Candidates Respond to Beacon City Election Questionnaire

There are two public events that will provide voters with an opportunity to meet and see the candidates for city office.

The Branding Iron in conjunction with the Belle Fourche Chamber of Commerce will be hosting an Open House for the candidates from 5:30 to 7:30, Thursday, April 1 and the Downtown Business District is sponsoring a Candidate Forum from 6 to 8 pm, Tuesday, April

Also, in an effort to give insight into the candidates and their positions on some of the issues, the Belle Fourche Beacon sent an election questionnaire to all of the candidates seeking election on the April 13th City ballot.

We have grouped their responses by question, by candidate, by position they are seeking. Questions are the same for Mayor and Council. For Mayor: Rebecca Larson, Vern Bills, & Randy Schmidt. Ward 2: Derrick Erhart & Clark Sowers. Ward 3: Randy Sowers & Dean Brunner. Ward 4: Wayne Gilbert Betty Jo Hoffman. Derrick Jones answers will be in the April 7 issue.



RPM Minerals Looks to May Opening RPM markets will be orga-

BELLE FOURCHE - A new manufacturing plant just north of the city is hoping to begin operation in May after hiring its first shift of employees.

RPM Minerals of Alexandria, Egypt, has spent the last two years converting the Black Hills Fiberglass plant three miles north of the city on US Highway 85 into a facility that will manufacture a proprietary drilling fluid to make drilling for oil and natural gas more efficient.

Alexandria and Belle Fourche share a common bond in that both cities lie near high-grade bentonite deposits. Bentonite is an absorbent clay material that has uses ranging form skin care, to kitty litter to industrial applications. Deposits are generally formed in areas that have seen significant settling of ancient volcanic ash.

"The bentonite here in this area is without a doubt the highest grade that we will work with," said Dr. Ahmed Rasheed, Managing Director of RPM Minerals. "And because of this, this product we will produce here will be the best of its kind available anywhere in the

If things go according to plan Rasheed told the Beacon that he hopes to begin operations in May. The renovation of the plant and construction of the tanks, dryers and production tower/reactor was a methodical but steady process.

"We adopted a slower construction system because we depending on local contractors," Dr. Rasheed told the Beacon. "We spent a year but we used local contractors and that we hope has long term

positive effect. Very few things were brought in from longer distances."

RPM will initially hire a half dozen employees with growth expected as the market expands. This is their first operation in the western hemisphere and Dr. Rasheed says they will make their first batch of trial product, ship it out and await for reports.

"I do not want to exaggerate on hiring because in Egypt it took me three years," he said. "I hope it will not take that long here, maybe a couple of months. With some customers I know it will just be a purchase order because they already know us that well."

Dr. Rasheed sees a potential for between 30 and 40 employees once the plant is operating at a high-level capacity. The facility in Egypt produces 150 pallets of material per day (non-COVID conditions) and the Belle Fourche location will have that ability. It will largely depend on orders received because the product is produced as



Pastor's Perspective

This week's Pastor's Perspective is provided by Rev. Sheri Fadley, BF United Methodist Church "Jesus' Last Words to His Disciples."

As you read this, it's Wednesday of Holy Week for Christians. What is Holy Week? This is the week that Christians remember Christ's final days as a human living a life on earth. Palm Sunday celebrates Christ's triumphal entry into the city of Jerusalem. On Maundy Thursday, we remember Christ's last Passover meal and initiating holy communion with his disciples. Good Friday we remember Christ's unjust trial, persecution, and crucifixion. Eas-

ter we celebrate his victory over death and sin through his resurrection. Churches throughout our community are holding special worship services and activities to honor Christ's final days on earth.

In the retail world, Easter falls way behind Christmas and Halloween, but a little more recognition than Thanksgiving. I reference the retail world, because this is often the most common place we see the holidays being observed. Yet in terms of spirituality, I believe that Easter has so much more meaning than all of the

Why do I believe Easter is so much more meaningful than the other holidays? Because Easter is the transitional day between Lent and the Easter season. The Lent and Easter seasons truly reflect the ups and downs, the challenges and blessings of life. With Lenten season, which culminates during Holy Week, there is a downward humbling descent that correlates to the hard times we have in life. With the Easter season, we can celebrate new life and redemption.

Yet often, we Christians focus just on the new life

and resurrection that Easter and springtime give to us. We avoid Lent and even Holy Week. Yet what a loss this is for so many. When we ignore God in the hard times, we lose out on so much that God can provide for us. When we honor Lent and Holy Week, we can invite God into the hard times of our lives. We won't be able to experience the deeper peace and joy that comes

as a result of sharing the hard times with God. This is the "soil" in our souls for new life to generate from.

If all we do is celebrate Easter and the good times with God, we end up treating God in a superficial way. By honoring Maundy Thursday and Good Friday worship services or events, we are showing God how deep our love and commitment is to him and the sacrifice Christ made for all of us. Paul prayed the following prayer for the Ephesians: "I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the good measure of all the fullness of God." (Ephesians 3:17-19)

When we journey with God through Holy Week, we have the opportunity to experience the width, breadth, depth, and height of God's love for us. 



most of his time in Diibouti and Somalia. Diibouti has been designated a combat zone since 2002, and Somalia has been designated a combat zone since 2004. Willert served as the Deputy Staff Judge Advocate and as the Chief of Military Justice for Combined Joint Task Force - Horn of Africa (CJTF-HOA), which is comprised of individuals from various agencies as well as the Army, Air Force, Marines, and Navy. Willert also supported the Defense Institute for International Legal Studies (DILS), a Department of Defense Agency, where he was able to travel and train multinational forces on things including international human rights, interrogation techniques, torture, and human trafficking. Willert said that "Working with DILS was the highlight of my time over there. The bad guys in east Africa violate human rights, and it's important to get our partner forces on board with respecting human rights, only using acceptable interrogation techniques, not engaging in torture, and identifying and stopping human trafficking."


Willert received the U.S. Africa Command Shoulder Sleeve Insignia for military operations in Hostile Conditions, the Joint Service Commendation Medal, the Global war on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal, the Armed Forces Reserve Medal with "M" Device.

"Military operations aside, it was a very interesting and unsettling time to deploy and be halfway around the world from my family," Willert said, "because we were dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic, a Presidential election, the inauguration of a new President, and social unrest." Willert is very glad to be home, and said that "I am happy I went, and I'm happy I'm back. Now I just want to get re-plugged back into the community, and spend as much time as possible with my wife. Question #4 Belle Fourche stands on the edge of having growth in jobs and business. What role do you think city government should play in accommodating the opportunities brought on by this growth?: Randy Sowers: A: Housing: The City should be providing the basics we need for public safety and making Belle Fourche attractive because we take care of our town. B. Business: Businesses want to be in a place that again is taking care of their own business. The City needs to be prompt and focused on making decisions so that businesses can make decisions to be here. C. Infrastructure: The Infrastructure needs to be a priority. New pickups shouldn't be a priority when the streets are in such bad shape? Why put a water park up in Jones Park when that same street (11th Avenue) needs major work? Prairie Hills and Hat Ranch water supplies are a much higher priority than new pick ups.

Question #4: Dean Brunner: A: 1. Housing? We need to talk to the local Realtors to find out how to expand housing. 2.Business? Help promote the businesses that are here, so outsiders see them, & continue to promote the Industrial Park & the Rail Park expansion. 3. Infrastructure? Our streets & roads are in bad need of repair.

Question #5 Belle Fourche has a vast and varied business community spread from N US Hwy 85 to S US 85 and spread throughout the community including an historic Downtown. What would you see the role of city government as it pertains to that wide and varied business community?: **Dean Brunner:** A: Keeping streets in shape & safe & promoting businesses should be top priority.

Question #5: Randy Sowers: A: The city is here to serve them and make business easier for them. This starts with trying to keep taxes down, water and sewer prices down, and just taking care of our own.

Tax Increment Finance Districts and Business Improvement Districts could be a very good tool for certain projects.

Ward 4 Cont. from A1 budgeting. A balanced budget is what we should strive for. Sidewalks - every walking path to schools should have a sidewalk. Safety for our children should be a top priority. Events - Events bring people to town. We need to do a better job at promoting what Belle Fourche has to offer. I would like to see more events be held in Belle Fourche. We have a great venue at Roundup Complex, & a nice area by the Center of the Nation Monument to host events. I believe, we as a City need to support more of our youth sports such as soccer, baseball, & softball. I would also like to see High School Rodeo brought back to Belle Fourche.

Dog Park: I think is a great need for the Citizens of Belle Fourche, as well as our travelers passing through our community, to have a place for their pets.

Question #2: Wayne Gilbert: A: 1. Exploring and developing ways to assist business owners in improving downtown, through tax incentives and cooperative ventures between the City and business owners.

2. Exploring and developing ways to expand tourism options in Belle Fourche. The City should consider getting involved in developing eco-tourism, such as expanding and improving the bike path, the disc golf course, and perhaps a bird sanctuary in the wetlands that surround our town. 3. Continuing to market and improve economic development. We simply need to take active steps to make Belle Fourche a commerce center and a place where employers want to locate a business and bring employees to town.

These three things do admittedly require a judicious use of money, but if we don't explore these options we will continue to be a stagnating "bedroom community."

Question # 3:There has been some conversation about our City government being more open and informative when dealing with the "peoples" business. What you like to see happen to facilitate a more open government? 3: Betty Jo Hoffman: A: In my opinion, we have Open Government. All committees/boards and council agendas and minutes are posted on the City website, a paper copy of the agendas are posted outside of City Hall, City Council meetings are live streamed online through the city website. You can even go back and watch old council meetings. Everyone can be involved as little or as much as they want to. I would, however, like to see all city meetings be held after 5pm. By doing this, it gives citizens the chance to attend, if they so choose to add public input.

Question #3: Wayne Gilbert: A: The City should consider employing a person who is proficient in such platforms as Facebook to make sure that the word is getting out. Simply relying on published minutes and agenda doesn't appear to be getting it done. But, I have to say, the fact is that many of the people who complain about the lack of open and informative government are people who don't bother to inform themselves through available media and by attending council meetings. I honestly don't know what we can do to encourage those people to get informed. But I do think that increased use of social media would advance this.

Question #4 Belle Fourche stands on the edge of having growth in jobs and business. What role do you think city government should play in accommodating the opportunities brought on by this growth?: Wayne Gilbert: A: The City should take a very proactive role in encouraging the growth of existing businesses, and in attracting new businesses. Tax incentives have not proven to be a major factor, however. Municipal property could be made available for long-term leases or purchase for interested businesses who want to expand or to move here. What it takes is for the City to be an attractive place to live, work, and shop. I think the City should continue to expand the parks and recreational opportunities for residents. The Pickle Ball courts, the new water park, the downtown "parklets," and the use of the Highland Park tennis courts for ice skating, are all great ideas and they should be a basis for building on. I think that infrastructure should focus on improving the downtown. But I also think that we should explore expanding the tourism opportunities that Belle Fourche affords. Some truly visionary ideas need to be on the table. But to start with, I think that there is an important need to promote and improve our bike and walking path. The Belle Fourche River, and Hay Creek, could be significant and beautiful areas with clean up, bank improvement, and landscaping. Of course, this would require cooperation with the Corps of Engineers, but I'm optimistic that with a now fully staffed engineering department we can take steps to getting that cooperation going.

Ward 2 contd. from A1 Question #2 If elected, what would be the top three things you may wish to help accomplish? Clark Sowers: A: 1. In Ward 2, Streets and Infrastructure would be my priority, and includes the streets and infrastructure (water and sewer) of our entire community. This would prioritize pedestrian safety, and include center and turn lane striping, and especially crosswalks for the safety for our citizens. Drive around town with this perspective and especially slowly down the 500 & 600 blocks of State Street and you will understand. They were only built 20 years ago and are falling apart.

2. Spending would be the second priority. There are three business owners running to serve you who

2. Spending would be the second priority. There are three business owners running to serve you who manage people and budgets and understand it is your money you have trusted the City Council with. Our call as a Council is to provide the greatest good for the greatest amount of the people. This is wrapped around your public safety, public health and overall "common good" of our community.

To do this we must concentrate on where we spend your tax dollars. It should be as local as possible. We

To do this we must concentrate on where we spend your tax dollars. It should be as local as possible. We also need to look at spending in our departments. The council needs to be deeply involved in forming the budget and determining "wants v needs." It's easy to say "Yes" when spending other people's money. I can say "no," if it is a "want" and not a "need."

3. Cleaning up our community would be third. We have a plan in place that would encourage neighborhood clean-up in all areas of the community. We have the regional landfill in our community, and we have so many opportunities to clean our town. There are many positive consequences from a clean and organized community one of which is Economic Development!

Question #2: Derrick Erhart: A: 2.1. Open lines of communications are vital to everything we do, including establishing trust and gaining a better understanding. First, I want to thank the current mayor, current council members and city administrators for being open and honest when I have approached them with questions. Could communications be better? Are there other avenues of communications that could be explored? There are always challenges to communications in everything we do. I do feel that we as a city should explore other avenues of opening up further dialog with our constituents.

2.2. Our streets are always a topic for discussion. I would like to see not only our current improvement projects completed, like the Lawrence St. project currently being prepared for the bidding process. I would also continue to encourage more improvement projects to be considered.

2.3. I would like to see continued revitalization projects happening in and around our community. Projects like these help our community revenues by fostering increases in business and tourism.

Question #3 There has been some conversation about our City government being more open and informative when dealing with the "peoples" business. What you like to see happen to facilitate a more open government?: Derrick Erhart: A: As I previously stated, when approached with questions or concerns, I have always found our city government to be open when providing answers. The operations of our city government are all public knowledge. However, if no one asks the question, no one will hear the answer. That said, the first step I would take is to encourage more public participation. Attend the meetings when you have concerns or questions. The council meetings are always live streamed and available for later viewing as well. Alternatively, send an email, a text message or call to your council members. As a second step, I would recommend the addition of a public forum platform on the city website that would allow the public to submit items for discussion. This would allow for an official channel of communications to your city government.

Question #3: Clark Sowers: A: This begins at the top and should be ingrained in the City Council members. The key is for council members to understand our role - that we are doing the people's business, not our business. Laws are in place for open government and transparency. There are stipulations in place for "executive sessions" and when council members come out of executive session. Council agendas need to be posted digitally as well as physically. If we trust you enough to vote us into office, we should trust voters by informing them of our decisions.

Serving you is simple. It's not about politics. It's about your government.

Question #4 Belle Fourche stands on the edge of having growth in jobs and business. What role do you think city government should play in accommodating the opportunities brought on by this growth: Clark Sowers: A: 1. Housing? Encourage private developers to invest in Belle Fourche. Our city needs to work WITH these developers to provide for our community needs in housing. We need to say "yes" working within our ordinances while working with developers. They need to work with us as well. We need to clean up our neighborhoods and enforce the ordinances that are in effect. Developers have a better chance of succeeding with well structured and enforced ordinances.

2. Business? We need to let entrepreneurs know we are "open for business!" Again, we must work with businesses and encourage them to invest in our community. The "Discretionary Property Tax Formulas" of 0% for 5 years will encourage growth. It works.

We need to be forward thinking for the infrastructure businesses need. Privatizing areas of the city operations that we are able should be considered. We have four lawn care businesses in Belle Fourche. Putting our City Park mowing up for bids is an option, especially since recent committee meetings discussion lends that it's "hard to find summer help" in the summer. Privatize and give our local businesses an opportunity for success. The approximate \$60,000 to hire summer help could go a long way to hire private contractors. The bottom line: City government is there to encourage Economic Development through private enterprise, in areas where it

is feasible for all parties.

3. Infrastructure? As stated above. We need to be forward thinking for providing city services in our infrastructure. But we also need to look backwards on our infrastructure. If we are to provide homes and neighborhoods for employees of companies, we need to update our water, sewer, and streets. We need to fix our streets. For downtown business this would especially include State Street which is coming apart. Businesses need employees and Belle Fourche needs workers LIVING HERE. Therefore it is imperative we put a capital improvement plan in place prioritizing these needs. We need to invest in our town if we expect business and their employees to invest in Belle Fourche.

Question #4: Derrick Erhart: A: 4.1. Housing? I feel that the main role of the city government with regards to housing is to encourage new growth and renovations of existing homes. These incentives can come in the form of an ordinance to help reduce tax burdens on new structures and additions such as recent ordinances 11-2020 and 1-2021. Tax Increment Financing (TIF) is another option the city government has to help attract developers and future growth.
4.2. Business? I feel that main role of city government with regards to business is to ensure that they are setting just and appropriate ordinances and applying those ordinances fairly. Always considering new ordinances or consider amending existing ordinances to make sure they are in the best interest of our community and business owners. 





4.3.Infrastructure? With regard to Infrastructure growth, the city has already been planning for growth, for example, there have been recent flow studies done that help the engineering department to forecast water needs for the next 40 years. Studies like these helped to plan the water main upgrades that were completed in the 8th Avenue project. As far as new areas, the city again can incentivize further growth through TIF programs that would help new developments offset the substantial costs that are associated with installing new infrastructure.

Question #5 Belle Fourche has a vast and varied business community spread from N US Hwy 85 to S US 85 and spread throughout the community including an historic Downtown. What would you see the role of city government as it pertains to that wide and varied business community?: **Derrick Erhart:** A: I will again state that I feel the main role of city government in our community businesses is to maintain appropriate ordinances, always keep the community's best interests in mind and provide encouragement to foster current and new business growth. Our city government should work alongside of our Chamber of Commerce and Economic Development to help businesses thrive in our community.

Question #5: Clark Sowers: A: The City needs to support the local organizations via memberships, resources, or encouragement. This would include but not be limited to The Chamber of Commerce, Center of the Nation Business Association (CONBA) the Historic Business District. They should be providing a united vision understanding that everyone has an opportunity to contribute to the common good of our community. Their reach would not be limited to city limits but beyond as well. The city should be in a

Question #6 What would you like to see happen in Belle Fourche to foster the growth of tourism in the community?: Clark Sowers: A: The Warrior Trail runs from Belle Fourche to The Little Bighorn Battlefield along Highway 212 all the way to our Center of the Nation! In 2006 Vern Bills, myself and CONBA promoted "The Warrior Trail" and had it designated by the SDDOT as an historic roadway. This came about from the small Broadus, MT. Chamber of Commerce having a contest to rename the southeast area of Montana tourist area. Five years ago our Chamber of Commerce and community formally and finally recognized the designation. There is a great interest in Native American Culture and Highway 212 is filled with great history and the "Warriors," whether they be Native Americans, American Cavalry, Homesteaders, or small communities like us, who have survived this rugged country. There is a sign where I-90 intersects with Highway 212 at the Little Bighorn Battlefield that directs travelers to Belle Fourche. ("Shortest Route to The Center of the Nation") It is an hour shorter than I-90. To date we haven't capitalized on this attraction of our history. We have our great museum at this end. The Little Bighorn on the other end and a great Native American museum at Lame Deer. Our Chamber of Commerce would be a logical choice to lead this organization of the Warrior Trail. Native Culture will draw people here from the east or the west. It's a great opportunity! Other tourism will pivot from this. Especially visitors to the Beautiful Forks. We need to make The Beautiful Forks part of the fabric of our community

Question #6: Derrick Erhart: A: I feel strongly that ongoing revitalization is one good way to help in tourism growth. I feel that we need to also continue our traditions. I frequently use the example of one of our family camping trips. Our family was camping in the Black Hills over the 4th of July Holiday a few years back and a small family from out of state was camping nearby, they asked about things they could do nearby or if there were any carnivals around. We mentioned Belle Fourche had a carnival. They came to us the next day so excited that they were going back to Belle Fourche again that night with a group of their friends to enjoy the carnival again and attend the rodeo and fireworks. Our traditions are a mainstay and huge attraction to tourists.

Question #7 Our cities name sake, "the beautiful forks" has suffered much damage and disrepair from erosion? What would you like to see the city do with that site?: Derrick Erhart: A: This topic is already being worked on by our city government. I have done work with right-of-way when I worked as an engineer for a telephone company. Anytime that the river is involved it lengthens the time of a project and increases costs. The department of natural resources has to be involved, hydraulic and archeologic studies have to be completed. This all takes time and can delay projects. Belle Fourche has started these processes and hired an engineering firm to look at this problem. The other part of this that we must all keep in mind, it that the path the river carves in our beautiful landscape will forever change.

Question #7: Clark Sowers: A: When I was Mayor, we had people as far away as France wanting to see the Belle Fourche River that was in the movie "Dances with Wolves."

We understand the Corps of Engineers needs to approve plans for waterways. If so, where is it? If it isn't in the works, we need to get something done on it. It's been 12 years since it was closed. During the 8th Avenue construction we had an opportunity to use material from the street to reinforce the area of erosion. A lack of planning and vision in our leadership allows the problem to continue. I will work on this as the Beautiful Forks area is truly beautiful and peaceful, and important to our history.

Question #8: Closing the City owned liquor store and placing the sale and distribution of those products in the hands of several Private businesses in the community has been suggested. Your opinion on the idea? Clark Sowers: A: Great idea and another great opportunity to enhance local business. Many don't realize Belle Fourche used to own the Bars in town. We sold them decades ago and it seems the city has benefited from it. If we sell the liquor licenses, we will generate revenue annually without the headaches of managing it. One of the licenses could be designated for our current store and the successful bidder could purchase inventory and equipment. The other licenses we could sell would benefit the businesses that are successful in the bid. This creates competition and enhances the community.

Question #8: Derrick Erhart: A: I would take this under consideration if asked about it. However, I do not currently feel that closing the city owned liquor store is a good idea at this time. I have a few reasons for feeling this way. First, closing this would cause a loss of jobs in our community. When this was originally discussed, the plan would have been for an existing local business to take this over. They already had their own employees and management, so there would have been no reason to keep the employees or manager that the city employs. Second, the profits of the city liquor store benefit very important services in our community. The profits earned go into to funding things like our emergency services and street improvements. In 2019, our city liquor store profited \$132,630. In 2020, using a different marketing strategy, it profited \$214,337. If this were to be privatized, the city government would only see a one-time payment for the liquor license. One thing that could be considered, is to find a property already owned by the city that the liquor store could be located in. This could potentially save the city money, but we also need to consider the location. In its current location, there is plenty of room for vehicles that are pulling a camper to lake for example. Parking options not being available could limit this type of traffic and affect sales negatively.


Question #9 Do you believe public/private partnerships are a viable consideration to save and repair buildings in the downtown business district?: Derrick Erhart: A: Revitalization is key to maintaining our town's history and beauty. I feel that the city government should encourage revitalization. The city government can encourage this by fostering communications between business owners and the many historic grant providers and lenders that could help our businesses to meet these goals. Again, the adoption of ordinances that help relieve tax burdens on these types of improvements could also be an avenue the city government could take.

Question #9: Clark Sowers: A: A Tax Improvement District (TIF) or Business Improvement District (BID) would be great opportunities for support new and expanding business and especially for the potential store front improvements and other issues with our beautiful historic buildings downtown. Question # 10 High taxes on property prevent consumers from building in the Belle Fourche city limits. How can we work toward being more tax friendly? 10: Clark Sowers: A: I stated earlier about the "Discretionary Tax Formula" being set at 0% for 5 years for new construction. That is a proven tool to

This would include items like notices when utilities will be off for repairs, detailed minutes of meetings, open forums to gather input for community events and improvements, and promoting town events. Communication must be open and honest to move forward positively.

Question #3: Vern Bills: A: I will have agendas, handouts, and minutes, published sooner on our city website and in our local newspaper.

You will have access to key city personnel through their city cell phones during business hours. I will implement a Mayor's advisory committee and monthly Mayor's round table discussions for information and idea sharing for those that are interested in the opportu-

Question #4: Belle Fourche stands on the edge of having growth in jobs and business. What role do you think city government should play in accommodating the opportunities brought on by this growth?

Rebecca Larson: A: 1. Housing? City government should be a promoter and supporter for housing as a partner with the appropriate local agencies and development groups. The housing study projected continued growth in population and a need for more housing, so we must plan now to be prepared for the increased population and not try to play catch-up. It is important to me to think of housing as a matter of both new builds and fixing and maintaining current structures. The recent creation of the three redevelopment districts on the north end of Belle Fourche is a great step in the right direction of addressing housing concerns and needs to be promoted and supported. In addition, we need to be working with local entities to determine the need of new structure types - house, apartment, etc. - and the most economically beneficial way to add those to our

2. Business? Business needs to be welcomed into the city, whether it be an existing business or a new business. We need to make sure that we are a business friendly community that promotes and supports our local businesses, while giving them an environment to thrive and grow in. I truly believe that when your businesses are thriving, so is the community.

3. Infrastructure? A healthy, strong infrastructure is a must. If our roads, utilities and buildings are not adequate, how do we expect to grow? How can we expect private residences to be up-kept? It is of utmost importance that all of our infrastructure is regularly assessed and maintenance is continuously planned. Two issues I hear about a lot are roads falling apart and issues with water and sewer. I have seen work being done in these areas and still so much more is left to be done. I do not have the answer today about how all of this will get resolved in a timely matter, but I do know that I will address

The Belle Fourche River walk is a five-mile path that meanders thru downtown, residential neighborhoods and along the beautiful tributaries our community is named for. It is used by families, runners, bikers, walkers, and visitors. With the idea that in an emergency situation it may be difficult to explain to a

911 Operator where you are on the River Walk if assistance is required. Code Enforcement Officer, Clint Haffner, and local volunteer, Cindy Moore, implemented a system in 2017 that would make it faster for emergency services

to locate anyone who may need assistance while on the path. A "mile marker system" was implemented and numbers were painted in black, directly on the cement; in most cases, every 100 feet. The markings weren't designed to detract from the natural beauty of the walkway and you won't find them in areas with obvious landmarks or street signs.

gency locate numbers as you pass them. Parents are urged to point



them out and explain their purpose to younger family members.

the issues and do what I can to support the projects already in progress and find ways to continue to improve the infrastructure. Question #4: Randy Schmidt: A:1. Housing: I have been on the Council for 3 years,

and we are already working on this. We have done a housing study, which has showed us what the City is lacking for housing. We need low income, medium income and multi family. We do have a new manufacturer in Belle Fourche that will be manufacturing small homes which there is a need for. These might require some revisions of some ordinances which is the job of your council. Getting developers interested in Belle Fourche is another tool to use for our housing growth. I have suggested that we try to do a housing study every 5 years. The city was able to get some grant funding on these, to help with the cost. Recently the council has done some redistricting of some areas of Belle Fourche to be able to start moving forward with addressing our housing needs. We also have done some tax incentives for these projects If you would like more information on this please contact your City Engineering department. All these efforts are one I encouraged and will continue to work at if elected.

2. Business: First off, I would like at this time to thank the existing businesses and manufacturers that have chosen this great City to do business in. Without private business the city could not run. We have two industrial parks. One is full, the other one we must keep promoting so we can fill it. We must continue to work to make these businesses feel welcome in Belle Fourche. If we want these businesses to succeed, we must support them locally. Please shop local, we need our businesses to keep Belle Fourche moving forward.

3. Infrastructure: We must continue to work with repairing the City's infrastructure. Over the three years that I have served on the council we have accomplished a great deal in this area. We are continuing with street repair that will be going out for bids. We are working on phase two of the HVAC system for the Rec Center. These are very costly, so we must find ways to continue to broaden the city's tax base. As Mayor infrastructure projects will continue to be a priority.

Question #4: Vern Bills: A: 1. Housing? I have watched the housing growth in our neighboring cities and have been envious. We need to be sure we are not discouraging developers from the opportunity of investing in our town. We need to work to serve those interested with the necessary infrastructure to make housing starts attractive. 2. Business? We need to look at the opportunities we have to enhance their existence with our normal services. For example, the city forced a local business to remodel the drive thru access, but the city street is a disaster. We need to move that particular repair of the city street up on the list. When businesses want to enhance their locations, we need to be careful not to discourage them. We have a great group of business organizations, and the city needs to embrace their efforts with collaboration and implementation. One example is implementation of way-finder signs. Belle Fourche was one of many towns that hoped HGTV's "hometown" would come and renovate our town. However, that could and should be local builders and designers doing that job. 3. Infrastructure? Question #6 Betty Jo Hoffman: A: It goes back to the saying "You get what you pay for" marketing is just that, time after time people shortchange their marketing budget. Let's face it. It's expensive, and it's usually the first thing to get cut. In my experience with marketing, you must figure out what you want to market. Belle Fourche is unique, we are diverse. What do we have to offer? Who is our target market, and how much can we afford to budget to market throughout our nation and other countries? I would like to see an increase in our exposure - perhaps a destination video - showcasing Belle Fourche. We live in a beautiful area, let's figure out how to capitalize on it.

Question #7 Our cities name sake, "the beautiful forks" has suffered much damage and disrepair from erosion? What would you like to see the city do with that site? Betty Jo Hoffman: A: Over the past several years the city has put \$200,000 in the CIP for Bank Revetment. This project goes out to bid to do approximately 400 - 500 foot of the bank. I would like to see the city continue to add money to the CIP and to continually work on the bank. This is a process and there are a few factors that go into fixing the bank. Different entities have to be involved with this project, such as the Corps of Engineers.

Question #7: Wayne Gilbert: A: I believe that it has to be fixed. The bike and walking path should go all the way to the forks, and an overlook should be established. I believe that this will require cooperation with the Corps of Engineers, and may also require the cooperation of private landowners though negotiation of rights of way. This needs to be explored and done. Right now, the name "beautiful forks" doesn't really have any meaning, and this needs to change.

Question #8 Closing the City owned liquor store and placing the sale and distribution of those products in the hands of several Private businesses in the community has been suggested. Your opinion on the idea?: Wayne Gilbert: A: The idea should be on the table. I am not yet convinced that it is a good idea. There needs to be a careful examination and analysis of current and historical financial information, and I certainly would be willing to go where the examination and analysis leads.

Question #8 Betty Jo Hoffman: A: I am unsure about getting rid of a revenue source that provides money to our General fund and jobs. In the last 2 years, the liquor store has had a net profit of approximately \$350K. Last year alone it had a net profit of approximately \$215K. We have had our challenges with the liquor store, no doubt, about it. We currently have good management in place which I believe is a key factor. The liquor store is a self-sustaining department. I would be in favor of our liquor store owning its own building. I would have to research this more as to why it would be in the best interest of our community to no longer to own our liquor store.

Question #9 Do you believe public/private partnerships are a viable consideration to save and repair buildings in the downtown business district? Betty Jo Hoffman: A: I do not believe using City Tax dollars for private business repairs would be in the best interest of the taxpayers of Belle Fourche. Question #9: Wayne Gilbert: A: Absolutely. The creation of a Business Improvement District should be explored, and perhaps Tax Increment Financing should also be explored.

Question #10 High taxes on property prevent consumers from building in the Belle Fourche city limits. How can we work toward being more tax friendly?: Wayne Gilbert: A: The tax base needs to be expanded through overall community improvement and economic development. Cutting services to save money is a fool's errand, and will only serve to Belle Fourche less attractive for businesses in the long run. That said, the use of Tax Increment Financing might be helpful. If businesses are actually refusing to expand or improve because of taxes, there needs to be serious dialogue with those businesses to find out how the City can and should help them.

Question #10 Betty Jo Hoffman: A: Property tax is set between the county and the state. We have an ordinance that encourages new construction which is a tax incentive that offers zero taxes for the first 5 years of business or residing.

124 years ago Northwest Times April 3, 1897

Appropriation Knifing Much credit is due to the governor for the fearless way in which he applied to the appropriation bill. It came to him too late to be considered before adjournment, and he would have been upheld by many in vetoing the entire bill and calling an extra session, for he had warned the legislature in his message of the danger in delaying the appropriation bill. The conference committee too \$49,000 out of the bill and thought it had done a good job, which is true, but the governor did the rest. He clipped \$30,000 our of the appropriation for the hospital for the insane by a method that was both neat and expeditious. He could have cut much more out of the bill but for the ingenious method by which several items covering appropriations for different purposes were bunched in one item. It did not seem to occur to the committee that money had been squandered, diverted and stolen from the fuel fund at the asylum. Do you wonder that the Republicans hang to the asylum so tenaciously? Do you wonder that they were willing to allow the governor to name warden of the penitentiary in consideration that the asylum picnic be not disturbed? The investigating committee whets its knife and looks toward Yankton

while Judge Fuller weeps. News from the Country J. D. Stevens tells the Record that his company (the BXB) has not sold out, but has transferred the home ranch to the Flying-V people – the latter to take care of and run the BXB bunch until further orders. Mr. Stevens said they were located right in, and surrounded by several big outfits, so that the cost of representation at the roundups was too great for pleasure or profit. He doesn't know whether they will put in more cattle this year, but the chances are against it, as young stock are too high in the southern markets.

The Stockman Report The Stockman has this week received reliable reports from many points throughout Montana setting forth the condition of the stock on the range and giving probably losses. The warm wave of ten days ago came just in time to prevent great losses, but much weak stock has already perished from the cold weather which prevailed up to that time. However, since the arrival of the warm wave stockmen are breathing easier and feeling more confident of the future. The eastern part of the state has had a winter of almost unparalleled severity. In Yellowstone, Custer, Dawson, Valley, parts of Fergus and Teton and in the Judith country the suffering among stock is especially severe.

Killed Gray Wolf There were big doings and diggings on the Long Pines on Tuesday this week, when a big gray wolf, the first one for many long months, was tracked to its den and after twelve weary hours of labor by a dozen or more ranchmen, was finally exterminated. All winter long the wolves have been preying on the live stock in the hills and ranchmen have employed "every known means to secure relief." The Stock Association last year advertised that it would pay a bounty of \$50 cash for every wolf killed on the forest ranges. The situation was becoming desperate and it was up to the ranchmen to protect themselves. With the first fall of snow they took up their saddle horses and began tracking the wolves. It was soon determined that at least three big grays were making headquarters in the south end of the Long Pines, but they were wary beasts and it was difficult to sight them. Tuesday morning ranchmen Jack and Leonard Carter, Ed Pendleton, Herman Halverson, Roy Turbiville, Verner Clark, John Latham and Bob Catron met by appointment near Stormy Butte and started tracking. Even though the wolf doubled back, eventually the men followed one track to the den located between the Mc-Clary and Pendleton ranches. The men were soon joined by Dan Wash and Dave Wickham. Food and tools were furnished from nearby ranches and the work of excavation continued until nearly midnight. The mission was accomplished. Including the state bounty of \$15 and the value of the pelt which is probably \$10 the total reward from the capture amounts to about \$75. Nelson, chairman of the Butte County Agricultural Conservation Association, reports that the department of agriculture has established the minimum wage rates to be paid by producers of the 1946 sugar beet crop who apply for payments under the Sugar Act of 1938. The announcement received by Mr. Nelson states that the minimum piece rates specified in the wage determination average about \$6.00 per acre, or about 17 per cent above the 1945 rate. Time rates are about cents per hour more than in 1945. Here are some of the rates established 60 cents per hour for blocking and thinning, hoeing and weeding; 65 cents per hour for harvesting, with provisions made for inexperi-

Two tax protest efforts have been launched in Butte county, both aimed at seeking a reduction in what the sponsors of the project label "confiscatory taxes." One of the efforts is the circulation of a petition calling upon the Belle Fourche Independent District board of education to reduce operating expenses. The other is a meeting called to organize a group to work for reduction of taxes. Petitions have been placed in various business houses in Belle Fourche for persons who wish to urge the school board to reduce the school budget. Mrs. Jack McClure, one of the group which has set the petition drive in motion, pointed out that the group has met with the Butte county commissioners and with Wayne Pluimer, school board chairman, Supt. Joe Keegan and school administrators. A tax discussion meeting has been scheduled for April 5 at the Belle Fourche Community Hall. Dave Heinbaugh, Belle Fourche rancher who announced the meeting Monday, said it has been called for the purpose of forming an organization of Butte County taxpayers to work for "reduction of confiscatory property tax."

markedly anti-fossil fuel policies, as amounting to an immediate threat to business.

"There is concern of course. But I don't think we, as investors, think oil is under threat of disappearing," Dr. Rasheed said. "We need it right now as human beings. It's the cheapest energy form. We can make it more environmentally friendly but killing it is not the answer. That's why we are continuing with our investment here in the Belle Fourche."

RPM does have ideas on how to diversify the space at the facility. According to Dr. Rasheed there are plans to market the space at the plant to outside manufacturers for the production of other bentonite-related products.

"What we are trying to do here is to increase the benefit of the existence of the facility," he said. "Why not make ourselves available for those who require using the facility for producing some product instead of doing it somewhere else. I am in contact with a couple of manufacturers that would prefer doing it in this facility than elsewhere.

As an example Dr Rasheed envisions a manufacturer of a product that blends bentonite with another material to supply a specialty market. That manufacturer may be on the east coast with customers in Seattle. Once agreements are signed RPM would be able to dedicate the silo space to fulfill the manufacturer's bentonite blending and packaging requirements in Belle Fourche and then provide distribution.

"I don't know if it will work or not, but we are working on it and I hope that it would bring in even more jobs," he said.

TeenPact, a program that brings young people to their state capitols to learn more about the political process, is a dynamic, hands-on leadership experience for Christian students. It was founded in 1993 by Tim Echols and first held at the Georgia State Capitol.

This year, Tate Ollila, a Butte County junior homeschool student and son of Dave and Holly Ollila of Newell, got to participate. And his cohorts at the event, which was held for a week, in early March in Pierre, elected Ollila Governor.

The TeenPact event is now held in all 50 states and inspires youth in their relationship with Christ and helps to give them minimal training in understanding the political process, valuing liberty and defending their Christian faith, while they engage in the culture around them. Ollila, along with his mother Holly, spent time in a four-day class where he participated in a mock legislature. This was for students age 13-19. Ollila and others gathered in Pierre learned how to strategically discuss important topics, author and pass bills, make motions and amendments, all while keeping their faith forward with prayer walks around the capitol, praying outside the doors and even with many

legislators. These students met the governor and lieutenant governor, many legislators, staff and lobbyists. Ollila fancies that he may someday be a lobbyist.

"The people need a voice," he said of the difficult job a lobbyist plays. Ollila also participated in a Political Communication Workshop which trained students to analyze and interpret public presentations through a variety of activities and discussions. The students were challenged to develop critical thinking skills as they learned about what communication looks like in the political realm.

The group was guided by Class Directors, who came to South Dakota from many different areas of the country. During the week, these young people shared biblically based talks during the evening sessions and directed the students through the different activities. There was also a



traveling intern team comprised of experienced TeenPacters who have committed a year of their lives to serve at the classes and events around the nation. The intern team had previously gone through an interview process which considered strengths and skills, vision for discipleship, and leadership ability.

"You already have influence," said Forehand to the students gathered. "Being a leader is using your influence."

"The TeenPact conference is an excellent learning opportunity for youth," said Holly Ollila, who followed her son through the days of the experience. "I am extremely impressed with the program and their outstanding group of adult leaders, teen leaders and parent volunteers." Most of the class activities were held in the visitor center, but the students also were able to experience other parts of the capitol, including the senate and house floors, committee rooms, and even the cafeteria. They played a type of trading game where a group of students were given

\$50,000 to spend and had to put together a campaign group, complete with a campaign manager, graphic designer, and communications manager, all who helped prepare their candidate.

"I was nominated by my friend and I nominated him," said Ollila, of being selected by his peers to run for the governor's spot. The groups created campaign banners, handed out treats and lobbied potential legislators to influence the election of their candidate. One sign that was prominent during the "campaign" was, "Be great, like Tate."

During their time the eight groups of students passed such bills as the "Nerd Protection Act of 2021" and a bill that stated it was illegal to sleep in a cheese factory.

Around 65 students participated in the week-long event and they were about to earn a 1/3 Carnegie college credit for their

"What God showed me during the week was that He has a plan for me, and that is to have faith and be bold," said Ollila. He may get the chance to share that faith and boldness in the state legislature in the future.



'Insurance agents are a dime a dozen," she said. And added


that what makes her stand out is customer care.

Many locals turned out as well to enjoy the meal, stuff some money in the buckets and sit down to enjoy both the meal and the fellowship.




