
Nate Bayne Named HC Head Basketball Coach

BH Roundup to Honor Memory of Announcer Chad Nicholson



BELLE FOURCHE - The Black Hills Roundup committee has begun to make plans for a tribute during this year's centennial celebration to long-time announcer Chad Nicholson who died last Friday in California. Nicholson was to return for his 19th consecutive year as announcer of the event this July.

Nicholson died of injuries sustained in an accident on a ranch road off Highway 245 between Badger and Woodlake, CA. According to California Highway Patrol and eyewitness accounts at around 6:20pm PDT Friday Nicholson was helping tow a friend's pickup truck that had slid off the road when the tow rope suddenly snapped, sending Nicholson's jeep backward, rolling over and down a 30-foot ravine on top of him.

"It was just like Chad to be helping out a friend. As you can imagine we're devastated by his sudden loss," Roundup Chairman Clay Crago told the Beacon. "He had such an energetic and entertaining style. He has really done a lot for the Roundup. Some of his openings were second to none. Our thoughts and prayers go out to his family, to his wife Jennifer

and the Riata Ranch Cowboy

During Nicholson's 27-year PRCA career he served as the voice of close to 2,000 rodeos and rodeo-related events, including the Black Hills Roundup.

Last December in Las Vegas he had the honor of presenting the BHRU Committee with their award as PRCA Rodeo of the Year. "I am so proud of all of you," he said at the time. "The Black Hills Roundup will always have a special place in my heart. There's no better place to be on the 4th of July"

Nicholson had lived on a ranch near Three Rivers, CA.



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Center of the Nation Adopt A Flag

The Tri-State Museum and Visitor Center has renewed its "Adopt a Flag" program. It was begun in 2017 to allow members of the public to show support for the Center of the Nation Avenue of Flags, by paying for replacement state flags.

"It has now been two years since our last 'adoption cycle,' said director Kristi Thielen "and the state flags are in need of replacement. We have sent out cards to those who adopted flags in 2017 as we had stated we would give them first right of refusal for the next adoption."

Thielen added that there were several flags which were not adopted in 2017 and would therefore be open to anyone for adoption this year. Those state flags include Alabama, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, Pennsylvania and Utah. Additional state flags may come up for adoption, if the initial participant chooses not to re-adopt.


Each flag is \$60 with the exception of Washington and Oregon, which are \$100 each. The higher cost for these flags is due to the fact that there are different images on each side of the flag, and being double-sided means greater material costs.

The Avenue of Flags at the Center of the Nation Monument is extremely popular with visitors. Tourists often comment on them to Tri-State staffers and volunteers. In response to this, staffers have created a "Find the Flag," activity which is especially popular with children who visit the complex.








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Post 32 Bronc Baseball is Back

Now the biggest issue to tackle was transportation. That's where local support from Scott Peterson Motors came in with the donation of a 21 passenger bus. "That was huge for us!" said Wahlfeldt, "we didn't want to burden the parents with the responsibility of getting the players to Williston for a Monday night double header, although I'm sure they would've had no problems with it."

The home opener took place Saturday May 11th where the Broncs met the Spearfish Teener team. "That game was a fantastic way to open the season and test what the boys were capable of doing in a game together". Behind a solid pitching, Post 32 ended up pulling out a W by a score of 8-7. The following Monday they would travel to Newcastle to take on the Dogies Sr. Babe Ruth team. Post 32 jumped on the Dogies right away with a 5 run 1st inning, and the superb pitching from Blake Vissia kept the score close through 5 with a 7-7 tie. But the Dogies age and experience prevailed and Post 32 fell 22-7.

B-1 Flyover Returns



It's become a fantastic way to begin a parade on July 4th. And after having it canceled in 2018, we can only hope for the best this year as the Pentagon in Washington DC has once again given approval for a B-1 Bomber Flyover to officially begin the Black Hills Roundup Grand Parade on July 4th.

Parade Chairman, Mark Leverington explained, "It was a big disappointment in 2018 when the flyover was canceled. On July 3rd last year, a "stand down" was issued worldwide and all B-1 Bomber aircraft were ordered to stay on the ground. It was due to a safety concern in the ejection system. Just this past February, another "stand down" was ordered and I thought 'here we go again'. But this past April it was lifted. So hopefully that means we'll have no roadblocks to the flyover this year in 2019."

July 4th is right around the corner and Leverington encour-

ages people to enter the parade. "It's the 100th anniversary of the Roundup and I sure hope the parade entries begin coming in. People always wait until the last minute to enter, and that's fine. The main thing is we'd like to see a lot more parade entries to celebrate the 100th. I hope I have a huge problem finding line up areas for all the floats. That would be a great problem to have." Entering the parade is free and easy. Entry forms can be downloaded on (www.blackhillsroundup.com) and they are obtainable at the Tri-State Museum and on Facebook. The parade route is ready to be announced soon. Leverington says, "it's looking like the parade route is going to be similar to last year, but not the same. I'd anticipate seeing it go down Elkhorn, State Street, as well as going by Hermann Park. We'll let you know exactly what it is real soon."

That last one is from my hero, Charles Osgood, since retired from the world of "see you on the radio".


As for me I'm absolutely certain that the socks that go missing from my dryer turn into extra Tupperware lids.



City Begins Water Project

NEWELL – For those who live in Newell the next few weeks may be a bit interesting as the city begins work on a water project that will affect major portions of town. Work is only being performed in certain areas but because of the age of the pipes and especially the valves, things may affect water users in other areas.

"In the worst-case scenario, we would have to shut off the whole town," said City Foreman Larry Parker. "Best case, we just shut of the project (area)." The representative from Brosz Engineering was obviously anxious to get going, saying that they needed to start getting pipe in the ground.

Parker said the valves are in tough shape so it will be hard to say how long the process will take. He suggested that residents just be prepared with water-filled containers.

Todd and Hope Komes came before the commission to request permission to live in their camper which is parked at their son's property in Newell while their home, which suffered fire damage in late April, is restored.

"Don't worry about it," said Mayor Ken Wetz. There was a question about a variance, but in the end, the commission just gave a verbal confirmation for them to stay as long as needed.

"It could take two to three months, before getting back into our home," said Hope Komes, thanking the commission.

At other information during the regular monthly meeting on May 13, Parker said he wanted to extend the garbage clean up until they can physically get it done. They won't be taking any more requests for pick-ups, but will continue to pick up the piles there are and will keep taking loads to the city dump.

"It's probably the best Saturday we ever had for cleanup at the dump," said Parker. He shared that they had 27 loads that people brought in and that they still can't get to the areas

Patty's Place is the Kitchen-the Cooking Continues

Patty's place is in the kitchen and that kitchen is in Patty's Place, an eclectic little restaurant and coffee

shop that enjoys a steady influx of newcomers and locals alike, situated as it is on busy highway 85 (aka 5th avenue).

Co-owner Patty Wagner knows her way around the kitchen because, as she says, "When I was 12, I started flipping hamburgers at a drive-in called Hoppys Triple H." That business was in Keystone where Patty grew up. She laughingly notes that today's 12-year-olds wouldn't be permitted to work in a commercial kitchen. But that's where Patty learned the trade although her career path deviated somewhat.

"When I was a senior in high school, my parents bought a Dairy Sweet drive-in from Iowa and had it moved to Keystone," Patty relates. She worked there every summer and that income paid her college tuition. She married Spearfish native Dick Wagner in 1974 and the following year graduated from Black Hills State University. The couple then headed to Manderson, Wyoming, where Patty taught second grade for five years, followed by nearly four years of work at the Wyoming State Nursing Home. Both of the Wagners' children were born in Basin, Wyoming. (Daughter Kara Fairbank, married and the mother of three, is a graphic design artist residing in Billings, Montana. Son Stewart, a long-time American Colloid employee, resides in Belle Fourche with his wife and three

children.)

Patty and Dick eventually returned to Belle Fourche and began managing the Tastee Freez in 1989 on the then not-so-trafficky 5th Avenue/ National Street intersection. The business was owned by the Schmaltz brothers and included carhops on roller skates! When the brothers decided to retire and closed the business, everything was auctioned off and the building sold. (Today it's the site of Subway, coincidentally right across the highway from Patty's Place.)

After the Tastee Freez closed, the kitchen beckoned once again with Patty joining the Cedar House restaurant in Spearfish. Then she took on the job of kitchen manager at the Prime Time (now the Stadium) in Belle Fourche. Then it was back to the Cedar House for 10 more years. (The restaurant closed two years ago.)

Patty was widowed in 2005. Today she has a new life partner, Dan Braxton, who is the other co-owner of Patty's Place. Says Patty, "Dan asked me what I really wanted to do and I said I wanted to own my own business." Patty's Place opened on April 1, 2011.

A native of the Florida swamplands (thus the wide array of hot sauces in the restaurant), Dan was living in California when the desire for a little more peaceful existence brought him to the Black Hills. He's also a chef in his own right, specializing in pulled pork, brisket and hickory smoked ribs.

The concept for the décor in Patty's Place was Patty's desire to create the feel of "walking into grandmother's kitchen." The home-style cooking includes breakfast served from 6 to 11am, Tuesday thru Saturday and offers everything from Patty's yummy sweet rolls to the awesome heart attack sandwich.

The more expansive menu, with hot and cold sandwiches, burgers, soups, salads and homemade desserts is served from 11am to 5pm Tuesday thru Friday, 4pm Saturday.

In addition to the variety of seating options, Patty's Place has reserved a little corner of the restaurant to showcase locally-made crafts in addition to Patty's own canned goods. She also has on display her collection of 'Happy Face' memorabilia.

On their days off, Patty and Dan like to go exploring with their metal detectors and garden when weather permits. 
Looking Back in Belle

123 years ago Belle Fourche Times May 9, 1896 *Area News*

T. N. Matthews, owner of the T7 cattle outfit was a city visitor this week. He says cattle are in better condition than he ever saw them before at this time of year, and that beef will be earlier than for several seasons before. He also informs us that the -FS outfit is having a large pasture built and will engage in raising Shetland ponies. They have received two carloads of the Lilliputian horses.



100 years ago The Northwest Post May 8, 1919 Will Build new Garage

Council Approves 3.2 Beer Permits


Approved of a number of 3.2 off sale beer licenses and the appointment of city offices for the coming year highlighted the

The reason for the resignation was not publicly made known and it wasn't expected. An invitation to Deyo-Amende for comment was not responded to as of press time. The resignation, with regret, was presented at Monday night's city council meeting for approval.

The next step will be to update the job description for the executive director's position. According to sources the job description hasn't been updated in quite some time. After May 31st the Mayor's Office along with senior staff will oversee the day-to-day operation of the center until replacement is

The BFACC is currently in the process of evaluating options and designs for a facility upgrade that, for the most part, includes a renovation of the entrance and lobby. Plans call for a new front-facing welcome desk and new better organized office space.

According to the Community Center Committee the main purposes of the redesign are to improve safety, function, flow and aesthetics.

Upwards of \$260,000 has been set aside in the city's Capital Improvement Plan budget for the project.

"When people come here and you show them our rec center, they're impressed," said Councilman Randy Schmidt, also a committee member. "That and the schools. That's a lot of reason they come to Belle Fourche and not Spearfish when they decide where they're gonna live. It's important we make these upgrades, we can't let it fall apart."

The Optimistic Gardener Planting By Numbers **RICHARD WELLS**

It is frequently said that "you should use odd numbers in planting". So let's start at the beginning.

1. One. One is the loneliest number, but it can stand up for itself. In the garden, a single plant which can stand on its own is called a specimen. A specimen is something special- a plant that your eye will single out- "center stage" in the garden. So if you only have room for one plant, it needs to be an imposing one to make an impact. Size alone may not be enough, so interesting foliage and flower may need to come into play as well. Contrast in color or form may also help create a dramatic one-plantshow.

2. Two. Two is a couple, and couples, can be harmonious, or show tension. Because

the number two is keyed to balance, it can be the hardest number to use in the garden. The easiest way to use two is to balance two plants on either side of a walkway or entrance as gatekeepers, or as bookends on either end of a planting bed. This requires a mirror image kind of balance to look right.

in size or character, it messes with the harmony. Two of the same plants alongside each other tend to look less than natural and lacking an organic flow. Two different plants can be an odd couple for sure.

3. Three. Three may be the easiest number to use. Three provides a natural feel and flow, and gives more emphasis by grouping- more foliage, more flowers, more everything.

The idea that "you should use odd numbers in planting" begins with three. Using three allows the gardener to use triangle positioning, rather than planting in rows, with a more connective natural effect.

> 4. Four. Planting in fours looks more blocky and less interesting to the eye. 5. Five and more. Like other odd numbers, the brain is stimu-

lated to look everywhere and a more natural flow is created.

We experience the garden as a whole and not as numbers of plants, but odd numbers will help create a more appealing, memorable and effective garden experience. Grouping for masses of color and texture capture attention more than individual plants. Let it flow.

In a time when we have easier access to communication with others, we have less real-life social connec-

tions. This loss of social connection greatly contributes to our generation being the most medicated cohort in history. Creating rela-

tionships and being purposeful about face-to-face interactions is vital in maintaining strong mental health. As one of my favorite movies says, "all you need is 20 seconds of insane courage and I promise you something great will happen." So take your 20 seconds of courage and walk into the Senior Center for their upcoming Prom Night, grab a chair for morning coffee at the Community Center and leave with a new friend, attend one

of the many Chamber events and challenge yourself to stay until you have set a lunch or coffee date with someone new, join the next round of Belle Fourche Leadership, find a

local church and join one of their weekly small groups, join a rec league. The Belle Awareness Fourche Community has risen to the task of creating spaces and places

to connect, I urge you to make it a priority to grow connection. At the end of our lives time spent with people is our greatest investment.


