Despite Tragedy Belle Fourche Family Remains Truly Thankful

100th Black Hills Roundup 225 DAYS to July 4th, 2019

BELLE FOURCHE - Stephanie Palmer will never take for granted the opportunity to hug her children. Especially since she nearly lost one of them to a house fire on Nov. 12th.

Palmer's home on Kathy Ave. in south Belle Fourche was destroyed by fire on Monday morning and they lost everything. And yet, from her temporary home at the Super 8 motel, the single mother of four young children says she approaches this Thanksgiving as someone who feels blessed.

"I am just so overwhelmed by how this community has responded to help us," she told the Beacon. "I can't believe how this town is so giving.'

For Palmer and her children, her life circumstances weren't always so.

Up until March of this year they lived in Bakersfield, California in what she describes as "a very dangerous neighbor-

"One afternoon, and I remember it all too well, across the street from our house at a convenience store there was a drive-by shooting," she says. "My oldest children were within earshot and we heard the gunshot. One man had his arm literally blown off. We ran across the street to see if there

was anything we could do and you could see the blood spattered on the wall.'

Palmer says that it was a sight that no one, let alone her children, should ever have to see or experience. It was at that point she knew she needed to move away.

"My sister lived in Belle Fourche, South Dakota and we decided that we would make the move for the safety of my kids,' Palmer said.

But even that wasn't easy. On the drive from California to South Dakota, Palmer was involved in a vehicle rollover accident. "We had to swerve and the car rolled two times before it stopped."

Fortunately there were no injuries and they were able to get a car to complete their trip to Belle Fourche in March of this year. "I just figured that we were blessed by God at that moment that nothing serious had happened and we were meant to keep going."

Palmer found work as soon as she and her children arrived. In fact, at one point she was working three jobs to make ends meet. It was a new beginning, but not quite the end of their challenges

Eight months after moving to Belle, on Monday morning the 12th, Stephanie had just taken her two oldest children, a first grader and a second grader, to

Southpark Elementary. She took her 2-year old son Jordan along with her leaving Stephanie's sister behind at the house to watch Palmer's 4-month old daughter.

"As soon as Jordan and I got home we went to the bedroom and we both laid down and fell asleep. It wasn't much later when I woke up to the smell of smoke and I heard wood crackling," Palmer said. "I jumped out of bed and went into the living and the couch was on fire."

Palmer believes that a space heater was somehow moved too close to the couch and ignited the upholstery.

"I grabbed a blanket and started to beat down the flames," she said. "Then I realized that I wasn't doing much good and the fire was spreading. So I ran down the hall to the baby's room and grabbed my daughter and said to Jordan that we had to get out of the house now."

Carrying the baby Stephanie ran out the front door and down the steps. She turned around to look back toward the house and then discovered that Jordan had

BELLE FOURCHE - The city will once again be hosting its annual holiday celebration beginning this Friday night November 23rd. South Park School to Get New Playground Equipment

The Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) was reactivated about three years ago. The "sparkplugs" that got it going inherited a bank balance of \$200 and no bylaws or clear direction. Jenelle Willert took on the role as the first PTO president and spent a lot of time with Superintendent Dr. Steven Willard mapping out a clear direction that would best serve the organization. With that accomplished they were off and running.

It started with lockers. The group kept hearing the elementary school needed lockers. The research completed, project readied, and PTO was asked and began fundraising. The first two fund raisers of catalog sales and a pizza coupon were well received and they were able to add a nice amount into the account.

The School District informed the group that the lockers would be something provided for in their budget, so that first year funds were used to do a week long teacher appreciation. Efforts included stocking the teacher's lounges fridges with

food and coffee, and had meals prepared for them that week as well as acquiring classroom supplies. Since that first year, PTO has continued to provide many things along the way for the kids including: their water bottles the first day of school, Bronc bracelets during Homecoming week and meals for Literacy night just to name a

Now active and gaining traction in their endeavors the PTO was asked if they would start fundraising for a playground. The current playground has some fun things for the kids and will remain, but it's simply just not large enough to accommodate the play of 200 plus kids during recess.

The PTO Board of Directors started the playground effort by sending a letter to all the local businesses and the response was overwhelming. PTO was very, very thankful and appreciative of the approximately \$10,000 that was so generously donated. They have continued fundraising efforts for the playground with their most recent drive being a Fun Noodles Pasta sale. Sarah Audis has an incredible way of energizing the kids and

they sold close to \$15,000 (with us making close to 50%) in noodles!! In addition to these fundraisers, they collect Lynn's Dakotamart receipts and box tops each month from the kids and they give a party to the classroom with the most. The proceeds of all the work adds up and current PTO President Andrea Rhoads informed the School Board at their regular board meeting Monday night that the PTO could donate a minimum of \$10,000 right now

for the new playground that they voted to order.

Total cost of playground equipment plus freight = \$97,404.00, less a matching grant of \$46,689.50 =\$50,714.50 which is the cost to the District without the PTO donation.

Their work and efforts have just begun and they plan to have a third fundraiser in December and a Spring Carnival on the


Bronc Golfer Signs with Wyoming Cowboys








WALKING DISTANCE - The parade route is shown in red above and all of the events with "Light Up The Night" are within walking distance of each other downtown.





School Board Considers Future of Heating System Agreement

By Betty Bruner NEWELL - The Newell School Board heard from a representative from Johnson Controls, Will Quinn, during the regular monthly meeting on November 12. Quinn informed the board that he was getting attention from his superiors at the Rapid City division of Johnson Controls concerning the problems with the heating system at the school. The Rapid City department is not directly responsible for Newell's heating system he explained. Normally, according to Quinn, the Solutions Division would do an energy efficiency design and the Rapid City division would usually do all the maintenance.

At the moment the engineering department of Johnson Controls

is starting to dissect the problems with the boiler system at the school. Quinn insisted that the right people are giving their attention to the system and are working on a solution.

"We are heading in the right direction," Quinn said. "We are working on why there is a problem with the boilers."

"The relevant people are starting to pay attention to it," he said.

Quinn encouraged the Board to continue the heating system maintenance agreement for another year.

Board member Todd Youngberg spoke up and questioned continuing with that agreement.

"Every month we pay \$2,000 to \$5,000 plus in maintenance to fix something that's been

broke since the beginning," Youngberg commented.

Quinn explained that the people above him only see the numbers and would believe the "ship is sinking" and would want to "bail now" especially if the service contract is dropped.

"We're going to hold their feet to the fire," Quinn said. "I want to see Newell come back up to a good level."

Board members Miles Burtzlaff and Lisa Wendt echoed Youngberg's views on pursuing the continuation of the maintenance agreement.

The Board decided that further action will follow at the December 10 Board Meeting.

Business Manager Sophie Burditt announced that Newell School is now offering parents

The Right Long-Range System

This Column is written by Brian Mehmen, the Founder of Rolling Bones Outfitters, headquartered in the Northern Black Hills. Brian hunts throughout the Tri-state Region, North America and the world and hosts the Rolling Bones TV show, "No Boundaries."

The shooting world is changing every day. It seems like everyday I look at another magazine and another company is producing a product for the long-range shooter. The question today is the same as it was 18 yrs ago when I set my bow down and unplugged from the tournament archery world and started my obsession with long range shooting and varmint hunting.

I started like most. I took a rifle I had and tried to build it into something it would never become. Then I bought a high quality production rifle put a very high quality scope on it. After that I bought every box of high quality manufactured ammo I could find. I wanted to see what the rifle liked and go with that. I also was trying to save money. I had looked at custom-built rifles and even though

financially I was blessed to be able to afford one, it didn't seem like a responsible thing to do. With two kids and a wife, \$5,000.00 for a rifle

and another \$2,500.00 for the scope rings was just flat not in my mind something I was going to do. The other thing was, I would rather spend that money

on a hunt. Maybe some of you have had the same thoughts? So I found my answer.

The system I built worked, well kind of. Out to 600 yards it held about a 1 1/2 MOA grouping, which for deer it was fine but for coyotes, not so fine. So here is what I did. I built two rifles exactly the same. One 7mm Remington Mag in a

Browning A-bolt with the B.O.S.S break that I had a trigger and bedding job done on. The other was a 22-250. I took both these rifles to different shooting schools and used them for a few years. The issue

was I still did not have the performance I wanted past 600 yards. My farthest shot with the 7mm was on a Colorado Mule Deer at 701 yards and with the 22-250, a covote at 589 yards. Some would say that is all you need and they're right. I am not the guy who goes hunting for the longest shot possible, actually just the opposite. I want to hunt within the range of the most ethical shot and humane kill I possibly can. But when the situation presents itself and there is no way to get closer, I want to be able to make that shot effectively to humanely

harvest the animal. When we started our company to help people figure out and solve the Rubik's cube code of hunting the west, we realized that people also needed be able to effectively shoot to 500+ yards. So we went to work to solve the issue that so many had. They come out West and spend thousands on the trip to go home only empty handed because they missed a shot past 300 yards. As a company we want to produce results and provide success when and where

possible. So off we went to deliver a system to our clients that would work as good as the \$7,000.00 plus systems and have all the data delivered to the hunter! Then all they would need to do is practice, learn wind, elevation and squeeze. After building a couple of rifles and working with a few companies, we found a solution.

So how do we produce a better system for less money? We did the homework and research! We found a rifle builder that had an action that was as custom as they come. We also wanted to produce the rifle that would keep the cost at a price point where it would be available to the masses with a result of shooting out to a 1,000 yards for just under \$4,000.00. We did it. We are so proud of this hunting rifle and what it does for the hunter.

I have spent my life as a hunter working on being a better shot, whether it is with a bow, shotgun or rifle. First for the animal and second for myself, so I can hedge my success in the field. I am a hunter first and a shooter second. In a world where a lot of people are trying to be a "sniper", I want to be a hunter that can shoot. We believe we can put a rifle in our hunter's hands that can extend their range. If they are comfortable out to around 200 yards, we want to help them go to 300 or 400 yards. Not everyone will have the time to become great out past 600 yards, however most can get to 400 yards with the right education and the right system. Give us a look if your considering extending your range or looking for a great hunting system. As always, we wish you the best and safest adventures in the field. The Best Of Hunting To YOU! --Brian

opportunities.


