BFHS Hires New Activities Director

BELLE FOURCHE- The Belle Fourche School District has named Adam Nowowiejski as new activities director. Nowowiejski will take over from retiring director Clay Anderson and will assume his new duties on July 1st.

Nowowiejski is by no means a stranger to the Belle Fourche community or the school district. He served as head football coach from 2008-2015, coached middle school track and has taught science in both the middle school and at the high school. He and his wife Traci have also owned Ski's Pizzeria on the city's south side since 2013.

"I am very much looking forward to this opportunity," Nowowiejski told the Beacon. "I sincerely hope I can bring a lot of energy and some fresh ideas into the department."

Nowowiejski says he has learned a lot from his predecessor over the many years in which Anderson served in the position.

During its regular meeting on April 15th, the Belle Fourche City Council conducted a canvas of the April 9th city elections. Ballots were presented to the council by Breanna Schaefer, City Finance Officer. Council members examined the ballots and results of the election were confirmed after the vote counts were examined.

In Ward 2, Annie Reich received 57 votes, Karen Mondillo received 52 votes. In Ward 4, Robert Somervold received Ager tallied 29 votes. Nominated in Ward 1 with no opposition was Monte Talkington and in Ward 3 with no opposition was Vern Hintz. All four seats will assume new 3-year terms. The vote canvas was approved without objection by the council.

Vern Hintz joined with others on the council including Mayor Gloria Landphere in thanking outgoing council members Fred Ager and Kayla Kinard for their service.

In other news the council approved the bid from Sacrison Paving of Whitewood to construct two asphalt paths at the Roundup Grounds. The first was a 385' path from the parking lot to the grandstands and the second was an 8' wide, 295' path to the handicap restroom. Total bid for the project as approved was \$12,240. The council also approved a Engineering for design, plans and specification work to be done on improving the airport access road. The plan is to place a new asphalt surface on the access road and parking areas at the Belle Fourche airport.

HDR Engineering presented an update on the new Day Street Lift Station project which covered progress made up until March 2nd. According to the report, preliminary construction plans and specifications are currently being developed. Geotechnical borings and lab work have been completed by HDR's subconsultant AET. An invoice in the amount of \$3,552.03 for payment to HDR. Thus far \$39,347.71 has been spent on the project which represents 40.8% of the total allocated not to exceed \$96,425.

The Hay Creek Bridge project on 8th Ave continues to progress on schedule. Work is to be completed by mid-June, perhaps earlier. The city council approved a change proposal request by Ainsworth-Benning to add an additional street drain on the south side of Kingsbury Street to improve drainage as it slopes downhill toward the intersection with 8th Ave. near the

In today's changing society, mental health concerns have skyrocketed in our community and in our nation as a whole. One in five people will be affected by mental illness in their lifetime. Suicide is the second leading cause of death for adolescence and 22 veterans die by suicide each day. Belle Fourche Counseling along with many other organizations are raising awareness by fighting stigma, providing support, education and advocacy for mental health as a part of Mental Health Awareness Month.

Weekly during May, Kayla Grams, Licensed Professional Counselor and owner of Belle Fourche Counseling, will present a series that focuses on building our understanding of mental health and highlights ways to enhance our overall mental wellness. Kayla says, "Conversation around mental health bring about a range of feelings from fear to empowerment. Belle Fourche is a

community of people that show up every time to help those who are hurting. The shame and isolation that generally accompany struggles with mental illness create a lack of support for affected individuals. I believe that increasing our understanding of mental health will reap positive benefits for our community as a whole."

The four-week series will explore social connections, spirituality and religion, humor, work-life balance, and recreation as ways to boost mental health and general wellness.





Pastor's Perspective

This week's Pastor's Perspective is provided by Thomas Pruett Minister, Northern Hills Church of Christ. The Heart of the Mind

"I go with my gut," says one. "I have a plan," says another. We all know people who are more "gut" or "mind," meaning they listen to one more. Impulsive versus planner, snap decision versus analytical, they do seem opposites. But must they be?

Philippians 2:5 says have the mind or attitude of Christ that as He counted others more important than Himself so should we. This sounds like classic gut versus mind: when you serve someone do you plan it out or act? Why not both? The word for mind or attitude is a Greek word that literally combines both the gut feeling and the analytical thinking of our attitudes, bringing an inner feeling into outward action. It's a thought out gut feeling or impulsive analysis.

Why does this matter? When we can serve someone we must be aware of that gut feeling

to act but also think about the best way to serve one another. God isn't after only our heart or our mind, but says to love Him with our heart, soul, mind, and strength. Our challenge is to, with God's help, make the two meet and emulate Jesus with the entirety of who He made us to be, our mind & heart working together to serve Him & each other. The Optimistic Gardener

"Winter lingered so long in the lap of Spring that it occasioned a great deal of talk." - Bill Nye

When is it really Spring? When we see the greening of the grass or the opening of first crocus flower? Or when we spy the first robin of the season hopping across the lawn looking for worms? Or, as

the cabbage family, including cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower, kale and kohlrabi. Strawberries, asparagus and rhubarb also can be planted early. It is prime time for planting bare root- semi-dormant shrubs, trees and vines which are sold bare, not in pots, with the advantages of lower prices, ease of handling and planting, compared to potted plants. The only caution is that bare root plants need to be planted soon after they are received, with the roots kept cool and moist in the process. When planting early, when nights

with confidence that they are accustomed to our weather. Plants that come from greenhouses, or from warmer climes, are not going to be adapted to our early spring conditions. So, as lush and attractive as newly arriving plants may be, now is not the time for them to be put out in the early spring chill.

Spring is for all the senses! Already a musky smell rises up from the soil, and the fragrance of spring blooms will soon perfume the air. The smell of spring flowers can trigger instant recall of springs past, and touch the soul. Some of our best fragrances are from blooms of cherries, plums and apples, lilac and roses. Also mock orange (like orange blossoms), daphne and abelia shrubs. Perennials like phlox, daylilies, iris, peonies and dianthus (pinks) are some perennial favorites for fragrance. Underlying smells come from the soil and changing natural processes, from seriochemicals and green leaf volatiles, which trigger changes in other organisms, and the whole living world comes into play. It won't be long until Spring smells as good as it feels. "Spring shows what God can do with a drab and dirty world." - Virgil Kraft

The harbinger of Spring's return, for this gardener, the definitive sign is hearing the frogs croaking chorus rising from the creek bottom as the wet earth comes alive. After a bumpy ride, Spring has come to Hay Creek. Life within the soil is stirring, and planting can begin.

What are the first things we can plant? Seeds for root vegetables like radishes, carrots and beets can start in cool soil, as well as other cool season vegetables- onions, peas, lettuce, spinach and chard. A little later, the next phase

can still be below freezing, plants that are in the natural weather cycle are what you want, even if they are just emerging, not the tender greenhouse babies that will go into shock when planted outdoors. For tender plants, it is mid-May before the odds are on your side for planting;; for Belle Fourche, May 15 is the average last frost date. But for semi-dormant plants, either bare root or in pots, you don't have to wait. For perennials, new growth is beginning on plants which have been kept outdoors and can be planted

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

Sheriff's Budget Feeling Sting of Rising Mental Health Service Cost

Trend Likely to Exceed Last Year's Record Expenditure.

BELLE FOURCHE- Butte County Sheriff Fred Lamphere recently returned from the Western State's Sheriff's Conference in Reno, Nevada, with one over riding concern; the rising cost of processing and securing the help needed for self-harm and mental health cases.

"It's really an epidemic that every sheriff's office is seeing," Lamphere told county commissioners last week. "It's not just in Butte County, but it's a real issue everywhere."

The problem is this. When a county resident tries to inflict self-harm or exhibits mental health issues that need immediate medical or law enforcement attention the sheriff's office must secure the situation until the individual finds medical or other professional treatment. Often that can take from 12 to 36 hours.

"If that person is from outside the county we have to pay for the processing, whether its taking them into custody, evaluation, or transporting them to mental health facilities in Rapid City, Yankton or Sioux Falls," Lamphere said. "State statue allows us to protect our costs by billing the county of residence of the individual.'

However, as Lamphere outlined for the commissioners, since Belle Fourche does

not have an emergency room, and with an increase in drug use leading to more psychotic behaviors nationwide, more and more Butte County residents are presenting at the hospital emergency room in Spearfish. Then the Lawrence County Sheriff's Department becomes involved if the patient threatens suicide or exhibits other potentially harmful or dangerous behavior. They then must secure the situation and process the individual. Lawrence County then contacts Lamphere's office to see if a deputy is available for transport, and if not, Lawrence County will absorb those costs and bill those costs back to Butte County.

"And the Lawrence County Sheriff's Office has been very good about that, working with us. But last year our costs in that area were the highest they have ever been," Lamphere told the Beacon. "And this year we are already on pace to beat last year,"

To that end, Lawrence County Sheriff Brian Dean sent a letter to Lamphere's office earlier this month formalizing the costs for these services in order to help in budgeting. The letter, which Lamphere presented to commissioners, specified that Lawrence County would bill Butte County \$34.95/hr for a deputy's time and 42 cents a mile for transportation. Additionally, \$80 for overnight lodging is added if needed during a transport. The letter states that cost to transport an individual to Yankton is around \$753.84, to Sioux Falls \$716.36 and Rapid City or Regional West, \$90.92. If an additional deputy is required another \$34.95/ hr will be added.

"When we get a call that a transport is needed we will do what we can to take care of it," Lamphere said. "But sometimes it is a manpower issue as to whether I have people who can just up and go. And when we get the call we have to move, we can't pick a choose a better time or wait until Monday.'

Lamphere says most mental health cases they must deal with can be traced to drug use. "We see a lot of depression which leads to suicidal actions which can be drug related. Or others who have used illegal substances that have gotten them into a psychotic state where they exhibit sensational behaviors or paranoia," he said. "And it's not just here, it's everywhere," he added.

Lamphere said it's not uncommon to see one or two cases a week in the county.

No action was required on the part of county commission as the presentation was informational as an aid in future budget planning





HISTORY OF THE ROUND-UP

Belle Fourche being located in the heart of the most lucrative stock country in the United States attracted the attention of the directorate of the Belle Fourche Commercial Club as the ideal place for the conduct of an annual Frontier Celebration and early in April, 1918, a committee consisting of R. L. Bronson, C. A. Quarnberg, Chas. S. Small and Roscoe C. Bangs, were appointed and placed in charge of the first Tri-State Round-Up.

This committee labored ardently in its efforts to perfect all preliminary work in connection with this celebration and inasmuch as the military needs of the Government required a large thank offering from Butte County for the conduct of the Red Cross, the Round-Up Committee made their first show a Red Cross Celebration and donated the net proceeds of the two-day show to this most worthy cause.

Starting out timidly with but a few bucking horses and a handful of riders, this Plains Show developed into one of colossal size and Belle Fourche was startled when several days before the curtain raising of the Round-Up, thousands of ranchers began to pour in from all corners of the globe. On July 4th and 5th, 1918, Belle Fourche a city of 2,000 accommodated, in true Western spirit, 20,000 visitors, the largest crowd ever assembled in western South Dakota. The local Red Cross Chapter replenished its coffers to the extent of approximately \$20,000.00 in addition to having the distinction of selling the highest priced lamb in the world, and the Round-Up was crowned with glowing success.

The business men of Belle Fourche in order to keep this Round-Up spirit alive have since purchased a seventy-five acre site adjoining the town for the permanent home of the TRI-STATE ROUND-UP. Each year, additional improvements will be made and in time Belle Fourche and its trade territory will have one of the most elaborate play grounds in the world.

"Wilson Bucking Horses" and "History of the Round-Up" are from pages of the 1919 2nd Annual Tri-State Round-Up Souvenir Program. A special thank you to Doug Engebretson and Doug Howard of Belle Fourche for generously providing documents from their historical collections for Beacon review. Was written before Yakima Canutt had a successful ride on Tipperary.

Wilson Broncs:

TIPPERARY, the world's most famous bucking horse, was raised in the Long Pine Hills of South Dakota by Elmer Wickam. The owner of this horse made many attempts to break him for saddle and finally gave it up as a bad job. The horse was turned out on the range and was allowed to run unmolested for five years and at the end of that time he was sold to B. E. Latham, with others, as a war horse. Latham tried hard to break this horse but his efforts were unsuccessful and Tipperary was sold to Charles Wilson of Harding, South Dakota.

Mr. Wilson came into possession of this bronc in 1925 and being interested in spirited buckers, he immediately saw great possibilities in this outlaw and put him through a scientific training course for bronc bucking.

Tipperary has been saddled and attempts made to ride him on approximately thirty different occasions and each time his rider has either been disqualified for fouling or has been thrown. Among the many bronc tamers who have attempted to top off this bronc are Sam Brownell, the 1917 world's champion bronc buster; Rufus Rollins a well known top notcher; Don Hibbarrd, Frank Gaylor, "Shorty" Davis, one of the world's best; Geo. Askins, Joe LeFlamme, Paul Barnard, Ray Losier, Bill Foreman and Garnet Shockey.

The horse is now ranged in the "jump off" country on the range of his owner, lives off the fat of the land and is guarded as carefully as a child.

Tipperary is 15 hands 3 inches high, a blood bay, looks like a thoroughbred and in bucking condition weighs 1,050 pounds. Although 15 years of age he still defies the world.

TIP-TOP was raised in jump off country near Harding, SD, by Wilson. The mother of Tip-Top is a full sister of Tipperary. Ever since his birth, he has been property of Chas. H. Wilson who has carefully trained him to follow in the footsteps of Tipperary. A bald face sorrell, built like a quarter mile racer, is six years old and in shape weighs 1,125 lbs.

Mr. Wilson's hobby is raising and training buckers and he rightfully holds the reputation of training the world's greatest bucking horse. Among his string which will be exhibited at the Round-Up and in addition to his top-notchers, **TIPPER-ARY** and **TIP-TOP**, are found the following: **Strip**, a 5yr. old; **Easy-Mark**, a 5 yr. old; **Easy-Mark**, a 5 yr. old; **Headlight**, a 6 yr old; **Tipperary Mary**, 12 years old; **Brownell**, 6 years old, and Dapple, 5years old.



Wyoming's JR Vezain Making Good Progress After Tough Injury

Veteran bareback rider J.R. Vezain continues to make progress after suffering a broken back while competing at the Pasadena (Texas) Livestock Show & Rodeo when he was riding Frontier Rodeo Company's Brazos Bash, Sept. 22.

The injury required surgery and has left him with mobility issues from the waist down. Vezain, a veteran competitor in Belle Fourche's Black Hills Roundup, addressed his rehab in an interview with ProRodeo Sports News earlier this month.

"I was rehabbing at Neuroworx in Sandy, Utah, since November," said Vezain, 27. "They have upgraded me to taking steps with bodyweight support. My wife (Shelby) is getting ready to have a baby boy (the couple's first child) May 14, so the closer that (date) came the more we were wanting to be at home. I talked to the therapist, and we did some new testing. They set me up with an at-home program to come to do some strength training for the next six to eight weeks until after the baby comes. Then we will touch base and make a new game plan after that. My in-laws turned the garage into a gym, and we have a bunch of equipment set up." Vezain, a native of Cowley, Wy and a six-time qualifier for the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo (2012-14 and 2016-18), returned home to Melstone, Mont., from Sandy, Utah, earlier this month on April 5. "I have been back rehabbing, and I elicit my own steps," Vezain said. "My hip flexor is firing, my quads are firing, my glutes are firing, and those muscles are flexing. I can elicit my own steps, but my leg muscles are still so weak that I can't hold myself up yet without

when this happened, I could have laid in bed and wondered why it happened to me and wonder if I was going to get out of it, or you can get dressed, get out of bed and make the most of it, and that's what I have been trying to do," Vezain said. "I'm relying on the support system I have and my faith. I don't know what the outcome is going to be, but I dang-sure know who holds tomorrow, and I'm going to keep working hard and keep on swinging."

Vezain got on a horse for the first time since his injury April 6.

"I rode a horse around the place here (in Melstone), and that sure was great," Vezain said. "I also got a four-wheeler rigged up with a hand-shifter, so I up my own saddle shop, and I got married and got busy with life and rodeoing," Vezain said. "I had not done much leatherwork for three years or so, and then when I went to Utah, Kent Mertin raffled off a leather bag that he made and some spurs. Through small talk, I told him I used to do leatherwork. He told me if I got bored to come over (to West Jordan, Utah), which was 10 minutes away and do some leatherwork. I spent every day there after rehab doing leatherwork. I've been making a bunch of Navajo purse bags. Kent told me to show some of my purse bags on the internet, and I've been blessed. I got a bunch of orders of purses and some belts."

Special Buck Any Whitetail License Proposed

The South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks (GFP) Commission proposed to add resident and nonresident any whitetail licenses to the choices hunters could choose from for future West River deer hunting seasons.

The proposal would create Special Buck any whitetail deer licenses to be allocated at the greater of four percent of the total resident West River deer licenses that include an any whitetail deer tag from the previous year or a minimum 500 each for resident and nonresident hunters.

The proposed licenses would cost \$169 for residents and \$554 for nonresidents. If a person successfully drew a special any whitetail deer license, they would not be able to apply for a West River deer license in the initial and second drawings.

If a person successfully drew a West River deer license they would not be eligible for a leftover special any whitetail deer



license.

Special Buck licenses are only valid on private land. An applicant must have permission from an owner or lessee of private land before applying. An applicant for special any whitetail buck must also include the name and telephone number of the owner or lessee providing permission.

The GFP Commission will consider adopting the proposal

on May 2 at Custer State Park's Creekside Lodge. To comment in person, the public hearing will be held May 2 at 2 p.m. MDT. Individuals can comment online at https://gfp.sd.gov/ forms/positions/ or mail them to 523 E. Capitol Ave., Pierre, SD 57501. To be included in the public record and to be considered by the Commission, comments must include a full name and city of residence.

will continue to meet and solicit funding, as well as make more plans for events to support their efforts in coming months.


The other important news was the canvasing of the election votes for the city/school election on April 9.

April 29, 1909



Will Be Taken at Once April 21 – The text of the preliminary peace treaty will be transmitted to the press Friday or Saturday of this week. April 25 or 26, the Petit Parisian says. The Fiche de Paris declares that in case Germany refuses to sign the preliminary peace a special train will immediately be put at the disposal of the enemy delegates for their return to Germany, and allies will take military and naval measures to enforce the treaty

war, and that the war is over? Are you glad that our sacrifice of the best of America's young manhood is over, and now instead of facing death at the hands of the German armies, they are facing the prospects of returning to their homes and your hearts? America's Greatest Battle New York World: The official figures for the Mouse-Argonne struggle, which is likely to be known in history as the Battle of the Argonne, have been issued; and they show that so far as numbers are concerned it is our greatest achievement in war. Perching commanded there 631,000 American troops and an auxiliary force of 128,000 French. He employed 600,000 men in the St. Medievality, but victory was won then quickly, and our losses were comparatively small. We had eleven divisions, or about 300,000 men, at the Second Marne, where our men played a decisive part, but then we were under the French high command. The toll that we paid in the Argonne Forest and along the Meuse was terrible, because that was conceded by all the military leaders, French and English as well as American, to be the most difficult part of the German line, as it was the most vital. The Germans, aided

by the nature of the country, also accumulated forty-seven of their best divisions for its defense, and they fought desperately, knowing that if the Americans got through the game was up. Our men went through, but they suffered 115,000 causalities, of whom about 20,000 were killed. The Argonne was not as spectacular as the Second Marne, or the breaking of the Hindenburg line, but more than one-third of our casualties in Europe occurred there.

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
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

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
