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# Officer Huber Sworn In City Council Approves New Hires for Police Department

The Belle Fourche police department will soon be at full strength once again. The city council approved the hiring of two additional full time officers and a third was promoted from part-time to full-time status. Jason Huber was sworn in as the newest full-time member of the Belle Fourche Police Department. Officer Huber took the oath of office from Mayor Randy Schmidt during the April 18, 2022, city council meeting. Huber has been a part-time officer in the department and will assume full-time duties on April 25.

The city council also gave its approval for new Police Chief Ryan Cherveny to hire Brandon Wolfe as a full-time police officer. Wolf's first day on the job will be April 24. He graduates on May 15th with a Criminal Justice-Law Enforcement degree.

Finally, the council gave its approval for Chief Cherveny to hire an additional full-time patrol officer. This will bring the force to full strength. The council also approved the purchase of two additional

police vehicles. The department will add a 2021 Dodge Ram and a 2018 Dodge Charger, purchased from Scott Peterson Motors. The cost of the vehicles is \$85,030 and an amount not to exceed \$17,000 was approved to purchase equipment to furnish the vehicles.

Almost \$42,000 of the cost had been budgeted in 2022 and the remaining \$60,000 will be paid for with CARES funding.

### **BFMS Celebrates Arbor Day by Planting a Tree**

Fifth graders at Belle Fourche Middle School celebrated Arbor Day 2022 with a traditional tree planting on the grounds southwest of the district's administration building. According to veteran staff members it was the 20th year in a row a tree had been planted on Arbor Day, dating back to the spring of 2002. Many of the past trees planted can be seen along the west side of the Middle School grounds. The observation of Arbor Day began at 3pm on Friday, April 22, inside a school commons area when the classes gathered to hear a presentation from Joshua Larson, South Dakota Community Forester. Larson

quizzed the students about the benefits that trees provide to the environment and asked them specifically about trees that are found in Belle Fourche and the Black Hills region. Following that Melanie Williamson from the Butte County Conservation District, and 7th grade science teacher, presented the three students who won the Arbor Day essay contest. They were: Raina Reder, 1st place, \$20 award; Ansley O'Brien, 2nd place, \$15 award; and Ellie Kukuchka, 3rd place, \$10 award. The essay winners also had the opportunity to help plant the 2022 tree. The fifth graders then proceeded to the southwest grounds of the Middle School for the annual tree planting. This year

a Fall Fiesta Sugar Maple was planted. Larson directed the students in how a tree should be planted, including digging the hole to the proper dimensions, clearing and trimming the root ball and planting the tree at the proper depth in the hole.

"Every year in the fifth-grade science teacher Ann Anderson has trees and Arbor Day as part of her curriculum.," Williamson said. "And every year, we as a conservation district provide the tree and help the students put it in to try and make the campus as nice as possible." Assisting with the tree planting were Sarah Raber from the City Parks Department and School Board Vice President Scott Reder.

The Butte County Commissioners listened to a myriad of comments, questions, and plans at the regular afternoon meeting on Tuesday, April 19. Once again, the commission room was near capacity as concerned citizens heard the business of the county.

The dry conditions have increased an ongoing problem in the county and Darren Messner approached the commissioners about dust control on McCoy Road, Valley 1 Road, and Snoma Road. Messner asked if the county could either drop the speed limit from 45 mph to 25 mph or help with putting mag on the gravel roads.

Although he realized that the county had no ordinances concerning nuisances found at county subdivisions, Messner wondered what the plans were for the influx of new residents. He listed several areas that would need attention, including garbage control, mosquito control and junk around housing. "A subdivision is only as good as the people within them," he pointed out.

Sheriff Fred Lamphere suggested that he begin the process of addressing an ordinance. His sentiments were echoed by

In his later years, some of Al's happiest days were spent with his grandson Jesse fishing, flying drones or just hanging out around a campfire. Family remained a constant source of happiness and pride throughout his life.


Al had a talent for fixing most anything mechanical and took great joy in making things run. In his teen years, Al worked with Marvin Curtis at the family's Skelly Station working on cars, which started him down the path to repairing things. After attending school in Quinn and Wall, SD, he followed his interest and attended Denver Auto Tech in Denver, CO, upon graduation applied these skills in the US Army as a Wheel Vehicle Mechanic and a Sharpshooter. A longtime friend Zane Rhynard brought him to WY where he turned his talents to the mining industry in WY as a heavy machinery mechanic, first in Medicine Bow with Shirley Basin Uranium Mine and Medicine Bow Coal, and later in Wright with Thunder Basin Coal. In 1996, Allen & Ellen moved to the Black Hills near Newcastle, WY from where Allen continued work until his retirement in 2012.

The need to fix things wasn't restricted to his work life. Al found pleasure in bringing vehicles and machinery back to life and always had project cars - particularly Festiva's - and equipment at home to tinker with in his spare time.

His passion for vehicles didn't stop at fixing them. Al enjoyed a bit of speed! Al, Dale Kjerstad and George Krebs also built and raced a stock car at Black Hills Speedway. In his younger days, Al could be found riding his motorcycles with abandon off-road and on. He raced in the Badlands Baja & Hill Climbs in Sturgis. Al even had a big road bike for cross country trips. When he wanted to go for a little ride, you never knew which state you would end up in.

Al enjoyed the outdoors his entire life. In grade school Al, brother Bruce and friends "The Curtis Boys" started a hunting & trapping club and hunting and fishing became lifelong passions. While living in Medicine Bow, he loved driving through

he Snowy Range and Shirley Mountains, looking for all kinds of wildlife. He hunted with friends in the Snowy Range, Jackson Hole, the Big Horns & the Black Hills. He also loved fishing with friends and family and kept a boat for summer fishing on Lake Oahe, but mostly he prized sharing that time with grandson Jesse. Al taught Jesse how to drive the boat, tie lures, and to catch fish.

Al meshed his loves of the outdoors and vehicles. He went 4-wheeling on back roads through the Black Hills with his daughter, son, grandson, and friends. He even took up mountain biking! At one point, Al and his friend Jack rode the entire Michelson Trail. To combine two of his pastimes, Al mounted a gun rack to his mountain bike so he could go to hunting areas that could only be accessed by biking or hiking.

Al's sister Marjean introduced him to golfing. They traveled all around Wyoming and South Dakota to golf as well as longer adventures to Nevada where they could golf, gamble and see family and friends. Al even went golfing in Alaska when visiting friends and was able to experience some "combat fishing" for salmon and deep-sea fishing for halibut.

He was most proud of his children and grandson. He was able to watch them grow and become loving and caring adults. Al had a lot of family and friends and was grateful for all the lives he touched thru his life.

### "What Now?"



As many know, the most wonderful week on the Christian calendar has just passed. Easter 2022 has concluded. It is easy to get excited about what we celebrate each year at Easter. While Good Friday remembers the brutal and torturous death of Jesus, Easter celebrates the reality that Good Friday was not the end! Easter memorializes the resurrection of Jesus! The grave could not hold Him and death could not defeat Him! He is alive today! So, what now? What will we do the following weeks and months as Christians? In I Corinthians 15 the apostle Paul wrote about some things that he referred to as being of "first importance." In verses 3 and 4 he wrote, "For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received, that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, and that He was buried, and that He was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures." From those verses we see that the substitutionary death of Christ and His resurrection are primary, foundational doctrines of the Christian faith. The bodily resurrection of Jesus is the hinge upon which the door of Christianity hangs! Without the resurrection of Jesus, the whole structure of Christianity falls. And in I Corinthians 15 Paul addressed that very thing. Later in I Corinthians 15:14-17, Paul wrote, "And if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is vain, your faith also is vain. Moreover, we are even found to be false witnesses of God, because we testified against God that He raised Christ, whom He did not raise, if in fact the dead are not raised. For if the dead are not raised, not even Christ has been raised; and if Christ has not been raised, your faith is worthless; you are still in your sins." In other words, if the resurrection of Jesus did not occur, then Christians are wasting our time and we are blaspheming God by propagating

something about Him that is not true. Finally, in verse 19, we read this, "If we (Christians) have hoped in Christ in this life only, we are of all men most to be pitied." If the resurrection of Jesus is false, then Christians should be the most pitied people on earth. After all, we would be wasting our lives on something that doesn't even matter. Rather than living this short life we have on earth in self-indulgence, we would be found to be squandering on lives living for something that is merely a myth believed by deceived people. However, here is the other side. If Christ really is who He claimed to be and if He really was killed for our sins and raised again as the Scriptures foretold, then that means that Jesus is worthy of everything in our lives! Paul wrote in verse 20 very simply, "But Christ has been raised from the dead." In fact, earlier in the chapter Paul gave evidence of Christ's resurrection in the form of eyewitness testimonies. In verses 5-8 we read, "And that He appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. After that He appeared to more than five hundred brethren at one time, most of whom remain until now, but some have fallen asleep; then He appeared to James, then to all the apostles; and last of all, as to one untimely born, He appeared to me also." There is historical evidence that Jesus did, indeed, rise from the dead! As a result, one theologian wrote this, "Most tombs are famous for what they contain, but the tomb of Christ is famous because of what it DOES NOT CON-TAIN." If Jesus really is the Son of God who willingly laid down His life for us and was raised back to life, then that demands a response. Rejection or complete allegiance! Turning away from Jesus or a complete, total surrender to Him! Where do you stand on this? What do you believe? Have you made Christ Jesus the Lord and King of your life through faith and repentance? If not, I pray that you will consider this, for there is literally nothing more eternally important than this.

## Steer Wrestler Dakota Eldridge Snares Big Win at San Angelo Rodeo

SAN ANGELO, Texas – Rodeo success has been commonplace for steer wrestler Dakota Eldridge in his career.

The Elko, Nev., native has qualified for the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo eight times – 2013-17, 2019-21 and won the NFR average twice in 2015 and 2017.

Eldridge is eyeing trip No. 9 to the NFR, and he took a step in that direction by winning the average at the San Angelo (Texas) Rodeo with an 11.1-second time on three head.

Eldridge clinched the win with his 3.5-second effort April 15 before a sellout crowd at the Foster Communications Coliseum.

"Oh man, this feels awesome," Eldridge said. "It feels really good when you can come down here and do your job. This kind of still feels like a winter rodeo to me even though it is spring now I will be off to California (Saturday)."

Eldridge departed San Angelo after earning \$12,379, including \$9,354 for capturing the average. The rodeo was a stop on the NFR Playoff Series presented by Pendleton Whisky.

"This is huge boost to a guy's confidence and a huge boost financially, and I can't thank the San Angelo (rodeo) committee enough for making this one of the best rodeos out there." Eldridge said. "This gives me a lot of confidence to keep things rolling."

Eldridge, who was riding Clayton Hass' standout horse Benz, has been in numerous high-pressure moments in the arena in his career and he welcomes the challenge.

"I crave them," Eldridge said about high stakes runs. "This is what we do for a living. When I get to the short round, the hard part is done. (In the short round), I just get to go out there and have fun and do my job and let it all hang out and make the best run I can."

Eldridge entered April 15 just outside the top 20 in the PRCA | RAM World Standings and will climb up near the top five in the standings after his performance in San Angelo.

A year ago, Eldridge finished 11th in the world standings with \$131,409. He finished a career-best second in the world standings in 2015.

Other winners at the \$660,746 rodeo were all-around cowboy Zachary Jongbloed, (\$7,048, tie-down roping and steer wrestling); bareback rider Keenan Hayes (176 points on two head): team ropers Derrick Begay/Colter Todd (12.8 seconds on three head); saddle bronc rider Spencer Wright (175.5 points on two head); tie-down ropers Tuf Cooper and Tyler Milligan (23.5 seconds each on three head); barrel racer Dona Kay Rule (43.72 seconds on three runs); and bull rider Toby Collins (166.5 points on two head).

### Area Receives Much Needed Precipitation from Spring Storm

Western South Dakota received some much-needed precipitation from a late-April storm which began with heavy rain and hail and ended with blizzard conditions across much of the area. Storm total precipitation ranged from 1 to 2.5" inches of liquid and snow totals from a trace to more than 14 inches. Wind gusts reached 70 miles per hour.

According to National Weather Service a significant low-pressure system approached the northern plains on Friday, April 22. Ahead of this system, warm, moist air was advanced into our region with temperatures in Belle Fourche and Newell close to 70 degrees on Friday. Thunderstorms began to develop early Friday evening, some of which became severe, dropping large hail and producing strong winds. Several places received an inch or two of rain, much needed in our current drought situation. Storms moved eastward and dissipated Friday night. On Saturday morning, precipitation increased again as a large low pressure approached from the south, and rain changed over to snow. Northwesterly winds became strong, gusting to 70+ mph in some locations. The

strong winds combined with the falling snow created very poor visibilities and hazardous travel conditions. Some areas received heavy snow, but even in areas that didn't receive heavy snow, the blowing snow caused blizzard conditions.

Emergency crews were busy over the weekend pulling vehicle and semi-trucks from the ditches along Highway 85 and Interstate 90. Both roadways were closed at times. Icy conditions at the top of Redwater Hill early Monday morning resulted in a multiple vehicle mishap with the Butte County Sheriff's office, Belle Fouche police department and BF Volunteer Fire Department with ambulance responding.

Snow totals ranged from 22 inches south of Gillette with 4-8 inches in the Belle Fourche / Newell area. Winds gusted to 71 mph in the Buffalo area where they received 2.4" of liquid precipitation. Warm temperatures and calmer winds settled into the area on Sunday afternoon as much of the snow was melting. The forecast calls for moderate temperatures with rain chances the latter half of the week into the weekend.



NISLAND – Village Missions Central Mountain District Representative Sean Carney, who is a former Village Missionary, made his regular bi-annual trek to the Nisland Independent Community Church to meet with members. And he brought along some very good news.

On March 6, the departure of 17+ year Pastor Doug Clark, left a hole in the church pulpit, so to speak. The church board expected it would be some time before the mission organization the church is affiliated with would be able to provide a new full-time pastor to fill that spot.

Several good things the church had going for them were the fact that the independent church is fully self-supporting and has provided for a pastor for the past 48 years. They also have a five-bedroom pastor's residence available. These two factors helped in the quick response by Village Missions in supplying a new pastor for the field.

Carney served many years as a Village Missionary at the Newell Christian Church, so was familiar with the area. As he met with the board, he shared a bit with them about the process of finding a new missionary. In usual situations in denominational churches, the board must go on a search themselves. In the case of Village Missions, which supplies pastors to rural churches, they do all the leg-work.

Carney said that there are currently around 18 VM fields waiting for a full-time pastor to be placed. The organization just held a candidate school to help fill some of those positions. These schools are held for those meet certain requirements set down by VM, including an inquiry letter from a candidate, a pre-application, a full 20-page application with 10 references for both the pastor and for his wife, if married.

Once the candidate jumps through all those hoops, there is a sit-down in-home interview with the family where their lifestyle is observed and they are asked questions about their concept of rural-America ministry, philosophy and doctrine.

"Then the DR (district representative) makes a recommendation, (to the VM board)," said Carney. "If the candidate is recommended by that board, they go through the candidate school." It's quite a screening process, according to Carney. He said there are three open fields in his district besides the Nisland church.

This empty position will be filled by Chris and Bethany Jones of Leoti, KS, where they have been serving a residency (internship) position at Carwood Community Church for VM. The couple has five children and joined Village Missions originally through a church in Mingle, KS. June 5 will be their first Sunday at Nisland.

## Newell School Moves Forward on Expansion

NEWELL – "It's a little up in the air right now," said Superintendent Andrew Fergen. "But an ideal time to build would be fall of 2023. We want to do it right, even if it takes longer." The school is working on a large expansion to the ag-science building on the northwest side which will house a lab for a large woodworking area as well as a potential classroom area.

The current lab area houses a welding area and Careers/Technical Education teacher Trev Fiedler said it would be less expensive to make the new area a woodworking area rather than try to move welding equipment.

Along with Kassandra Champion, the agriculture teacher, Fielder said they had been able to receive quite a bit of funding from Perkins Reserve Grants to purchase new computer-controlled equipment. They've received a record \$120,000 worth of equipment and tools for the program. This year they will add a robotics program to the CTE training, which will give students another area for a career path.

The school is currently in the architectural phase, with a recent board meeting approving the selection of an architectural firm. The program expansion will utilize ESSER III funding for the architectural fees and construction.

"I look at this as a longterm benefit (for the school) in getting it done with ESSER funding," said Fergen. "We want to get students out of poverty type positions and into something that will change their lives. At \$30,000 (fees) most

room, with focus on the lab first. Fiedler said the total cost for everything they 'wanted' to do was over \$1 million.

Some of the CTE classes that are available or will be with the expansion and new robotics program include: Engineering, Cabinetry, Advanced Cabinetry, Welding and Advanced Welding, Construction (building structures), Manufacturing (running equipment and building components) and Ag-Food Science. With the departure of the current art teacher, the school will be looking for someone with CTE training so that classes such as business, graphic design, photography and math can be included in the roster. "It's awesome that some of

the kids (who graduate and train in CTE) will probably make more than me when they get done," said Fergen. Fiedler said South Dakota has done a really good job promoting CTE classes with the Build Dakota scholarships.

The current welding class is working on a new sign for the old marquee area with a large N and the word Irrigators on it. It should be finished before school is out and be placed soon.

"We are exploring all options for what we're going to include," said Fiedler. "We have a meeting before the next board meeting so we can share ideas." He said they are looking at the budget, and getting more grants to continue funding this type of education.

The cool part, is not just the robot," said Fiedler of the next program to be added. "It's about every area that is opened up to kids by learning this. With so much going into manufacturing, and machines driven from CAD (computer aided design), they'll have a real advantage.'

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#### April 20, 1922

J.L. Pyle and Sheriff Arthur Lefores came to Newell on Tuesday afternoon to serve a warrant on John Herbrick, proprietor of the Model Pool Hall, the charge against him being that of keeping and maintaining gambling apparatus to his place of business. Herbrick was arraigned before Justice H.W. Jamison and asked for a continuance of his preliminary hearing which was set for next Monday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock. He was allowed to go Victor, the 10-year old son of Mr. & Mrs. Conrad Lundgren, living in the Empire community, was brought to the Newell Hospital Monday morning suffering from concussion of the brain, as the result of being dragged and repeatedly kicked on the head by a horse he was attempting to lead. At the preset time the boy is in a critical condition.

#### April 23, 1942

Relatives and friends of South Dakotans held captive by the enemy may communicate directly with them through the International Red Cross Commission in Geneva, according to information received from War Department by Guy H. Harvey, state director for the office of government reports. All requests for information and correspondence relative to Americans who have been captured or interred by the enemy should be addressed to "Information Bureau, American Section, Office of the Provost

#### April 29, 1952

Civil Defense needs immediately 21 volunteers in the Newell area to receive training and serve as aircraft spotters on a 24-hour basis; according to word received last week by N.M. Holmes, Civil Defense Director for Newell. The US Air Force has requested Civil Defense to set up a network of aircraft spotters in the northwestern part of the county and the local requirements are for a spotter supervisor and 20 additional spotters. Work would be on a 24-hour basis, with someone to be on alert for aircraft at all times and to report all such aircraft sighted, giving the location, direction of flight and approximately altitude. Spotting in an area extending from 4 miles in each direction from Newell and any person or family is eligible for the work.

Lange advises, it is hoped, that the Ross-Kayras Post of the American Legion will sponsor the club, in which any youth of the community interested will be welcomed, also that several matches or tournaments may be arranged. Although all participants are novices, they show considerable promise. The meeting starting at 7:15 PM sharp will be either at Austin Auditorium or the City Hall.

Monday evening of this week, vandals engaged in some wanton destruction at the Newell Municipal Golf Course, where members of the Newell Golf Club have been making needed improvements. Two benches were torn up and broken, a newly constructed tee-box damaged, a city sign and gate chain stolen or destroyed and a number of markers bowled over.
