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### **City Looks** to New **Phone System**

BELLE FOURCHE - The city of Belle Fourche is moving toward replacing the city's antiquated phone system with a new VoIP phone system. A proposal to accept a bid from Vast Broadband to provide the service was approved by the city's Legal & Finance Committee on April 11 and sent to the city council's consent agenda at last Monday night's meeting.

The move is seen as way to streamline communications between the public and city departments and may even see a monthly cost savings when compared to the current system. Bids were reviewed from three vendors: A&B Business Solutions, Vast Broadband and Verizon Wireless. A&B **Business Solutions offered** quotes for a monthly service plus additional costs ranging from \$8,000 to \$9,000 for new equipment. Vast Broadband's monthly service fee was slightly higher but according to the quote all equipment was included at no additional cost. The committee approved the Vast Broadband quote which came in at \$1,706.50 per month, all included. Vast currently handles the city's phone system.

#### **New Ordinance Would Create City Technology Advisory Board**

BELLE FOURCHE - The city of Belle Fourche is making plans to form a Technology Advisory Board. City ordinance 6-2022 to adopt such a board was passed out of the Legal and Finance Committee on Apr. 11 and was read during this past Monday night's city council meeting. The ordinance will have a second reading later this month, at the council meeting on May 16. If there are no changes or delays, the ordinance then will be publicly posted and twenty 20 days after public notice it will become part of the city code.

The purpose of the Technology Advisory Board will be to serve as a liaison between the public, the city council, city department heads and all of the city's information technology (IT) contractors. In addition, the board will advise and guide the care and maintenance of the city's technology needs. It will also promote technology and strive to increase the quality and type of services and hardware available to all departments. According to the proposed ordinance the board will also make use of its members' skill sets and knowledge to help department heads and the council through education, industry standards and real-world

The board will be required to regularly report and make technology recommendations to the city department heads, city administrator, mayor, and the city council. It will meet monthly and report to the council through the board's chairperson or designee each month on its activities and recommendations. Each year the board will be required to submit an annual report summarizing the activities, actions, expenditures, and receipts for the prior year, according to the wording of the ordinance.

Originally the plan was to have seven voting members on the board. That included one who was a member of the city council. After some discussion it was decided for logistical reasons that the number be reduced to four community members and one council members. Additionally, language that would provide a means for board members to be compensated was removed from the ordinance.

The ordinance states that membership criteria be based on having technical knowledge in some or most of the following areas: enterprise servers, enterprise networks, cyber security, desktop support, camera and physical security, telephone and internet technology and web design and social media expertise. The mayor will be assigned to appoint

#### Take a Bow, A Night of Comedic One-Acts

One-act performances are fun to watch, especially comedies. Although the Wednesday evening performance at the Belle Fourche Rec Center was sparsely attended, all four plays were well received. Baked goods available during intermission for the price of a free will donation to the Belle Fourche Area Community Theater were an added bonus.

The first play, Pandora's Revenge is loosely connected to the Greek myth about a curious young woman, Pandora who was warned not to open a mysterious box. Of course Pandora opens the box anyway and releases all the evils in the world, explaining why bad things such as war, pestilence and disease now exist. According to Greek mythology, evil in the world is

In this play, Pandora is a cat whose owner, Ida Simpkins convincingly played by Shirlene Jones seeks revenge for the various world evils she perceives, including Pandora's demise as the result of a drunk driver (aka, the young insurance salesman). Ultimately, Ida seeks retribution by murdering the insurance salesman for murdering her cat, Pandora. She blames the insurance salesman for not taking responsibility for his devious actions. Ida's plot is contrived and keeps the audience guessing. She even insists that she is saving the young salesman from experiencing the ravages of old age. Pandora's Revenge is humorous but dark and ironic too.

The next play Boise, Idaho has a cast of four. Three of the characters are involved in a sort of relationship triangle. The fourth character is a third

person omniscient narrator who butts in to tell their story. In this play, the main source of conflict seems to be about who is determining the course of the story, the characters or the narrator? Involving a third person narrator is an interesting theatrical device that somehow makes the audience wonder about the narrator's purpose and credibility in wanting to take over a story.

The third play was fairly short, written by director Derek Olson. In this comedy, Tristan tries to check into a hotel but is thwarted by the efforts of a hotel owner and a coffee shop owner who claim to be sisters, both named Maeve, (different pronunciations) but are really one person. Tristan's frustration is apparent, although Maeve's motive for creating the situation is not entirely clear.

The final performance of the evening, Self-Help, was also written by Derek Olson. This play was especially provocative. Abaddon portrayed by Garrett Merrow presented a wonderful satanic voice, although it was a little hard to catch all the words at times. The character, Abaddon was certainly commanding and threatening when summoned by three friends to help them with change their unhappy lives. After frightening each of the three friends, Abaddon helps each of them. In return, for helping them find value in their lives, the three friends release Abaddon from the fate of returning to hell, where he isn't really happy. Maybe the theme here is, Demons aren't really that bad after all and with a little kindness can live a normal

Marguerite Eleanor Kleven, age 91, of Sturgis, passed away on April 25, 2022, under hospice care at her beloved home of 54 years. She was the first-born child of A.B.

"Andy" and Jessie (Helmer) Mickelson on March 28, 1931, in the home of her grandfather, Chris Helmer. Over the next six years she was joined by siblings: Marilyn, Jim, and Patsy. By 1937, the family

had moved to the farm on Hwy 212 on Owl Creek, which continues to be in the family and is presently owned by one of her grand nephews. She graduated from Nisland High School in 1949, and then enrolled at Black Hills Teachers College to pursue her teaching degree. After her first year of college, she taught at the Ingersall School, East of Belle, for the 1950-1951 and 1951-1952 school year, and then returned to BHTC to finish her education.

After obtaining her degree she began teaching business classes in Hettinger, ND, in the fall of 1954. According to mom's meticulous record keeping she met a young Norwegian man from Minot on May 13, 1955, (Friday the 13th) who had come to Hettinger the year before to build and manage the new station KNDC. They were married March 15, 1957, at the Nisland Congregational Church.

By this time Les had already been in Williston building a new TV station, KUMV, for Meyer Broadcasting out of Bismarck. Marguerite continued teaching business classes for the newly formed Williston Community College. By the spring of 1962, the young couple along with the financial backing from local business owners in Sturgis including Betty Matkins, Jim Dickson, Clarence Glover, and Russell Molstad, built a small 1000 watt AM station on 1280 and signed on the air at 3pm, September 27, 1962. The original studio was located in downtown Sturgis on the corner of Sherman & 1st street, with Les & Marguerite living in an apartment upstairs. Over the years changes came to KBHB with the frequency change and power upgrade in conjunction with building the studio building East of town, up to 25,000 watts in the early 80's making the station what it is today. Over the years Les & Marguerite built and operated additional stations in Milbank, SD, Dickinson, ND, Jackson MN, and St Cloud, MN. Marguerite sold her last two stations (KKOJ-KRAQ) in 2015, ending 53 plus years of broadcasting. Marguerite served in the South Dakota State

Senate beginning in 1995, after being appointed by Governor Janklow to finish out the term

of her husband Les, who passed away on April 19, 1995. She continued to serve in the Senate until 2004. She served on the Meade County School board from 1980-1992. She was very active in the State Republican Party over the years from Precinct Committee-

woman to being a Delegate to the Republican National Convention.

Marguerite was a longtime member of Grace Lutheran Church, and as anybody who knew her knows she was on more boards and in more organizations than we can possibly list. Some of the more near and dear to her heart would be Zonta International, of which she was a charter member in 1972, Beta Sigma Phi since 1969, High Plains Western Heritage Center, Western Ag Conference, and in the last few years she really enjoyed the Sturgis Senior Center. With all the different boards and organizations that she was involved in, she always made time for the Wednesday afternoon women's bowling league which she thoroughly enjoyed for many years.

She is survived by her siblings, Marilyn Elenberger of Grand Junction, CO, Jim Mickelson of Belle Fourche, SD, and Patsy (Ralph) Dienstel of Rapid City, SD; children, Andy (Michelle) Kleven, Onida, SD, and Jezal (Mike) McNeil, Bozeman, MT; grandchildren, Preston Kleven, Onida, SD, Devan Kleven, Vermillion, SD, Kendra Kleven, Brookings, SD, Jack McNeil, and Ruby McNeil both of Bozeman, MT; she is also survived by Les's sister-inlaw, Inez Kleven of Washington State and a host of nephews, nieces, and cousins.

She is preceded in death by her husband Les; her parents, Andy & Jessie Mickelson; her mother and father-in-law, Joe and Alice Kleven; brothers-in-law Richard Elenberger, and Laurel Kleven; sister-inlaw, Deanna (Luft) Mickelson; nephew, Dwight Kleven; and nieces, Debby (Elenberger) Miller, and Michelle (Dienstel) Martell.

Jim loved helping people and he was honest, dependable and trustworthy. Jim was also very patriotic. Finding ways to help

veterans who were affected with Agent Orange and PTSD was very important to him. "The Wooden Cross"
There is a song by David Crowder in whom we have red that has been stuck in my head ever since Good Friday services at St. James Lutheran Church. I can still close my eyes and see the wooden cross, draped in black cloth. We had cleared the altar area of everything else. On Good Friday,

there are no banners and no linensnothing except for that cross.

The high school youth were leading the Good Friday service. The students had prepared dramatic readings to accompany each of the words that Jesus spoke from the cross. I read the Scriptures and then the youth responded by sharing songs or stories from authors ranging from Mother Theresa of Calcutta to David Crowder, a contemporary American singer.

I knew it would be a powerful service, but I was frankly unprepared for the waves of emotion that crashed in my heart as I contemplated the cross this year, 2022. Maybe it's the war in Ukraine. Maybe it's the environment. Maybe it's the pandemic. Maybe I'm still grieving my mom's death. Maybe it's just everything, all wrapped up in a sorrow that has been hard to shake at times this year.

The service progressed to the "third word" which records the exchange between Jesus and the thief being crucified beside him. Jesus says, "Truly, I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise." Then, Shaine and Lily read the lyrics to "Come as You Are" by David Crowder and there it was. One short sentence in this song has been on replay in my head ever since.

"Earth has no sorrow that heaven can't heal." That bare wooden cross stands as a stark reminder that God is willing to hold all our pain and brokenness and suffering. The cross calls us to the very center of our fallen humanity and then moves us to a whole new way of being. The apostle Paul puts it like this: "He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son,

in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins"

(Col. 3: 13-14). Earth has no sorrow that heaven can't heal.

Three days later, on Easter Sunday morning, we arrived at St. James to find that bare, wooden cross still standing at the front of the church. The cross was empty now. Yet, there was a spirit of anticipation and eagerness and excitement. As we gathered in the sanctuary, each person chose a blooming flower. One by one, we carried the flowers forward to the cross while we sang familiar Easter hymns. I imagine that the flowers came to represent our hopes, our dreams, our loved ones, or perhaps the bloom of forgiveness and the new growth of a redeemed life. As we each attached our flower to the cross, we saw a transformation from pain to beauty before our very

On Easter Sunday, I remembered again how much we need to see God in both the crucifixion and the resurrection. As Paul writes, "For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross' (Col. 1: 19-20). This year, the two words that stand out for me

are "all things." It really is true, you

know. "Earth has no sorrow that heaven can't heal."

#### Dawn Newland, Artist, Writer, Publisher, Speaker

Dawn Newland's presentation at the Belle Fourche Matthews house Author Talk series began with a survey. "How many of you have ridden a horse for more than 20 miles a day? "She asked the group. A few hands went up. The questions all referred to some things that Lucy Tressler would have done during her life as a frontier woman.

Dawn is a self-taught professional artist, author, publisher, speaker, and a research historian. Lucy Tressler is a real character. Dawn was first introduced to Lucy in August of 2010 by "Doc" Curtis, a retired veterinarian and Montana historian. It was Doc who told Dawn about Lucy Tressler, a frontier woman castigated in a newspaper article for leaving her husband and five children to run with Kid Curry and his gang. "I told him there had to be more to the story." Dawn told Doc. He challenged her to prove it. "I believe I have done it...It only took me ten years." Dawn explained in her presentation.

The series, Of Men and Horses may best be described as historiography. Lucy's story is factual and based largely on primary historical resources Dawn has



gathered on her travels to all the places where Lucy lived. The books are written from a third person narrative point of view. A Dead Hard Country is the first book in the series. The reader is introduced to a young Lucy and her five young children living in northern Montana in 1890s. She is married to Daniel Tressler, an abusive husband, nearly twice her age.

The Tresslers' nearest neighbors are a group of young cowboys. Among them is the infamous Kid Curry, known locally for robbing the bank in Belle Fourche in 1897. The neighboring cowboys

take an interest in Lucy and begin to intervene to protect her from her abusive husband. Another neighbor, a rancher named Jimmer Thornhill vows to help her get a divorce a feat not easily achieved for a woman in frontier days.

The second book in the series is Crazy Woman Creek. Lucv is still unable to get a divorce. A touching love triangle develops. Johnny Curry (Kid Curry's brother) and Jimmer Thornhill are in love with Lucy. Lucy chooses Jimmer although she is rebuffed when Jimmer is falsely

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accused of murder and leaves the area for a while.

The saga resumes in Arizona Tough now in print. It is 1919 Lucy is finally divorced. She and Jimmer Thornhill are ranching in the high deserts of Arizona. Dawn is humbled by the scope of her work. She does not consider herself to be an academic researcher, but she is. Dawn's books include a number of original illustrations. "The one thing I still search for is a photograph of Lucy. I have come across photos of many of the other characters."

Although, Dawn was told by several experts that she would never find enough information about Lucy to write a book, her third volume of Lucy Tressler's saga is recently published and the fourth is well under way. Book four of Of Men and Horses is untitled as of now, but will be available by January of 2023. #### Dept. Of Justice Recognizes WASHINGTON - The Office court proceedings and supervised Stambaugh

for Victims of Crime, a component of the Justice Department's Office of Justice Programs, presented the Volunteer for Victims Award to Linda Stambaugh, a Court-Appointed Special Advocate from Newell, South Dakota. The award honors individuals for their extraordinary and selfless efforts resulting in positive and lasting changes in the lives of

crime victims. "Ms. Stambaugh devoted countless hours to securing the safety and well-being of four young children, making the equivalent of a round-trip cross-country drive while the case was open to bring them to school, counseling, visits with their parents," said Amy L. Solomon, Principal Deputy Attorney General of OJP.

"She demonstrated great compassion and incredible perseverance in her heroic work on behalf of these neglected siblings. It is a privilege to honor her volunteer service that went above and beyond."

Ms. Stambaugh, a Court-Appointed Special Advocate for the Fourth Circuit Court of South Dakota, had only been working for nine days as a volunteer advocate when she received her first child abuse and neglect case. Four siblings between two and six years old had been found wandering the streets unsupervised on several occasions. They were placed in foster care while their parents tried to regain custody.

Ms. Stambaugh made 470 contacts on behalf of the children during the one-and-a-half years the case was open. She facilitated many visits, even transporting the children to sibling visits in two separate foster homes in two different communities so they could spend time together.

She also drove the children to supervised visits with their parents, counseling sessions and school, logging more than 7,000 miles. She continued to work with the children and their par-

ents to try to secure a successful reunification at the time of trial. When Stambaugh saw that the children were not thriving in the care of their parents, she effectively communicated this to the court, which ultimately found them a caring family, who adopted them together.

"Ms. Stambaugh was the one constant in these children's lives during a period of tremendous change, loss, uncertainty and confusion," said Kristina Rose, Director of OVC. "Her steadfast dedication and support helped stop the cycle of child abuse and neglect for these four children and put them in an environment where they can begin to safely heal and grow."





## **BF High School Baseball Heating Up**

In case you haven't heard, Belle Fourche has a high school baseball team this spring. This past winter, Belle Fourche Youth Baseball decided it was time to join the South Dakota High School Baseball Association, and after a unanimous school board vote on April 11th the Broncs are now considered an official high school club sport. South Dakota and Wyoming are currently the only two states in the nation that do not have sanctioned high school baseball now that the Montana High School Association has approved the addition of baseball and will begin play in 2023.

Instead, to give South Dakota High School athletes the same opportunities and experience that neighboring states provide, the SDHSBA was established over twenty years ago.

After a slow start to the season and a handful of postponements and cancellations due to cold temps and snowstorms, the Broncs finished up their April games by picking up midweek wins against Lead-Deadwood on Wednesday and a thriller against St. Thomas More Thursday evening. Then kicked off the month of May winning via run rule against Chamberlain/ Kimball/Lyman. Belle Fourche Broncs Head Coach Randy Doran commented on the slow offensive start to the season, but knew it was only a matter

of time before the bats would come alive, "Hitting is always the last thing to come around. No matter how much work you put in during the offseason doing tee work, working on mechanical adjustments, hitting off a pitching machine, batting practice, or even live at bats in practice, nothing compares to stepping into the batter's box during a live game. It takes time and reps, and we knew that it was only a matter of time before our guys found their grove on offense."

The Bronc bats were lightning hot on Wednesday's regional seeding game against the Lead-Deadwood Golddiggers winning the game 27-5 after 3-innings via run rule. Plate discipline and working into "hitter's counts" resulted in 18 walks and 11 hits in only 2-innings of offensive output including a 3-3 night by Senior Right Fielder Ryker Audiss. Senior Center Fielder Gabe Heck and Junior 2nd Baseman Brayden Carbajal both had two hits apiece, and Junior DH Caden Thomsen had a hart hit double. The hitting barrage was highlighted by a 2-run homerun over the left field fence by Sophomore Shortstop Nolan Wahlfeldt. Heck, Thomsen, Audiss, and Senior 1st Baseman Sean Wahlfeldt all finished the night with 3 RBI's each. "Early in the season I felt our team was too eager, too anxious with our

to be more patient and wait for their pitch that they could drive. Lead-Deadwood started a really good side-arm pitcher against us who threw hard with a lot of movement. locations scattered throughout a city. Also a VoIP system eliminates the need for fax lines and long-distance charges. The portability of a VoIP system would also allow the option of city employees to stay connected with the city phone system while working remotely, since connection relies on internet lines and not telephone lines. For city residents it means that calls can be transferred more efficiently between departments. For example, if someone calls City Hall wanting to purchase rodeo tickets, the city hall employee can simply transfer the caller to the Tri-State Musuem and Visitors' Center. As it stands now, the caller would have to hang up and find the phone number for the museum and call back.

The proposed new VoIP phone system would connect all of the city's departments including: city hall, public works, the police department, the Rec Center, Tri-State Musuem and Visitor's Center, the cemetery, library, city-run liquor store, landfill, fire department and scale house.

If a problem with a telephone arises the city does not have to pay for a new physical telephone. It is treated in much the same way as your cable TV company would treat a broken cable box. According to Vast, they would simply replace the broken telephone with a new one. This is seen as another cost-saving measure since the city currently has around 58 physical phones. The city's new VoIP phone

system proposal was to be set before the entire city council at last Monday night's meeting. There was wide speculation that it may be moved from consent to the regular agenda for further discussion.



It will include the start of the "Walking History" of Belle Fourche".



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#### **Concerned Citizens Seek Improvement**

NEWELL – Concerned citizens all over Butte County are gathering together in an effort to see positive changes come to the county. Several who have already been meeting feel that some changes that were made in a previous election do not show the voice of the majority of people in the county.

"We want the people of our community to be informed of what their local government is doing to represent them," said Travis Ismay of Vale. "We have been made aware of the medical marijuana laws and ordinances for, not just the county, but the state." Ismay said that the county commissioners share that 60 percent of Butte County voted in favor of medical marijuana. Ismay says that's misleading information and that, with a 28 percent voter turnout for the election that passed the law, only 1250 people out of a population of a little over 10,000 people actually voted in favor

of the legislation.

"Another point they make is that the county will make lots of money through taxing these entities, (but) what they leave out is that marijuana is still federally illegal and banks are federally insured so they cannot hold the money for any of this. It is an all-cash business." He, and others like Dale Simonton of Newell, ask how the county will be able to keep track of the

money and tax it.
According to Concerned Citi-

zens of Butte County (CCoBC), the county is able to make their own ordinance(s) to control time and place management. The state requires one dispensary per municipality. They are concerned about the placement of grow facilities, dispensaries and manufacturing complexes. Ismay said one of his biggest concerns is that at least one cultivation and dispensary is located just south of Newell along Highway 79, where there are foster care children living in the home on the property.

Another concern CCoBC has is that law enforcement in the county already has a full plate, and adding issues related to this industry would only add to those concerns.

The group's Mission Statement reads, "We are seeking to improve our county through truth and accountability making Butte County a better place to live." Ismay said they base their concerns and activities on Matthew 5:16, Let your light shine before men that they may see your good works and glorify your father in heaven. Buck Casey, who lives south of Newell, came here from California to get away from what he considered adverse living conditions there.

"And here it is," said Casey at a recent CCoBC meeting.

"They (commissioners) are approving all the grow farms, and dispensaries," said Simonton. "But they (still) have to submit them to the state for final approval, and then it comes back to the county commissioners." The county ordinance can be read online at the Butte County South Dakota website by clicking on the commissioner tab and scrolling down to ordinances and cannabis ordinance. The group banded together in August of 2021 to discuss concerns they had. Their first focus is on the marijuana issue, but they plan to address other things, such as circulating petitions to drop the number of county commissioners from five to three.

"That would save over \$48,000," said Simonton.
Currently, \$121,825.00 of the county budget is paid to commissioners with that total figure split among the five sitting on the board.

"We are tired of people just complaining," said Dusta Ismay. "We are trying to do something positive. The first thing is addressing the marijuana issue. More permits have been approved in Butte County than in Minnehaha (east river Sioux Falls)." She said the commission had dropped the permit fee from the originally approved \$15,000 to just \$5,000. "It's supposed to be limited per the law to two dispensaries and two grow farms."

In the meantime, the group encourages people to become informed by reading county



ordinance 2021-02, if they can get a copy. It currently is not listed on the county's website. They also encourage people to look at the county election district map, the location and the number of marijuana related facilities in the county and other information included in the ad the organization has placed and will continue to run in the Belle Fourche Beacon, right up to

the week prior to the election on June 7. The group has been attending commission meetings to monitor ordinances being passed and that they feel are contrary to community standards.



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

Bareback rider Caleb Bennett sidelined with elbow injury

Bareback rider Caleb Bennett, a nine-time qualifier for the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo, will be sidelined for up to six weeks with a right elbow injury.

Bennett had surgery on his riding arm elbow April 18 in Austin, Texas.

"I have had on-going problems with the elbow and it flared up pretty bad (around the first of March)," said Bennett, 33. "I had a bunch of bone chips and stuff. I was trying to ride with the (injury) as long as I could. My goal was to try and get through the end of April. May is slower as far as big opportunities for money and that would be my best time to take off.

'They gave me an elbow scope. They removed a lot more bone chips and pieces than they thought were in there. I had like 17 bone chips removed. I don't know how I was riding like that, but this is what I do for a

living, and I have to get it done. They say I will be out four to six weeks."

Bennett is 10th in the PRCA | RAM World Standings with \$38,923. Over the weekend, he earned \$6,622 at the San Angelo (Texas) Rodeo (April 15) and the Red Bluff (Calif.) Round-Up (April 17).

Bennett is hoping to return to action at the Darby (Mont.) Riggin Rally event on June 4.

With the money I won at San Angelo and Red Bluff, that dang sure made taking this time off a lot easier," Bennett said. "That did give me a boost in the standings, and I felt like I had a pretty good winter and spring so I'm not too worried about stepping away and there is so much money to be won from June on. My goal is to come back and win that gold buckle."

Bennett qualified for the NFR eight consecutive years from 2012-19 and then again in 2021. He finished a career-best fourth in the 2016 world standings and was ninth a year ago.

At the 2021 Wrangler NFR

presented by Teton Ridge in Las Vegas, Bennett placed in two rounds, highlighted by his Round 9 win with an 88-point ride on Rafter H Rodeo Livestock's Medicine Show.

#### Bareback rider Cole Reiner stays hot, wins Clovis Rodeo

Reiner was in his rookie season of bareback riding on the PRCA tour, he had a chance to climb aboard C5 Rodeo's Make Up Face. That bronc has been a mainstay in big rodeos the past several years, including at the Wrangler National Finals

"I got on him one time before, 2020 in San Antonio," Reiner said Sunday night. "I was 68 points. He beat me up pretty good, bucked me off right at the

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rodeo was a key stop on the NFR Playoff Series presented by Pendleton Whisky.

"Last time, I got on him when I didn't know what I was doing. It's always good to get a little rematch a couple years down the road. I feel like I was more prepared for it," Reiner said. "I had a pretty good idea of what I needed to do. Not getting out of control. That horse is really strong, so it's important to stick to the basics.

"He's really a cool horse, but you've got to expect anything. Halfway through a ride, when you think about how good it's going, that's usually a pretty good feeling.'

Indeed it was Sunday, continuing what's been a month of good feelings. Reiner took second in Weatherford, Texas, picking up about \$7,000, and then won the San Angelo Chute-Out for another \$7,500. That makes more than \$22,000 in earnings over the past three

"When you show good and you're riding good, trying not to get beat up and staying healthy, that's better than going to a bunch of rodeos. It really works good when you draw good horses like I have."

weeks or so.

Reiner stressed the importance of a good spring run, as

it helps him stick to his plan of

45-50 rodeos this year, followed by an anticipated third straight NFR trip. Reiner finished seventh in the PRCA | RAM World Standings last year, with \$190,187 in season-long earnings.

"One thing about rodeo is that when it's easy, it's easy, but when it's hard, it's really hard," Reiner said, noting right now, it's all coming easy. "There'll be ups and downs in the summertime, so you have to capitalize on every horse right

now." And again, it keeps Reiner's reasonable schedule intact.

"I can go to the best rodeos and get on more horses with better money," he said.

Other winners at the \$363,158 rodeo were all-around cowboy

Stetson Wright (\$12,229, saddle brone riding and bull riding); steer wrestler Nick Guy (32.6 seconds on four head); team ropers Jr. Dees/Levi Lord and Andrew Ward/Buddy Hawkins II (37.1 seconds on four head each); saddle bronc rider Sage Newman (90 points on Burch Rodeo's Rev Runner); tie-down roper Zack Jongbloed (41.8 seconds on four head); barrel racer Abby Phillips (50.78 seconds on three runs) and bull rider Stetson Wright (91 points on Burch Rodeo's Burning Bush).

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

#### **Badlands Security Looks For New Help**

BELLE FOURCHE - Since 2010 owner/operator Fritz Carlson, has been looking for more help each and every year. And this year, Badlands Security will need more help than ever before.

Carlson, who has a background in the meat cutting industry, and for years, followed in the footsteps of his grandfather and father, running Grandview Locker in Belle Fourche. He started working at that business at age 14.

His grandfather Carlson started in 1945, followed by his father Fred, who met his mother Marcie who was the first meat wrapper at the locker. At 18 Carlson worked as a bouncer, due to his size, he said. Then in 2010 he started working for another security company. Due to some problems, Carlson decided to form Badlands Security, and the rest, as they say, is history.

Badlands is a full-service security business taking care of all aspects of the business. They run security for the Deadwood Chamber Special Events and other events in the town. He has expanded to the Hills and beyond.

Some of the businesses they have provided security for include Wild Bill, Hickok's, Deadwood Mountain Grand, Tin Lizzie, Silverado, Tobacco, Days of '76, PBR, Loud American, Rumble On, Indian Motorcycles, Harley Davidson, Elkhorn Ridge, The Lodge, Holiday Inn, Motocross and Snowcross to name a few.

Up until now his team of security experts have provided security

"They basically have been stewards of the crowd, to make sure everything is going as it should." said Carlson. "We do ID checking, parking, traffic control, ticket scanning, watch gates, help with band and entertainer security, and provide bodyguard services.'

He said the roles are varied. They even got tapped to provide traffic control and parking for "Topless Tuesday" last summer at the Stoneville Saloon in Alzada, MT.

"Carter County (where Alzada is located) loves us," he laughed. "They want us to come back."

Badlands provides service for the vendors in the area during the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally, set up security systems, including cameras, and other features

"We are in Deadwood yearround," said Carlson. "Things slow down after September, but concerts keep us going. We also do October Fest, and now there's Outlaw Square (in Deadwood).'

He said currently he doesn't have any full-time staff, but all part-time so employees can work around the schedule of other jobs. But he still has a great need for employees all the time. At some events he needs as many as 50 people. Like during the summer he often has three or more events

going at one time. "We are beginning multiple events per day starting on Memorial Day, with three major concerts, a rodeo and a comedy show.'

He said, up to now, he has not advertised, but most of his help comes via word-of-mouth, his Facebook page and people seeing the team at different events.

His team monitors several different businesses, via remote cameras or a foot patrol that checks local areas during off hours. They also do employee ID checks for those coming to work, monitor shipments in and out of businesses.

"It grows every year, and this year looks to be better than last," he said. "We've 'heard' a lot of concerts and entertainers, but not seen them, due to being on duty and watch the crowd."

Some of the major acts they have provided either secuity or bodyguard services for include Hank Williams Jr., Everclear, Gary Allan, Shinedown, Chris Young, Halestorm and others.

"We are now gearing up for the cannabis industry and offering armed security," Carlson said. "I'll have a need for fully certified officers to handle the grow facility and dispensary security needs,' he said. The company will help with processing facility, money and product transfers and a host of other new opportunities and challenges.

"I have an absolutely amazing crew," said Carlson. "The skillset needed to be employed by Badland is to be age 18 or older, pay attention, do what they're told and have a good attitude."

For those interested in the cannabis related jobs, they will have to have certain other qualities.

Carlson said if there are folks looking to make some extra cash at some part-time jobs, he'd like to hear from them soon. He has a full schedule set up for the summer and needs employees to plug into

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

La Charreria is the official national sport of Mexico and, for Garcilazo, exhibits his skills aboard a horse.

On his beautiful mount, he does sliding stops, spins, turns, reining, side passes, all in Mexican style, choreographed to music. Garcilazo makes it look effortless, belying how much time he has put into his life's

While he performs, he wears the traditional Charreria attire, proud to represent his culture through his outfits and skills.

During his routine, he incorporates fancy roping, standing on his horse and jumping through his rope, like the Texas Skip, and finishing his act with the Wedding Ring, a big loop rope trick with 70 feet of rope spinning around him and his

horse as they walk around the arena.

Garcilazo grew up with a rope in his hands. "I didn't have many toys," he said. "My toy was my rope." He competed in bull riding and roping at Mexican rodeos and moved to the U.S. when he was 22 years old. Since then, he's spent two years on tour with the Will Rogers Follies, a six-time Tony Award winning show, performing in 48 states and two countries and twice in the White House. He's been a featured performer at Disney's Wild West Show in Paris for three years and performed at several horses shows in Holland, Germany and Italy. The content of the magazine will from time to time be shared in the Beacon.







Belle Fourche Daily Post May 14, 1946 Selective Service Law May End Today

Unless the selective service act is extended before midnight tonight, the draft act will expire, and with it President Truman's power to seize the coal mines. Administration leaders are doubtful that the draft act can be saved. The house yesterday approved the senate bill for a 45-day extension of selective service, but in doing so, it tacked on amendments to prohibit the induction of teen-agers and fathers. Unless the senate accepts the bill, with those amendments today, the draft will be wiped off the statute books. Chairman Andrew May of the house military affairs committee says in his opinion, the house action last night sounded the death knell for the draft law. Other committee members believe the senate will agree to the house changes in "five minutes."

Robert Craig Dies At Hospital Monday Robert Craig, 86, Belle Fourche, died at the local hospital yesterday morning at 11:30. Craig had been a resident of the Tri-State area for 44 years, since he and his brother George started a cattle ranch at Cave Hills in 1902. Robert Craig was born in Scotland in October, 1859. He came to the United States in 1881 and settled in Chicago, where he worked for five years as a carpenter. He went back to Scotland in 1887 and returned with his brother George, to the United States. For two years they worked in Chicago, and then moved to Gleenleaf, Kan., where they operated a ranch for John Clay.

Daylight Saving Time Approved By Businessmen As a result of last night's meeting of the retailers and trade extension committee of the Commercial Club, changes are that Belle Fourche will have daylight saving time this summer. Members of the committee decided to propose to the Commercial Club a resolution providing that Belle Fourche follow the policy of the rest of the Black Hills towns. Sturgis has already approved day-light saving time, effective June 1, while Lead, Deadwood, Custer, Hot Springs and Spearfish have voiced their intentions of setting clock ahead an hour this summer. The Commercial Club will, in turn, act on the proposal and hand it over to the city council for a final vote. The group of Belle Fourche merchants also decided last night to close their stores an hour earlier on Saturday evenings, beginning June 1, regardless of the final decision on daylight saving time.

51 Years Ago Belle Fourche Daily Post May 13, 1971 Utilities File Tax Suits Against County

Butte county is facing three lawsuits involving three of the biggest taxpayers in the area. States Attorney Leroy Hill said Wednesday that the Montana-Dakota Utilities Company, the Black Hills Power and Light Company and the Chicago and North Western Railway, all of whom have paid taxes under protest, have now filed suit charging that they have not been assessed on a basis equal with that of other local taxpayers. The assessments for utilities are calculated by the state department of revenue thru the state board of equalization while individuals and local firms are assessed by the county director of equalization. The protesting firms charge they have been assessed at 60% of full and true value, while others in the county are assessed in the area of 40%. The Black Hills Power and Light Company recently paid \$35,034.72 in taxes under protest, MDU paid \$53,335.11 under protest.

At the risk of repeating myself, let me share one of my favorite quotes. Gen. Eric Shinseki said to his troops, "if you don't like change, you will like irrelevance even less". All great changes are preceded by chaos, and upheaval, you must be willing to sacrifice where you currently are, for the vision of where your dreams can take you. 

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

# Newest Cannabis Cultivation Approved in Butte County

cultivation facility licensed to
operate in Butte County. They
have begun construction of
the growing facility south of
Newell on Highway 212. According to their website, once

plants. Target date for completion of the greenhouse is June 1,
but getting power to the facility
may push the date later.

A dispensary is planned to be located at the greenhouse, also. Initially, there will be six people employed, but according to Ed Reilly, CFO, long term plans are to employ about 40 people.

The Butte County Commissioners approved the Black Hills Bud, LLC applications for cultivation and dispensary during the December 7, 2021 meeting. The application was then forwarded to the state for final approval.




of heating the building and upkeep has risen as well.

We got a little shower in Wednesday night and I dumped .06" out of the rain gauge Thursday morning and then enjoyed the beautiful day with no wind. The temperature was 65 degrees and I was able to wash some laundry and it didn't take long for it to get dry. I went to the EMT training with Linda Mohagen Thursday evening. Pastor Henry didn't go because he was busy helping Brock Beeler.

It rained a little over a tenth of an inch Thursday and the weatherman said it was supposed to rain all day on Friday but we only got a tiny sprinkle. The only thing the weatherman gets right every time is when he says the wind is going to blow. Russell Beld called to see how much rain we had here and he said that he got about the same amount as we did, but he thought he got over 5 inches of wind! They got 34 of an inch of rain in Buffalo and 34 of an inch way over east of here, but the little amount of rain we've gotten has taken us out of the severe drought area and put us in a moderate drought area. My rhubarb plants, winter onions, chives, tulips and horseradish plants are up and the lawn is even starting to green up, so that tiny bit of moisture is doing some good.

We're getting close to being done lambing but there was still a lot of sheep to move around that day. Sunday was May 1st and the old saying that April showers brings May flowers proved true when I was walking home from the lambing shed and came across two tiny dandelions and several pretty

white May flowers blooming beside my raised bed gardens. A Little History for Those Who May Not Know:

Most people don't know that back in 1912, Hellmann's mayonnaise was manufactured in England. In fact, the Titanic was carrying 12,000 jars of the condiment scheduled for delivery in Vera Cruz, Mexico, which was to be the next port of call for the great ship after its stop in New York.

This would have been the largest single shipment of mayonnaise ever delivered to Mexico. But as we know the great ship did not make it to New York. The ship hit an iceberg and sank and the cargo was forever lost.

The people of Mexico, who were crazy about mayonnaise, and were eagerly awaiting its delivery were disconsolate at the loss.

Their anguish was so great, that they declared a National Day of Mourning which they still observe to this day. The National Day of Mourning occurs each year on May 5th and is known, of course, as Sinko de Mayo.

#### "Looking Forward to our Past"

May 2, 1912

Matt Schuster brought his steam plow over to the Empire Community from Bear Butte Valley Saturday. He has a number of jobs of breaking sod to do in that vicinity.

J.H. Senovoy, the milkman, set-out 120 fruit trees consisting of apples, crabs, plum and cherry trees. Also some raspberries, currents and strawberries. It not only pays financially to set out fruit and take care of it, but it marks the difference between the aborigines and civilized beings. A.B. Goss of Fairpoint was in town the first of the week after fruit trees to plant on his claim and for some of his neighbors. In a few years this country will be shipping out apples by the train load.

Mr. & Mrs. Titus gave Easter dinner to the Peregrine and Bingham families and Misses Titus and Taylor. Since that occasion, Mrs. Titus has been on the sick list and is no better at this writing, which we are very sorry to hear.

April 27, 1922 Officials recently elected for the newly organized Township of Vale are: Chairman F.A. Gammon; Treasurer E. A. Ritter; Assessor W.R. Glover; Clerk F.C. Brunger; Justice of the Peace A.A. Kinghorn; Constable Jacob Thompson and Supervisors Albert E. Henzel and U.S. Allison.

A prominent South Dakota manufacturing concern sent out circular letters advocating the buying of South Dakota products. The circular, however, was printed by a Twin City firm. That is the same spirit that many people have who advocate buying at home – then preach a lot and practice little.

April 28, 1932

On account of impassible road conditions the mail between Belle Fourche and Buffalo and Camp Crook was carried by airplane Tuesday, according to a report received here from Belle Fourche.

It is hoped that Miss Mira Satterlee, accomplished pianist of Yankton College may be in Newell this summer. Any interested in piano lessons will please speak to Mrs. Osenburg or Mrs. Jamison.

The Horse Creek and Indian Creeks were both over flowing the bottoms for the first time in several years, caused from the rains which we have had the past several days. The South Hilan folks are jubilant that, for the present, our drought is broken. Only farmers can appreciate fully what this means. It is almost 2 years since we've had a rain.

David Richards, in charge of the local registration, stated that the total for Butte County is about 875 and men in this group are not expected to be called to military service due to their age. However, they will be examined for occupational qualifications.

May 1, 1952 After mass of litigation in the proceedings by the United States of America condemn ranch lands near Moorcroft, Wyo, for the Keyhole Dam project, the Federal Court at Cheyenne rendered judgment on April 17th in favor of the 6 landowners in the approximate amount of \$750,000. The amount of the award was considerably more than double the amount of compensation fixed by the appraisers and offered by the government.

The Squire-Dingee Company, which has operated a pickle receiving and salting station at Vale for a number of years in the past, is planning soon to dismantle the station there, according to word received by Mrs. E.H. Kent. It is planned, she has advised, that the tanks will be shipped to a location in Mississippi, with the salt house and office to be either torn down or sold locally.

## Decker Helps Look for Ag Research Breakthroughs

NEWELL –In the fall of 2021, Tanvi Govil, a Ph. D. student at the School of Mines and Rajesh Sani, Ph.D., professor, joined Steve Decker on a visit to the Decker family farm in Spink County. Decker grew up on the farm in eastern South Dakota, and as a farm kid loved the rural life. He also loved science and that took him on a career path to becoming a teacher in the Newell school system, in high school math and

"Having grown up on a family farm, I really enjoy teaching in a rural town with such a focus on agriculture," says Decker. "My students think very practically, so I am excited when I find ways to incorporate local concepts into my curriculum. This can be difficult when also trying to meet the content standards, which is why I was excited to join the RET program at Mines."

Decker joined a Research Experience for Teachers (RET) program in the Karen M. Swindler Department of Chemical and Biological Engineering at South Dakota Mines where he began working in the Composite and Nanocomposite Advanced Manufacturing - Biomaterials (CNAM Bio) Center. He soon found that at CNAM-Bio he could bring together his love of science and agriculture.

Researchers at CNAM-Bio are making significant advancements in developing safe and clean ways for farmers to convert agricultural waste like corn stalks into valuable products. Tanvi Govil is a Ph.D. student with CNAM-BIO. Her research helped open a pathway to transform corn stalks into a commercially valuable biodegradable bioplastic while eliminating costly pretreatments.

CNAM-Bio is led by David Salem, Ph.D., a professor and director of the Composites and Polymer Engineering Laboratory (CAPE) at Mines, with Rajesh Sani, Ph.D., professor of chemical and biological engineering, as coprincipal investigator on the project. Sani and Salem are now working with Govil to expand the research to produce other value-added, environmentally friendly bioplastics and biofertilizers using their advanced technology. This work has a huge economic potential as the global plastic market alone was valued at \$435 billion in 2020.

"With the accelerating push towards sustainable production, bio-based manufacturing is poised to overtake petroleum-based production of chemicals in the next two or three decades, and South Dakota is exceptionally well-positioned to become a global leader and major beneficiary in the new industrial landscape dominated by bioproducts,"

says Salem.

This past fall, Decker worked alongside Govil, learning the mechanisms microbes use to degrade plant biomass and how this technology could be implemented in South Dakota to turn agricultural waste into a new source of revenue for farmers and ranchers today. For Decker, this hits home.

The research could greatly benefit his own family. His parents run the Steve and Beth Decker family farm in Spink County, SD. "When I learned what Dr. Sani, Dr. Salem and Tanvi were doing with their research and understood what it could mean to my family, I was thrilled," says Decker. "I also saw a complex science topic that my students could relate to. Farming, education and sustainability are all very important to me, and I saw this research as a way to bring them all together."

Decker collected corn stalks, corn silage and soybean plants from his father's farm and brought them back to the lab at Mines where they are being analyzed and enriched for possible future use. There is even a chance Decker could find a previously undiscovered microbe species, which he could name after his family farm. Eager to help find scientific breakthroughs that hold promising commercialization potential, the Decker family invited Sani and Govil to visit their Spink County farm. The researchers were delighted to accept, given the major focus of their own work is on helping South Dakota farmers by finding new uses for massive amounts of leftover corn stalks generated each year across rural America.

"This partnership was built on mutual trust and respect between the Decker's and the CNAM-Bio team. It did not develop all at once, but through the research experiments of Donnie Decker with the team and personal meetings with the Decker family. We're very fortunate to make this kind of connection," says Sani.

Researchers are planning to increase connections with producers in rural America in the coming year with more visits to farms and ranches. "I'm happy Mines researchers made time to come and hear from the producers firsthand and see what their challenges and issues are and where they may be able to help," says Scott Decker, a neighboring farmer near the Steve and Beth Decker family farm

Researchers on the CNAM-Bio team are optimistic that these connections and their work can yield real results that boost the viability of the state's number one industry, agriculture. "Visits like this will continue to strengthen the bond between farmers and Mines researchers and help find practical and helpful answers that will improve the competitiveness of our country's agricultural industry," Govil says.

The research in CNAM-Bio at Mines is funded by the South Dakota Governor's Office and corporate collaborators and is directed at providing a pipeline of innovation for scale-up and commercial level demonstration at the new POET Bioproducts Institute in Brookings.

Part of the criteria for Decker working on this prestigious program includes bringing what he learns back into the Newell school classrooms where he teaches. He plans to use techniques that cause his students to use higher level thinking skills. The process being researched right now on the mines campus includes trying to break down corn and make it into bioplastic, taking the place of petroleum-based products currently used.

Decker is in his fourth year at Newell. He is married and he and his wife have a little boy.

NEWELL – Way back in 1974, Pastor Craig and Lelani Norwood came to Nisland to minister at Nisland Independent Community Church. They stayed for 12 years before moving on. In the meantime, those who knew them before, and those who are just getting to know them, are happy that Craig and Lani Norwood are back.
