Subdivision Ordinance Approved **MJ License Denied**

BELLE FOURCHE-At the most recent commission meeting held May 2, the Butte County Commissioners approved the final reading of Subdivision Ordinance No. 2022-02, "An Ordinance of Butte County providing regulations for the Subdivision of Land." The ordinance can be read in its entirety online at the Butte County website. It will become effective the twentieth day after final publication.

According to South Dakota Codified law, 7-18a, the commissioners' decision to adopt the ordinance can be referred to a vote of the people. A referendum petition form may be obtained from the County Auditor's office.

Center of the Nation Cultivation and Manufacturing renewal licenses were denied until a variance meeting could be held. There were questions about resident restrictions and background checks for all members of the business. The location differences were mentioned, but the discrepancy was due to a 911 address change, not a location change.

There were several changes to the agenda including adding to the Sheriff's report and removing the approval of minutes of the Board of Adjustments. Also, Sue Broadhurst was taken off the agenda.

Chairman Stan Harms explained his reasoning for the decision to remove Broadhurst saying that there were at least two precedents that should not be established. One was that allowing someone to speak who doesn't have direct business with the commission should not be on the agenda.

He added that the person wanted direct answers that were not appropriate for a county business meeting.

Also, it was up to the chairman to decide what goes on the agenda.

"Traditionally the Chairman controls the agenda and it would establish that any commissioner can put something on the agenda," he said.



125 years ago Belle Fourche TIMES May 5, 1898 WAR BULLETINS- Santiago deCuba

The enmity against British subjects, which for the past two weeks has been so manifest in Spanish mobs, culminated this morning, May 4th, by an attack on the British consulate here. The British Consul, in defense of his family, shot and mortally wounded a Spaniard. Mob finally dispersed with difficulty, but not before the consulate was completely destroyed. Three British war ships are expected to arrive hourly when ample satisfaction will be demanded for the outrage. British Consul arrested by Spanish officers. British subjects mobbed.

To The Front From Spearfish we learn that Company L has orders to go overland to Whitewood this morning, to Rapid City by rail this evening, and leave there tomorrow for Sioux Falls. There they will remain three days, be regularly roistered in, and then go straight to the Pacific coast. The supposition is that they will form a part of the detail to go to the Philippines. Hurrah for the Black Hills boys!

To Fort Meade First Colonel Grigsby, of the South Dakota Volunteer cavalry, yesterday wired orders for three Black Hills troops to rendezvous at Fort Meade until further orders. Seth Bullock of Deadwood, G. E. Hair of Belle Fourche, and J. E. Hammond of Sturgis, have been commissioned captains of the respective troops.

> 100 years ago Northwest Post May 3,1923

Jake Snyder Almost Jailed As a result of a rather amusing case of mistaken identity in circuit court last week, ex-County Commissioner Jake Snyder of Nisland came might near landing behind the bars of Butte county's bastille. A man named Erickson of Newell had been brought into court to answer for the failure to pay a stipulated sum each month for the support of his wife and children, from whom he is separated. Judge McNenny ordered the defendant committed to jail, and Sheriff Lefors not being in the court room at the time, State's Attorney Seward stepped into the sheriff's office to deliver court's order. Mrs. Lefors, who is the

jailer, was the only person in the office, so the state's attorney advised her that she would be obliged to take Erickson over to jail ad lock him up, at the same time indicating that it may be necessary to handcuff him, as he was considered a "bad actor" Mrs. Lefors was "game" however, and decided to perform her duty. She had never seen Erickson before, so when she entered the court room to get her prisoner, Jake Snyder (who was also unknown to her) was the guiltiest looking man in sight. He chanced to be in the court on another matter of business and was seated inside the compartment occupied by the attorneys and litigants. Mrs. Lefors accosted Jake with the whispered query "Is your name Erickson?" Now: Jake is a trifle hard of hearing and misunderstood the question so he nodded his head and said "Yes." Mrs. Lefors then asked him if he would come along to jail with her, or would it be necessary to get an officer to assist her. Again Jake nodded his head and started to arise to accompany the lady, when Judge McNenny, who could scarcely maintain his dignity under the funny circumstances, called Mrs. Lefors to his desk and informed her that she had the wrong man in custody. By the time order had been restored, Mrs. Lefors had Erickson in custody and was well on her way to the jail with him. When the situation had been explained to him, Uncle Jake enjoyed the joke as much as anyone. His well known gallantry would not permit him to question any lady's authority to even put him in jail, whether he deserved it or not.

91 years ago The Belle Fourche Daily Post February 9, 1932 Mildred Eaton To Establish a Factory Here - Plans Wholesale Manufacture of Candy, Jellies,

Pickles, in Belle Fourche Mildred Eaton, who for more than a year has conducted a candy store and luncheonette in Belle Fourche, announced Saturday that she had practically completed plans for the establishment of a wholesale factory in Belle Fourche. The plant, Mrs. Eaton stated, would be located probably at her ranch home, where she will install modern equipment. Mrs. Eaton will have as her partner in the new venture, Mrs. Grace Anfin,

manufacturer, who is now in Belle Fourche completing arrangements. The well known Mildred Eaton candies will be manufactured, and in addition, jellies, pickles and other household foodstuffs in those lines will be manufactured. They will produce on a wholesale bais only, Mrs. Eaton stated. Mrs. Eaton will discontinue her present location at once, she stated, closing the lunch room and retail candy shop,, and will make preparations to open the wholesale manufacturing plant within a few days. It is probable a salesman will be placed on the road, which will cover, they anticipate, the entire state of South Dakota, Montana and Wyoming and as much additional territory as a market can be established. 

The vote on the fireworks was 6 in favor and 1 against. Councilmember Talkington once again voted against the proposal as two nights of fireworks during the Roundup are not needed and an unnecessary expense. He feels the extra night dilutes the impact that the single show used to have. Two nights

of fireworks during the Roundup was inaugurated just prior to the 100th year anniversary of the Roundup and has stayed in place the past four years.

fireworks program several members of the Roundup Committee were present during the council meeting on May 1.




"I remember the gender switch clothes day during homecoming," Aundra shared. "It was so funny to see all the boys in dresses rocking it."



Crow Peak Brewing Company started in the spring of 2007 as a modest 5-barrel brewery with on-premise sales in the form of pints and off-premise sales in the form of 64-ounce growlers. The brewery was extremely successful, and in order to provide a quality local beer to other parts of the State and beyond, a brewery expansion was in order. The beautiful new brewery building opened for business in December of 2009.

However, our beers were still being brewed on our 5-barrel system while we were waiting for our new 30-barrel brew house – three 60-barrel fermentation vessels and 60-barrel bright beer tank to arrive and be installed. Installation of the new equipment, plumbing, wiring and boiler system was completed in June of 2010. In addition to the larger brewing system, a Cask automated canning line was brought online in the fall of 2010, allowing us to distribute our product in both draft and packaged form.

By the end of 2015, Crow Peak Brewing Company was producing 2,000 barrels of beer annually and was distributing its products in South Dakota, North Dakota, Nebraska, Wyoming and Minnesota. We were finding it hard to keep up with demand, especially in the summer months so we underwent a second expansion in 2018. With two additional fermentation vessels and one additional bright beer tank, we are now able to produce approximately 5,000 barrels annually.


