The Belle Fourche Envirothon team, consisting of local chapter FFA members, took part in the

state competition at the Outdoor Campus West in Rapid City late last month. The team members included Emma Singer, Laney Mackaben, Guy Davis, Tate Larson and Destinie Lugmao.

There were six categories of competition including, forestry, aquatic ecology, current issues, wildlife, oral presentation, as well as soil and land use. Emma Singer, a senior, said her favorite categories were wildlife and oral presentation.

"Wildlife is very fun because I have grown up hunting and fishing, so I know a lot about the topic," Singer said. "I also enjoy the oral presentation because I like talking about a subject I am interested in with to others."

George Douglas "Doug" Johnson 83

George Douglas "Doug" Johnson, 83 of Belle Fourche, SD passed away at the South Dakota Human Services Center in Yankton, SD after a tenyear long battle with dementia.


The third of eight girls and two boys, Doug was born on January 27, 1936 in Newell, SD to George J. and Mamie (Stolnack) Johnson. His family rented ranches from south of Newell to south of Camp Crook until purchasing a ranch between Castle Rock and Redig in 1946. At the age of 10 he trailed 500 head of sheep

from Camp Crook to their new home 50 miles away, with a 15-year-old friend, one horse and one dog in four days.

He attended country school through the eighth grade and graduated from Belle Fourche High School in 1954. While in high school he worked as a bell hop at the Don Pratt Hotel for his room. Following high school he attended Colorado State University for one year. Along with working on the family ranch, he worked in the Fall in the sugar beet factory and drove truck until he was drafted into the United States Army in 1961, where he served as a Military Policeman at Fort Riley, Kansas. His job in the Army was to bring soldiers back who went AWOL. On one of his trips to New York to find a prisoner, he met Patricia Ann Caswell. Following his honorable discharge from the service in 1963, he flew back to New York and the couple married in October of 1963.

They moved to the family ranch and had four children. He and his brother worked on the ranch until it was sold in 1974. Doug then bought a ranch southeast of Belle Fourche where he resided until dementia forced him into an assisted living. In 1977, he purchased an interest in a car dealership in Rapid City. He sold his interest in the dealership in 1984 and bought another dealership in Spearfish in 1986. He owned and operated that business for 17 years. He always said his best customers were the farmers and ranchers from the five-state region.

While he would spend his weekdays at the car dealership, his weekends were always spent on the ranch. During his time selling cars, he also bought a registered Angus herd and sold bulls for



20 years. His wife loved animals and calved out and kept records for the herd until her death in 1987.

Through the years he was a director for the Federal Land Bank, holding that position for ten years, and was on the advisory board for Norwest Bank. He won numerous awards for excellence and customer satisfaction through his 25 years as a Ford dealer. He was a member of the Buckaroos and the Custer Trail Riders. The highlight of the year for him was the annual trip to the NFR in Vegas.

Following his retirement from the Ford dealership, he would still get up at 4:30am every morning and go to town for his morning coffee, occasionally help his son with the morning chores and field work, and his favorite, "Chase the tail of a cow" on horseback.

Doug is survived by his three children; Tammie Johnson, Rapid City, SD, Tyron (Tami) Johnson, Coffeyville, KS and Troy (Carolyn Stansberry) Johnson, St. Onge, SD; grandchildren, Jack and Jessa, St. Onge, SD; brother, Andrew (Linda) Johnson, Rapid City, SD; sisters; Betty Niemi, Buffalo, SD, Doris Johnson, Rapid City, SD, Beverly Miller, Mission, TX, Darlene Schafer, Mission, TX, Arlene Reynold, Rapid City, SD, Judy Johnson, Sioux Falls, SD and Ida (Melvin) Johnson, Apple Valley, MN; and friend and brother in-law, Arnie Schmidt, Brandon, SD.

He was preceded in death by his parents; wife, Patricia; daughter, Teryl Johnson; and sister, Marilyn Schmidt. Doug will be laid to rest privately with his family present at Black Hills National Cemetery near Sturgis. It Continues: With Greater Joy!

As my young associate, Fr. John Paul Trask, wrote a number of weeks ago, Catholic tradition begins Lent with the call to the three biblical and spiritual disciplines of deeper prayer, serious fasting (denial of the senses), and greater charity towards one's neighbor (almsgiving). These, of course, are not things we neglect to do at other times of the Christian year, but Lent gave us the opportunity to begin their discipline anew and correct any bad habits that have crept into our lives regarding their obligation as the foundation of Christian spirituality.

I remember as a child, when my mother would diligently help me choose one or two of my favorite things to give up for the Lenten season – in my case they were usually Coke and Cheese Curls - that I would grudgingly agree, under threat of reprisal from my 98 lb. Irish mother, to accept this imposed discipline for the next 40 days with the inward promise that come Easter Sunday I would somehow obtain three Cokes and three packages of Cheese



Three awesome graduating seniors have just competed at their final 4-H State Shoot, April 26-28th. Tye Davis, Tee McAmis, Taten Fox, Matilyn Oakes, & Katelynn Ruby along with 57 other Butte Co. 4-H Shooting Sports members competed in almost 160 events and made lots of memories in Pierre this last weekend! Some had personal best scores, which led them to the top of their events and some had unforgettable mis-haps, but all in all they were all smiles and grateful for the journey that 4-H and Shooting Sports has taken them on! Tye, Tee & Taten – otherwise known as the 3 T's all started out together 10 years ago when they were only 8 years old. While Tee & Taten had older siblings to show them the ropes, Tye has blazed his own trail. The 3 of them together along with their parents, Steve & Renee McAmis, Chris & Krinda Fox, and Ivan & Shannon Davis, have pushed & encouraged each other to become the accomplished marksmen that they are and the caring role-models that we would all want our kids to follow after.

The 3 T's all agree that .22 CMP is their favorite event in shooting sports. In this event they have to shoot 10 Slow Fire & 10 Rapid Fire shots in each position Prone, Sitting/Kneeling and Standing. The Rapid Fire shots are definitely challenging in that for both Prone and Sitting/Kneeling the kids have

to start in the standing position and only have 25 seconds to drop into position and fire 5 qualifying shots at 50 yards. In 2016, Tye was able to represent SD at the National Shoot in .22CMP & .22 3-Postion. Their time spent practicing for 4-H competitions has also led Tee in qualifying for the NHSRA National Shoot for the last 3 years. He is hoping for 1 more year, we will know after he shoots here in Belle Fourche the 2nd





BELLE FOURCHE - Belle Fourche Middle School 5th graders took part in an Arbor Day tree planting and education day on Friday morning May 3rd. Winners of an Arbor Day essay contest were also recognized.

The morning began with Mayor Gloria Landphere reading a proclamation recognizing Arbor Day and the importance of trees to the community's environment, beautification and economy.

Then Josh Larson, Community Forester from the SD Department of Agriculture in Rapid City talked with students about the importance of trees and even handed out small prizes to students who correctly answered the pop quiz questions.

Shortly afterward, parents and students paused for a group photo with the Mayor and the State Forestry office representatives, standing with a large Arbor Day banner.

This year was the 147th annual observance of Arbor Day in America, the first observance happened in Nebraska City, Nebraska in 1872. The Arbor Day Foundation has set a goal to plant 5 million new trees by 2022, the 150th anniversary of Arbor Day.



Bahe Leaving Post as Head of Casey Tibbs Center

Cindy Bahe has resigned as executive director of the Casey Tibbs Rodeo Center in Fort Pierre, S.D., effective in June. The announcement was made on April 29.

"After thoroughly thinking through many facets of my life I have decided to move to the Sioux Falls area to be closer to my family," she said in a news release. "This decision has been a difficult one as I've lived in this community for 26 years; I love the Fort Pierre/Pierre area and its people."

It's the second time Bahe has resigned from the job. Three years ago, in March 2016, she announced she was leaving, to take a job in April 2016 as communications director for the state Bar Association. Within three weeks, she was back as executive director of the Casey Tibbs Center. She's worked at the Casey Tibbs center a total of about eight years.

The Casey Tibbs South Dakota Rodeo Center is a historical museum devoted to the leg-

endary sport of South Dakota rodeo; the history and its stars. 



May 7, 1979



Preparations have been completed here for the school district reorganization hearing which will be held Tuesday, May 20 at 1:30 p.m. at the Belle Fourche Community Hall. Conducting the hearing will be the newly created five member state commission on the school district reorganization. The commission was created as a result of passage of Senate Bill 130 requiring all school districts to become part of an independent district. The function of the commission is to hear presentations by all parties involved and to make a decision on the attachment of common districts or to create new districts. As the result of a series of elections there are now only six school districts in the county, four of these are common school districts – Triple Creek, Antelope, Fruitdale and Vale. The other two are independent districts – Newell and Belle Fourche.

This was the decision of a committee of Belle Fourche Public Library board members and library patrons Wednesday evening when they met at the courthouse. There Goes Another Piece of

Belle Fourche History The old Methodist church, located at State and Seventh, is being torn down to make way for the new home of the Bank of Belle Fourche. The structure hasn't served as a church for more than four years, but its roots go back to the beginnings of Butte county. The first church in Butte county was the Methodist Episcopal church of Minnesela. That church was started about 1885 and completed in 1888. Rev. Atwater, Rev. J. M. Gardner and Rev. Perry were among the early pastors. When the railroad bypassed Minnesela and Belle Fourche was born, the Bullock Townsite Company donated the corner lot to the church. A loan from the Methodist Extension Service was

supplemented by local donations of time and money and the building was dedicated Sept. 9, 1894. The church then consisted of only the north part of the building as it later stood. Some of the lumber from the Minnesela church had been used in construction of the church and parsonage, which was built in 1903. The south extension of the church was added in 1926 along with a roughly finished basement. In 1941 the basement was paneled and the kitchen added. In 1964 the new church, on Stanley and Seventh, was dedicated and the old building faded to sometime use. It served as the post-office about one year while the regular post-office building was being remodeled. It served as a Salvation Army center for a brief time and as a meeting hall... then nothing.


Durrs Donate Land for Library, Civic Center

Mr. and Mrs. John Durr of Belle Fourche yesterday offered to donate to the City of Belle Fourche, four parcels of land surrounding the city hall for location of a library and development of a civic center. The offer was extended to the city council at a special meeting Wednesday afternoon by Attorney Sterling Clark, representing Mr. and Mrs. Durr. Clark said Mr. and Mrs. Durr had originally considered donating a lot and \$30,000 for a library, but later decided the donation of the land around the city hall would be of greater benefit to the community in that it would not only enable the city to erect a new library but would give the city an opportunity to expand its city facilities, provide a parking area and generally develop a community center. The only stipulation in the request is that the library building would face Sixth Avenue. Clark said Durr would move the buildings now on the land off the lots and would donate the small building just south of the city hall to the city if they want it for museum purposes. The small building, more recently used as a shoe shop, at one time housed the city offices and the jail. The council voted unanimously to accept the offer of Mr. and Mrs. Durr. The city has already purchased property on Fifth Avenue for location of a library and a feasibility study for location of the city library and Northwest Regional Library there is under way. However, the council felt the board could make adjustments in its plans and that the property purchased for the library could be sold.

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

First of all, gardening is both a science and an art. There are scientific principles that can be applied and empirical evidence weighed, but many gardening ideas have been passed on without a lot of examination, and don't pass the test for reliability once they are closely examined. My perspective as a master gardener and nurseryman for 31 years leads me to offer the following as examples of garden myths and misconceptions:

1. The "Green Thumb"

While it is undeniable that there are gardeners who seem to possess a special gift in making gardens grow, to say that you need a magical "green thumb" to have success at gardening is an exaggeration of the magic and an underestimation of the work ethic.

2. Tree roots below the ground are like a mirror image of branches above.

That is the mental picture most of us have internalized, but is far from the truth. In fact, most tree roots are close to the surface, since roots need air and water moving through the soil to operate, and will not grow too deep, especially in heavy clay soils which dominate in our area.

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3. Ants make peonies bloom. The story is that you need

ants for peony blooms to open, but the truth is that the ants really don't form teams to pry the blossoms open. 4. All trees need to be staked.

While there are valid reasons

for staking trees, it should be

pottery at the bottom of a hole or pot helps drainage. While this seems to make

sense, it actually works against good drainage. When soil or potting mix is the same density, air and water can move through evenly, but when a gap of air is created, like with rocks or pottery shards, this creates different densities and the soil or potting mix has to become more saturated before draining. **6. Watering**

every day is best. While newly planted trees, shrubs and perennials need an inch of water a week during the growing season, when it comes to watering, there can

be too much of a good thing. 7. Using a baseball bat to wake up trees in the spring. "Waking" trees by using a

baseball bat to stimulate trunk

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and branches was one of gardener and author Jery Baker's most inventive ideas. There are a lot of claims made by Baker and others for various techniques and concoctions to make the garden grow better, but many of them just don't

stand up to testing.

Chalker-Scott's books 'The Informed Gardener' (2008), a garden writer's best book winner, and 'The Informed Gardener Blooms Again' (2010) give a good look at many products and practices, and puts them to the test. Her website "Horticultural Myths" is a well-organized compendium of many myths and misconcep-

tions, with concise critical evaluation of many things that gardeners hold dear. For the gardener who wants the best information based on real science and testing, this is a good place
