101st Black Hills Roundup Plans and Schedule

The Black Hills Roundup Committee, following conversations with the PRCA and the City of Belle Fourche, is putting into action its plans to go forward with the 2020 101st Black Hills Roundup. Information about various aspects of the Roundup is now being made available and will be made public as it is determined.

Carnival

The current plans are for the carnival to be here, but with fewer rides and social distancing enforced through barricades that guide public movement. Equipment will be sanitized between rides, so those who attend should be prepared for slower times between rides. Ticket prices have not yet been set; that information will be provided when it is made available to the BHR. As with rodeo tickets, people are encouraged to buy carnival tickets on-line. The decision about selling tickets through area banks or chambers of commerce has not yet been made.

Cattle Drive

This event is still under discussion. Tentative plans for the afternoon of June 30th.

Concerts, post-rodeo

As in past years, there will be bands booked to play at the rodeo grounds following the rodeo performances. Information about these will be on the website.

Dates and Times:

The dates of the Roundup remain June 30th through July 4th. The Ranch Rodeo will take place on that first night, Tuesday, June 30th; PRCA rodeos will take place at 7 p.m. on July 1-3, and at 3 p.m. on July 4th. Fireworks will take place after the rodeo on July 2 and July 3.

Golf tourney

The golf tournament will be June 28th. It will take place at the Belle Fourche Country Club and is being hosted by Chutes for Charity, with proceeds going to that entity. To sponsor the event or for more information contact Lorrie Kimball at lorriek@rushmore.com or (605) 210-0605.

Parade

The 2020 parade route is longer than it has been in the past, but this will be an advantage as viewers will be more able to social distance as they watch it. Parade applications can be found on the Roundup website. Completed applications may be dropped off at the Tri-State Museum and Visitor Center at 415 Fifth Avenue in Belle Fourche. Rack Cards

Rack cards will be created but will include only basic information rather than an extensive list

of events. Events will be listed on both the website and Facebook pages. The date of rack card availability is not yet set.

Street Dance

A July 4th street dance is being planned; specifics will be made public when they are available.

Tickets

Tickets for the Ranch rodeo are \$20 general admission and \$15 for 12 and under. Tickets for the PRCA rodeo are general admission \$24, twelve and under \$15; reserved, \$29 and premium reserved, \$34. July 1st "PRCA Family Night" general admission is 4 for \$48. "We are really pushing people to buy tickets on-line this year," said Roundup Chairman Keith Anderson. "On-line ticket ordering is the future of events like this and due to COVID-19,

it is simply a safer way to get them." Online orders can be made at www.blackhillsroundup.com.

Phone orders can be placed by calling 723-2010, which is a box office at the Tri-State Museum and Visitor Center. Tickets purchased in this way will be mailed out. Purchasing tickets in person at the Tri-State Museum and Visitor Center is being discouraged due to COVID-19

COVID-19 protocols

"Plans for the Roundup are being made with care," said Chairman Anderson. "We have extensive protocols in place that have been provided to us by the PRCA. We have also received guidance from Monument Health. But we're going to need help from the community to make all the plans work."

There is one silver lining to all this," added Anderson. "Because so many other rodeos have been canceled, the number and quality of participants in this year's Roundup could be higher than ever before. The 101st could be one of our best Roundups ever!"

101st Roundup Seeks Volunteers for 2020 Rodeo

The Black Hills Roundup has been given a thumbs up from the PRCA and the City of Belle Fourche to go ahead with their 2020 plans. Board members are starting work on their various tasks.

But making it all happen will require help from the community of Belle Fourche.

"The PRCA has given us protocols about crowd control and sanitizing," said Roundup Chairman Keith Anderson. "The board itself - and even the committees affiliated with the board - just won't be able to enforce all the necessary safety measures. We would really appreciate help from community members who can donate their time to work the event."

The BHR board is aware that requesting people give of their time during a holiday week can be a difficult "ask," but it is essential.

"The Black Hills Roundup is the event that put Belle Fourche on

the map," explained Anderson. "The fact that it has endured for a century shows how popular it is, with people from all over. It's our chance to showcase our town, our culture and the west in general."

The Roundup also brings money to the community, as visitors eat at restaurants, stay at motels and shop in stores. Given the economic downturn caused by the pandemic, these monies have become even more important.

"We hope people of Belle Fourche will think of volunteering with us as a way to support their community, at a time when things have been tough for everybody. Whatever time you can give us, we'd be very grateful."

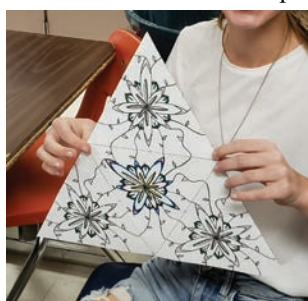

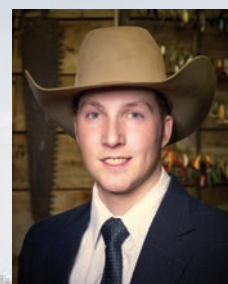

Pastor's Perspective In Remembrance...

This week's Pastor's Perspective is provided by Pastor Chuck Aurand Belle Fourche UCC & St. Onge UCC

Just a few days ago we shared a Memorial Day holiday as a nation and as a people. While the main focus of our remembrance was centered upon those who served our country in military service, it was originally a day set aside to remember all of those who have served, sacrificed, and shaped our lives. As a child, I remember visiting the cemeteries of so many of my family members and decorating their graves with fresh flowers and listening to my Grandparents share the stories of our family history and the great influence that these ancestors had in our lives. I was always proud to know that I had a family member serving in the military in every war all the way back to the Civil War and that those veterans served and sacrificed with a heart for our great nation. Today, as I reflected on those vivid memories of taking time to decorate graves or share stories of my heritage, I was struck with the fact that "remembrance" is a biblical exercise that God established for our benefit and blessing. As we read the history of God's people in the Old Testament we find many occasions when God directed the prophet or the leader to have the people place "stones of remembrance" in various places to remind them and the successive generation of God's great deliverance and provision in their lives. When Joshua and the nation of Israel crossed the Jordan River to the land that God had promised them, the leaders of each tribe carried a stone and built a monument as a remembrance of their safe crossing. God told the leadership to tell their children and succeeding generations what



these stones represented. For Jacob, leaving home in fear, with a stone for a pillow, he marked the place where he had a vivid dream and the promise of God's presence with him on his journey. He called the place Bethel, or the House of God. Samuel, the prophet, had occasion to stop on a ministry journey and place a marker (the Ebenezer stone) as a remembrance of his growth and progress and, in particular, God's faithfulness to him in his ministry. We realize the importance of remembrance in God's mind when we think of the Communion Celebration that Jesus, Himself, established just hours before His sacrificial death on the cross. As He shared the Passover with His disciples, at the conclusion of their Passover meal, Jesus took bread and wine and served them. He gave specific instructions for these followers to remember His broken body in the sharing of the bread and to remember His death and shed blood in the wine. These emblems of bread (His Body) and wine (His blood) were given as a reminder, a remembrance, of the great sacrifice of His life for our forgiveness and our salvation. Jesus said to do it often in remembrance of Him. I encourage you to take a moment as you read this message to remember the Lord Jesus Christ and His sacrificial death for you and also the life that we share through His resurrection. Remembrance is an important part of our lives and it is therapeutic. As we remember we celebrate the important people in our lives and the influence that they had on us. It encourages us, inspires us, and it makes us realize how blessed we are.

Belle Fourche Cub Scout Pack 19 is planning a presentation on Flag etiquette at the Center of the Nation Monument on Flag Day, Sunday June 14 at 5:00 PM. The scouts will demonstrate their knowledge of and proper respect for our nation's symbol. On May 30, 1916, President Woodrow Wilson issued a presidential proclamation establishing

a national Flag Day on June 14. The day commemorates the adoption of the Stars and Stripes as the official flag of the United States. On June 14, 1777, John Adams spoke about the flag at a meeting of the Continental Congress in Philadelphia. He said, "Resolved, that the flag of the thirteen United States shall

be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the Union be thirteen stars, white on a blue field, representing a new constellation." Stars have been added to it as states have entered the Union. The current version dates to July 4, 1960, when Hawaii became the 50th state. Please join us in this presentation.

Vision and Leadership

How important is community pride or community self-esteem to the overall vibrancy of a community? Many believe a massive transfusion of dollars is the most important factor. While dollars are important, it may turn out that without elevating the sense of community pride, self-esteem, and self-worth, the massive transfusion of dollars may be for naught. Taking it one step further, ample evidence indicates growing your community pride and self-esteem are directly related to the local growth of the GDP or revenue outlook of the community as well.

When it comes to a community, the old adage that “perception is reality” may actually have a firm basis in truth. What residents feel toward their community has a direct correlation to their overall involvement, their volunteering likelihood and their civic contributions. A great example of this plays out on the voting front. While voting has become less of a civic undertaking across the country, those communities having a low self-esteem only seeing a bleak future are usually near the bottom of voting percentages as a community; they have just lost interest in their own community.

When one thinks of this, I don’t believe apathy should come as huge surprise; it actually makes total sense. That leads to a follow-up question. How do we bring back the pride and self-esteem so vital to a community’s well being? How do we turn around the negative mindsets so pervasive within the boundaries of our community?

How do communities overcome their self-perception issues? How do communities bridge the often times Grand

Canyon size gulfs of self-esteem? How do communities lift themselves up from past mistakes, false starts and the constant cadence of the nay-sayer’s drumbeat? The answer to each of those questions lies in two words – Vision and Leadership!

Vision has the ability to transcend the widest of gulfs, healing the sickest of communities, and sparking the renaissance of ideas and innovation. Vision can take a community that dares to dream big from the depths of the valley of nightmares to the mountaintop of dreams. Vision dares you to dream big, reach high, and raise the bar.

While any community can have lofty visions, the reality of the matter is few do. Most communities and leaders are stuck in the traditional minefields of failed strategies and policies that have in fact created many of the problems they are dealing with today. Those strategies and policies had their time and place; but like 8-track tapes and the shelves of comprehensive studies lining city hall, failure to change leaves them mired in the antiquated sameness of Neverland.

While most will say they have vision and the willingness to go where that leads, studies and practical observation show otherwise. While the numbers vary by study, they indicate less than 10% will eagerly adapt to significant changes in vision. Approximately a third of those would be considered true visionaries, willing to take the risk and lead the charge towards a future full of vision and hope. The other 90% are followers waiting to be swayed, but only after great effort. Let those numbers sink in; in a community of 10,000, that is only 1000 adaptable to change. But more

important, there are only a few dozen capable of truly leading change.

The odds of success may seem to be stacked against those with visionary dreams. They can take comfort in knowing that every successful community transformation, nearly every successful business and in fact, the United States of America came about due to those persistent 1% of visionary leaders. Let me also add, the best leaders are visionaries. Those in leadership positions without vision are simply tools of stagnation. In today’s economic and community realities, communities can’t afford stagnation.

You see, setbacks don’t stop visionaries; setbacks further motivate them. Public opinion doesn’t deter visionaries; following the herd mentality has never had much appeal to them in the first place. Perfection is not a priority in a visionary’s mind, as they understand it is rarely achieved, and that “perfect is the enemy of great.” So the real task for communities is to find the true, trusted and financially prudent visionaries, follow their lead and hold on for the ride. Those are the communities that have a hopeful tomorrow.

**Temporary Extension For Driver
License Expiration Dates**


A temporary extension of the expiration date for driver licenses has been extended until Mar. 30, 2021 by Gov. Kristi Noem.

The Governor's executive order extends the state's emergency declaration through Dec. 30, 2020. That means the expiration date for driver licenses is extended through the duration of the emergency declaration plus an additional 90 days or March 30, 2021.

The extension covers driver licenses, motorcycle operator licenses, restricted minor's permits, motorcycle restricted minor's permits, non-driver identification cards, commercial driver's licenses or commercial learner's permits.

Driver licenses can be renewed online at dps.sd.gov/driver-licensing/renew-and-duPLICATE/renew-online. Driver Licensing Director Jane Schrank asks those license holders not to schedule renewal appointments at this time.

10 driver exam stations are open by appointment only for those applying for new driver or commercial driver licenses and ID cards. Appointments for new driver or commercial driver licenses and ID cards can be made at <https://apps.sd.gov/PS14SchedulerCovid/>. Due to heavy website traffic, please be patient.

Vale “Yesterday” Plans Canceled

June 14th annual event falls victim to COVID

VALE - Last year the Vale community saw an outstanding parade celebrating the 140th birthday of the “Star of the Project”, but this year the streets of Vale will be a little quieter because of COVID-19. The main street through Vale will be traffic for the locals and those passing through, a quieter place to enjoy the sound of birds and tractors.

This year would mark the 10th Annual Celebration on June 14. But because of the situation with social distancing and the novel virus, the Vale Community Club has decided to cancel this year’s festivities.

“We look forward to next year,” said Carolyn Ruff, a member of the Vale Community Club. She encourages people to make plans for the second Sunday in June 2021.

Vale was founded by Andrew Rosander, a native of Sweden, who came to the United States in 1869. By 1880, he had located a claim on the Belle Fourche River where he built a dugout on the banks of Cottonwood Creek north of present-day Vale.

Rosander continued to add improvements to the Vale community when he built a private irrigation system on Cottonwood Creek and then in 1908 when he dug an artesian well for the town’s water supply. The Dutton family, long-time residents of the area, dug a second well in later years.

Growth of the Vale area boomed when sugar beets found a home at the U & I sugar factory built in 1927 in Belle Fourche. An annual celebration called Sugar Days began to be held to highlight the sugar beets grown in the territory.

When the sugar beet factory closed in 1964, the event died out but was revived for a short time in the late ‘60s and then ceased all together.

In the early years of the 20th century, cucumbers were also raised for pickling, both in the Vale and Nisland areas. The small cucumbers were added to large vat-tankers on the trains that traveled through.

Sugar beets and cucumbers no longer are grown commercially in the Vale area, but the rich soil and irrigation water supplied by the Belle Fourche Reservoir (Orman Dam) support crops for raising cattle and sheep production. The principle crops today are alfalfa and corn.

Vale is a representation of small town America and the folks of Vale love to show their fondness for family, rural life, and the community.

Then and Now *in Newell*

June 9, 1910

The Guild food sale today will be selling strawberries and ice cream. Mrs. Gandolfo, Mrs. DeMouth and Mrs. McCandless will be in charge. Hot coffee and sandwiches will be sold all the afternoon until 6 o’clock and a special supply of bread and rolls will be on hand.

Carl C. Adams, of Belle Fourche, was in town with his surveying outfit last Saturday. Mr. Adams makes regular trips through this vicinity, attending to the surveying work of homesteaders, as well as the irrigation ditch, reservoir surveying and water right work in the county. While in Newell, Mr. Adams measured up all the buildings for the purpose of making a fire map for insurance.

June 3, 1920

Louis Gunderson, Fairpoint, expects to go to the Deadwood hospital as soon as he can get into town. He is hardly able to get about.

The annual election of Newell Independent School District No 7 will be held on June 15 in the Newell School building. The polls will be open from 9 AM until 5 PM. Petitions have been legally filed with the clerk for the following candidates: 1-year Board member Frank A. Yoder and Mrs. G. E. Partridge; for 3-year member Thomas Wall and John Price; 3-year Treasurer John Anderson and George Hohenberger and Harry I. Bauer will remain Clerk of the Board of Education.

Frank Roughton closed a deal this week for the sale of his ranch. We understand the consideration was \$1300 for the 80 acres. The new owner is L. Momeni, who traded in his interests in the Model Billiards Parlor as part payment. Frank

also started the erection of a new dance hall and show house on the lower level of 3rd Street. The building is to be 28’x100’ and will be all in one room.

June 5, 1930

The Newell Tourist Park will be officially opened for the season on Saturday, June 7, according to announcement by the ladies of the Civic League who are in charge of the park. The program provides music during the evening by the Newell Community Band under direction of J.C. Brodsky and the ladies will serve ice cream, cake, coffee, home made candy and pop corn. The proceeds are to be used by the Civic League to pay for extensive improvements made on the park building and to operate the park during the tourist season. The ladies plan to furnish beds and other equipment so it can be rented to tourists who prefer

to get inside rather than camp outside.

With the use of gumbo blocks a new building material is coming into use in the Nisland area. 1500 adobe blocks have been made of gumbo, straw and water for the use in construction of a building for C. F. White, which will be the first adobe structure to be built in this section. It will be used as a meat market and living quarters by the White family. The excavation for the basement has been completed and the work of making the blocks is going ahead rapidly. It will require more than 4,000 blocks to finish the building.

June 6, 1940

Harvey Knuteson of Newell landed an 11-pound wall-eyed pike last Saturday afternoon while fishing with a group of other local men at Orman Dam. This is the largest fish reported

by local fishermen this year, but still lacks 2 pounds of equaling the catch made by a Lead man there 1 month ago.

Children climbing trees and breaking down branches or picking flowers, not only in the park, but also on private property can cause much damage. If parents would teach their children not to destroy shrubs or pick flowers of their own it would certainly help. There have been a number of complaints of flowers being picked and shooting of birds are punishable and dealt with according to law, by fines and payment of damage.

David Schmidt, 18, son of Mrs. Pauline Schmidt of Newell was seriously injured last Saturday night when a CCC truck conveying 12 Camp Roubaix CCC enrollees to Lead, turned over near the foot of Aztec Hill west of there before 8:00 PM. Seven others were less seriously injured and a Deadwood young man was shot in the aftermath of the accident. The occupants were thrown against a pile of jagged rocks alongside the road. Another CCC truck, traveling to the rear, picked up the injured to take them to St Joseph’s Hospital in Deadwood. The less injured were transported to Ft. Meade. The young man shot, apparently was a curiosity seeker, by the CCC guard who had been instructed to guard the machine, had ordered him to leave the scene, however did not obey. He fired 3 times; the first shot was into the air, 2nd into the ground and the 3rd into the intruder. The young guard appeared before Lawrence County States Attorney Cooper for questioning.

June 8, 1950

Third Degree work and presentation of Veteran’s jewels hi-lighted the regular meeting

of the Newell IOOF Lodge Monday evening which was attend by 30 local and 5 visiting members from Spearfish. The 3rd Degree work was put on by the Newell members for four local candidates and 2 from Spearfish. A 30-year jewel was presented to Clarence Smith and 25-year jewels each to Andrew Syverts and J.O. Price. A delicious lunch was served at the close of the meeting by the ladies auxiliary.

The 4-H Club members and leaders of the county are making plans to hold their annual dance at the Fair Grounds Pavilion near Nisland Saturday, June 24. Proceeds from the dance will be used to defray expenses of various club events, such as State Club Week, the State Fair and Recognition Banquet. 4-H club members and leaders are at present busy selling tickets for the dance.

June 9, 1960

Dr. J.F. Pokorny and Andrew returned home Sunday from a trip to New Orleans, LA, Durham, NC and New York City, NY touring colleges. Andrew plans to attend Duke University at Durham, this coming fall.

Welcome but spotted showers fell in this territory Sunday and Tuesday afternoons of this week locally a 6-month drought is continuing to threaten both farm and ranch operations. Total precipitation at the US Field Station amounted to .05 of an inch, according to Joe Bonnemann, volunteer weather observer and Tuesday .25. At Newell the total received since April 1 is nearly 3” below normal. Some sugar beet fields have already been reseeded to beets or other crops as the cool nights and lack of moisture deter growth.

Good Fences?

I’ve been known to make some rash statements in my life. The latest one is, “Poor fences make good cowboys.” Let me explain my rationale.

When you go to pennin’ some cattle and all the fences are in good shape, why, you don’t have to worry about chousin’ the cattle, as the fences will hold them if they get scared and run or hit the fences a little too hard. Same with goin’ thru a gate. If it’s big and wide and made of steel or real heavy posts, you can just jam them thru. If it’s a little small or made of ced’ler posts that would have been better off used in a line fence, then you better baby them along and not get real wild or your gonn’a have to fix fence. One of the most dreaded jobs I can think of!

If you go to sort off a critter to pen it and it gets a little wild, if you’ve got good high fences to work with, you can just bust ‘em in, high, wide and handsome and not worry about if their gonn’a jump the fence or jump thru’ it and tear it down. ‘Cuz they can’t! ‘Course you might get ‘em hot and knock some pounds off doin’ it that way, but Hey!, whats a few pounds if you get to ride hard and wild? With good stout fences you could probably pen ‘em with a four wheeler or a pickup even!

If you have a lot of poor fence and a wild critter, you might have to set and use your brain a little and out think the critter and make them think it was their idea to go into the pen you wanted them too. ‘Course it ain’t as much fun puttin’ a critter in at a walk and it might take a few more minutes, but I was taught that we raised cattle to put on weight, not knock it off. You’ll never put a pound back on that comes off from a critter. (I told that fact to a wheat farmin’, so called cattle-man once and he just couldn’t understand it. He claimed they’d gain it right back. I tried to explain that once a pound was lost, it would always be lost and that any future weight gains were new and not any that had once been on the TMcritter. He couldn’t see my point of veiw and thats plumb fine. He don’t help me work my cattle anyways.)

But gettin’ back to my theory, when you go out on a colt to work cattle and you know he doesn’t have much cow sense yet, you approach the job at hand a little different than you would on a broke to death, cowy son of a gun. You might have to back off and take a little more time so that the stock don’t get rattled and get to runnin’ or maybe have to be roped. I know that lots of fellers think it’s great to stretch a rope

and it’s the high point of their day, but I’m gettin’ paid to put weight on cattle. Don’t get me wrong. I’ll rope one to doctor it or whenever it’s necessary, and enjoy the hell out of it, but I try to be as easy and as gentle with my stock as I can. I’ve got to the age where grace and style seems more fun than provin’ to myself or anybody thats handy, just what a wild and wooly, he-man cowboy I can be!

When you get some cattle next to one of my sorry, broke down, fallin’ apart excuses for a fence, you dang sure don’t want to crowd them much or their goin’ to go thru it and then you have to get them back in after you fix that damn fence! And if one needs roped, you better get there before they get to the fence so’s they don’t get thru’ it and get into another pasture. ‘Cuz then you have to get off from your horse and open a gate.

Anyhow, I think my boys are pretty good hands and it’s all due in a large part to me, and bein’ too lazy to fix good fences and too poor to build good corrals. I’ve noticed my friends are all good hands too, as they hardly ever let one of my cattle get to a fence or get away! They may talk funny about me, and how I fix fence, but they still like to come help!

This house was built in the late 1880’s by Lee Brooks on a lot from the original Pioneer Townsite. After Brooks family lived in the home for 14 years; he sold his home to Myron Smiley.

Lee Brooks was born in Iowa; and moved to the west, locating in Minnesela, the small town on the Redwater. He later went to work for the cattle outfit VVV while Billy Moses was the range manager. After leaving the employment of the VVV, Lee moved to Belle Fourche, the newly founded town on the terminus of the railroad. He married Ollie Rollins. He established his home and became

the Chief of Police, a position he retained for 20 years. He was appointed as the U.S. Marshall for South Dakota by President Woodrow Wilson. He held that office for eight years. Later in 1903 he moved back to Belle Fourche, where he ran both the Roundup Club, and later yet the 5th Avenue Recreation Club, a pool hall.

The second owner of the beautiful house on Harding St (seen at the right) was the Smiley family, father Myron, his wife Mary and two sons, Robert and John and daughter Florence. Smiley’s had come to the area from Rawlins, Wyoming, where they had raised sheep.

Road 184. A sign will mark the entrance to the pond.

Highway 212 Culvert Repair Work Begins this Week NE of Newell

BELLE FOURCHE, S.D. – The South Dakota Department of Transportation says work is beginning this week to replace box culverts under Highway 212 at mile markers 48, 49 and 50, east of Newell.

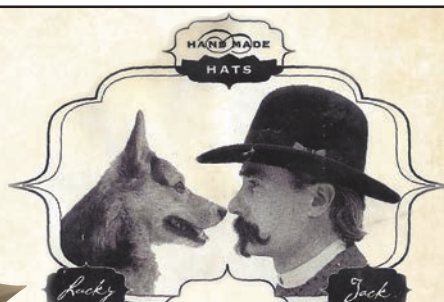
