All the candidates for City and School positions provided profiles and pictures to be presented to the public.

The election is just six days away and all voting will take place at the Belle Fourche Community Hall, 510 6th Avenue. Polls are open 7 to 7 on Tuesday, April 13th.

All candidates for Mayor and City Council positions answered the Beacon's questionaire and those were published in last weeks issue.

We received a final questionaire from 4th Ward Candidate Derrick Jones last Sunday.

It arrived before any others were published, but too late to be included with them.

To provide his answers to the voters prior to the election they are published below:

Derrick Jones Ward 4

Question #1 Why should voters vote for me?

I am willing to listen to the community. I have years of leadership experience and recognize that those closest to the work have great ideas and are invested in improving the work they do. Within the city there are many people with the talents, skills, and know-how to bring the best results. My role as a City Councilman is to listen and to be their voice. I believe in being a positive leader and working with others to make good educated decisions that build a strong community. *Question #2 If elected what are* three things you may wish to <u>help accomplish?</u>

Currently Belle Fourche has the potential to see a lot of growth. People are moving in and businesses are starting up. I want to be part of that growth and help guide Belle through it. I believe we need a vision of what we want Belle to be in the future and an organized plan of how to achieve it. Then we need to work together to make

I would like to be involved in developing that vision which would include:

it happen.

1. Revitalizing downtown and leveraging the Belle industrial and rail parks to bring in more business.

2. Urban planning is another issue that needs to be addressed. There is very little housing for people who want to move in. There also is a need for affordable housing. Where is the next subdivision going? Do we have contractors to build them? As a city we need to help incentivize these projects and be part of the process. We need to develop a rolling 5-year plan and budget

accordingly. 3. Communication and unity. We have a lot of great individuals and organizations in Belle Fourche that are trying to bring positive growth to the community. I see the need to unify under a common vision. We can accomplish a lot working together not caring who gets the credit, but ensuring that we are accomplish our goals. I believe that the basis for unity comes from communication. When we have a vision and communicate it with others and allow them to contribute with their expertise many wonderful things can happen.

Question #3 There has been some conversation about our City government being more open and informative with the peoples' business. City Unveils Three New Redevelopment Districts

BELLE FOURCHE - As a result of the recent housing study renewed emphasis will now be focused on sprucing up a few neighborhoods in the city.

Last week local organizations along with the city announced the formation of three new redevelopment districts located from the central part of the city northward. Anyone living in these districts may qualify for tax breaks and low interest loans if they choose to build, remodel or renovate. The rules also apply to businesses within the district.

The housing study, like the one completed in 2013, told a familiar story, according to Belle Fourche Mayor Gloria Landphere, which is Belle Fourche needs affordable housing.

"That comes in many different ways," Landphere told the gathering last week. "A lot of times people think that it just comes through the building of houses. But it's through renovations, apartment buildings, all of that kind of thing."

Krysti Weed, City Engineering Assistant outlined the three main conclusions that prompted the formation of the redevelopment districts.

"Their recommendations were to promote rental housing rehabilitation programs, to promote owner-occupied housing rehabilitation efforts and also to continue neighborhood revitalization efforts," Weed said.

A new city ordinance was passed March 1st to create the districts, which went into effect this week. This allows for property tax breaks to be given for new structures and additions and adding the classification of these areas as redevelopment neighborhoods.

Three new homes are going up in one of the districts at the corner of Aurora and Eight Avenue, according to Mike Walker, Ex. Director of NeighborWorks in Belle Fourche. Neighbor-Works also plans to spread the word about programs that they

"In the next few weeks we're going to be targeting the three

redevelopment districts with a little door hanger to promote our rehab programs and our down payment closing cost assistance programs," Walker said. "With our organization we're trying to reach every single area of housing, whether its helping people clean up their credit to help the purchase a home, or helping with budgeting through our homebuyer education piece."

In addition to Neighbor-Works efforts with the three new homes in Ward 1 they are also involved in two additional new homes in the greater Belle Fourche area.

Bringing developers to the table to assist with redevelopment and new home development

will be a renewed focused of the Belle Fourche Development Corporation (BFDC), according to organization Vice President Wendy Bowers. BFDC has been active with the West River Foundation and Belle Fourche High School in building a new home each year, usually on a lot that was vacant or had a dilapi-

dated home. "With the housing study we decided we needed to expand our focus," Bowers said. "We have revamped our efforts toward trying to bring developers to the table.'

To help with that effort BFDC has sought the guidance from pat Kurtenbach of the West River Business Center who was instrumental in helping Sturgis develop and redevelop areas of that community.

ing off the individuals around them to make good decisions. I think a less formal periodic town hall would be appropriate. The city could layout plans and accomplishment and answer questions. I think education is part of the answer to transparent government.

Question #4 Belle Fourche stands on the edge of having growth in jobs and business. What role do you think the city government should play in accommodating these opportunities brought on by this growth? 1. Housing

The city needs to have a plan. We need to be actively engaged and intentional in what happens. We need to work with others to provide housing at all levels. We don't want industrial mixed in with housing. We want to provide the best quality of life for the people that live in Belle Fourche. We need to incentivize building subdivisions. Housing means people and people are the building blocks of our city.

2. Business

We need to be open to business and be willing to offer incentives to encourage them to come to Belle Fourche. They will open somewhere, so why not here? We need to work

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

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Pastor's Perspective

This week's Pastor's Perspective is provided by Chad McCord, Belle Fourche Connection Church

"Jesus' Last Words to His Disciples."

My name is Chad McCord and I am the new associate pastor of discipleship and missions at Connection Church. I've been married to my wife, Alysia, for over 18 years, and we have three daughters—Maggie, Elizabeth Ann, and Josie. Previously, we served 15 years overseas in SE Asia planting churches among Hindus and Muslims.

A person's last words are very important. Anyone who has had someone dear to them whose life was fading knows the importance of that's person's final words. It can be a time to convey final wishes or words of encouragement and love.

In Matthew 28:18-20, we find some of Jesus' last words to his disciples. And as you can imagine, these words were very important. Jesus was about to physically leave the men in whom he had deeply invested for 3 years. Jesus always had a knack for delivering a timely word, and this one was spot on. Jesus gave the

disciples their marching orders.

In verse 19, Jesus says, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations…". The "Go" here in the original Greek has the effect of "as you are going." So, as we are living our lives according to the will of God, we are to make disciples. Scripture is not clear if those hearing these words were just Jesus' close band of disciples or up to 500 believers like is mentioned in I Cor. 15:6, but we know his words were meant for all believers in Jesus Christ. We have something in us that wants to make disciples. If you are a big sports fan and you have a favorite team, you want everyone to be a fan of your team. You talk about your team and how great the players and the coach are. You want others to join you in your passion for this team. I personally love sports, and I want everyone to like my favorite teams. Our passion for knowing Jesus, however, and wanting others to know Jesus should be far

superior to our passion for sports, or cooking, or whatever hobbies we give a part of our lives to. If Jesus is who he claimed to be, and who we believe he is (the one and only Savior—John 14:6), then our passion for making disciples for Christ should be unparalleled. Question #10 High taxes on property prevent consumers from building in Belle Fourche city limits. How

can we work toward being more tax friendly?

The city's primary source of revenue is taxation—not land or property sales. By developing our community through housing, business, and jobs we widen our tax base. With a wider tax base, taxes don't have to be as high as they currently are or raised to facilitate need. A land or property sale is a one-time transaction, but taxes are ongoing. There are programs that reduce taxes for a period of time to allow business to get started. We need to be business friendly to widen the tax base and then provide support to strengthen and grow those businesses.

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



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Looking Back in Belle

These articles come from newspaper microfilm from the Belle Fourche Public library, using a new microfilm reader and printer. The photographs are from the Tri-State Museum.

124 years ago Northwest Times April 10, 1897

"More Than Reported" Last week papers all over the Hills contained "painted" reports of the situation at Belle Fourche. Following are a few phrases clipped from exchanges: "At Belle Fourche the situation was last evening reported as critical." "Grave fears were also apprehended for the town unless the gorge was soon broken." "At the railroad bridge an ice gorge has formed, backing the water up for ten miles." And "The Belle Fourche river is higher than ever before known." And here is one still worse. "The town is inundated, and the water is in the first floor of the bank.' In the valley the situation is more than serious, and much damage will result to farmers." "The wagon bridge and railroad bridge at Belle Fourche are completely destroyed." These and other equally exaggerated reports were ready in last week's papers. The facts are, that with the exception of slight damage to the two bridges, nothing suffered in the least. Had it not been for the ice choking the main channel and forcing the water around this would not have been.

John Pierce Returns John Pierce, the well known promoter, returned today from New York City; accompanied by William Lees, a capitalist from Manchester, England. The two gentlemen arrived on the Elkhorn and were met at Deadwood by Messrs. McAllen, Moody, Halloran and Wilson. They immediately drove to this city and will remain for several days. Mr. Lees comes to the Black Hills for the purpose of investigating the Lardner property, which is situated north of the Homestake. Mr. Pierce and Mr. Lees have been interested together for fifteen years in different investments and the latter gentleman has, besides the energy and progressiveness which is characteristic of John Pierce, unlimited means. There is a mining deal that interests Belle Fourche. Mr. Pierce has stated since his return that the original idea of locating the mills at Belle Fourche will be carried out. Mr. Pierce has done more to interest capital in the Black Hills during the past six months than any other man has accomplished in several years. It is still thought everything will be in shape to begin active work at this place in June.

100 Years Ago Northwest Post

April 7, 1921 Land Sink Out Of Sight Pierre, S.D. March 26 – The numerous rumors that somewhere in western South Dakota, nobody knew just where, a tract of land had mysteriously sunk from view, were substantiated. Settlers living in the valley of Tepee creek, between Tivis and White Owl, had their attention called during the latter part of

December to frequent thunder-like noises which occurred during the day and night, in clear and cloudy weather and regardless of the temperature. About two weeks ago, a rancher riding the range in search of stray stock, came upon an immense hole in the ground, seven miles from his claim, where last fall there had been no break in the surface. This hole is about twenty-five miles northwest of Tivis in the Tepee Creek valley. Upon investigating, this rancher found that between fifteen and twenty acres had dropped from sight leaving a hole whose sides are almost perpendicular, the bottom of which cannot be seen. When a large boulder was rolled into a pit, no sound of its striking bottom could be heard. The area ranchers have asked that a state geologist be sent out from one of the state institutions to investigate the hole.

Treaty Negotiations Washington, April 5 – The American state department is expected to approve of the treaty signed between Russia and Iran. Signing of the agreement was announced today in Tehran and Moscow. It calls for the establishment of a joint Russian-Iranian oil company to develop Iran's unexploited oil resources, and also provides for complete evacuation of the Red army from Iran by May 5. In addition the treaty recognizes the Azerbaijan problem as an internal one to be handled by the government of Iran. The British are not too happy over the prospect. They have wide oil properties in Iran.

I won an election 334 to 192. Thompson not only won that election against two opponents, but was re-elected last year with one opponent. The only "appointment" ever made to a school board is an interim appointment made to fill a vacancy until the next regular election. This is a legal necessity when a board member dies or moves away from the district before the election date which is established by state law, and such appointments are very rare. There is a school board election every year. If the Daily Post is ignorant of the facts, you should at least keep your ignorance to yourself instead of publishing it.

Aggressiveness Builds Dreams & Communities

There's an old maxim that goes, "A problem well defined is a problem half solved This is so true in the transformation of your community, in business, as well as in our personal lives. In the technology world, we are taught the theory or

principle of "Diffusion of Innovations". This theory tells us it takes the same amount of time for new innovations to become used and perfected by 10% of the early adopters as it will for the next 80% of the population to adapt and embrace it. Simply put, the longer a sustainable innovation is around, the rate or speed of adoption accelerates rapidly. While this is a technology principle, it can be adapted to most innovations, and I also might add, to community and business transformation.

Translating this into a community or business venture, there are always a few, say the 10% tending to do the heavy lifting or work early on in the project. For true transformation to be made possible in smaller communities allowing it to take hold, we need the 80% or the entire community kicking in to reach the heights possible. As they say, 'many hands make light work' in order to avoid burnout of those leading the charge. It takes many hands willing to pick up the mantle of work allowing for sustaining a consistent and long-term transformation.

Albert Einstein taught, there is no such thing as darkness, that there is simply an absence of light. That being the case, in community and business building, there is no such thing as inaction, only an absence of action. Years ago, I

John Newby action. Tears 250, 1 Uchtdorf tell the audience that we must "lift where we stand". Now is the time to cast inaction aside springing into action and lift where we stand in our community. There is no better time than now to become the light and action within your community and business.

> Last week we discussed how forward-thinking communities are in the business of building dreams. They are busy creating an environment of trust, innovation, friendly competition, quality-of-life, teamwork, motivation, and other business-friendly attributes. They do this at all levels of their community by involving the entire community from their citizens to their local government in the process. They understand the true power of teamwork and how building a business-friendly community attracts not only entrepreneurs, but others seeking this vibrant mindset.

> Communities must be aggressive and focused on business attracting change. They must be willing to embrace the needed change which isn't always easy. Change brings disruption,

disruption upends the status quo, which in turn can make many uncomfortable. It is human nature to resist chang even when we know change is necessary. As General Shinseki once said to his troops, "If you don't like change, you will like irrelevance even less". It is the fast and adept that will transform most effectively, the slow will be roadkill on the road to transformation.

It took TV thirty-years to reach 90% of the households, it took computers twenty years to reach 90% of the households, it took cell phones ten years to reach mass adoption. Likewise, the period of time which communities have left to transform is shrinking, even as the world speeds up.



NEWELL – He is a familiar face around the Newell landscape as he continues to be active in the community. Ken Wetz, Newell's present Mayor, is running for another term because he wants to press on with plans that ready to be put into process.

"The first term has been a challenge," Wetz said, "and I want to continue with our plans."

Wetz grew up in Vale, married his childhood sweetheart and then moved to Newell in 1978. He taught school for nine years, subsequently taking on a position with Butte Electric Cooperative for 33 years before retiring. He has been active in the community as a Lion, part of the Historical Society, and as a member of St. Mary's Star of the Sea. Holding every office as a Lion, helped Wetz seize the opportunity to fulfill the office of District Governor and Council Chair. He also served as South Dakota House Representative for four years in 1997-2000.


The response to the call of these organizations has given Wetz a broader view of what other places have available and how to collaborate with different entities.

Financially, Newell is in good shape and can continue so with a conservative view according to Wetz. Late March High Winds Cause a Ruckus Throughout the Area

NVN Area - Both Nisland/Arpan Search and Rescue and Vale Fire Department were called to a truck rollover north of the Belle Fourche River bridge on Highway 79 south of Newell on Monday morning. Butte County Sheriff's Deputies and Sheriff Fred Lamphere, along with two South Dakota Highway Patrol Troopers, the scene was secured as the two fire departments dealt with the truck, which was traveling to Washington state.

The driver was relatively uninjured and not transported, even though Butte County Ambulance, Newell, was called to the scene. Paramedics and EMT's on scene assessed and gave minor treatment to the drive. The incident was caused by wind gusts of up to 50-60 mph. The driver lost

control of his truck and empty trailer as he was hit by an extremely strong gust of wind, according to the trooper in charge.

Deputy Jason Huber, the newest member of the Butte County squad was in charge of keeping track of the driver's belongings which law enforcement and fire department personnel removed from the truck which was on its side on the east side of the road ditch.

"Due to the short area of skid marks and the fact that there's only one side of the truck's tires showing a skid, he probably didn't have any control," said the deputy.

Before the Highway Patrol officers in charge were finished with this incident, the Vale fire department was asked to respond to a fire out of control at the Buffalo Chip campground for mutual assistance.

"Buffalo Chip's fire started as embers in their dump were fanned into flame and came out of the dump," said Vale Fire Chief Mike Gruble. "We had two units on that scene.'

Then the patrol troopers were asked to respond to another truck rollover, this time close to Buffalo. While one trooper stayed on site, the other took off to respond. The incident near Buffalo was another semitruck, which has slammed into the side of a bridge and the trailer went over the end, about 1.5 miles south of Ludlow.

"Thank you to the Ludlow Fire crew that did traffic control on this accident for over four hours in unbelievable windy conditions," said the Harding County Sheriff's Office. "Winds were gusting to 68 mph." Just after this accident those same first responders were called to a prairie fire in Perkin County.

Following the wrap-up of the truck roll-

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Then and Now in Newell

"Looking Forward to our Past" by Linda Velder

April 6, 1911

Louis Kemp of Sturgis was at Newell Friday looking over the field for a pool hall. He concluded that 3 pool halls would be too much for Newell and has decided to put one up at Nisland.

C.F. McClung, of Newell, was a Sunday visitor in Deadwood. He is one of the best cornetists in this part of the state, having been associated with some of the best musical organizations of the country. His last engagement was with the well known Raven Concert Band at Toronto, Canada. He is now holding down a claim near Newell

Our minister was walking along the street, saw a crowd of boys in a ring around a small dog. He asked them what they are doing with the dog. The boys spoke up, who ever tells the biggest lie, and he wins the dog. Oh good and well, said the minister, for when I was a lad, I never told a lie. A moment of silence followed, finally one boy said, give the gent the dog.

April 7, 1921

An effort will be made by the Commissioner in charge of the Arbor Day Observance program to have all business houses (so far as practical) close all day so that all our citizens may participate in the good work. Keep Friday April 22 date in mind.

Snow flurries and high winds have characterized the weather for the better part of the week since Sunday. A heavy snow fall is reported nearer the Hills. The storm seems to be general throughout the West.

Orville Merrill met with quite an accident early Sunday morning while returning from a dance east of Vale, when in some manner the horse which he was riding fell on him. The accident happened near the C.J. Kendall place and help was summoned from there. He was taken home and now ill of pneumonia in addition to the hurts sustained in his fall.

April 9, 1931

The seniors and members of the Newell High School faculty received invitations to the Junior-Senior Prom and Banquet, which is to be given Saturday evening, April 18.

If mice get into your automobile when it is stored for the winter, there are several ways to get rid of them, but William Barber, who lives on a farm near here, has found that carbon monoxide will do the work most efficiently. He discovered a mouse, with indication that there were many more doing damage to the upholstery. He put the machine in his closed garage, started the motor and stepped outside to wait. 30 minutes later there were 35 dead mice in the car.

General Manager Lee Boyer

has issued a \$100 reward to be paid for information leading to the arrest and conviction of anyone breaking insulators or otherwise damaging the power lines of the Consolidated Power & Light Co in and around Newell.

April 10, 1941

Plans for moving the fire siren from the present fire department building to the City Hall were announced Tuesday evening at a special meeting of the Newell Volunteer Fire Department. Tentatively, the move is planned for Friday and will require several hours, after which it is expected only a single blast will be given for alarms until "hook-ups" are completed. The public is requested to bear this in mind over the coming week end.

All children of the surrounding territory up to and including 12 years age have been invited to Newell this coming Saturday to enjoy a free show and participate in an Easter egg hunt sponsored by the Newell Jr. Chamber of Commerce. The show "Saps at Sea" starring Oliver & Hardy famous comedy team, will start at 2:00 PM after which the hunt will start. Approximately 500 beautifully colored Easter eggs to be found, with hundreds of prizes which include candy, toys, merchandise and cash donated by merchants. The hunt will be divided into 2 groups - school age and pre-school.

South Hilan was well represented in Belle Fourche Saturday, many attending the industrial show and others the county spelling and declamatory contest. At the later, South Hilan pupils as usual reaped their share of honors. The Webb and Milberg Schools also came home with trophies. Congratulations to the young folks and teachers.

April 12, 1951

Word was received last week that Julian A. Guerrero, 21 year old son of Mr. & Mrs. Felix Guerrero, formerly of Newell, now of Lead, was missing in action in Korea. The War Department said he had been missing since February 12. Guerrero attended school in Newell and was graduated from Lead High School 1948, joined the Army 1949 then left for Korea December 1950.

Fact that C.J. McTighe, well known farmer of the Maurine community had to enter the Rapid City hospital several weeks ago for medical treatment hasn't interfered with his spring farm operations. With Fred Hampton, acting as co coordinator, the neighbors pitched in, seeded 140 acres of wheat and plowed 60 acres for corn and oats. 4 tractors with plows were used, 5 with discs and 4 drills it was wound up in a hurry. To help Mrs. McTighe,

This week was nice and warm, but the wind was awful! When I looked out the window Monday

morning the dust storm outside looked like the dirty thirties. The 75mph wind was so strong you could barely stand up outside and it blew a semi over near Ludlow. Taz and Reub got all the firefighting units filled with water and ready to go, which was a really good thing because there were several fires in the Black Hills and the Divide fire over east of us started up that evening.

We didn't have any electricity when we woke up Tuesday morning because the Divide fire burned several power poles to the Ellingson sub-station, which is where our electricity comes from. The guys had the generator hooked up so we had electricity at the house before I left for Bowman that morning to get the oil changed in my pickup. RonE Jenson and Taz took the Ralph firetruck down to help fight the fire and saw a lot of damage. Max and Joyce Matthews lost several outbuildings, all of their hay and a lot of their sheep had to be put down because they were so badly burned, but the firemen managed to save their house. Tom Brockel had some livestock burned and his shop and all his tools were a total loss. His cattle shed that was full of trucks burned up, he lost some hay stacks, his silage pile, his fertilizer spreader and an antique tractor he'd gotten from his uncle. No houses were lost, but the fire was devastating to

the community.

The Divide fire flared up again and was still burning on Wednesday when Reub and I went down to visit his brother Doug Olson in the hospital in Sturgis. Doug fell while he was out feeding cows and broke his hip. His son Chip took him to

the hospital in Rapid City for surgery and then Doug was sent back to the hospital in Sturgis to recuperate. Hopefully, he'll be able to get out of the hospital soon. We got home late that afternoon in time for me to catch a ride with Henry and Linda Mohagen to

our EMT meeting in
Buffalo that evening.
The EMT meeting
was supposed to be
Monday evening but
the ambulance crew
that took care of the
guy in the semi wreck
near Ludlow couldn't get

back in time so the meeting was changed to Wednesday evening.

Loren Opstedahl and his crew came to shear our sheep on Thursday. Sage and his kids came down from Hettinger to help Casey and Taz with the shearing and Missy and Amanda put in a lot of hours working too. Louise Jenson came to help for a while before she had to leave for Jim Erk's retirement party in Buffalo. Rosie Hotchkiss is home from Scotland for now and she and her sister-inlaw Jessie Hotchkiss hauled Rosie's sheep up here so the shearers could shear her sheep after they finished shearing our sheep. Reub and I had to leave before the shearers were finished in order to make it to the Maundy Thursday supper and communion service at the church that evening.

Trig came home from college Thursday afternoon for Easter and Bryce and Braxton Hespe came home from Wyoming Friday afternoon. Taz left Friday morning for the bull dogging school in Bowman that the Harding County cowboys were putting on this Friday and Saturday.

Saturday morning I watched Mike Lindell's documentary "Scientific Proof" about election fraud on QANN TV, which I found to be very interesting. Taz and Trig left that morning for the bull dogging school in Bowman again and Matt and Lanie Klug and the kids came

down to spend Easter weekend here on the ranch. Amanda and the kids went up before lunch to RonE and Starla Jenson's to celebrate Easter at their house with all the Jenson kids and Grandma Louise Jenson on Saturday. Trig dropped Taz off there on the way home from the bull dogging school in Bowman.

It was fun to have four generations of Olson's at the sunrise Easter service at Slim Buttes Lutheran Sunday morning. There was an Easter egg hunt for the little people after church and then the guys cooked pancakes and sausage to feed the congregation. We joined all of Casey and Missy's kids and grandkids for Easter dinner at Casey and Missy's house and had so much food that I'm not going to get on the scale for a couple weeks because of probable weight gain, although I did manage to take an almost 4 mile hike across the prairie that afternoon.

High winds compounded drought conditions in this area Tuesday filling the air with top soil, toppling stock shelters and stockades and also causing other miscellaneous damages. The winds quickly evaporated moisture from the Monday night shower, some fences were covered by drifts of soil and debris and many irrigation ditches were also filled. Irrigation Manager Victor

Preliminary plans for the 1961 softball season were discussed with a general meeting to be held later this month.


