US Postal Service Joins the Roundup Celebration

Commemorative BHRU postmark to be made available starting July 4th.

BELLE FOURCHE – A germ of an idea rolled around the brain of Belle Fourche Postmaster Anne Carter until she came up with a special design to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Black Hills Roundup, which will be this summer. It is known as pictorial postmark and is often very popular with stamp collectors or attendees of an event that want a special keepsake.

“The artwork is copyrighted by the Black Hills Roundup Committee,” said Carter. “And a signed approval was received by them prior to creating the cancellation stamp.”

There is a unique program for making this type of mark on history according to USPS publication 186.

Pictorial postmarks commemorate a wide variety of local events, such as fairs, conventions, philatelic expositions and in this case, the 100th Anniversary of the Black Hills Roundup.

The postmarks generally feature words and graphics related to the specific event. They must be approved by the USPS and are applied with a hand canceling device.

A postmark is used to indicate the post office of origin and the date and time of mailing. Postmarks are often used as a cancellation whereas a cancellation is never used as a postmark.

A Postmarking service will be held at the Belle Fourche Post Office starting Thursday morning July 4, at 9 a.m. and run through 1 p.m. Pre-stamped envelopes will be available to

purchase along with the pictorial cancellation. Patrons can also bring any stamped envelope/postcard to be canceled. The special postmark can also be requested up to 30 days following July 4 at the post office retail counter or sent to

the Belle Fourche office at 804 State Street.

Once the 30 days is over the cancellation stamp is defaced and the stamp will be offered to the Tri-State Museum for display.

MAY IS MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS MONTH Gratitude is Good Medicine

What we water grows. Our minds and lives are just like the beautiful flowers growing as a result of our April showers. Whatever we choose to water with our thoughts grows in our lives. If we water thoughts of frustration and disappointment, we grow despair. If we water thoughts of delight and gratitude, we grow joy. Our mind is a powerful weapon in the battle for mental wellness.

A 2011 study from UC Davis Medical Center highlights the importance of what we choose to focus on daily. The study shows a 41% reduction in symptoms of depression, a 23% reduction in the stress hormone cortisol and a 16% lower diastolic blood pressure in participants who kept a daily gratitude habit for 6 weeks. A study from the National MS society reports that patients diagnosed with chronic neuromuscular disease were able to reduce their pain medication by half after a 6-month gratitude habit. Gratitude decreases sensitivity to pain while improving pain tolerance.

To add these positive benefits to support your mental wellness, start small with a daily gratitude check in. At the end of your day, list three things for which you are grateful. Keep it simple: today I am grateful for the sunshine, the birds chirping and for the hearty good morning I received at the community center.

Other habits to build include: writing a gratitude letter to someone you appreciate, journal about positive moments in your day, share your gratitude with others and notice the small delights as they happen in your day. Start today and you will begin to reap the positive benefits of gratitude.

Street Survey Reveals Most Needed Repairs

BELLE FOURCHE - Belle Fourche, like communities across the nation, faces a never-ending battle; city streets in need of repair. This can be especially true for locations in the northern part of the country.

“I’m sure it’s a topic of conversation not only with Belle Fourche but every other town,” said Mayor Gloria Landphere at a recent town council meeting. “Especially with the last couple of winters we’ve had, they were very, very hard on our streets.”

Working with the city engineering and public works departments, Landphere told the council they were looking at

“several areas where we need to do overlays rather than waiting to do the whole street.”

The mayor told the council that they would need to begin looking at where repairs were most needed and finding the funds to complete the overlays until more permanent repairs can be made in the future.

“We’re going to start looking at the CIP budget and figure out where we can do this,” she said. “It’s something that wasn’t anticipated in the (city) budgeting process but it really looks like we have several that need to be taken care of until their complete street projects.”

Council member Randy Schmidt asked how it would be determined which streets

will need immediate overlays. Dirk Hoffman, Public Works Director said they would be conducting rides around the city to prioritize those streets that would be in the worst shape.

Hoffman told the Beacon that his department did a survey of most city streets two weeks ago and has initially identified two areas that they will recommend to the council that are in need of overlays. The first is Summit Street between 5th Ave. and 7th Ave. and the second is Country Club Road.

“Obviously we haven’t got a cost for these yet and we need to take this to the council at their next meeting,” Hoffman said.

most of their lives. Upon retirement, they spent many enjoyable winters in the south traveling to see much of the country, enjoying RV living and meeting many new friends.

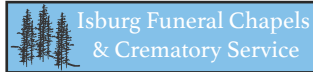
They were blessed to meet and get acquainted with most people in a campground with each and every move. They were rich with friends.

Moments of Reflection

I have always been deeply touched by the ministry of the prophet Jeremiah. He faithfully shared God's Word with the people of Israel and no one seemed to listen. In fact, he preached for 44 years without a response from anyone other than his scribe. It is no wonder that he wept openly for the people of his nation who were about to experience destruction of its capital city and captivity in a foreign nation for 70 years – all because of their unwillingness to listen to God's Word. He preached faithfully and did everything that God asked him to do to bring the nation to repentance for their sin. In fact, Jeremiah ended up in the darkest of dungeons because the leadership of the nation was so upset with his message and his ministry. I also understand his heartbreak when we find that he prophesied the destruction of the city and Temple for most of his ministry



and then experienced it. A simple reading of the Book of the Lamentations of Jeremiah is an exercise in hopelessness and depression as we read of Jeremiah standing among the ruins of the city

of Jerusalem and the Temple. He witnessed the burning of the city and literally walked through the ashes of his people. He also painfully stood by as many of his people were taken captive and were led away to Babylon. In the midst of these dark and troubling times Jeremiah discovers a ray of hope and it is in marked contrast to the rest of his lament...

Lamentations 3:21-26 (NLT)
²¹Yet I still dare to hope when I remember this: ²²The faithful love of the LORD never ends! His mercies never cease. ²³Great is his faithfulness; his mercies begin afresh each morning. ²⁴I say to myself, "The

LORD is my inheritance; therefore, I will hope in him!" ²⁵The LORD is good to those who depend on him, to those who search for him. ²⁶So it is good to wait quietly for salvation from the LORD.

We can learn an important lesson from the experience and writing of this "weeping prophet". In our darkest hour we can turn from our misery and grief to the mercy, compassion and goodness of our Lord, Jesus Christ. We can find light in our darkest dungeons as we place our hope in Him and wait quietly for His salvation. His faithfulness is great, His love never ends and His mercies never cease. The treasure that I find here is fact that His mercies begin afresh each morning. For each and every day of our lives, we find the grace and mercy of our God to see us through. The lesson that we learn here is to pause and reflect! As the prophet, when we remember this we find new hope for each day.

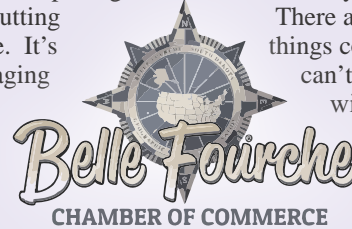
Chamber, to other Chamber members and to you in the community to see our businesses thriving. It means as a community we are alive and well.

When asked if drainage repair work would be included in the overlay process, Steve Nafus, Interim City Engineer, said they would take a look at that. "It's all about the expense of that. When we do an overlay we try to patch some curb and gutter before we go in," he said, "and

of course really bad spots may need to be totally rebuilt, then patched and then overlaid."

As far as a timeline, Hoffman said the council will need to work out the funding. Then bids will need to be let and about the soonest work could begin on the asphalt overlays would be August or September.

"We will move forward with this, sooner rather than later," Mayor Landphere said. "I think we'll look at making what could be hard decisions as to what we're going to do to get really the worst of these streets taken care of."

The curious custom — still practiced in discrete pockets of the country — went something like this: As the month of April rolled to an end, people would begin gathering flowers and candies and other goodies to put in May baskets to hang on the doors of friends, neighbors and loved ones on May 1.

In some communities, hanging a May basket on someone's door was a chance to express romantic interest. If a basket-hanger was espied by the recipient, the recipient would give chase and try to steal a kiss from the basket-hanger.

Perhaps considered quaint now, in decades past May Basket Day — like the ancient act of dancing around the maypole — was a widespread rite of spring in the United States.

A reporter in the Sterling, Ill., Gazette in 1871 explained the seasonal ritual this way: "A May-basket is — well, I hardly know how to describe it; but 'tis something to be hung on a door. Made of paper generally, it contains almost anything, by way of small presents you have in mind to put in it, together with your respects, best wishes — love, perhaps. It is hung after dark at the door of anybody the hanger fancies. — Which done, the said hanger knocks and scampers."

The writer went on to say, in the spirit of the times, that if a boy hangs a May basket on a girl's door and the girl catches him, "it's a great disgrace." If a girl is the hanger, "it disgraces the boy again not to catch her."

One day, when Plumb and his wife were sitting in a restaurant, a man at another table came up and said, "You're Plumb! You flew jet fighters in Vietnam from the aircraft carrier Kitty Hawk. You were shot down!"

"How in the world did you know that?" asked Plumb.

"I packed your parachute," the man replied. Plumb gasped in surprise and gratitude. The man pumped his hand and said, "I guess it worked!" Plumb assured him, "It sure did. If your chute hadn't worked, I wouldn't be here today."

Plumb couldn't sleep that night, thinking about that man. Plumb says, "I kept wondering what he had looked like in a Navy uniform: a white hat; a bib in the back; and bell-bottom trousers. I wonder how many times I might have seen him and not even said 'Good morning, how are you?' or anything because, you see, I was a fighter pilot and he was just a sailor." Plumb thought of the many hours the sailor had spent at a long wooden table in the bowels of the ship, carefully weaving the shrouds and folding the silks of each chute, holding in his hands each time the fate of someone he didn't know.

Now, Plumb asks his audience, "Who's packing your parachute?" Everyone has someone who provides what they need to make it through the day. He also points out that he needed many kinds of parachutes when his plane was shot down over enemy territory - he needed his physical parachute, his mental parachute, his emotional parachute, and his spiritual parachute. He called on all these supports before reaching safety.


Sometimes in the daily challenges that life gives us, we miss what is really important. We may fail to say hello, please, or thank you, congratulate someone on something wonderful that has happened to them, give a compliment, or just do something nice for no reason. As you go through this week, this month, this year, recognize people who pack your parachutes.

ProRodeo Hall of Fame Announces 2019 Inductees

COLO SPRINGS - Commotion, one of the greatest bucking horses of all time, highlights a star-studded, 12-member class that will be enshrined in the ProRodeo Hall of Fame in Colorado Springs, Colo., Aug. 3.

"I think this is great," said stock contractor Bennie Beutler. "With Commotion, he either bucked them off or they would win first on him. He was one of the horses who liked to buck, and he never had a bad day."

The rest of the 2019 ProRodeo Hall of Fame class that was announced Monday consists of stock contractors Elra Beutler and his son, Jiggs; four-time world champion team roping heeler Allen Bach (1979, 1990, 1995, 2006); two-time world champion steer wrestler Dean Gorsuch (2006, 2010); world champion bull rider Doug "Droopy" Brown (1969); world champion bareback rider Larry Peabody (1984); notable Jerome Robinson; the Cody (Wyo.) Stampede Rodeo; contract personnel Tommy Lucia; and three Women's Professional Rodeo Association inductees – barrel racers Jimmie Munroe and Sammy Thurman Brackenberry and notable Florence Youree. In addition to the 13 inductees, Guy Elliott, a former arena director for the National Western Stock Show and Rodeo in Denver and the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo and countless others, will receive the Ken Stemler Pioneer Award, which honors individuals in recognition of their groundbreaking, innovative ideas and forward thinking.

Commotion, a 1,300-pound bay stallion, who stood at 16.1 hands, was voted the top bareback horse at his first Wrangler National Finals Rodeo in 1997. He went on to win the

next three Bareback Riding Horse of the Year awards, 1998-2000, when he was part of the Beutler and Gaylord Rodeo Company string. Commotion passed away Sept. 7, 2016, at the Beutler & Son ranch near Elk City, Okla. He was 25.

Kissack Takes First at Red Bluff

RED BLUFF, CA - For tie-down roper Dane Kissack, this past Easter reminded him of the power of resurrection. In more ways than one.

A year-and-a-half ago Kissack herniated a disk and bulged two others, going through a long period of rehabilitation, competing through a lot of pain, but never giving up. On Easter Sunday he found himself in the winner's circle after the final round of the Red Bluff Roundup in northern California.

"Winning Red Bluff was awesome, but to be able to do it on Easter Sunday was a double victory for me," Kissack told the Beacon. "I was able to really put it into perspective because winning red Bluff was a big deal but what Jesus did was so much bigger."

Four years ago at Red Bluff the Spearfish cowboy found himself in a similar position. But in his fourth and final run he broke the barrier, adding a 10-second penalty, and losing the chance to win. This year, he took a lesson from the school of hard knocks and didn't push the barrier, remembering something

his wife Kelli told him back then.

"She said, Dane, you've got to remember you've learned the hard way on these things, so use that," Kissack said. "I can still feel the pain of riding out of here back then. I missed out on winning a lot."

But not in 2019, on Easter Sunday. The results were four clean runs, including winning the final two rounds with times of 8.3 and 8.8 seconds respectively. Kissack also won the average with 37.5 on four head.

After the win Kissack gave a shout out to the Justin Sports Medicine team who has helped with his rehab and stretching to keep his mobility. "It seems like I always have to maintain it," Kissack told the local press, "and thank the Lord they're here and ready to help. It really makes a difference. I wouldn't be able to move around today without them."

Kissack added more than \$6,800 to his season total and has moved into the top 30 in the PRCA Ram World Standings. He's currently 17th in the Pro-Rodeo® Tour standings.

Then and Now *in Newell*

May 6, 1909
Captain Francis A. Gaskill was around Monday taking up a collection for Paul Thurlow, who was burned out last Friday afternoon. Just what amount was raised was not ascertained. The State Veterinarian has been in the Bixby and South Moreau vicinity quarantining diseased sheep. Mr. Schultz, who has been with the Homestake Mine at Deadwood for years, has recently spent sometime on the South Fork of Grand River in Harding County sluicing for gold in the black sand, large quantities of which were found in the bed. There is no more experienced placer miner in the country than Schultz.

May 1, 1919
Old age and ill health compel B.F. Newkirk to offer his 160 acre improved farm 2 miles west of Newell for sale. 39 acres are irrigated, 80 acres under plow, all but 12 acres in alfalfa, balance pasture fenced in 3 Lots. Asking a small down payment and balance easy terms. See Mr. Newkirk at the farm. There is a Rummage Sale or White Elephant Sale Saturday May 3 at the Lodge Hall. If you can spare something that will

be useful to someone else, bring it to the sale. Ladies Service Union will serve supper 50 cents per plate.

May 2, 1929
Hunting coyotes from the air was the wild and thrilling sport introduced by Clyde Ice in the early winter of 1927. The proceeds of the first winter’s coyote hunting were more than the purchase price of a new plane. The Versitte pilot also built a pair of skis to replace wheels when their further use was made imposable by deep



snow. The Livewire Sheep Club of Arpan was organized at the Stoughton School on April 27 with Oliver Herrett chosen Leader and Assistant Leader John Taylor. Twelve boys were present and enrolled in the club. Elected President was Clarence Lungren, Vice President Donald Reid and Secretary-Treasurer Eugene Kennedy.

May 4, 1939
The Odd Fellows are adding another notable improvement in the way of an ornamental fence and sidewalk line in front of their lodge home. Reinforced concrete pillars will serve as posts. The fence will serve to protect the fine lawn which is being prepared. (Pictured at left) Mr. & Mrs. H.R. votions in the morning followed by guest speaker Christina Osthus from Eagle Butte.

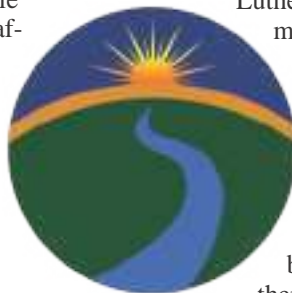



The Optimistic Gardener

"Nature will bear the closest inspection; she invites us to lay our eye level with her smallest leaf and take an insect view of its plan."
 - Henry David Thoreau

As life within the soil energizes and emerges in spring, the insect world awakes alongside. We know they are all part of the balance of nature and vital to life on earth, but they are not the most welcome manifestations of spring. Tiny and not-so-tiny creatures begin hatching, crawling, moving and flying all around, mostly in their own world, but some become all too present in ours. Why is it that the first flies of spring seem obsessed with annoying us, rather than minding their own business. Bees, at least, are more focused on their work and eventually reward us with honey, not to mention the pollination that helps make fruit happen. Of the myriad of insects to be found in the garden, most are beneficial, or at least not harmful, so our view of insects should be tempered.

Which bugs are of real concern to the gardener? For destructive potential, Public Enemy Number One is the Emerald Ash Borer, which has only this last year been confirmed in South Dakota. While the first infestation is in Sioux Falls, it is expected that the Emerald Ash Borer will gradually spread across the state and region, killing nearly all ash trees in the process. Because of their susceptibility to borer damage, ash is no longer recommended as a shade tree—not just green ash, but the other varieties as well. Mountain Ash is not in danger from the borer, since it is not related, and only has the "Ash" part of the name in common. As far as what to do with existing ash trees- the first advice is to be vigilant and watch for borers or borer damage. The Emerald Ash Borer adult is a bullet-shaped dark metallic green insect less than 1/2" long; the larva is light-colored and longer. Damage to trees would be holes in the trunk, and limbs or branches that begin dying. If you suspect borer problems, SDSU extension, or S.D. Ag. Dept. can help with identification and options. Hackberry is generally problem free and could be a useful replacement as well. A variety of different kinds of tree is the prudent approach.

Of common garden pests, aphids are the most likely to be a problem. Aphids are small soft insects (in different colors) which multiply quickly and suck juices from leaves and stems; leaves will curl and a dark sooty coating may form. Aphids secrete a sweet sticky substance called honeydew, which can rain down from trees. Another sign of aphids in trees is the presence of many ants, protecting and farming aphids (and "milking the honeydew"). Aphids can be washed off, or be killed by dish soap mixed with water and sprayed, or eliminated by many insecticides (check the label). Once they have been active for awhile though, leaves will curl and stems get distorted & twisted, and the damage can't be undone. If it is practical, badly affected leaves can be plucked and discarded to maintain good appearance of the plant. Aphids are always around by mid-May and are not likely to do much damage unless they are concentrated on a plant. Remember that when you are using insecticides on bad bugs, you will kill good bugs too, so ultimately may not gain a lot. Ladybugs are great predators on aphids, so can control minor populations, and green lacewings (especially the larval form called ant lions) can clean up aphids on plants. Both ladybugs and green lace-

wings are available to buy to use for natural insect control. In a balanced environment, the good bugs keep the bad ones in check.

For grasshoppers (and field crickets) control, semaspore (a naturally-occurring disease organism) can do the job without bothering us or pets. Birds can be a helpful part of the bug control equation as well.

One question we are asked frequently at the nursery by concerned gardeners is "What is eating the leaves on my plant (or tree)? For a healthy tree, leaves being partially eaten, or even totally consumed, is not a major problem. Locally the box elder trees are often defoliated by small green caterpillars in the spring, and in a few weeks the foliage is back and life goes on like normal. Research has shown that plants with some leaves eaten by insects are actually stronger than those who are kept pristine; being eaten a little can make you stronger apparently. So there is no need to be spraying for insects eating some holes in leavers, unless they remain and concentrate on one plant.

Bugs come and go, and unless they are present, spraying or dusting for retribution is a waste of time at best, and can kill beneficial insects that could help in the effort. Aside from borers, insects are rarely a cause of death or significant damage to trees or shrubs, although they can make them unsightly. For a vegetable garden, insecticides may be used more often, but not close to harvest. There will be people who experience entomophobia (fear of bugs). We all have our fears, but unless you have rupophobia (fear of dirt), dendrophobia (fear of trees) and anthophobia (fear of flowers), you still should be able to be a gardener.
