## Is On Again, Off Again Councilman On or Off Again?

Belle Fourche Councilman Troy Shockey is being accused of excessive absences and is facing the vacation of his City Council seat.

Shockey was first elected to the council in 2015. He later resigned in May of 2016.

He ran again for the seat and was unopposed in 2018.

The Monday regular meeting of the Council had agenda item #26: Set date for a special election to fill the Ward 1 Alderman vacancy for September 8th, 2020.

The disposition of that item was not available at press time. In February of this year the Council adopted a new section of city ordinance that would enable the board to penalize a councilperson for excessive absences punishable by vacation of their position. Any member who fails to attend three consecutive meetings shall be deemed to have resigned their position.

Shockey was officially notified that his position as a Ward 1 councilperson had been vacated.

Shockey said his schedule makes it difficult to make meetings, and he apparently has run afoul of the city's ordinance that requires attendance at all of the meetings or an explanation of why they were missed. But he feels he was being singled out for punishment.

A three-phase plan was presented by Adam Nowowiejski, school district Activities Director, at the board's regular meeting on June 8th. "The COVID-19 pandemic continues to be a fluid situation but with the guidance from NFHS (National Federation of High School Associations), the SDHSAA and the CDC we're making strides to move towards some form of normal," Nowowiejski reported. "Dr. Willard and I have worked closely together to come up with a potential 3-phase plan to slowly open our athletic facilities for the summer to be preparing for the upcoming fall seasons.'

Sunday June 14th was Flag Day and a tribute to our nation's flag and its history was held at the Center of the Nation Monument at the Tri-State Museum and Visitor's Center.

The program was put on by local Cub Scout Pack 19, under the direction of Scoutmaster Kellen Willert, who served as Master of Ceremonies.

## Downtown Business District Helps Keep 11th Annual Cattle Drive Part of 101st Roundup



The Re-opening plan covers the athletic facilities within the Belle Fourche School District. The three phases are rolled out according to date and prior to moving onto the next phase there should be a downward of flat trajectory of documented cases of COVID-19. Each phase covers a 14-day period. Phase one is currently underway and will continue until June 23rd. If all goes well phase two will begin June 24th and run through July 8th. The 11th Annual BH Roundup Cattle Drive will take place at 3:00 pm on June 30th in part because of the support and encouragement of the Belle Fourche Historic Downtown Business District.

The group raised funds to offset associated costs to continue the annual event.

The spectator favorite is a taste of the old west in the way Belle Fourche used to be, as one of the largest cattle drive hubs in the western United States. The Black Hills Roundup recreates this tradition with a cattle drive through downtown Belle Fourche on State Street headed to the Roundup Grounds. In the 1800's, before cattle trucks, and before railroads criss-crossed the west, the best way to get cattle from the ranch to the market was drive them with cowboys on horseback. It was common for wranglers to move as many as 60,000 head to market, from Mexico to the major rail heads like Belle Fourche.

That heritage continues during the opening day of the Roundup. You will see longhorn cattle herded by mounted cowboys and trailed by wagons, just like in days gone by!

The practice has grown from that day into a modern progres-


sive clinic that includes himself, four additional veterinarians and a proficient support staff.

### Pastor's Perspective is provided by Evelyn Weaver of Pastor's Perspective St. James Episcopal Church in Belle Fourche. "Remember, I am with you always."

In Genesis, we read the creation story found in chapters one and two. God made the heavens and the earth and all that are in them. And God saw that it was good! 

## Tilted Gallery to Open in Historical State Street Building

According to local historical documents, 516 State Street is one of the original buildings in Belle Fourche. The whole building was moved into town from the original location in the once thriving Minnesela site in 1895.

One hundred twenty-five years later, an artist and a writer are now in residence, calling it The Tilted Gallery. "My husband Larry and I began renovations early this year and our amazing contractors revealed the original tin ceiling and unusual tin walls, along with the thin slat floors. It's been so exciting," says co-owner and artist in residence, Hilea Hutchinson. "Restoring the raw, baseline integrity to this building has created an amazing studio/gallery space...and a spacious writing office for Larry, too!"

Hilea creates Bio-Energy Paintings, a style based in depicting the living electrical energy field intrinsic to all life. "I really translate the energies of nature and emotion into colors, forms, and portray the energy flows. It's a personal style, somewhere between Abstract and Impressionism. I really run the gambit between the two."

"The Tilted Gallery gives me the space to create and show the work. This building is a great home base." A home base in which the Hutchinsons plan on us-


The Tilted Gallery plans to open sometime later in the summer. "We're taking it easy right now," says Hilea, "I never thought we would be starting a business during a pandemic, so we're also making decisions based on that. All in all, we're very grateful to be part of this building's history and part of the downtown area.

As to the name: The Tilted Gallery, Hilea explains with a smile, "After 125 years of action and adventure, from the cattle booms to the 21st century, the building tilts a little to the west. We completely embrace being a part of that history!"

Hilea is an award winning artist who creates Bio-Energy Paintings of natural themes.

## **Get PT First During the COVID-19 Pandemic**

A study published in the Journal of Orthopaedic and Sports Physical Therapy showed that patients who obtained physical therapy via direct access had significantly lower medical costs-an average of \$1,543 less per patient than those who chose referral from a physician. They also had significantly fewer visits and spent significantly fewer days in care.

Roundup will be featured in a one-hour documentary to air on The Cowboy Channel. Highlights of the rodeo, the rich history of the event and the stories of the community that have supported it for more than a century will be contained in the special,

according to the network. The broadcast will be shown sometime after the event, although a specific air date has not yet been set.

The Roundup is one of only a few national rodeos that will take place during the 4th of July holiday. Normally the time period is jam-packed with events in what competitors refer to as "Cowboy Christmas" due to the amount of prize money that is available. This year, due to COVID-19, many of the events have been postponed or canceled. As a result, interest in the 2020 Roundup is at an alltime high among the nation's top cowboys.

One rodeo that is taking place over the 4th of July is the Prescott Frontier Days Rodeo, which bills itself as America's

It will highlight the competition from this year's rodeo, tell the story of the event's origins and then show the color and pageantry that surround the rodeo. This will include the parade, fireworks, ranch rodeo, carnival, queen pageants and charity events. The program will also profile the community of Belle Fourche and delve into the generational support that the Black Hills Roundup has received from its many volunteers since 1918.

meetings. This is taking an active member of the council, and trying to remove him from his seat, a public and elected seat, and over what?" he asked.

Schockey feels the State already has an ordinance in place, so the city's version is redundant, and feels this is a personal grudge against him on the part of Mayor Gloria Landphere and Ward 1 Councilor Monte Talkington. "Removing me from the council is disenfranchising the voter, and I hope the voter takes heed or a warning from this" he added. He went on to say he hopes the voters remove Landphere from office and that this is nothing more than a personal vendetta against him. Schockey feels he is being singled out because in his words, "I'm a squeaky wheel. It stems initially from the issue with the liquor store and me wanting an oversight committee over the Mayor and the Finance officer. Mayor Gloria Landphere says this is not about vendettas. "Our ordinance states that if you miss three meetings in a row, there is still a provision to

talk with the council and have the absence excused. So that's basically it in a nutshell," she said.

She added that Shockey talking with Council President Vern Hintz didn't qualify, as he needed to talk with the whole council. And as for his claim of a vendetta against him, Landphere was adamant that was not the case

"It wouldn't be any different if it was another council person," she said.

As for the issue of oversight of the liquor store, she stated the council told Shockey the Legal and Finance office was having oversight of the municipal liquor store during the search for a general manager. "Besides, all committees have oversight of any department," she added.

Landphere commented that Shockey was the only council member to vote against the attendance ordinance, so one could see why he was unhappy.

As for the state statute on attendance, municipalities are allowed to craft their own ordinances to fit their needs. Landphere reiterated that this wasn't meant to pick on one person, that's the way the ordinance works.

Ward 1 Councilor Monte Talkington echoed that sentiment, saying this was an issue that was raised by several of his colleagues.

"This was never meant to single out one person. I had four or five members approach me about absences since this was a problem before," he said. He recounted how the state enacted the ordinance and City Attorney Dwight Gubbrud was asked to draft an ordinance for the city.

"This is a job that we get paid for. You can't do your job if you're not there," he said. He agreed that Troy Shockey's talking with Vern Hintz wasn't enough, that he needed to talk with the council.

"I can see how Troy has a problem with this, but we simply can't do business with a lot of absences. Something needs to be done," said Talkington.

The Beacon will report next week on the Councils actions.





allowed indoors or outdoors. Among the many general protocols included, according to the plan, are no mandatory activities (volunteer only), no direct physical contact between athletes of staff, no locker room use during phase 1 and 2 (will be available for phase 3), no drinking fountains available at any time (until phase 3), no sharing of clothing or water bottles, a limit on activity to 60 minutes, all equipment cleaned and disinfected after each use, travel to out-of-state "hot spots" is greatly discouraged and no training room facilities will be available.

The wearing of masks is not required although coaches and students may choose to do so. Physical distancing will be observed, and participants

are encouraged to self-check at home for any COVID-like symptoms and report them to the coach or director in charge. All athletes will be screened by BFHS staff before entering workout facilities, including a temperature check and answering COVID-19 related questions. No parents or spectators will be allowed in the athletic facilities during the threephased opening plan.



Local civic clubs such as the Lions, Rotary, Shriners, Exchange, Young Professionals, Kiwanis, American Legion, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and religious groups are loaded with talented and visionary members. Imagine a community harnessing the power and abilities of the majority of their local civic organizations to assist in community transformation. Put another way, a community that can synergize with each of the four legs of their community transformation stool will succeed in ways they would never have imagined. While each of these mentioned clubs and others can provide great leadership in the transformation building planning, they are also capable of tackling various projects that might become a part of the final plan. Once again, imagine if each of the above listed and other civic groups were all tasked with a small portion of the community's final plan. The most successful community action plans will involve as many groups and individuals as possible.



# **County Commissioners Tour NVN, Butte County Sites**

day, June 11, the county commission, several employees and media representatives participate in a road tour of Butte County. The group which included Commissioners Kim Richards, Frank Walton, Karrol Herman and James Ager, along with employees, Dwayne Heidrich, Lori Johnston, and Elaine Jensen, toured from the southwestern part of the county through northeast.


The group started at 9 a.m. at the county courthouse. They gave the old red prisoner transport van one last outing before it was donated to the city. They first went to Wood Road and Habeck Road, where they viewed a fence line that has caused the commissioners a great deal of time in trying to resolve issues there. They also looked at a bridge that is shared with Lawrence County From there they traveled to Helmer Road, off Highway 34, to look at another bridge shared with Lawrence County.

"This one is stuck in engineering," said Commissioner Kim Richards. "Lawrence County is doing the preliminary work and engineering, and we're just sharing the cost." Several places where the county highway department is at work were viewed, including a work crew on Helmer Road to the north and a spot on Snoma Road where they are pulling the shoulders.

This is a process where a disk, mounted to the side of a grader pulls dirt, gravel and binding material up onto the road. Then the road is re-worked to bring back a proper crown and the material from the ditch is worked in. This is a cost-saving measure for the county as all the gravel that has collected in the ditches for years is utilized, along with binding material to keep it in place. They stopped to look at the Mahoney bridge, where the north side of the big box culvert has caved away and caused undermining issues

where the two portions of the culvert have separated underground. The county dug up the center of the road and did a temporary repair until the culverts can be replaced.

Brosz Engineer Jason Hanson met the group at the Whitewood Valley bridge on the southeast edge of Nisland to discuss preservation grant work that will be done on the bridge, including cleaning drains on the south end that are plugged and adding a 100-foot portion of blacktop at the southern edge.

"This will help keep gravel from the road from pulling up on the concrete of the bridge and eroding it," said Hanson. Currently the county has placed a speed zone flashing sign at the south end warning drivers to slow to the 25-mile-per-hour speed in the town.

With a pit-stop at the Nisland Church, the group was off to Stonelake Road and Dillinger Road to view the reworked bridge on Dillinger and then on to Orman Road to look at the closed bridge there.

This closed bridge has been a big concern to the commission for a long time. The bridge on Winkler Road, which was completed this past year, is considered an alternate route for east-west traffic, but many landowners were still utilizing the partially closed bridge, traveling with farm equipment and trucks, until the county closed

## Then and Now in Newell

### June 23, 1910 The school election held Tuesday at the Wilson homestead was rather a tame affair there being no opposition. The following were elected; W.H.

Phillip Chairman, Mr. Kenaston Treasurer and Mr. Partridge Secretary. A 20 mill levy was voted for school purposes.

Rev. E. Jenny will hold a series of meetings in the Blaine School house, 4 miles west of Newell every night for a week or 10 days, beginning Friday June 24. Mr. Jenny is the equal of any pulpit speaker in the state. Come and hear him.

Phaley Sprague and John Toma, local livery and feed barn proprietors attended the ball game in Vale Sunday. ### June 17, 1920

R.J. Koerner has secured the local agency for the Overland cars. He brought a run-a-bout down from the Hills the later part of the week and sold the same to O.E. Farnham.

Beyer Aune Superintendent of the US Experiment Farm at Newell went to Rapid City Saturday to attend a meeting of

County Agents. Owing to the heavy rain, he left his car there and returned home by train on Sunday.

We understand Eskil Youngberg is dealing for a sale of his confectionary store, but nothing has been closed at this writing.

#### June 19, 1930 A request for \$3,500 to

be used in improvement of a recreational park at Orman Dam was denied by the state Game & Fish Commission recently because the commission was advised that it could not appropriate such funds legally.

Cutting scrapes among the Mexican beet workers are becoming altogether common in this section. Wednesday a Mexican was brought to the Newell Hospital suffering with numerous knife wounds and a great deep cut on his arm. Authorities here located the assailant and are today investigating the case.

The Spearfish Canyon road first started 19 years ago but delayed because of difficult construction, an auto road through Spearfish Canyon will be completed within the next few weeks, barring unexpected delays. Blasting their way through rocks and forests, construction crews, working from the lower end of the canyon, are nearing Iron Creek where the present upper canyon road ends. Between the upper and lower canyon roads was 1 mile of difficult construction, with rocks and heavy forests, blocking the way. Adding to difficulties, a landslide a few weeks ago blocked the route and blasting again was necessary to clear the way.

### June 20, 1940

US Officials from the Department of Agriculture say the famed Texas longhorns should be added to the "Vanishing Americans" List. At least that is what a report of the biological survey indicates, for it says that this animal, which once roamed large in the history of the west, is on the verge of extinction. Once there were 10,000 of these rangy beasts, now out of that vast number there are only 250 pure-strain longhorns left. He is being bred out of extinction, in his veins now flow the blood of the Short horn and the Hereford, which reduced the length of his horns, put meat on his lanky sides and cooled his wild spirits.

### June 22, 1950

The recount of the recent Primary Election Republican vote in Butte County for the Sheriff's nomination is expected to occur on June 26, it was announced at Belle Fourche this week. Maurice Cavin, Belle Fourche who was behind consist of the County Judge, County Auditor and County Treasurer.

Farmers and ranchers using aerial sprayers in weed and insect control were warned this week to employ only spray operators certified by the South Dakota Department of Agriculture, director of State Aeronautics Commission Lyndon V. Hanson pointed out. Records are maintained of all SD spray pilots and operators who do not have a current permit in their possession are in violation. Spray operators may be difficult to locate at a future date, for this reason they are registered so as to protect the customers who employ them for the eradication of weeds and insects. As of June 15, the Aeronautics Commission office has approved 60 spraying applications, of which 20 are out-of-state pilots applied.

### June 23, 1960

The Newell Community Club considered a suggestion that it recommend to the State Game, Fish & Parks Department that it close Newell Lake to fishing until such time as the fish planted there have


increased in size and numbers to warrant its re-opening. A vote favored such action, however Art Noste directed that it be delayed until after the next regular meeting in order that all persons interested might express their views.

A new farm product, chicken frankfurters, is being tested in the New York Experiment Station. The idea is to help poultry men take advantage of consumer's desire for convenient fast foods. But one wise cracker said: "It's a sign the chicken business is going to the dogs."

If you wake up and find aluminum foil, don't become alarmed, state Civil Defense Director Major General Homer E. Jensen said this week. Be assured residents of SD that the thin strips of aluminum foil that have been reported in several areas are harmless. Numerous inquiries have been received at the Civil Defense Office from ranchers reporting that the foil was found on their ranches. Authorities at Ellsworth Air Force Base near Rapid City have advised that the foil is used by the 28th Bombing Wing at E.A.F.B. in training flights. The strips are called "chaff" and are dropped by high flying bombers to confuse ground radar; it is the same type of material that was used in WWII.



#### 120 Years Ago June 14, 1900

S.W. Moses and family of Bixby were visiting friends in town yesterday.

### From A1 FLAG DAY

15 Stars & Fifteen Stripes one for each state. This flag was used in the War of 1812, making it the "Star-Spangled Banner" of our National Anthem. It was used for the next 23 years, until 1818. (3) 20 Stars & 13 Stripes: In 1818 Congress decided that adding a new stripe for every new state would lead to lots of confusion so they passed an act stating that after July 4th of that year the flag would have 13 stripes and 20 stars, and a new star would be added for each state but not a stripe. (4) 29 Stars & 13 Stripes: From 1846-1861, the flag did not change very much except for the addition of a few stars. States were being added so quickly that during the short 2 years of the Mexican War, there were 3 different forms of the flag, the final one having 29 stars. (5) - 36 Stars & 13 Stripes: From 1861 to 1890, the flag continued to gain stars. During the Civil War, it was suggested that stars be removed for the states that had seceded. However, this did not happen and during the last year of the Civil War, our flag had 36 stars. From 1890 to 1912 the Flag changed frequently as the territories beyond the Mississippi River achieved statehood and the country prospered. The United States wanted to take its place among the great nations.

In 1898 the Spanish-American War was fought under the 45-star flag. (6) – 48 Stars & 13 Stripes: The 48-star version of the Stars & Stripes is rather remarkable for its long career., with the admission of New Mexico and Arizona to the Union in 1912. It remained unchanged until 1959. It is this flag to which President Wilson referred in his 1917 Flag Day message when he said:

...."This flag, which we honor and under which we serve, is the emblem of our unity, our power, our thought and purpose as a nation. It has no other character than that which we give it from generation to generation. The choices are ours. It floats in majestic silence above the hosts that execute those choices, whether in peace or in war. And yet, though silent, it speaks to us – speaks to us of the past, of the men and women who went before us, and of the records they wrote upon it." .... (7) – 50 Stars & 13 Stripes: The flag changed in 1959 when Alaska was admitted, and another star was added. The 49-star flag only lasted a year because in 1960, Hawaii was admitted into the United States, and the present 50-star flag officially went into use on July 4, 1960. Thus, in a little less than 200 hundred years, the Stars and Stripes increased its constellation from 13 to 50 bright and shining stars. It reflects the story of the American Union which has prospered and grown from a small beginning of 13 colonies along the Atlantic seacoast to its present wealth and power, comprising 50 states which extend from ocean to ocean and beyond.

The ceremony concluded with the trumpet playing Taps. Plans are already underway to make the ceremony an annual event.

ter), cheese, non-homogenized milk, farm fresh eggs, heavy cream, meats, (lamb, chicken, beef), canned goods, and fresh baked bread. We will grow most of the produce available at the store. Currently there is a selection of local asparagus, tomatoes, kale, spinach, and lettuce from other local producers."

Cox said in the future they plan to have their own tomatoes, sweet corn, popcorn, watermelon, eggplant, okra, cabbage, carrots, beets, sweet peppers, cucumbers, zucchini and yellow squash. They will also still source from other local producers.

"We opened the store to give our customers the option of daily access to local South Dakota producers," said Cox. "Camylea was the baker. At the farmers market we were able to sell under cottage food laws. Since we opened the store, we would need a commercial kitchen to bake the goods to sell at the store." They have ceased this option for now. But everything available in the store comes from South Dakota. Besides the Cox's own produce/products they source from Maude Hog and Cattle of Caputa, Kitzan Family Farms, of Nisland,

Kaisemeister's of Frankfort, Stensland Family Farms of Sioux Falls, Happy Hydros of Pukwana, Sunrise Hives and Lund Valley Farms, both of Spearfish, Nerdy Nuts, Dark Canyon Coffee both of Rapid City, Cedar Creek Gardens of Midland and Ben's Produce of Box Elder.

Kyle has his own land, separate from Cox Farms, LLC and has a high tunnel, 20 acres of sweet corn, and a very goodsized garden. He also grows alfalfa and oats on his property and hires out to Cox Farms LLC.
