SDBES Adopts Social Study Standards-Direction Needed

Beacon Staff news@bellefourchebeacon.com The Belle Fourche school district awaits direction. Along with all public school districts in South Dakota, Belle Fourche must prepare to implement a new set of Social Studies Standards adopted last week by the South Dakota Board of Education Standards (SDBES). The vote was 5-2 in favor of the new standards with Board President Terry Nebelsick and Belle Fourche School District Superintendent Dr. Steve Willard casting the dissenting votes.

Dr. Willard offered this information following the SDBES decision, "We have not received the process for implementation from the DOE as of yet. All I know it will take 2 years to implement and the DOE is looking at integrating it into other curriculum areas."

The adoption of the new Social Studies Standards is a contentious issue. The controversy is complex and stems from how the standards evolved as well as the standards themselves.

Proponents in favor of the new standards have expressed appreciation for the comprehensive content, and promises that the new standards will indoctrinate "patriotic citizens" and offer the "best social studies education in the country".

According to some 1300 comments in opposition to the standards received by the South Dakota Department of Education (SDDOE), the majority of stake-holders, school administrators, teachers, parents, students and citizens are opposed to the new standards. **Standards** A8

Downtown RCP&E Railroad Crossing to be Replaced

Detour on Hwy 85 will be needed

BELLE FOURCHE - The railroad crossing on U.S. Highway 85 in downtown Belle Fourche is scheduled to be replaced during the upcoming construction season. The concrete railroad crossing, which has been the subject of numerous citizen complaints, will be completely replaced, and new asphalt surfacing will be placed on each approach. Once started, the work is anticipated to be completed within five construction days.

According to the Belle Fourche Area Office of the SD Dept. of Transportation (SD DOT), the project will require Highway 85 to be closed to traffic between Roundup Street and Railroad Street, with traffic to be detoured onto 6th Avenue.

Grant Street, Railroad Street, Roundup Street, Indian Street, and 6th Avenue will all be restricted to one-way traffic with limited parking, according to the office.

Motorists and truckers need to be aware that 12-foot width restriction, 15-foot height restriction, and a 90-foot length restriction will be in place for the detour route.

According to the SD DOT additional information about the project will be shared with the public once the replacement dates are scheduled.

This project will be completed jointly by Rapid City, Pierre & Eastern Railroad and the South Dakota Department of Transportation.

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

9, she and her family moved to Zeona, SD, north of Newell, SD. There she started 4th grade and Dad (John) started to build the first two-story Sod house in Western South

Dakota. She loved it out there, but times were tough. She graduated from 8th grade and then went on to High School in Newell, where she lived in a boarding house with her best friend, Adie. They stayed friends till her passing in her 90's.

In 1938 Bernita graduated from High School and the family moved back to Wisconsin, but she had met a young man, Rudy Jaskela, at a dance at Horse Creek. He stayed in her heart but figured she would never see him again.

She worked as a maid in Chicago in the winter and the summers she worked at the Sunflower Lodge, a resort by Tomahawk Lake. In December of 1942 the world was at War and a cousin showed her a list of soldiers that needed pen pals and she saw the name "Rudy Jaskela!!! That has to be him! So, she sent him a letter and it was history from there on. He asked her to marry him and she moved to California and they had a very nice Military Wedding on April 11, 1943, at Camp San Luis Obispo. It was a short honeymoon, as of July of that year Rudy was sent overseas. Bernita was left alone so she went to work at the Northrop Corporation to work on the P38 Aircraft to install gun turrets as a Rosie the Riveter. Her favorite job ever. The war ended in 1945 and Rudy rushed to Bernita's arms and grabbed his bride. He could not get to Newell fast enough and start a life on a farm. They lived in several places till they found their home on Horse Creek. In this process they had four children; Lu Onna (Lu), Judy, Jerry and Marilyn. They sold the farm in later years and moved



into the town of Newell. They did not like the town life so bought a place outside of town where her son and his wife still live. Rudy died in July of 1976 in a tragic accident and she was lost. She moved into town to a few places and then to Spearfish in 1997, to the Maple Apartments, where she lived for 17 years. It was here she met Chuck Ahartz; a great companion till his death in 2013. They oved going to Deadwood alot and she loved isiting with her friends and family.

In September of 2014 she was starting to fail and moved to Burrs (Tender Care Assisted Living) in Spearfish, where she had her final moments. They loved her and all her crocheting and her stories. They took wonderful care of her. She was well known for her dancing, crocheting (Pot Holders), all crafts/wood work, and her years of gardening. She always had the prettiest yards wherever she lived.

She was preceded in death by her parents; husband, Rudy; brothers and their wives, Marv and Julia Borgemoen, and Vic and Mary Ann Borgemoen; and best friend, Chuck Ahartz.

She shared her life with her family which is Lu and Jerry Heater, Albuquerque, NM, Judy Jaskela Mayer, AZ, Marilyn and Steve Bocksnick, Dewey, AZ, and Jerry and Shawn Jaskela, Newell, SD. Her two grandkids and great grandkids; Trinity Jaskela and Amy Rounds and his three boys, Corbin, Cash, and Klaus Jaskela, all of Spearfish SD; Brandi and Ethan Andrews and their 4 daughters, Lilly, Leida, Lucy and Lainey Andrews, all of Boulder City, NV; five nephews and their wives and their children in Wisconsin.

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

Lawrence Anton Capra 94

Lawrence Anton Capra 94, passed away at Holy Rosary Hospital in Miles City, MT on April 20th 2023.

He was born August 10th 1928 in the family home at Boyes MT. He was first child born to John Baptist (Jack) Capra and Lydia Rose (Chiesa) Capra. His aunt Mary Julio and Grandmother Angelina Capra acted a mid-wives, as the doctor from Broadus was a little late arriving. His grandfather Antonio, uncle Louis Julio and his father Jack were working in the field binding oats at the time. When they came in for dinner, Grandpa insisted on seeing the new grandson. He wanted to confirm that it was

a boy before he opened a bottle of grapa to celebrate. Lawrence was the oldest of three children, Ange-

lina (Angie) and Louis John (JR) came along later. He attended his first 8 years of school at the Boyes School House that was located 2 miles north of the present day Boyes post office, then on to Powder River County High School in Broadus, graduating in 1946

When he was in 7th and 8th grade he worked summers herding sheep for Joe Landa. When he was in high school he worked for Otis Nisley lambing sheep. He became good friends with Dan Nisley, Ross Denson, Dan Denson and Bob McCurdy. And told many stories of their escapades. After he graduated from high school he spent a summer helping survey the proposed Moorehead dam. Later he purchased an 8 foot Case combine and pulled it with a John Deere B tractor. When he wasn't working on the family ranch, he and Bob McCurdy harvested grain in the summer time around the Boyes community.

In the spring of 1952 he met Miriam Scoles at a dance in Hammond. She was staying at Boyes with a friend and fellow nurse, Linda Trucano. A relationship blossomed out of this meeting and they were married on October 18th 1952. After a honeymoon in California, they made their home at the Capra Ranch at Boyes where they remained for the next 68 years.

Lawrence and Miriam raised 5 children, Michael John, Louise Marie, Rose Ann, Laurie Leona and Anthony Louis.

Lawrence started his sheep business with the help of Otis Nisley who sold him a few head of ewes. In the early 60's he and R.O. Burch purchased a new breed of sheep from the Targhee Idaho sheep experiment station. Lawrence, Miriam and kids raised

some of the finest Targhee sheep in Montana. Lawrence was very active in local organizat Association. He was Chairman of the board for Powder River County School District as well as a Montana Livestock brand inspector for over 50 years.

Lawrence and Miriam dedicated themselves to the unconditional loving care of Anthony for the first 16 years of his life until he moved to the Black Hills Workshop in Rapid City, SD. They were especially proud of the artwork that Anthony did at the Workshop. They were able to travel around South Dakota for some of his art shows.

After Miriam passed both Lawrence and Anthony moved to the PR Manor, Lawrence's purpose in life was to check on him every day to make sure he was doing well.

Lawrence and Miriam in their younger years loved to visit neighbors, play cards, square dance, and annually attend the MT Ram Sale and MT Wool Grower's Conventions. Farming and ranching was his passion throughout his life. Up until the day he passed, he asked how the sheep and cows were doing.


O. Myron Jerde, MD 92

1930 in Hettinger, ND, the oldest of three children of Ole Martinius Jerde and Benna Dina Larson. Myron grew up on the U Cross ranch near Sorum, SD and attended a country school nearby. He played on the Sorum baseball team on the field beside Skoger Lutheran Church where he was confirmed. Myron attended Bison High School and graduated in 1949 from Lead High School, and enjoyed choir, band, and his studies.

Myron was drafted for the Korean War and joined the Army in the Fall of 1953. After serving two years, he returned to the U Cross. Myron moved to Sioux Falls for college at Augustana College in 1956, enjoying chorus and his biology and business courses. groups represent a broad demographic of the state's population.

Overall, many school administrators, teachers, parents and students have felt left out of the process.

Many opponents of the standards are disturbed by the influence of organizations such as The National Association of Scholars (NAS) and the Civics Alliance. These organizations are seen as interfering with decisions about schools that many stakeholders believe should be made by South Dakotans at the local level. Furthermore, many opponents do not believe the new standards are necessary.

The Oceti Sakowin (the collective name for members of the Dakota, Nakota, and Lakota language speakers) has expressed strong opposition. In 2018, the SDDOE removed the Oceti Sakowin, Essential Understandings curriculum under the governor's executive order. The action undermines many years of curriculum development about the history of Native Americans.

Administrators are wondering how teaching standards will match with the new curriculum. What will be the cost to school districts? Will highly qualified professionals want to teach in South Dakota given low pay and a host of added restrictions and expectations?

Highly effective teachers are currently expected to demonstrate how they teach higher order thinking skills. According to the "Guiding Principals for High Quality Standards" on Page 5 of the 179 page Social Studies Standards document, "Debating current political positions or partaking in political activism at the bequest of a school or teacher does not

belong in a K-12 social studies class..."

Not an easy pill for social studies teachers to swallow.

Teachers are uncertain how to teach social studies without violating the executive order of the governor, who has banned speaking of topics defined as those meant "to make one race feel inferior or superior to another."

In Arizona's pending legislation, if teachers discuss racism or sexism they can be fined up to \$5,000. In Tennessee, such violations could cost the school districts state aid funding.

Teachers are also concerned about being able to squeeze in the rigorous content, much of which relies heavily on memorization and recitation. rather than higher order thinking skills.

The standards are scheduled to be implemented by 2025.

Justin Smith Gets Much-needed Win with San Angelo Rodeo Title

SAN ANGELO, Texas - Justin Smith didn't have the season he wanted a year ago, but in rodeo, cowboys must look out the windshield instead of the rear-view mirror.

Smith qualified for his first Wrangler National Finals Rodeo in 2021, but then adversity struck. His good horse Doc went down with an injury, which forced the Leesville, La., tie-down roper to find a new mount.

The rest of the season didn't go as planned. He finished outside of the top 50 of the PRCA | RAM World Standings with \$17,545, which kept him out of qualifying for a majority of the big winter rodeos, except for one. That was the San Angelo (Texas) Rodeo.

He made the most of his opportunity at the PRCA Playoff Series rodeo on Friday night. After laying down a 6.9-second run in Round 2, he came into the finals with the lead on two head. He took care of the rest with an 8.4-second run in front of a sold-out crowd at the Foster Communications Coliseum to secure the average title with 23.7 seconds on three head.

"I didn't get into any of the other big rodeos this year," said Smith, 25. "I just kind of took some time off and seasoned a horse last year after mine went down. That made it to where this was about the only one that I got into. So, to capitalize like this in San Angelo it means everything."

He said having Doc back underneath him is a feeling unlike any other and the crowd got to experience their chemistry firsthand the past two weeks in the heart of Texas.

"I've rode that horse since I was in junior high," he said. "We bought him as a two-yearold and broke and trained him. I've rode him my entire life, he's pretty much the only horse I've really ever had. So, to have him back really makes a difference and I couldn't be more comfortable on him."

Smith pocketed more than

\$18,000 for his three runs in San Angelo, which will likely move him into the top 30 in the world standings. He said even with the slow start to the year, he still has his eyes set on Las Vegas come December.

"It's absolutely still my goal to be in Las Vegas this year. My horse is getting a little age on him now being 19, but he's as sound as ever," Smith said. "I'm going to ride him at the big ones this year and try to capitalize when I'm on him. I think that'll be key to me having success."

Other winners at the \$699,710 rodeo were bareback rider Leighton Berry (175.5 points on two head); steer wrestler Jay Williamson (12.1 seconds on three head); saddle bronc rider Dawson Hay (178.5 points on two head); team ropers J.C. Yeahquo/L.J. Yeahquo (12.3 seconds on three head); barrel racer Kassie Mowry (43.86 seconds on three runs); and bull rider Deklan Garland (174.5 points on two head).

Rebuilding the Chutes

Whew! We are in the undertaking of rebuilding our old loading chute. It was originally built by my father and then repaired and added on to over the years. It has gotten a little scary to use, tho' one of the owners of cattle we summered last year, told me not to change a thing as it works great. And it has, so far. But the posts are no longer straight and plumb and

some of the planks are weak. So it is time.

I went down today and started moving junk, that had gotten piled up over the years and almost in the way. We plan to move the chute further west, so all that needed to go. I found out I am old, fat and out of shape! Imagine that!

Chance had went to do some dirt work with his skid steer and showed up about the time I was finishing up. I had a grandson who was working here and he had went and fixed fence. So we all gathered round and discussed how to set up the pens leading into the chute as they are getting rickety also.

I have seen some great things with a Bud Box and we have something similar on our working chute that works good so we will need to change

some fences. Sounds like the plan is now to use free standing panels and if everything works well, then put in permanent.

I read in one of Spike Van Cleves book a statement that I agreed with. He said, "Seems like I have to rebuild corrals about every twenty years." Yup, me too. And many folks are now putting in pipe and sucker rod, which make a stout, pretty good looking corral. But what I have noticed, when ever I rebuilt some, I had discovered that maybe they weren't situated to be the handiest and by moving some fences, you could get cattle to flow better. About the time they came out with the tub system for working cattle thru' a working chute and everyone had got one set up, someone discovered that a double alley actually works better. Most wouldn't mess with a double alley as they

already had invested time and money in a tub. I have worked around both and when set up right, the double alley is my preferred system. So I'm sure glad I never made a tub. Tho' I did somewhat mimic one, and it never worked as good as it should have.

I also like to have things set to where it is handy to use whether you are afoot or horseback. Gates that latch at the corner so there is no room to get to them while on a horse, especially with chains, is a personal pet peeve!

I have got most of mine set up to where they are easy to open when on a horse or afoot. But I haven't yet found the perfect latch. Easy to operate and stout!

So, we strive on. I know I am sore and tired and perhaps a stiff shot of Who Hit John just might be in the cards!

Enjoy this lovely spring weather, and if you get some snow, just remember, it can snow about any time in South Dakota. Mother Nature don't always pay much attention to the calendar!


Anthony Budmayr got the win on the mound pitching 5 innings, giving up two runs and two walks while striking out

Ronda's only get-away this week was on Thursday when she took mail to town in the late afternoon. The Over the Edge was open so she enjoyed supper before heading

home to do chores.

Sunday turned out to be a very beautiful day, even if it began with temperatures in the 20's. She got out and did a lot of raking and cleaning around the yard and shops. The burn pile is growing. She's hoping for rain before burning it. Curt Zolnoski stopped by Monday morning before heading to Hannah's to work. They went into town for supper on Sunday night. Their calving is winding down. It has been a up and down year with 80 degrees one day and the 30's a couple of days later. The temperatures are forecasted to be more normal this week. I hope that everyone has a great week and Karen will be talking to you next Sunday.

Their clientele include veterans as well as others with

"Building Main Street, not Wall Street" ——— Impact of the Local Multiplier Effect

This 300% or 3 to 1 increase was supported in a similar study conducted by the Institute for Local Self-Reliance. They found that independent businesses in Austin, Texas recirculate 45% of their revenue within the local economy, compared to only 14% for large chain stores. These two studies demonstrate that local businesses are more likely to reinvest their profits back into the community, which can result in a multiplier effect stimulating further economic activity.

The local multiplier effect also has a significant impact on job creation. Local businesses are more labor-intensive compared to large chain stores, as they often require more human resources to operate. A study conducted by the U.S. Small Business Administration found that small businesses, including local retailers, create two out of every three net new jobs in the United States. Moreover, a

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study conducted by the American Independent Business Alliance found that for every \$100 spent at a local business, on average, \$68 stays in the local economy in the form of wages paid to local employees. This indicates that supporting local businesses not only contributes to job creation but also helps to sustain and improve local income levels.

Furthermore, the local multiplier effect can lead to increased tax revenue for local governments, which can be used to fund essential public services such as roads, parks, and infrastructure. Local businesses generate tax revenue through various channels, including sales tax, property tax, and payroll tax. A study conducted by the Andersonville Study of Retail Economics, which analyzed the impact of local businesses in Chicago, found that local retailers generate 70% more local economic impact per square foot compared to chain retailers primarily due to their higher contribution to property taxes. nurses.

He elaborated on his vision, "Train like you care; care like you train!'

"I believe that training of nurses needs to be as realistic as possible. Nursing students need to train hard and with a caring attitude, so that when they get out on the hospital floors they can provide care to those patients in the manner in which they trained "

"Nursing research is showing that the average patient has a higher acuity and nurses are caring for higher volume and more difficult patients than ever before. With more emphasis on being fiscally responsible, hospitals don't have the luxury of extensive orientations, therefore student nurses need to be trained in such a manner that they can jump right in and care like they've trained," he emphasized.



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City Explores Privatizing City Liquor Sales

BELLE FOURCHE - The Belle Fourche City Council voted 5-to-3 on Monday, Apr. 17, to invite private entities to submit proposals to operate liquor stores within the community.

According to details in the request for proposals (RFP) the city could accept up to five private parties to operate liquor stores within the community.

Expectations in the potential operating agreement between the city and private entities state that the city would retain ownership of the state liquor license but would no longer operate its lone off-sale liquor store once said agreement was in place.

It further states that each operator would pay an initial fee of \$35,000 to the city and an annual renewal fee of \$5,000 each year the agreement was in place.

The city currently operates a lone liquor store, Belle Package Liquor, on the south side of town off Highway 85. The store is operated with six city employees and brought in about \$110,000 last fiscal year, according to the 2022 city annual report.

The RFP is scheduled to go out May 1, with a deadline for submission by 3pm May 31. The city has the option to accept one or more of the proposals or reject all of them and keep things as they are.

Those voting in favor of send-

ing out the RFP's were Council Members Randy Sowers, Derrick Erhart, Monte Talkington, Clark Sowers and Larry Schmaltz. Those voting against were Rebecca Larson, Heidi Parker and Bob Somervold.

The proposal came as a surprise to Larson, who also chairs the council's Legal and Finance Committee.

"There has been some talk that has come up about different options with the liquor store. I will says I was really floored when I saw this on the full council agenda," Larson said. "So I really feel like we're getting ahead of ourselves on this a little bit."

Larson told the council that she saw three options the city could take. "We could continue to own and operate, we could sell the liquor license completely and have nothing to do with it, or this suggestion, which I said I didn't know existed until just recently," Larson said.

Larson expressed two main concerns regarding the RFPs. The first was looking out for the financial interests of the community and the second was the fate of the six city employees who currently work at the store.

"With operating agreements we could have up to five companies that would probably want to hire them because they have more experience than anyone else in town," said Council Member Larry Schmaltz. "That's what we'd be

looking for when some submits a proposal, would that proposal include buying the inventory, or hiring our employees. If we don't like the answers we get in the proposals we don't have to accept them."

"So the liquor store employees would suddenly be unemployed by the city but then rehired," said Council Member Heidi Parker. "Why would they want to stay if that's what they're going to deal with. I would just want be sure that they would be taken care of."

Parker said she would have favored more "open table discussions" of the issue. "I didn't know we were this far along in the process, so I was just a little stunned when it came before the full council," she said.

From a fiscal standpoint Schmaltz pointed out that there would be initial license fees, annual renewals, third penny and sales tax revenue created by one or more operating agreements, similar to how a few other Black Hills communities operate. With one or more operating agreements the thinking is it would be possible to generate more revenue on a consistent basis than the current process.

"I think it's a good idea to at least explore this and see what our options are," said Council Member Derrick Erhart. "We're not nailing anything down, we're just gauging interest to see what could potentially happen."

Do you have a kid in the home under the age of 18? If so, your home is more likely to have a computer tablet than a home without children.

Tablet ownership among homes with children is 22 percent higher than homes without, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. That gap persists even when controlled for race and socioeconomic characteristics.

In households headed by someone with less than a high school education, 60 percent of homes with children had a tablet versus 32 percent without children. Households with less than \$25,000 in annual in-Spearfish resident David A. In households with \$150,000 in annual income, 92 percent of those with children had a tablet while 81 percent of childless houses had tablets.

Private swimming pools and garden watering could join the growing list of items that climate activists hope to restrict or ban.

That's the conclusion of a study of water use by residents in Cape Town, South Africa. The study evaluated water use based on income levels. It

found that the city's wealthiest residents consumed 50 times more water than poorer residents. That's because wealthier residents were more likely to own swimming pools, water their gardens or wash their cars.

The city's poorest residents constituted 62 percent of Cape Town's population, but that



was among the three finalists in the history category.





The program optimizes connectivity and helps ensure a low drop rate using a dedicated EMS phone number. The router cycles between the major carriers to find the strongest signal. Since cell towers do not cover the entire state and a call may be dropped, the Avel team is prepared to relaunch the video as soon as possible.

It is possible to decide to use audio option only. The decision is based on the desires of the patient and EMS.


coyotes east of the place so that didn't happen. Caleb and Rebecca (Bingaman) Whitney are the





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
