Commissioners **Tour Area Roads** and Bridges

The Butte County Commissioners toured several areas during a county tour the past week. Commissioners viewed Habeck Road which had recently been redone. The changes were explained by County Highway Superintendent Dwayne Heidrich as he pointed

out the new gravel and grading to make the road more efficient

and safer A new addition to the process of road grading was checked out by the commissioners. A tractor pulling a combination disc/cultivator type implement that smooths out grass clods,

etc. was viewed. The new procedure was given kudos from the group. They also drove a portion of

Knutson Road near Newell, while Heidrich explained the process of correcting problems that had been encountered recently. He said that after grading the road, the recent rain had contributed to the delay of the finish work on the road. The road will be graded and then a two to three day wait until more gravel is added.

The Butte County Commissioners meet again for the regular meeting at the Butte County Court House June 1 at 9:30 a.m.

This week's Pastor's Perspective is provided by Andy Anderson of Emmanuel Baptist Church.

"The Ultimate Sacrifice."

As American's we observe Memorial Day on the last Monday of May. It is a somber reminder that freedom Is not free. Men and women, some who were very young, sacrificed their lives and their futures, so we could live our lives in freedom.

The Word of God states in John 15:13, "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends



"Crow Dog: Courtroom Clash of Cultures"

The Tri-State Museum and Visitor Center will hold a First Saturday Brunch on June 5 with a presentation entitled "Crow Dog: Courtroom Clash of Cultures."

Crow Dog was a Lakota chief whose 1881 murder of rival Spotted Tail led to a celebrated U.S. Supreme Court ruling about tribal sovereignty. During the time Crow Dog was

incarcerated in Deadwood, and while under a sentence of death, he became a much-loved local celebrity.

The presentation will be provided by Wayne Gilbert, a Black Hills historian and humanities scholar who has lectured widely on a number of topics. Gilbert appears courtesy of the South Dakota Humanities Council.


Here's hope by the next time I write we are all fighting mud!





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Local Group Seeks Help Solving a "Grave" Mystery

(BELLE FOURCHE) – The Society of Black Hills Pioneers is seeking the public's help with information relating to a recent discovery along I-90 west of Beulah, WY. Society member Vernon Davis of Belle Fourche told the Beacon that recently two motorcyclists came across several old military tombstones in a small overgrown depression in the ground near the base of a large billboard between the interstate and the frontage road on the north side of freeway.

"So far we just have no idea where they came from," Davis said. "We don't know if they were stolen or just thrown away."

Davis says sometimes when the tombstones get old the markers are given away as they may be replaced.

The Crook County Sheriff's Office began the investigation

early in May. They took custody of the four gravestones and have since turned them over to officials at the Black Hills National Cemetery near Sturgis. The National Cemetery has joined in the investigation.

It is not known for certain where the military markers were originally placed. The markings on them range from partially readable to un-readable. Whether they were purposefully defaced, or the wearing of the letters was from natural origins is also not known.

The most legible of the markers reads Robert C. McCroskey, of Washington state, who was a WWII veteran, a Lieutenant JG in the US Naval Reserves. It appears that an attempt to remove his name was made as the markings underneath the name remain perfectly intact. A search by the Beacon of FindaGrave. com shows a tombstone with the identical name and dates located in good standing at the

Black Hills National Cemetery

near Sturgis. Another tombstone that appears to memorialize Elise Mern, the wife of William Mern. Her indicated birth date was February 28, 1895 with a death date of December 22, 1965. A search of census data by the Beacon shows that an Elise Mern with that approximate birth date was a resident of Township 3, Range 6 in Meade County in the 1940 census. It indicates she was Native American, around 44 years old and married to William. Her resting place was also listed as Black Hills National Cemetery. William was a US Army Corporal in WW I.


"We haven't morphed at alljust continue to be the same full service floral shop that we have always been," said Canalas. "We have added a large gift selection through Redwater Market."

Belle Fourche Times Thursday, July 1, 1897 "The Bank is Being Robbed, the Bank is being Robbed!"

DARING ATTEMPT AT ROBBERY,

- Butte County Bank Held Up by Five Men July 1, 1897

About 10 a.m. on Monday an attempt was made by four or five men to rob the Butte County bank at this place. Seven men were in the bank doing business at the time – C. A. Dana, Rev. E. E. Clough E. M. Mitchell, A. Giles and Sam Arnold, besides the cashier, Mr. A. H. Marble and the teller Mr. Harry Tichnor. Three men entered the bank with drawn pistols and ordered the crowd to throw up their hands, while two outside proceeded to attract general attention to what was going on inside the bank by a lively fusillade against those passing along the street. Mr. Jonathan Gay, who at the time was in Arthur Gay's hardware store, received a slight cut in the left ear by a piece of glass from the window broken by one of two or three shots which were fired into the store. The men's horses were hitched in the rear of the TIMES office. In a little time the news spread through the town and men were hurrying to the scene with every conceivable kind of weapon, almost.

Four of the men mounted and leisurely retreated south across the railroad track firing at the crowd which was collecting in the vicinity of the bank. At the northeast corner of the fence enclosing the artesian well the four men halted and for a moment seemed to be mediating a charge for the rescue of the fifth man who somehow failed to get to his horse which followed those of the other robbers. A few minutes later this man was captured after having been seen to throw pistol and cartridge belt into the privy vault in the rear of Sebastian's saloon. In his pockets was found #392, in bills of various denominations - \$10, \$50 and \$100 etc. He claimed to have obtained the money by the sale of cattle at Sheridan Wyoming.

The county having been burned to the ground the man was locked in one of the cells in the steel cage until the outgoing train when he was sent to Deadwood for safe keeping.

Determined men are in pursuit of the four men who escaped and it is reported at this writing that they have them surrounded in the vicinity of the VVV ranch. It is to be hoped that

none of them will be successful in eluding capture. One horse was captured and it was reported at one time that one of the men had fallen from his horse somewhere on the "Sourdough" flats and a team and posse of men went after him. Later it was said that he was not there but had escaped with his pals. Reports are very conflicting and it is impossible to speak with any degree of certainty of the damage sustained by the robbers. The TIMES reporter who was within easy stones throw of the robbers when they crossed the railroad track thinks that one of them was wounded near the corner of the fence east of the artesian well.

There is not much doubt that the fact that the men had been drinking rather too freely for the success of their daring scheme, and that to that fact may be at tributed their comparative failure. It is said that the sum of about \$50 which Mr. Arnold was about to deposit was all they got from the Butte County bank. Great excitement prevails up to this hour -5 p.m. - and various rumors are afloat. The town is found to be in a bad condition to repel an invasion or to defend itself against robbers.

It is said that Mr. Marble displayed remarkable courage in drawing his gun and snapping it in the face of the robbers who had him covered with their revolvers. The gun refused to do duty at the moment but later sent its leaden messengers after the retreating bandits. Quite a number of strangers are yet in town and several have been closely watched. Some men under the influence of drink have been heard to express the hope that the bandits may make good their escape. The people are in the temper that make it unsafe to indulge in much talk of that kind.

It might have been foreseen that the reunion held here last week would flood the country with reckless characters, and it might have been a costly mistake not to have provided for the safety of life and property before the crisis came. Possibly the one reason the results were no worse is that the organization was incomplete and the bandits lacked a competent leader. They were not lacking in courage, or fool-hardiness, as the leisurely manner in which they retreated most plainly indicated.

During the melee Mr. Frank Bennett mistook Joe Miller for one of the bandits and fired

upon him, the shot striking Miller's horse and inflicting a wound from which it soon died. It seems most remarkable that not one of our citizens was wounded except Mr. Gay as above stated.

The Pioneer-Times of Tuesday gave credit of the capture of the robber to Walt Simpson, which is a mistake as Mr. Bowman of this city make the capture and turned him over to Simpson and Arnold which he searched for the gun which the robber had thrown away.

As stated above the robbers made their raid at about about 10 a.m. Monday. There seems to have been six of them. Will Thompson met five or six men, about 9 o'clock riding toward town from the northwest on the Owl creek road. The same men were afterwards met by Frank Miller and Noble Taylor who identify the prisoner as one of two were riding a hundred yards or so in front of the other four men. The man, giving the name of Thomas O,Day, captured in the rear of Sebastian's saloon, is positively identified by different citizens as one of the gang. Before the men had time to secure much "sway" from the bank the streets were dotted with men who had hastily armed themselves and rushed to the attack against the bandits. Among others Messrs. Fuller, Sweeney, Broomfield, Glassie, Ferrall and Brooks followed the bandits as rapidly as they could mount and arm themselves. Great difficulty was experienced in getting saddle horses, and perhaps fifteen or twenty men followed during the day in hacks. Probably as high as many as forty men were in the chase up to six o'clock Monday.

Word has just been received that a sheriff and deputy are out from Miles City and are hastening toward Belle Fourche after the same gang. The parties who brought this word also report having seen one party of citizens at Stoneville and they were on the trail of the robbers. It is said that the bandits have a camp on Cottonwood.

At the preliminary examination the prisoner O'Day pleaded "Not Guilty" and after an hour or so spent in the examination of witnesses, waived further examination and was placed under \$15,000 bonds to appear at the next term of the Circuit Court. Just at the close of the examina-

tion "Col." Parker announced the capture of the robbers, but as he was more than "half seas over" no one credits the story. We wish it might be true.

E. J. Farrall, who left here Monday in pursuit of the robbers, returned last evening and reports that they never caught sight of the robbers after Mr. Fuller and Mr. Will Thompson lost sight of them Monday night. Officers from Montana and Wyoming are after them. Mr. Farrall thinks it will be impossible for the robbers to cross the Little Missouri. We learn that they have been up north for some time and it is said they have a bunch of 26 horses where they have been camped.

Manager Craig, of the VVV outfit, is with the posse, and has been near enough to the robbers to recognize them as members of the Curry gang Curry himself being among them. They are men who were implicated with the Johnson county cattle rustlers in Wyoming in '92, and Mr. Craig who was at that time manager of the 71 outfit, west of Buffalo, had several hostile engagements with them. It was believed at the time the last encounter left the posse yesterday that the robbers would be compelled to surrender before night, or at any event come to a halt, as their horses were sadly fagged, and were traveling laboriously

It was difficult to hear anything in Deadwood concerning the chase during the day, as the telephone wire was down between here and Belle Fourche. The breach was repaired before night, however, and a long communication was received from the most authentic source Deputy Sheriff Arnold.

Communication Will Transform Your Community

Let's shake it up a bit this week, and have some fun utilizing the knowledge and expertise of many others. Much has been written regarding communication. Communication is the heart of your community transformation effort; this can't be over-stated. Let's use my comments coupled with famous quotes to sum up this critical topic.

One of the biggest problems with communication in our communities is that there is none when it is needed. George Bernard Shaw once said, "The single biggest problem in communication is the illusion that it has taken place". Never assume everyone knows, always assume that you missed someone important.

Want a vibrant community with a great quality of life? Tony Robbins said, "The way we communicate with others and with ourselves ultimately determines the quality of our lives". To fully reach our full potential as a community, we must communicate openly, honestly and directly. When communities are transparent in their communications, the entire community can be rowing in the same direction.

Never assume effective communication is happening and confuse information for communication. We can constantly provide information, but true communication involves a return exchange showing understanding. Sydney J. Harris said, "The two words 'information' and 'communication' are often used interchangeably, but

they signify quite different things. Information is giving out; communication is getting through". Maya Angelou said, "I've learned that people will forget what you said, peo-

ple will forget what you did, but people will never forget how you made them feel". We should never forget that building community is all about building vibrancy, heart and soul. True transformation occurs when you convince people to return to your community after their visit. This is due to the feelings they experienced while spending time in your community.

The surest way to success is to have everyone singing from the same hymnal, so to speak. Garrison Wynn said, "No communication takes place until the other person feels heard." The same holds true in building community. You need all groups represented, all groups actively participating, and all groups feeling understood and heard.

Dale Carnegie said, "There are four ways, and only four ways, in which we have contact with the world. We are evaluated and classified by these four contacts: what we do, how we look, what we say, and how we say it". As we see, two of these processes revolve around effective communication. The more effectively we communicate our goals and initiatives, the greater the odds of transformational success in our community.

Let's not leave out one of the most critical elements of a community's transformation, that of community leadership. Bear in mind, community leadership


goes well beyond city/government leaders. It includes business, civic, church, youth and many other leaders in various capacities. Gil Amelio echoed this sentiment when he said. The hair sheep, who do not have wool, but shed in the spring, will arrive this summer. They are rounding out the ranch crew withs some beef cows.

"We are not certified organic, but practice organic techniques in growing and land management. The animals help fertilize and provide weed and pest control. Covid 19 showed us our supply lines are very delicate and being less dependent is a good thing," said Hutchinson. She said small towns are unique in that they can support each other by sharing skills, and empowering others to discover if herbal remedies are an option

The couple said their underlying moto is "Food is Medicine," whether it be a bowl of fresh salad, a nice cup of chamomile tea to prep for a good night of sleep, or high quality concentrated herbal remedies for more acute incidents.

"I would like to say that Hay Creek Ranch WY produces herbal and farm products from the group up," said Hutchinson. "I am able to wild harvest on

the ranch, several of the herbs like dandelion, stinging nettle, catnip, bee balm, yarrow, and mullein, just to name a few." She said it's all about bringing locally grown plants to becoming useful products, using ingredients as close to home as possible.

Besides all this plant magic, Hutchinson is the manager at the Aladdin General Store, attends ladies' Bible studies, and spends time with family all on the place.

"I just love staying home with our hodgepodge of critters and my hands in the dirt," said

Finding Bus Drivers Still an Issue

NEWELL – Finding a way to secure more bus drivers for the next calendar school year is still an issue that seems to bring a stalemate to the Newell school board. Most recently the board had approved advertising for new drivers at \$125 per day per morning/evening route. That has brought a couple of people interested, but when it came right down to approving the bus route rate for 2021-2022, the board came to a screeching halt in their quest.

Business manager Sophie Burditt reminded the board that they had advertised the position as \$125 a day for running both the morning and evening route. The rub came when they started discussing the option of paying less to a driver who "deadheaded" their route, meaning they kept the bus at their end location (home) and didn't have to drive into the school, pick up the bus, drive the route and at the end of the day drove it home. This saved money for the driver as they did not have to use their own vehicle to get to the school to pick up the bus.

"If it's \$125 a day it's a raise for everyone," said Superintendent Andrew Fergen.

Board chairman Tyrel Bonnet asked if the board wanted to pay that price for a deadhead route, which would give that driver essentially a "bonus" that others would not receive.

"I hate to see us getting into a habit of having someone take a bus home," said Board Member Miles Burtzlaff. "What if it gels up way out there, who's



going to take care of it? I think we need to pay a deadhead less because we're actually saving them money." Another issue came in the form of experience, as the district has one driver with 40 years of driving in.

A motion was made to pay the \$125 to all drivers regardless of experience or a deadhead route. In a voice vote, Lisa Wendt, Chad Lawson, and Brianne Bonnet voted yes. Miles Burtzlaff, Tyrel Bonnet and Todd Youngberg voted no. There was no other board member present to vote so that motion failed.

Another motion to pay \$125 per day, with \$62.50 for a half day, and \$90 for a deadhead route was made. A voice vote saw Wendt, Lawson and Brianne Bonnet vote no, with Youngberg, Burtzlaff and Tyrel Bonnet voting yes. The topic was tabled until the next board meeting.

Another topic on the agenda that took some time, were two presentations on a software/ hardware security for the school. A Zoom presentation by Logan Bender, representing Marco, Chris Anderson representing Commtec and Tyler Christianson, representing Aviglon, for one system was

viewed by the board. It included a number of cameras along with equipment and software to view and manage the system. The three companies work in tandem to provide the different facets of the security system. The price tag topped out at \$107,561.00.

Another presentation, this time with Architectural Specialties representative Melvin Bender present to hand out bound copies of his proposal, saw a similar system come to \$69,240.02. Although similar, the two systems are not exactly the same and in the words of Youngberg, they needed to compare "apples to apples." The funds would come from the CARES money the school has received and is expected to receive in the near future. No action was taken.

In other end of the year reports, school food service head Vicki Gifford said she was trying to finish out the end of the year with as little inventory as possible and that the free breakfast and lunches provided by CARES funds through the Department of Agriculture would be extended through the coming school year.

Burditt reported that insurance rates did increase for property and liability, by almost \$13,000. She added that there would be a

limitation on coverage of loose surfaces, such as the new roof on the middle school gym.

'They're no longer going to pay for small dings, only major issues," said Burditt.

She added that the proposed amount the school would receive through the state from the windfarm was expected to be at \$57,000.

Seventeen new windows will be placed in the Ag-Science building, paid for through Capital Outlay funds, the wrestling practice room currently in the upper floor of the high school will be moved to the current band/choir room in Austin, while that room will be moved to the elementary room.

Principal Steve Schoenfish reported that the WIT Coalition will not be doing the school calendar this year, a service that had saved the school around \$2,000 each year, as it was provided through a tobacco prevention grant.

"We'll need to charge for it (the calendar) or just pay for our it ourselves," said Schoenfish. He also reported there were around six to seven students willing to come in three times a week to do credit recovery to prepare them for the next school year.

By 1967 the program had grown to over 200 clubs in 18 countries and become an official youth program of Lions Clubs International. In the following year, the Leo Club Program spread rapidly, resulting in 918 clubs in 48

"Looking Forward to our Past" by Linda Velder

June 1, 1911

J.H. Pearson, livestock agent of the Northwestern sends this welcoming news. "I am pleased to inform you that, in the absence of warehouse facilities at Newell, our company has arranged to store wool temporarily in box cars at the Newell station, as it is being hauled in and will be isolated in car lots." Cock & Bennett will haul their wool to Newell this year.

Newell has had the normal growth and has attracted a large number of speculators. Many of these in disregard of the law have erected buildings on the Townsite lots. The government proposes to hold a second sale of lots and ejectionment proceedings will be instituted against trespassers in order that bona fide purchasers may go upon these lots without hindrance or delay.

June 2, 1921

There will be a meeting of all those signers of the Chautauqua contract on Monday in the dining room of the Loyal Hotel. The purpose of the meeting is to formulate the local organization which will have charge of the Chautauqua in our city. Mr. Whiston of the Standard System will be here Sunday and wants a good turnout to the meeting on Monday.

We have been requested to notify the Townspeople that the flowers in the park are not to be picked. Considerable damage has already been done to the shrubbery and small trees and unless the practice of picking is discontinued, steps will be taken to stop this evil forcibly.

The herder who was looking after a bunch of about 1200 sheep for several of the farmers in the Vale vicinity, had the misfortune to loose 119 of them when they got into an alfalfa field and died from bloat. Gordon Van Loan lost 68, J. Tetens 19 and others lost several head each

June 4, 1931

The fire siren sounded Friday afternoon when a tank of creosote near the Reclamation yards caught fire. No damage resulted other than the loss of the tank of creosote. The hot mixture was being used for treating lumber by employees of the drainage contracts.

Mr. & Mrs. Maurer traveled from the Redig vicinity to Castle Rock to dispose of some sows. They came to Newell and on to Sturgis on business.

Last week 12 cans of pike fingerlings were received from the state fish hatchery near Waubay, in the northern part of the state, and planted in Orman Lake. The 12 cans contained about 120,000 young pike.

June 5, 1941

Bridge and bridge approaches, not up to Federal standards, along US Highway 212 east of Newell were washed out Sunday following a torrential downpour that extended from southwest of Vale mostly northeast to the Sulphur territory. Approaches were washed out along the gravel on 3 bridges, 13 miles east of Newell and others; Owl Butte, Station Elm and 2 on Elm Creek. The Reclamation Bureau rain gauge measured 2 inches in half an hour, some hail damage was also reported which filled the road ditches and forced water over the highway in several stretches.

Memorial Day is Monday and I'm writing this earlier than usual because some of the newspapers needed it ahead

of Memorial Day. We owe so much to the people who died defending us. Reub's uncle, Clarence "Tad" Olson, was in the Army breaking horses for the Calvary during WWI at Fort Keogh near Miles City, Montana when he died in 1918 from the Spanish Flu after catching it when he helped save another soldier with it. He died just a couple months after Buck was born and when Tad came home to meet his little brother was the last time Hattie and Delos Olson saw their son.

My Grandmother Lydia Wilkinson's brother, Pvt. Gustav Schmidt, died in France in WWI on October 31st, just two days after his 23rd birthday and he is buried in the cemetery in Lemmon. Gus homesteaded west of the Slim Buttes before going to war. He was a full-blood German, but when WWI started he changed his last name to Smith, joined the Army, went to fight the Germans overseas, and was killed in France.

Grandma Wilkinson had two pictures of her brother Gustav that the Army gave her and I have both of them hanging on my wall. Below one of his picture is this poem: There is no North, there is no

South, There is no East or West today;

We're one big Nation, following-

The Man and Flag who lead the way!

Below the other picture of Gus

is this poem:
IN LOVING REMEMBRANCE
He heard humanity's clear call,

And knew the voice divine; He gave his life, he gave his all, In deadly battle line. The silent stars in love look down

Where lies this loyal son; In frost and dew they weave a crown

Of honor he has won.


