### Ward 2 Council member Derrick Erhart Resigns: Cites Work Commitments

Due to a changing job situation Ward 2 Council member Derrick Erhart has resigned his post. A special election to fill the vacancy will be held on July 25.

Ward 2 City Council member Derrick Erhart's resignation was accepted by the Belle Fourche City Council during its regular meeting on May 15.

Erhart says a change in employers necessitated the move. His resignation is effective immediately and a special election to fill the post has been set for July 25.

Erhart was elected in April of 2021 and has served two years of a three-year term. "I had a different career at the time, so that made it a little different for me," Erhart told the Beacon. "I've since changed careers and I'm over in Wyoming so it makes it a little harder to get to some of the afternoon meetings. I never know if I'm going to be a hour or four hours from that meeting."

When Erhart was elected to office he held an IT (information technology) position with Black Hills State University. He has since accepted a position with Powder River Energy serving eastern Wyoming as a server infrastructure administer.

"The one thing I can say is that it takes a lot of time but it is rewarding and there is a lot of good that comes out of being on the council," he said. "No matter how experienced you think you are, you are always there to learn something. It's eye-opening, but I am glad I served."

This was Erhart's first foray into public office and says that he might consider it again. He said he's grateful for the talent-

ed people he had the opportunity to work and help see the city grow.

"What I'll remember is when we started two years ago trying to get the city administrator position going," he said. "I think we went the right direction to get the extra guidance and keep our plans moving forward as councils change. It helps the cohesiveness of the city." Erhart also cites the opportunity to help the city regain its financial stability through changes in the finance office. "Overall, it's been good," he said.

"I'd like to thank Mr. Erhart for putting in the time and effort," Mayor Randy Schmidt told the Council. "I don't think anyone realizes until they sit in these chairs how much time it consumes alongside your family life and job. I really appreciate your being a part of the Council."

May 15th was Erhart's final council meeting. According to Jason LaFayette, City Finance Officer, any Ward 2 citizen may file a petition to run for the office. The candidate petitions for the post will go out May 26. The petitions will be due back to the city on Friday, June 23, by 5pm. The special election will be held on Tuesday, July 25, with canvassing of results on August 1.

### **Nearly \$1.4 Million in Scholarships Awarded**

An impressive \$1,044,800 was awarded in institutional post-secondary educational scholarships, and \$345,000 was awarded in state and local scholarships.

John grew up in Gary, Indiana. He attended St. Luke Catholic grade school for eight years. He attended Emerson High School in Gary, Indiana, and graduated in 1963.

John joined the U.S. Air Force in June of 1965. He received his basic training at Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, TX. He was then assigned to the base police squadron at Ellsworth Air Force Base, near Rapid City, SD.

Patricia Daisy, joined the family in 1966. Marlyn taught school for 32 years in Philip, West Central Humboldt, Pierre (country school), Gettysburg, Hoven Catholic School, and Allen on Pine Ridge IR. She was principal of Whitewood & Meade Rural School in 1981-1983. She served as President of West Central Education Assoc. and was a member of Women's Extension Club. Morey enjoyed buying, selling and renting homes. She was adventuresome and enjoyed her travels to Rome, The Holy Land, Canada, Mexico, Hawaii, Greece & cruises to Alaska & the Bahamas. After Francis (Knute) died in 2003, she wintered every year either in Georgia, Alabama, Las Vegas, Florida, Seattle, California, Mississippi as well as in Mesa, AZ. She enjoyed bible studies at the Methodist, Wesleyan and Presbyterian churches in Sturgis as well as singing with the choirs of churches she attended in Sturgis and Hot Springs. In the 50s & 60s, she played the piano at the Presbyterian church in Philip where she and Knute also taught Sunday School.



Besides church, her main contributions were charitable gift annuities to ministries, universities, Salvation Army and St. Joseph Indian School. She was a member of NEA, extension clubs, United Way and other outreach organizations. Her spiritual breakfasts were from Joel Osteen & Joyce Meyers broadcasts on TV.

She took much pride in the honor her family received from Dakota State University for the Alumni Association Outstand-

ing Alumnus Award. It was to the Marlyn Murphy Family as 6 of us graduated from DSU. She also took great pride in Knute's rising to the National President of the National Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association. She was proud of her family's achievements that included the National Teacher Award (Milken), induction into the DSU Athletic Hall of Fame, Teacher of the Year awards, as well as her son-in-law becoming South Dakota's Lt. Governor and more. She loved attending any function for her children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Marlyn's traits were independence, adventure and generosity, all she'd say she inherited from her parents. She loved music and was quick to laugh and had a great sense of humor accompanied with quick wit. She was very frugal at times having lived through the Dirty Thirties. 



By fostering an environment that supports entrepreneurship and innovation, communities can attract and retain businesses, create new industries, and diversify their local economies. According to a study by the Kauffman Foundation, new businesses created by



entrepreneurs account for nearly all net job growth in the US, and small businesses are responsible for two-thirds of all new jobs. The study also found that small communities have

a higher rate of entrepreneurial activity than larger cities, indicating the potential for innovation-driven economic growth.

The city of Erie, Pennsylvania, has been working to develop a culture of innovation and entrepreneurship through the Erie Innovation District, a partnership between the city, local universities, and the private sector. The district provides support for entrepreneurs, connects them with investors and mentors, and offers training and resources to help them launch and grow their businesses. As a result, Erie has seen the creation of new businesses and job opportunities, including in emerging industries such as robotics and advanced manufacturing.

For example, the town of Greensburg, Kansas, rebuilt itself as a green community after a devastating tornado in 2007. The town developed innovative strategies for energy efficiency, water conservation, and waste reduction, leading to a 100% renewable energy supply and becoming a national model for sustainable development.

Moreover, innovation can also improve the quality of life for residents by enhancing access to education, healthcare, and cultural resources. Small communities can leverage innovation to provide affordable and accessible services such as telemedicine, distance learning, and mobile libraries. The community of Brush, Colorado, developed a mobile library program that brings books and educational resources to residents in rural areas, enhancing access to education and promoting literacy.

Innovation can have a significant impact on small communities, driving economic growth, social progress, and environmental sustainability. By fostering a culture of innovation and entrepreneurship, small communities can create new opportunities, address challenges, and improve the quality of life for their residents. Examples such as Erie, St. Clair, Greensburg, and Brush demonstrate the transformative potential of innovation, and highlight the importance of investing in programs and initiatives that support innovation and entrepreneurship in small communities.

He said the calf's body goes into a low blood sugar issue, brought on when the calf goes into a deep sleep caused by heat and humidity, and they don't nurse often enough. Ronda's calf had gotten through the fence and was running up and down trying to get back through, and didn't get to nurse. This little calf didn't make it through the night. On Wednesday morning, Ronda grafted an unwanted baby calf to the mama, so everything turned out happy. On Thursday morning, Jake Reynolds and Jason Berg stopped at Ronda's, as they were going into the hills to call turkeys. Later they came back by, for a little longer visit, and joined Ronda for lunch. On Friday evening, Diane came out again, to help on Saturday with gathering and loading of pairs. 





### Looking Back in Belle

These articles come from newspaper microfilm from the Belle Fourche Public library, using a new microfilm reader and printer. The photographs in most cases are from the Tri-State Museum.

125 years ago Belle Times May 12, 1898 Talk of the Town W. B. Clanton and wife of Harding came in Saturday. Ben Mendenhall, the Slim Buttes stockman, was in town yesterday...W. H. Stewart has his soda fountain in operation. Call in and get a refreshing drink. Go to the new opera house, the Gaiety Monday night and see new plays, songs and dances. J. W. Patterson has rented the Bullock pasture north of town and is repairing the fence. Elmer Zimmerman has invented a revolver holster that promises to be a good thing for him. He is perfecting a patent on it.

More Brand Registrations After many weeks of anxious waiting, the stockmen in this vicinity are beginning to receive from Pierre the certificates of their brands. It is difficult to understand the reason, if any there be, for the delay in the matter. Several hundred brands were sent in from the cunty, and probably nine tenths of the of the applicants are still in the ark as to whether they own a recorded brand or not. The register of deeds has been bombarded with inquiries, but is unable to account for the delay. W. R. Glass has just received his certificate, and others will probably follow soon.

100 years ago Belle Fourche Bee May 17, 1923 ATTEMPTS TO MURDER EM-PLOYER: Sheep Herder Shot Ira Sleeper Shot Three Times -Officers on Trail of Assailant Ira Sleeper, one of the popular young sheep men of the northeastern part of this county is in a hospital at Bison suffering from wounds caused by being shot three time by a pistol in the hands of Martin Cook who is also known as Martin Racskowski, the shooting taking place Monday morning of this week at mr. Sleeper's sheep camp on the Moreau river in the extreme northeastern corner of Butte county. Cook made his escape after the shooting and has not been apprehended as yet. Cook had been working for Sleeper for about two months, the agreement at the time he commenced work was that if in the opinion of Mr. Sleeper, his services were worth \$60 per month that is the amount he would receive; if he was not worth more that \$45 per month, that is the sum he was to receive. Monday morning mr. Sleeper asked Cook to ride his own horse as he, Sleeper, wanted to ride the one Cook had been riding and which belonged to Mr. Sleeper. To this agreement Cook objected, saying if he had to ride his own horse he would quit. Mr. Sleeper agreed that he should quit, and paid him for the time he had worked, the pay being at the rate of \$45 per month. Cook objected to this and became abusive and acted in a threatening manner, so much so that Mr. Sleeper asked Clarence Kimball and Hans Jensen, who also were working for him, to stay around the wagon until Cook left. At this time Cook was standing near the door of the sheep wagon, and Mr. Sleeper went to get his horse to go to the sheep. As he was getting ready to mount his horse, Cook who had been grumbling and cursing, said "I will get you," and as he said this he fired at Sleeper. Sleeper had a sheep hook in his hand, and as soon as Cook fired he stuck at him with the hook, knocking the gun a thirty-two caliber Colt automatic, from Cook's hand. Cook reached for the gun and just as he got it in his hand Sleeper clinched him from behind, attempting to band his arms to his side, and did this, but Cook was able to reach to his side and fired two more shots, both of these striking Sleeper in the side, the first shot

having struck him just under the left shoulder. By this time both Jensen and Kimball succeeded in wrenching the gun from his hand, after bending the man's thumb back until the pain made him loosen his hold on the gun. Sleeper showed an extraordinary amount of nerve after the shooting, not even wanting to go to a doctor. But Jensen and Kimball prevailed on him to get in the Ford runabout that was standing near the wagon, and Kimball took him to the Wm. Marty ranch, from where he was taken by Sam Marty to Bison, and Sheriff Charley Hanson of Perkins county was notified. The sheriff and his deputy Ed Lease of Bison, immediately left for the scene of the shooting, but when they arrived they found their man had left shortly after Kimball and Sleeper did, going in a southeasterly direction. Not finding their many at the sheep camp, the sheriff and eupty and Mr. Kimball came on to Belle Fourche, arriving her Tuesday morning. In the afternoon they were joined by Deputy Sheriff Craig of this county, as well as by Deputy State Sheriffs Peters and Westgage, and the hunt for the continued. Investigation by the officers Wednesday morning brought out the fact that after leaving the Sleeper sheep cam, Cook headed for the Clark ranch east of Newell, arriving ther he traded his orse and saddled to tor two guns and a change of outfit. One of the Clarks who carries the mail from Newell to Sulfer, took Cook to Newell, and there the latter hired a car to bring him to Belle Fourche, arriving here about 11 o'clock Tuesday morning. The car stopped in front of the First National bank, and Clark went into the bank

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

Judge Rice arrived Monday evening from Deadwood and on Tuesday opened the regular term of Circuit Court. Among the cases presented: Nellie Miller entered a plea of guilty to maintaining a house of ill fame, but will be dismissed and was charged with selling liquor without a city or county license; the other notable case; Fred Gantz entered a plea of guilty to charge of carrying concealed weapons and will receive sentence Saturday; Al Andrews plead guilty to an assault on Fred Gantz and was given a fine of \$100 or 50 days in jail and final case; A. M. Wilson of Newell charged with obtaining money under false pretense, was not in court and his bond of \$500 was declared forfeited. E.J. Spencer shipped in last week a car of milk cows and calves from Stewart, Nebraska. Henry Jacobsen of Castle Rock bought 11 head and Mike Thaler also Castle Rock bought 10 cows and 6 calves and J. A. 
