BF City Council Approves BH Roundup Museum

Proposal calls for structure to be built at the Roundup grounds.

BELLE FOURCHE- The Belle Fourche City Council gave it's consent at it's regular meeting on Nov. 20 to the planning and construction of a Black Hills Roundup Museum at the Roundup grounds. The structure will be built in the Spring of 2019.

Plans call for a small building, about 14' x 20' to be placed inside the ticket gate between the existing stage structure and the new grandstand which will soon be built.

"We just thought it was time to collect in one place the history of the Roundup," said Clay Crago, BHRU Committee Chairman. "For whatever reason we seem to have lost some of it or we can't locate it. Now we'll have a place to put it for

display to the general public."
Crago said they plan to
borrow exhibits from people
who have been involved in the
Roundup over the years and to
locate other artifacts, photos
and pieces of history from people who may have something

they'd like the public to see.
"The museum would be open

for the Roundup during the 4th (of July) and probably other times of the year that a rodeo event may be going on," Crago said.

Along with the museum a part of the structure will feature Roundup merchandise for purchase. This would include t-shirts, buckles, coffee mugs, post cards or other items that the Roundup's Merchandise Committee would choose.

According to Crago the cost would be minimal. The plan is to construct a concrete slab to be put in place at the grounds and then move an existing building that has already been identified onto the slab. It's possible he said that a small lean-to would be added. The structure could be expanded as needed in the future.

"We've already found an older building that is in good condition. We would set it on the concrete slab, fix it up and cover it with some rough-cut lumber to give it an old-timey look," Crago said.

All told the budget for the project would be between \$2,000 and \$3,000. Donations will be sought for materials and cash to cover expenses. Much of the work would be volunteer labor, Crago said. He added work on the project is expected to begin in the Spring of 2019 if not before, depending on how the winter weather plays out.

County Commission Hires New Highway Superintendent

news@bellefourchebeacon.com BELLE FOURCHE – The Butte County Commissioners met in the second meeting of this month on November 20, and finally hired a Highway Superintendent, raising Dwayne Heidrich from his position as foreman to the new spot. He has been doing the job without the title for some time.

"It took a while," said Chairman Frank Walton about the decision. "We were working toward it for a while."

Tony Smith, who was recently recognized by the commission for his exemplary service in the department recently, will be elevated to the foreman position. This came after a long executive session toward the end of the session on Tuesday.

In other decisions in the area of roads and bridges, the commissioners approved the work orders for three projects, and then discussed the area of general policy when it relates to road procedures.

Commissioner Kim Kling, in his final appearance on the board, spoke about the issue of cattle guards and encouraged the board to approve all-metal guards as well as those with

"They make them (cattle guards) with metal abutments and we need to make this a part of the policy," said Kling.

"The cattle guards are a land owner convenience," stated Commissioner Karrol Herman. "We need to mention that they will be inspected periodically and show that we hold them (landowners) responsible."

Auditor Elaine Jensen suggested that each cattle guard be noted with a GPS coordinate as well as a photo of the condition and the date.

"The key to this whole thing is the more documentation the better," said Jensen.

The group also discussed mail boxes, snow removal, sanding and minimum maintenance, an ongoing discussion.

Kling actually read the statute on minimum maintenance aloud and said that the county should not be required to change status



This weekend marks the beginning of Advent in many churches. It's a special season in the church year as it carves out time for us to prepare for the coming of Christmas when we celebrate the birth of Jesus. It's also a special time because it reminds us that the holidays - the holy days - can also be the hollow days, the days when we feel incapable of receiving "glad tidings of great joy." One of the songs that we often sing during Advent is the 12th century carol, O Come, Emmanuel. The first verse sets the tone: "O come, o come, Emmanuel and ransom captive Israel that mourns in lonely exile here until the Son of God appear." When we sing those words, we remember that the journey of grief can be as long as it is lonely. We remember the pain of separation. We remember what we had, and what we've lost.... And then,

we get to the refrain of assurance reminding us to: "Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel!" And with the refrain comes the reminder that we are not alone. With the refrain comes the assurance that God will find us, that God will heal our broken hearts, and that Emmanuel (which means "Godwith-us") will make it possible for us to once again rejoice.

If you find the coming holidays to be "hollow days", know that there is hope and know that there is help. Regional Health Home+ Hospice provides free bereavement services to the community. In Belle Fourche, there's an open grief support group that meets from 3pm-4pm the first and third Tuesday of each month (barring holidays) at St. James Lutheran Church. 

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New Director at Senior Citizens Center

Belle Fourche residents

may have become inured to the many detour and road closed signs in the city. But when those surround



the Belle Fourche Senior Citizens Center (BFSCC), they perhaps take on an even more ominous meaning. That's due to the well-known fact that the BFSCC has seen its share of troubles over the past few years and membership has dwindled

But just as the detour and road closed signs will eventually disappear, so too will the decline of the BFSCC if new director Laura Bennett has anything to say about it. And Laura has plenty to say.

Transplants from East River, Laura and her husband John, a retired engineer whose sister, Cyndi Rankin, is the Center's Board president, moved to the Belle Fourche area in 2016.

With a strong background in property management and a degree in Religious Education, Laura entered the fray last month with sleeves rolled up and a determined attitude to turn things around. She agreed to keep herself off the payroll until the Board of Directors feels that the Center is financially stable.

Looking back at the Center's

troubled past few years isn't going to accomplish anything, according to Laura.

"While we have the potential to serve five generations of seniors, so many people feel disconnected due to the many changes that we encounter as we grow older," she says "We need to welcome active participation and provide the types of activities that will attract participants and make people feel fulfilled every time they leave here."

Laura is already adding new activities and has launched a membership drive that will continue through January 31 of next year. Right now a oneyear membership costs \$10 but the cost will go up to \$12 on January 1, 2019. Memberships purchased before the end of the year will still cost \$10 and be good for all of 2019. While membership is open to those 45 years of age and older, only members 55 and older have voting rights. In line with that, Laura stresses the importance of all members participating in the open Board of Directors meetings.

"Right now we have seven members on our new Board of Directors, all with heart and vision for the BFSCC," she explains. The Board needs to seat two more people and Laura says, "Members with a vote can help fill those vacancies.'

The BFSCC is a non-profit which owns the building and provides a venue for the Meals Program which is run separately, paying the utilities and maintenance costs for the kitchen and dining room facilities. Laura says she has rooms available for rent for special events as well.

In any ambitious enterprise, it helps to have an able assistant. Laura has just that in office assistant Lana Johnson, a native of Martin, South Dakota, who came on board in June. Lana's assignment came via Experienceworks which pays her wages, relieving the Cent of any financial burden. She is currently concentrating her efforts on grant applications for the BFSCC.

And Laura has some pretty exciting projects up her rolledup sleeves. After the first of the year, she plans to start offering classes in self-defense and will have a health coach volunteering at the center. And even though senior citizens are the linchpin of BFSCC, Laura and the Board are looking to change the name of the facility and will hold a contest to do so with hopes the city of Belle Fourche will support this effort and the Belle Fourche Beacon will announce the winner! (We will). Even though the Belle Fourche Senior Citizens Center has faced some daunting challenges, it never gave up, according to Laura, because of the efforts of so many people including Velma Collins, Frances Hays,

Rosander. And in spite of any 'detours' or 'road closures' that could impede the Center's progress, Laura has an unobstructed view of what the Belle Fourche Senior Citizens Center can and

Looking down the road as the




















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Revitalize Belle Fourche Announces Third Annual Christmas Lights Contest



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
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NWS Weather Radar Out of Service for Up to Three Weeks for Upgrades

Local weather watchers in the tri-state area will need to look a bit harder in the coming weeks to keep apprised of incoming weather.

The Rapid City National Weather Service's WSR-88D Doppler Radar is currently undergoing a major hardware upgrade. The work was scheduled to began yesterday and the radar will be shut down for approximately three weeks. This means that the radar images used in a wide variety of online weather apps and website will not be available.

The upgrades include the replacement of the pedestal, the stand which rotates and positions the antenna. After the antenna is taken apart, the radar dome and pedestal will be removed by a crane. The new pedestal will then be lifted onto the deck, the dome replaced, and the antenna reassembled.

Rapid City National Weather Service Meteorologist David Hintz says once the work begins, the radar cannot be turned on again until work is complete.

"This work was scheduled to reduce the impact on our the impact on our forecasts. This time of year we typically don't have many storms. And our forecasters can monitor winter storms with satellite and ground station data, whereas radar is the primary tool we use for thunderstorms," Hintz said.

The radar and pedestal were designed to last 25 years, so this work will keep the radar functioning for at least another 20 years. The Rapid City radar was installed in 1995.

The pedestal replacement is the third major project of the NWS's NEXRAD Service Life Extension Program, a series of upgrades that will keep the nation's radars viable into the 2030's. The first project was the installation of the new

signal processor, and the second project was the refurbishment of the transmitter. The fourth project will be the refurbishment of the equipment shelters. The eight-year Service Life Extension Program will be complete in 2023.

During the work Belle Fourche area weather watchers won't be entirely "blind" to incoming precipitation. Images from the Bismarck, Aberdeen, North Platte, and Cheyenne, radars will still be available. There is some overlap in coverage with Rapid City's radar but areas particularly to the west and north of the Belle Fourche as well as over the Black Hills

region will essentially be in the

dark. The radar and pedestal were designed to last 25 years, so this work will keep the radar functioning for at least another 20 years. The Rapid City radar




> The old man replied, "But there must be tens of thousands of starfish on this beach. I'm afraid you won't really be able to make much of a difference."

"Kelli, how did you end up being a writer and living in the Black Hills?"

This is a question that should be answered in two parts. How I became a writer is a story with deep roots in "the Hills." The second part of the question - how I ended up living in the Black Hills - is another fun story. Let's start with part one...

Since I was a young girl, I have always loved to read. My favorite series of books was The Little House on the Prairie series by Laura Ingalls Wilder. My love for reading stories quickly turned into a desire to write them. My grandma's Christmas gift to me each year was a subscription to Western Horseman, and my grandpa's gifts were boxes full of books. I read them all voraciously.

I earned a Bachelors in Media Studies from the University of Sioux Falls (USF), and one of my requirements for graduation was to do an internship. As I looked around for internship opportunities, I stumbled across Black Hills based equine publication, Today's Horse Magazine. I approached them about doing an internship, and they agreed. I was thrilled! I spent the summer in my favorite place, the Black Hills, writing stories about horses and horse people. It was a summer of firsts like my first published articles and my first time meeting many of the prominent western people I'd admired from afar. I learned the art of pitching a story and writing a well-organized piece of work. It set me on the path of becoming a freelance writer when I returned to college that fall.

My family has always had a deep connection to the Black Hills. Though my family roots

come from the eastern side of the state (my dad was raised on the Bones Hereford Ranch near Parker, South Dakota, and my mom's parents grew up in Sioux Falls), we've always loved spending time in the Hills. I spent many summers working at a Christian ranch camp between Sturgis and Rapid City (Rainbow Bible Ranch), and our family spent many holidays

at our cabin in Boulder Canyon. I always dreamed of moving to the Hills, even before I met my husband, Dane Kissack. He and I met through a perfect intersection of my love for horses, the Hills, and writing. By this time I'd graduated from USF, and I was freelancing for several magazines. My editor at Horse Country Living Magazine (thanks Maggie!) assigned me to write an article about a young roper from Belle Fourche named Dane Kissack. Though I'd spent time in the area, I'd never met Dane or his parents, Phil and Terri Kissack. Dane happened to be hosting a roping clinic that June with Jay Mattson near Sturgis, South Dakota. It was the only time he'd be home for an interview,

since he was spending the rest of the summer at rodeos all over the West.

I showed up to do the interview, and he pretended to be very occupied with his students. He said, "You know, I'm really busy right now and can't do the interview, but I can definitely answer questions tonight over dinner." Smooth Dane, smooth...

I dubiously agreed to this strange turn of events, and what started as a professional interview turned into wedding bells just under a year later. On May 24th, 2015, I became Kelli Kissack, and my address officially became the Black Hills of South Dakota. I believe that the Lord used all of my loves - horses, writing, and the Black Hills to bring Dane and I together. Now, I am extraordinarily blessed to be working as a writer and photographer in the region I love so dearly. We also travel a great deal, since Dane is competing as a professional calf roper with the goal of qualifying for the National Finals Rodeo. I see a lot of country, but I'm always happy to get "home to the


Komes Family Provides "My Three Sons" for the Military

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Eight Essentials to Guide You When Packing for the Hunt

This Column is written by Brian Mehmen, the Founder of Rolling Bones Outfitters, headquartered in the Northern Black Hills. Brian hunts throughout the Tri-state Region, North America and the world and hosts the Rolling Bones TV show, "No Boundaries."

Here we are! Not only is the holiday season in full swing but so is the hunting season. For us at Rolling Bones, and perhaps for you as well, it's antelope in August and then coyotes, fox, bobcat, deer, elk, moose. We are in an area that we can be hunting several different states or animals in a short period of time. It's not uncommon for me

to hunt deer in South Dakota on Saturday, Wyoming on Wednesday and Montana Friday. Why I tell you this is because packing and repacking

would be next to impossible, so we really need to be prepared and have what we need and be prepared for a lot of different situations and a lot of the same. Here are eight things to keep in

1. Don't take the kitchen sink. Pack light is packed right.

I personally am not a fan of having everything plus the kitchen sink in my pack. I am also not a fan of not having what I need. So it's a balancing act. Most of our hunts are

day hunts so we are not living out of our packs. We will talk today about having a pack ready to grab and go!

2. Pick the right size pack. I am not big on

having a huge pack for day trips. I want about 3200 to 3600 cubic inches. I look for something with belt pockets and external pockets. The packs on our web are all hand picked to meet this criteria. These easy access pockets are great for getting to things you may need quickly, wind bottle, flashlight, gloves, knife, etc. I also want a deep main pouch with a water bladder pocket. Adjustable shoulder straps are huge for me at 6'4" it has to adjust.

3. Think "hands and head" when you begin packing.

When choosing what to pack first, I start with hands and head. As funny as it sounds if my feet and hands are cold I am cold. I have two stocking caps and three pair of gloves and an extra pair of socks with me at all times. This allows me to layer up or layer down my head, feet and hands.

4. A list of the essentials.

I have a shell, down jacket and rain gear. This allows me to get in a place and glass for hours no matter the weather. Flash light, 2 knives, wind bottle, extra batteries, small knife sharpener, paracord, fire starter, ear plugs, calls, tags, pen, an extra box of bullets, camera, phone scope, spotting scope, tripod, binoculars, shooting sticks, dry bag, pack cover. I am now ready for day-to-day hunting in most any state out west and can stay out from sun up to sun down!

5. Think of your pack like a toolbox.

The way I look at it, a pack should allow me to leave the truck and go all day if necessary. Or to move out for a mile or so, glass for a couple hours, come back to the truck and move on! My pack is my toolbox and I need all the tools in it at different times each day or at various times throughout the season.

6. Think of your pack like a hunting partner.

A good pack is one you're in and out of everyday and is your go to location. It should be one of your best hunting partners. Choose it wisely and lay it out with some thought and you will be surprised at how ready you will be to go hunting on a

moment's notice. 7. Bring a tote and backup. There are a lot of ways to hunt and each day can be different. I have one pack that has my main hunting items in it. I also carry a plastic tote box in the back of my truck with all the duplicates, extras and reserve gear I might need. I do put a bigger pack in that tote, for the simple reason that I may have to pack out a

The transition team will work with Governor-elect Noem and Lieutenant Governor-elect Rhoden to develop policy proposals for the upcoming legislative session, prepare Governor-elect Noem's budget proposal, and identify and screen candidates for the Governor's Cabinet and Staff. The team will work closely with Governor Dennis Daugaard to ensure an orderly transition to the new administration.

Matt McCaulley will chair the transition team. McCaulley is a partner with Redstone Law Firm in Sioux Falls, and has previously served as legal counsel to Governor-elect Noem for nearly a decade. He served in the State House of Representatives from 2001-2004, and also served as the chair of the House Judiciary Committee in 2003-2004.

Herb Jones was the deputy campaign manager of the Kristi for Governor campaign. Jones' extensive government experience includes work in the Janklow, Mickelson, and Miller administrations and as chief of staff to U.S. Senator John Thune. Jones previously chaired Noem's 2010 congressional transition team.

Steve Westra is the President of Hegg Hospitality Management, and COO of Hegg Companies Inc. Westra served in the State House of Representatives from 2013-2016, including two years as assistant majority leader. He currently serves on the State Tourism Advisory Board.

Liza Clark is commissioner of the Bureau of Finance and Management, the state's chief financial officer. Clark joined BFM in 2005, including six years as chief budget analyst. She spent three years in Governor Daugaard's office as a policy advisor, advising on issues relating to labor and regulation, workforce development, human resources, and higher education.

Kennedy Noem is a senior at South Dakota State University, where she is majoring in political science with a minor in economics. She is the daughter of Governor-elect Noem.

Lieutenant Governor-elect Larry Rhoden will also serve on the transition team.

The transition team is committed to the Four Pillars of Protection that Governor-elect Noem and Lieutenant Governor-elect Rhoden have promised to the State of South Dakota. The transition team will serve until January 5, 2019.

Tony Venhuizen has been designated by the Daugaard administration to serve as liaison to the Noem transition team. Venhuizen, who serves as Governor Daugaard's chief of staff, also worked in the 2002 Rounds transition and the 2010 Daugaard transition.

of "four pounds per person per month" is left to the loyalty and sense of fair play of the consumer and retailers. These sugar cards having answered their purpose and the system abandoned, the cards may be destroyed.

Ask Aid Of Bolsheviks London, Nov. 25 – Chaotic political conditions in Germany are emphasized in reports received here from Amsterdam and Copenhagen based on direct tele-

grams from German cities. The Spartacus group at Dusseldorf is reported to have proclaimed a proletarian dictatorship and arrested the burgomaster. Dr. Karl Liebknecht, radical socialist, was acclaimed at a Spartacus meeting in Berlin.

State Casualties Summarized to Date A summary of the South Dakota overseas casualties to date shows the following interesting figures. There has been a total of 353 casualties among the South Dakota troops fighting in France. In the statement, the largest number of casualties of any one kind are the wounded severely of which there are 133. There have been 72 Dakotans killed in action. Fifty-three have died of disease. Twenty-nine men have been wounded, degree undetermined. 27 men have been reported missing in action. The number who died from wounds is 21. Fifteen men were wounded slightly. Two men met their death by accident. Only one man, Private Christ Veflin of Ellington, is reported as being a
