Cannabis Renewal Pending

The Butte County Commissioners denied renewal of the dispensary license for Redwater Cannabis at the regular meeting held April 6. Attorney Nathan Chicoine from Rapid City submitted information that the dispensary was compliant with the newest ordinance although the 1000 ft. from a residence rule was in question. He asked at what point the measurements were to be taken.

Commissioner Chad Erk pointed out that the ordinance the license was approved under last year did not allow an establishment to be open on Saturdays and that he had noticed Redwater Cannabis was open on Saturday. He also showed him Section 8 of Ordinance 2021-02 states "The provisions of this Second Amended Ordinance supersedes all requirements and provisions of any Ordinance or Amended Ordinance issued prior to the effective date of this Second Amended Ordinance. All pending or future applications for Butte County medical cannabis permits must comply with this

Second Amended Ordinance.' Erk moved to deny renewal

of Redwater Cannabis license according to Section 4, 5A-the 1000 ft. rule and also not following the times according to the ordinance. This motion failed and a second motion was made by Commissioner James Ager to table any action pending further discussion with the State's Attorney and Redwater Cannabis' attorney.

Prior to the discussion surrounding the license renewal, several Butte County citizens shared their concerns.

Dale Simanton reminded the commissioners that marijuana is not a medicine and asked them to not give any variance to a marijuana grower or dispensary.

Katie Hoffman had a list of several items, including the duties of the State's Attorney and urged the commissioners to visit Hoffman's FB page to check out what Nathan Stalway had to say. She also implored the commissioners to approve the new subdivision ordinance.

Sue Broadhurst had asked various questions at earlier

Reder, La Duke-Pelster Elected to School Board

news@bellefourchebeacon.com BELLE FOURCHE - Incumbent Scott Reder and Faye LaDuke-Pelster were elected to the Belle Fourche School Board after results from the election on April 11.

Reder and LaDuke-Pelster were the top two vote getters of the three who were vying for the two seats. Past board member Wayne Gilbert was also running.

There were an unofficial total of 466 votes cast out of 5,468 active registered voters in the county, not all who were eligible to vote in the Belle Fourche election. The voter turnout was less than 10%.

Reder, the current board Vice President, received 204 votes, LaDuke-Pelster tallied 187 votes and Gilbert garnered 75

Reder is an incumbent who began his first three-year term in 2020 and currently serves as School Board Vice President. He is a local rancher, former Roundup Committee Chairman and a Commercial and Ag Lender at Pioneer Bank and Trust.

"I would just like to thank all of the residents that voted and to let them know that I will always put the children's best interest forward while trying to be financially responsible," Reder told the Beacon.

LaDuke-Pelster is the Chair for the School of Education at Black Hills State University. She was elected to her first term on the school board and will take the seat that will be vacated by Tammy Clem, current School Board President, who chose not to stand for re-election.

"I want to congratulate Scott Reder," she said. "I'm happy with the election results and am looking forward to serving on the board."

LaDuke-Pelster will begin her first term on July 10.

The following are bios provided by each candidate prior to the election beginning with Reder.

"I have been a lifelong resident of Butte County and the Belle Fourche area. I went to high school in Newell and attended college at SDSU, graduating with bachelor's degrees in Animal Science and Ag Business. I married my wife Angela in 1998 and we have three children, all of whom have received the entirety of their education in the Belle Fourche school district. We are a ranching family and are all very active in our local community. I work as a loan officer at Pioneer Bank and Trust in Belle Fourche," Reder said.

Faye LaDuke-Pelster: "My husband Chad and I have lived in Belle Fourche for 17 years. We have two children. Syd is a freshman at Belle Fourche High School and Cade is a 5th

grader at Belle Fourche Middle School. Chad is an Agriculture Loan Officer at First Interstate Bank. For the past 17 years, I have worked at Black Hills State University in the School of Education. I teach Reading Methods to undergraduate pre-service teachers majoring in Elementary Education and K-12 Special Education. I also teach graduate courses for teachers pursuing a master's degree in Reading. In addition to the courses I teach, I am the Department Chair in the School of Education. Prior to working at BHSU, I was an elementary teacher and a K-12 Literacy Coach in the Todd County School District in Mission, SD. I have a Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education from the University of Wyoming, a Master of Education in Reading from West Texas A&M University and a Doctor of Education in Curriculum and Instruction with a Reading emphasis from the University of South Dakota.

"In our spare time, Chad and I really enjoy traveling to games, track meets and rodeos to watch our kids compete," LaDuke-Pelster said.

Sen. John Thune Addresses HS Students

Dressed casually in a plaid shirt, clean boots, and khaki trousers, South Dakota Senator John Thune appeared to be quite at home in the Belle Fourche high school gymnasium last week before an assembly of high school students.

Senator Thune drew largely on his personal experiences as a native west-river South Dakotan and politician to offer life advice to the impressionable audience. The presentation was a composite of career advice, civics, and Thune's political platform with few equivocal metaphors.

"If a door cracks open, don't be afraid to push it open if an opportunity comes along." Thune said. He explained how his life in politics was not something he planned. Rather, it happened fortuitously when as a high school freshman he met Senator Jim Abnor of South Dakota. The meeting with Abnor was the catalyst to his political career. Senator Thune encouraged students to consider careers in politics and to strive to make the world a better

Although Thune described his background with some

humility, he grew up in a two-parent family in Murdo with professional parents. His dad was a teacher and coach, his mom, a school librarian. School activities and sports were a focus of family life during his

formative years.

Ray was born January 22, 1942, to Roy and Annie (Krininger) Kidd in Belle Fourche, SD. He grew up working on the family ranch in Harding County, SD, and staying in Belle Fourche during the school year. He graduated from Belle Fourche High School in 1960. His first job was at Eddie's Fifth Avenue grocery store where one day he was introduced to his future wife, Josephine Silvernagel. They were married on March 3, 1962, in Belle Fourche. They were together 52 years, making their home in Belle Fourche where they raised their three children. Ray worked for American Colloid for 25 years before taking early retirement in 1997. He then worked for the Belle Fourche School District as a janitor and as the lunch truck driver before going to work in Deadwood as a slot technician. He also worked at the Belle Fourche Area Community Center as a building superviser. Next was one of his most enjoyable jobs in retirement, being a bus driver for Prairie Hills Transit transporting clients from Belle Fourche to the North Hills Training Center daily. Finally, he worked for several years at the Belle Fourche Landfill before retiring for good in 2019. Ray is survived by his children: Clara (Pete) Kiley of Belle Fourche, SD; Leroy Kidd of New Haven, CT, and Thomas (Cindy) Kidd of Montgomer, y, IL; four grandchildren: Morgan (Rachel) Kiley of Milbank, SD; Dylon Kiley of Sioux Falls, SD; Alexander Kiley of Arlington, VA; and Natalia Kidd of Bradley, IL; and two great grandchildren, Aspen and Lincoln Kiley of Milbank, SD. He is

also survived by his younger brother, David Kidd of Firestone CO, several cousins, nieces, and nephews, and honorary granddaughter Amythest Schwender of Belle Fourche, SD. He was preceded in death by his wife and parents.

Gregory Stanley Smeenk 70

Gregory Stanley Smeenk, age 70, took his last breath on this side of heaven on Easter, April 9th, 2023. He was surrounded by his family. He was born February 23rd, 1953, in Rapid City, SD as the youngest of 2 children. He grew up as the 3rd generation on the family ranch.

He attended Newell High School, was active in football, bull riding and met his wife Sherry in high school. At the University of South Dakota, he earned a double major Bachelor of Science in Psychology and Sociology with an emphasis in Criminal Justice and was a member of Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity where he earned the title of "The Governor." He worked as a police officer in Vermillion and Rapid City after college.

From 1977 until 2005 his family owned and operated a ranch in northern Butte County, approximately 8,000 acres in size, a livestock operation consisting of cattle, sheep, and buffalo. The total number of cattle was about 400 head, sheep numbers ranged from 500 to 1,200 head, and the buffalo cow herd was 300 head. He also rented pasture and ran beef cows and sheep with neighbors on a share

He became a licensed private pilot for a single engine aircraft in 1974. He flew his plane to check livestock daily with his most memorable flights being a snake falling into his lap from the ceiling when he was in the air and flying a loop with his uncle Mac.

For 15 years, he operated a hunting enterprise on his ranch taking in deer and buffalo hunters. Greg shot a world record buffalo on his ranch in 2004 which was recorded in Safari Club International with a total scoring of 79 2/8"

He was in many movies, Ford commercials, magazines and books with his most memorable movie roles in "Thunderheart" with Val Kilmer, "Roads," "Lakota Woman," and supplying horses for the movie "Dances With Wolves."

He got his real estate license in 2004 and just 2 years later, became a broker and started his own real estate company, Dakota Properties of Belle Fourche. For the year 2008, he was the Top Producer for the Northern Black Hills Association of Realtors out of 153 realtors and was recognized by the South Dakota State Legislature.

He had a commercial real estate business in the Black Hills of South Dakota and Oklahoma. In 1987 he purchased his first apartment building, a 15-unit residential complex. Since that time, he added more apartment units and storage rental buildings, all of which he was the general contractor for. His most recent business

venture was building a wedding venue, The Barn Out West.

He was a member of the Northern Black Hills Association of Realtors, President of the Dakota Territory Buffalo Association, Director of the South Dakota Sheep Growers, Black Hills Round Up Club and Western South Dakota Buckaroos.

We could fill the Grand Canyon with stories about Greg. To know him was to love him. He was larger than life and impacted more people than he probably knows. He lived by the cowboy code and always said "Do what you say and say what you do." He built ranches, buildings and businesses, but he took the most pride in building his family and friendships. He was a leader, prankster, full of life and energy, always greeting people with a smile and if you were around him long enough, a deep laugh. He was an inspiration and will continue to be.

Loving survivors include his wife of 45 years-Sherry Smeenk; children-Trisha Shields (Dustin), Jenna Smeenk, Jed Smeenk; grandchild, Avery Shields; brother, Randy Smeenk (Marnie) and numerous nephews, cousins and other family. He is preceded in death by his parents: Kath-

leen and Stanley Smeenk Visitation was held Friday April 14 at First

Judy Holt 76

Judy was born on December 18, 1946, at Lemmon, South Dakota Hospital to Clarence and Lorene (Koltz) Davidson. The family lived on a farm in Hayes, ND. When Judy was five years old, her mother passed away from a heart attack. After high school, Judy married, John Holt on January 2, 1965, in Belle Fourche, SD. In Belfield, John and Judy managed a grain elevator. They moved onto a farm where she raised a variety of animals from chickens to

appaloosa horses. Her favorite horse was a leopard appaloosa named, Apache, who was a grandson of John Wayne's famous Cochise.

John later worked for the oil fields and Judy continued to manage the elevator. On March 23, 1980, John was tragically killed in a trucking accident in the oil fields. Judy was devastated. She sold the farm and had to get rid of everything. She continued on waiting tables and other odd jobs here and there to make a living. All she had left were the clothes on her back and her station wagon, Ol' Smokey. Her friend, Wendy Beard, heard about a wagon train in SD for the Days of '76 in 1985, and Judy said she would join her. This is where she met Jim Grover. Jim was a widow with six daughters.

They had a lot in common and had a really good time on the wagon train. After she went back to ND, a month later she decided he was the one she wanted to be with, so she moved back to SD. The two got an apartment for a while and then rented a house in Belle Fourche. Two years later, they had a daughter, Mary. Five years later they moved to Newell, SD. Mary started school and the three of them bought a trailer house across from the school. They rode horseback and worked cattle in the



summer for ranchers around the Newell area. In the summertime at the end of July they would all three go on the wagon train where they had originally met in the Black

In 2005, Mary graduated high school and moved away for college. Then, on April 1, 2014, Jim passed away. Judy was alone again. She remained in Newell with her cat, Quinn. Her health started to decline, and she started dialysis in Spearfish

and went for three years. On June 28, 2022, she fell and ended up in the hospital in Rapid City, SD. She did not recover and had to go to Avantara Mountain View nursing home in Rapid City where she had her final moments.

On April 8, 2023, Judy passed away peacefully in the nursing home. The whole staff loved Judy with her fun and silly personality. She was a talented artist and shared her drawings with the residents and the staff there.

Judy is survived by her daughter, Mary (Grover) and Jason Machristie; also, Jim Grover's six daughters and their families.

She is preceded in death by both her parents, a brother, first husband John Holt, second husband, Jim Grover, and her favorite cat, Quinn.

Judy will be cremated and buried with her husband, John Holt, at Fort Snelling National Cemetery in Minneapolis, MN. There will be no

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Happy 100th Birthday **Rosemary McMahon**

news@bellefourchebeacon.com "We've got a good world. Just enjoy life. You'll have good days and bad days." Rosemary McMahon shared her sage life advice during our conversation last week at her kitchen table. She lives alone in the same two-story house in Belle Fourche she and her husband Dalton purchased in the late 1940s.

Rosemary who turned 100 on April 16th, 2023 is very much in charge. She is dignified, charismatic, and direct with the ability to convey a sense of authority.

Rosemary Pagels was born not far from South Bend, Indiana in Niles, Michigan in 1923. The nearest large city was Chicago, some 100 miles distant. Rosemary was a middle child, between a brother and a sister.

Rosemary recalled the depression years with sadness and personal gratitude. "My dad had a job, must most kids' dads didn't have jobs. Sometimes, you'd feel so sorry for those families. They didn't have enough food or clothing." Rosemary's dad worked for the railroad and the family always had enough food and clothing. 'My mom sewed, and my aunt had no children. She sewed all the time and we had plenty to wear."

Following high school graduation Rosemary went to work at the local bank. As it turned out, Rosemary had an aptitude for numbers. She also had a longing for adventure.

The nation was at war by this time. A high school friend who had joined the Women's Army Corp (WAC), returned home on leave. The WAC was a U.S. Army unit created during WW II for women who wanted to serve in noncombat positions.

Rosemary was inspired by her friend's experience as a WAC. She answered the call to adventure and soon joined the WAVES, or the Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service. The WAVES was established in 1942 as the U.S. Navy's female corp. During WW II some 100,000 women served in the WAVES. These

women performed duties in a variety of capacities, such as clerical assistants. Some even served as instructors for male pilots.

"I looked better in blue than I did in Khaki." She said with a hint of a smile. Rosemary worked in an office that dispersed payment to sailors. "It was hard." She said not referring to the work, but rather to the attitude of the male sailors to the WAVES. "They knew that we arrived, their stateside jobs were being filled so they could be sent overseas.'

There were relatively few WAVES on the base with 150 men. The base was small and there was no place for the women to stay so the women lived at another base nearby. They were chauffeured back and forth to work in a station wagon every day.

Rosemary noted that the supervising officer was very protective of the women. They weren't allowed to go anywhere alone and the sailors were given stern instructions to treat the women with respect.

After the war Rosemary married a sailor, Dalton McMahon. They moved to Rapid City near where Dalton's family had a ranch. They lived in Rapid City for a while then migrated to Belle Fourche to manage a shoe store. Competitive cheaper stores led the McMahons down yet another

Rosemary went to work at the Butte County Auditor's office, defying the tradition that women belonged at home. When the previous Butte County Auditor stepped down, Rosemary ran for office and won. Her aptitude for numbers again served her well. At the same time, not everyone regarded women working outside the home as appropriate especially when they filled high level positions, such as the auditor's office.

She described the satisfaction of her work as the County Auditor. "I loved going to the office everyday and I loved working with the people. That's what I missed most when I retired."



"No Reason to be Discouraged"

Do you ever get discouraged about things that happen or things that don't happen? There was one time a young lawyer who became very depressed. His friends were

so concerned about him that they kept away from him knives, scissors, and anything else that he could have used to hurt himself. They were afraid that he might commit suicide. He wrote this in his memoirs, "I am now the most miserable man living. Whether I shall ever be better, I cannot tell. I fear I shall not." The young lawyer who wrote these words of complete hopelessness was Abraham Lincoln.

Discouragement can be debilitating. It can cause a person to completely give up on life. Discouragement is from the devil. It can cause us to lose all hope including hope in God.

There are many wonderful promises in God's Word about God being with His people, and giving us hope. Our hope comes from knowing that God is all-powerful and able to do for us what we need. Think of how discouraged the disciples of Jesus were after He died on the cross. They thought He had failed at what He came to do. Broncs Begin Season Against Class A Competition

The Belle Fourche Baseball Team opened their season on Monday April 10th in Rapid City against the Stevens Raiders. The Broncs had some first game jitters falling behind early but showed a lot of grit coming back to close the gap in the third inning. The game was called after 4 innings due to time limit with Belle Fourche falling just short 11 to 14.

The second game Monday afternoon Belle Fourche gave the Stevens Raider's Varsity team all they could handle scoring seven runs in the fourth inning and leading by a score of 7-2 after four complete. Nolan Wahlfeldt pitched the first four innings in game two, allowing just 3 hits and 2 walks while striking out 9. Stevens answered with three runs in the 5th before the Broncs responded by tacking on two more runs in the top of the 6th. Another three-run inning by the Raiders and an added insurance run by Belle Fourche saw the Broncs heading into the bottom of the final inning clinging onto a two run lead. Senator Thune discouraged students from spending too much time on social media. "People should not always be looking down at phones." He

The Senator took aim at one social media app, in particular, Tik-Tok. Senator Thune explained that Tik-Tok is owned by the Chinese, and poses a danger to our national security.

In addition to life and career advice, Senator Thune discussed the function and operations of American government. He reminded the students that South Dakota has two US senators, but only one congressional seat. "How many of you have been to Washington?" He asked the group and quickly counted a few hands. Everyone should see Washington to observe "the greatest example of self government in history" at work. He explained.

Senator Thune went on to say that Washington is a great place to visit, but not a good place to live. He noted that it's much better to live here

in South Dakota where our "governments are transparent and the people have access to elected officials". He suggested that people in South Dakota value their freedom more than people who live elsewhere and explained that that is the reason we are experiencing an influx of population. "We have a unique thing going on here in South Dakota." He noted.

The subject of freedom brought Senator Thune to the freedoms guaranteed in the first ten amendments in the American Constitution known as the Bill of Rights. He noted that laws can change over time and we should expect them to change as society changes. However the Bill of Rights is timeless and thus "the second amendment is eternal and we

should stick with it". Already a warm afternoon, the temperature seemed to rise as many students began to raise their hands for commentary as the conversation turned to the high incidence of school shootings in America.

"The incidence of school shootings (sic) is a thorny issue

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with lots of moving parts." Thune commented. "The one common denominator in school shootings is deranged people." Thune explained.

"Aren't guns a common denominator too?" A student asked.

Senator Thune did not respond directly, but offered other insights. "I don't think taking guns away will help. We live in a part of the country where people rely on guns and that taking guns away would be impossible."

Thune explained other ways to subvert school shootings, such as providing better mental health, making sure that guns don't fall in the hands of criminals, and adding more school police officers.

Senator Thune also said

that arming teachers would be another way to add additional layers of protection. "Any teacher who wants to carry a gun should be permitted to carry one, although they should receive training. Teachers who do not want to carry guns should not be forced to do so."

Some students expressed a safety concern about teachers carrying guns. One student asked, "Teachers aren't armed in Europe. What's different

Thune did not miss the opportunity to discuss his committee assignments and visions for South Dakota, again somewhat metaphorically. A good leader must have a "true north" and "have character." He said.

He went on to share his political platform and ideology with the students. Although Senator Thune described President Biden as a "nice man" he was highly critical of Biden's withdrawal of US troops in Afghanistan. He indicated that former President Trump's recent indictment was suspicious.

When asked his thoughts were regarding affirming care for transgender youth and consenting adults, he commented, "We want to make sure that students are affirmed and cared for." He expressed opposition to permitting transgender males to compete with girls in sports. Throughout the presentation, Thune reminded the students that their votes matter and that they should followed the Golden Rule as it is anchored in the Bible.

125 years ago Belle TIMES April 14, 1898 Round-up Program

Lacking times and space this week, the TIMES only give the Belle Fourche round-ups. The complete program will appear next week.

Lower Belle Fourche, No. 11 Begins May 11th, at Viewfield, one wagon working north side of Elk and one wagon south down to forks of Belle Fourche, thence down north side of the Cheyenne river to reservation line, thence across to Sulphur and up to mouth of Red Owl, thence up Red Owl to White Owl post office, thence across the head of Bad Land Creek to round-up road to Elm creek. Orlin Holcomb, Foreman. Then up Elm Creek to Shingle's ranch, Al Taddiken, Foreman. Then round-up to divide. Sulphur division to cross over to head of Sulphur Creek and work down Sulphur to Scaffold. Ollie Tisdale, foreman. Orlin Holcomb foreman Pine Creek to Rad Scallfold. Belle Fourche division to work Belle Fourche and tributaries to Miles City Crossing, Frank Stewart, foreman.

Talk of the Town A greater farce was never enacted in Lawrence county than the trial and acquittal of Punteney and O'Day. If the Jones brothers, who are known to have had a hand in the robbery, will only come back and stand trial they will be acquitted also. The court was nearly evenly divided, five holding that such laws are unconstitutional and three that they were not. The majority opinion was based on the ground that such laws are improper interference with the right of contact between employers and employees. A conference to be held soon will be called of the National Women's Trade Union League to discuss what action will be taken "to humanize either the courts or the constitution" to prevent wholesale reduction of women's wages as a result of the removal of legal restrictions under the supreme court's decision.

75 years ago Belle Fourche Bee April 14, 1947 MUNICIPAL STORES NET OVER \$30,000 SIX MONTH PERIOD Aggregate Profits Start of Operations in 1935 Now Total \$310,683.17

The public accountant's audit of the three municipal liquor stores of Belle Fourche, as published elsewhere in this issue, shows that for the six-months period, September 28, 1946 to March 29, 1947 the net profit from their operation is listed at \$30,783.32, and that the total liabilities and net worth of the business on March 29, 1947 was computed by William B Travis, public accountant at \$72,255.79. The aggregate profits which have accumulated since start of operation of the municipal liquor stores, back in May, 1935, are now \$310,682.17. Of this amount a total of \$240,825.38 has been paid into the city treasury. Also, profits for the past six months the public accountant's report shows that \$10,202.48

came from the package store, \$11,305.13 from the municipal bar, \$7,572.34 from the Circle Lounge, and \$2,056.48 from refund on liquor taxes, interest on bonds, miscellaneous and sale of adding machine. 50 years ago Belle Fourche Bee April 14, 1973 Hospital Problems - Staff Group

Voices Complaints About 20 persons, including doctors, nurses and aides, met informally at the Tri-State clinic here Saturday night to protest what they described as confusing, frustrating and disappointing conditions at the John Burns Memorial Hospital. As a result of the Saturday night meeting the group decided to ask for a meeting with the board of trustees of the hospital as soon as possible to discuss some of their grievances. The group voiced a number of complaints: Lack of communication between the board and the hospital personnel. They said they feel personnel should sit in on board activities so there could be better understanding. Lack of clear cut policy. Although the board does have some basic policy established, the group feels the policy is not clear cut and leads to confusion and misunderstanding. The group voiced dissatisfaction with the administration, claiming the administration is too business oriented and fails to give adequate consideration or understanding to the medical side of the operation. The group voiced objection to what they described as a "self-perpetuation" board. They felt the board should be responsible to some group or to the community. The group contends that no one on the board represents the medical needs of the hospital. The group also voiced objection to some of the recent administrative actions of the board. They complained that the board had discharged one of the male personnel recently and did not give a reasonable cause of the dismissal. 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

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Prescription Drug Take-Back Day Saturday April 22

PIERRE – Saturday, April 22 is the next Drug Enforcement Administration's National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day. It is an opportunity to safely dispose of unwanted prescription drugs.

South Dakotans have been strong participants in the past and are encouraged to take part

Unwanted medications can be disposed of without question in a secure medication drop box at participating locations like pharmacies and police stations.

"Participating in the Take-Back Day event is a very tangible way we can combat the dangerous issue of prescription medications being used inappropriately," said DSS Cabinet Secretary Matt Althoff. "Thank you to all those who have participated in the past.

We encourage anyone who might have medications that are no longer needed to place Take-

Back Day on their calendar as a reminder of this important opportunity to safely dispose of their unused or expired prescription drugs."

National Take-Back Day is held twice annually in October and April. The Fall event was extremely successful in South Dakota with 994 pounds of medication collected for destruction through participating law enforcement locations. From the inception of the program in October 2017 through February 2023, 37,836 pounds of unwanted medications have been collected in South Dakota.

For those unable to physically take their unused medications to a drop off site, DisposeRx packets are available for free from DSS and can be mailed directly to you.

DisposeRx packets contain an FDA-approved ingredient that, when mixed with water, chemically and physically neutralizes

the medication and renders it safe for disposal at home. The packets work with pills, tablets, capsules, liquids, and powders.

According to the 2021 Nation Survey on Drug Use and Health, among the 9.2 million people that misused opioids in the past year, 8.7 million were misusing prescription pain relievers.

With the increasing danger of fake pills and fentanyl laced pills, keeping any pills off the street, and off the illegal market, takes on added importance. If you come across pills or medication in a public place like a park or parking lot, do not touch them or pick them up.

Call law enforcement and they will safely dispose of the item(s).

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
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

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School District Moves Forward with HS Air Conditioning

Third floor underway, gymnasium soon to bid.

BELLE FOURCHE - The Belle Fourche School Board voted Monday, April 10. To accept a proposal by Temperature Technology Inc. (Tem-Tech), of Rapid City to install air conditioning on the third floor of Belle Fourche High School. Tem-Tech was the only bid received for the project. The proposal passed unanimously.

Included in the proposal is the installation of ductless Mitsubishi air conditioning units in the third-floor classrooms with 15 climate zones total. The proposal carries a \$174,600 price tag.

Specifically, the proposal calls for the installation of 10 Mitsubishi cooling-only VRF systems to serve the high school classrooms on the west side of the third floor, and 5 to serve the classrooms on the east side of the third floor. Installation will include electrical lines to the new units and piping to run outside the building. Each classroom will have a pair of wall-installed minisplit heads with electrical disconnects at each unit.

Ductless air conditioning systems are becoming more popular these days for a variety of reasons. Also known as

mini-splits, manufacturers of these systems say they provide cooling capabilities without the many problems associated with ducted setups. Using a ductless system, users can better regulate the temperature from classroom to classroom, while reducing energy loss typical with inefficient duct work.

The system is typically comprised of an outdoor and an indoor unit. According to Mitsubishi, the outdoor condensing/compression unit applies pressure to the refrigerant, which is then sent through the piping that is connected to indoor unit. The indoor unit usually has three parts which include air-handlers, blowers, and the evaporator coil. Indoor air-handling units are placed strategically in the classroom, which allows for more efficient energy usage.

With hot air rising, the top floor of the high school can get especially warm. This is a big problem during the early part of the school year and sometimes during May, when temperatures in the upper floor of the high school can reach well into the 90-degree range.

Last September Greg Krajewski, BF School Board Member, paid a visit to the high school's third floor on a day when the thermometer reached more

than 100 degrees. As classes dismissed and students spilled into the hallways Krajewski asked several of them about the conditions.

"I wanted to know if they had anything they'd like to say to us," Krajewski told the board at the time. "The one thing I heard was, 'make sure they know this has not been our only hot day."

Teachers and staff alike know that a student's ability to learn goes down as the temperature rises above the century mark. "It's just harder to focus and to learn in that heat," a staff member told the Beacon.

Not included in the Tem-Tech bid is the construction of concrete pads for the condensing units. If things go as planned the third-floor air conditioning should be ready by this fall. The third floor is not the only

hot spot at the high school. Cooling and heating the gymnasium has also been on the front burner. During the April 10 school board meeting Dr. Steve Willard, District Superintendent, gave a synopsis of the presentation prepared by Upper Deck Architects for installing a new HVAC system in the gym. Upper Deck surveyed the facility to determine what equipment would be needed to complete the project as they look to put it to bid. Along with the HVAC

requirements, included in the scope of work would be the removal of the ceiling insulation and yellow foam, and painting the ceiling white like the middle school gym. Tommy Coyle, Dir. Of Facilities and Transportation, says there is six-inches of ceiling insulation above that, which will remain, so the spray on insulation is not needed and is regarded as an eye-sore. It will also make access to wiring and plumbing easier.

Additionally, the bid would include upgrading the 1954-era wiring, including replacing the fuse boxes with circuit breakers.

Willard says an alternate bid will also be sought which would include a new smoke detection system and a fire suppression (sprinkler) system. A second

alternate bid would also include the cost of replacing the acoustical tiles on the west and east walls.

"If you look at those walls they're from that '54 era," Willard said. "They're yellowing and deteriorating."

Also contained in that second alternate bid would be to replace the climate controls with electrical thermostats which could be programmed via computer. The current system is pneumatically operated.

Willard says Upper Deck's Jerud Pummel will put this package out for bid and Susan Proefrock, District Business Manager, says it will take about a month to get bids returned for consideration. A possible special school board meeting may be scheduled for late May to consider the bids.

NEWELL-Following the approval of several building permits at the regular meeting on April 10, the Newell Commissioners heard from Tim Grosz and Alex Westerbuhr from Brosz Engineering on the plans for the Wastewater/Water Project. The update showed that according to engineering plans, the project may come in at a higher cost than what had been budgeted. City Foreman Larry Parker had several ideas on how to cut costs, but further discussion was deemed necessary. There will be a meeting with Commissioner Allen Youngberg, Parker, and Grosz at a future date.

There are issues with unlicensed dogs and barking. According to Ordinance 04-2020, An Animal Control Ordinance, section 2.04, "no person owning any dog, licensed or unlicensed, confined on the premises, or otherwise, shall suffer to permit such dog to disturb the peace and quiet of the neighborhood by continuous barking or making other loud or unusual noises." The Butte County Sheriff has a duty to notify the owner of the dog when a signed complaint is filed. The animal could be impounded and fined.

Section 3.01 says that any dog, chicken or cat must obtain a license from the City Finance Officer.

Chickens may be kept within the city, but must be licensed annually, according to City Finance Officer Sheila Smith.

The annual City Cleanup Week will be May 15-19. The city will pick up items that are set at curbside. Residents are asked to call the city office by the Wednesday before that week. The free Saturday at the Newell Landfill will be May 6 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Regular landfill Saturday will be May 20 at normal rates. The landfill is available for Newell residents only.

Building permits were granted to several areas in Newell. At 621 Dartmouth Ave. and 200 Dartmouth Ave. The building permit for 913 Dartmouth Ave. was not complete in the city office and in time to be discussed and voted at this meeting. A conditional use permit was granted for the Tiny House at 601 E. 6th St.

The decision on the demolition of 102 Fisk Ave. was tabled until next month.

Colleen Brunner was present to give an update on the Splash Pad located in the North Park. She would like to have a grand opening sometime in late May or June and was wondering when the city could turn the water on for operation. In later discussion, the commissioners discussed the issues with the Splash Pad, including the chemical use, the extra concrete needed surrounding the pad, and the operation of the pumps. No decision was made on opening the pad for use.

Liquor licenses were renewed for 212/79 Service Center and High Plains Restaurant & Bar.


The results of the Drinking Water Report were given to the commissioners. Water quality

was tested last year. According to the report 615 customers use an average of 70,000 gallons of water per day. The water is groundwater produced from local wells. The State has determined that the relative susceptibility rating for the water supply system is low.

Corrosion of household plumbing systems, erosion of natural deposits, and leaching from wood preservatives has added copper and lead to the drinking water, but is still under safe levels. Tests of Barium, Fluoride, and Total trihalomethanes are also under allowable levels.

The complete test results can be seen at the Newell City Offices.

There will be a special meeting held Monday, April 17 to discuss two more liquor license renewals.






