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Albany Farms Planning Ramen Plant **Expansion**

Flour Mill Agreement Also In The Works

BELLE FOURCHE - Officials with Albany Farms, manufacturer of Twisted Noodle ramen products, have signed a contract with Belle Fourche's Bachman Construction to begin an expansion of its food production facility at the Belle Fourche Rail and Industrial Park.

In 2021 the California-based company purchased the former Permian Tank Manufacturing Plant and is converting it into what will eventually be one of the nation's largest ramen noodle production facilities. The company is currently installing the first two lines of production equipment, one for noodle cups, which is expected to go online in June, and one for pouches which will begin production perhaps as early as August.

But with demand for Ramen at an all-time high and with international ramen manufacturing supply chain issues causing shortages, company officials say their first run of product is already sold with demand for more right behind it.

"The opportunity for sales is outrunning our manufacturing space right now," Lyle Rogalla, Albany's BF Plant Supervisor told the Beacon. "It's more than we had expected so we had no choice but to expand."

In late May the company signed a contract with Bachman Construction of Belle Fourche to build an additional 135,000 square foot production facility and 25,000 square foot warehouse directly to the north of the present building, nearly tripling the present manufacturing space.

"We're working with our architect, and with Schreier Engineering, and with Mark Bachman right now. We hope to start the project as soon as possible," Rogalla said.

"This is a part of the project that we had talked about from the beginning when we came here approximately 14 months ago," Albany Farms CEO Bill Saller told the Beacon. "So this is the next phase. We're adding buildings and looking at other expansion as well."

The other expansion includes plans to build a massive flour mill at the park. Originally planned to be a moderate sized structure, the plans for the flour mill have grown with interest coming in from the surrounding ag community.

"It's going to be a gargantuan building, perhaps 300 by 600 feet," Rogalla said. "We had originally planned a smaller space but we have been approached by a strategic partner in the cattle feeding business

Albany Farms Set to Produce First Product in Late June

BELLE FOURCHE - Albany Farms expects to be producing their Twisted Noodle brand ramen noodles in late June with product on store shelves in one of the nation's three largest retailers during a July-August timeframe, according to CEO Bill Saller. Saller was in Belle Fourche this past week meeting with production facility staff and contractors as the company pushes forward to complete the first of its production lines within the month.

"The first product should be running off our lines in June, which is a major accomplishment considering the world climate right now, not just with raw materials but with actual technical equipment," Saller told the Beacon.

Major accomplishment is an understatement. Getting the manufacturing equipment from Kuo Chang Machinery Company in Taiwan to Belle Fourche has been a major hurdle.

COVID, economic uncertainty in Taiwan, and overseas shipping congestion into Terminal Island in Los Angeles has presented challenges. Wheat shipments from Ukraine are being blockaded by Russian forces in the Black Sea and inflation and rising fuel costs in the U.S. have also added significantly to start-up costs. Even so, Saller savs they are not just moving forward but looking ahead.

"It's been quite the challenge but even so we're looking at significant expansion. As I stand here today, I can tell you that we're going to get there," Saller said. "We're going to accomplish all of our goals here in Belle Fourche."

The first noodle production line will produce 300 microwaveable ramen cups per

Monument Health Announces Major Expansion Plans

SPEARFISH - Last Wednesday Monument Health announced two major construction projects in the Northern Hills area. The first will be a new multi-specialty clinic to be built at I-90 Exit 17. The second will be an expansion of the current hospital in Spearfish. The total investment in the two projects is expected to be at least \$80 million dollars.

In one of the projects, the Spearfish Hospital campus on Main Street will nearly double in size. In the other, Monument Health will build a new multispecialty clinic off Interstate 90 Exit 17 near the Elkhorn Ridge neighborhood at the eastern edge of Spearfish. Together, the projects represent an \$80 million investment in Spearfish




Room. He pulled various stu-



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

and with the access we have to rail we know we can move product. I think we have a really good plan to build a very competitive and modern mill here."

The Beacon has learned that Albany is in talks with CBH Co-op on an agreement to provide the agriculture-based supplier with wheat middlings from the flour operations. Middlings are a by-product of the wheat milling process that is not flour and make excellent livestock feed.

"We're in negotiation with them (CBH) to work on a joint venture but I can't really say too much more than that because negotiations are ongoing," Saller said. "Albany Farms will operate the flour mill and it would be great to have that partnership because they're in the middling business. In this way everything we put through that mill will be sold and that will be a benefit to us and to CBH."

Saller said the company is still looking at building a freeze-drying manufacturing plant in the rail park if they can find the space. With the city's proximity to cattle and ag producers Rogalla said it would be a "no brainer" type of investment in the community. Freeze-dried proteins would be integrated into Albany's product through a proprietary process, but the market may be larger.


"The northwestern part of the United States needs a huge freeze-dried facility," Rogalla said. "We have uses for it in our products and we also have the energy for it. It's a logical fit. We know how to do it and we know what to do."

Saller says the company's

commitment to use local contractors and source local product is turning out to be even better than they had anticipated. "This was our model from the beginning – to work with the local community in as many areas as we can, from raw materials to services. The vast majority of people you see in the building now are local. So we're following through with what our promise was to work with the local community just as much as possible.

"We are in a competitive environment and so we need to be competitive, but a lot of folks have stepped forward and offered their services and we're really happy with how that's gone so far. We're very pleased in how supportive people have been in so many ways," Saller said. "There is a lot of talent here."

medical advances and the growing need for specialty care, the time has come for a health care transformation in the Northern Hills," said Paulette Davidson, President and CEO of Monument Health. "This community deserves nothing less."

In 2018, Monument Health (Regional Health at that time) was looking at a proposal to build a completely new health care campus at I-90 Exit 10, off Highway 85. It was to include relocating the existing Spearfish hospital and building a multi-specialty medical campus. However, Monument Health leaders, with community input, determined that the existing hospital location near downtown Spearfish would better meet the needs of the growing Northern Hills community.

At that time, Monument
Health already owned property
at Exit 17 and last week it was
finally announced that Monument would be developing that
land into the new multi-specialty clinic.

According to Monument Health, the new clinic will be a single-story, 37,000-square-foot building offering access to specialized medical care to include physical yherapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, massage therapy, sports medicine, orthopedics, podiatry, ENT /Allergy, audiology and dermatology for residents of the

Northern Hills. Several existing Spearfish clinics, at various locations throughout the community, will be consolidated into the new building. According to preliminary

According to preliminary design work for the Spearfish Hospital expansion, officials plan for up to 78,000 square feet of new construction, and 13,000 square feet that will be remodeled. Monument states that upon completion, the hospital could have up to 8 operating rooms, 2 endoscopic procedure rooms, 15 medical-surgical patient rooms and 2 intensive

"Of all the elements of the hospital project, the one most critically needed is the expansion and relocation of the Emergency Department," said Thomas Worsley, President of Spearfish Hospital and Hills Markets.

care unit rooms.

The department will move to the south end of the hospital, with a dedicated North Avenue entrance. In addition, the new Emergency Department could have approximately 10,000 square feet, with 12 exam rooms and a covered drivethrough ambulance garage. The Monument Health Foundation is committed to contributing \$6 million toward the projects. The Foundation has \$3.5 million in existing funds, and the campaign that launched last week has a goal of raising the remaining \$2.5 million specifically earmarked to expand the hospital's emergency department.

per minute with the initial flavors to be beef, chicken, and possibly shrimp. The equipment to produce the first cup line is on-site or on the way.

A crew of engineers from Taiwan is in Belle Fourche helping place and configure the equipment. Chien-tsang Wang, President of Kuo Change Machinery, told the Beacon that installation is going very well and thus far there have been few problems. The biggest issue has been getting the team of engineers to Belle Fourche. The US State Department held their work visas and delayed their arrival over COVID quarantine mandates.

"We lost two months of time over that," Lyle Rogalla, Plant Supervisor and Lead Engineer told the Beacon. "But we have been working hard to close that gap and everything we need to complete the line is in process and in order. We have manufacturers of equipment in California and Seattle going at full speed to bring in the few remaining components to get the first lines going."

There are currently 30 employees on site working for Albany and there will be a need for more in the near future. Plans call for 11 total production lines with at least 15 employees to staff each line on a 6-day, three shifts per day, production schedule. At full capacity that will require around 500 employees for the cup and pouch lines, not counting maintenance, shipping, administration, and flour mill staff. And so far the company is more than pleased with the Belle Fourche area workforce.

"It is just an outstanding workforce. I don't know what other word to use but that," said Justin Stacy, Belle Fourche Plant Manager. "They have hit the ground running and done everything we've asked them to do, and they are more than eager to get this project started. "Progress has been good and we're speeding up now, we're hitting the gas pedal. The engineers are here and we're starting to line everything up. We're working on the warehouse floor getting that food-grade ready right now so we can store everything we need for production. It's been a long process but we're moving forward fast right now."

Saller says they plan to create a fully vertical operation, meaning that customers can come to them for a one-stop shop experience. This would include creating a packaging operation on one end of the supply chain and sourcing local wheat on the other.

"We'll have a fully vertical operation which the competition cannot compete with," Saller

said. "It's taken a lot to get to the position we have today."

International ramen manufacturers are currently facing supply chain and shortage issues. India and Egypt have suspended wheat exports and the 25% of the world's wheat supply from Russia and Ukraine is in doubt. To combat supply chain issues Rogalla says Albany has uniquely positioned itself to meet the increased demand for the Twisted Noodle product by following the example of a well-known billionaire.

"It used to be you put your plant where the people were in the big metropolitan areas. Now the strategy is to put the plant where your raw materials are and as close to them as you can get," Rogalla said. "We've tried to create the shortest single line supply chain that we can. It's just like Tesla and SpaceX, we're copying some of the models that we see Elon Musk using."

Belle Fourche's location fits that operating strategy perfectly. "It's the blessing of the Belle Fourche area," Rogalla said. "We have 21,000 square miles of the best wheat on earth. We have met with a group of farmers from the Bison, SD, area who are very eager to deal directly with us."

Rogalla says Alan Gold, Albany Farms Vice President, recently met with a cooperative of 16 Dakota wheat producers who represent more than 80,000 acres of wheat production. The high protein in their hard spring and winter varieties is exactly what Albany needs and the producers are only too happy to work with Albany in return.

"They want to deal directly with us," Rogalla said. "For the last 5 or 6 harvest cycles they have been complaining because, due to the high demand for wheat, their super high-end product has been co-mingled."

The co-mingling often reduces the quality and value of the grain and in some instances can create a possible source for food allergens due to preservatives and other chemicals that are required to be added. Wheat that is not co-mingled leads to a purer product and the source of the grain can be documented.

"Without co-mingling we don't have to add all the preservatives and bug control chemicals. That only happens when you work through brokers and all the wheat crops gets co-mingled," he said. "In our case this is coming together so we can trace the wheat directly back to the soil it was planted in. We'll be able to get a topgrade wheat, dealing directly with the farmers. None of our competitors will be able to trace the product to the seed." "The traceability is incredibly important," Saller said. "Consumers not only prefer it but require it."




Starting line of the 50 Meter Dash. Courtesy Photo

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Robbs: A Belle Fourche Legacy

As of the end of May 2022, the Robbs store in Belle Fourche will permanently close its doors. For locals, the store on Highway 85 was a popular shopping resource for groceries and just about anything. To tourists and visitors the iconic Robbs Red Star logo represented a unique destination.

As the last shoppers milled around the store and lined up with cartloads of items, owner John Robb, reflected on his years in business. John's two daughters Shanie and Morgan were on hand to share the joys and sorrows as they helped to serve and greet Robbs' customers for the last time. John's older daughter, Shanie wiped away a few stray tears while she surveyed the store. "Yes, I'll miss it." she said quietly, but with resolve, a family trademark.

Robbs has been a family venture from the beginning. John explained how his parents got their start in the salvage business. Walter (Corky) Robb was a pharmacist by profession with a passionate interest in salvage distribution. "Dad was never meant to be behind a counter." John noted, rather he described his dad as a gifted negotiator and salesman who loved to travel.

"Dad was the gas and mom was the brakes." John commented on his parents' happy marriage and well-matched business partnership. "My parents met at Black Hills State and Dad fell in love with mom the as soon as he heard her laugh." Corky Robb had a fine sense of humor in addition to a gift for a salesman's gift for

Along with his older sister Jo

Ann Robb-Peterson, John, their parents, Corky and Beverly were the original Robbs' employees. The hours were long, the work was challenging but there was always something new to learn. John loved it. He was only 13 when he started. John described himself as not being cut out for school. In high school he earned his GED and went to work full-time for his Dad. Corky Robb understood that his youngest son would learn much more working than sitting in a classroom. "Dad wasn't dumb, he also got a full time employee out of the deal." John said.

For the next several years John Robb worked tirelessly. He loved the business skills he gained along the way, the opportunity to make connections, travel, and even the long hours. John gives credit to his parents and his dad in particular for being a great teacher.

John Robb has many colorful, interesting stories to tell of his years in the salvage business including several stories about salvaging contents from railway cars in train derailments. At one time, the Robb family owned/ operated stores throughout the region. John followed in his dad's footsteps and became an expert in negotiation, problem solving and the leadership skills needed as an employer. "Everyone makes mistakes." He said. "We just have to pick up the pieces and move on." John expressed appreciation and respect for his employees and Belle Fourche customers more than once during our interview.

The journey has not always been easy. He has raised children alone. Twelve years ago John experienced serious health problems, which influenced his ability to work long hours, but

not his work ethic. Neither is he a stranger to tragedy. A son ended his life. "The employees and my daughters got me through that time." He said. John's dad Corky Robb passed away in 2017, followed by John's mother, Beverly in 2018.

As with all life events, things change. In preparation for John's retirement, the building was sold two years ago. John Robb has had various opportunities to sell the company, but the uncertainty of the future of salvage business has caused him to be reluctant to do so. "Covid killed the salvage business." He explained. "Surplus became nearly impossible to find over night." To be successful in the salvage business, you must be able to think ahead and see ahead." He noted.

Now that the warehouse is empty and the customers are wondering where to shop for unexpected bargains, John is considering a new second career. This one involves selling his house, investing in a pickup camper, travelling and taking time to enjoy the scenery, something he has rarely had the opportunity to do.

Sitting back in a comfortable office chair overlooking the store, he reflected, "It's been one hell of an adventure." Then he added with quiet certainty, "I look forward to seeing more of the country, but Belle Fourche will always be home."



Looking Back in Belle-

Belle Fourche's First Mayor S. G. Mortimer Memoirs (shared by Mortimer family, written in 1952)

Samuel Mortimer arrived in the area with his parents George and Eliza Murray Mortimer. His family was living in the Bear Lodge when his father died in 1899. He and his mother sold the ranch and moved into Belle Fourche. When Belle Fourche organized in 1903, Mortimer was its first mayor youngest mayor in the state, maybe ever. He was 22 years old at the time. He grew up with the town; was an active member of the Commercial club (later renamed the Chamber of Commerce). Here is Samuel's memoir of his duties as newly elected Mayor.

"After my election I found plenty to keep me busy with one thing and another and the City Council had to hold many special meetings to get lined up with revision of ordinances to conform with the difference in city government and the old town ordinances.

There were, of course, some appointments to be made, among others a Chief of Police. As this individual would have a great deal to do with the keeping of peace in the city and should be one with a great amount of judgment as to how to accomplish that important duty, it to me was a question as to whom I should select from the several applicants who were seeking the position. After several conferences with the other members of the Council, I found a majority in favor of one man whom I did not think was the man for the job on account of his temperament. He was quick to anger and somewhat overbearing and I felt sure would not only be in continual trouble himself, but would also cause everyone else, more or less, trouble too. However, I felt that I might be wrong and inasmuch as the rest of the Council felt so strong for him, I named him chief. But I had my fingers crossed when I did it and proceeded to go ahead with the rest of the business at hand.

I ran into a proposition that was going to seriously affect one of what then was one of the "major industries" you might say of this and most western towns. I refer to the gambling which was carried on in all the saloons. We had five saloons at that time and all had gambling more or less. The cowboys coming in town off the roundup were nearly all good customers and, after being out on the range for a few months, were liberal spenders. The games allowed them to soon get rid of their surplus money and be able to go back to work sooner than otherwise. Although the games all ran on the square and none allowed that were crooked, the percentage of course finally cleaned out the player who kept at it, which most of them did.

The State Legislature of 1903 passed a law making gambling illegal in the State of South Dakota. This law did not go into effect until July 1, 1903 and, of course, it was up to the city officials to enforce the law and close the gambling. This was done, much to the discomfort and against the wishes of all the gamblers and saloon keepers in the city who had the idea that the closing was optional with the officials, which of course was not so.

Anyhow, it darned near wrecked my pet fire department which, as I stated before, enjoyed the membership of most of the younger members of the gambling fraternity in the city. They voiced their objections long and loud and predicted dire results of the closing of their "legitimate business" as they called it. My friend Ole who I had appointed Fire Chief even went so far as to buy a sack of grass seed as his prediction that grass would grow in the streets of the city after the gambling would be closed. The things quieted down after considerable time and some trouble, but the predicted grass crop never materialized anyhow.

I realized the fact that the law had to be enforced. Therefore, I took a definite stand and let it be known that as far as the city

of Belle Fourche was concerned, it was a closed town. Here it was that the Chief of Police showed up his weakness. By that I do not mean to say that he tried to shirk his duties as a peace officer, but the situation was so tense among the saloon men and gamblers and others who always follow in line that there was some pretty serious situations where a lot of judgment and diplomacy, together with a cool head, could be used to advantage in

handling the duties of a police

officers.

Unfortunately, both for him and most everyone else, he managed to keep himself in hot water all the time and had the whole bunch of "Saloon Street" practically boiling most of the time. The police committee of the Council cautioned him to keep his temper and not have arguments, do his duty with as little trouble as possible until things smoothed out, but this did not improve the situation. These conditions continued for considerable time until one day I happened to meet an old peace officer named Lee Brooks who had just returned to Belle Fourche after a long absence. He was a man of wide experience as a peace officer and had the reputation of being perfectly able to cope with any kind of problem arising in keeping law and order. I then asked him if he would be interested in the job as Chief and Police in Belle Fourche. He answered he would.

Lee Brooks

Lee Brooks, a native of Iowa, arrived in the Black Hills area in 1881 and went to work for the VVV Cattle Company where Billy Moses would have been his foreman. Mr. Brooks served as Chief of Police for nearly 20 years. During this time he built the house at 835 Harding St, just down the street from Samuel Mortimer's home at 811 Harding. Later this home was owned by Myron Smiley who in 1914 raised this small home and built the basement and ground floor. They used a team of oxen to raise the building.

Later he was appointed as U.S. Marshall for South Dakota and lived in Deadwood. He was married twice - to Olive Robbins and after her death he returned to Belle Fourche and married Inez Sheffield. He had interests in the Round Up Club with L.C. Gass. Later he opened the Recreation Club on Fifth Avenue. He died in 1934 and is buried at Belle Fourche's Pineslope Cemetery.

Those same dollars spent with non-local businesses leave our community and no longer are able to fund our police, fire departments, city government, water department, road department, parks & recreation, and so forth. Bottom line, fewer locally spent dollars equate to fewer or less than desirable services. How can communities move forward sending their dollars to Wall Street in lieu of growing their own Main Streets?

As is the case with most things in life, it is all about balance. Having these big boxes, chains, Wall Street, and out-of-town owned businesses can initially be beneficial to the overall growth of a community. The bigger issue arises when communities in their haste vigorously court these big boxes, chains, and Wall Street organizations at the expense of organically growing their local business base from within. We must not forget that small businesses, mostly locally owned, employ the majority of all workers across the country. We must

Communities must find the resolve to expend equal attention and resources on their local business, innovation and entrepreneur base. Nurturing their startups will ultimately create the balance to weather the pending economic storm clouds of retail, along with the rapidly shifting shopping habits that are changing right before our eyes.



Newell's Stambaugh Receives Northern Hills Award

NEWELL - Linda Stambaugh, rural Newell area, was awarded the Northern Hills CASA Optima Excellence Award for 2020 and the Spirit of CASA Award in

Stambaugh is a Court-Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) for the Fourth Circuit Court of South Dakota. A champion for children who have been abused and neglected, Ms. Stambaugh was appointed to her first case nine days after completing her pre-service training. The case involved four siblings, between the ages of 2–6, who had been neglected by their biologi-

The Department of Social Services became involved after the children were found wandering the streets unsupervised and scantily clad several times. To ensure the children were cared for, the department placed the children in foster care and worked with the parents to regain custody.

Ms. Stambaugh went above and beyond her volunteer advocate role and made over 470 contacts on behalf of the children during the 1.5 years the case was open. Ms. Stambaugh facilitated many visits, even transporting the children to sibling visits in two separate foster homes in two different communities, so they could spend time together. She also helped transport the children to supervised visits with their parents (who were not licensed to drive), counseling sessions, school, and the many outings she took with the children. She logged more than 7,000 miles during her activity on this case. And she was a constant in the children's lives during changes in professionals involved in the case.

At one point in the court proceeding, a parent's defense attorney accused Ms. Stambaugh of "doing too much." However, it was her "doggedness" that helped the four children reclaim their childhood. All the while, Ms. Stambaugh was respectful

NEWELL-More than 60 Butte County residents attended the annual Candidate Forum held at the Newell City Hall Tuesday evening. Representatives and candidates themselves each gave their pitch for candidacy. Nearly every upcoming office was represented from Governor to County Commission and Register

of Deeds. Some appeared via Facebook or video. The educational event was co-sponsored by WIT (Whatever It Takes) and the city of Newell, with Mayor Ken Wetz as moderator.

The evening began with the introduction of gubernatorial candidates involved in the Primary Election June 7, 2022.

Steven Haugaard is a Republican candidate facing Governor Kristi Noem. Although, he was not present he did have a statement through his Facebook page. Presently, he is a member of the SD House of Representatives. More can be found at his website stevehaugaard.com.

Governor Kristi Noem was represented by Lt. Governor Larry Rhoden. He told the crowd that he was honored to serve as Noem's Lieutenant Governor. The last two years have been amazing as he watched Noem handle

hard decisions especially during COVID. Rhoden continued

by outlining her stand on core principles. South Dakota has the strongest economy, fastest recovery and strong infrastructure according to Rhoden.

"She trusted people to make their own decision," he said. She acknowledges the greatness of the people of South Dakota.

Jamie Smith is also running unopposed in the Primary for Governor on the Democratic ticket.

Brian Bengs is the only Democrat running for US Senate. He will be unopposed in the Primary Election in June. More information can be found on his Facebook page at Bengs for US

The Republican candidates for US Senate were slated next as Erica Douglas took the podium to discuss Bruce Whalen's candidacy. She pointed out that Whalen is the only candidate with hundreds of volunteers helping on the campaign trail.

Whalen stands for South Dakota and will strive to insure a voice for all of South Dakota. Douglas listed several areas that are priorities for Whalen including freedom, the Declaration should be a focus of any lawmaker, the border, and government spending.





Border security is a must, she said. She will fight for limited government and is a fiscal conservative. She backs mandatory COOL and would like to see a breakup of the large processors.

Attention was then turned to more local races. Thomas Brunner is running to represent all of Butte County, District 28B, in the SD House. He has already set a track record as a pro-life, pro-family, and pro-Second Amendment legislator.

Presently, his focus is on property taxes. He thinks that it is important to roll the levy back and that the State should be picking up more of the slack. Brunner also feels that the state sales tax should be rolled back.

Brunner encouraged the citizens to get a concealed weapons permit. Gun legislation is a priority.

Running against Brunner is Neal Pinnow. Because of a family emergency, he sent a letter outlining his plans and desires. His prime concern is limited government. He says he will fight for agriculture, small business, and conservative values. Check his Face Book page at Neal Pinnow.

Many voters do not realize that the position of Register of Deeds is an elected position, but there is a race in the Primary for the position that will be vacated soon with the retirement of present Butte County Register of Deeds Paula Walker.

Julie Brunner currently holds the title of Deputy Register of Deeds and has been there since September 11, 2001. She said that it is a natural step from Deputy to Register of Deeds and since she has been "in training" for 20 years, it seems logical to take that step. "I want this role," she said. And added that "Experience + Knowledge=the Right Person for the Job.

Brunner has a Face Book page at Julie Brunner for Register of Deeds.

Brunner's opponent is Cynthia Lewis. Although she is new to the area, she is very interested in being part of the community.

Some of the most interest was in the local Butte County Commission races coming up in the June Primary. There are three candidates in District 1 including James Ager, incumbent; Steven Clooten, and Les Hermann. District 3 has Chad Erk (R) running against Brad Brunner (D) this fall, since incumbent Kim Richards has chosen not to run this term. District 5 has two Republicans running, Troy Shockey is up against incumbent Frank Walton.

Chad Erk outlined his ideas for the county as he listed that he is tired of wasteful spending.

"There's a lot of money in the budget," he said, "and we should lower taxes."

As a fiscal conservation, his goal is to turn things around. Butte County incumbent

Commissioner Frank Walton has been a commissioner for 19 years and has established a long record. He pointed out that the county commissioners are a good team.

Up against Walton is Troy Shockey. Shockey has been on the Belle Fourche City Council for two terms. In Shockey's words, longevity breeds complacency. It's time for fresh eyes and ears and for the commission to be reinvigorated.

Shockey plans to create a good relationship within the commission and the county.

James Ager, commissioner from District 1, established that he desires to spend conservatively and always challenges the status quo.

"I ask a lot of questions," he said. And he added that he tries to always be responsive to others' questions.

He wants to keep government out of people's business. Ager likes the culture of Butte County and cautioned residents to be sure of facts before they vote.

"Now is not the time to jeopardize strong leaders," he concluded.

Running against Ager is Steve Clooten. Clooten has a degree in business and has owned several businesses.

Clooten's desire is to give back to the community and to get respect back to politicians. He wants to use common sense, cut the fat, and have transparency in the county commission. Clooten suggested having cameras available during the county commission meetings.

Another Republican running in District 1 is Les Herman. His top priority is the district's roads. There are issues with roads and bridges, lowering taxes, and medical marijuana.

"I'm ready to meet the challenges," said Herman.

Amendment C is an amendment to the South Dakota Constitution that would require a three-fifths (60%) supermajority vote for the approval of ballot measures that would increase

taxes or fees or that would require the state to appropriate \$10 million or more in the first five fiscal years. As of 2021, ballot measures in South Dakota require a simple majority vote (50% +1) to be adopted. More can be read at the South Dakota Secretary of State's website, sdsos.gov, and under the heading of Elections and Voting, subhead of Potential Ballot Questions.

This constitutional amendment requires that any initiated measure, proposed constitutional amendment, or referred measure imposing or increasing taxes must obtain three-fifths of the votes cast to be approved.

This constitutional amendment also adds the requirement that any initiated measure, proposed constitutional amendment, or referred measure obligating the state to appropriate \$10 million or more in any of the first five fiscal years must obtain three-fifths of the votes to be approved.

This constitutional amendment additionally requires any initiated measure, proposed constitutional amendment, or referred measure which imposes or increases fees to obtain three-fifths of the votes cast to be approved.

Vote "Yes" to adopt the amendment. Vote "No" to leave the constitution as it is.

There are a small number of these animals in northern Butte County and a few have been caught and placed in the park, but have died and want another effort to start a herd there. Ralph White, whose ranch 10 miles northwest of Castle Rock, has informed the State that a good opportunity is offered to secure some young animals and has offered to assist in the effort.

children and shared resources with the parents in hopes the reunification would be successful.

Unfortunately, she witnessed that the children regressed when in the care of their parents and included detailed information in her court reports, information that the court would not have been aware of if she was not involved. Her reports assisted the court in finding the children permanency with

one home.

abuse and neglect for these
four children and set them on
a path where they can safely
heal and grow. After shining a

of trauma and upheaval, Ms.
Stambaugh maintains a relation-

a caring forever family, where

ship with the family.

"I became a CASA advocate in 2019," said Stambaugh, who along with her husband Brian lives on a farm near Newell where Brian grows organic ancient grains and hay. "I have been privileged to advocate for seven children in three cases since becoming a CASA."

The couple was originally from South Dakota and have been married for 40 years.

"We lived in Colorado for nine years, Texas for 17 years, and then moved back to South Dakota in 2008.

They have three grown daughters, Clair, Leah and Emily, a son-in-law, Michael and a two-year old grandson, James.

Stambaugh graduated from University of Northern Colorado in 1991 with a BSN, and worked as a registered nurse until she retired in 2019.

The Office of Victims of Crime sent someone from Washington, D.C. to produce a short video about the work that Stambaugh does. It was shown at the awards ceremony. She was nominated for this award by Northern Hills CASA, for her first CASA case, detailed above.

Judge Michelle Comer wrote a letter of support for her nomination.

"Being nominated and chosen for this award was one of the greatest honors of my life," said Stambaugh. "I am just one of thousands of CASA volunteers across the country, and I was proud to represent the CASA program and the work that CASA does for abused and neglected children. My husband and I were invited to come to Washington DC on April 28 and

29, 2022 to attend a candlelight vigil and an awards ceremony. Attorney General Merrick Garland presented the awards and gave a very moving speech. The other award

winners had amazing and inspiring stories about the organizations they are involved in, and I was humbled to be there with all of them and hear about the work they do.

This volunteer does more than just CASA, helping others in a variety of ways, one of which is helping with the local Feeding South Dakota distribution in Newell each month. She said she enjoys volunteering and believes that all people can do something, no matter how small, making the communities a better place to live.

"I am especially committed to doing what I can to make life better for children. I volunteer with Northern Hills CASA, the Newell Food Pantry, Lutheran Social Services (in a variety of capacities), and South Dakota Kids Belong. I am a member of St. James Lutheran Church in Belle Fourche."

When not fulfilling a volunteerism role, Stambaugh enjoys gardening, reading, drinking coffee, visiting with her children and friends, and spending as much time as possible playing with her grandson.

"I am so thankful for all of the foster parents and especially the adoptive parents of the four children in my first CASA case," Stambaugh shared. "I am proud of these brave, resilient children who are now in a safe, loving home, and they will always have a special place in my heart, along with all the children I have had the privilege to advocate for. More CASAs are always needed, and I would encourage anyone who has ever considered becoming a CASA volunteer to reach out to Northern Hills CASA for more information. The staff there are very dedicated and assist and support their volunteers in the work they do. There is also a need for foster families in the local area and also families to assist those who provide foster care. I would be happy to share any information I can about these very worthwhile organizations who are involved in helping abused and neglected children. We can't all do everything, but each one of us can do something."
