City Building Roof Repair Continues 9 Months Later

BELLE FOURCHE - Roof repair on city and school district buildings continues more than nine months after the devastating hailstorm the community suffered on June 12 of last year.

At the regular meeting of the Belle Fourche City Council on Mar. 20, the council voted to award a contract to replace the fire hall and fire hall outbuilding roof to Albright Construction of Belle Fourche. Albright's bid for both structures came in at \$53,929.92. The other bid was submitted by Belle Fourche's Coyle Construction. That bid came in at \$66,804.66.

The council also awarded a bid to fix roofs in various picnic shelters throughout the city

along with replacing the roof on the Herrmann Park Bandshell which was recently renovated. That bid was also awarded to Albright Construction. The 13 picnic shelters and the bandshell roof came in at \$72,735.96. The city also received a second bid from Coyle which totaled \$85,341.32.

Both projects are part of the June 2022 hailstorm insurance claim, according to the city finance office. They were both approved as part of the council's Mar. 20 consent agenda. The several items that make up the consent agenda are generally approved with one vote unless a council member requests they be removed to be placed on the regular agenda for further consideration. Consent agenda items are typically approved by council sub-committees before being brought to the full council for final approval.

The Belle Fourche School District will also be replacing roofs at North Park Elementary, South Park Elementary and Belle Fourche High School along with the district's bus barn. There were three separate bids for the projects.

The first bid covered steel roofing and siding replacement at the Belle Fourche School District bus barn. The second bid involved re-roofing the South Park annex building and the North Park storage buildingboth shingled roofs. The third bid was for the Belle Fourche High School library building and North Park Elementary School.

It was the 67th annual induction ceremony and Dr. Jade Larson was the guest speaker. Dr. Larson is a doctor at Tri-State Chiropractic in Belle Fourche, and was a graduate of Belle Fourche High School and member of the BFHS National Honor Society.

City Finance Office Receives Draft of Annual Financial Report

Council Expected to Approve New Financial Transparency Software

The city has received a rough draft of its annual financial report, according to Jason LaFayette, City Finance Director. The city had hired local accountant Wayne Drealan to assist in preparing the report which is due by state law by the end of May.

LaFayette said he is currently reviewing the report and will be re-pulling reports that had been included in the rough draft for any updated changes that may be needed.

"We've changed a lot of things in the system since we originally pulled the reports for him as we are trying to be more efficient," LaFayette told the City Council. "This way he can re-review to make sure he doesn't think anything needs to change.'

LaFayette said his office is tracking all these efforts with Drealan and so far he says both his office and Drealan are on

the same page. "He was, from what I understand, pleased with the way 2022 looked and the decisions we made throughout the year,"

LaFayette said. The city is on pace to have the report submitted by the May 31st deadline which has been one of the main priorities for LaFayette since taking over as City Finance Officer late last summer. With several disruptions in the process brought on by questions in the city's bookkeeping methods that has not been the case the past two years. Worth noting is that all of the city's delinquent reports were eventually presented and all were accepted by the state.

The city's finances are regularly audited by Ben Elliot of Independent Audit Services of Madison, SD, and more recently a financial review to reconcile the city's banking records was completed by Casey Peterson & Associates of Rapid City.

Drealan's consulting agreement with the city for 2023 was approved in late December and signed in January. He recently retired from a four-decade career with an accounting firm in Minnesota and relocated to Belle Fourche to be closer to

Pastor's Perspective

This week's Pastor's Perspective is provided by Betty Knappen, St. James Episcopal Church

"Jesus Will Light the Way"

There is a recurring promise running through the Gospel today. Jesus will lead, Jesus will light the way, Jesus will move aside the darkness. It would seem an easy choice to believe, to welcome the light and allow it to lead and protect us, but we humans want to be in charge – not just of ourselves, but of everyone and everything. But we aren't meant to lead. We aren't meant to light the way. And we do not create our own light. ONLY God does. And I don't think Jesus is talking about the absence of light when he talks of bringing us out of the dark. I think he talking about fear and uncertainty, shame, hatred, and deceit.

God sent his light into the world to lead us, to heal us, and finally, to save us. But he didn't send that light simply to created brightness. God simply IS. And life is simply, life everlasting - and He sent Jesus (the Light) to lead us to that understanding. When we walk out of the darkness, when we let go of fear, hatred, deceit, what are we left with? Love, connectedness, kindness, PEACE, LIGHT. Light is not heat or fire - both could harm. Light however, doesn't harm, it enriches, comforts- it grants us Peace and JOY.

It's no wonder that Jesus tries to explain this with a story about a blind man suddenly able to see. Imagine how completely different life would look if there was no fear, no hatred, no dangerous things lurking. It would be like you were seeing the world for the first time. There wouldn't be any need to avoid the "dark" that may hold things that could harm you. Instead, you would be placing your trust in God to lead you. And knowing that if you follow where he leads you will always be where you are meant to be.

Giving our trust, giving our lives to God is NOT giving up control, rather it's giving up the fear that you could misstep

and be lost in the dark. You are picking up his light, you are living the life of God's choosing. Following HIS will isn't surrendering your life, it's truly finding your faith, your relationship with GOD. It is an acceptance that you are His and therefore in His keeping. You are SAFE, you are HOME. And there is only light here.

The blind man in today's Gospel keeps trying to convince the other people, no matter how many times he is questioned, that he was blind and that Jesus restored his sight. And Jesus keeps saying, he wasn't blind because of sin or wrongdoing – in other words "he wasn't blind because of something he did or didn't do. He simply couldn't see, and he couldn't fix it. God Fixed it, God brought light and made him see"

We all have millions of little choices or decisions that shape our everyday lives. BUT, the path we walk, the light we follow? That has never been something that we get to choose – because we have always and will always belong to HIM – we are each here because of the glory of God.

This week I am going to relearn to FOLLOW GOD. I am going to let him lead, and light the way. I am going to have faith that I belong to him just as all of you belong to Him. And that in that belonging, he IS making everything as it should be. I am going to let him push out my fear, my sadness, my uncertainty. I am going to pray the prayer that never fails, "Thy will be done."

I am going to believe with all my heart and soul that He will bring each of us to an eternity of peace and joy. I am going to believe we are all protected and guided through our time here, and that we will all meet in the same light drenched place when our time here is done.

Believe with me. Amen.

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

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

At the Mar. 20, regular council meeting, the matter was discussed and a vote was taken to approve the purchase of the software from OpenGov for \$155,198.75. The vote was 4-to-2 with two council members, Clark Sowers and Derrick Erhart absent. Later in the week the city's legal council advised that a majority would be required for a purchase of that amount. With eight council members, four affirmative votes were not considered a majority. In cases of tie votes, the Mayor

has the ability to break the tie but that option was not consid-

According to Lafayette the OpenGov software will allow the city to be more transparent with the ability to provide live updates on how the city's money is being spent throughout the

"What it is, it's software that allows us to be more transparent with our citizens. It offers an online interactive budget book where people get online and see where the city's budget is," LaFayette told the council. "It's live to where we can keep it up to date with where we are now

as opposed to one single set of numbers for the entire year."

The idea for implementing an online budget book software originated with the Legal and Finance Committee under Council Member Rebecca Larson. In working with the committee Lafayette said they came up with two options - OpenGov and Questica.

The Questica plan was more expensive at \$165,368.31 but would run for five years. The OpenGov plan had a three-year term with the \$155,000 price

Not everyone was pleased with the high price tag. Ward

1 Council Member Monte Talkington said the money could be better spent elsewhere, such as repair of city streets.

'You've heard me say this a hundred times. It's wants versus needs people," he said. "There's been a lot of money spent already this year on wants rather than needs. Our streets are falling apart out there. I understand this is probably going to make things easier, but I don't think we were elected to spend money on things to make our jobs easier. I think we were elected to spend the tax payers' money on things to make their







lives better and the city better, so I am voting no on it."

Ward 4 Council Member Bob Somervold also questioned the expenditure but ultimately expressed support for the software. "I agree with Monte that we have to watch out for the citizen's money. But I have been getting a lot of conversations just this year – 'when are going to do this project, when are we going to do that project," he said. "And if this is something that is implemented, then we can put it on the website and you can look up and see when projects are going to get started and when they are going to get finished - if I'm understanding it right - that's something we're going to get."

Lafayette reminded the council that this expenditure is a response to what citizens wanted after going through some turmoil in the city finance office the past 26 months.

"The process that we've used for, however long it has been, is terrible. You all requested transparency, efficiency and (City Administrator) Bob (Nelson) and I went out and found it," he said.

Lafayette says the software would allow the council to gather during budget planning sessions in the fall and see real-time data on the large LED screen recently installed in the council chambers at City Hall.

"When department heads are going through their budgets and want to change something they can do it right through their laptops and it will go up on that screen," he said. "We can compare side-by-side original budgets with proposed budgets. We can make those changes on the fly."

One of the major improvements Lafayette sees with the use of the software is the ability to track employee expenses within departments at a more granular level. This is especially helpful during the fall budget planning sessions.

"We can get those costs to within dollars or hundreds of dollars as opposed to how we are budgeting now, because right now we don't know," he

With the live data Lafayette says they will be able to closely track and project where employee costs will be, potentially revealing thousands of dollars which could be allocated to other projects. With the current system those expenses can only be a best-guess estimate.

Each software system could be implemented for the 2024 budgeting season, but the committee leaned toward the OpenGov solution.

"The OpenGov was the one we really liked," said Rebecca Larson, Ward 4 Council Member. "There's a higher one-time fee with OpenGov than with Questica. But the big thing with the OpenGov is that it is handheld training and implementation. It's unlimited support instead of an hourly rate for support."

Larson added that the Open-Gov closely resembles how the city books are set up, making implementation potentially much smoother. "The line-item numbers will stay the same so it will be more fluid and more tailored toward what we have," she said.

'We won't be the first municipality in South Dakota to have something like this, a budget book online, however we will be the first to have this interactive kind," said Heidi Parker, Ward 1 Council Member. "We are a little ahead of the curve and we would be ushering in a new era for many other municipalities."

A total of \$68,505 is due once the contract is signed with OpenGov to cover implementation costs. Lafayette says the city will pay for the project using funds allocated for contract

The city had budgeted more than what the city will end up using. "The money is there,"

From A1 Roof Repair

The district had four bidders for the third bid and none of them were local contractors. The school board unanimously approved a motion to award the bid to Black Hills Roofing of Rapid City for \$112,885. That bid was nearly \$11,000 lower than the next closest one from Black Hills Exteriors of Rapid City.

However, the other two bids did receive interest from community contractors. Albright Construction of Belle Fourche put forth estimates on both the bus barn and shingled roof

In the case of the bus barn the low bid was RainTite Roofing of Rapid City at \$126,245. Albright's bid was nearly the same at \$127,600. That represented a difference of \$1,355 or slightly more than a 1% difference.

School Board Member Greg Krajewski asked the district if it would be possible to award the bid to a local contractor since the two bids were so close.

"In this particular situation we might just want to look at it," Krajewski said. "I know there is state law that we have to abide by but I would like to know if we have any room here. If I'm approving something I'd like to know all the parameters,

"We assure you, we are listening and working on finding answers," said Harms.

As the commissioners began the process of approving the renewal of Black Hills Bud Dispensary and Black Hills Bud Cultivation licenses, an item in the paperwork drew a red flag causing them to ask about background checks. Sheriff Fred Lamphere had put a call into SDDOH for clarification but had not received a return call. Backgrounds are checked through DCI and SD Attorney General.

According to Calvin Reilly, Chief Executive Officer of BH Bud, an independent company does background checks that are renewed every two years.

He went on to explain that when the license was approved last year, it was done under the first ordinance and the 1000 feet distance was not required.

not necessarily just the lowest bid when it's this close."

During the Mar. 13 school board meeting Susan Proefrock, District Business Manager, read from the state code regarding bid preferences. The relevant section of the code says there is no provision to award a bid simply because the vendor was located with the limits of a city, county, district, or immediate trade area.

After further discussion a motion was passed to table decisions on the first two bids until further information could be presented. The second bid, for the shingled roof project at South Park and North Park, also had an Albright offer but it was \$16,000 higher than the low bid.

The school board held a special meeting on Mar 20. At that meeting Dwight Gubbrud, School District Attorney, reviewed with the board the competitive bidding process for public improvement projects, as required by state law.

Following that review it was decided to accept the low bid on each project. RainTite of Rapid City was awarded the bus barn roof and siding contract for \$126,245 and Dynamic Roofing of Rapid City, was awarded the bid for the shingling project at South Park and North Park for \$235,019.

State's Attorney LeEllen Mc-Cartney said that the renewal ordinance was clearly articulated to business owners at the time of adoption and there was no grandfather clause. She explained that BH Buds could apply for a variance.

Reilly explained that the dispensary was not in place yet and could be positioned anywhere past the 1000-foot distance. Erk said that since it was listed as the same address as the cultivation and was not in

place, the license renewal must be the subject to be voted on. Both operations were denied

Several abatements were presented to the commissioners. The abatement request for 15.82.01.02 in the amount of \$477.78 was denied on the basis that the application was insufficient. Punteney Acquitted: A Deadwood Jury Does Its Sworn Duty
to a Pal - the Deadwood Press
Assists in a Travesty of Justice

"The Times" gives below a

brief review of the evidence of

first witness called in behalf of

the principal witnesses in the

Punteney trial: A.H. Marble

the state testified to the bank

being robbed by three men on

the 18th day of June 1897, and

positively identified Punteney as one of those men. Mr. Marble's testimony remained unshaken by the severe cross examination to which he was subjected for two hours. H. W. Tecknor, teller of the bank. was next called and testified to substantially the same facts as Mr. Marble, and identified Punteney as being one of the robbers. J. D. Hicks testified to the pursuit and capture of the Jones brothers and Punteney near Red Lodge, Mont., last September. E. M. Mitchell was the next witness and testified to being in the bank on the morning of the robbery and at the time the same occurred, and also identified Punteney. C. A. Danna also testified to being in the bank at the time of the robbery occurred and positively identified Punteney as being the man who held he and Marble up. A. S. Shockley was called and testified that while in his office, which is almost directly across the street from the bank – on the morning of 28th day of June 1897, he heard several pistol shots and upon opening the office door saw three or four men in the act of mounting their horses directly in front of him and but twenty five or thirty feet distant, and he positively identified Punteney as one of the men. Ed Armstrong, of Camp Crook, testified to trading horses with one of the gang of five men who were camped in the canyon in his pasture and that on the evening of the 19th day of June, 1897 he went over to their camp to make delivery in the horse trade; that he took supper with the gang; that he saw and talked with Punteney. After recalling a few witnesses on minor points the state rested. Attorney Temple in opening the defense stated that he expected to prove that Walter Punteney had always borne a good reputation, and further that they would establish an alibi. Eli Punteney took the stand and testified to the character of his son. Several affidavits were read from men who lived in Kansas – Punteney's old home - as to his good character. Mr. Ford was called and testified that he was formerly in the barber business at Casper and knew Punteney by reputation which was good. M. Brown swore that Punteney took dinner at his ranch near Thermopolis, Wyo., on June 27, 1897, the day preceding the robbery. Brown looked up the date in a calendar after Punteney's arrest. Robt. McCoy swore to the same facts as Mr. Brown, and fixed the date by saying he had just returned from a trip. Jno. Whote testified that he stood by the fence in the rear of Sebastian's saloon while the men were mounting their horses after the robbery; that they were there for the space of 3 to 5 minutes and that Punteney was not one of the men. Curly Raney was called and stated that he met four men coming into town on the day of the robbery; that he conversed with them for twenty minutes and that Punteney was not one of the men. W. H. Thompson testified that he met four men coming into town and that another man was riding in the rear of the four men trying to overtake them. He did not recognize Punteney as one of the crowd. Defendant took the stand and stated that he had never been in Belle Fourche previous to his arrest. That he

was at Brown's ranch on the day preceding the robbery, and that he was then on his way to his ranch near Embar, Wyo. He admitted that when arrested he was in company with the Jones boys and bound for the British possessions. At p.m. Wednesday Attorney Rice began his argument to the jury, which occupied about thirty minutes and was simply a review of the evidence. McLaughlin opened for the defense with a short address. Temple followed with an argument of two hours and a half duration, which was chiefly a tirade of abuse and sarcasm of the state's witnesses. In closing he pleaded for some time for mercy on account of the "poor, old father and sweet staunch sister, Nellie." And the praying invalid mother. LaFleiche closed for the state with an earnest convincing argument which was clear, concise and devoid of personalities, and was an effort of which he may well feel proud. Without question it was one of the best ever delivered in a criminal trial in Deadwood. Judge Moore received many congratulations for the fairness and impartiality of his instructions to the jury. After being out about an hour and a quarter the jury returned a verdict of "not quilty."

The Deadwood Pioneer-Times of Wednesday says: The people of Belle Fourche believe it would be impossible to convict a criminal in this county on any charge and there is at least a semblance of foundation in justification of such a sentiment.

The bank examiners who have been probing into the affairs of the Bank of Gillette, at Gillette, Wyo., now state that the shortage resulting from the speculations of the suicide of the president, Mark H. Shields, may reach the enormous amount of \$250,000. This is perhaps the largest bank failure ever recorded in the state of Wyoming, and seems to be a pretty strong argument in favor of a bank guaranty law in that state.

Belle Fourche's Newest Industry Belle Fourche Bentonite Products Company Preparing to Commence Mining Operations

Announcement was made in this paper last week of the incorporation of a company to be known as "The Belle Fourche Bentonite Products Company," with the home office in this city. With reference to the intentions of this company the following was prepared by Ruth O. Fellow, one of the stock holders, who states that since the article was written, several thousand dollars' worth of machinery has been purchased and paid for and that it is purchased to be delivered in Belle Fourche within a week or ten days: It is proposed by this company to develop a deposit of bentonite under-lying 3,080 acres of ground situated between the Belle Fourche river and Middle creek, beginning a short distance west of the Middle Creek stock yards, one mile west of Belle Fourche, and extending nearly to the Wyoming line. The tract has been subdivided into 154 twenty-acre placer mining claims, all of which have been filed upon and properly recorded. Within the next few days a meeting of all claim holders will be held, probably at Deadwood, for the purpose of electing permanent officers for the proper conduct of the affairs of the company. Thus it is expected that there will be developed to the users of this mineral, one of the richest deposits ever dreamed of, for years tying dormant within our very doors and in unheard of quantities. Bentonite is known to scientists as

a "Volcanic Ash" and the bed



by Mary Buchholz referred to was discovered by W.I. Smith some three years ago, but not until about one year since was he made aware of its nature, its uses or its value. But upon submitting a sample to a geologist he was advised that the material was high grade bentonite and the thing for him to do was to place placer mining claims on every acre of the discovery. He then began getting busy. His first idea was to interest Belle Fourche people only; several of the well-to-do business men of the city were solicited to assist financially and become owners of one or more of the twenty-acre tracts. But he was met with many pessimistic views regarding the value of the product, those approached fearing presumably, that it was but another "get rich quick" scheme being promulgated and Mr. Smith gave up all further efforts to interest home people who could not see that at some future time they might be greatly benefited by joining him in the proposition, and proceeded to confine himself to personal friends at first, but later with some of the business at first, but later with some of the business men of Deadwood and Lead, until at last he succeeded in getting every twenty-acre tract properly filed upon. Then after securing power of attorney from each claimant, he began a campaign of attempting to find a company able and willing to pay a lump sum for his relinquishment of the entire tract, placing his prices for such release at \$500,000. Three trips to Chicago put him next to two different firms, receiving an offer from one party of \$100,000 in cash, and a 50-cent per ton royalty from another. These offers were turned down and after waiting a reasonable length of time for them to raise the ante, concluded it was time to act. He consulted his attorneys, Messrs. Hayes & Heffron, each of whom are holders of several claims and it was decided to make a quorum, which was done and the articles of incorporation were adopted and sent to Pierre. After permanent organization there will be something doing in the way of directing suitable buildings, securing grinding and drying machines so that he finished product may be loaded direct on the cars ready for shipment. Letters from Chicago, Denver and New York have been received and each of them intimate that the firms represented may be in a position to handle the entire output. The money necessary to supply the needed machinery will be forthcoming from the sale of from 200,000 to 300,000 shares of the capital stock, and from inquiries already received from those anxious to get into the deal, it surely loos as if that amount of stock will not go begging. As to quality and quantity: Chicago geologist claims that the Belle Fourche bentonite is of the highest grade yet discovered in the United States, especially for manufacture and de-inking paper; while the quantity which in places almost, if not quite, crops out at the grass roots, seems almost beyond one's imagination. The same Chicago geologist and engineer estimates from average depth measurement, that underlying one thousand acres alone, there may be mined at least 8,000,000 tons of the mineral, hence it would not appears difficult to figure how many tons may be mined from 3,080 acres in this tract. Irrigation District Costs for
1948 Are Estimated at \$70,000

1948 Are Estimated at \$70,000 The cost of operation and maintaining the Belle Fourche irrigation district in 1948 has been estimated at \$70,000, it was disclosed this week in a report of the regular monthly meeting of district directors. Board members gave consideration to the official notice from the interior department advising the 1948 operation and maintenance budget has been set at \$70,000 and is to be advanced by the district in two payments. Making up the estimated coast is \$18,600 for operating the storage and distribution system during the irrigating season and in filling stock ponds and assembling crop and livestock census data: \$22,000 for maintenance of storage, canals, laterals, drains and permanent improvements; \$11,500 for repairs and replacements to minor structures, and \$17,900 over-

head. The treasurer's report

disclosed that on Feb. 28 the district had a balance on hand in the general fund of \$15,135.12, and \$65,631.55 cash on hand in the contract fund. Superintendent S.T. Larsen, reviewing project activities, explained present plans of the bureau to replace the main valves at Orman dam at an estimated cost of \$66,000, including lining of tunnels. Directors voted to broaden the compromise rule by allowing purchasers of county land to settle delinquent construction charges upon payment of principal only, exclusive of interest, where such lands carry one year or no delinquent operation and maintenance charges. Heretofore these cases were not eligible for any reduction under the compromising rule. Superintendent Harry E. Weakly of the U.S. experiment farm met with the board to discuss the matter of water delivery to the farm, which has been receiving water service without charge. Weakly indicated the problem will have to be worked out with the governing agency of the farm and invited board members to meet with his department heads at a conference to be held later this spring.

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

NEWELL-The first reading and approval of policy KKB: Student Registered Sex Offender was discussed at a Special School Board Meeting held Thursday evening March 23.

The policy holds much the same with the exception of Paragraph 2 which reads that "a student who is registered as a sex offender pursuant to 22-24B2, must receive instruction through remote or distance learning or an alternative educational program unless such placement is preempted by Federal Law. Such student shall not participate in any extracurricular activities."

The new wording on the policy was changed due to Governor Noem's signature of SB 168.

The school's attorney, Eric Neis, was on hand to explain the wording on the new policy. He explained if the policy was not passed, the school could be subject to losing funding or a

A paragraph was added from the SDASB that included parental appeal.

In other action, the board approved the part-time 5th grade teacher contract for Tracy Wendt. Also the 5th grade longterm substitute teacher rate of \$140 was approved and will be retroactive.

The next regular meeting of the Newell School Board will be April 10.

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





ideas discussed and a solution will be found.

The water tower in Newell is due for repairs at a cost of \$6,780. Work will include repair and touch up of the interior coatings. The tank interior will be rigged and once repair and touch up is completed the tank will be cleaned using a pressure washer. The tank will be disinfected, sealed and ready for service. This price does not include containment, testing, or off-site disposal of sediment or debris from the tank.

Foreman Parker assured the commissioners that the problem

with the tank would not get better, but only worse.

A nine-year contract was signed for water tank inspection. The first year of the contract cost is \$847, the cost for year three is \$2,309, year five is \$2,475, year seven is \$2,654, and year nine is \$2,845.

Options for the demolition of 102 Fisk Ave. will be explored further.

It is important that sidewalks be cleared at all times. According to the Town of Newell website sidewalks "should be free from branches, grass, ice, snow, and personal property. Snow needs to be removed within 24 hours after snowfall (Ordinance 02-2011)."

Finance Officer Sheila Smith told the commissioners that she would need more hours with Gloria Landphere who is helping her to learn the process of city finances. The commissioners voted to extend her another 30 hours.

Commissioner Lorri Olson will be spending 10 hours a month dealing with code enforcement.

The animal ordinance came into question and will be reviewed at the next month's meeting. Water and sewer requirements for home owners will also be reviewed and addressed.

The next regular meeting will be April 10 at 5 p.m.

Nisland veterinarian merges career with unique homeschool lessons

NISLAND – When parents homeschool, life can get a bit interesting. But the opportunity for the "hands on" teaching of many different curricula often comes in unusual forms. That is the case for Dr. Teri Todd and her husband James Todd who live just south of Nisland.

"(It was a) long day yesterday with lots of miles, joints injected, and a c-section for a client resulting in a live calf," said Todd. This local veterinarian often takes son Clancy and daughter Mariah with her on calls. They spend the day learning about the science of veterinary medicine, calculating dosage using math skills and being a "gopher" for mom, all while learning to be a good citizen and helper. Plus they learn things like compassion as they watch their mom work with an animal and often comfort

"The kids are great with entertaining clients and helping me carry supplies," said Todd. "They love to hand me instru-

ments and Clancy is old enough he can hold horses and even trot some of them for lameness exams. They are great with baby calves when we have ones that need to be dried and stimulated after birth. Mariah loves to hold syringes and medications for me and also to love on the horses. They are both great at cleaning up and packing things to load.

Todd runs Classic Veterinary Services from their ranch just south of Nisland. She has a mobile exam unit and travels quite a bit around the area to work her magic.

"I have a mobile practice for large animals and have done relief work all across the state on large and small animals. I only work in Sturgis (at the clinic) if they call now and since they hired some more vets, I haven't had to fill in for quite a while," said Todd.

The family moved here a little over six years ago. Before that she had a practice on the east side of the state and worked at the Veterinary Emergency
