Carl’s Trailer Sales in Belle Fourche, where they sell and service enclosed trailers, flatbed trailers, horse and stock trailers, used trailers, pickup flatbeds, bale handlers, feed dispensers, Star Performance Hitches and more.

Protection, Kansas is in Comanche County in south central Kansas less than a half hour drive from the Oklahoma border.

This farm/ranch raised kid’s family also did custom wheat harvesting and it was on a harvest stop in Hemingford, Nebraska where he met Suze Brost. Suze who was raised at Ridge Montana, after high school graduation was living with her grandmother

in Alliance and working in Hemingford. The two met in Hemingford, then were married and living in Kansas when a decision to go to Pharmacy school was made.

The two best options between Kansas and Montana were Brookings, SD and Laramie, WY. Mike landing a job at Twin City Fan & Blower in Brookings, and finding nothing in Laramie was the deciding factor and SDSU Pharmacy school now had an Alzada, Montana girl enrolled.

After Suze graduated from Pharmacy school they agreed to try to move closer to family. Openings in Faith and Spearfish took the couple on a road trip to visit the two pharmacies.

When on the road trip to visit the area, father in law, Herman Brost met the couple in Belle with his horse trailer to bring the Mikes horses back to his ranch in Alzada. The plug on the trailer cable was different than Mike’s truck. Herman told Mike, “I know I guy named

First Woman Chair of Butte County Commission Takes Her Spot

BELLE FOURCHE – A year after handing off her opportunity to take the helm of the Butte County Commission, Vice-Chairman Karrol Herman stepped into a role she finally felt she was ready to move to the Chairperson position.

The move came during the first monthly meeting in 2021 during the wrap-up of 2020 and the opening of the 2021 year.

The reorganization included naming Kim Richards as Vice-Chairperson, and committee appointments made by the new incoming Chair. They included: Herman to Extension, Weed & Pest, Highway/Transportation and an alternate to Planning Commission. Kim Richards was appointed to Ambulance, B.H. Council of Local Government, Alternate for Resource & Conservation Development, and Highway/Transportation Committee. Frank Walton was named to Ambulance, County Buildings, Jail & Juvenile Services, and B.F. Economic Development. James Ager was named as alternate to B. H. Council of Local Government, County Buildings,

Resource & Conservation Development, and Butte-Lawrence County Fair Board. Commissioner Stan Harms was named to Dispatch Advisory Board, Planning Commission and TIF Committee.

Resolutions were also established for depositories, legal newspaper, polling locations, workers’ compensation, naming sheriff’s deputies, travel rates, investment policy, engineering firm and payments in lieu of taxes, wheel tax limits, redemption of tax fees, and county employee salaries and wages. The resolution for naming Deputies and Clerks included the addition of words stating the County Treasurer’s office to employ a full-time deputy, and three full-time clerks, which is different than last year. It also included one payment of \$300 per each at-large, Weed Commissioners. Wages and salaries for the 2021 fiscal year include salary employees: Wendt, Cassie-States Attorney \$84,576.18, Edward Tarbay-Deputy States Attorney \$61,800.44, McCartney, LeEllen-Part-Time Deputy States Attorney \$16,501.94, Lamphere, Fred-Sheriff \$71,623.50, Emergency Manager \$8,917.22, Clements, Tristan-Chief Dep-

uty Sheriff \$51,563.46, E-911 Assistant \$2,546.44, March, Jason-Deputy Sheriff \$48,435.40, Hahne, James-Deputy Sheriff \$46,185.10, DeBoer, Michael-Deputy Sheriff, Bothwell, Dan-Deputy Sheriff \$48,435.40, Walker, Paula-Register of Deeds \$58,984.38, Lensegrav, Deb-Treasurer \$57,486.78, Jensen, Elaine-Auditor \$58,235.58, Commissioner’s Assistant \$11,627.72, Highway Administration \$6,688.24, Nelson Lisa-Director of Equalization \$55,989.18, Planning Director \$2,543.44, Robert Wagner-Veteran Service Officer \$20,719.40, James Ager, Karrol Herman, Stan Harms, Kim Richards, and Frank Walton, Commissioner \$17,499.56, Commissioners’ Technology Allowance \$1,800.00 per year. Hourly employee wages range from \$13.67 per hour to \$25.98 per hour depending on years of service and elevations of pay. General staff starting pay includes \$14.95 per hour, Dispatch starting pay \$17.80 per hour, and Highway Department starting pay \$17.95 per hour. Butte County employees’ rates are adjusted an additional \$0.36/hour at 6, 11, 16, and 21

years of service.

Karrol Herman took the oath of Commissioner for District 2, Stan Harms for Commissioner for District 4, Cassie Wendt as State’s Attorney and Debra Lensegrav for Treasurer, all four-year terms.

The commission made motions to approve budget supplements including \$2,000.00 for Register of Deeds, \$3,000.00 for Sheriff’s department, \$2,500.00 for Planning, \$6,000.00 for Highway department, \$1,500.00 for E-911, and \$100.00 for 24/7 Sobriety.

“I have one more thing I need to add in budget supplements,” said Auditor Elaine Jensen.

“We made a wire transfer of \$299,059.04 when we paid off those graders, so we need to do an automatic supplement to the highway department for that amount, in the 2020 budget.”

A bit of discussion came over raising payments for indigent burial and cremations, which the county pays for. The commissioners set burial payments at \$1000.00 and cremation payments at \$800.00 which was a raise from previous years’ payments.

Sheriff Fred Lamphere intro-

duced new Sheriff’s Deputy Dan Bothwell, saying, “He’s from Pierre and has been working with the brand inspector and livestock investigator there and is certified through the state. I had Gary (Brunner-former deputy) working with him the last couple days. He’s familiar with the area as he lived here before.”

Herman reported that the Fair Board threw out a lot of ideas for the 100th anniversary celebration this coming summer, including building/branding of a fence on the west side of the grandstands along the wash bay area. This would be a fundraiser as they would sell boards and it would end up being a historical register of area ranchers.

“They also want to do a ‘Christmas in July’ and have different businesses, a fundraiser for 4-H,” said Herman. “It would be outside their normal use time so would need to be approved. I’m not sure the electrical system down there could handle a lot of Christmas lights.”

“I think if you give us the dates, we could probably donate the use of the fairgrounds,” said Commissioner Stan Harms.

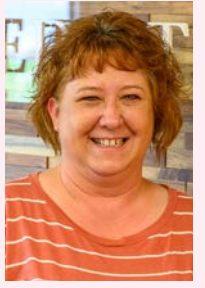

Boys Basketball Roundup

The Boys Broncs traveled to Lemmon on January 2nd to take on the Cowboys. The Cowboys never trailed and came away with a 46-33 victory over Belle Fourche.

The Broncs were without the services of two starters due to quarantine and could never really get their offense going. "We were just out of rhythm and couldn't match Lemmon's toughness," said Broncs Head Coach Clay Pottorff after the loss.

Lemmon outshot the Broncs 41 to 30 percent and won the battle of the boards 32-23. Anthony Budmayr, Aiden Giffin, and Ryker Audiss had six points each to pace the Broncs. Budmayr had five steals and Giffin cleared six rebounds to lead the Broncs defense. Tell Mollman had 12 points for the Cowboys. The Broncs host St Thomas More next on the schedule.

The Broncs entertained the St. Thomas More Cavaliers on Tuesday the 5th at Ed Paternek Armory in Belle Fourche. The game was a tale of two quarters as More dominated the 1st and 3rd quarters and the Broncs held their own in the 2nd and 4th periods but fell to the Cavaliers by a 68-42 margin.

The Broncs took an early 3-2 lead on Gage Kracht's trey, but More's full court pressure would lead to some easy buckets as they took at 10-3 lead. The Broncs Lan Fuhrer hit a deep corner three pointer to close the lead to four. More kept up the full court press and went on an 18-4 run and led 28-10 at the quarter stop.

The Broncs opened the second quarter strong as Ryker Audiss nailed a three from the wing and a Brexton Garza feed to Aiden Giffin led to a pair of free throws and Belle closed the gap 28-15. After a Cavalier three pointer Kracht hit both free tosses after being fouled and Garza's hard drive to the hoop for a score and Belle got as close as they were going to

get at 31-19. More ended the quarter with an 8-3 run and led 39-22 at the half.

After a More hoop, Broncs point guard Anthony Budmayr scored the next five points on a long three from the corner and a driving layup and the Broncs cut the lead to 41-27. The Cavs got another big run fueled off steals from their press until the Broncs Gabe Heck nailed a three pointer, but More held a 50-30 lead. More finished the quarter on another run of 9-4 and held a comfortable 59-34 cushion.

The fourth quarter was played even with both teams using lots of substitutions. Giffin would put down a nice three pointer and Bryton Oedekoven would score with a nice reverse lay up to pace the Broncs in the final stanza. Giffin led the Broncs with 12 points and Kracht chipping in 9.

In the JV game the Cavaliers came out on top of the Broncs 57-34. Anthony Staley led the Broncs with 12 points. More also won the C contest 68-25. Nolan Wahlfeldt led Belle with 8 points.

The Broncs tangled with Chadron on Friday the 5th in Belle Fourche. Chadron came out on top of the Broncs with a final tally of 53-40.

After a technical foul against Chadron to start the game and a hoop by Aiden Giffin the Broncs held an early 3-0 lead. Chadron stormed back and took a 6-3 lead before Brexton Garza got a steal to cut the lead to 6-5. Chadron extended the lead again until Gage Kracht hit a 3 from the corner. Giffin scored a runner in the lane followed another bucket in the paint and it was 14-12 Chadron after one.

The second quarter was all Chadron as they went on a 21-3 run for the quarter and held the 35-15 lead at intermission. The Broncs made a run on the Cardinals in the third stanza with Giffin, Kracht and Cole Hockenbary getting clutch bas-

kets as the Broncs cut the lead to 42-29 after three periods. The final quarter was a stale mate as each team scored 11 counters and the Broncs could get no closer than 12 points the rest of the way. Giffin tallied 11 points for Belle and Kracht added 9. The Broncs lost their 5th game in a row while Chadron in now 7-5 on the season.

In the JV game the Broncs held a 29-24 lead going into the final stanza but could not put a point on the board as Chadron won 32-29. Anthony Staley paced Belle with 13 points.

The Broncs came back the next night with another home contest against the Scoopers from Sturgis. Belle had defeated the Scoopers earlier in the season and came out on top with another 48-41 victory.

The first quarter ended with Belle on top 14-13, but the second quarter would tell the tale of the game as the Broncs outscored the Scoopers 8-2 in the second quarter to head to the lockers with a 22-15 lead. Both squads would play pretty much even the rest of the contest as the Broncs prevailed with the victory. Aiden Giffin had a big night for the Broncs

nailling 23 points as teammate Gage Kracht chipped in with 13 points including three treys. The Broncs shot better at the charity stripe hitting 69% of their tosses.

The Broncs JV's lost a 51-50 heartbreaker to the Scoopers. Cole Hockenbary and Anthony Staley scored 13 and 11 respectively for Belle while Nolan Wahlfeldt added 8. Sturgis captured the C contest besting the Little Broncs 47-26. Kyrin Nulle had 8 points for Belle with Jordan Sandoval and Jayden Sechser adding 6 each. The Broncs now 3-5 host Spearfish and Red Cloud next week.

Notice of Destruction of Special Education Records

DATE: January 2021

Attention Parents/Guardians, Former Students, Eligible (Adult) Students:

Special Education records which have been collected by the Belle Fourche School District related to the identification, evaluation, educational placement or the provision of Special Education in the District, must be maintained under state and federal law for a period of five (5) years after Special Education Services have been ended for the student. Special Education services end when the student no longer is eligible for services, graduates, completes his or her educational program on June 30th of the year after he/she turn age 22, or moves from the District.

This notification is to inform parents/guardians and former students of the Belle Fourche School District's intent to destroy the Special Education records of students who received Special Education services during the 2014-2015 school years. These records will be destroyed in accordance with state laws unless the parent/guardian or eligible (adult) student notifies the School District otherwise. After five (5) years, the records are no longer useful to the District, but they may be useful to the parent/guardian or former student in applying for Social Security benefits, rehabilitation services, college entrance, etc. The parent/guardian or eligible (adult) student may request a copy of

While we are on the subject of misinformation, a recent article on the 100th Anniversary of the Post Office reported the PO as being in the second story of the Flat Iron Building (now Pete's & Hodge Bootery)

Couldn't have been there because at the time the PO building was being built the building didn't have a second story.

The first shipment of the Pfizer vaccine was received on Dec. 14th and the Moderna vaccine the following week. Those first doses were administered to the 1A priority group which included physicians and caregivers working in COVID-19 units, ICU, Emergency Departments and long-term care facilities.

Individuals in the 1B category are receiving their vaccines directly from their CVS or Walgreens pharmacy provider.

This past week Monument Health was able to start administering the vaccine to those in the 1C priority group. These include both Monument Health and non-Monument Health recipients. Monument Health continues to work through the list of 1C facilities with the DOH. Eligible facilities will be contacted by Monument Health in the coming weeks.

It is our sincere desire to see everyone vaccinated who wishes to do so. This is a large effort with many variables. We ask for your patience and understanding as we complete this task together.

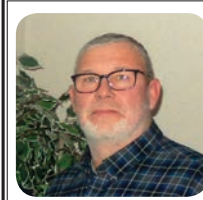

ProRodeo Notes

Gary Williams, the general manager of La Fiesta de los Vaqueros rodeo in Tucson, Ariz., recently announced his retirement. Williams was the only general manager in the rodeo's 95-year history and served in the position for the last 26 years.

Williams has been affiliated with the Tucson Rodeo Committee since 1987, serving as marketing chair, rodeo committee vice chair and rodeo committee chair. In 1995 he was employed as the Tucson Rodeo's first general manager.

"Over the past 26 years, there was always one constant. It was always one heck of a ride!" said Williams said in his retirement letter to the rodeo committee.

During his time at the Tucson rodeo, Williams was involved in numerous professional rodeo associations. He served on the Board of Directors for the PRCA National Finals Rodeo Committee. Williams also served on the ProRodeo Committee Executive Council in the At-Large position, representing more than 600 professional rodeos in the U.S. and Canada.

Williams served as a member of the board of directors and as president of the Turquoise Circuit.

"Gary's dedication, passion and guidance, along with all our memberships' commitment, is the reason we have achieved as well as maintained our position as a top-tier PRCA Rodeo," said Mark Baird, Tucson Rodeo Committee Chairman.

The Pendleton (Ore.) Round-Up's Tough Enough To Wear Pink might not have been able to take place in 2020, because of the COVID-19 pandemic, but that didn't prevent the campaign from raising \$11,000 for its causes.

The TETWP campaign in December donated more than \$11,000 to two local cancer support organizations.

The Round-Up association's TETWP split \$11,000 raised in 2020 between the St. Anthony Hospital Cancer Care Clinic and the Kickin' Cancer New Beginnings program. While contributions usually come from generous sponsors, donations, fundraising events and merchandise sales, not having the 2020 Pendleton Round-Up meant no TETWP event.

Instead, this year's contributions came from two primary sources – the Let'er Buck Cares

Fund and Oregon Grain Growers Brand Distillery (OGGB).

The Let'er Buck Cares Fund, which has raised more than \$900,000 since June, was established by the Pendleton Round-Up and Happy Canyon Board of Directors through the Oregon Community Foundation to provide support to the community's not-for-profits, service organizations, community groups and the local economy, all of which were immensely impacted by the lack of the Pendleton Round-Up in 2020.

The Let'er Buck Cares Fund donated \$10,000 to TETWP in October in an effort to allow TETWP to continue to support its two benefactor organizations despite COVID-19.

In addition, OGGB, a distillery in Pendleton, held a fundraiser during what would have been TETWP day in September by donating a portion of proceeds from the day's sales. OGGB raised and donated \$800 to TETWP from the fundraiser.

"It was devastating not being able to have TETWP in 2020," said Casey White-Zollman, co-chair of the Round-Up's TETWP campaign. "That's why we're so appreciative of Let'er Buck Cares, OGGB and all of the community members who have continued to support others, including TETWP and breast cancer awareness, despite the challenging circumstances we've faced this year."

The National Bareback Riding Hall of Fame and Museum in Congress, Ariz., was founded in January 2020 with the goal of promoting the event of bareback riding, promoting and displaying the history, and recognizing those over the past 120 years who have contributed in some way to this event.

The first nominee is Jimmy "Digger" Dix. Known as the Australian Legend Of Rodeo, Dix also qualified nine consecutive times to the National Finals Rodeo 1969-77. Dix was the first Australian to qualify for the NFR.

Dix is joined in the inaugural class by Jan Youran. From a ranch outside the little town of Garden Valley, Idaho, Youran grew up to be one of the top cowgirls in the history of women's rodeo. She was a charter member of several all-girl rodeo associations.

Youran's career included five world champion bareback riding titles.

"We lean on our defense, but we missed some easy buckets that we need to make," said Broncs Head Coach Bill Burr. "We had some great bench play as Clooten (Grace) had 10 points and Dru Keegan gave us some good defensive help," he added. The Broncs were also without a starter due to quarantine. The Broncs and Eagles would play the third quarter even, but Wall still held the lead at 24-22 after three. Clooten, Bella Jensen and Dylan Stedille led the Broncs in the last quarter along with a key bucket by Hayley Wilbur powered the Ladies to the 36-34 victory. Bella Jensen led Belle in scoring with 13 to go along with Clooten's 10. Jensen and Clooten also had five rebound each with Jensen getting five steals in the contest. Clooten and Chloe Crago also had three take aways each. The Lady Broncs took on the number one rated Cavaliers from St Thomas More in Belle

Fourche on Monday January 4th in Belle Fourche. The Broncs fought hard but were not able to stop the Cavaliers Haleigh Timmer who poured in 31 points as More handed the Ladies their first loss of season 61-34. The Broncs started out playing the top team in the state tough. After Timmer opened the game with a hoop, Bella Jensen hit a jumper at the elbow to tie it up at 2 apiece. A few minutes later Jasmyn Jensen had a nice back door feed to Tia Williamson and More led 7-5. Another More score was followed by another Jasmyn Jensen drive that just missed but Hayley Wilbur was there for the put back and it was 9-7. 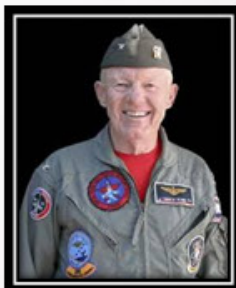

124 years ago Northwest Times Jan. 4, 1897 G.A.R. Installation

At the G.A.R. Installation a week ago, the following officers of A. J. Hamilton Post were installed for the coming year: D. F. Andre, C. Henry Cushing, S.V.C., S. A. Wheeler, J.V.C., Wm. N. Clare, O.D., John Barr, Chaplain, H. E. Thompson, Q.M., Peter Miller, Adjnt., J. Y. Spaulding, Srng., Wm. H. Frazine, O.G., J. H. G. Holmes, Q.M.S. The installation was conducted by Gen. J. F. Baker, of Hermosa, Dept. Commander of South Dakota.

The Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) was a fraternal organization composed of veterans of the Union Army (United States Army), Union Navy (U.S. Navy), Marines and the U.S. Revenue Cutter Service who served in the American Civil War. It was founded in 1866 in Springfield, Illinois, and grew to include hundreds of "posts" (local community units) across the nation (predominantly in the North, but also a few in the South and West). It was dissolved in 1956 at the death of its last member, Albert Wololson (1850-1956) of Duluth, Minnesota.

Linking men through their experience of the war, the G.A.R. became among the first organized advocacy groups in American politics, supporting voting rights for black veterans, promoting patriotic education, helping to make Memorial Day a national holiday, lobbying the United States Congress to establish regular veterans' pensions, and supporting Republican political candidates. Its peak membership, at 410,000, was in 1890, a high point of various Civil War commemorative and monument dedication ceremonies. It was succeeded by the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW), composed of male descendants of Union Army and Union Navy veterans.

100 years ago Belle Fourche Bee Jan. 6, 1921 Legion Basket Ball

The local Legion boys won their fourth consecutive basketball victory of the season last Thursday night, when they defeated the Lead aggregation of stars by a score of 41 to 25. A large crowd of basketball enthusiasts were on hand to witness the fray and all fans went away "feeling fine" for they had witnessed as fast and excellent a basketball contest as has been staged in this city for many a year. The first three minutes of play were the most sensational of the entire game, for Else, playing the center position for the local team, brought the spectators to their feet with three pretty baskets from near the center of the floor. The first half ended with a score of 25 to 12. Steinhauer, O'Donnell and Else being the main scorers for Belle Fourche, while the Lang brothers and Rogers scored the points for the visitors.

State News Hydro-Electric Commission

The hydro-electric commission takes exception to the statement which appears to be circulated in the state that hydro-electric is among the claimants which are asking an appropriation from the state at the coming session when the matter of finances to be one of leading issues of the session. The commission denies this. The members say they are not

asking for a cent of appropriation; that they will ask for a grant of credit from the state that will enable the commission to pay its own way and at the same time save the people of the state \$1,500,000 in coal bills annually, and \$2,500,000 in electric bills each year. It is estimated that this saving alone would pay for the plant in four years.

75 years ago Belle Fourche Bee Jan. 10, 1946 1945 Exceeded Former Records

By 251 Carloads 7,404 for the Year; Compared to 7,153 for 1944 - Bentonite Was Top Product

The 1945 carload shipments out of Belle Fourche reached a new high, it was revealed by a summary report from L. W. Hamblin, local agent for the Chicago & Northwest Railway Company. During the year some 7,404 carloads of freight were shipped from this city. This was an increase of 251 carloads over the preceding year's total of 7,153 carloads, the former top mark. Outgoing bentonite shipments again took the lead with 4,295 carloads compared to 4,130 in 1944, 2,809 in 1943, 2,242 in 1942 and 1,613 in 1941. The live-stock shipment came next with 2,187 carloads. Brick and tile showed a decided gain from 71 carloads to 121.

Western South Dakota Sheep-growers Association Meet in Belle Fourche

So successful were the efforts of the Association that at the annual meeting, in July, 1939, Mr. Devereaux, chairman of the executive committee, reported this territory had been freed from scabies. Mr. Devereaux also reported the Association had 200 members.

Previous winners were Kathy Soper and Kay Countryman.

This will enable the vocations department to provide more extensive training. Course offerings in the department include mechanics and radio and TV.

Albert Einstein is credited with many quotes. The following one really rings true when it comes to community leadership, vision and innovation. He said, "Logic will take you from A to B, imagination will take you everywhere." I really enjoy this quote for many reasons. On one hand, the first half of the quote might accurately describe a group of many city governments throughout the country. Those city government organizations are run by good intentioned and well-meaning leaders; they are smart and very creative within the box they reside. However, it is the second half of the quote that best describes the best forward-thinking city governments. This group are few and far between.



regardless of one's point of view, rapid change is certainly upon us.

We all seem to agree retail is undergoing a rapid transformation. Getting this one right is critical. It is rapidly becoming a retail situation of the haves and have-nots. In the middle, we have the national retailers such as Target, Home Depot, Walmart and Dollar Tree which are doing very well, growing in fact. While the segments on the ends are both struggling. For the sake of this column, we will stick to the local end. These are locally-owned and operated businesses having been devastated by the pandemic. This hardest hit group is in a fight for their retail and services lives. Many are falling by the wayside at a faster rate than one can imagine; and the bloodbath is far from over.

The locally-owned and operated business apocalypse is far from over, it will continue for years. The unfortunate issue here is that this hits the smaller and mid-sized communities the hardest. Many residents of these communities are flocking to the convenience of online shopping leaving their local communities hung out to dry. I am not one that believes all online shopping is bad. There are things that you cannot get in local communities. At times it makes sense to get those items the most convenient way possible. While some online shopping can be a healthy thing for a community, when the balance swings too far, make no mistake, communities are devastated.

While the methods may vary,

when it comes down to it, forward thinking communities understand one basic law of transformation: The Law of Local. They understand every dollar they keep within the boundaries of their communities is vital and essential. They understand and commit all their time, resources and energy on creating a vibrant local retail base, a local restaurant base along with a local experience-based and quality of life atmosphere. They understand with few exceptions, the continued courting of national chains and big boxes are a trojan horse that can destroy their locally-owned business base. They understand those same dollars devoted in years past to national chains suck your community dry, slow and steadily. Those dollars are better used to build their community's local business base. They make local entrepreneurship easy, affordable and wanted.

Oftentimes when writing this weekly column, I am guilty of saying some of the same things over with slight variations. While this may be true, I understand one of the major laws of marketing is that a message must be conveyed between six and seven times before the message begins to stick. Communities must look at it the same way, keep preaching the local message, keep conveying your shop hyper-local message and keep fighting for your future. If your community is to have a bright future, understand the economic dynamics of today are changing. Your ability to change with them is critical for your survival in a cruel and unrelenting economic environment.

After School Program Survey Results Shared

NEWELL – In a weekly visit about the school for the NVN area community, Superintendent Andrew Fergen shared results of a survey that went out to parents and staff about the topic of an after school program. The program, which has been discussed at several school board meetings, is still in the works, according to Fergen.

“We are still in the ‘intent to apply’ phase,” said Fergen. He is looking forward to a meeting with teachers and paras to further discuss the potential program. The recent teacher response showed 16 responses with 12 saying they would be interested in helping out. Eight said they would help one night per week, six-two nights a week, and two-four nights a week.

As far as transportation goes, six staff members said they would help with transportation of students with a suburban after the program ended each evening, with 10 not interested. Answering the question on helping students with missing work on Friday’s from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m., eight teachers voted yes and eight voted nay.

A survey to parents resulted with these statistics. Interest in one or more of their children attending: 27 yes, 20 no and three maybe. Nights per week they would utilize a program: 12 for one night, 13 for two, four for three and 11 for four.

Seventeen parents said they would provide transportation for their child, while 33 said they could not. In answering the program about potential volunteerism by parents, 13 said yes and 30 said no, while six lodged a maybe.

BELLE FOURCHE – “I’m so glad to hear the positive feedback and that the kids enjoyed the educational and hands-on experience as well,” said 4-H Youth Program Director Michelle May. “It was so awesome to have so many dedicated mothers there alongside their kiddos watching, learning and asking questions, too.”

ETHICS stands for ecology trapping history conservation and stewardship and is a comprehensive furbearer education program. It is designed to be a six-month-long program, with the group meeting once a month for two or three hours. As they continue to move through the program they will meet less often.

The program is based on partnerships with local SD Game, Fish and Parks, South Dakota Trapping Association and SDSU Extension/SD 4-H. The students have classes at a variety of locations including the Center of the Nation Shooting Center and local ponds and ranches.

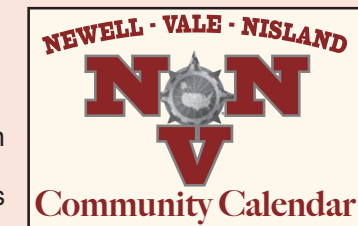

for creativity. Every school's makerspace is different, but there could be things such as a woodshop, 3D printing, audio-visual equipment and hand tools.

"Rhonda Waterland, a para at the school, has been instrumental in the Makerspace program and has worked really hard on programs that utilize it," said Fergen.

Fergen also said the board continually contemplated Covid-related issues and the possible events that are scheduled. Some of those events

include a father-daughter dance on February 19 and a snowball dance in the near future for the high school students.

He said the board is discussing the bus situation and the fact that the fleet is quite old, with the potential need for three gently used buses in the next couple years. That cost could run to \$180,000. The board and administration are looking at potential resources such as hiring a bus service.

Fergen touched on the refinancing the board has recently committed to, with a savings

of close to a quarter-million dollars. They are looking at ways to work on buildings and grounds as well as the ongoing drainage issue between the high school and ag-science building and around the south entrances into Austin Auditorium.

DerBoom both won their weight classes.

January 26, 1911
 An election will be held at Newell, South Dakota, in compliance with the order of the Butte County Commission on Monday January 30, 1911 between the hours of 9 AM and 4 PM in the Wm Quinn office on Dartmouth Ave, for the purpose of voting for or against the incorporation of the Town of Newell. This notice is given by Hugo Behrens, Chairman of Mass Meeting.
 The peal of the church bell echoed in Newell for the first time last Sunday. The Congregational Church Society are the owners.
 Mrs. J.R. Montgomery, who lives in the Vale vicinity, is very ill confined to the house with Quinzy. In the doctor's two visits, she had her throat lanced 18 times.
 W. F. Carr of Vale and M. Everett of Snoma came to see Newell Tuesday, the town they had heard so much about. They also dropped into the Irrigator office to renew subscriptions and get acquainted with the new Editor.

 The new traveling library of the Neighborhood Club has arrived. It contains 45 volumes with plenty of good fiction as well as 10 volumes of the heavier, or more instructive kind. There are books for the young folks and some for the little tots. This library is for the use of everyone in the neighborhood south of Newell and it is free to all; located in the home of George H. Day; Mrs. Day is librarian.
 M.E. Kiser's Meat Market is introducing mutton to the local consumer. Here is a nice flavored meat and when an appetite is once acquired for it, it makes a welcome change in the bill of fare. Mutton may be had in roasts, chops, steaks and also boil and stew meat.
 The Aladdin team will host the local basketball shooters Saturday night. The Aladdin bunch is pretty fast, having defeated Nisland last Saturday. Not knowing whether Nisland played her regular or a spiked team, however, we cannot at this time judge the betting.

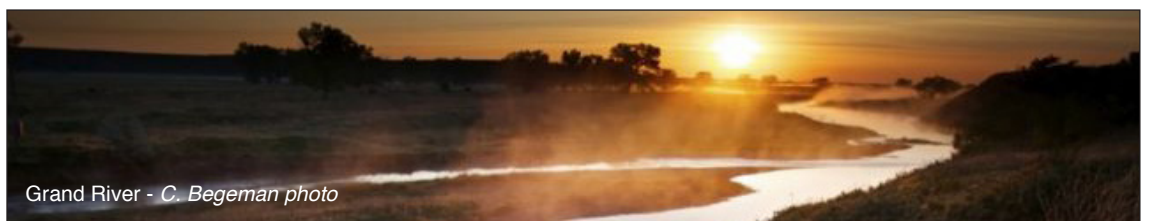

 Little Johnny replies, "No, I'm sure we don't. When Biden was elected, I clearly remember my dad saying, 'Well, that's the last thing we needed!'"

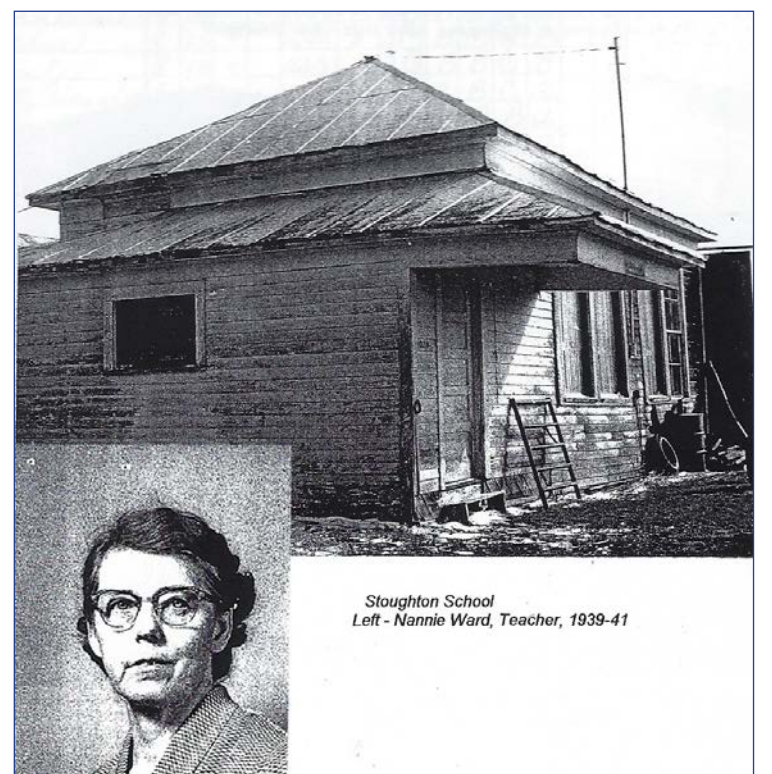

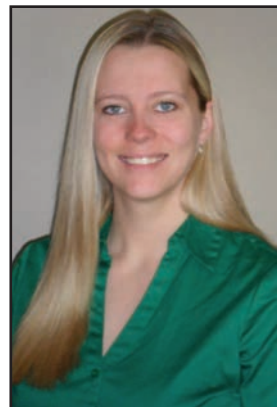

USDA Announces Quality Loss Assistance Now Available for Eligible Producers Affected by 2018, 2019 Natural Disasters

Signup began on January 6th.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5, 2021 – The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) today announced that signup for the Quality Loss Adjustment (QLA) Program will begin Wednesday, Jan. 6, 2021. Funded by the Further Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2020, this new program provides assistance to producers who suffered eligible crop quality losses due to natural disasters occurring in 2018 and 2019. The deadline to apply for QLA is Friday, March 5, 2021.

"Farmers and livestock producers nationwide experienced crop quality losses due to natural disasters in 2018 and 2019," said. Bill Northey, USDA Under Secretary for Farm Production and Conservation. "We have worked diligently over the past couple of years to roll out meaningful disaster assistance programs to help alleviate the substantial financial loss experienced by so many agricultural producers and are pleased to offer quality loss assistance as added relief. Many of the eligible producers have already received compensation for quantity losses."

Eligible Crops
Eligible crops include those

for which federal crop insurance or Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) coverage is available, except for grazed crops and value loss crops, such as honey, maple sap, aquaculture, floriculture, mushrooms, ginseng root, ornamental nursery, Christmas trees, and turfgrass sod.

Additionally, crops that were sold or fed to livestock or that are in storage may be eligible; however, crops that were destroyed before harvest are not eligible. Crop quality losses occurring after harvest, due to deterioration in storage, or that could have been mitigated, are also not eligible.

Assistance is based on a producer's harvested affected production of an eligible crop, which must have had at least a 5% quality loss reflected through a quality discount; or for forage crops, a nutrient loss, such as total digestible nutrients.

Qualifying Disaster Events
Losses must have been a result of a qualifying disaster event (hurricane, excessive moisture, flood, qualifying drought, tornado, typhoon, volcanic activity, snowstorm, or wildfire) or related condition that occurred in calendar years 2018 and/or 2019.

Assistance is available for eligible producers in counties that

received a qualifying Presidential Emergency Disaster Declaration or Secretarial Disaster Designation because of one or more of the qualifying disaster events or related conditions.

Lists of counties with Presidential Emergency Disaster Declarations and Secretarial Disaster Designations for all qualifying disaster events for 2018 and 2019 are available here. For drought, producers are eligible for QLA if the loss occurred in an area within a county rated by the U.S. Drought Monitor as having a D3 (extreme drought) or higher intensity level during 2018 or 2019.

Producers in counties that did not receive a qualifying declaration or designation may still apply but must also provide supporting documentation to establish that the crop was directly affected by a qualifying disaster event.

To determine QLA eligibility and payments, FSA considers the total quality loss caused by all qualifying natural disasters in cases where a crop was impacted by multiple events.

Applying for QLA
When applying, producers are asked to provide verifiable documentation to support claims of quality loss or nutrient loss in the case of forage crops. For crops that have been sold, grading must have been

completed within 30 days of harvest, and for forage crops, a laboratory analysis must have been completed within 30 days of harvest.

Some acceptable forms of documentation include sales receipts from buyers, settlement sheets, truck or warehouse scale tickets, written sales contracts, similar records that represent actual and specific quality loss information, and forage tests for nutritional values.

Payments Calculations and Limitations

QLA payments are based on formulas for the type of crop (forage or non-forage) and loss documentation submitted. Based on this documentation FSA is calculating payments based on the producer's own individual loss or based on the county average loss. More information on payments can be found on farmers.gov/quality-loss.

FSA will issue payments once the application period ends. If the total amount of calculated QLA payments exceeds available program funding, payments will be prorated.

For each crop year, 2018, 2019 and 2020, the maximum amount that a person or legal entity may receive, directly or indirectly, is \$125,000. Payments made to a joint operation (including a general partner-

Future Insurance Coverage Requirements

All producers receiving QLA Program payments are required to purchase crop insurance or NAP coverage for the next two available crop years at the 60% coverage level or higher. If eligible, QLA participants may meet the insurance purchase requirement by purchasing Whole-Farm Revenue Protection coverage offered through USDA's Risk Management Agency.
