Variations Granted, Renewal Applications Approved

BELLE FOURCHE-Amid heated discussion and several protests, the Butte County Commissioners approved the cannabis renewal applications for Black Hills Bud Dispensary and Cultivation licenses and Red Water Cannabis Dispensary license.

The Commission Board recessed and reconvened as the Butte County Board of Adjustments to hear input from the public concerning the applications. Katie Hoffman pointed out that in her opinion the Board should have gotten recommendations from the Planning Board before voting on the license renewals. State's Attorney LeEllen McCartney gave her position to the commissioners based on the idea that the Board is legal to make decisions on a variance for cannabis businesses.

Hoffman had said that according to the minutes from February 21, 2023, the Board of Adjustments "will take recommendations from the Planning Committee" and asked if the commissioners had consulted with the Planning Board members.

The minutes of the February 21, 2023 minutes read "Planning Board will take Commission Board guidance when completing section on variances in the Subdivision Ordinance." Further stating in the next paragraph, Butte County Commission Board as the Board of Adjustments will take recommendations from the Planning Committee. Hoffman claimed that the second paragraph is clear that the commission should take recommendations from the Planning Committee on any variance granted.

McCartney pointed out that the Planning Committee does not have any input concerning cannabis businesses. It is the purpose of the Board of Adjustments to hear appeals on decisions.

Attorneys Nicholas Moser and Nathan Chicoine for Black Hills Buds and Redwater Cannabis, respectfully, gave their arguments for a variance based on South Dakota Codified law 11-2-26, which reads as follows:

11-2-26. Continuance of nonconforming uses permitted--Discontinuance.

Any lawful use, lot, or occupancy of land or premises existing at the time of the adoption of the zoning ordinance may be continued, even though the use, lot, or occupation does not conform to the provisions of the ordinance. However, if the nonconforming use, lot, or

occupancy is discontinued for a period of more than one year, any subsequent use, lot, or occupancy of the land or premises shall conform with the zoning ordinance.

Attorney Nathan Chicoine also added SD Codified law 11-2-49: 11-2-49. Appointment of board of adjustment or commission as board of adjustment--Rules--Variances to terms of ordinance.

Except as otherwise provided by § 11-2-60, the board shall provide for the appointment of a board of adjustment, or for the planning and zoning commission to act as a board of adjustment, and in the regulations and restrictions adopted pursuant to the authority of this chapter, shall provide that the board of adjustment may, in appropriate cases and subject to appropriate conditions and safeguards, grant variances to the terms of the ordinance.

Both attorneys said that a denial of the variance would cause a hardship on the business owners.

Following the discussion during the Board of Adjustments public hearing, the board voted four to one on approval of the variances. Commissioner Chad Erk was the one dissenting vote.

The Board of Adjustments adjourned and the County Commission reconvened to decide whether to approve the licenses for Black Hills Buds and Redwater Cannabis. Following the roll-call vote, the renewal licenses were approved with one dissenting vote by Erk.

Earlier that afternoon, there were other public comments directed to the commissioners from several others, including Dale Simanton, Janette Stearns, Katie Hoffman, Sue Broadhurst,

Bronc Bird Busters Sports Team

Bronc Bird Busters is a local shooting sports team. The name comes from organizations that sponsor the team, as the team itself does not receive any school district funding for this extra-curricular activity. The team raises all the money themselves; however, a good portion of the funding comes from an event they host. Each year the team hosts an annual event called the Bird Buster Invitational. During the most recent invitational, approximately 10,000 clay targets were used because the event is open to the public. This year the 3rd Annual Bronc Bird Buster Invitational is Sunday, June 4, 2023, at the Spearfish

Trap Club.

The Bronc Bird Busters first started in 2018 with only a trap team. This year the group has trap, skeet, 5-stand (similar to pheasant hunting), and sporting clays (walking course, similar to a golf course) available to the team. While sporting clays have a fall league, the rest are spring leagues. Bronc Bird Busters have also recently started a shotgun team. The team is available for students in grades 7 through 12, and they also have an adult division. The team participates in events using virtual scoring with other teams across the state. The head coach is Clint Crowley, and assistant coaches are Tony Musilek, George King, Chris

Jackson, Pat McKenna and Mike Klocek.

By participating on this team, students can receive a varsity high school letter and receive scholarships through the shotgun team. The team is open to different schools and includes homeschool students, and there are 26 participants this year. There are three different divisions for students to compete in including junior varsity, novice, and girls' and boys' varsity. The Bronc Bird Busters compete against other schools at conference.

There are 9 different schools that compete, and there are both A and AA regions. Schools can also compete individually. For trap, there are 52 schools in South Dakota that compete. Each year, students have qualified and gone to state, and this year's state tournament will be held in Aberdeen, SD on June 9 for skeet and trap. The state tournament for 5-stand will be held in Fort Pierre, it will be held on June 10. In July, the Bronc Bird Busters may possibly have 10 students attend a tournament in Ohio as well. Good luck to all the students preparing for the state tournament.

Belle Fourche Ambulance

Two well-maintained ambulances occupy the spacious Belle Fourche Ambulance Barn on the corner of 6th and Grant in Belle Fourche. Both ambulances are always prepped and ready for a call to any emergency. Two ambulance attendants are on duty at all times.

Altogether there are 24 EMT employees including director Donnie Walding who works 9-5. Six of the employees are full-time. Donnie explained the qualifications of the staff. Six are highly trained paramedics, five are advanced level providers and the rest have EMT basic training.

Becoming a paramedic requires intensive training. Paramedics are trained in 12 lead EKG as well as ACLS which stands for Advanced Cardiac Life Support. They are licensed to administer medications in the event of cardiac arrest. Donnie explained that paramedic training takes about a year and a half of full time study including several hundred hours of clinicals and ride times with an instructor in an ambulance. Advanced level providers and basic EMTs also are required to have many hours of training.

Paramedic work is a calling. Donnie noted, "I didn't know what I wanted to do after my military service. I went to Western Dakota Tech on the GI bill and signed up for the Fire Safety Program. One of the courses was in EMT Basic." Donnie immediately gravitated to the profession and soon earned his paramedic licensure.

There are many good things happening for ambulance services in South Dakota thanks to recent funding allocated by the state to upgrade equipment and improve rural ambulance

services

Belle Fourche will receive two new lifepacs, one for each ambulance. A lifepac is a device that measures a patient's heart rate, blood pressure, and other vitals and performs tasks such as cardiac monitoring, pacing and defibrillation. The current lifepacs are somewhat outdated and their technology can no longer be updated. The cost of a life pac is \$44,000. LifePacs are used on 70 percent of ambulance calls.

The Tri-State Museum and Visitor Center will mount a mini exhibit entitled "Batter Up! The History of Baseball," to open Saturday, May 27. Family Fun Day Does Knot Disappoint

Tri-State Museum hosted nearly 20 attendees at Family Fun Day on Sunday, April 16 for a presentation all about Yarn and String. Attendees learned about the many ways string has been used throughout history since its invention at least 120,000 years ago and the profound impact it has had on civilization.

Kristi Thielen gave a presentation about the ways in which the very first types of strings were made, the most common types of string we see and use today, and the many uses of yarn and string, from human needs such as clothing and rope, to simple enjoyment, such as embroidery and string figures.

"String and yarn are part of the expressions we use all the time," says Thielen. "If you learn the ropes, it means you're learning to

do something. If you're hanging by a thread, it means you're in a dangerous situation or close to failure. If you spin a yarn it means you're telling a tale, and if you pull strings it means you're making use of an authority figure. So, string and yarn not only function in society as material things but they're part of our language."

Each participant was invited to create their own unique project with a bag of string and yarn, which produced many unique designs, from string art, to musical instruments, to string figures.

Family Fun Day is held the third Sunday of each month from 2 p.m. - 4 p.m. at the Tri-State Museum and Visitor Center. The Family Fun Day topic for May 21 will be "Birds", with a visit from the Black Hills Raptor Center. Space is limited so reservations are encouraged!



Channel and The Cowgirl Channel, which will excite and be embraced by our large and growing audiences on both sides of the border, and around the world."

Under this new agreement, The Cowboy Channel will be the new home of the Canadian Finals Rodeo (CFR), which takes place every November in Red Deer, Alberta, along with the Maple Leaf Circuit Finals in Regina, Sask., the SMS Equipment Pro Tour Finals and several other premier

stops along the SMS Equipment Pro Tour including but not limited to: Wainwright, Ponoka and Strathmore, Alberta; Williams Lake and Armstrong, British Columbia; Morris, Manitoba and Regina, Sask. Numerous Canadian pro rodeos will be part of The Cowboy Channel's very popular 100 Rodeos in 100 Days schedule, which begins in June 2023 with Reno Rodeo and ends in September with the Pendleton Roundup.

"Rodeo is just as big in

Canada as it is in the United States," said Jeff Medders, The Cowboy Channel President and host of the NFR. "Whether it is fans traveling from Canada to the NFR in Las Vegas every December, or Canadian cowboys and cowgirls competing in PRCAs to earn their spot to compete at the NFR, the sport of rodeo is growing by record numbers."

Spring Works

Still building on the chute and corrals. We got some continuous fence put in where old planks had broke and rotted off. Looks good. I used to make all my corral fences like a windbreak, but then cussed the drifted snow in the corrals. So now I make them fairly open. They stiff drift in some snow but not as bad.

We got all the posts set for the chute and the lower sides in, but still have to fill the bottom half at an incline with dirt. Some of them posts are 14 foot up off the ground, so finding a way other than a shovel to fill in the dirt is an interesting prospect! Our son who has the locker in Newell, Ryan, has a little tele-handler, and he has a scoop and pallet forks for it, so we hope it will go high enough to dump over the side. The posts are all on 8 foot centers except right at the front, where they are 4 foot apart so we can put a trucker gate in, so it don't leave much room. And of course we put it close to a shed, so you really can only dump from one side. May have to hire a neighbor with a back hoe! Or resort to shoveling. I have used a shovel a lot in my life. Even dug a hole by hand the other day. The ground was wet as far down as you wanted to dig. And I sure hope it stays that way with some additional moisture

All my little purchased first calf heifers calved and seem to be doing good, but they all seem to have a hard time remembering who's calf is whose. That must be why most people tag. I am glad I didn't have to tag these. They seemed to be REAL good mothers!

This evening a couple girls showed up and played with the ponies in the corral. Their older brother was helping us, so when we played Chance out, Gabe and I went and hung a new gate and then he worked with my little two year old colt. Nice horse. Seems smart. Gabe did good. I rode out and checked the cows. Seen all the calves and they looked to be well fed, so came home, ate supper and now I am thinking of a hot tub of water and then bed.

Sure have been enjoying the spring weather, tho' the wind gets a bit tiresome, but I just keep telling myself at least we don't have 2 feet of fresh snow for it to blow around!

Be sure to take some time and go listen to all the birds and look at that wonderful grass that is coming ever so slowly!





and Luke Bundt. Simanton pointed out the bullying done by commissioners. Hoffman had a list of reasons for the removal of commissioners and the State's Attorney.

Stearns spoke on another slant as she asked the commissioners to consider current (cannabis) business owners. She encouraged the commissioners to allow marijuana business owners to continue under the original ordinance that they were approved under.

Broadhurst had asked to be on the agenda, but had not been placed. She had several questions on the cannabis ordinances and applications, including the present ordinance. Broadhurst thanked Commissioner Stan Harms for answering her previous questions.

Bundt thanked the commissioners for their service. He had several remarks on the benefits of cannabis, pointing out that it is tested and that the last thing a cannabis business wants is for people to go to the street for cannabis that they need.

The commissioners approved the Butte County Cattle Guard Policy. Commissioner Erk pointed out that although he was a landowner and had several county roads that ran through his property, he felt he could be impartial. The policy reads as follows:

“The Board of Butte County Commissioners shall approve applications to construct new cattle guards across a county road. If a cattle guard is installed across a county road without approval by the Board of Butte County Commissioners, the landowner may be required to remove the cattle guard.

“New cattle guards on county roads shall be installed and maintained by Butte County Highway Departments. Landowners will be responsible for

purchasing the cattle guards and concrete abutments.

“Replacement of existing cattle guards on county roads shall be completed by Butte County Highway Departments. The landowners will be responsible for purchasing the cattle guards and concrete abutments.

“New and replacement cattle guards shall meet the following specifications:

*A minimum of 7' in width X 24' in length for County Primary Roads.

*A minimum of 7' in width X 20' in length for County Secondary Roads

*Must have concrete abutments and metal tops.

*Tubing may be round or square, with cross members every two feet on center, and only have wrap around straps on top of the rails running parallel to the road.

*Cattle guards must be heavy enough to meet HS20-44 loads.

*If landowner constructs their own cattle guard, it must meet current SD DOT Standards for construction of a cattle guard. The Landowner must provide proof that the cattle guard is certified at the SD DOT Standards. (which can be gotten from the County DOT)

“All present cattle guards on county roads may be grandfathered in and all maintenance and cleaning shall be Butte County Highway Department's responsibility. All maintenance and cleaning of cattle guards will be scheduled by the Butte County Highway Department.

“Butte County Highway Department will decide if an existing cattle guard needs to be replaced. The notice to replace the existing cattle guard will be given to the landowner in written form, with a completion timeframe of 30 days from the date of notice.

“Any exceptions to the above policy shall be approved by the County Commissioners.”

area will require specific training. Cheryl Anderson is the new CHW in Belle Fourche. She has served as an EMT for three years.

Another new service is called “Telemedicine in Motion” This innovative service already up and running in Newell.

Essentially, the program provides tele-service to Emergency agencies. The system provides the ambulance crew with access to emergency room professionals on the trip to the hospital. There are many lifesaving advantages to Telemedicine in Motion. Ambulance personnel will have access to professional advice and the intake time at the emergency room can be drastically reduced, allowing staff to treat the patient more quickly. Telemedicine in Motion should be available in Belle Fourche sometime in May.

Donnie Walding emphasized the professionalism of EMT work. All responses are treated with the same urgency. “We don't run lights and sirens on every call.” Donnie explained. One reason that in an emergency Flashing lights and sirens is dramatic, it's also harder to perform CPR chest compressions effectively in a vehicle that is racing through town. Lights and sirens are dangerous and more likely to distract drivers on the road increasing the risk of accidents.

“One of the advantages of years of experience is that paramedics understand how patients are feeling in an emergency and can help them feel calmer. Experience and training help EMTs empathize with their patients.

The Belle Fourche Ambulance Service is administered funded under a tri-party agreement and funded by three entities,

The City of Belle Fourche, Butte County and the city of Newell. Employees of the Belle Fourche Ambulance Service are not county employees or city employees. They are not paid the same benefits awarded to employees of the county of city. Although they have retirement benefits through the county, there is no dental or medical.

Prior to 2015 most EMTs were volunteers. Since then, pay has improved. Last year the BF ambulance service made just under 1,000 calls last year and each year that number rises.

On that note Donnie Walding complimented the staff, “We have great employees.” A lot of friendships have been made here, We are like a family. We celebrate life milestones and holidays together. It's the best place to work.” My employees know that I will strive for improvements.”

PROPOSED RECOGNITION OF MEXICO: Secretary of State Appoints Two Commissioners to Confer With Representative of Obregon
Washington, D. C. - April 24 - Secretary of State Hughes today appointed two commissioners to go to Mexico City and form a conference with two representatives of the Mexican government, to discuss the differences between the two nations and endeavor to reach agreement on proposals to be submitted which will lead to recognition of Mexico by the United States, and establishing of diplomatic relations. The commissioners named are Charles B Warren, former ambassador to Japan and John Barton Payne, former secretary of interior, and head of the Red Cross organization in the United States. Mexico will appoint two commissioners to meet the American representatives at an early date in an effort

to adjust the differences which have prevented recognition of the Obregon government of Mexico. Diplomatic relations were severed on the downfall of the Carranza government in 1920. The commissioners will be authorized to discuss only the existing situation between the two nations. In event of failure on the part of the commissioners to submit a plan for recognition which could be approved by their governments, it is expected that the present status will continue.

COMMITTEE STARTS NEW IMPROVEMENTS ROUND-UP GROUNDS Replanking and Bracing Seats - Grandstand Seating Arrangements Altered

The grounds committee is contemplating several new improvements out at the Round-Up grounds, which will be completed by the time that the Premier Event of the West opens on July 3, 4 and 5. The committee comprises K. K. Arthur, Frank Evans, Deacon Weaver, Lem Overpeck and Lon Newell. Replanking and bracing of seats has been ordered. A new top might replace the deck roofing above the west bleachers. The contractor doing the work, Kenneth Lester and crew, will also construct out buildings, new ticket offices on the grounds, and overhaul the box seat section. In the big stand, there will be improvements in entrance ways with the addition of two new approaches to the big grandstands. A bull corral with feed racks is also planned. The ticket committee, under Urho Jarvi, Ray Wood and Geo. C; Johnson, has worked out a whole new layout for the convenience of easy ushering and seating in the grandstand. Instead of the three former distinct grandstands, titled X, Y, and Z, there will be only one large grandstand, to be divided into 18 sections averaging 200 seats per section. The change is due to a system of renumbering the present seats. The box seats will be more numerous under the revamped plans. The new sections will be

marked A. B. C. on to T, with no section having a duplicate number, rows will start from number one, at the bottom and run to the top rail in rotation order from one to twenty. Seats in each row will start from one and run to the next aisle, then start from number one and repeat for each row. Marshall Sign Company has been contracted to paint out all the present numbers on the seats and to renumber according to the new plan. Every row will bear its number on the steps leading to it. Every section will be marked with abig letter against the roof up near the back centering the section There should be no mistake in reading a ticket stub and guiding a patron to his seat. Back of the stand will be big signs over each entrance way to direct the ticket holder to the entrances that accommodate certain sections.





Training and Trying Out the New Stuff

NISLAND – The Nisland/Arpan Fire & Rescue department came together on Tuesday night, April 25, to get educated and to try on some new gear. Second Chief Ronald Fickbohm demonstrated the latest “drip ???” to the crew of around 10 firefighters. He also spoke about the proper techniques for use and storage of a partially full tank.

“We also got the FLIR which is the latest model,” said Fickbohm, referring to the new thermal imaging camera “It has a flashlight option, as well as a way to take photos of whatever is on the screen.” That will be invaluable in documenting structure fires as well as identifying “hot spots” in walls of burning buildings.

Each member of the department had the chance to handle each firefighter tool. The thermal camera has the capacity to store up to 10,000 images, as well as provide the safety option for firefighters to know what’s inside a wall that they can’t see.

Brian Mills, a newer member of the department was able to try on and show off his brand new bunker personal protection gear. This was a set that was ordered in 2022 and just finally came in. The department has the plan of ordering two new sets of bunker gear for fighting structure fires each year. The gear, which includes a turnout jacket and pants, can run as high as \$3000 so the option of outfitting each firefighter with new gear is not feasible.

The group meets twice monthly, with the business



"Looking Forward to our Past"

April 24, 1913

Encroachment of the homesteader and farmer on the free-stock ranges of Montana is driving the sheep raising industry out of that state. We should be concerned of this tactic here in our territory.

Andrew Lange and F.G. Finn from near Station Elm left Monday for an outing up in the Black Hills and may stop at Lead, on their return and seek employment.

The Castle Rock School house will so be in shape for the spring term of school. It will be one the neighborhood can be proud of when completely gone over and painted and the school yard enclosed with a woven wire fence with a large swinging gate.

April 26, 1923

Thomas MacKrell's family has been suffering from the grip. Mrs. MacKrell is still ill. Miss Gladys is home helping during the spell of sickness. Empire School was closed this week on account of an outbreak of scarlet fever. Miss Maude Grant, who has just recently returned from the Rapid City Hospital, is much improved in health.

A surprise party was held at the home of Mr. & Mrs. John Salmen Sunday evening. They are moving to the Frank Roughton place, east of Newell. Abraham Ahonen has leased the John Salmen place on Dry Creek.

There will be a meeting of the Farm Bureau held in the assembly rooms of the Horse Creek School house on Wednesday evening, May 2. K.H. Dubach

of Huron, one of the state directors will be in attendance and present some matters of great interest. All are cordially invited to be present.

April 27, 1933

Sheepmen in the Newell territory, it is reliably reported, have refused offers of 16 cents a pound for their wool. According to information from Belle Fourche, it is said that Butte County banks, who pool their wool each year, are asking better than 20 cents for this season's clip.

The ranch house of Mr. & Mrs. Hugo Reiche 3 miles east of Newell, was struck by lightning last Wednesday evening and besides causing injuries to their son, did considerable damage to the house. The boy was injured when the chimney toppled over and suffered numerous body and facial bruises. Dr. Clark, who attended the lad, reports that splinters from falling timbers were lodged in the boy's chest and face. The bolt virtually split the house into 2 parts and tore the roof off. According to report, all the damage was covered by insurance.

A supply of a variety of garden and seed potatoes from the State Relief Commission was brought to Newell Saturday and delivered to A.W. Richards, local RFC officer, who will distribute the same among those who have been on the relief list during the past winter. In order to secure the seeds, it is necessary to perform 1 day's work and sign an agreement that the seed will be planted and properly cared for.

April 21, 1943

The State Supreme Court reversed the holding of the Circuit Court in the case of Frank Miller of Iowa versus Wm Marty of Strool. The case was heard at Buffalo last April. It was brought by Miller to recover \$1,000 down payment on sheep he had contracted to purchase from Marty. The sheep were delivered to Belle Fourche, but Miller refused to receive them and complete the deal. The Lower Court returned a decision in favor of Miller. The Supreme Court has reversed the decision, holding in favor of Marty.

All expiring ration stamps that are not used the consumer should be destroyed by him, according to the OPA. Blue Stamps A, B, C, D, E & F that might remain in a consumer's book No 2 after April 30th should be destroyed. Red Stamps A,B,C & D also should be destroyed, as should expired sugar, coffee & gasoline ration coupons.

Hunters and fishermen may now purchase, the over-the-knee olive drab, clay and Khaki colored Army rubber boots without a ration certificate. Still under OPA, rationing control are below the-knee height boots.

April 23, 1953

Mr. & Mrs. Edward Yoder and children and Mr. & Mrs. Ingman Karlson visited at the home of Mr. & Mrs. A.W. Holtry in Sturgis Sunday afternoon. Mr. & Mrs. Yoder and 2 sons are leaving Saturday for Fairbanks, Alaska, where they plan to make their new home.


With about 6 businesses yet to be contacted, about 50% of the amount which it is estimated would be required to surface from the south end of Main Street to the Cemetery Corner has been subscribed, Roger Van derBoom reported at the regular meeting of the Newell Community Club at the Corner Café Tuesday noon. N.M. Holmes reviewed possibilities of surfacing the road east from the old corner, south of town to the depot area, on which the Hafner Wool Company has agreed to pay 1/3 of the cost. No business was transacted at this meeting.

April 25, 1964

Mrs. Donald Seaman was elected President of the VFW Auxiliary to the Newell Post No.5807 at their regular meeting held at the Veteran's Hall. Tuesday evening. Other officers elected were: Senior Vice President Mrs. Shirley Bierle; Junior Vice President Mrs. Rosalee Dahlquest; Treasurer Mrs. Matt Klinkner; Secretary; Mrs. Howard Tennis; Chaplain & Publicity Chairman Mrs. Sam Sundstrom and as Trustees Mrs.

Bierle, Mrs. Paul Oksol and Mrs. Kenneth Sundstrom. Ray Simpson, Senior Vice President of the VFW at Mitchell as a former Civil Defense Director, gave a lecture on first aid and showed a film "Objective Survival" which presented information on radiation and fall-out in case of a nuclear attack and pointed out that Newell is in a target area in case of an attack of this sort. Lunch of cookies and coffee was served by the Auxiliary.

The name of James Taylor Craig, a native of Scotland who moved to Wyoming ranch at the age of 21 and for whom it was once suggested that the town of Newell be named, was added to the Great Westerners of South Dakota at the Annual Trustee meeting in Oklahoma City, location of the National Shrine. The name of the former South Dakota rancher, banker and stockman was added to the Hall, which is a division of the National Cowboy Hall of Fame & Western Heritage Center under construction atop a hill near Oklahoma City. Craig came to America in 1884, moved to the Wyoming ranch 1893 at the VVV Ranch, he was affiliated with the John Clay organization; founder of the new Butte County Court House at Belle Fourche; influential in securing US Experiment Station at Newell; Vice President of the John Clay banks; also served as Western south Dakota Stock Growers Association for 17 years and Director of Swan land & Cattle Company at Chugwater. Mr. Craig died in 1930.



(Left) Fredrick Haynes Newell was a graduate of MIT, a hydrologist and the Chief engineer on the new Irrigation Project. Since he was a friend of President T. Roosevelt and other high Government officials, the new town was named in his honor, "Newell". (Right) James Craig, he was a banker. He would loan money to people on just a handshake. Many of these people were first time land buyers and could not obtain a loan from any bank or lending institution. Because of his generosity, when the new town petitioned for a Post Office, it was suggested it be "Craig".


2023 Newell High School Senior Profiles


