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Final Roundup Preps Underway

Ticket sales trending ahead of the 100th.

BELLE FOURCHE – Final preparations are underway for the 102nd annual Black Hills Roundup that will kick off with the annual Ranch Rodeo on June 30th followed by four rounds of PRCA rodeo concluding Sunday afternoon July 4th. After most rodeos were canceled last year, the award-winning Roundup is one of the longest continuously running rodeos left in America. And 2021 is shaping up to be a big year.

"Our ticket sales are well ahead of last year and in fact they are even ahead of the 100th," said Zeann Golliher, Roundup Media Chair.

Already tourism has picked up in the Black Hills region as the pent-up demand for travel and vacations outweighs the rising cost of gasoline at the pump. And Roundup officials are seeing that reflected in the growing interest for their event.

"I think a lot of folks are onboard, geared up and excited for this year," said Keith Anderson, Committee Chairman. "We're 10% ahead of ticket sales from the 100th and if that stays on track we may break attendance records."

According to Anderson all the contract personnel and specialty acts are in place and ready to go. Cowboy Kenny and his high-flying Steel Rodeo motorcycle acrobatics will return. Barrel man and rodeo entertainer Trent McFarland will bring his antics to the rodeo grounds. Powder River Rodeo and partners will again be providing NFR-class bucking stock and Steve Goedert returns for his third season in the booth

Despite a nationwide fireworks shortage Fritz Carlson,
who typically orders his shells
6 to 8 months in advance, will
oversee two nights of fireworks once again with enough
firepower to light up the night.
The shows will begin after the
rodeo on Friday night, July 2nd
and Saturday night July 3rd.
Without a pyro show at Mt.
Rushmore this year this will be
the largest and earliest show in
the state.

The Grand Parade entries are on par with last year and once again the July 4th signature event will begin with a B-1 Bomber flyover at 10:30 am. The 2-mile parade route will begin at 13th Ave and National Street, winding its way north-

City Cuts Ribbon on new Jones Park Splash Pad

BELLE FOURCHE – Just in time for our early summer heat wave the new city splashpad at Jones Park is now open. Mayor Randy Schmidt cut the ribbon to officially open the water attraction on Wednesday, June 16th surrounded by city officials, former Mayor Gloria Landphere and others who saw their two-year efforts come to fruition.

And like moths to a light bulb it didn't take long for nearby kids to find their way to the new splashpad to cool off and have fun. In fact, during a soft opening earlier in the week there were at dozens of youngsters taking a break from the 100-degree heat to enjoy the attraction's many features.

"We hadn't even advertised the opening and I drove by here and there must have been 15 kids already here," said Krysti Weed, City Engineering Assistant. "It was really enlightening to see all the kids laughing and playing and walking through the water having a great time."

The idea for the project began four years ago when Assistant City Engineer Steve Nafus took his kids to Spearfish and visited the small splashpad there. When he came back, he told Weed that the city of Belle Fourche should "get one of those."

Weed began doing research and located a Canadian manufacturer, Vortex, and began to put together a budget. Next, she went to Randy Kittle, Grants Coordinator with South Dakota GF&P, for help in applying for a matching grant from the state's fund for providing outdoor recreational facilities for public use. Gloria Landphere who was Belle Fourche mayor at the time, got behind the project and things began

progressing.
A matching grant for \$75,000 was awarded and the city budgeted the match for a total

Belle Fourche Convention Center Project Delayed But Still on Track

BELLE FOURCHE – The lot at the northeast corner of Hwy 85 and 34 in Belle Fourche was to be a beehive of activity by now, but nothing is moving.

Developer Doug Peterson and DA Peterson Company, LLC of Lemmon is planning to build a large hotel, restaurant, and convention center on the site but the recent rise in the cost of lumber has put those plans temporarily on hold. It now looks like groundbreaking will happen late summer to early

"We still are planning the project for this year," Peterson told the Beacon. "It has taken

a little longer to get things together. There were some reservations with our partners with material prices as high as they were."

Lumber prices rose more than 150% year over year in April. But since May's record high of more than 17-hundred dollars per thousand board feet prices have retreated about 43%. That comes as welcome news to the future of the project.

"We'll know more in the next two weeks for sure," Peterson said. "But I would say that we'll still try and get started by the

Peterson says they are aiming to get the concrete work in before the weather turns cold. Once foundations are done, and barring supply chain issues, he says there should be about a 6-month construction time-frame.

Timing is important for projects like this. Material costs are high but that is offset by low interest rates. As material costs drop it is likely interest rates will rise. Hitting that "sweet spot" is critical. According to Hollie Stalder, Belle Fourche Development Corporation Executive Director, there are at least three community projects on hold right with material costs as high as they are. But most, like Peterson, are planning to move ahead.

"We are actually pre-working a lot of stuff right now so we can be ready," Peterson said.

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

Forty kids participated in the track practices and 55 participated in the meet.







Sidelined with Broken Leg

in 2019.

Shane Proctor's charge to his sixth Wrangler National Finals Rodeo bid is on hold.

Proctor, the 2011 PRCA world champion bull rider, is sidelined after suffering a broken right fibula and damage to his right ankle after his 85.5-point ride on Andrews Rodeo's Rapid Fire at the 101 Wild West Rodeo in Ponca City, Okla., June 11.

"I got off and then my right foot stuck in the ground, and my body kind of twisted with the momentum of the bull and it brought my body over the top of my leg" said Proctor, 36. "It was just a freak deal. (Injuries) are part of the game. This isn't checkers."

Proctor said he's scheduled for surgery June 15 in Dallas.

"I'm hoping to only be out for six weeks," Proctor said. "This is going to be my sixth surgery, but this is the first time I've ever broken my leg. I will have an outside shot to get to the NFR no matter what.'

Proctor, who qualified for the NFR in 2011-13 and 2015-16, is 19th in the PRCA | RAM World Standings with \$24,763.

"I had a bad last month, but I had it figured back out and rode four of my last five bulls," Proctor said. "I love what I do."

Proctor did find a silver lining in his setback.

"I will get to spend more time with my family (wife, Haley, who is a PRCA specialty act performer, and daughter, Coulee, 6 months)," Proctor said. "Haley stays busy, and I get to be a part of it all."

Bull rider Jate Frost aiming to carve his own niche in **ProRodeo**

Having the last name Frost as a bull rider comes with high expectations.

The late Lane Frost is a ProRodeo Hall of Famer and a legend in the sport. Joe and Josh Frost, second cousins to

Lane, have six National Finals Rodeo qualifications between them, Joe in 2014-18 and Josh

Now, Jate Frost, 20, younger brother to Joe and Josh, is trying to carve his own rodeo niche.

"It would probably bother a lot of people (living up to the Frost name), but I just show up and do my job," Jate said. "It doesn't matter what your last name is you still have to

ride them. I love the pressure." Jate, who has been on his PRCA permit the last two years, posted an 84.5-point ride on Beutler & Son Rodeo's Fake Friend to finish second at the Woodward (Okla.) Elks Rodeo,

a ProRodeo Tour event that

concluded June 12. "That was a good bull," said Frost, who made his ride June 9. "I had him in Vernon (Texas) last month and he was good, but he stumbled at the end of the ride. I was excited to get on him again. He turned back right there into my hand and felt like a dream

"I had a little bit of luck earlier this year and I went through a rough patch of not staying on very much. I went home and practiced up and I'm feeling pretty good right now."

Frost earned \$3,024 for his performance.

In 2019, Frost earned \$17,934 on his permit, but he had his season cut short when he broke his left ankle in August in Heber City, Utah. The injury required surgery. In the COVID-19-marred 2020 season, he broke his right ankle in the practice pen when he was bucked off. He missed three months recovering.

"My first year (in 2019) I had

a really good year, and then I broke both my ankles and had to sit out, and that was rough,"

said Frost, 11th in the PRCA | Ram Rodeo Permit Standings. "Now, I'm riding in lacedup boots to give my ankles some protection."

After Frost's left ankle healed, he wrestled for Northwest College in Powell, Wyo., during the 2019-20

He posted an 8-8 record at 165 pounds and qualified for the National Junior College Athletic Association National Championships in Council Bluffs, Iowa.

Frost, a two-time high school state champion wrestler as a junior (145 pounds) and senior (170 pounds) at Union High School in Roosevelt, Utah, believes wrestling benefits him in bull riding.

"I wrestled from junior high on up," Frost said. "The mental game I learned from wrestling has helped me a lot in riding

In terms of bull riding, Jate was born into it.

"I didn't know any other way," he said. "Joe and Josh have taught me everything I know. I call and ask Josh every time I enter a rodeo what he thinks. Joe and Josh have been teaching me how to ride bulls since I was a little kid."

Jate, who stands 5-foot-9, is planning to buy his PRCA card in September.

"My goal for 2021 is to win the Wilderness Circuit and do well enough to get into all the big rodeos next year," Jate said. "I want to win rookie of the year and make the NFR in 2022. Those are my goals."



of \$150,000. The location at Jones Park was selected and Ainsworth-Benning was contracted for the work. COVID delayed the project for about 10 months and last Wednesday's opening couldn't have come soon enough for the kids.

"We did this for the kids, their parents, their friends, their grandparents and the community. And I just think this is wonderful and I am so pleased," said Landphere, with the sound of water splashing and kids playing in the background. "I'm just glad I could be here today to see the completion. This is great, isn't it?"

"It's pretty fun," said Esten Biegert while aiming a water gun at Mayor Schmidt. "I like the water guns. They are my favorite part."

"What a great asset to this community for the kids and the adults as you've seen today," said Schmidt. "Anything the city can do to bring families together is a good thing. And after a year of COVID it's a great thing to see people out here enjoying this."

"We're rolling the ball downhill a little faster."

In fact interest in the lodge and convention center is still at an all-time high. Peterson has picked up additional local investors in the project since the announcement last February.

As far as the scope of the project Peterson says that has not changed. The development will still include a three-story structure with 74 guest rooms, a 300-seat convention center, a restaurant, indoor swimming pool and a 1,200 square foot

fitness center that will be open to the public. The \$10 million project still has no official name but "Center of the Nation Lodge and Convention Center" has been suggested. The company runs similar lodges and convention centers in Lemmon, Newcastle, Bowman, and Lead. But this will be Peterson's largest project to date.

The accommodations will include family suites and ex-

"My view as an outsider is this is the missing link for Belle Fourche to be able to jump into the next size city," Peterson said. "When you see a three-story marquee hotel sitting there, they're going to think 'Belle is more than we thought.""

ward and then back south to end at 8th Avenue and National Street. Best viewing locations, according to veteran parade watchers, will be along 8th Ave., including Herrmann Park and along Elkhorn Street.

The downtown carnival will return to pre-COVID form with ticket day passes issued instead of individual ride tickets as there was in 2020.

"And that's reflected in ticket sales that are up over last year," Anderson said. "People will be spending \$25 bucks and letting their kids ride all day instead of \$200 on each individual ride."

The carnival opens on June 30th and runs through July 4th. Hours for the carnival will be 5:00pm until 11:55pm each evening.

Returning this year will be women's brone riding on July 2nd and 3rd with 8 women competing each night, including Cheyenne Frontier Days Champion Pearl Kersey. It will be the first time since the 1940's that the event has been seen in the Belle Fourche. Sanctioned by the Texas Brone Riders Association, it was common in the early days of the Roundup, according to Anderson. He estimates that the Roundup featured women brone riders for

its first twenty years.

The rules are similar to the men's ranch bronc riding, except women can ride with two hands: one on the buck rein and one on either the saddle horn or a rope tied to the saddle. Points are scored the same way as for the cowboy's bronc riding, with more points awarded if the woman rides one handed or fans the horse with her hat as she rides.

"It's an entertainment," said Daryl McElroy, coordinator of the Women's Ranch Bronc Riding. "It's a competition, and they're competing for money, but it's also entertaining."

Overall sponsorships are up this year as are sponsors for the Chutes for Charity golf tournament. The Chutes for Charity golf tournament has recorded 90 sponsors to date. More than 35 vendors will be onsite behind the grandstand during the rodeo this year.

"There will be a wide array of just about everything from popcorn and hot dogs to jewelry and saddles," Anderson said. "It's quite a sight to see them lined up when you walk in the gate."

Other events taking place during the annual Independence Day celebration will be the cattle drive down State Street on Wednesday, June 30th at 3:00pm, the community barbeque that same evening at 5pm prior to the ranch rodeo, the crowning of Miss Black Hills Roundup, Cowboy Church, July 4th cowboy breakfast at 7th and State Street, mutton bustin', slack, PRCA Steer Roping and street dances.

"And keep your eyes on the skies for a surprise, either Friday night or Saturday night," Anderson said.

Anderson is in his final year of a two-year term as chairman that had its challenges. During COVID last year the committee and volunteers put the rodeo together during a 45-day span and managed to maintain the event's status as PRCA Rodeo of the Year for a third-straight year.

Having the rodeo last year, when most events were cancelled, gave the Roundup extra visibility. This attracted participation from more than 1,000 rodeo-starved athletes and landed the event with live coverage on the Cowboy Channel+ app, rotating with a few other rodeos. This year the number of contestants will be closer to 900 but the rodeo's national visibility will be enhanced even more this year as the Cowboy Channel will showcase the event on its app and the network after July 4th as a solo presentation.

"Each year there seems to be more and more moving parts," Anderson said. "It has its challenges, but it is definitely rewarding too. I've made some great contacts and built relationships with people who've I've lived in the same town with and never knew before. It comes with a large workload, and you definitely lean on your spouse for a lot of help.

"I really just want to say thank you to everybody for the support, to the sponsors, the volunteers, and the committee who help out with the rodeo all year. It just shows you how the community can pull together and have the biggest week of the year," Anderson said.

Children's Western Wish recipients love the experience, said Mel Schmidt, Roundup volunteer and committee person. This year's Western Wish recipient is Emma Juelfs.

A few years ago, the little boy who was the Wish recipient was so excited to get his buckle that he had the Roundup chairman, Clay Crago, put it on his belt in the middle of the arena, during his presentation. "He couldn't wait," Schmidt said. "It's so surreal to see how excited these kids get. It's so rewarding."

Giving back is part of the Roundup's tradition.

"It's always been about giving back," Schmidt said. "And that's what we're trying to do. We want people to know they're not alone."

The Black Hills Roundup kicks off June 30 with a ranch rodeo at 7 pm. It continues with a performance at 7 pm on July 1-3 and a 3 pm performance on July 4. Family night is July 1; July 2 is Chutes for Charity night, and July 3 is Tough Enough to Wear Pink night. July 4 is Military and First Responders Day.

General admission tickets are \$15 for children 12 and under and \$24 for adults. Reserved seating tickets \$29-\$34. They can be purchased online and at the gate.

For the ranch rodeo on June 30, tickets are \$15 for children ages 12 and under and general admission tickets are \$20.

They were traveling in a Ford truck, and as it was raining when they left Belle Fourche. The picnickers were covered up with a big tarp. When near the James Cushing ranch on False Bottom creek one of the smaller girls in the party attracted the attention of the chaperone, who was riding in the driver's seat, by her cries. She complained of a severe headache and an investigation followed. It was found that the fumes of gas from the engine had asphyxiated five of the young ladies, who were in unconscious condition. The other girls in the party were all suffering from headaches, but believed their companions were sleeping, and but for the outcry of the small girl, at least five of the children would have been past recovery in a very few minutes. The unconscious girls were taken to the Cushing ranch and Dr. Fasser was summoned from this city.

Tourism Brings Newness and Strength

As we exit the COVID era and enter the summer tourist season, what better time to write about tourism which is the life blood of many communities and an untapped resource for others. I am reminded of the quote by Anamika Mishra when she said, "To travel is to open windows of the heart and welcome newness". That begs the question, is your community creating and offering newness to those who travel

through or come to visit? Due to many reasons, we have discussed in previous columns, most communities throughout the country are struggling financially. Revenue is slowly, or rapidly in some cases, being eroded. For most communities, there are few options to reverse this trend of local dollars leaving their community. That begs the question, what can communities do to slow or better yet, reverse these trends that will only continue to intensify in the future?

One way to slow or possibly reverse the outflow of dollars from your community is to find ways to attract visitors through tourism. The value of tourism is immense and ought not be understated. The power of tourism dollars can literally alter economic trends, outcomes and landscape in your community. It can indeed restore the vitalization needed for communities to grow and ultimately compete for survival.

While each community varies Building Main Street, not Wall Stree

slightly based on cost of living and other economic conditions, studies indicate tourism brings approximately \$500 per visit into a community over an average two-day stay. This

figure includes hotel, gas, shopping and food. Utilizing those figures, if your community can attract 10,000 additional tourists throughout the year, that is an additional five million dollars circulating through your community each year. It gets better. Studies also show those dollars will then recirculate throughout the community between three to seven times by those within the community. This equates to over fifteen million additional dollars circulating through your community each year. What will fifteen million additional dollars do for your business base and the city coffers charged with infrastructure and maintaining the city?

Needless to say, tourism is a high stakes game every community would be negligent to not pursue. Community leaders would be shirking their fiduciary duties of office by not actively pursuing those dollars. How might a community build the machine that promotes and attracts tourism? While there are many ways to grow this avenue of revenue, here is a simple three-step process that works.

First, realize, understand, and promote the value and vision of tourism. Regardless of where you are, you must get to

a point that you are constantly preparing and doing things that grow tourism. This is the most important frame of mind community leaders can have when it comes to your community's financial survival. It isn't a short sprint; it will be a marathon but a marathon with no greater satisfaction once completed.

Secondly, find unique things about your city and build upon them. As the quote above indicated, tourists are seeking new and unique experiences, not sameness. Tourists are seeking to find the heart and soul of a community, not the same old and easy to find anywhere experiences so many provide. Does your community have access to water, such as rivers or lakes? Does your community have a niche such as music, history and/or art etc.? Find at least one niche and magnify that niche to the best of your ability.


Thirdly, support organizations willing to create events magnifying your community's niches and talents. People travel for good events. Events can be car or bike shows, food festivals, unique music festivals, veteran's events, ethnic festivals, the list is endless. The real skill in this arena however is beyond just creating these events. Every event you concentrate community resources towards should be an event that can ultimately grow to a multi-day event. These are the events that attract

One additional element can't be overlooked as you begin to capitalize on these great events. This is the appearance and ambiance of your downtown. Tourists seek uniqueness. They seek experiences unduplicated



Newell School Board

School Board **Approves New Truancy Program**

Board also approves hiring of new maintenance director.

NEWELL - At their most recent monthly meeting on June 14, the board listened to information on the county truancy program from Butte County Assistant State's Attorney LeEllen McCartney, who has been working with Judge Michael Day to set standards for the local school districts.

"We've been working out a truancy program to address the underlying causes, to address the issue early," said McCartney. "There've been lots of studies done on truancy and how it impacts children's' lives. It is an indicator with problems of crime, it's gradual, and can have a whole host of facets like family issues, lack of transport,

McCartney said there are various ways a child would end up into juvenile court. One is when a citation is issued because of a current issue. She said this ends up in a status hearing and potential follow up.

Juveniles are committed to the Department of Corrections by the courts as either adjudicated delinquents or as children in needs of supervision (CHINS), as allowed by law, according to the sd.gov website. A child in need of supervision (CHINS) is defined by SDCL 26-8B-2 as any child tens years of age or older who, regardless of where the violation occurred, has violated any federal, state or local law or regulation.

McCartney said they are trying to prevent "any" child from ending up in the court system.

"If a kid has five unexcused absences, that is a sign of something being wrong," said McCartney. "In the truancy program we set up a diversion program, out of the juvenile system, which is a three-step program where truancy is addressed outside of court," she said. The program includes disseminating information through welcome back to school packets, so that parents and guardians know the program exists. It also includes an immediate meeting as soon as five unexcused absences happen.

That's for 'anyone' when five unexcused absences happen," said McCartney. "This avoids potential discrimination. A meeting where the interested parties get together to discuss



and make recommendations. There can be a referral to the truancy diversion program. But the diversion program is a mandatory meeting, where parent

and child goals are listed." She said the parties sign the attendance agreement, a contract to accept treatment and possible other things. There are mandated dates for completing the goals. It is focused

more on middle and high school aged kids, according to McCartney.

"How does this relate to homeschooling?" questioned Board Member Todd Youngberg. McCartney said that is another issue entirely as the state has not updated the home school requirements and will not do so until July 1, 2021.

Later in the meeting the board approved through a motion to accept the truancy program the county presented, with stipulations that the district work through the present truancy policy making any changes needed to mesh the two policies together.

A new transportation and maintenance director, Robert Witherspoon, was approved. Previous director Jeremiah Weeldreyer will be hired at \$25 per hour to train Witherspoon during the summer for an undefined amount of time, depending on need.

School Food Director Vicki Gifford reported that an agreement was made with Wall Meats to provide donated beef. She will ramp up the use of, especially hamburger-related

recipes, to include the beef in the meal plans. She also noted that there will be free and reduced meals all the way through August and September, at which point a new application will be made for free CARES-funded meals through the Department

of Agriculture for the 2021-2022 school year. A surplus auction will be held on July 13 with many technology-related items listed. There will be camcorders, computers and other items, which will

be made known to the public on the school website prior to the auction. There will also be three buses on the list, for a minimum bid of \$750. One bus was listed for surplus for trade-in and the chicken coop building that was discussed at the previous meeting was put on the list for next year's determination.

The group spent a bit of time discussing the possible purchase/rent of a new commercial printer for the ag-science building and where it would be located. Superintendent Andrew Fergen proposed locating it in the north end of the current special education room with a hole "punched through to the hallway," for access for other teachers. A new copier and the possible labor for access was discussed and at the end of that time the board determined to wait on the project for further information.

Principal Steve Schoenfish plans to have staff come in from July 19-22 to work on curriculum mapping, offering a stipend of \$250/day for 4 days-using CARES funding. "We can't make excuses and we need to do better," said Schoenfish referring to a better plan to educate the children in areas where the school was showing a deficit according to the state 'report card.' "You can go to the Department of Education website a compare (us) with other schools. But, there are lots of reasons why kids don't do

The superintendent reported that they did hire a teacher for the Title program for increasing the time for pre-school, and that a full-time paraprofessional will also be needed. He also said he wanted to send out a weekly email to all board members keeping them in the loop on happenings during the time between meetings.

The district will seek letters of interest to fill the one vacant spot on the board, advertising in July so that the new board, along with committee commitments can be ready to go at the beginning of the school year.

Asphalt Concrete Overlays Continue on U.S. Highway 85 Next Week

LUDLOW, S.D. – The South Dakota Department of Transportation says crews continue to work laying an asphalt overlay four miles south of Ludlow on U.S. Highway 85.

Traffic on U.S. Highway 85 will be reduced to one lane and guided through the project with the use of flaggers and a pilot car. A delay of up to 15 minutes can be expected while traveling

through the work area during daytime hours.

Work on the project includes an asphalt overlay, new centerline rumble strips, edge rumble strips, and pavement markings.

The prime contractor on the \$540,000 project is Anderson Western Inc. from Bismarck, ND. The overall completion date for the project is Oct. 29, 2021.

USDA Announces Dates for CRP General and Grasslands Signups

SOUTH DAKOTA, June 14, 2021 – The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has set a July 23, 2021, deadline for agricultural producers and landowners to apply for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) General signup 56. Additionally, USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) will accept applications for CRP Grasslands from July 12 to August 20. This year, USDA updated both signup options to provide greater incentives for producers and increase its conservation benefits, including reducing the impacts of climate change.

Both signups are competitive and will provide for annual rental payments for land devoted to conservation purposes.

"We are excited to roll out our new and improved CRP General and Grasslands signups," said Acting FSA State Director Joseph Schultz.

"Bottom line, CRP now makes more financial sense for producers while also providing a bigger return on investment in terms of natural resource benefits. The General and Grasslands signups are part of a broader suite of tools available through CRP to integrate key conservation practices on our nation's working lands."

General Signup Through CRP, producers and landowners establish longterm, resource-conserving plant species, such as approved grasses or trees, to control soil erosion, improve water quality, and enhance wildlife habitat on cropland. Lands enrolled in CRP also play a key role in mitigating impacts from climate change, and FSA has added a new Climate-Smart Practice Incentive for practices that sequester carbon and reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

FSA is also adding a one-time "inflationary" adjustment for payment rates, as well as having more flexibility on adjusting soil rental rates.

FSA opened the General Signup in January 2021 and extended the original deadline to July 23, 2021, to enable producers to consider FSA's new improvements to the program.

and pastureland and certain other lands, while maintaining the areas as grazing lands. Protecting grasslands contributes positively to the economy of many regions, provides biodiversity of plant and animal populations, and improves environmental quality.

FSA has updated the Grasslands Signup to establish a minimum rental rate of \$15 per acre, as well as new National Grassland Priority Zones.

How to Sign Up To enroll in the CRP General signup, producers and landowners should contact their local USDA Service Center by the July 23 deadline. To enroll in the CRP Grasslands signup, they should contact USDA by the August 20 deadline. While USDA offices may have limited visitors because of the pandemic, Service Center staff continue to work with agricultural producers via phone, email, and other digital tools. To work with FSA, producers and landowners should contact their local USDA Service Center. Contact information can be found at farmers.gov/service-locator.

More Information on CRP Signed into law in 1985, CRP is one of the largest voluntary private-lands conservation programs in the United States. It was originally intended to primarily control soil erosion and potentially stabilize commodity prices by taking marginal lands out of production. The program has evolved over the years, providing many conservation and economic benefits. The program marked its 35-year anniversary this past December.

Rounds, Tester, Grassley Unveil Legislation to Address Anti-Competitive Practices in Meat Processing Industry

Meat Packing Special Investigator Act will create new dedicated office within the Department of Agriculture's Packers and Stockyards Division

WASHINGTON – U.S. Senators Mike Rounds (R-S.D.), Jon Tester (D-Mont.) and Chuck Grassley (R-Iowa) announced new, bipartisan legislation to address anticompetitive practices in the meat and poultry industries that threaten the nation's food supply and national security following the ransomware attack on JBS, the country's largest meat supplier.

"Congress knew in 1921 what we know today - anticompetitive behavior in the meat packing industry hurts both consumers and producers," Rounds said. "Unfortunately, packer concentration in the beef industry is more consolidated today than it was when the Packers and Stockyards Act was first signed into law 100 years ago. South Dakota cattle producers are going broke, while consumers are paying an over-inflated premium for beef at the grocery store. It's long past time to address this problem. Our legislation strengthens USDA's ability to investigate harmful anticompetitive behavior and to apply the Packers and Stockyards Act as intended."

"For years, unfair, anticompetitive practices in the meat packing industry have hit Montana ranchers where it hurts the most—in the wallet—and put our rural communities and family agriculture way of life at risk," Tester said. "On top of that, corporate consolidation is a direct threat to our national security, because a single cyber attack that threatens the very food we eat is proof that some-

thing must be done, and fast. That's why this bill is so important—it devotes the needed tools to USDA to shore up our national security and address anticompetitive practices in the industry that threaten Montana ranchers and consumers."

"Increased consolidation is driving concerns about competitive market access for Iowa livestock producers," Grassley said. "The recent cyberattack added to existing vulnerabilities in our food supply chain, underscoring the importance of protecting the livelihoods of our family farmers. Food security is national security. This bill provides USDA with the necessary tools to beef up enforcement of the Packers and Stockyards Act, increase coordination with DOJ, FTC, and DHS and to foster a fair and functional marketplace for farmers and consumers alike.'

The Senators' bill, the Meat Packing Special Investigator Act, would create the "Office of the Special Investigator for Competition Matters" within the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Packers and Stockyards Division.

The new USDA special investigator will have a team of investigators, with subpoena power, dedicated to preventing and addressing anticompetitive practices in the meat and poultry industries and enforcing our nation's antitrust laws. They will coordinate and act in consultation with the Department of Justice and the Federal Trade Commission and create a new

bridge between the USDA and the Department of Homeland Security to protect the continuation of the food supply and increase our national security. Background:

Since he was elected to the Senate, Sen. Rounds has worked to provide solutions to the problems faced by independent cattle producers and beef consumers. Most recently, he:

Led a group of 26 colleagues with Sen. Tina Smith (D-Minn.) in calling on the attorney general to investigate the meatpacking industry to determine if antitrust violations exist.

· Addressed cattle producers during a virtual town hall focused on meatpacker concentration in the cattle industry.

Reintroduced legislation with Sen. Angus King (I-Maine) to allow meat and poultry products inspected by state Meat and Poultry Inspection (MPI) programs to be sold across state lines.

Introduced bipartisan legislation to foster more competitive cattle markets by requiring that a minimum of 50 percent of a meatpacker's weekly volume of cattle purchases take place on the open or spot market.

Introduced legislation which would outlaw foreign beef from being labeled as a "Product of the U.S.A." and make certain that label only goes on beef and beef products exclusively derived from animals born, raised and slaughtered here in the United States.

Governor Noem Launches Website for Medical Cannabis Program

PIERRE, S.D. – Today, Governor Kristi Noem, along with the South Dakota Department of Health and the South Dakota Department of Education, launched medcannabis.sd.gov, a website to answer questions and provide information about the upcoming medical cannabis program set to take effect on July 1, 2021.

"One of my jobs as governor is to make sure that the will of the people and all constitutional laws are enforced," said Governor Kristi Noem. "I want South Dakota to have the best, most patient-focused medical cannabis program in the country. I've heard from people who are hurting and are hopeful for relief. My team is 100% committed to starting this program as quickly and as responsibly as possible for South Dakota."

Medical cannabis will be legal on July 1, 2021, after the voters of South Dakota passed Initiated Measure 26 in November 2020. The medical cannabis program is on schedule. The Departments of Health and Education are creating and will operate the new regulatory program to ensure the safety of patients, students, and the public in this new industry.

"We are working hard to

streamline the process to get medical cards out to people," continued Governor Noem. "Other states have made mistakes that we do not want to repeat, so we have been careful in our approach."

In conjunction with the

website, Governor Noem also launched a new public service announcement (PSA) to tell the people of South Dakota where they can find more information about the medical cannabis program.



GFP Proposed Firearm Antelope Season

The proposed firearms antelope season would run from Oct. 2-17, with a total of 4,857 licenses. In addition to the regular licenses, the proposal would also create a "Special Antelope" application. This would allocate 50 resident and 50 nonresident any antelope licenses that would be valid on private property only. Individuals who are successful in obtaining a special antelope license may not apply for a West River or East River

antelope license in the initial or second drawing or apply for a leftover special antelope license.
