

Still Aligning After 75 Years

news@bellefourchebeacon.com BELLE FOURCHE – It may be a little hard to follow how the son of a coal truck driver got to be a fixture in the town of Belle Fourche, but for anyone who has pulled their vehicle onto the racks for an alignment or other service from Lindstad's Alignment in Belle Fourche, they have probably heard the story. And they have probably heard that story, because this man loves to chat.

Wayne Lindstad, 89-yearsold, and still going strong. heads to the shop at 501 5th Avenue, once or even twice a day, according to daughter Sherry Drolc. Lindstad and daughters Sherry, Wendy Carr, Sue Cramer and in the past, son Dean, have spent countless hours in the shop, helping to serve the people of the Tri-State area. "I've had a really good life," said Lindstad recently, as he sat in the office area of the business. Sherry and Wendy continue the generational link, doing the bookwork for the business. They learned how from their grandmother Lucille. At one point, Dean's son Andy also worked in the shop. "We have customers who have become good friends, and we've been blessed. We take a sense of pride that people encourage others to come."

The business actually began in 1945 when Wayne's father, Emil (Lindy) and mother Lucille moved to the area after his father used the town as a stop-off point between Lemmon and Newcastle, Wyo. on his coal truck runs. Following his leaving behind the trucking business, Emil bought into the John Deere dealership and started doing alignments. He and his wife owned and operated the Belle Motel. They also sold Kaiser/Frazer cars as the Lindstad Motors and in 1949 they were the local Packard dealer in a facility located close to Roosevelt school.

of 1950 from the Bear Service school. In 1951 he joined the Coast Guard for a two-year stint.

During his time running the business Wayne invented a new repair kit, the track bar kit, to help with working in the business. "It's kind of like a tie rod," said Lindstad. "I've sold them all over the U.S. It's patented." The track-bar adjustable-end repair kit is available for 1994-2002 Dodge pickups and 1985-1998 Jeeps. When the track ball-joint end wears, the kit is installed at a fraction of the cost of replacing the complete rod. The kit is adjustable, which compensates for any future wear. They can be ordered at the shop.

Currently the business is under the management of John

for Lindstad's. Other former and current employees include Janice Helmer, Dan Dingaman, Betsy Morely, and Paul Conley.

The company continues to provide quality service to longtime customers and those who venture in for the first time. The shop is located at 501 5th Avenue and Faulk Street, diagonally across from Randy's Discount Tire which is Wayne's daughter, Sherry and her husband Randy's business. Leadership Training For Mental Health

With our local extension leader, Michelle May, as the only person west-river that has been trained in Teen Mental Health, it might be an interesting immediate future, if the local area decides they want more people, including students, trained in this essential need.

"This could be a full-time position for me," said May at a recent county commission meeting. "I will have to be very careful in scheduling my time." May said this training is so important to both the area and to mental health, especially for teens. The statistics about mental health among teens is staggering. One in five teens has had a serious mental health disorder at some point in their lives, according to the National Council for Behavioral Health (NCBH). And 50 percent of all mental illnesses begin by age 14 with 75 percent by the mid-20's, and suicide is the second leading cause of death for 15- to 24-year-olds.

May has had training in learning how to identify, understand and respond to mental health of teens, training students to be aware of their peers.

"It is so new, the most successful outcomes are when schools, principals, guidance counselors, and health teachers, are involved," said May May said that the Newell school staff has been trained and that she has about 15 youth trained

in the Belle Fourche system. She currently is working with potential Covid funding to help

with the 8-hour training. "It gives them immediate skills so that if something comes up, they know what to do. It gives them confidence and the tools to respond." May said she is approaching administrators

now to set up trainings. Nothing has been solidified yet, but she plans to start with at least two schools in the fall. She is hoping for a grant that will cover up to 40 youth with 4-H Junior Leaders.

The Youth Mental Health First Aid also teaches adults with similar material as that for youth. It covers discussing common signs/symptoms/ substance use, common signs of a mental health crisis and addresses in-depth how to respond to suicide. But there is still much stigma and myth



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



or anyone promoting the market or auction profession." he said.

Heinze said Deitterle was a clear choice for this year's award.

"He's promoted South Dakota, the markets, and did a lot of work in getting the contest to Belle Fourche," he said. Deitterle also does a lot to promote the region's cattle and is well known throughout the area for his skills, said Heinze. Deitterle was honored to be selected for the award. He is currently serving as the South Dakota director for the Greater Midwest Auctioneers.

"It was a good sale. It was well run, with a good crowd of buyers and good cattle," said Deitterle.

A contest such as this helps draw a different crowd, and often the auctioneers from other regions will connect new buyers with the cattle for sale, as was the case this week, he said. "That's one benefit of having a contest, even though it's extra work for the auction market. They get more buyers," he said.

The 2020 champion who helped organize this year's event said talent was not hard to come by at the April 29, 2021 event held at Belle Fourche Livestock Market outside of Belle Fourche, South Dakota.

'We had a strong selection of professional auctioneers. They really put on a good show



and they really worked hard for the consignors," said last year's champion, Wade Leist, who auctioneers at Mitchell Livestock Marketing, Mitchell, South Dakota.

TSLN field man Dan Piroutek assisted on the block by starting the bid on each consignment and providing background details on many of the producers, said Leist.

Belle Fourche Livestock owner Baxter Anders is to be credited for ensuring that Piroutek helped set the pace for the cattle being sold, and also that he helped make the buyers aware of information about the cattle such as genetics or a particular feeding program.

"Baxter took great care in making sure that his producers got the best opportunity to get the highest market. He was very careful about switching auctioneers between consignors, he was careful about what kind

of cattle were put in front of the auctioneers. He wanted to be sure his producers were taken care of," he said.

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Leist also pointed out that the number of quality of cattle in Belle Fourche was something that the auctioneers from outside of the region were not accustomed to.


"The contestants that came from Ohio, Illinois, Florida, at one point or another, they all remarked on the exceptional quality of cattle here. I'm from Michigan. To see that many high quality cattle is really unique to guys like us that are from a different part of the country. It is really notable to us," said Leist.

"One contestant said, I've seen more good cattle on the Interstate, from the airport in Rapid City to the salebarn in Belle Fourche, than I ever see at home," Leist said.



He was prominent in French politics. Madame DeMores accompanied by two of her surviving children, made her last trip to Medora 17 years ago. The madame was prominent in relief work in France during the world war and entertained many North Dakota boys at her home in Cannes.

As I have visited communities and various businesses over the years, I have seen very few guilty of dreaming too big. In fact, unfortunately most communities, businesses, and their leaders are guilty of the exact opposite. Far too many dream and think far too small. Vic Johnson said it best when he said, "Big dreams drive us to do things we'd never do for lesser dreams — in many ways they almost pull us through the obstacles we're likely to have on the way to reaching them." Put another way, it is those seemingly big dreams that actually lead to our greatest successes.

As I have visited with community and business leaders, I have often referred to and written about the community wide thinking known as a poverty mindset. This isn't the poverty mindset in the traditional sense of poverty, it is the mindset of allowing your previous experiences and letdowns determine your future dreams and aspirations. When it comes to vision and forward thinking, one of the greatest traits a leader and community can have is that of learning from past experiences and failures, utilizing them as steps in lieu of chains. I am unaware of any community growing to exceed its wildest expectations because they dreamed too small. To be big, one must think and believe big. There is no other way!

Today, we live in a world of rapid change, innovation and transformation. The world can



ing, even in the best of circumstances. In order for communities to achieve their ultimate destination, they must turn aside the

poverty mindset and set their sights much higher. They must cast aside those failed initiatives from yesterday and use them as stair-steps to greater heights. They must take each and every resource at their disposal and find ways to utilize those resources for the greater good.

When a community is seeking to transform, they must look inside themselves to determine who or what they are. A great business leader, Simon Sinek said, "Our friends don't love us for what we do. Our friends love us for who we are." Communities are much the same way. People won't travel to your community consistently for what you do, but rather because of what you are. What is the vibe that you give to those visiting your community? What is the feeling people get when they spend time with you? It is all about building connections between the community and the outside world. The greater the connection you can build, the more powerful the draw will be.

All the above communities not only dared to dream big, but they found the emotional connections they could successfully share with others. When visitors come to their communities, they leave having had their expectations met. Of the thousands of communities across this great nation working to enhance their connections to travelers and residents alike. few fully capture the essence of what is possible. But for those communities daring to dream big and finding those vital emotional connecting points, success will never feel more rewarding because they dreamed beyond the poverty mindset. They captured the elusive dreams few dare to dream.



NEWELL – Devin Ward will graduate this month. He is excited about the possibilities that are before him. Of the recent past, he's not so positive.



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Then and Now in Newell

"Looking Forward to our Past" by Linda Velder

May 4, 1911

C.R. Rua and Charles Schedwin of Vale were in town Monday. The Irrigator acknowledges a pleasant call. From here they went to Belle Fourche where Mr. Schedwin was going to take out his final citizenship papers before the District Court.

Engineers from Orman Dam have been busy last week in putting a weir to measure the flow of water into the siphon across the river. Complaints were numerous last season that the farmers on the south side were getting more then their share of water. The weir has been put in to enable the engineers to distribute the water more equally.

A whirlwind swept through the area here Thursday moving a few small buildings, no damage of importance is reported as yet. Honyockers are still coming and improving the country with fences and breaking sod and there are claims vacant yet.

May 5, 1921

Newell High School for the first time in her history will be represented by a track team that will compete with the other schools at Belle Fourche next Saturday. The team is as follows: Roy Davidson, Harold Partridge, Lloyd Felt, Warren Fairbanks, Stuart Partridge, Edwin Anderson, Howard Viken, Martin Berg, Orrin Tysdal, William Warren, and Glen Rich. Several of the local students will accompany the boys to Belle to lend the necessary encouragement. The expectations of the boys are not up to the point of carrying away the heavy end of the honors at their first attempt, but Supt. Bauer assures us some of the boys have surprised him with their various stunts.

Somewhat of a mystery surrounds the burning of the house on the Dr. O.H. Clark farm south of town which occurred at an early hour this morning. Some time ago a fire was discovered in a small summer kitchen adjoining the house and this section was destroyed. Howard Clark had been working the place and was just fitting it up preparatory to occupying it with his bride. Besides numerous household goods, he lost a rare collection of war relics which he gathered personally in France and a brand new set of double harness. There is very little doubt but that the fire is of an incendiary origin.

May 7, 1931

B.F. Sherbon was the successful bidder for building the new Horse Creek School house and the work of pouring cement for the concrete foundation is already well underway. The new building is to be as near fire-proof as possible, it is reported and is to be completed in time for school next term. A group of officers including Sheriff "Doc" Long of Butte County, Sheriff Art Helmer of Lawrence County and Dep-

Pastor Henry Mohagen usually goes with us, but there was a church council meeting that evening so he stayed home for that and Casey left the lambing shed long enough to attend the council meeting too. I had some good visits talking politics that afternoon with Rep. Liz Marty May, her brother Rep. Sam Marty, and Sen. Ryan Maher.

Sen. Maher told me about the national blow up over the Faith Rodeo Club slave auction that the rodeo club uses by the kids getting auctioned off for helping at brandings for local ranchers to raise money for the rodeo club. An article about it came out in the Washington Post that led to the rodeo club having to cancel the auction because the rodeo club kids and their advisors were getting death threats from ignorant leftists that had no idea what they were talking about. Several people called the office of the Legislative Research Council to give death threats to Sen. Maher for defending the rodeo club. Dawn Simons sent very nice letters to the Bison Courier and the Faith Independent newspapers explaining exactly what was happening and defending these hardworking kids and their advisors. This is just more of the 'cancel culture' and is infuriating!

Lanie and the kids came down from Dickinson on Wednesday to help in the lambing shed while Taz was gone.

about lambing and she and Amanda were great help for Missy in the shed. Me, not so much. I mostly just water the bullpens and help a little with feeding grain and hay. Amanda had Casey, Missy, Lanie and

the kids for supper at her house that evening. Taz was up in the rodeo in Oklahoma that day. It was hot and dry on Thursday so I washed laundry and hung it on the clothesline outside.

Lanie and the kids were still here to help and her three kids and Amanda's three kids sure had a lot of fun together in the lambing shed. Reub and I had to make a parts run up to Laufer's to get a motor for his processor and then to Hettinger to get some more parts for it that afternoon. Casey got the processor fixed that evening when he got out of the lambing shed. Taz was up in the rodeo in Oklahoma again on Thursday and he and his traveling buddies started on the way back to South Dakota.

I ran into Arden Saunders while we were in Hettinger and he told me that he was going to give me all six of the books his late Uncle Bob Penfield had written as a 'thank you' for the help I gave him to find where Guy and Mary (Hogarth) Sandusky were buried. He grew up next door to them in Hettinger and they were like grandparents to him. Sandusky's sister Jessie married George Allen, their daughter Mary Elsie married Boyd Thybo and they lived on the Bar H ranch just south of us. He left the books at the Reva Store for me and Casey picked them up for me. I've already started reading these interesting stories.

I attended Dean Penor's funeral in Bison on Friday and got to see a lot of old friends I hadn't seen for quite a while. Lanie and the kids went back to Dickinson and Taz was home by the time I got back from Bison that afternoon. Amanda and the little kids went to Buffalo for Jace Jenson's birthday party and the shower for Jace and Kami's baby boy Keen. Taz went to the party later after he finished the sheep chores.

Saturday, May 1st, was a beautiful day. It was so warm that Amanda filled the wading for the kids and they had a lot of fun playing in the water. Copper and River Lu spent more time in the pool than Knox did because he was over helping Taz and Missy move ewes and lambs.

Wednesday, May 5th is Cinco de Mayo celebrated in Mexico and in the USA. Literally meaning "The Fifth of May," Cinco de Mayo is a Mexican holiday celebrating the Battle of Puebla, which took place on May 5, 1862. It was one of the few Mexican victories during France's attempt to penetrate Mexico.

This might not be a totally accurate history of Cinco de Mayo:

Most people don't know that back in 1912, Hellmann's mayonnaise was manufactured in England. In fact, the Titanic was carrying 12,000 jars of the condiment scheduled for delivery in Vera Cruz, Mexico, which was to be the next port of call for the great ship after its stop in New York.

This would have been the largest single shipment of mayonnaise ever delivered to Mexico. But as we know the great ship did not make it to New York. The ship hit an iceberg and sank and the cargo was forever lost.

The people of Mexico, who were crazy about mayonnaise, and were eagerly awaiting its delivery were disconsolate at the loss.

Their anguish was so great, that they declared a National Day of Mourning which they still observe to this day. The National Day of Mourning occurs each year on May 5th and is known of course as Sinko de Mayo.

April 8, 1941

Two cases of spotted fever were reported in Butte County during the month of April, the State Board of Health revealed in its regular report the past week in warning that the months of May, June and July following are the most dangerous for such infection from ticks. 13 cases were reported during the same period in Montana with 1 fatality.

The general Land Office dealt out 7 "aces" for the first time in it's more than 100 years of operations in issuing a patent for government land to Robert G. Richards of Newell for a 7,000 square Townsite Lot. Commissioner Fred W. Johnson said Richards was awarded 1,111,111 representing the total number of such patents issued since the present numbering system was instituted in 1908. It was on Lot 11 Block 34, Newell Original Townsite. Many Lots remained unsold, however and after reappraisal, Richards applied for purchase of a Lot at

He also cautions owners of poultry and other pets to keep same within enclosures strong enough to protect them, pointing out that dogs which come into town from the country may destroy same before such animals may be taken up. Many dogs have been allowed to run loose recently and the fact that a dog is licensed does not exempt it from provisions of the City Ordinance, which provides that such animals should be taken up and killed when running loose.




