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School Budget Moves Toward Final Approval

BELLE FOURCHE- The Belle Fourche School District proposed budget for fiscal year 2019-2020 moved one step closer to finalization this past week. During the school board's regular meeting Monday, June 10th, a public hearing on the proposed fiscal framework for

roth, a public hearing on the proposed fiscal framework for the upcoming school year was held. There were no citizens present and the proposal now moves on toward amendments and expected final approval at the July 15th meeting.

The district proposes a total expenditure of \$15,719,963 against proposed revenues of the same amount for 2019-2020.

On the revenue side 46% of funding would come from local sources, 42% from state of South Dakota sources and a little more than 9% from Federal sources. About 3% would come from other sources.

Of the local revenue about \$4.98 million would come from property taxes, making up about 2/3 of the total local income. About half of property tax dollars would be directed toward the school's general fund with 34% going to the capital outlay fund and 18% to special education.

The largest projected contributor to the general fund is from the state with just under \$5.7 million. South Dakota also is projected to kick in \$926,000 to the Special Education Fund within the district.

On the expense side 58% of the budget is allocated toward instruction, 37% toward support services and a little less than 5% for co-curricular programs which include sports and transportation. The instruction budget includes allocations to the elementary schools of \$2.07 million, middle school, \$1.64 million, high school, \$1.494 million, and Programs for Educationally Deprived (Title I Part A Instruction), \$350,000.

The Beacon is still a work in progress, but now, twelve months on the calendar and 52 weeks later we are working on a *100th Roundup "Special Edition"* for next week.

The first issue, just a short year ago, was June 28, 2018.

The area support is tremendous and keeping busy is an understatement. We have found that each week we have printed the paper we have more than enough Local and Area news to fill the pages. If you are interested in finding out how much is going on locally, that you haven't heard about, start a newspaper. The old cliche', "the newspaper is always the last to know is true."

We don't always get every item in, but please never assume that we know. No such thing as sending to much in the way of news items and photos.

Postal Permit

We have, and will continue to use our current ECRWS-SEDDM postal permit. That is what you see on the front label instead of your name and address. The Postal permit delivers to everyone on a mail route, or no one. We are not allowed to pick and choose.

This is different from standard local papers, in that a paid subscription isn't mandatory to receive the Beacon.

We had more than enough subscribers in our first month of operation to qualify for a traditional postal permit, but have decided to continue on indefinitely with the every door direct mail approach.

Advertisers

We jokingly say, "We only do 100% of the households that receive mail. If you require anything above that you are on

your own."

Sale barns, grocery stores, car and implement dealerships, feed stores, Auctions, and everyone else is greatly benefit when they know that everyone (100%) in the whole trade area is in the know about their ads. It also is a strong voice for supporting local business.

Facebook and websites are an effective part of almost all of today's businesses, but the paper can serve as a "short cut" directory to tell everyone what is out there. Time to read one paper versus 100+ Facebook posts?

Subscriptions are a part of the make up of what a paper needs to have to succeed, but the ability to deliver information to 100% of the trade area is a significant means of getting the advertiser's message out.

Trade Area

The circulation area's 8,550 recipients was developed by design with the intention of distribution throughout the bulk of the Belle Fourche trade area.

The Beacon goes to every Post office mail recipient in Butte and Harding Counties, parts of Lawrence, Perkins, and Meade in South Dakota, as well as parts of Carter County Montana and Crook County Wyoming.

If you have mail delivered to you at any of the following zip codes in South Dakota you should receive the Beacon: 57717, 57720, 57724, 57755, 57762, 57776, 57760, 57760, 57688, 57758, 57649, 57650, 57651, 57758, 57779, 57793 (R002), 57783 (R001, R004, R005); and in Wyoming, 82710, 82711, 82712; and in Montana 59311, 59314, 59316, 59319, and 59332.

Our distribution of the Beacon has caused some confusion, because it is an abnormal way of distributing a newspaper.

Typically you pay your subscription, the paper adds your name and address to the list and you start to receive. If you believe the price is fair and the content is worthwhile you continue on. Well we did it the opposite: We send the Beacon out to everyone in the area and if you like what you see your welcome to pay a subscription. We set the price of the subscription to cover the cost of printing and postage to get it to you.

We hope that it contains at the very least one item that is of interest to you or someone in your family that makes it worthwhile to receive in the mail:

Subscriptions

Grocery specials, business information, church schedules, obituaries, prices of livestock sold locally, results of sporting events, or what happened 100 years ago!

We will continue to send the Beacon under our current permit. We will not be sending bills out for a subscription. If you believe it is worthwhile to have a local paper and to receive in the mail we appreciate your vote of support when you send a subscription. We started with \$25 if live in our permit delivery area, or read on-line. \$68 if we mail to you outside of our permit area.

We have had slight increases in postal and printing costs so for the upcoming year we are recommending \$28 for in the delivery area and \$75 for outside. We thank many of you that have sent more than recommended amounts. Know whatever amount you send it will go to the continuation of providing the local area with local information. State High School Rodeo Finals

Cain Birkeland's 423.5 point score in Boy's Cattle Cutting earned the Belle Fourche High School graduate first place honors at South Dakota's State High School Final's Rodeo this past week in Belle Fourche. He will lead a group of South Dakota rodeo competitor's to the National High School Finals Rodeo July 14-20, 2019 at the Sweetwater Events Complex, Rock Springs, Wyoming.

The top four finishers in each event advance to the National Finals.

Cain will be joined in National Finals cattle cutting by teammate Bradey Labrier, who finished in third place, and Brandon Volmer, Winner, and Jace Ullerich, Humbolt.

Another gold buckle finish came from Belle Fourche cowgirl, Shyanne Howell, who won the Pole Bending event. Molly Ryan, another Belle competitor took third place. They will be joined in Rock Springs in their event by Riley Donnelly, Elk Point and Jessica Woodward, Custer. Shyanne finished 15th in Barrel racing.

Belle Fourche roper Lan Fuhrer with healer Payton Pirrung, Hartford nailed down second place in the team roping. Lan also finished a respectable eleventh in the tie down roping.

eleventh in the tie down roping. Other team ropers qualifying for Finals are Rio Nutter, Rapid City and Bodie Mattson, Sturgis; Denton Good, Long Valley and Riley Hannum, Ft. Pierre: and Wyatt Tibbitts, Hot Springs and Tracer Olson, White River.

Belle's Chantel Kolb landed the number four spot in Breakaway Roping, and a trip to the Nationals. She finished in fifth place, just two points out





David Gleason Rathbun 84


David Gleason Rathbun, 84, of Nisland, SD passed away on Sunday, June 16 at his home on the farm.

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Working to Preserve Local History



Belle Fourche Historical Commission listened to a presentation from Sofia Mattesini, a Historic Preservation Specialist from the South Dakota State Historical Society, State Historic Preservation Office, Pierre at City Hall last week. DeEtte Goss, Laura Bennett, Barb and Ferman Clarkson, Sheila Frost and Mary Buchholz attended the presentation.

The Belle Fourche Historical Commission hosted a meeting with in City Hall last week with Sofia Mattesini, a Historic Preservation Specialist from the South Dakota State Historical Society. Sofia explained in detail programs that are available to assist communities for the preservation of historical buildings and structures in Belle Fourche. The Commission had applied for a grant for signage earlier this year and a change in Federal rules made signage ineligible for funding.

Mattesini and the group toured downtown Belle Fourche and the Band Shell at Herrmann Part and discussed various possibilies

There are individuals working on the complete restoration of the Band Shell at Herrmann Park. Concrete and masonary repairs had been made, but the above foundation interior is still in great need of repair.

It is often used for celebrations and band concerts.

Dr. J. L. Chassel, a local physician, donated the band shell to the City. It was built

in the 1950's and originally dedicated in 1954.

The local Historic Commission intends to see what help they may receive from the Historic Preservation office in repairing this legacy and active part of Belle Fourche history.

Committee members are Mary Buchholz, Nancy Cole, Gary Helmer, Darrin Newton, and Sheila Frost.

Pastor's Perspective

Have You Strayed From God's Path?

Have you ever been traveling and wandered off course a bit? I recently made a trip into a rural location in North Dakota. As I was heading back to Belle Fourche a few days later, I realized that I had never seen the scenery around me

before. I knew I had strayed off course so I pulled out my smart phone for GPS help and, sure enough, I had missed my turn about 10 miles back!

Have you ever been there spiritually? All who have been Christians for very long at all have probably experienced this at some point if they are honest. It is easy to wander off the path God desires for us. Once we come to our senses and recognize that things aren't right, what should we do? Well, James 4:6-8 will point us in the right direction if we will humbly read and apply the text to our lives.

In this letter, James was writing Jews who had become followers of Jesus. At some point in their journey some of them had wandered off course and become entangled with

some things that were against God's will. In James 4:4, James refers to them as spiritual adulterers! An adulterer is one who pledges their faithfulness to one and then transgresses with another. James was

writing to these believers and reminding them that they had pledged their fidelity to their Lord, but that they had transgressed with the world. So, in verses 6-8, he reminds them what they need to do to get back on track. And these are great

reminders for all Christians. First, in verse 6, we are instructed to humble ourselves before God and God will pour out His grace on us! What a wonderful promise! Sin is driven by arrogantly thinking that God's way is not as good as our way. But the promise here is when we come before God in humility, recognizing that we have erred from God's path, God will pour out His grace on

Second, verse 7 then instructs us to submit ourselves afresh and anew to God. The word used for submit in the original

language means "to place or arrange under." In other words, after humbling ourselves before the Lord, we should then kneel ourselves before the Lord, trusting in Him and His plan for us.

Third, we are reminded at this point to resist the devil and he will flee from us. Satan doesn't flee because we are scary or powerful people. He flees because, as I John 4:4 reminds us, "Greater is He who is in us than he who is in the world!" In other words, once we have humbled ourselves before Christ and placed ourselves in submission to Him, Satan is

terrified because of Christ in us! Finally, verse 8 tells us to draw near to God and He will draw near to us! This speaks to the personal nature of our Lord. As Christians, we do not serve a God who is far off. He is near to us and desires close relationship with us! This is so encouraging! So, maybe you have wandered off the path God has placed before you. If so, the order James 4 lays out for us is this: confess our sin to God, humble ourselves before God, submit to His Lordship, resist the devil, and then draw near to our great, personal God! And He will draw near to us!

Emma Singer was one of twenty five recipients of the Jim Sable \$1,000 scholarship. Jim, the founder of the USA Clay Target League has over fifty years experience as a firearms safety instructor and has long recognized the importance of hunting, shooting sports and other outdoor activities. He has always championed the symbiotic relationship between conservation funding and outdoor shooting sports activities, and believes that hunters and shooting sports enthusiasts are the best stewards of our environment. It is with relationship in mind the scholarship program was established.

Sable has announced that he has stepped down from his roles as Board Chair and President of the League. Sable started an after-school mentoring program at the Plymouth Gun Club in 2001. The success of that program led to the creation of the Minnesota State High School

Clay Target League in 2008. The program proved to be highly popular, and has become one of the fastest-growing youth extracurricular activities in America. In 2012 the program was reorganized under the USA High School Clay Target League moniker, and began expanding out to other states. Last year the League was reorganized again under the USA Clay Target League banner, and a college shooting program was introduced. Today the League is now the largest youth clay target shooting program in the nation, with nearly 30,000 students on over 900 teams expected to participate in League programs during the 2018-19

school year.

The League is the safest sport in school, with not one reported injury since the inception of the League in 2001. To participate in the League, each team must have the approval of their school's administration. The League is the only 100% school-approved clay target shooting sport program in America, and is a preferred vendor of the National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association.

The League attracts student athletes to participate in shooting sports while creating a 'virtual' competition among high school teams throughout each state. Family travel is minimal because practice and competition are conducted at a shooting range near the school's location. Conferences are determined by team size rather than geographic location for fair competition. $Athletes\ earn\ True\ Team \\ {\footnotesize \textcircled{\tiny \$}}$ scoring points as determined by their performance and ranking against all athlete scores within their team's conference. The team score and overall standing are calculated by adding the earned points from qualifying athletes and posted on the League's website. Athletes and their families track their individual and team performance on their phone, tablet or computer via the Shooter Performance Tracker®.

The League is the independent provider of clay target shooting sports for secondary and postsecondary schools. The organization's priorities are safety, fun, and marksmanship in that order.



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May Was a Weather **Record Breaker**

RAPID CITY - May of 2019 rewrote the record books across western South Dakota and northeastern Wyoming. Continuing the cold and wet trend of early spring, May was characterized by repeated bouts with well below normal temperatures and heavy snow, including snow on some days in late May for the first time on record.

Rapid snowmelt and heavy rain late in the month also contributed to widespread flooding issues, including record crests on portions of the Cheyenne and White rivers in western South Dakota. Roads throughout Butte County were closed due to high water and flooding within the city caused delays to a couple of major construction projects.

The National Weather Service Office has provided statistics on the monthly average temperatures and precipitation totals for several cooperative observer sites across the area, including where May 2019 ranks in the record books.

Hot Springs, Mission, Mt. Rushmore, Newell/ Belle Fourche and Spearfish recorded their coldest month of May on record with average temperatures around 48 degrees. This follows the second coldest month of February on record for the Newell/Belle Fourche

As for daily precipitation records several of those same cities saw record levels for several days during the month, particularly the period between the 18th and 22nd of the month. Most locations had never recorded snowfall from May 21 - 22nd including Newell/ Belle Fourche, Spearfish and Ft. Meade. During that period snowfall totals in the Black Hills region ranged from 4 to 8 inches on the plains to more than a foot in the hills. Pactola Dam recorded 19.6 inches of snow on May 22nd. Mt Rushmore had it's snowiest month on record with a 31-day total of 28.8".

There is a silver lining in late spring snowstorms. They contain a lot of moisture that is absorbed more efficiently into the soil than a rainstorm. And the temperatures tend to moderate quickly in the days following.

Although May snowstorms are rare they are not unheard of. The Mother's Day Blizzard of 1965 collapsed the roof of an airplane hanger in Spearfish. May snowstorms in 2005 and 2011 resulted in a few snow days for Black Hills area students. In fact many will remember June 3, 1998, when

Of the capital outlay fund the district has proposed \$1.65 million to support services with \$211,000 going to instruction. In food services the district will allocate \$685,000. The lion's share of revenue for food services comes from the Federal Government with \$395,500. Food sales to pupils and adults totals a bit more than \$287,000.

The budget will be submitted for final approval during the school board meeting July 15th.


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Anything Left in the Barrel?

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




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

Daugard Bronze Unveiled at State Capitol in Pierre

Former Governor Dennis Daugaard was honored Friday in Pierre by the "Trail of Governors" with a life-size bronze statue by sculptor James Michael Maher. Daugaard's hand is outstretched, making the American Sign Language sign for "I love you." In his other hand, Daugaard holds a shovel, evoking his enthusiasm for tree-planting and his commitment to maintenance and repair. That hand is also pinching a penny, a reference to his wellknown frugality. The sculpture was placed north of the Governor's Mansion on Governor's Drive, near the eastern shore of Capitol Lake.

Governor Dennis Daugaard served as the thirty-second Governor of South Dakota from 2011-19.

Daugaard was born on June 11, 1953. He grew up between Dell Rapids and Garretson on his family's farm, which his grandparents purchased in 1911 after they emigrated from Denmark. Daugaard's parents, Raymond and Florence, were both born deaf, making sign language the principal means of communication for his family. Daugaard attended a one-room country school and graduated from Dell Rapids High School

in 1971. He worked his way through USD - washing dishes, welding, and painting water towers - and graduated in 1975 with a B.S. in government. Daugaard then earned his law degree in 1978 from Northwestern University in Chicago, and worked in Chicago for three vears.

Daugaard moved back to South Dakota in 1981 to marry his high school girlfriend, Linda Schmidt. Two years later, they purchased the Daugaard family farmsite where, over the next year, they built their own home. Their children Laura, Sara, and Chris were the fourth generation of Daugaards to live on the family farm.

After working for nine years in banking, Daugaard in 1990 joined Children's Home Society of South Dakota, first working for eleven years as development director for the foundation, and then for seven years as executive director. Daugaard became involved in politics in 1996 when he was elected to the first of three terms in the State Senate. He was elected lieutenant governor in 2002, serving for eight years with Governor Mike Rounds.

Daugaard ran for governor in 2010, winning a five-way

Republican primary with more than fifty percent of the vote, and winning the general election that fall on a ticket with former House Speaker Matt Michels of Yankton. In 2014, the Daugaard/Michels ticket was reelected by the largest margin in state history.

Daugaard left office in early

2019, retiring to his home near Dell Rapids.

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


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
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BF Wins State High School Rodeo Team Title

BELLE FOURCHE - Once again the hometown club took home the team title form the 2019 South Dakota High School Rodeo State Finals. The Belle Fourche Broncs took top team honors with 1605 points, easily outdistancing second place finisher Faith High School.

Belle Fourche also took home the Buster Berry Team Trophy. This travelling trophy is awarded to the team who accumulates the highest point total in the traditional rodeo events. The Broncs totaled 352 points. This is the second year for the award and Belle Fourche

also won the award last year. The award is named for Earl "Buster" Berry of Scenic, SD, who was involved in organizing the first high school rodeo in the state of South Dakota. That event was held in New Underwood and was only the third of it's kind in the U.S. at the time.

Belle Fourche had a pair of state champions in Caine Birkeland who took top honors in Boy's Cutting (see page A1) and Shyanne Howell who took first in Pole Bending. The Broncs had great team depth with top five finishers in no less than / events.

This is the last year the state finals will be held in Belle

Fourche for at least the next two years. In 2020 the event moves to the Stanley County Fairgrounds in Ft. Pierre, SD. The dates have not been set but traditionally the event is held the 3rd or 4th weekend in June.

The top four finishers in each event at the state finals will advance to the National High School Finals Rodeo to be held July 14-20, 2019 at the Sweetwater Events Complex, Rock Springs, Wyoming.

Belle Fourche will send seven competitors to Rock Springs. Buffalo's Gilbert Sawyer also qualified for Nationals and will represent the South Dakota team in Goat Tying.

Vale Celebrates its 140th Year

VALE - Yesterday was somewhere around 140 years ago when Vale was founded and became the "Star of the Project" during its heyday. Now the home of approximately 150 people, Vale has quieted down for the most part, but on Sunday, June 9, the place teemed with many times that number with the celebration of its birthday.

The main street through Vale was lined on both sides with folks from all generations as they waited for the parade made up of floats, cars, clowns, trucks, horses, and fire engines. A potluck was held in the Community Hall with more than 200 people enjoying the fruits of their labor. Youngsters enjoyed sack races and other fun activities behind the hall. Stories were swapped and past years' experiences were shared as people gathered in and around the Community Hall.

Vale was founded by Andrew Rosander, a native of Sweden, who came to the United States in 1869. By 1880, he had located a claim on the Belle Fourche River where he built a dugout on the banks of Cottonwood Creek north of present-day Vale.

Rosander started the third post office in Butte County in 1881, along with a store in the area. His vision grew as he built a large two-story store, post office and hotel in 1885. The building was in use until 1937 when it burned down.

By 1905, the town had been platted with many of the streets named for members of the Rosander family.

Rosander continued to add improvements to the Vale community when he built a private irrigation system on Cotton-

wood Creek and then in 1908 when he dug an artesian well for the town's water supply. The Dutton family, long-time residents of the area, dug a second well in later years.

Growth of the Vale area boomed when sugar beets found a home at the U & I sugar factory built in 1927 in Belle Fourche. An annual celebration called Sugar Days began to be held to highlight the sugar beets grown in the territory.

It was a day filled with beet digging and topping contests, and prizes awarded for the largest sugar beet. The day concluded with dances to celebrate the abundant harvest. A Sugar Queen was crowned to reign over the event.

When the sugar beet factory closed in 1964, the event died out but was revived for a short time in the late '60s and then ceased all together.

The high school took on the name of Beet Diggers because of the sugar beets grown in the region. Vale became the only rural high school in western South Dakota in 1914.

The high school closed in 1967 and the grade school in 1983.

In the early years of the 20th century, cucumbers were also raised for pickling, both in the Vale and Nisland areas. The small cucumbers were added to large vat-tankers on the trains that traveled through.

Sugar beets and cucumbers no longer are grown commercially in the Vale area, but the rich soil and irrigation water supplied by the Belle Fourche Reservoir (Orman Dam) support crops for raising cattle and sheep production. The principle crops today are alfalfa and corn.

Vale is a representation of small town America and showed off its love for family, rural life, and the community they come from during the daylong birthday celebration.

Although the weather didn't really cooperate, with gray, overcast skies, wind, and often a drizzle, it didn't seem to stop these young fishermen. There were 41 kids, who along with parents and siblings, showed up to fish, trying to pull a bass or trout from the depths of the pond.

"We got a good deal on trout from Lindstad's trout farm," said Jo. The bass had been in the pond for over a year. "It's funny, nobody caught a trout." She said that you have to fish a bit differently for trout because the lure needs to be at the bottom of the pond where they like to hang out.

June 24, 1909

Articles of Incorporation have been filed at Pierre for the Belle Fourche Valley Railway Co. the proposed line of railroad will be from Belle Fourche through the irrigated district to the Government Townsite, 29 miles north east of Belle Fourche. Monday morning a crew of 17 Northwestern surveyors outfitted at Vale and gave their destination as 12½ miles northeast of there. John D. Kirk and Mahlon Van

Loon left the first of the week for Belle Fourche where they will load out supplies for the North Country. They will load back with wool. They expect to freight both ways until the wool season is over.

June 19, 1919

Mrs. N.A. Viken and daughter Marie experienced a runaway accident and the former was confined to the hospital for a couple days on account of bruises about the shoulders and both suffered more or less from shattered nerves. The accident was caused by the horse being frightened by an auto, combined with the breaking of a single-

A big school election was held at Vale Tuesday, nearly everyone turned out to vote for Consolidation. Miss Mae Scotney, Butte County School Superintendent, visited and gave a very pleasing address to the teachers and patrons.

June 20, 1929

The fire siren is being moved today to the top of the high tower immediately adjoining its former location in the city park. The additional elevation is thought to improve the operation of the siren. Fire Chief Otto Kraning, Joe Anderson and John Graber are expected to attend the Annual State Fire tournament at Hot Springs, June 15 to 28, as representatives of Newell Fire Department.

A 4-day Chautauqua program has been announced at Nisland to being Tuesday evening, June 25, the following days' afternoon programs are also to be given. The committee at Nisland reports their attention to bring a good class of entertainment to the Valley and appreciate the splendid co-operation given to them from the neighboring towns of Newell and Vale.

June 20, 1939

Despite the downward plunge in the mercury from a chilly wind that blew the length and breath of the Black Hills Sunday, the Passion Play of the Black Hills was dedicated and launched in impressive fashion. In a natural amphitheater on the western edge of Spearfish, giving the audience a commanding view of Lookout Mountain, a large crowd gathered for the evening ceremonies.

One of the most drastic curtailments of poor relief yet taken by any county in South Dakota became necessary last week as the Butte County Commission faced a shortage of funds. The Board was forced to stop the services of the county physician and to announce it cannot pay anymore hospital cases and is forced to set up a commissary where only the groceries necessary for the maintenance of life will be given to the very needy.

June 23, 1949

Harold G. Peterson, Newell, was among the largest graduating class of history at Princeton University's 202nd Annual Commencement exercises at Princeton, NJ last week. Mr. Peterson, son of Mr. & Mrs. Axel Peterson of the Newell Community, a 1939 grad of NHS, was the only graduate from SD this year and received a Degree in Bachelor of Arts. 41 different states and 10 foreign countries were represented out of 666 Sections.

Butte County has double prominence in the June 1949 issue of "The Readers Digest", a leading magazine in the US

and 14 foreign countries. A condensed article on the life of Sam H. Bober, prominent Newell seedsman and farmer has appeared in "Prairie Schooner", Boulder, CO written by Paul Friggens formerly of St. Onge also editor of "The Farm Journal". Friggens spent several weeks in Butte County gathering material for his story on Sam Bober "Chronicles of Americanization" a biography of Bober "From Russian Peasant to American Pioneer."

June 18, 1959

A pilot narrowly escaped injury when his Super Cub plane hit a tree and crashed it to the ground early Wednesday 5:30 AM. Dale Wright, Spearfish was flying to spray sugar beets on the Fred Homan farm northeast of Nisland. The plane owned by Arnold Kolb from Spearfish Flying Service, had just flown over the Homan house and was returning for another load of chemicals as the plane hit the tree when it swung around and crashed into the ground. Wright was able to crawl out and taken immediately to Belle Fourche Hospital with only facial cuts and bruises, being released in a few hours.

The Bud & Blossom 4-H Club who attended Club Camp

June 20, 1979

When Allyn Amundson was cleaning up debris in the building he bought on 3rd Street, downtown Newell, he found a Red Crown sign. The sign depicting the price of gasoline at 10 cents per gallon. He would appreciate any history on the sign or building, stop by Al's Plumbing, Heating & Refrigerator shop of you have information.

The temperature hit 103 degrees, breaking 20-year records. Humidity was only 12%, so fire danger was extreme. Otherwise June 11 through 15 was typical, a lovely June week. Wild roses are blooming and so many yards look beautiful with their spring flowers in spite of the heat and drought.




Pine Slope Personalities Brings Part of Roundup History to Life

The personages are pictured, with the personality who portrayed them at the event below.

Dan McCutchen, 1883-1943, a well known attorney and former mayor of Belle Fourche was an active member of the Commercial club and early Roundup Committee. He was portrayed by Jim Doolittle.

Faye Kennedy, 1919-2014, was a life time member of the Belle Fourche community-her parents had settled in Belle Fourche many years before she was born. She graduated from Belle Fourche High School, worked for the Belle Fourche

newspaper for over 50 years. Always working to make Belle Fourche a better place, she covered and promoted Belle Fourche and the Roundup. Lucy Cole was her portrayer.

Bill Schuft, 1919-1996, was a partner in the Wool & Sheep business with his father Max Shuft. He was part of the Roundup for many years and was on the National Board of Directors for the International Rodeo Association. Prior to the establishment of the PRCA, it managed 104 rodeos nationwide. Bill was portrayed by Vern Bills.

Peggy Davis, 1922-2014 was a rancher through and through. She worked her life in the support of things she loved: her family, the ranching industry, Belle Fourche

Vern Bills and the Black Hills Roundup. Peggy was portrayed by her granddaughter, Chandy Davis Olson.

Orval J. Brownfield, 1877-1974. Orval started making his way in the world at age 12 as a jockey racing horses against grown men-and winning.

Already an accomplished horse trainer (he started at age 10) he became a rancher in Montana, until he retired to Belle Fourche with his trained horse Candy. Candy, trained by Orval, knew many crowd pleasing tricks and was trained to do so without the use of a bridle or bit. Orval was portrayed by Stan Hefner.


Jim, who was a man of few words, was portrayed by his son Wilbur Newland. **Jane Countryman**,

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
