Butte County Election Results

Despite the rain, or maybe in celebration of the rain, 39.14% of registered Butte County voters turned out to cast ballots during the primary election on June 7. That's 2,512 voters out of 6,417 according to the Butte County auditor's office and higher than the state average, 32.09 % as reported by the South Dakota secretary of state's office.

Here's the local breakdown: Register of Deeds: Cynthia Lewis 564; **Julie Brunner** 1173.

County Commissioner, District 1: Steven Clooten 168, **James Ager** 266, Les Hermann 59.

County Commissioner, District 5, Troy M. Shockey 95, **Frank Walton** 150.

In other races, voters in District 28B supported Neal Pinnow (949 votes) to represent them in the state legislature, in a tight race with Thomas Brunner (888 votes).

Kristi Noem remains a favorite candidate for governor over Republican Steve Haugaard in western South Dakota. Taffy Howard, was the preferred candidate in Butte County for South Dakota's only congressional seat. However, statewide voters chose to retain Dusty Johnson as our lone representative. John Thune, who won by a wide margin in Butte County and statewide, will also remain in his senate seat.

The June 7 primary election consisted of races between, or among Republican candidates. Amendment C was the only item on which registered Democrats or Independents could express a preference. Apparently, quite a few of these voters in Butte County (2,484) turned out to defeat this controversial amendment that many critics argued would limit the voice of the majority.

I brought my mother to the Belle Fourche City Hall during a downpour to cast her vote. She's 87, walks with a cane and is from a generation that votes, in every election. Always. An election official met her at the

City Sales Tax Receipts Remain Strong

BELLE FOURCHE – Sales tax collections within the city of Belle Fourche have remained strong through the first five months of 2022. According to data released by the City's Finance Office each month of 2022, January through May, has established the highest total for that month for the last five years. This comes on the heels of 2021's record collection of more than \$3.7 million in total revenue. Thus far 2022 is 8% ahead of last year, which tracks with the overall increase in South Dakota sales tax revenue for this year.

The city set a record with more than \$323,000 collected in April, including gross receipts. It remains the high-water mark for this year. In past years June through September usually see the highest revenue with increased activity from summer events, tourism and back to school spending.

Retail sales remain strong for the city with sales tax receipts in this sector accounting for

door, took her arm and guided her into the building. Voting may be primarily a civic duty, but in Belle Fourche it is also a pleasant social event where friends and neighbors greet one another and take a few minutes to visit. Sunday Night Storm Wreaks Havoc on City

BELLE FOURCHE – Hail up to 4" in diameter combined with 70-mph winds roared through Belle Fourche on Sunday night, June 12th and areas east through the evening. Damage estimates were still being assessed at press time but numerous windows were

blown out, roofs were damaged, siding on homes and buildings was stripped bare, tree limbs downed and numerous cars and property at area car lots suffered extensive damage. Cleanup was underway as of Monday morning.

The supercell formed quickly around 4:00pm near Alzada and began its march eastward

following a path roughly along and to the south of Highway 212. Two hours earlier the Severe Storms Forecast Center in Norman, Oklahoma, had issued a tornado watch for much of western South Dakota. At around 4:30pm doppler radar at the National Weather Service Office in Rapid City indicated

Dan Carlson: New Pastor at the Christian Life Center

The Christian Life Center (CLC) in Belle Fourche has a new pastor. Dan Carlson will step as senior pastor in coming weeks. Paul Howard, the veteran senior pastor for 37 years will become the associate pastor.

Dan Carlson appears to be quite at home in his new office at CLC. Next to a display of ministerial licenses and certificates, a floor to ceiling bookcase houses a collection of personal artifacts. Beside an impressive number of Biblical reference books is a photograph

of the 1990s Star Trek Next Generation cast and a small model replica of the Starship Enterprise. Dan likes science fiction.

In fact, he wrote and published two science fiction novels. Species Unknown was one of the science fiction novels that climbed to No. 1 on Amazon's Christian Fantasy list.

Drawn by his eclectic interests, Dan has always worn many different hats during his career, often at the same time. Perhaps Dan Carlson could best be described as a 21st century renaissance man. The label goes back to the Italian renaissance

period when Leonardo Davinci, (the original renaissance man) astounded the world as an artist, philosopher, engineer and scientist. Now, the label refers to a person whose career and identity is shaped by his or her pursuit of eclectic passions and achievements, just like Dan.

Dan began his career when he was hired as a meteorologist for WCCO in Minneapolis, Minnesota in 1979. He was the youngest major market weather presenter in the world. He had just turned 19 and was not yet a meteorologist. Dan quickly became well known as a regional celebrity. His moniker, Dan, Dan the Weatherman caught on quickly and brought him lasting recognition.

During the eight years he filled the role of weatherman in the Twin Cities for WCCO his reputation grew. Dan was in a position to scale up into even larger and more prestigious broadcasting positions. What happened next is a little incongruous.

Dan made annual trips to the Black Hills as a young adult, and his love of meteorology may have stemmed from deep

James Tatge 68

James Richard (Jim) Tatge of Nemo, SD, passed away unexpectedly on March 2, 2022. Jim was born on June 27, 1953 to Alvin and Mavis (McAmis) Tatge of Alzada, Montana. He came home from the hospital in the family airplane and was enamored with flying from that day on.

Jim was in a car accident on February 1, 2022 and suffered a severely broken neck. He survived against great odds and was home after eight days with a metal halo. He was recovering well and grateful to his doctors for their expertise and the huge support from his many friends.

On February 28, Jim suffered a heart attack. He was treated at Monument Health and seemed to be recovering well. On March 2, his heart went into A-Fib and was not able to recover. He died a few hours later with Barb, the love of his life, holding his hand.

Jim attended high school in Belle Fourche, SD and graduated in 1971. He worked many jobs during his life including designing and selling ultralite aircraft. He had the first ultralite dealership in the Midwest in the 70's when the planes were still foot launched. He worked for several years as a motorcycle mechanic and raced motocross. During his lifetime he owned 150+ motorcycles and at times lamented some of the ones he sold. Jim worked several years commercial salmon fishing in Bristol Bay, Alaska and said he never got tired of eating fresh salmon every day. Jim was an excellent mechanic and was always ready to help diagnose engine problems whenever he was asked.



He was very curious about the world around him and had an interest in vast areas. He researched world religions and spirituality. He practiced transcendental meditation; studied and practiced sound nutrition; and studied a lengthy list of topics from airfoils to quantum physics and mechanics. Jim remembered details about everything he studied, could build or fix almost anything. He could carry on an intelligent conversation with anyone of any age on almost any topic that came up.

Jim's friends and family meant the world to him and those feelings were mutual. He is missed by everyone who knew him. He was preceded in death by his parents, grandparents, and many aunts, uncles, and cousins. He is survived by his sister, Pamela Tatge of Boise, ID and his partner of 38 years, Barb Hallberg of Nemo, SD. Although Jim never had children, he took great joy in being "dad" to Barb's sons, Erin Sharp of Sioux Falls, SD and Ben Sharp of Hot Springs, SD and New Zealand. He took great pride in his "grandkids" Alex Sharp (McKenna) of California; Wesley Sharp of Arizona; Conrad Sharp of Hot Springs, SD and New Zealand. Jim and Barb also had two great grandsons. He is also survived by dear relatives and friends.

A memorial celebration will be held on June 25th at 21862 Big Elk Place near Nemo, SD. The celebration will begin around 3:00 pm. Memorials for Jim will be used to establish a scholarship for a deserving student pursuing a vocational degree.

Pastor's Perspective

"Politics and the Christian"



Do you follow politics? Are you a conservative or a liberal? It's been said that there are two topics that you shouldn't talk about in social situations, politics and religion. As a Pastor, I've had many opportunities to talk about religion, and hopefully discussions

about religion are expected, to be coming from a Pastor. And, being as the Bible deals with moral issues, it also colors my view of politics.

However, not everyone agrees that Biblical teaching agrees on a political party, or issues. The truth is that there are biblical issues represented in both parties, not just one.

In the church, there are often people with differing political persuasions. And, there is a well voiced opinion that politics and religion don't mix. But, the truth of the matter is, Scripture does address issues that are represented in politics. And yet, we find great division within the church when it comes to the subject of politics. And, that division in our day has led to heated disagreements both in the church and in the culture.

It shouldn't be this way. Politics shouldn't divide us in the church or in the home. It's reported by some that Augustine stated, "In essentials, unity; in non-essentials, liberty; in all things, charity." The point of that quote could be applied to politics in that regardless of how a person votes, we should still care about who they are as a person and their relationship with God.

How did we end up being in a situation where opposing political philosophies see the others as their enemies? One answer is that we choose to watch our preferred/slanted news outlets that reflect our political perspectives, and often we find ourselves simply discounting the opposing viewpoint. And, if we're attentive, we can clearly discern that news inflames

and divides because of its perspective, whether one side or the other.

When we go into the voting booth, we often vote on the basis of party affiliation, and we go into the voting booth with a great deal of faith. We hope that our votes are informed ones. We trust that the candidate that we are voting for will carry out what they have promised, and we trust that our vote will be accurately counted. We also trust that the ideals that we hold to will continue in the future.

We live in a country with a great deal of history, both good and bad, and it is still a country that many will sacrifice life and limb to gain access to. We're truly a blessed people.

Regardless of who is elected, the Scripture encourages us to pray for our elected leaders. We're to make requests on their behalf, intercede for them, and give thanks for them. And, that goes even if we didn't vote for them!

Just read what the Apostle Paul wrote to his protégé Timothy:

1 Timothy 2:1-7 I urge, then, first of all, that requests, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for everyone—for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness. This is good, and pleases God our Savior, who wants all men to be saved and to come to a knowledge of the truth. For there is one God and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself as a ransom for all men—the testimony given in its proper time. (NIV)

Band was 2 Country 4 Nashville. They had some friends fly in from Dallas to attend our festival and hear them play.

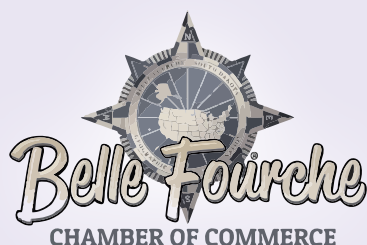
Contest between the local law enforcement was a close call. \$5 different. The winner was the Belle Fourche Police Department.

Old Glory, Eternal Glory

On June 14th each year, we celebrate the American Flag as an enduring symbol of freedom, equality, justice, and hope. Our flag is more than a symbol of our country's core values — it also represents the toil and sacrifice of so many who have worked to lift America to the top of the world stage.

Flag Day officially commemorates the Continental Congress' approval of the design on June 14, 1777. Some scholars believe the tradition of Flag Day began around 1889, the same year South Dakota became a state. In 1927, President Calvin Coolidge signed a proclamation honoring Flag Day. He noted, "when we look at our flag and behold it emblazoned with all our rights, we must remember that it is equally a symbol of our duties."

Every glory that we associate with it is the result of duty done."

Those American duties — the personal responsibility of our people — are wonderfully depicted in the colors of our flag. Red stands for hardiness and valor — the American people tamed a continent and have fought and died for generations to defend the freedoms that make

our nation great. White stands for purity and innocence — our nation was the first in history to be founded on an ideal, "that all men are created equal," and

we must remain pure to that ideal in everything that we do. And Blue symbolizes justice for all — our nation stands for equal rights, equal treatment under the law, and limited government that doesn't pick winners and losers.

We recently honored Memorial Day, and it was a tremendous reminder of the values depicted by our flag. Standing with rain-soaked patriots at the Black Hills National Cemetery,

I watched as veteran after veteran, family after family, presented wreaths in honor of the more than 3,000 South Dakotans who made the ultimate sacrifice for our freedoms.

As I watched a wheelchair-bound veteran endure the rain to participate in a flag presentation to a World War II veteran, the symbol of the red, white, and blue became more powerful. They call the flag "Old Glory." She's 245 years old, but her glory is eternal — the result of generations continuing to fulfill their duty to serve.

We must keep America strong so the flag can remain a sym-

bol of hope for those yearning for freedom. President George Washington once said, "We take the stars from heaven, the red from our mother country (Great Britain), separating it by white stripes, thus showing that we have separated from her, and the white stripes shall go down to posterity representing Liberty." That Liberty has remained a beacon for so many around the world, and we must keep it that way.

For too long, there has been a radical push to redefine what the American Flag represents. We must reject that movement, but we must also recognize that our nation is always

finding ways to improve and learn from mistakes. When our nation mourns, we lower the flag; we do not tear it down completely. It's our history. It's our heroes. It's our legacy as the first nation to break through tyranny to self-govern under the rights given

to us by our Creator.

Our Founding Fathers took 13 colonies and built One Nation Under God. It is our responsibility to continue that legacy and protect the flag as a symbol of freedom and democracy around the world.

Yesterday, June 14th, was Flag Day. * * *

Flag Day, also called National Flag Day, in the United States, a day honouring the national flag, observed on June 14. The holiday commemorates the date in 1777 when the United States approved the design for its first national flag. Flag Day is celebrated on Tuesday, June 14, 2022 in the United States. * * *

The idea to set aside a day to honour the national flag came from several sources. Bernard J. Cigrand, a Wisconsin schoolteacher, in 1885 urged his students to observe June 14 as "Flag Birthday." He later wrote an essay published in a Chicago newspaper that urged Americans to proclaim this date as the day to celebrate the flag. In 1888 William T. Kerr of Pennsylvania founded the American Flag Day Association of Western Pennsylvania, an organization to which he dedicated his life. A lesser-known claim is that of George Morris of Connecticut, who is said to have organized the first formal celebration of the day in Hartford in 1861. * * *

In 1916 Pres. Woodrow Wilson proclaimed June 14 as the official date for Flag Day, and in 1949 the U.S. Congress permanently established the date as National Flag Day. Although Flag Day is not an official federal holiday, Pennsylvania celebrates the day as a state holiday. Each year the U.S. president delivers an address that proclaims the week of June 14 as National Flag Week, and all Americans are encouraged to fly U.S. flags during that week. * * *

The Origin Of Father's Day
Many people assume Father's Day (and Mother's Day for that matter) is a holiday designed by greeting card makers to turn a profit. But that couldn't be farther from the truth. The story behind how this day became a holiday is actually a tale of determination by one woman and a decades-long fight to get fathers the recognition they deserve. * * *

Some attribute the first Father's Day observance to the 1907 Monongah, West Virginia mining disaster that killed 361 men—250 of them fathers—and which left more than a thousand children without a dad. Grace Golden Clayton, whose father was killed in the tragedy, suggested a service of commemoration to the pastor of her local Methodist chapel. But it never really caught on as an annual observance. * * *

Two years later, in May of 1909, a woman named Sonora Louise Smart Dodd of Spokane, Washington, heard a Mother's Day sermon by Reverend Dr. Henry Rasmussen in her hometown church and thought a similar day should be set aside to honor fathers. Her own father, William Jackson Smart, a Civil War veteran, raised six children as a single parent. * * *

On June 6, 1910, Dodd approached the Spokane Ministerial Association and the local Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA) with her petition outlining the idea for an annual observance, and she received overwhelming support. Spokane's held its first Father's Day celebration on Sunday, June 19, 1910, with moving speeches by her own pastor and those from other area churches. * * *

The first U.S. President to celebrate it was Woodrow Wilson in June of 1916, who opened the church services by telephone to Spokane from the Oval Office. Wilson liked the idea so much of a day of observation for fathers that he pushed to make it a national holiday (he had just made Mother's Day official in 1915), but members of Congress resisted, fearing that such a day would take away support from the Mother's Day holiday, and commercialize the day for fathers, causing more harm than good. * * *

Undeterred, Dodd took her mission on the road and spoke publicly to fathers to gain their support. But she was met with hard criticism. According to The Spokesman-Review, they laughed at her and said they didn't want a Father's Day. "A national fishing day would be better," they told her. * * *

Whether your fishing or not, have a **Happy Father's Day!**

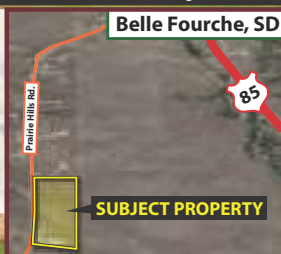

Bareback Rider Rocker Steiner Wins in Darby With World Record 95-point Ride

It's only taken a few months for rookie Rocker Steiner to etch his name into the record books.

Steiner turned 18 in December 2021 and now, just five months into his professional career, he has claimed his first title at a Rigg'in' Rally stop and he did so in world record fashion with a 95-point ride aboard renowned bucking horse Virgil from C5 Rodeo.

"I'm so mind blown right now," Steiner said. "That was one of the most special moments of my life. I've been dreaming of getting that horse for about four years now, ever since I started riding."

The Rigg'in' Rally features a unique format. The 30 contestants, comprised of the top 24 in the PRCA | RAM World standings alongside six riders who advanced from a qualifier held the day prior to the Rigg'in' Rally, were drawn into three sections. The top three from each section move on to the nine-man finals.

On Sunday night, the competitors were able to draft their livestock for the long round. With the fourth pick in his section, Steiner chose Brookman Rodeo's Boozy Beaver. Three-time PRCA World Champ Tim O'Connell set the bar at 88 points for the section win, while Steiner tied for second with Canadian cowboy Ty Fast Tappotat, who advanced to compete through Saturday's qualifier. The matching 83-point rides squeaked into the sudden-death finals.

Then came the finals, a sudden death competition known to produce marquee matchups and high scores.

"We were sitting behind the chutes and Will O'Connell was calling out who's matched up against what horse and he said, 'Rocker Steiner, Virgil,'" Steiner recalled. "Right there, my stomach dropped, I was scared. I was so ready. I knew something great was going to happen, and it did."

When the gates blew open, Steiner matched moves with the two-time PRCA and two-time Canadian champion horse and hit the ground to a huge celebration.

"It was everything I dreamed of," he said. "I just kept telling myself to set the brakes because he was going to want me out the front."

"I couldn't believe that I made the whistle, and I knew I was going to make the whistle," he joked.

Steiner's 95-point ride broke up a logjam of six 94-point rides that formerly held the world record, originally set in 2002.

Steiner earned \$10,000 for the win. He came to Montana 15th in the PRCA | RAM World Standings and will move up the ladder as he aims to make his Wrangler National Finals Rodeo debut in 2022.

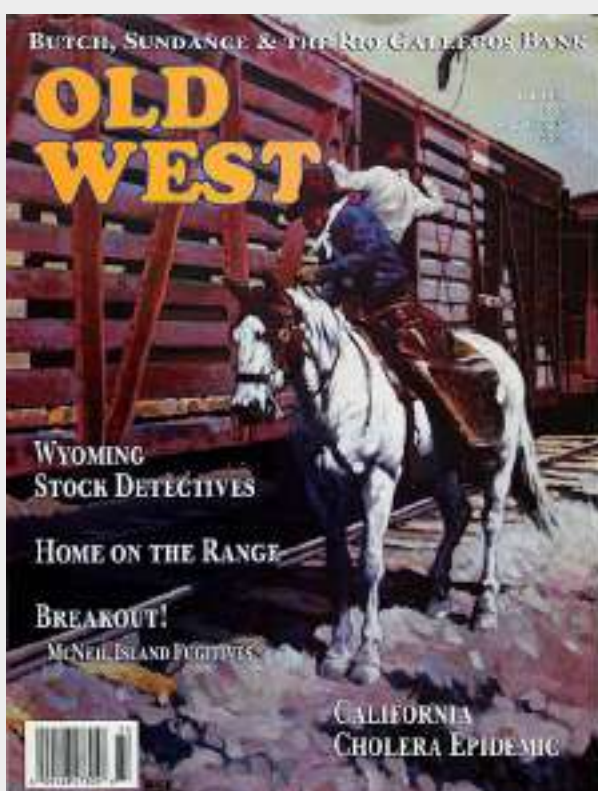


Railroad Agents Oil Cover of 1993 Old West magazine

Additional Child Care Funding
Available to Providers

PIERRE – Governor Kristi Noem is making available additional grants to assist child care providers licensed and registered with the South Dakota Department of Social Services (DSS).

This is a second round of funding from the \$60 million stabilization grants through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) of 2021 to help support child care providers and families impacted by COVID-19. Initial funding was provided to 676 child care providers in the amount of \$35.4 million this spring.

“Helping stabilize South Dakota child care providers strengthens our communities,” said DSS Cabinet Secretary Laurie Gill. “Child care is a vital part of keeping our economy strong, but more importantly access to quality providers is crucial for families.”

Grant awards are based on the provider’s average monthly expenses. The funding is being made available to child care providers who previously received grants as well as open to new providers registered and licensed by DSS at the time of application. Applications are being accepted until June 15.

Providers who received

previous grants will receive an additional two months of operating expenses up to a cap. Providers who haven’t received a grant will receive five months of operating expenses up to a cap. As with the first round of ARPA Child Care Stabilization Grants, funds must be expended on operating expenses.

DSS provides assistance to low-income families who need help with child care costs while parents work or attend school. Additional information including an online application is available at dss.sd.gov/childcare/childcareassistance/ apply or by calling Child Care Services at 1.800.227.3020.

DSS also provides oversight, technical assistance, and support in promoting safe, healthy, and caring environments for children through licensing, registration, and quality improvement activities. rotation within the storm as it neared the area around Colony, Wyoming. A tornado warning was issued which included the city of Belle Fourche.

Residents west of town reported seeing rotation in the clouds but there were no verified reports of a funnel touching down. However, due to the large instability in the atmosphere updrafts created the perfect atmosphere for large hail which was widely observed. Storm spotters two miles northwest of Belle Fourche reported 4-inch diameter hail (roughly baseball sized) and there were reports of 2.75 inch diameter hail 2 miles north of St. Onge. Reports of 4.5” hail came in from 23 miles north of Wall.

A peak wind gust of 91 MPH was recorded one mile north of St. Onge with winds in excess of 80 MPH near Redig and 70 MPH reported in locations near Faith, Buffalo, Castle Rock and

Reva.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) scrambled one of its fleet of Hurricane Hunter Orion P-3 Turboprops from Forbes Field in Topeka to the Belle Fourche area to conduct research measurements and overflights of the storm. The plane, nicknamed Kermit, which routinely flies into hurricanes in Caribbean, made numerous zig-zagged passes at about 14,000 feet along the south edge of the storm as it tracked across western South Dakota before returning to Topeka at around 9:30pm, according to FlightAware.

Rainfall totals from the storm ranged from three-quarters to an inch-and-a-half. Nearly 2.5” of rain was recorded 1 mile southwest of Midland. Northeast of Whitewood were reports of about 1.6 inches of precipitation.

As of press time there were no injuries reported from the storm.

Hurricane Hunters Visit Belle



The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) hurricane hunter team visited the skies above Belle Fourche on Sunday to investigate and do research on the storm. The Orion P3 turboprop (see on top) departed Topeka, Kansas, and flew to the Belle Fourche region where it made several passes to the south of the storm.

The plane, nicknamed “Kermit” is one of two four-engine turboprops NOAA uses to routinely fly into hurricanes in the Gulf of Mexico and the Atlantic Ocean.

“Kermit” left Topeka at about 2pm and spent four hours in the skies over western South Dakota, as seen on the flight trace provided by FlightAware. The crew returned to base at Forbes Field in Topkea at about 9:30pm MDT.

Damage to Hides by Branding
It would seem as if range cattle might devise some way to distinguishing their cattle which would save to themselves the immense aggregate loss suffered by the depreciation in value of the hides through the branding-irons, says the Breeders Gazette. This is a subject that has been agitated for many years, but still the disfigured hides are everywhere in evidence. The money lost from this source alone has been estimated as high as \$2,000,000 per annum. There is absolutely no excuse for a brand to exceed four inches square. Range men using larger ones are simply burning their money. A free-of-brand side of Texas slaughter leather for instance, is quoted at 21 cents today. Brands reduce their figure, according to size and number to 19 cents.

Homestead in Project Not Subject to Taxation
Newell Irrigator: Homesteads in the government irrigation project are not taxable until final reclamation proof has been made. Tat is the substance of a recent decision of the United States supreme court, written by Chief Taft, in the case of William Irvin vs. Samuel F. Webb, County Treasurer. The supreme court, in the above case, holds that a reclamation homestead entry upon which proof under the ordinary provision of the homestead law has been made, in not subject to taxation prior to the making of the final reclamation proof. The same question was tried in the circuit court of Butte County several years ago, and the decision of the state court was

the other way. The decision of the United Sate supreme court on this question will settle a question which has heretofore been undecided by a court of last resort, and will make a substantial difference in the amount of taxes that can be collected under a government project, especially where new units are opened up. This raises the question fo whether or not taxes heretofore collected on lands of this character should be refunded. This point apparently is not touched upon the the decision but it seem to provide a basis for such refunds.

S. D. NATIONAL GUARDS COMING The 147th Field Artillery to Attend Tri-Sate Round-Up in This City Next Month
The Tri-State Round-Up management is elated over landing another extra big attraction for one day of the show, probably July 4. The 147th Field Artillery of the South Dakota National Guards, which will be in camp at Fort Meade on the dates of the Round-Up, will come to Belle Fourche to spend an entire day, making the trip on a special train, which has been secured for the occasion. There will be in the neighborhood of 300 officers and men under command of Lieutenant Colonel E. A Beckwith of Pierre, which will be camp commander. The National Guards will give a number of field drills during the day and will participate in the big military parade on the morning of the Fourth.

Schufts Back in Full Scale Operation Two Months After Fire
Less than two months after fire burned their wool warehouse to the ground April 13, Max Schuft and Son now are back in full-scale operation. Only the finishing touches remain to be placed on the 100X200 foot all-metal building which has replace the former warehouse. The new building, erectly in 11 days, actually will house more wool than the former structure. In addition to the warehouse, a small Quonset, erected and finished, is serving as an office for Schuft and Son. The building has been completed on the eve of the Tri-State area's wool shearing season. Already hundreds of pounds of wool are stacked in the four-section Quonset building. So complete has been reconstruction at the site that a small lawn has been planted and is growing around the office of the firm.
Improved Facilities, Incentive Plan To Boost Brick Production
Improvements in production facilities and a new workers' incentive plan have brought about a 10 per cent roll back in wholesale prices at the Black Hills Clay Products Company plant here, it was disclose

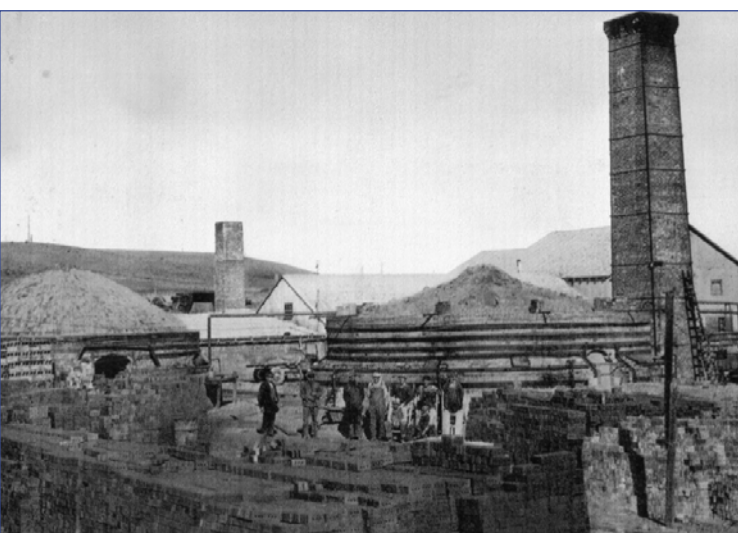

this week by E. J. Coughlin, manager. The price cut, which is expected to amount to about eight or nine per cent on the retail market, became effective June 1. Remodeling activities have been under way at the plant for several months. The work now has been completed. The plant has seven kilns, each of which will accommodate 95,000 bricks. Two large drying rooms will handle 40,000 bricks or two car loads per day. Important factor in the city in prices for clay products is the new incentive plan, under which Coughlin expects a sharp increase in efficiency and production. One improvement in production involves re-use of heat in the drying rooms. Heretofore, the smoke heat from the intense kiln fires has been allowed to escape. "Now," Coughlin explains, "the kilns are all connected by underground tunnels equipped with a large suction fan. By this arrangement smoke for kiln fires is drawn thru the tunnel, then thru steel pipe into drying rooms where it radiates heat for drying rooms where it radiates heat for drying purposes." As a result Coughlin expects to save ten per cent on fuel. Most of the brick and tile produced in Belle Fourche is used within a radius of 300 miles. Now with the workers' incentive program, modernized production methods, and a protected stock pile which will provide raw clay thru poor hauling weather, steady output is assured. Raw materials for the plant are secured from a pit about three miles south of Belle Fourche, where a 14-foot strata of red clay overlays a three-foot strata of buff clay. The red clay is burned into products of various shades. Yellow brick is made from buff clay. The company, which provides employment for 25 families, has been operating her for 20 years, since 1927.

Rail Damage Curbs Bentonite Production
Economic effects of the Rapid City area flood were being felt in Belle Fourche's bentonite industry this week. Because most of the bentonite is shipped by rail, the four plants in the area have been forced to cut back production or shut down. C. & NW officials report it will be anywhere from 10 days to three week before the rail lines in the Rapid City area will be restored sufficiently to permit resumption of freight traffic. Meanwhile, local C&NW crews and the local office force are idle. One local bentonite plant reported its production has been cut about one-half. They are shipping by truck to Deadwood where the bentonite is loaded on the Burlington-Northern, but that too, has its complications, because trucks have been diverted to Rapid City disaster area and are difficult to secure. The plant has laid off about 10 men. Another of the plants shut down immediately after the flood. Some of its orders have been diverted to Upton and a truck is loaded now and then, but the plant is idle.

Three Ozuna Children
The tragic impact of the Rapid City flood was felt in Belle Fourche this week with the announcement that three members of a Belle Fourche family died in the weekend disaster. The victims were Ronald Ozuma, eight years old; Arnold Ozuma seven years old; and Stanley Ozuma, five years old. They were the sons of Mrs. Virginia Ozuma. Funeral services for the three boys were held in Belle Fourche Wednesday.

Local Content That Enhances a Community

Adam Gardner once said, "I never really thought of community service as a movement, but it is". With this quote in mind, I recently had the opportunity to discuss with a veteran media executive the types of local content their media company provided to their local community. He mentioned the typical, yet important content offerings such as the city government happenings, school board meetings, local high school sports, the crime report, marriages, divorces, obituaries, news business openings, civic club news and a few stories about the good things going on around town.

I want to stress these are important elements to include as a part of the local coverage. That said, I also want to stress these items are the minimum point of entry for a truly-local news-media company. The community expects and needs this type of local coverage each and every week. In most cases, when your media provides that coverage, they are simply hurdling the lowest bar in the quest for community greatness. To truly win over a community and convince the community how much they need their media, the product needs to not only clear the lowest bar, they need to shoot for and clear bars much higher.

In order to work effectively with a community, the news-media company must be a community leader. Your local media is



one of the few businesses within a community having the unique ability simply by their position in the community, to lead change as well as being at the forefront of transformation. Simply put, they can help drive the community by their actions and understanding. In their position, they are an important ingredient in the community's quest to thrive, and not just survive in these difficult economic times.

How might your local news-media company accomplish this and how can the community assist? While the answer will vary by community, here are a few common traits.

The media can educate the community on the value of your locally-owned businesses. They can teach the community that a dollar spent at a locally-owned business has 3-7X the local economic impact than spending that dollar at Walmart or online. With your help, they can be a leader in educating your entire community on this one simple element. The business community will embrace this critical message.

Does your community understand that spending a dollar on your downtown district versus other areas of the community on average will return 40% more for their investment dollar? The downtown is the heart and soul of a community. By working with community leaders voicing this information, both the city

and the media company are much more effective in advocating and voicing this critical information. Working together, the media and the community can conquer mountains that otherwise would be difficult at best to conquer.

In essence, by working together, the community and media company are much greater than the sum of each of their individual parts. By working together with the community, business owners, chambers, civic clubs and others, they can harness an army of volunteers to drive change through the semination of information that goes far beyond that which was mentioned at the outset of this column. Together they can be the start of a community movement that can't be stopped. Together they can create the environment of positive change and effective as well as productive disruption. You can do this together, or risk being the disrupted in lieu of the disrupter. Your community will see the value of the media, especially when coupled with fellow community organizations engaged in moving forward. You will have started a movement that will only build steam as it grows!

“Looking Forward to our Past”

June 13, 1912

After June 15, Brattons' Mercantile Co will not buy any more dairy butter as the supply's greater than the local demand and they are unable to find a foreign market in which they can dispose of the product at a price equal to that paid by the Creameries for the butterfat. They have made arrangements with the creamery to "cash for your cream". They will also sell you a Standard Cream Separator at a very close price.

Sealed proposal will be received by the Board of County Commission of Butte County, South Dakota, until the 20th day of June, 1912, for the painting and decorating to the specifications prepared by C.A. Randell, architect, a copy of which may be obtained from the architect. Bids will be opened at 2 o'clock in the afternoon on 20th day of June 1912. A bid must be accompanied by a certified check of 15% of the amount of the bid as a guarantee that said bidder will sign a contract according to his bid. The Board of County Commission reserves the right to reject any or all proposals submitted to D.C. Barr, County Auditor.

June 8, 1922

Superintendent Westre is rapidly getting his forces organized for beginning of actual construction work on Newell's new high school building. A large number of men are now engaged in hauling gravel, cement and lumber and the school grounds will soon and present be a busy scene of operations. Contractor John Holt this week finished excavation work and has done a splendid job, considering the unfavorable weather conditions with which he had to contend. All the cement has arrived also a car of lumber and

3 carloads of brick are expected in a few days.

Albert Fredlund came down from Perkins County last week to visit relatives here. Miss Caroline, who has been nursing in Deadwood hospital, met her father and returned with him to Lodge Pole. Miss Ruth Fredlund, who has been teacher at the Milberg School for the past year, left Monday for Spearfish to take a course at the State Normal School.

A crew of sheep shearers from Wyoming passed through here this week enroute to the Wm Marty ranch near the Slim Buttes. They have contracted a number of jobs in that territory. George W. Shipley, the Moreau River sheepman, was in from the ranch Tuesday for supplies. He expects to entertain the shearers at his place next week.

June 9, 1932

Fire starting from a kerosene stove destroyed the home of Dave Baird, south of Vale at 4 o'clock last Sunday morning. All the household furnishings were saved except those in the kitchen.

Mr. & Mrs. R. B. Sorbel, accompanied by Principal Ray Johnson of Newell High School and Miss Ruby Jackson, also an instructor in the Newell Schools departed Wednesday for Los Angeles, Calif, where Messers Sorbel and Johnson will pursue summer studies at the University of Southern California.

June 11, 1942

A general meeting of the citizens of Newell is called for next Monday evening June 15, for the purpose of organizing a Black Out program for the city. Especially wanted in attendance are members of the Commercial

Club, Jaycees, the Fire Department, American Legion and Boy Scouts. The meeting will be held in the City Auditorium and starts at 7:30 PM. This meeting is initiated by Butte County Defense Committee.

About 50 friends and neighbors gathered at the Wm Schmele home last Sunday evening to honor Mr. & Mrs. Henry Noziska with a shower. Everyone brought defense stamps for the newly wedded couple. Cake and ice cream was served at a late hour. Mrs. Noziska is the former, Miss Laverne Schmele of the Horse Creek Community.

June 12, 1952
