School District Sets '22-'23 Budget Hearing

A public hearing on the
proposed budget for fiscal year
2022-2023 of the Belle Fourche
School District (BFSD) has
been set for Monday, June 13 at
5:15pm in the school district's
administrative offices located
on the middle school campus.
Any member of the public with
questions or concerns is invited
to attend.

The proposed budget reflects a modest 2.6% increase over last year's budget. It also contains an increase in teacher pay, an increase in state aid, but a lower enrollment over what was expected a year ago.

"One positive from the state is the 6% funding rate which is absolutely wonderful, thank you legislature and Gov. Noem," Dr Steve Willard, Superintendent of Schools told the Board. "And the other was a negative due to a loss of enrollment which basically turned our 6% increase to a 3%. But if we didn't have the good, the bad would be terrible."

The budget proposes a \$2,000 per year increase in salary for returning teachers which is not as much as the district would have liked to provide, largely due to the loss of enrollment. School districts in South Dakota receive funding based on a student enrollment count taken on the last Friday in September.

Proefrock says estimating student enrollment for an upcoming budget projection is a "best guess" effort. The district considers past enrollment figures and local economic conditions to try to arrive at a figure which can be used to determine state reimbursement. The amount given to the district by the state, provides most of the budget funding which makes the enrollment figure more critical.

Last year the district estimated an enrollment of 1,380 students. Willard said they looked at enrollment figures from 2019 (1,379) and 2020 (1,369) to set the 1,380 student enrollment figure for last year's budget. The actual figure came in at 1,343.

"We didn't even come close to that (1,380) so last year's

budget didn't get funded like we thought it was going to," Proefrock told the Beacon. "It makes it difficult to compare last year's budget to this year's because it's not really apples to apples."

According to state figures enrollment in Spearfish and Sturgis is up slightly while Rapid City's is trending lower along with Newell and Lead-Deadwood. Overall the state has

seen a slight increase in student enrollment in public schools from 2020 to 2021.

"Our students aren't going to Spearfish or Sturgis," Willard said. "They're going to Texas or Wisconsin. They move to where the jobs are or where their relatives are."

Nationwide student enrollment figures are declining, partially attributed to the number

BELLE FOURCHE-He has been the face at the Butte County Veteran Service Officer, VSO, for 13 years, but now Bob Wagner has decided it is time to spend more time fishing with grandkids, or in his words, "Nothing really."

"It's been good," he said. He has enjoyed working with the veterans of Butte County and working with the county commissioners over the last 13 years.

Wagner, as an Air Force veteran, has been involved in helping area vets handle the labyrinth of paperwork surrounding the Veteran's Administration. He has helped over 900 vets and their families with burial arrangements, receive compensation, and has been a liaison with the VA. His work has been mostly with service related disabilities and the "hoops" that are there.

Everything he has done has been free of charge.

The most frustrating thing he has addressed is the process of vets proving they have a service disability. Wagner spends hours wrangling the red tape of the administration in Sioux Falls. Although, he says that they work well, there's a lot of time involved. It's a process but it's important to the vet.

"People need to realize the sacrifices veterans have made," he said. They are away from family and friends; they go no matter where.

Bob's heart has been fully involved in his work with the veterans of Butte County. There are probably even more that could use the help available to them.

"It's as good as any organization," he said concerning the Veterans Administration.

He and his wife, Dee, have lived in Belle Fourche for 40 years and raised two children. Sandra lives in Belle Fourche with two children. Gregory lives in Texas and has one child. Wagner's position will be advertised in house at first. It will be hard to follow his role model, he has been an important part of Butte County veterans' lives.

management.



Dr. Micheal Henry Zehfus of Spearfish, South Dakota, aged 68, passed away Wednesday, May 4, 2022, at Monument Health Hospital in Rapid City, SD, following a heart attack. He was born November 28, 1953, to John and Colleen (Cook) Zehfus and spent his childhood in Weyauwega, WI. Mike met the love of his life, Betty Regina Culbertson at a NSF Science Camp held at University of Idaho, Moscow, ID, during the summer of 1971.

After graduating from Weyauwega High School in 1972, Micheal attended Ripon College in Ripon, WI, earning a Bachelor of Science in Chemistry in 1976. He and Betty married on May 14, 1977, and the couple promptly moved to Chicago, IL, where Mike pursued his Master's degree in Biochemistry at the University of Chicago. Then to Oregon State University in Corvallis, OR, where he earned a PhD in Physical Biochemistry.

The next decades would see the couple pursuing a semi-nomadic lifestyle - on the hunt for a place to settle. Their travels included postdoctoral positions at the University of Pennsylvania, Hershey PA; followed by another in Madison, WI; then an eight year stint teaching at the Ohio State University; a one year appointment at Ohio Northern University, Ada OH; and finally a tenured teaching position at Black Hills State University, Spearfish SD, where he was known as "Dr. Z.". He taught chemistry courses and guided students in research projects for over twenty years before retiring in the Spring of 2019.

In the course of their journey across the US, they welcomed two children into their family; Corey John Zehfus in 1986, Pennsylvania; and Torin Atlas Zehfus in 1988, Wisconsin.

Mike was, some would say, a mad scientist

complete with the flyaway mussed up hair; a musician, an outdoorsman, a loving husband and father, and a man of profound faith. Mike played saxophone in the Northern Hills Community Band, Belle Fourche Cowboy Band, and the BHSU Concert Band; as well as singing in the Spearfish UCC Choir.

Then God said, "Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness...So God created humankind in his image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them." Genesis 1:26-27

In recent weeks, I've been blessed to meet some people who are going through some very hard

times. Unfortunately, some of them come and receive the basic help they are asking for, but they haven't embraced the love that God has for them. Without understanding the depth and breadth of God's love, they are destined to live in the ruts of life they have created for themselves.

South Dakota Strong

Nature has a way of humbling
us, of stepping into our lives
with previously unthought power
and reminding us what truly
matters. That's how I felt these
past few days while surveying
storm damage across much of

South Dakota. But the power of the storm was not the only thing that I found humbling. I found it in the families in Castlewood who had lost their homes, but were still grateful to be safe, alive, and together. I found it in the first responders in communities across our state who maintained a cheerful, can-do attitude despite the long road ahead. And I found it in our community leaders who demonstrated the necessary resolve to get our cities and towns back on the right track.

Salem had to evacuate their nursing home. But first, staff moved their residents into an internal room. They had latched the doors, but literally had to hold them shut due to the wind. On the other side of the door, the

roof had been completely torn off. That's courage – that's going above and beyond.

In Castlewood, I spent time talking to a woman wearing a "small town proud" shirt. She just happened to be wearing it when the storm hit. But it fit. It demonstrated exactly how I felt in that moment, surrounded by folks I had grown up with, who were facing struggles ahead, but were proud to be from small town South Dakota.

In Madison, first responders reflected on the fact that it wasn't that long ago, in 2019, when we had all been together during another crisis, the flooding that hit that town. They had smiles on their faces last night because they knew from that experience that we could get through this.

I'm proud of South Dakota. I'm proud of the small towns who are weathering this together, just like they weather everything. I'm proud of our cities who were ready and responded swiftly. I'm proud of our farmers, who had a tough go of it, too. They know

that the Lord giveth and the Lord taketh away -- that the weather can make their living or wreck it. And they keep on plowing, sowing, and reaping, nonetheless.

We will continue to get information out to our people in the coming days. We are getting emergency resources to communities, deploying the National Guard when necessary, and working with local and federal emergency response to help folks out. There is more work to do-together we will get it done.

In the meantime, help your neighbors. Check on them if it's safe to do so. And pray for your fellow South Dakotans. Pray for the families in so many communities who will have to spend time away from their homes while we rebuild; for the towns where the lights are still out; for the workers helping to get the lights back on and for the emergency responders helping to keep everyone safe in the process.

We are South Dakota strong. And we will prove it, once again, by getting through this.

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


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Black Hills Conference Track

takes to be part of this program. When you look back at the


success we have had this year, you don't have to go much further than these guys here.

Sunday the 15th the Broncs traveled down to Hot Springs for a seeded game matchup against the Bison. The Broncs jumped out early, scoring 4





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

We are seeking to improve our county through truth and accountability making Butte County a better place to live. Whether it be by helping our neighbors, or draining the swamp at our local levels. We would like to invite anyone who is interested in helping us keep our community a good place to live.

To start off, I want to apologize about some information in the ad in the first week of May. I was misinformed by a politician that there was only a 28% voter turnout in Butte County, and 60% of those voters voted in favor of medical marijuana. There are truths to what we were told, but the information I shared was incorrect, and I don't want to spread misinformation to fellow citizens of Butte County. If you'd like to look up the information yourself, the website is sdsos.gov, I highly recommend that you do your own research on this subject.

We have been enlightened as to what the marijuana laws

will bring. We would like to share the negative aspects since there is \$2.5 mil of out-of-state money pushing for spreading the so-called benefits of medical marijuana.

Questions to think about: Who will be in charge of ensuring that the ordinance regulations are being followed? The police department or health department? How will the county and state be able to collect taxes from an all-cash business? Federally insured banks won't hold money for anyone affiliated with marijuana.

How much water will these facilities need to operate? One marijuana plant will consume 6 gallons of water per day during the growing season. How much electricity will they use? An average 2,400-squarefoot home uses 903 kilowatt hours of power monthly, according to the federal government. According to industry experts, a marijuana grow facility consumes about 360 kwh a month per 25 square feet, or even more during the different growing phases. Our local utility providers have been in meetings with other states dealing with this; just ask them what they've learned. What kind of chemicals are going to be used? Many of the illegal growers in California use fertilizers and pesticides that have been long restricted or banned in the United States,

including carbofuran and zinc phosphide. This could be what we're going to deal with, since there is no oversight other than the health department. The chemicals have turned thousands of acres of forest into waste dumps so toxic that law enforcement officers have been hospitalized after inadvertently touching plants and equipment, and scores of animals have

This is also going to increase the tax burden on the taxpayers in the county. The cost of this coming here will greatly affect our law enforcement budget, water, and roads, and in turn, taxes will rise to help cover these expenses.

We have reached out to state officials about what we can do to minimize the impact to our community. They told us that the state law is set up so that the power was given to the county level in deciding the facilities they will allow. The only state requirement, as far as number of facilities, is one dispensary per municipality. In our opinion this is major overkill but that's what the law says.

If you have any concerns about what our county is doing about medical marijuana, contact your commissioners from your districts and ask them to not sign the final approval until they know how they will handle all of these areas.

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
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The Good Stuff

Chad Masters/Cory Petska Top the Leaderboard in Guymon, Okla.

Chad Masters and Cory Petska have won nearly every big rodeo there is in the PRCA. The veteran team ropers added

another title to their resumes at the Guymon (Okla.) Pioneer Days Rodeo Sunday.

The PRCA World

Champions caught all three steers to take home the average title in 22.1 seconds, which included a 7.4-second run on the final day to lockdown the win. Petska credited his partner for making his life easy on the back end at the key stop on the NFR Playoff Series presented by Pendleton Whisky.

"You know it really helped that I got really good handles all weekend long," said Petska, the 2017 PRCA World Champion Heeler. "My partner (Masters) made it really easy for me to catch two feet. He set them up to where it was an easy catch, so he did all the work really. I just had to do my job."

Over the three rounds the pair pocketed \$4,912 to add their totals in the PRCA | RAM World Standings. Heading into the weekend, Masters was sitting

14th, while Petska was outside the Top 15 at No. 20.

The win in Guymon was the final time the two will rope

together this season. Petska said while he'll still compete at a few circuit rodeos, he's turning his focus to his cattle operation.

"I'm actually headed to Wisconsin this summer to take care of

my yearlings," he said.
"It's a good boost for Chad in
the standings, but for me it was
just a really good rodeo to end
my year on.

"We run about 1,500 head of yearlings in the summer, and I just wasn't feeling like doing all the driving this year. So, I just decided I was going to take the summer off and take care of our cattle and ease around to a few circuit rodeos in the Great Lakes."

Other winners at the \$322,923 rodeo were all-around cowboy Caleb Smidt (\$4,092, tie-down roping and team roping); bareback rider Jess Pope (92 points on Frontier Rodeo's Gun Fire); steer wrestler Tristan Martin (11.6 seconds on three head);

saddle bronc rider Ross Griffin (89 points on Frontier Rodeo's Maple Leaf); tie-down roper Marty Yates (25.5 seconds on three head); barrel racer Hailey Kinsel (34.22 seconds on two runs); steer roper Cody Lee (53.0 seconds on four head); and bull rider Garrett Smith (91 points on Frontier Rodeo's Gladiator's Hammer).

Kimzey came back Saturday night with an 88.5-point ride on Lancaster & Jones Pro Rodeo's Mr. Quick.

The ride looked good on the scoreboard, but it was far from smooth sailing for Kimzey. "That was a really nice bull," Kimzey said. "He kicked out and went left and it was all I could do to keep up with him. He threw me off right at the whistle. I took a little shot to the chin and broke my helmet and I turned around and got ready for the short round.



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

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

of parents who are opting for home schooling or private schools for their children. The Los Angeles County school district lost 150,000 students last year alone.

For the upcoming fiscal year the district is projecting its budget figures based on an estimate of 1,345 students. That would represent an increase of two students over this past year.

"The administrators and board are managing the funding appropriately," Willard said. "We're not having to make cuts but we're not able to do as much good as far as giving salary increases as much as we'd like."

With the increase in diesel fuel the district is having to pay more to fuel its buses and vehicles. Proefrock says they purchase the fuel on a contract basis a few cents above the cash price. But it has caused the district to look at ways to conserve.

"That's one reason why we're meeting to discuss some of our bus routes," Willard said. "We have to take a look at going so many miles just to pick up a couple kids, and can we keep doing that."

None of these budget figures takes into account ESSER funding, variously referred to as COVID funds. Those monies are earmarked for specific purposes tied to broad government mandates related to campus improvements or hiring of faculty and staff. It is reimbursed back to the district from the Federal government. Those funds will run out in a year or two and any hires the district has made will need to seek additional funding to continue.

According to School Board

Member Tara Knapp the district's Salary Committee was asked to add an additional staff member, a high school strength and conditioning coach. That position was added to the budget for the upcoming year.

In other district action the board voted unanimously to retain the services of Lunchtime Solutions. They have been the food service management company for the district for the past several years providing breakfast and lunch at the school. They also supply the school's summertime feeding program. The district will now work on a contract with the vendor to cover the upcoming school year.

The board also agreed to hire **Interquest Detection Canines** of Stevensville, Montana, to provide drug dog services at the school. The contract runs from August of this year through July of 2023. The district will hire Interquest for four half day or full day visits during the contract period at a rate of \$400 per half day and \$700 for a full day. According to owner Keith Chambers, Interquest will provide "contraband inspection services using non-aggressive dogs which may be completed on an unannounced basis."

Contraband includes all drugs of abuse, alcoholic beverages, firearms and ammunition, prescription and over-the-counter medication. It is the district's responsibility to clearly define and communicate its contraband policy to all area of campus. Communal areas, lockers, gym areas, class rooms, parking lots and vehicles, grounds and other areas selected by the district will be subject to inspection. Contraband detected on district property is the responsibility of the district, according to the agreement.

Looking Back in Belle-

S. G. Mortimer Memoirs -(shared by Mortimer family, written in 1952)

Samuel Mortimer arrived in the area with his parents George and Eliza Murray Mortimer. His family was living in the Bear Lodge when his father died in 1899. He and his mother sold the ranch and moved into Belle Fourche. When Belle Fourche organized in 1903, Mortimer was its first mayor – youngest mayor in the state, maybe ever. He was 22 years old at the time. He grew up with the town; was an active member of the Commercial club (later renamed the Chamber of Commerce). Here is Samuel's memoir of his start in town life.

When we moved to town and after getting settled, I was confronted with the problem of getting something to do. As I had no experience in anything but ranching, this was pretty much of a problem to solve. Mr. Alanson Giles and his son Edgar were running a hardware store then in Belle Fourche, the old man owning a two-thirds interest and Edgar one third. Mr. Giles also had a big ranch down the river a few miles and was kept pretty busy trying to manage it and handle the store at the same time and wanted to sell out his interest in the store so that he could devote all his time to the ranch. We had been trading with them all the time that we had been on the ranch and were fairly well acquainted and I used to loaf around the store occasionally after I came to town. Mr. Giles suggested to me that it would be a good opportunity for me to buy him out and go into the hardware business with Edgar.

"To Buy or Not to Buy," was the question. Having been left pretty much to myself as to making decisions in the past and having a much higher value of my ability and knowledge than was justified under the circumstances, I was inclined to take a chance and go into the deal. I did to a certain extent realize the fact that in so doing I was laboring under a handicap of knowing nothing about the hardware business or in fact. any mercantile business and had never been behind a counter in my life, did not know the credit from the debit side of a ledger

and in all respects, was just a blank. To make a long story short, I took Mr. Giles up on the bargain and paid him the \$1500 for his share of the business "as was," sold Edgar enough interest (on time) to make us equal partners and was in the hardware business in a hurry. After making the deal, I went over to the bank and told my friend Mr. Marble, the cashier, that I had bought out Mr. Giles and was going into the hardware business. He did not seem to be very enthusiastic over the proposition and asked me several questions of what the deal was. I then told him about it and he asked me, "When are you going to invoice?" Well, I hated to say it, but I promptly replied, "What do you mean by invoicing? I just bought the thing." (Just like I had been used to buying a cow brute - or maybe I should say "a pig in a poke.) I will never forget the expression on Marble's face after I told him that. He just looked at me for a minute and said, "Well, maybe the Good Lord will take care of you, but I can't." He then told me a few of the things I could have learned had I talked to him first instead of after. But anyway I was then a hardware merchant so to speak and had bet my last dollar on the outcome. So it was now up to me to find out if I was to sink or swim from there on.

Life rolled on. In 1904 Sam was nominated for the state Senate. At the time, his district included both Butte County, which at the time included the areas to the North Dakota boundary and Meade County. Mortimer was not known the Meade County country. So he went to campaign in that area.

While in Sturgis I ran into Jack Hale and he asked me what I was doing down in his territory and we had a nice visit. He was a fine gentleman and we were good friends and I had known him for some time. I, of course, told him I was just building a basis for November, and we had a good laugh over it. Just to show how the Democrats felt about my chances in winning, the following was in the "Sturgis Record" (Republican paper) quoting the "Sturgis Press" (Democrat paper):

"The Sturgis Press, Dem., en-

deavors to bolster up its waning courage by the following, which would be funny if true: S.G. Mortimer, of Belle Fourche, a youngish man and a fairly good looking one at that, was down here over Sunday making googoo eyes at our voters. He it is whom the Republicans of this senatorial district have put in the field against our Jack Hale. He would however, better hunt shelter against the "Hale" storm on November 8. There won't be enough of him left in the race to hold a post-Mortimer examination over."

(EDITOR'S note: However when the election was over, Samuel Mortimer was on his way to Pierre. With this development he needed to sell his share of the Mortimer-Giles Hardware store.) It was now up to me to make some arrangements and do a lot of planning so as to be able to get away by the first of the year to attend the Legislative Session held at

I began to wonder if I had not made a serious mistake in allowing myself to be persuaded to ever make the race. The building of the Irrigation Project made a lot of business and things looked very good - although I was doing more business than I could handle without much more capital and this was beginning to worry me considerably as to how I was going to handle things.

About this time J.C. Eccles came to me with a proposal to buy me out and offered an attractive price for the business. After due consideration and conference with Dr. L.J. Townsend, my partner, I accepted his offer and sold out to him. Having disposed of the business, I was able to get lined up to go to the Legislature on the opening in January, 1905.



Be the Change You Want to See! Everett Hale _____ to make a difference dollars floating throughout the

Edward Everett Hale once said, "I am only one, but I am one. I cannot do everything, but I can do something. And I will not let what I cannot do interfere with what I can do."

We often hear those around us say, I am just one person, what difference can I really make in my country or even in my local community. The larger the community, the more prevalent this thought process tends to be. I would counter this very flawed thought process by saying, historically, nearly every major change begins with a vision by one person or a very small group of individuals. It has also been said that we can't change the wind, but we can adjust the sails. By adjusting our individual sails, we can indeed influence the future of our local community for the better, one individual at a time.

How do we adjust our individual community sails? One of the more obvious answers would be to become knowledgeable and vote. Another might be volunteer to serve on a local non-profit board. You could volunteer with a civic or service club. Consider becoming more educated regarding local issues, volunteer or assist with a citywide cleanup, and so forth. All these and other avenues are certainly worthy and noteworthy, and they can make a huge impact in your community. How we volunteer and attempt

might be viewed as somewhat intangible and hard to notice, that is okay. Let me suggest one habit you can incorporate into your daily routine that will make a large, noticeable, and tangible

impact on your local commu-

nity.

When residents (and city leaders) make a commitment to spend as many of their dollars with locally owned and operated businesses, you will make a huge difference. Studies show every dollar spent locally in this fashion carries a compounding community revenue impact of three to five times greater value than dollars spent with non-locally owned big box or National chain establishments. It is a situation where the sum is much greater than the individual parts. It is a situation where one plus one can equal three, four or even five. Imagine what a 3-5X greater value for each local dollar spent would mean when it comes to funding our local fire fighters, local police, city services, local events, your local

investments? To put in practical terms, if a community or county with a population of 25,000 had every resident committed to spend just \$25 more each month hyper-locally than they might have otherwise spent out-oftown or online, that would generate \$7,500,000 additional

roads and parks or local public

community each year. What would an additional \$7,500,000 floating through your community mean for jobs and standard of living in many households? It doesn't end there, what does \$7,500,000 look like after compounding? When factoring in the 3-5X compounding impact of \$7,500,000, it becomes \$22,500,000 - \$37,500,000. Factor in a 5% local sales tax and your community leaders now have an additional \$1,875,000 for local police, fire, roads, and so forth. It all started with a small commitment by local residents to do their part in building a future for their children.


That is only the tip of the iceberg. Imagine how much more competitive your local business base could be with those new dollars circulating throughout the community. How many new jobs can be funded with those dollars staying within the community? How many entrepreneurs can flourish with the support of the community? These are real dollars with enormous community impact, all starting with each person committing to support their community.

In today's environment, the very fabric of the economic financial base in your local community is under a relentless attack on many fronts. A community's ability to support their hyper-local businesses isn't just a nice thing to do, it will be a matter of financial survival for your entire community in the future. I might even further suggest the future may already be arriving as the gale force economic and demographic trends or winds are gathering steam.

Community leaders must be forward thinking as must each citizen. Forward thinking involves understanding the current

Newell City Commission Begins Fiscal Year

NEWELL-The Newell City Commission set commissioner appointments, two commissioners were administered the oath of office, and on-off sale malt beverage licenses were approved among other business held during the regular Newell commission meeting Monday evening.

Commissioners Allen Youngberg and Don Adams were administered the oath of office to begin their new terms. Both commissioners ran unopposed for this year's election.

Before commission appointments, the commissioners heard from Bill Lass from BH Council of Local Governments, via Zoom, concerning the first reading of plans for water funding and sewer funding applications. The Town of Newell is seeking \$992,000 for funding from the Board of Water and Natural Resources for the Water System Improvements Project that includes a new water line to replace an aged and unreliable water system in the growing part of Newell. The town is also seeking \$603,000 for the expansion of the waste water collection system to the serve the industrial park area, as well as a new development adjacent to the industrial park in northeast Newell.

During the public hearing on the two projects, Lass outlined the funding procedure for each project. Following an explanation by Jason Hanson on the need for the both projects, Bill Lass began to further defined the funding. Lass cautioned the commissioners that his numbers were all approximations.

The principle source of funding for the Water System Improvements Project will come from one of two primary sources-the Drinking water State Revolving Loan Fund Program and/or the Consolidated Water Facilities Construction Program. There is also a possibility that the DANR could fund part of the project from the American Rescue Plan Act grant funds.

The total cost for the water project is \$1,142,000. The Town of Newell has pledged \$150,000 in local cash from the water savings account for the project. A surcharge exclusive to paying back the loan will be added to water bills. A surcharge allows the loan to not be a part of the city's debt limit. The approximate debt service for \$992,000 for 30 years at 1.625% interest is \$3,844 per month. There must be a 10% debt reserve amount that is added to the

NEWELL - The Newell school board, in their most recent meeting on Monday, May 9, accepted a bid for a new playground from Dakota Playground for \$59592.00. This would include one day of a supervisor to oversee the process. The board has been working toward this process for a while now and have finally taken the leap to a process that will be paid for with capital outlay funds.

The board also approved a variety of other agenda items including hiring Lonnie Johnson as a summer hire, Norine Yule as the credit recovery coordinator, and a number of SDH-SAA measures. An approval to request bids for cabling which

will be paid for with ESSER III funding.



May 16, 1912 Mrs. Jackson and family of the Horse Creek community went over to the Vale cemetery Saturday to decorate the graves

of their relatives.

Charles S. Price, the corner druggist, has fitted up a portion of his ware room as an ice house and will ship in manufactured ice from Deadwood. A new soda fountain has been installed in there this week, filled with the latest improvements, has 2 ice cream coolers, 3 taps for the carbonated water, fixtures for attachment to city water and is wired for electricity. The counters of quarter sawed oak, which the working parts are of 16-guage German silver. We believe that this is the niftiest fountain in the country.

Hay that wouldn't cause a starved Billy goat that would not bat an eye is selling for \$30 per ton in Newell. It will be a good many years before conditions will occur again. Alfalfa fields are looking fine and stock is doing well on the range with plenty of new grass.

May 11, 1922 Newell High School graduates have captured 4 of the 12 scholarships offered annually by Yankton College. Elmer Jukkola won the first prize over all competing High School students of the state. He received 100% in both geometry and algebra. His reward is \$120 in cash and free tuition of more than \$100. total, making the total monthly debt cost of \$4,229. According to Lass' calculations, based on 331 accounts, the approximate monthly debt cost would be \$12.78 per month.

The Sewer Funding project, i.e. Sanitary/Storm Sewer Facilities Funding, may be funded from one of two primary sources-the Clean Water State Revolving Loan Fund and/or the Consolidated Water Facilities Construction Program. It may also be funded in part by the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) grant funds.

The total loan request is \$603,000, Newell has pledged \$106,000 in local ARPA funds allocated to the project. The approximate monthly debt service for \$603,000 loan at 2.125% for 30 years would be \$2,267 per month. With a 10% debt reserve, the total monthly cost is \$2,494. So, based on 296 accounts, the approximate debt cost would be an increase of \$8.43 per month per account.

A special Public Hearing meeting is set for May 20, 2022 for the second reading of the two projects.

The first reading of the revised Zoning Ordinance, Ordinance 05-2022, adding 10 to Section 9B creating licensing provisions for cannabis establishments was done. This section, in part, sets the non-refundable application fee at \$10,000. Twenty thousand dollars will be required by the applicant who is approved and has obtained a registration certificate from SD DOH. The number of cannabis establishments will be limited to one dispensary only.

The first reading of Ordinance 06-2022, that amends Section 9B, "Permitted Uses" General Commercial District Use Regulations and Section 5, definitions of the Zoning Ordinance. This ordinance sets the maximum number of cannabis dispensaries at one. The ordinance wording states in part, "... there are some uses which because of their very nature, are recognized as having serious objectionable operational characteristics, particularly when several of them are concentrated under certain circumstances thereby having a potential deleterious effect upon the adjacent areas. Special regulation of these uses is necessary to ensure that these adverse effects will not contribute to the blighting or downgrading of the surrounding neighborhood. The primary control or regulation is for the purpose of preventing a concentration of these uses in any one area."

It continues, "A cannabis dispensary shall be located not less than 1000 feet from a public or private school existing before the date of the cannabis dispensary application; ...shall not be located not less than 1000 feet from churches, residences, public parks, libraries, daycare facilities, existing before the date of the cannabis dispensary application."

There is an exemption to the separation requirements other than from the schools. The distance can be waived if the applicant provides documentation from the land title holder. The setback is measured from the lot line of the property where the dispensary is proposed.

More information can be found at the Newell city offices on Third Street. There will be a second reading of the ordinances prior to approval.

Debris that is burnable: scrap lumber, untreated wood, trees and tree branches.

Yard Waste: Grass, leaves. trees and branches.

Miscellaneous Waste: Furniture, mattresses, carpet, flooring, sheetrock, and similar wastes.

White Goods: Washers, dryers, stoves, water heaters, and other recyclable scrap metals, excluding fuel tanks. Refrigerators and freezers must be certified Freon free by a plumber.


