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Butte County Election Results

Despite the rain, or maybe in celebration of the rain, 39.14% of registered Butte County voters turned out to cast ballots during the primary election on June 7. That's 2,512 voters out of 6,417 according to the Butte County auditor's office and higher than the state average, 32.09 % as reported by the South Dakota secretary of state's office.

Here's the local breakdown: Register of Deeds: Cynthia Lewis 564; **Julie Brunner** 1173.

County Commisioner, District 1: Steven Clooten 168, **James Ager** 266, Les Hermann 59.

County Commissioner, District 5, Troy M. Shockey 95, **Frank Walton** 150.

In other races, voters in District 28B supported Neal Pinnow (949 votes) to represent them in the state legislature, in a tight race with Thomas Brunner (888 votes).

Kristi Noem remains a favorite candidate for governor over Republican Steve Haugaard in western South Dakota. Taffy Howard, was the preferred candidate in Butte County for South Dakota's only congressional seat. However, statewide voters chose to retain Dusty Johnson as our lone representative. John Thune, who won by a wide margin in Butte County and statewide, will also remain in his senate seat.

The June 7 primary election consisted of races between, or among Republican candidates. Amendment C was the only item on which registered Democrats or Independents could express a preference. Apparently, quite a few of these voters in Butte County (2,484) turned out to defeat this controversial amendment that many critics argued would limit the voice of the majority.

I brought my mother to the Belle Fourche City Hall during a downpour to cast her vote. She's 87, walks with a cane and is from a generation that votes, in every election. Always. An election official met her at the

door, took her arm and guided her into the building. Voting may be primarily a civic duty, but in Belle Fourche it is also a pleasant social event where friends and neighbors greet one another and take a few minutes to visit. Election officials are friendly, knowledgeable, and accommodating. Voters present would probably agree that voting is a right, a responsibility and a privilege.

Although turnout for voting was "good" it would be nice if more eligible citizens found the desire, initiative, or sense of civic duty to participate in elections. After all, elections are an important exercise in upholding American democracy. Participating as a candidate and serving as an elected official represent an elevated level of courage and commitment. On that positive note, there was certainly plenty of enthusiasm from the voters, and others present at the June 7 primary election in Belle Fourche.

Sunday Night Storm Wreaks Havoc on City

BELLE FOURCHE – Hail up to 4" in diameter combined with 70-mph winds roared through Belle Fourche on Sunday night, June 12th and areas east through the evening. Damage estimates were still being assessed at press time

but numerous windows were

blown out, roofs were damaged, siding on homes and buildings was stripped bare, tree limbs downed and numerous cars and property at area car lots suffered extensive damage. Cleanup was underway as of Monday morning.

The supercell formed quickly around 4:00pm near Alzada and began its march eastward following a path roughly along and to the south of Highway 212. Two hours earlier the Severe Storms Forecast Center in Norman, Oklahoma, had issues a tornado watch for much of western South Dakota. At around 4:30pm doppler radar at the National Weather Service Office in Rapid City indicated

City Sales Tax Receipts Remain Strong

BELLE FOURCHE – Sales tax collections within the city of Belle Fourche have remained strong through the first five months of 2022. According to data released by the City's Finance Office each month of 2022, January through May, has established the highest total for that month for the last five years. This comes on the heels of 2021's record collection of more than \$3.7 million in total revenue. Thus far 2022 is 8% ahead of last year, which tracks with the overall increase in South Dakota sales tax revenue for this year.

The city set a record with more than \$323,000 collected in April, including gross receipts. It remains the high-water mark for this year. In past years June through September usually see the highest revenue with increased activity from summer events, tourism and back to school spending.

Retail sales remain strong for the city with sales tax receipts in this sector accounting for about two-thirds of all city sales tax during May. The May total for Belle Fourche was \$295,381.08, which was 5% higher than last year's record May receipts.

Inflation and rising fuel costs will no doubt damped that. While higher prices would bring higher sales tax, the typical household will more closely watch their discretionary spending with the likely effect being a reduction in tax revenue. The city is already seeing \$5 a gallon gas prices and increases in diesel, propane and natural gas are leaving their mark on budgets. However, with recent job growth and construction the city may be poised to weather a possible recession better than most. Councilman Larry Schmaltz, who sits on the Economic Development Sub-committee reported to the council that Belle Fourche Development Corporation (BFDC) has lined up two additional customers for the new rail spur

Dan Carlson: New Pastor at the Christian Life Center



In fact, he wrote and published two science fiction novels. Species Unknown was one of the science fiction novels that climbed to No. 1 on Amazon's Christian Fantasy list.

Drawn by his eclectic interests, Dan has always worn many different hats during his career, often at the same time. Perhaps Dan Carlson could best be described as a 21st century renaissance man. The label goes back to the Italian renaissance

period when Leonardo Davinci, (the original renaissance man) astounded the world as an artist, philosopher, engineer and scientist. Now, the label refers to a person whose career and identity is shaped by his or her pursuit of eclectic passions and achievements, just like Dan.

Dan began his career when he was hired as a meteorologist for WCCO in Minneapolis, Minnesota in 1979. He was the youngest major market weather presenter in the world. He had just turned 19 and was not yet a meteorologist. Dan quickly became well known as a regional celebrity. His moniker, Dan, Dan the Weatherman caught on quickly and brought him lasting recognition.

During the eight years he filled the role of weatherman in the Twin Cities for WCCO his reputation grew. Dan was in a position to scale up into even larger and more prestigious broadcasting positions. What happened next is a little incongruous.

Dan made annual trips to the Black Hills as a young adult, and his love of meteorology may have stemmed from deep Dan Carlson B4

James Richard (Jim) Tatge of Nemo, SD, passed away unexpectedly on March 2, 2022. Jim was born on June 27, 1953 to Alvin and Mavis (McAmis) Tatge of Alzada, Montana. He came home from the hospital in the family airplane and was enamored with flying from that day on.

Jim was in a car accident on February 1, 2022 and suffered a severely broken neck. He survived against great odds and was home after eight days with a metal halo. He was recovering well and grateful to his doctors for their expertise and the huge support from his many friends.

On February 28, Jim suffered a heart attack. He was treated at Monument Health and seemed to be recovering well. On March 2, his heart went into A-Fib and was not able to recover. He died a few hours later with Barb, the love of his life, holding his hand

Jim attended high school in Belle Fourche, SD and graduated in 1971. He worked many jobs during his life including designing and selling ultralite aircraft. He had the first ultralite dealership in the Midwest in the 70's when the planes were still foot launched. He worked for several years as a motorcycle mechanic and raced motocross. During his lifetime he owned 150+ motorcycles and at times lamented some of the ones he sold. Jim worked several years commercial salmon fishing in Bristol Bay, Alaska and said he never got tired of eating fresh salmon every day. Jim was an excellent mechanic and was always ready to help diagnose engine problems whenever he was asked.



He was very curious about the world around him and had an interest in vast areas. He researched world religions and spirituality. He practiced transcendental meditation; studied and practiced sound nutrition; and studied a lengthy list of topics from airfoils to quantum physics and mechanics. ied, could build or fix almost anything. He could carry on an intelligent conversation with anyone of any age on almost any topic that came up. Jim's friends and family meant the world to him and those feelings were mutual. He is missed by everyone who knew him. Do you follow politics? Are you a conservative or a liberal? It's been said that there are two topics that you shouldn't talk about in social situations, politics and religion. As a Pastor, I've had many opportunities to talk about religion, and hopefully discussions

about religion are expected, to be coming from a Pastor. And, being as the Bible deals with moral issues, it also colors my view of politics.

However, not everyone agrees that Biblical teaching agrees on a political party, or issues. The truth is that there are biblical issues represented in both parties, not just one

In the church, there are often people with differing political persuasions. And, there is a well voiced opinion that politics and religion don't mix. But, the truth of the matter is, Scripture does address issues that are represented in politics. And yet, we find great division within the church when it comes to the subject of politics. And, that division in our day has led to heated disagreements both in the church and in the culture.

It shouldn't be this way. Politics shouldn't divide us in the church or in the home. It's reported by some that Augustine stated, "In essentials, unity; in non-essentials, liberty; in all things, charity." 

Old Glory, Eternal Glory

On June 14th each year, we celebrate the American Flag as an enduring symbol of freedom, equality, justice, and hope. Our flag is more than a symbol of our country's core values — it also represents the toil and sacrifice of so many who have worked to lift America to the

top of the world stage.

Flag Day officially commemorates the Continental Congress' approval of the design on June 14, 1777. Some scholars believe the tradition of Flag Day began around 1889, the same year South Dakota became a state. In 1927, President Calvin Coolidge signed a proclamation honoring Flag Day. He noted, "when we look at our flag and behold it emblazoned with all our rights, we must remember that it is equally a symbol of our duties.

Every glory that we associate with it is the result of duty done."

Those American duties — the personal responsibility of our people — are wonderfully depicted in the colors of our flag. Red stands for hardiness and valor – the American people tamed a continent and have fought and died for generations to defend the freedoms that make our nation great. White stands for purity and innocence — our nation was the first in history to be founded on an ideal, "that all men are created equal," and

we must remain pure to that ideal in everything that we do. And Blue symbolizes justice for all — our nation stands for equal rights, equal treatment under the law, and limited government that doesn't pick winners and losers.

We recently honored Memorial Day, and it was a tremendous reminder of the values depicted by our flag. Standing with rainsoaked patriots at the Black Hills National Cemetery,

I watched as veteran after veteran, family after family, presented wreaths in honor of the more than 3,000 South Dakotans who made the ultimate sacrifice for our freedoms.

As I watched a wheelchair-bound veteran endure the rain to participate in a flag presentation to a World War II veteran, the symbol of the red, white, and blue became more

powerful. They call the flag "Old Glory." She's 245 years old, but her glory is eternal the result of generations continuing to fulfill their duty to serve.

We must keep America strong so the flag can remain a sym-

bol of hope for those yearning for freedom. President George Washington once said, "We take the stars from heaven, the red from our mother country (Great Britain), separating it by white stripes, thus showing that we have separated from her, and the white stripes shall go down to posterity representing Liberty." That Liberty has remained a beacon for so many around the world, and we must keep it that way.

For too long, there has been a radical push to redefine what the American Flag represents. We must reject that movement, but we must also recognize that our nation is always

finding ways to improve and learn from mistakes. When our nation mourns, we lower the flag; we do not tear it down completely. It's our history. It's our heroes. It's our legacy as the first nation to break through tyranny to self-govern under the rights given

to us by our Creator.

Our Founding Fathers took 13 colonies and built One Nation Under God. It is our responsibility to continue that legacy and protect the flag as a symbol of freedom and democracy around the world.

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
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The Good Stuff

Bareback Rider Rocker Steiner Wins in Darby With World Record 95-point Ride

It's only taken a few months for rookie Rocker Steiner to etch his name into the record books.

Steiner turned 18 in December 2021 and now, just five months into his professional career, he has claimed his first title at a Riggin' Rally stop and he did so in world record fashion with a 95-point ride aboard renowned bucking horse Virgil from C5 Rodeo.

"I'm so mind blown right now," Steiner said. "That was one of the most special moments of my life. I've been dreaming of getting that horse for about four years now, ever since I started riding."

The Riggin' Rally features a unique format. The 30 contestants, comprised of the top 24 in the PRCA | RAM World standings alongside six riders who advanced from a qualifier held the day prior to the Riggin Rally, were drawn into three sections. The top three from each section move on to the nine-man finals. On Sunday night, the competitors were able to draft their livestock for the long round. With the fourth pick in his section, Steiner chose Brookman Rodeo's Boozy Beaver. Threetime PRCA World Champ Tim O'Connell set the bar at 88 points for the section win, while Steiner tied for second with Canadian cowboy Ty Fast Taypotat, who advanced to compete through Saturday's qualifier. The matching 83-point rides squeaked into the sudden-death finals. Then came the finals, a sudden death competition known to produce marquee matchups and high scores. We were sitting behind the chutes and Will O'Connell was calling out who's matched up against what horse and he said, 'Rocker Steiner, Virgil,'" Steiner recalled. "Right there, my stomach dropped, I was scared. I was so ready. I knew something great was going to happen, and it did." When the gates blew open, Steiner matched moves with the two-time PRCA and two-time Canadian champion horse and hit the ground to a huge celebration. "It was everything I dreamed of," he said. "I just kept telling myself to set the brakes because he was going to want me out the front. "I couldn't believe that I made the whistle, and I knew I was going to make the whistle," he joked. Steiner's 95-point ride broke up a logjam of six 94-point rides that formerly held the world record, originally set in 2002. Steiner earned \$10,000 for the win. He came to Montana 15th in the PRCA | RAM World Standings and will move up the ladder as he aims to make his Wrangler National Finals Rodeo debut in 2022.



News & Notes From The Rodeo Trail

The Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association and Women's Professional Rodeo Association announced in a press release June 2 that the Wrangler National Finals Breakaway Roping will take place at the South Point Arena & Equestrian Center in Las Vegas, Nov. 29-30. "I'm pleased to see the continued success and growth of breakaway roping since the inaugural National Finals Breakaway Roping in 2020," PRCA CEO Tom Glause said. "Breakaway roping has experienced rapid growth and it is now featured at over 300 PRCA rodeos annually. This success has resulted in an increase of prize money at the NFBR to reach \$250,000."

The 2022 Wrangler National

Finals Rodeo is Dec. 1-10 at the Thomas & Mack Center in Las Vegas.

Jimmie Munroe, WPRA president, also is excited for the 2022 NFBR.

"The WPRA is looking forward to the National Finals in the Women's Breakaway Roping being held at the South Point Hotel and Casino during the the PRCA Convention," Munroe said. "So many committees are having breakaway roping at their rodeos and now they along with fans will have the opportunity to see the best women breakaway ropers in the world compete at the South Point."

The South Point Hotel, which is a hotspot for contestants and visitors during the Wrangler NFR, is glad to be the event venue for the 2022 Wrangler NFBR.


"We are thrilled to host the

Additional Child Care Funding Available to Providers

PIERRE – Governor Kristi Noem is making available additional grants to assist child care providers licensed and registered with the South Dakota Department of Social Services (DSS).

This is a second round of funding from the \$60 million stabilization grants through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) of 2021 to help support child care providers and families impacted by COVID-19. Initial funding was provided to 676 child care providers in the amount of \$35.4 million this spring.

"Helping stabilize South Dakota child care providers strengthens our communities," said DSS Cabinet Secretary Laurie Gill. "Child care is a vital part of keeping our economy strong, but more importantly access to quality providers is crucial for families."

Grant awards are based on the provider's average monthly expenses. The funding is being made available to child care providers who previously received grants as well as open to new providers registered and licensed by DSS at the time of application. Applications are being accepted until June 15.

Providers who received

previous grants will receive an additional two months of operating expenses up to a cap. Providers who haven't received a grant will receive five months of operating expenses up to a cap. As with the first round of ARPA Child Care Stabilization Grants, funds must be expended on operating expenses.

DSS provides assistance to low-income families who need help with child care costs while parents work or attend school. Additional information including an online application is available at dss.sd.gov/ childcare/childcareassistance/ apply or by calling Child Care Services at 1.800.227.3020.

DSS also provides oversight, technical assistance, and support in promoting safe, healthy, and caring environments for children through licensing, registration, and quality improvement activities. rotation within the storm as it neared the area around Colony, Wyoming. A tornado warning was issued which included the city of Belle Fourche.

Residents west of town reported seeing rotation in the clouds but there were no verified reports of a funnel touching down. However, due to the large instability in the atmosphere updrafts created the perfect atmosphere for large hail which was widely observed. Storm spotters two miles northwest of Belle Fourche reported 4-inch diameter hail (roughly baseball sized) and there were reports of 2.75 inch diameter hail 2 miles north of St. Onge. Reports of 4.5" hail came in from 23 miles north of Wall.

A peak wind gust of 91 MPH was recorded one mile north of St. Onge with winds in excess of 80 MPH near Redig and 70 MPH reported in locations near Faith, Buffalo, Castle Rock and

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) scrambled one of its fleet of Hurricane Hunter Orion P-3 Turboprops from Forbes Field in Topeka to the Belle Fourche area to conduct research measurements and overflights of the storm. The plane, nicknamed Kermit, which routinely flies into hurricanes in Caribbean, made numerous zigzagged passes at about 14,000 feet along the south edge of the storm as it tracked across western South Dakota before returning to Topeka at around 9:30pm, according to Flight-Aware.

Rainfall totals from the storm ranged from three-quarters to an inch-and-a-half. Nearly 2.5" of rain was recorded 1 mile southwest of Midland. Northeast of Whitewood were reports of about 1.6 inches of precipitation.

As of press time there were no injuries reported from the storm.



Hurricane Hunters Visit Belle





The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) hurricane hunter team visited the skies above Belle Fourche on Sunday to investigate and do research on the storm. The Orion P3 turboprop (see on top) departed Topeka, Kansas, and flew to the Belle Fourche region where it made several passes to the south of the storm.

The plane, nicknamed "Kermit" is one of two four-engine turboprops NOAA uses to routinely fly into hurricanes in the Gulf of Mexico and the Atlantic Ocean.

"Kermit" left Topeka at about 2pm and spent four hours in the skies over western South Dakota, as seen on the flight trace provided by FlightAware. The crew returned to base at Forbes Field in Topkea at about 9:30pm MDT.

125 years ago **BELLE TIMES** June 17, 1897 Damage to Hides by Branding It would seem as if range cattle might devise some way to distinguishing their cattle which would save to themselves the immense aggregate loss suffered by the depreciation in value of the hides through the branding-irons, says the Breeders Gazette. This is a subject that has been agitated for many years, but still the disfigured hides are everywhere in evidence. The money lost from this source alone has been estimated as high as \$2,000,000 per annum. There is absolutely no excuse for a brand to exceed four inches square. Range men using larger ones are simply burning their money. A free-ofbrand side of Texas slaughter leather for instance, is quoted at 21 cents today. Brands reduce their figure, according to size and number to 19 cents.

Schufts Back in Full Scale Operation Two Months After Fire Less than two months after fire burned their wool warehouse to the ground April 13, Max Schuft and Son now are back in full-scale operation. Only the finishing touches remain to be placed on the 100X200 foot all-metal building which has replace the former warehouse. The new building, erectly in 11 days, actually will house more wool than the former structure. In addition to the warehouse, a small Quonset, erected and finished, is serving as an office for Schuft and Son. The building has been completed on the eve of the Tri-State area's wool shearing season. Already hundreds of pounds of wool are stacked in the four-section Quonset building. So complete has been reconstruction at the site that a small lawn has been planted and is growing around the office of the firm. Improved Facilities, Incentive Plan To Boost Brick Production Improvements in production facilities and a new workers' incentive plan have brought about a 10 per cent roll back in wholesale prices at the Black Hills Clay Products Company plant here, it was disclose

this week by E. J. Coughlin, manager. The price cut, which is expected to amount to about eight or nine per cent on the retail market, became effective June 1. Remodeling activities have been under way at the plant for several months. The work now has been completed. The plant has seven kilns, each of which will accommodate 95,000 bricks. Two large drying rooms will handle 40,000 bricks or two car loads per day. Important factor in the city in prices for clay products is the new incentive plan, under which Coughlin expects a sharp increase in efficiency and production. One improvement in production involves re-use of heat in the drying rooms. Heretofore, the smoke heat from the intense kiln fires has been allowed to escape. "Now," Coughlin explains, "the kilns are all connected by underground tunnels equipped with a large suction fan. By this arrangement smoke for kiln fires is drawn thru the tunnel, then thru steel pipe into drying rooms where it radiates heat for drying rooms where it radiates heat for drying purposes." As a result Coughlin expects to save ten per cent on fuel. Most of the brick and tile produced in Belle Fourche is used within a radius of 300 miles. Now with the workers' incentive program, modernized production methods, and a protected stock pile which will provide raw clay thru poor hauling weather, steady output is assured. Raw materials for the plant are secured from a pit about three miles south of Belle Fourche, where a 14-foot strata of red clay overlays a three-foot strata of buff clay. The red clay is burned into products of various shades. Yellow brick is made from buff clay. The company, which provides employment for 25 families, has been operating her for 20 years, since 1927.



50 years ago Belle Fourche Daily Post June 16, 1972 Rail Damage Curbs **Bentonite** Production

Economic effects of the Rapid City area flood were being felt in Belle Fourche's bentonite industry this week. Because most of the bentonite is shipped by rail, the four plants in the area have been forced to cut back production or shut down. C. & NW officials report it will be anywhere from 10 days to three week before the rail lines in the Rapid City area will be restored sufficiently to permit resumption of freight traffic. Meanwhile, local C&NW crews and the local office force are idle. One local bentonite plant reported its production has been cut about one-half. They are shipping by truck to Deadwood where the bentonite is loaded on the Burlington-Northern, but that too, has its complications, because trucks have been diverted to Rapid City disaster area and are difficult to secure. The plant has laid off about 10 men. Another of the plants shut down immediately after the flood. Some of its orders have been diverted to Upton and a truck is loaded now and then, but the plant is idle.

Three Ozuna Children The tragic impact of the Rapid City flood was felt in Belle Fourche this week with the announcement that three members of a Belle Fourche family died in the weekend disaster. The victims were Ronald Ozuma, eight years old; Arnold Ozuma seven years old; and Stanley Ozuma, five years old. They were the sons of Mrs. Virginia Ozuma. Funeral services for the three boys were held in Belle Fourche Wednesday.


