxine, Shirrel, Tracy, and Hope.

Shirley's childhood was marked by hard work, which carried into her adult life. Every year, Shirley raised a huge garden, canning or freezing all the produce. She ordered a brood of chicks annually and butchered many chickens for the freezer. Shirley sewed clothes for her family, including their underwear.

Shirley had many interests and was curious about many things. She loved astronomy and talked Max into driving the truck to the Simmons Place, where the family could watch the Northern Lights from the truck bed, bundled in blankets. Shirley belonged outdoors, and Moseley camping destinations were the sandbar on the Little Missouri River and the Short Pines. She found beauty and a true treasure in the rocks, twisted sticks, and wildflowers she picked up on her hikes. Shirley and Max shared a love for arrowheads and other artifacts scattered all over the ranch. Shirley walked miles on the hardpan with her "toad stabber," finding many artifacts in the sagebrush and cactus. Shirley was fascinated by birds and learned to identify the birds that visited her many feeders. She despised grackles for the thieving bullies that they were. Shirley belonged to a birding club where she made lifelong friends. She participated in the Audobon Society's annual bird count for many years. She loved poetry, reading it and writing it. She would recite hundreds of poems, including the Cremation

of Sam McGee and Hiawatha. Shirley had an artistic eye and

crocheted many afghans, doilies, table toppers, and tote bags. She crocheted all the hats and mittens for her family through the years. A talented seamstress, she made many block quilts. Growing up in a musical

family, Shirley loved to play music with other musicians. She played by ear, never having a lesson in her life. She excelled at the piano and the accordion. For years, Shirley loved playing gigs and played with Dean Tarter, Johnny Anderson, and Don Heggem. Over the years, Shirley played with many talented people and loved every minute. Shirley made many lifelong friends at jam

sessions.

Shirley loved the Lord and His grace that made salvation possible. She earnestly studied the Bible and was not afraid to ask thoughtful questions. An accomplished cusser, Shirley hedged her bets and attended two churches: the Belltower Seventh Day Adventist Church and the United Methodist Church. These church members became her family, too, especially her Methodist Church family. Shirley played the piano/ keyboard for both churches for many years.

Shirley was a devoted mother, grandmother, and great-grandmother. She expected her daughters to do their best, work hard, and never take a handout. Grandma doted on her grandchildren and created many adventures for each of them. She wrote storybooks for them, binding them with duct tape. Her great-grandchildren were the cherry on top of the family sundae. Shirley was very proud of her family.

As her health failed, her inner strength and sheer will kept her going even when the odds were against her. When Shirley could no longer remain in the big house in Camp Crook, she moved into the Peaceful Prairie Estates, where she made a new family with the residents. Shirley moved into the Fallon Medical Complex on January 13, 2023. She made friends quickly with nurses and

In Paul's letter to the church in Philippi, the Apostle Paul writes to the believers that they should rejoice in the Lord always. What does that mean? How do we

rejoice in everything, always? Sometimes, life seems out of control, and the circumstances

around us seem to be terrible. Where is God when things are bad, and how are we supposed to rejoice even when things are bad?

Rejoicing in the Lord, even when things are bad is possible when we recognize that:

The Lord is well aware of our circumstances and walks with us through our lives. Psalm 139 Each trial that we face can be used of God to bring glory to the Lord. Romans 8:28

God is good, regardless of what we're going through. Psalm 25:8; 34:8

The Lord will never abandon us, even if it 4. feels like it. Hebrews 13:5

When Paul wrote to the church in Philippi, he was imprisoned in Rome, and yet he still encouraged the believers to 'rejoice in the Lord always!' Philippians

In the midst of great struggle, it's good to know that the Lord is with us. In verse 6, he states: "Do not be anxious about anything." If I firmly believe that God is with me, and won't abandon me, and 'nothing can take me from the Father's hand,' (John 10:28-30) there's no



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
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

can also be helpful when conducting transactions from overseas. However, as with much of the internet, it can be used in the wrong way. In this case, it was used to work around firewalls that had been put in place by the BFSD.

"We immediately blocked and removed it from all the district's devices and took the additional steps of adding a means to prevent the adding of extensions so that the abusing of Chrome in this way cannot be used again," Schreier said. Schreier says that all devices

in the district are put under management profiles that can control the district's computers, such as student laptops, all at once. "So when we send new policies to a group of devices all at once, as long as they are connected to the internet, all the devices are updated and receive these changes," Schreier said.

Schreier said once they had confirmed that all devices had received the update, they set about to determine the scope of the problem. After they reviewed the district's firewall logs they found that a total of 19 student laptops, all in the

middle school, had had the unauthorized Chrome extension previously installed.

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"We have been monitoring the blocking procedure that we started using to make sure that they have held for the past month or so and there have been no workarounds for it," he said.

Lythgoe reviewed with the school board the monitoring software that the district currently uses to monitor student traffic and usage. He said part of the reason that the firewall did not catch the Chrome extension was that it was not being properly tagged as VPN or proxy traffic. "And this is something we are building into our daily and weekly tasks so that this doesn't happen again," he said.

Lythgoe says the district has installed a new software monitoring system called GoGuardian. This program provides content filtering along with staff and student monitoring while school is in session and gives parents or guardians the ability to set up a free account to monitor student activity at home.

For teachers it provides a report on each student after every class period that provides data on how that student was

using their laptop during class. The intent is to direct students to focus on the classwork at hand and to give the teacher an ability to see learning issues a student may be having.

GoGuardian Parent allows a parent or guardian to download an app on their smartphone or home computer that is tied to that specific student's school authorized email account. This is done for security reasons, according to Schreier.

"The app provides the parent with a very detailed 30-day browsing history on the student's device," Schreier said. "It can also create easy to use reports if a parent doesn't want to go through all that information. It provides the top-5 websites a student has been using, top-5 documents, top-5 absent extensions over a variety of time frames, from one day to 30-days."

The software also provides the ability to pause internet access on school devices during out-of-school hours or at any other scheduled time.

'For teachers it also gives them intervention tools such as the ability to lock a student's computer screen during class if the teacher needs their attention or if a student is getting off task," Schreier said.

For parents interested in setting up an account, log on to the school district's home page and click on GoGuardian on the top menu bar.

Schrier added that if parents or guardians are interested in obtaining similar monitoring capabilities on their child's private devices (non school related) an app known as Custodio is recommended. It is a paid app but offers features similar to GoGuardian.

"Another cheaper option that's free is Google Family Link for those who have Google accounts. It gives parents browsing activity (reports) and remote locking," Schreier said. "And another cool tool is called Bark which actually will analyze a student's social media messaging behavior and alert parents."

Scheier says Bark will use artificial intelligence to tell parents when certain types of content or behavior is brought up or mentioned. Examples include violence, self-harm, substance abuse, or bullying. A parent will be notified if their student, or a

student they are interacting with on social media, is engaged in such conversations.

"This really helps parents so they don't have to constantly monitor these accounts as the app will do that for them," he

"We really want to encourage parents to have a communications pathway with their students regarding safety and online activity. Parents should not hesitate to report suspicious activity such as browsers other than Google Chrome being used on student devices. Student safety is very important to us and we just want to help parents with any concerns they may have," Lythgoe said.

"These two gentlemen are closing doors on bad stuff whenever they can and are trying to be proactive in getting things out to the public," said Steve Willard, Superintendent.





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

Dr. Julie Hatling, Elementary Principal, will be hiring a person who will work with all students and staff in kindergarten to promote and develop enriched reading and math instruction.

This position will be funded with Title 1A funds and will be for the 2023-2024 school year. Hatling says this part-time teacher "will measure student progress and collaborate with colleagues to plan and implement appropriate academic interventions for all Kindergarten students.'

Once again the school board wrestled with the issue of paying support staff for the Feb. 22 virtual learning day. Due to inclement weather in-person school was called off that day and virtual learning day was declared. But, again, should the support staff be paid since the state does not require districts to make up virtual learning snow days. In the past, support staff could recoup lost pay when snow days were made up later in the school year.

The board dealt with the same issue in December when school was closed for 3 days due to a winter storm. At that time the board voted to pay support staff for those three days. This time, with the single virtual learning day, the board eventually voted to do the same thing with the caveat to create a written policy regarding support staff makeup pay during virtual learning

During open comment session former Belle Fourche district employee Carol Chris-

tianson conveyed her concerns about the deteriorating condition of some of the buildings on the district's campuses. She encouraged the board to hire additional staff to support Tommy Coyle, District Maintenance Supervisor. "These buildings are showing signs of neglect because one or two people cannot keep up with everything that's going on," she said. "I would ask that you, as a board, take a walk from here to gymnasium in the middle school and take a look at the ceilings and look at what's going on. There's heating, plumbing, electrical and carpentry issues. It's more than

one or two people can handle." Going into the school year the shortage of staff in the district's maintenance department was an issue with Supt.Willard urging the board to consider pay rates that would stay competitive with other job opportunities in the community, such as with Albany Farms. It's a sentiment that Christianson echoed.

'And I feel like our district needs to be willing to invest in competent, trained staff to help take care of these buildings," Christianson said. "And the other thing is when students walk in and see things in disrepair, they think the adults don't care so why should I? I care about Belle Fourche, I don't want to see it deteriorate.'

Clem assured Christenson that the board would take her concerns under advisement.

The school board also appointed board member Greg Krajewski to serve as the district's Board of Equalization member. Jade Larson will serve as the alternate.

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

Herd Mentality & Indecisiveness Destroys Communities

"The opposite of courage is not cowardice, it is conformity. Even a dead fish can go with the flow." – Jim Hightower I have often pondered the question, what makes a community successful at transforming themselves versus those many communities that are insistent upon snatching defeat from the jaws of victory? I have concluded that successful communities succeeding in transforming themselves are those striking while the iron is hot and figuring out how to knock over slow moving traditional mindsets and barriers.

Growing up playing sports, I learned long ago the absolute value of momentum in sports. More importantly, I learned that capitalizing on momentum when it appears can seal

the deal and capture the win. I believe it is absolutely the same for communities. When something good happens in a winning community, you have momentum, they then immediately go

to work and try to figure out how to double down on those positive happenings and that momentum. They don't enact policies and programs that slow any positive momentum, they enact, and force policies and programs that speed things up even faster. That is not rocket science; it is basic human logic and knowledge. To use an adage, you strike while the iron is hot.

It is no secret the "herd" mentality, for better or for worse, is alive and well in most communities. Winning communities

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2014 Main Street Stupple, SD take the positive momentum coupled with the understanding of how the herd mentality works and uses it to their advantage.

I was fortunate enough to witness this firsthand in a community I lived in not long ago. The forward-thinking mayor decided to streetscape a oneblock section of their downtown one year. They liked what they did and decided to expand it the following year and add the second block. The third year, they added the third block, but something unexpected happened. Several new businesses started springing up in what were empty storefronts on those few regenerated blocks. The momentum that the city created had now turned into a 'positive' herd mentality movement. Private money was coming off the sidelines and beginning to transform their entire downtown.

But that was only the first step to winning, the city had a choice at this point. They could stop the streetscaping thinking

that private money was now in the game and let that carry the transformation forward, or they could double down and increase the momentum that was occurring. Back to a sports analogy, they saw that momentum was a powerful force and they didn't leave any room for that momentum to subside – the wanted to eliminate any potential for the losing herd mentality to enter the picture. They plowed ahead, and in the past decade, they have transformed their downtown, which in turn has transformed and impacted the entire community.

That is how a winning community works. How might a losing community look? Losing communities bounce from plans and ideas to the next set of plans and ideas. They have bookcases full of expensive studies with no real action to show for it. Instead of moving fast, they delay funding and action too often. They prioritize projects by who is in line first, not what makes the fastest and most immediate impact. They have many false starts that are cut-off before they really begin for a slew of

different and lame reasons. In short, they lack the vision or the fortitude to move quickly and decisively.

Take courage however, those with a losing herd mentality can always right the ship. The city mentioned above used as a winning example above might have qualified as a losing community prior to the foresight of the mayor. They had an entrenched losing herd outlook; they had a city council afraid to act feeling that no action was better than a potential mistake. They had as many bookcases full of studies as the next town and they lacked real vision. Yet, despite it all, a few individuals wouldn't accept failure. While many told them there was no "i" in team, they knew there was an "i" in win and win they did.

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

> 125 years ago Belle Fourche TIMES March 10, 1898 Circuit Court

On Wednesday, after the change of venue had been granted the defendants in the robbery case, the jury was discharged for the term, and the civil cases were tried to the Court. The changing of the robbery case to Lawrence county is due wholly to the actions of the people here. Especially in the case of O'Day, the citizens of Belle Fourche area alone responsible for the delay and extra costs which will be incurred, by reason of the demonstrations and loud talk indulged in at the time of his arrest.

There were several afflidavits presented which in our opinion did not help the cause of the defendants, but the affidavits of attorneys and others, backed up by a very suggestive rope, were of themselves incontrovertible, and left only one course open for the Courty to pursue. Hole-In-the-Wall Gang A report from Casper, Wyo., says For a week news has been coming to Casper of one of the biggest "cattle drives" ever know in Central Wyoming. It appears that Harvey Ray and other escaped Belle Fourche bank robbers have been joined by a party of Powder Springs thieves and together they have ridden down on the open range within fifteen or twenty miles of Casper and driven everything before them to the Hole-in-the-Wall region. They are said to have scattered and started their "drive" in a way that would be likely to create the least suspicion, but they were discovered and Ray, one of the Smiths and

others were recognized. There were upwards of twenty of the riders and they were all well mounted and heavily armed. A month ago the authorities here were informed that this gang was in hiding in the Hole-inthe-Wall country, but nothing was done. After the killing of Bob Smith, capture of Bob Taylor and crippling of another Smith by a round-up party last year, it was though the thieves would quit the country, but it appears they were concentrating and growing more daring.

Of his appointment, the Pittsburgh Chronicle and Telegraph of March 15 said: John S. Pyle, a general prohibition agent, working under G. J. Simons, divisional chief of general agents, who last might was appointed acting group head in place of W. A. Kelton, suspended yesterday, took charge of his office today. Chief Simons has detailed General Agent John Brevion to assist Pyle for several days. Kelton was suspended after being cited for contempt of court by Judge W. H. S. Thompson in federal court, along with John Douglas, Jr. clerk of courts of Allegheny county; Fenton Wilt, an attorney, and three others, in connection with the sale of 1.937 barrels of beer valued at \$50,000, bootleg prices, from the storage plant of the Strand Ice Co., on the North Side. Those cited were served with a copy of the court rule yesterday, instructing them to appear before Judge Thompson April 2, to show cause why they should not be adjudged guilty of contempt of court. Divisional Chief Simons has not received any news officially of the consolidation of his office with that of the group head office. Last night he was notified of the suspension of Kelton, with instructions to place a general agent in charge. This morning with Pyle and Brereton, he visited the office of Kelton, requesting that the latter turn over the office to Pyle. After reading the telegraph from Washington Kelton retired and refused to make a statement. Acting Group Head Pyle was formerly prosecuting attorney of Butte county, South Dakota. If the voters endorse the bond proposal, Belle Fourche will be ready to launch a citywide program of water works improvements, including a new 1,500,000 gallon capacity storage tank, new water supply lines, and a general extension of the mains over town.

'The program" says City Auditor Lyle Miller, "should solve the immediate problem of the water shortage during the summer. But even more important it will provide temporary storage supply for use in emergencies, such as fires, floods or breakdowns on the lines."

this offseason. Bravden came out for baseball for the first time in 3 years last spring and worked his way into a starting position and has improved immensely in every area. Aiden had his best pitching outing last year in the JR Legion Consolation Championship that shut down Winner/Colome and has been an all around steady ball player for us able to play anywhere infield or outfield. Darian and Gavin were both significant role players for us with their speed and quickness on the bases and hope this offseason they put in the work to expand their roles this year.

Q: What will be this

2023 team's strengths? CD: Experience of this squad is going to play a huge role this season especially early on. We haven't been able to get on the fields yet due to the all of the snow we got in March, so having this many players with significant varsity experience returning is going to be huge. On the field this team is loaded with hitters one through nine, in fact, we have more players that I have confidence in offensively than we have starting spots, which as a coach is a good problem to have. I just need to find the right batting order to put these players in position to be successful and they will do great things. Hitting has been what we kind of hang our hat on, last year our team accounted for 40% of all homeruns in region IV and 7.5% of all homeruns hit in Class B (44 teams). You can't win games if you don't score runs, my philosophy is if you hit, you play.

Q: What weaknesses are you trying to shore up before the season begins?

CD: Anytime you graduate six seniors there will be holes that need be filled and players that need to put in the work and step into a bigger role for the team, the two big ones this year are pitching and outfield. Outfield is going to be on of our biggest position battles this spring. We lost our everyday center fielder, right fielder, and our super utility player that could I plug in anywhere in the infield or outfield. Our outfield is going to look completely different and would be the one area that we are lacking a lot of varsity experience. There are some talented young players though that I am excited to see what they will do with the opportunity. The other one is pitching, Last season in 118 total innings pitched for our varsity squad only 43 of them were from players who will be returning this season. Of those 43 innings, Nolan accounted for 19 of them and Aiden accounted for 12. So obviously, we have lots of innings that we need to find guys to step up and compete. We started working with pitchers a little earlier than usual this year with some mechanical work in hopes that we can develop a few arms to be able to provide some needed quality innings.

Q: How competitive does the SDHSBA Region IV look this year?

CD: This is going to be a very challenging region this season. Last summer, this region had three teams in the American Legion Sr State Tournament. Winner/Colome won our west river Region VII, Platte-Geddes was placed in Region IV and won it, and Gregory made it as the host team. Winner ended up being runner up and Gregory finished in 3rd place. So I would say going into the season they would be some of the frontrunner favorites. Chamberlain returns four all-region selections, Rapid City Christian and St. Thomas More return all three of their selection as well and are going to be some tough

matchups for us. Hot Springs and Lead/Deadwood were very young last year and both are looking to capitalize on returning a lot of experience as they build up their programs. That is one of the exciting things about playing in the SDHSBA season, every game from every team in your region is an important one.

Q: What are a couple things you are excited to see from this team heading into the season opener?

CD: We talked about it already, there are a lot of holes to fill losing six seniors from our 3rd place team last year and people may look at it as a program that is rebuilding, but not our players. I am excited to see some of the improvements and hard work some players have

put in this offseason to step up and claim a varsity starting spot. Excited to see what Senior Anthony Budmayr will bring to this team, he missed all of last season with an injury and was an everyday starter for our Legion program back in 2021. He's a natural athlete who can play infield, outfield, and can pitch too. Lastly but not least, I am really excited to see what our JV Team can do this year. We have seven freshman and four 8th graders in our program, and this year of development for them will be critical for us to sustain a level of success we are striving for. I hope a couple of these young guys show out this year and make a case for themselves to get a look at the varsity level.

School Board

Bids, Remodels, **Teacher** Resignations

NEWELL - At the March 13, 2023 meeting of the Newell School Board discussion was centered around several items that were included with remodeling projects, Senate Bill 168, and teacher resignations, along with golf rules and new hires.

The bids for flooring for the Ag/Science, high school building, and Austin Auditorium were discussed with a final decision of putting new specs together. Superintendent Andrew Fergen explained to the Board that there was a part of the upper floor of the high school that did not need to have new flooring at the present time and could be put off until a future date. However, this brought discussion as to whether the bid then would be valid.

Board Member Todd Youngberg said that he thought since the bid did not address the omission of the upper floor project, it would not be prudent to accept the bid as written. In a roll-call vote, the motion was defeated and a new bid will be advertised.

Sealed bids for the Newell School District Drainage Project are due April 17 at 2:00 p.m. and will be opened at the School Board meeting on April 17 at 6:30 p.m. the project is set to start May 22 and completion must be by August 3, 2023.

Bids for the lower elementary and ag/science remodel were put off until the drawings were 100% complete.

Senate Bill 168 adds a new section to present law that authorizes a school board district to adopt policies regarding students who are registered sex offenders. It states that sex offender students can receive instruction through remote or distance learning or an alternative educational program. Dean Johnson approached the board members with his plea for them to consider implementing remote learning and to "take a stand" for the benefit of Newell students. He explained the basis for the bill and told the board that there was no basis for a concern for litigation for executing remote learning.

The Newell School District policy does not directly address remote learning as an alternative.

Board President Tyrell Bonnett said that the board should be thorough and not rush into any quick decisions.

"But we shouldn't dilly-dally," said Todd Youngberg.

Bonnett asserted that a decision would be reached and a special board meeting may be


