

For over 102 years, starting in 1918, a Roundup became Belle Fourche's way to celebrate the birth of our nation. The USA is 243 years old this July 4th, and Belle Fourche continues its Roundup tradition by celebrating the 100th Roundup in 2019.

In 1994 at the time of the Roundup's Diamond Jubilee, 'Belle Fourche Post' writer Faye Kennedy said, "It's the rodeo and also much more. It's homecoming with pageantry, family and class reunions, concerts, a mile-long parade, fireworks, a fly over, street carnival, Miss Rodeo South Dakota pageant, 10K run, and

Faye's "and more" has not slowed down the past 25 years, as the Roundup time has become somewhat like the Rally in Sturgis, our neighbor to the Southeast. It has grown beyond three top of the line PRCA rodeo performances to an event filled couple of weeks. People come a week or more prior to the 4th and stay and play; others show up starting on the 4th and stay a week or more after. Truly, not just a Roundup, but a tourist and family destination

spot. It is often said, "Belle Fourche is the best place to be on July 4th", or "Belle Fourche knows how to do the 4th of July right!' We would agree!

The Belle Fourche Chamber of Commerce, following this concept has initiated an "Independence Days" calendar (see page B7). It notes, promotes, and encourages support and enjoyment of the 100th Black Hills Roundup, but also highlights all of the activities scheduled on both ends of, and during the week of the Roundup. The Class Reunions, the Cowboy Band, Center of the Nation Concert Associations July 7th concert, and much more.

Belle Fourche Community Center in Line for Changes

news@bellefourchebeacon.com BELLE FOURCHE - The Belle Fourche Area Community Center (BFACC) is at a crossroads, according to a consensus of the Community Center Committee for the City of Belle Fourche. At the group's regular meeting on June 19th much of the agenda was taken up with a discussion of the future structure and operation of the landmark city facility.

The four-person committee, consisting of Ward 2 Councilman Travis Martin, Ward 1 Councilman Monte Talkington, Ward 3 Councilman James Ager and Ward 4 Councilman Randy Schmidt, were in agreement that now is the time to look at all options with regard to how the center will be run moving forward.

For the past several years the city has annually subsidized the operation of the facility with up to \$600,000 in some years. The committee agreed it was ready to explore the idea bringing in an outside entity to partner with the city to run BFACC as a possible way of alleviating city expense.

"I am all in favor of keeping the services that the center provides without it draining our bank account," said Travis Martin, Committee Chairman. "If we only had to subsidize \$10,000 that might give us \$590,000 to put toward something else." "That could go a long ways toward fixing a few streets," Talkington added.

The community center has long been a popular institution within the city since it opened 28 years ago. Thousands of citizens and visitors have used it with its indoor pool and water slides, hot tubs, fitness rooms, gymnasium, racquetball courts and meeting spaces. The large theater has hosted concerts and stage plays. Programs are in place to encourage wellness, yoga and physical fitness among others. The center is also looking at a remodel of its lobby and offices to improve patron check-in and security. Those plans, funded in the city budget, are expected to cost more than \$250,000 and are still in the formative stages.

"When people come here (to Belle Fourche) and you show them our rec center, they're impressed," said Schmidt. "That has a lot to do with why they come to Belle Fourche and not somewhere else. We can't let it fall apart."

For many years, Helen baked homemade bread, churned butter and made cottage cheese from fresh milk produced by the family milk cow. She made the best chicken and noodles, deviled eggs, potato salad, and lamb and barley stew. There were always chocolate chip cookies, homemade pies, cinnamon rolls or some other delicious dessert waiting at her house along with a pot of hot coffee for anyone who showed up. One time during shearing, several of her oatmeal raisin cookies were fed to the family's lead sheep, Thumper. He loved the cookies but would spit out the raisins. She was furious! The grandkids would often keep it a secret from the others when she was baking cookies so they could eat all the cookie dough they wanted before anyone else showed up.

Helen enjoyed crossword puzzles and sewing until her eyesight no longer permitted it. She served as the resident seamstress whenever anyone needed anything patched. She created several outfits for the local Make It Yourself With Wool contest in the early 1980's. She also served as a teacher of Sunday School and Vacation Bible School.



Throughout her life, Helen was active in the Carter County Cowbelles, Alzada Community Club, Extension Club, the Alzada Congregational Church, and the Powder River Congregational United Church of Christ. She and Ed were also members of the Montana Stockgrowers Association, Montana Woolgrowers Association and Carter County Sheep and Cattle Growers Association.

Walking in Faith



"Thy word is a lamp unto my feet and a light unto my path." Psalm 119:105 When I was a

child, my parents and two other families decided to go camping and fishing at Meadowlark Lake in the Big Horns in Wyoming. In those days, that meant surplus canvas Army tents, tarps, sleeping bags, kerosene lanterns and camp stoves, and a cast iron skillet. We arrived shortly after noon. While the women hauled out sandwiches and cake, the men set up tents. Then the men were off to fish, and the women visited and tended toddlers. That left Shockey and I, both five, to entertain ourselves. That evening, we had a fish fry, a campfire, and marshmallows to roast. Darkness had fallen. The evening air was damp enough that all sounds seemed muted.

The toddlers had been bedded down for the night. Shockey and I were told that it was time to crawl into our sleeping bags, but first to use the outhouse. That facility was located a perhaps twenty yards from the tents—a short distance for adults—a long trek for little girls walking in the dark. Our mothers assured us that we could make the trip without adults. "By the time we were your age, we thought nothing of taking the lantern and hiking to the outhouse. We did it every evening." With that, we were given a kerosene lantern and directed to go. I think things would have been fine, had my dad not said, "Don't let the bears git ya," had her dad not said "keep yer eyes open," had our mothers not said, "Go on

now, we'll be watching." Obviously, we made the trek successfully. However, all these years later, I can clearly recall the ring of lantern light. It was just large enough to illuminate three steps. The step we were taking was fully visible. The

next step was a bit shadowy, but the third step was entered into uncertain darkness. Shockey and I walked slowly, pausing frequently to peer into the darkness and to listen. Naturally, all was quiet. The adults at the campfire, no doubt smiled as they watched our timid steps into bravery.

Now, well-advanced into adulthood, I recall that ring of light whenever I read Ps. 119:105: "Thy word is a lamp unto my feet." Often in the vagaries of life, I have felt as though I were back trekking through wilderness with only enough light to discern the next step and a half. During those times, I look to scriptures for guidance, hold firmly to the knowledge that my heavenly Father is watching me, and I take the single step that I can

Gracious God, thank you for giving me your word to be a light for my pathway. Keep my faith ever strong enough to take the next right step—and to place all fears in your loving embrace. Amen.

Gubbrud Now on State Capital's Trail of Governors

"The Trail of Governors is not only a great way to honor our former leaders, it also provides an opportunity to display some of the challenges and accomplishments that our state has experienced." That comment was in reference to the recent unveiling of three former South Dakota Governors at the State Capitol in Pierre and said in tribute by Belle Fourche attorney Dwight Gubbrud. In addition to being the 22nd Governor of South Dakota, Archie Gubbrud, one of the three presented at the unveiling ceremony, he just happenes to be Dwight's grandfather.

Archie Gubbrud served as Governor of South Dakota two terms from 1961-1965 (the length of term at that time was two years).

His life-size bronze sculptureby sculptors Lee Leuning and Sherri Treeby portrays Gubbrud observing a model of a Minuteman missile, dozens of which were installed in South Dakota during Gubbrud's tenure. The sculpture was placed in the capital city at the corner of Pierre Street and Capitol Avenue.

When asked about the artists' life sized Bronze portrayal of his grandfather studying the missile in front of him, Dwight said, "To anyone under the age of 30, the Minuteman Missile is an ancient relic of the past. Nevertheless it should be remembered that the placement of ICBMs throughout western South Dakota had a significant impact on the entire state. Hopefully, these statutes will help future generations appreciate the value of leadership and public service."

Dwight also commented on his Grandfather pensive observation of the missile in the bronze and the positions of his hands.

"Archie had a favorite ring he always wore on his right hand. It was a Masonic ring." Dwight said his father, John Gubbrud, referred to it as, "my Dad's fidget ring." Whenever deep in thought the Governor had a habit of turning the ring around on his ring finger." This detail is depicted on the bronze.

Archie Gubbrud was born December 31, 1910 on his family's farm in Lincoln County, SD, the grandson of Norwegian immigrants. He attended rural schools and graduated from Augustana Academy, a Lutheran high school in Canton, and continued to work on the family farm. In 1939, he married Florence Dexter, a fellow Canton native, and they had two children, John and Maxine. Gubbrud "inherited" his father's position as Norway Township clerk in 1934 and held that role for 16 years. He also served as school board chairman. In 1951, he began a ten-year career in the State House of Representatives, serving as House Majority Leader and Speaker of the House. In 1960, Gubbrud challenged Governor Ralph Herseth's reelection, and achieved a narrow upset win despite suffering a fractured pelvis and conducting much of his campaign on crutches. Governor Gubbrud signed legislation prohibiting racial discrimination in the public accommodations. He approved large construction programs at the state universities and oversaw construction of the interstate highway system in the state. Gubbrud advocated for a constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions, created the office of the budget director, and created retirement systems for university and local government employees. He also established

Custer State Hospital, a residential facility for the developmentally disabled, at the site of the former State Sanatorium for Tuberculosis.

After two terms in office, Gubbrud returned to his farm in 1965. In 1968, he was drafted by Republicans to challenge U.S. Senator George McGovern, but lost. The following year he was appointed as the Farmers Home Administration director for South Dakota, a position he held for eight years. Gubbrud died April 26, 1987 in Sioux Falls.

Dwight recounted a story his grandfather had told him about John F. Kennedy.

President John F. Kennedy officially dedicated Oahe Dam in Pierre on August 17, 1962, the year in which Oahe began generating power.

Two of Kennedy's Secret Service contingency arrived in Pierre a two days before the event to do the advance work necessary for the Presidential visit. Subsequent to their survey of the area they met with Govenor Gubbrud and told him the plan for the event. The Governor was to meet to President at the Pierre Airport when his plane landed. He would join the President in his limosine and the Secret Service would lead the motorcade out of the airport, turn right and follow the Highway north out to Oahe Dam.

The Governor asked the Secret Service if it would be possible to turn left out of the airport; take the motorcade down to Capitol Avenue and then north on Euclid Avenue and proceed north to the dam.

He told the Secret Service, "We don't often have a President visit South Dakota and on the route through Pierre many more people would have an opportunity to see President Kennedy drive by."

The Secret Service instructed

to the highway route. We have reason to believe that the President's life may be in danger, and you certainly don't want anything to happen while he's in South Dakota."

It was while attending the Midwest Governors Conference in Nebraska in November a year later, November 22, 1963 that the conference was interupted with the news of the President being shot in Dallas.

In the interest of national security the balance of the Governor's Conference was cancelled and the Governor immediately returned to the State Capitol in

'Teens Against Tobacco' Visit Commission

BELLE FOURCHE - Newell's Teens Against Tobacco Use (TATU) visited the Butte County Commissioners on Tuesday, June 18, during their regular meeting. The object of the visit was to inform the commissioners of their desire to have this body approve the decision of the Butte County Fair board designating the fairgrounds at Nisland as "tobacco free." The fair is July 31-August 3.

The teens, which included Kendra Wetz, Trinity Henry and Katie McTaggart, along with 'Whatever It Takes Coalition' Director Sabrina Harmon, who advises the group, brought along an object lesson for the commissioners and guest.

The three girls handed out several colored slips of paper and asked the participants to write down activities they enjoyed, personal possessions, personal

characteristics and people in their lives.

Youth feel they are immortal and nothing will ever happen (to them)," said McTaggart. "Addiction can happen to all types of people."

Through a series of scenarios about tobacco use, the people were asked to delete several of the items/people they had listed which tobacco use and addiction has the possibility of taking from their lives.

"Scene six: You are finally seriously addicted," said Wetz. "Now turn to your partners and let them take away two of the last three items or people you have left. How do you choose what to eliminate from your life by making bad choices?"

"Good question," said County Auditor Elaine Jensen. "How do you choose?"

Commissioner Frank Walton told a short story about when he quit smoking, sharing with the students about how he had been in an accident that had incapacitated him to the point where he needed help with everything. He said the surgeon told him he would not operate on Walton's feet unless he quit smoking. Walton had smoked for 20 years.

"That was it," said Walton. "I tossed out my electronic cigarettes, regular cigarettes and chew."

"You do whatever it takes," said Henry. "You get rid of harmful activity.'

Harmon jumped in at that point and asked the commission to approve the decision of the fair board and brought fair booklets for each commissioner, showing them the full-page ad that the group had purchased showing the document the fair board had approved.

"It was taking from a document provided by 7 Downs Arena, when they became a tobacco-free campus," said Harmon. "They (fair board) approved it, put it in the fair book. I guess we missed a step in not getting your (commission) approval and we are asking you to approve that now."

Harmon said there will be more than 30 signs placed at the fairgrounds.

The commissioners did approve, with Walton making a comment about liability issues should a burning cigarette be dropped where it could catch a building on fire at the grounds.

"We would like you to offer your support and encouragement if people want to quit," said Harmon. "(You would be) making a decision for right now and for the future."

"We encourage people who have quit smoking to share their story," said Wetz.

The TATU group will have a booth at the fair with information and probably some free items that will help remind people to drop tobacco use.

Bridges of Butte County

BELLE FOURCHE – The saga of bridge repair and replacement is an ongoing thing in Butte County and seems to be the main topic at each and every meeting. That was the case on Tuesday, June 18 as well. The board received a letter from Brosz Engineering on the bridge structure on Orman Road in eastern Butte County with a list of five recommendations for this one bridge. This is considered the worst bridge that is still listed as an "open" bridge.

Along with photos of the structural damage in the underneath structure, the company listed the multitude of concerns.

"Our recommendation," said Jason Hansen, representing the company, "Is to designate Orman Bridge as one-way traffic only and lower the load limit to 4T only, down from 18."

In the meantime, according to the Butte County Bridge Repair/Reservation Plan for 2019, Orman, along with 12 other bridges and structures, are recommended to be replaced. According to the plan there are currently seven bridges in the county that have already been closed, with another four scheduled to be closed due to needed repairs.

A National Bridge Inventory was done in December 2017, and the commission just received a letter from Tammy Williams, SDDOT Administrative Program Manager informing them that the county has received \$382,800.62 through the Highway Infrastructure Program Funding Allocation. This is Butte County's share of \$17.313 million dollars received by 62 South Dakota counties.

The board voted to approve the allocation even though it will mean following certain procedures in spending the funds. They also voted to approve having the repairs or replacement of Orman bridge sent through

the engineering process to be ready for potentially receiving grant funding for bridge repairs. According to NBI data there are 24 structures in Butte County that are considered in poor condition.

Brosz Engineering recommends implementing the structures listed in the Preservation Plan for Preservation BIG grants. "There are currently five structures that would be considered good candidates for a BIG Preservation project," according to the plan. "These could be implemented into the plan on an, every-other-year basis or as the County wants to implement these projects."

The county also approved occupancy applications for a variety of rights-of-way for Willow Creek Wind Power LLC.

Some of these variances include areas on Double R Road, Twilight Road, and Wahlfeldt Road as well as some section lines in the project area where the windfarm will be built. A representative from Willow Creek came to give the commissioners an update on the project.

"The bigger picture is that we ended up in March with a very unfortunate situation where an investor pulled out," said James Madsen. "We found another partner and now we have planned for construction to begin in late August or early September with roads and foundations."

Madsen said the weather delays also caused concerns, but that their continued plan includes electrical work done by May 2020, turbines beginning to come in during June of next year and commercial operations to begin in October 2020.

"There's still a lot of permit work to do," said Madsen. "We plan to do some more events when we get into the start of construction, to avoid issues with the community and impact on the roads."

Madsen said they were working to get housing and all other logistics figured out.

City Water still a Big Issue

NEWELL – "How long are we gonna be on a hose?" asked Bar Manager Lorri Olson, as the Newell City Commission met in regular session on Monday, June 10. She was referring to the source of water for the bar and liquor store and the ongoing water project currently affecting Third Street.

"We are progressing with our street project," said City Foreman Larry Parker. Tim Grosz of Brosz Engineering reported that the footage of pipe that has been laid is about 23 percent. "So, about a quarter of the pipe is in the ground," he said. "Next week they'll be tearing curb and gutter across from Third and

Fisk Street up. Homes and businesses along Third Street and others that are affected by the water connections coming through that area have had to deal with a low source of water coming through temporary pipes laid along the

construction area. "We want to keep the business side (of Girard) open and running," said Parker of the transition to the main drag through town where many businesses are located. Currently Third Street is blocked to thru traffic at both ends and water supply often comes through a garden hose or a bit larger hose to businesses and residences. Newell resident, Toni Gilbert,

A New Way of Doing Things

NISLAND - Ed Kling has a new way of doing things on his farm south of Nisland. "It's the best thing I've ever bought," said Kling this past week as he watched some of his 65 head of bum lambs nurse at the Biotic Industries milk machine. "It saves a lot of time and labor.3

Kling ran onto the product when visiting a friend in the Sturgis area about another item, and saw the machine. The rest, as they say, is history. Kling, and his wife Kathy, who is also involved in the process, have just had the unit for a little

while, and there have been some bumps along the way to pretty much self-sufficiency, but now they only spend about 10 minutes a day prepping the machine, cleaning and filling it with milk replacer. It took forever to feed lambs with a bottle, Kling said. Last year they purchased buckets with several spigots, but as soon as a lamb chewed off the nipple, the milk all ran out on the ground. Kling said he knew there had to be a better way. "Kathy cleans the thing really good about every three days, he said. "The rest of the time we just brush it out around the tubes when we fill the

powdered lamb replacer with temperature-controlled water

and feeds it through a series of tubes to outside where a nipple is connected to the spigots. Then, it's just a matter of getting the lambs started and they take care of themselves, feeding on demand, just as they would if they were nursing on a ewe. And the unit can be used for calves as well, with a little adjustment.

"The biggest issue we have had was having to replace nipples too often," said Kling. He contacted Holly and Dave Ollila, who also have a similar smaller unit, and she said that didn't happen often. Kling caught feral cats chewing on the nipples in his game camera that he set up. It wasn't long before that issue was resolved.

Ollila said there are several such units in the area and that Buffalo Ranch Supply in Buffalo is a distributor. They can order the unit and keep one on hand for demonstration purposes.

"We recently started to carry the milk machines," said T.J. Swan, a representative for the company. "Customers were asking if we would carry them. It takes about five business days to get more machines in. We also carry super lamb milk replacer." Kling is totally satisfied with the unit and the way it has saved him so much. "It pretty much takes care of itself," he said. He said that with the cost of the unit, the fiberglass house it is contained in that acts as a feeding building for the lambs, and other costs, they won't make much money this year. But he already has plans for adding some spigots and making things a little more user friendly for next year.

came not only to issue a complaint but to praise the work of Parker who got up in the middle of the night to help the resident. "He came in the middle of the night when my basement was a waterfall to help set up another sump pump," said Gilbert. As she tracked down the issue she realized the water source was not seepage from rain, but a leak from a gash in a water supply hose that flooded the area around her home. The hose was supplying water to the Butte County School on Third Street and the valve was wide open, according to Gilbert. She questioned who was responsible for the damage to her basement and what could be done. After a long period of explanation and discussion, Mayor Ken Wetz said they would not spend any more time on the issue and that it remained a contractor issue. "We need

to refer that to the contractor,"

said Wetz. "It is a contractor's

liability issue." Parker said they are dealing with issues daily and trying to make changes to make things easier. 123 years ago – Belle Fourche Times June 27, 1896

Murder at Beulah At Beulah, Wyo., last Sunday evening, Amos Robinson, generally known as "Fatty", was fatally shot by Ed. Ross, a rival saloonkeeper. It was the outcome of a trivial dispute over a game of high-five in Robinson's place a short time previous. It is said that Robinson did nothing to aggravate the matter and that Ross seemed bent on trouble. Robinson closed his saloon and started down street, when he was again approached by Ross and his brother George: they abused him awhile and Ed Ross pulled a revolver and shot twice, the last shot taking effect in Robinson's abdomen. Robinson died Monday about 4 p.m. The Ross boys are both under arrest and will have their preliminary hearing at Sundance. Ross claims to have shot in self-defense, but the claim will be hard to substantiate, it is thought, as but two shots were heard, and Robinson's gun was found with every chamber full.

Married C. S. Wilson, who resides on Grand river, near the old Orlando Giles place, came to Belle Fourche about the 15th inst., and proceeded to make the most of city life for a few days. He came in with a team and wagon, and told several parties that he was here after a load of goods. It finally transpired that it was household goods and a wife that he was after. Wednesday of this week, he braced up, took the train to Deadwood, and returned Thursday with Mrs. Wilson, they having been married the previous evening in Deadwood. The bride-elect had been in waiting at Deadwood since the 16th inst., that date having been previously agreed upon for the meeting. Thursday's Pioneer gives the following account of the wedding: There was a quiet little wedding at the mayor's office last

evening, and two good, sensible people were made one. Charles S. Wilson, Grand river cattleman, and Miss Annie E. Bowers of Colorado Springs, met in the city by appointment and, securing the services of City Marshall Donovan, procured a license and wending their way to the mayor's office, with the marshal and Deputy U. S. Marshal Robinson as witnesses, were married by Mayor Star. Mr. Wilson said he would be married by the mayor or not at all, as he did not propose to be married by any small-fry official. They loaded up their goods and pulled out Thursday afternoon for the ranch.

Greatest Of All Wars At An End Treaty Signed With Ceremony Marked By Solemnity Germans Defiant To The Last Versailles, June 30 - The greatest war in all history formally ended Saturday afternoon with the signing of the peace treaty. The historic scene took place in the Hall of Mirrors at Versailles, where the Germans humbled the French so ignominiously in 1870. After preparing for forty years for war and world domination, the treaty which forever shattered their dream was signed in as many minutes. The defiant attitude of the Germans was noted about all incidents. The ceremony was marked by circumstances which somewhat dimmed the expectations of those who had worked and fought during long years of war and months of negotiations its achievement.

Wilson Will Save Drink Attorney for Wine Growers Asserts President Will Declare Demobilization Ended San Fran-



cisco, June 30 – The department of justice will make no attempt to enforce the war-time prohibition act, once the peace treaty has been signed and President Wilson has proclaimed demo bilization complete, according to information Theodore Bell, attorney for the California wine grape growers, is quoted here as having received from Washington. Bell said he has positive information President Wilson would declare mobilization at an end the moment the treaty was signed.

Proving Up Under Section Homestead Law Congressman Harry L. Gandy writes as follows from Washington: I have had many inquiries from person who filed non-contiguous additional entries under the section homestead law, asking as to when they will be able to offer proof. I now have his reply: "An entryman desiring to make proof on additional entry under the first proviso of section three of the stockraising homestead act for land not contiguous to his original entry will be required to show residence on the stockraising tract or on his original claim if he continues to own it, seven months each year for three years after additional entry is allowed and that during that period her had actually used the land for the raising of stock and forage crops.

without a director following the resignation of long-time Executive Director Michelle Deyo-Amende at the end of May. "So, it's a good time to talk about this now since we're in a state of flux up there," said Travis Martin, Committee Chairman. "We're needing to get a director, we're talking about remodel plans. There's a lot of things coming up and it's time to look at it and say what if we put someone else's name up there."

"We're definitely at a crossroads here," Ager said. "We are at the point where we are either going to continue to subsidize the center, and it's going to climb up within the next 5-10 years to close to a million dollars if we continue to do the way we're doing it now, no doubt. Or, we do what has been talked about. There is talk within the community already about asking a health provider or something like that to partner with us."

Martin is hoping that taking the concept to the people, some individual, business or organization may come forward with a plan or idea that the community could move forward on. A public/private partnership that the community still gets to use the pool, the track, we still have our programs in there and as a private entity we help someone get a good footprint in the city,"

"If you look back a little bit in history there was a council before that had talked about someone from Rapid City running the facility," Talkington added. "It's not the first time this idea has come up and I think there's a lot to be said for this idea." Caution in taking this approach was also discussed within the committee. Of utmost concern was making sure a proper contract was in place to benefit both parties. From the city's perspective the group felt it was vital to preserve and enhance the programs and use of the BFACC currently offered to citizens without constraining an outside entity from the ability to make money in the partnership. "Contract is key," Martin said. "It's not privatization it's partnership. If we go this route the city needs to have a say in the programs and what the facility

gets to do, how we structure the membership, all of that." "My fear would be this," Ager added. "In the first year there would be no changes. All the patrons stay, we keep the equipment we keep the pool. But pretty soon (the city's partner) would need a little more space, and there goes the cardio room. I guess we just want to make sure that we're sensitive for the needs of the people who've invested in that facility for 28

"I think what it would look

like is that we're giving the use of the building away in such a partnership," said Schmidt. "Any such contract would need to be very specific.' "Let's face it, if we get it turned over they are going to run it like a business," Talkington said. "They want to make money. They're going to keep the programs because that will keep the people and the more customers they have the more they'll make. But I agree that in the contract we need to have something to where we still have a say in how things are

run. We have to."

The committee decided to meet twice a month to design a way forward in the structure and operation of the BFACC. With unanimous agreement that a partnership option is on the table Martin says they will move ahead with making contact with potentially interested partners. And in the near future there are also plans for a community forum to be held to seek ideas and input from the general public. A date for that forum has yet to be decided.

"We definitely want to have a strong path (for the BFACC) moving forward so that after the days when we are here it's clearly understood what the goal is." said Mayor Gloria Landphere. "Part of it can be very general. We want the community center to be the very best that it possibly can be for our community. And if there are, sometimes, other ways of doing things we need to be challenging ourselves to look at those things."

"This is a pivot time right here, Ager said. "We're at the pendulum. We're either going to go one way or the other." The committee's next meeting

is scheduled for July 10th.

As chairman this year I stand on the shoulders of all the dedicated men and women who have come before me. They worked tirelessly to see to it that each year the community came together to keep this event going for



Parade Parking/Viewing Guide

There could be a record number of visitors attending this year's Centennial Black Hills Roundup July 4th parade. Estimates range from 25,000 to 30,000 parade watchers

If you're coming from out of town, welcome! We're glad you came. Here's some useful information to know about parking and parade viewing.

PARADE PARKING

First and foremost please do not park where you are blocking driveways, alleyways, streets or traffic in general. Also do not block fire hydrants and do not park closer than 20 feet from street corners. It's important not to park in handicapped areas unless, of course, you have a permit. Also, respect private property and do not park on private lawns or driveways unless you have permission of the landowner.

There is no parking on 13th Ave. between the Middle School and the football field. This area is reserved for staging the parade floats. So now, where TO park.

One option for parking is the Roundup Grounds parking lot. There is a paved walking path that will lead you up to a crossing on Highway 85 and it's a short three blocks to Herrmann Park. Bring walking shoes and portable chairs.

Another option for parking is near downtown at the Tri-State Museum and Visitor's Center parking lot. There is also parking around City Hall. It's a short walk to State Street for parade viewing from there. Visitors may choose to park in the high school parking lot with the closest parade viewing being along National and Elkhorn Street. If you want to move to Herrmann Park from areas around the high school be aware that 8th Street is closed due to construction on the new Hay Creek bridge. Just make your way to 10th Avenue and cross the pedestrian bridges into the park.

Many visitors will also be able to park along streets inside the city.

PARADE VIEWING

The parade route is 1.75 miles long. It begins at the intersection of National Street and 13th Ave. It will end at the corner of 8th Avenue and Jackson in front of the police station.

There are several popular parade viewing locations. Among them are Eagle Park, all along Elkhorn Street, along State Street through downtown and Hermann Park, Parents are



strongly encouraged to keep watch on children when candy is thrown from parade vehicles. There is a possibility that children will dart into the street to pick up candy without watching

for parade vehicles. A good rule of thumb is to arrive as early as possible, the parade begins at 10:30am. And for resi-

dents and visitors, be patient. When a large crowd converges in a relatively small area it is important to be aware of your surroundings. Bring comfortable shoes, portable chairs and sunscreen. There will be vendors in Herrmann Park and most shops along State Street downtown will be open.



Centennial Parade to Kick Off July 4th Ceremonies

BELLE FOURCHE- The Black Hills Roundup Centennial Parade is scheduled to begin at 10:30am sharp on Thursday, July 4th, 2019. What has become a fixture and a tradition for the Belle Fourche community should be bigger and better than ever as the Roundup celebrates its 100th year.

At least that's how Parade Chairman Mark Leverington

make this a celebra-

tion.

"We really want to make this a celebration," he told the Beacon. "As a committee we'd like this parade to be an experience they'll remember.

When kids come this year, we want them to remember this day when they're 50 years old."

With close to 250 entries, a 1.75-mile long parade route and 25-30,000 visitors expected this year's event is, by the numbers, one of the largest ever.

"You know, this is really a signature event for the city, nothing else around compares to it," he said. "We get so much support from people in town, our volunteers, and the people who call us who want to be seen in the parade. The folks in town decorate their houses and yards with red, white and blue and it's really a source of pride.

"We get so much support from the city, the mayor, and our law enforcement," he continued. "They all bring in so much energy and provide so many ideas to enhance the celebration."

Even support from the Pentagon. Washington DC has once again approved the flyover of a B1 Ellsworth Air Force Base Bomber (see associated story) to start the parade. The B1 Lancer from the 28th Bomb Wing is expected to make a low pass over spectators promptly at 10:30am. It will fly over 13th Avenue then make a slight left turn and exit the city heading to the northwest.

"If you hear it and try to look up, you'll have missed it," Leverington says. "You'll see if before you hear it. You have to have eyes on the sky right at 10:30am to watch it."

For Leverington it's his 8th year as parade chairman and his last. And even with all that experience there seems to be a never-ending list of details to go over. But it starts with two main things.

The first thing we have to do is find volunteers," he said. Leverington says that typically the parade will run with 50 or fewer volunteers. There are a variety of jobs to be filled, from parade judges, VIP welcome tent volunteers, all the way to parade marshalls. Still others must start nearly at the crack of dawn to drive the stakes into the ground to help line up floats in the staging area along 13th Avenue. And the Roundup Parade also has live announcers.

"We actually have eight parade announcers," he said. "And each one needs to be comfort-

able in front of a PA microphone, energetic and encourage parade watchers to have fun. Oh, and we have to get eight 2019 Parade Chairman PA systems too!" The second

> thing on Leverington's list is to secure the parade route. That has been a bit more challenging of late with the expansive construction project going on along 8th Avenue, typically the main artery of the parade. This year the street is done but the Hay Creek Bridge completion was delayed due to our wet and snowy spring. That will mean the parade will end at 8th Ave. and Jackson St. in front of the police station, about 3 blocks from where it was originally supposed to end.

"It's still going to be a longer parade route than we had last year," Leverington said. "We thought we'd need it since we had so many entries and knew there would be a larger crowd lining the route to see the parade."

Some details go unnoticed but are hugely important. The parade route spills onto US Highway 85 for a very short distance and permission needs to be granted for use. Also the route crosses the railroad tracks twice and Leverington must secure a train stop order from the RCP&E railroad for the duration of the event.

Also on the list is providing for security, safety and emergency procedures. "I can't say enough about our police chief (Marlyn Pomrenke),' Leverington said. "He and his department give it their all to provide safety and security with the large crowds while being helpful and friendly.

Another task on the parade to-do list is to recruit musical bands to play in the parade. "We've been blessed in the past with bands from Minnesota, Wisconsin and Wyoming but some years schedules don't always work out," he said. "This year we've got a bagpipe player coming from Wyoming

and the Rapid City Rangers will be playing. And we'll have our very own Black Hills Roundup Cowboy Band. They get all dressed up and give us great 4th of July music. They are certainly a signature of the parade." And of course clowns. "Every parade needs a clown, lots of them actually," Leverington said. "I love clowns and you can't have a parade without them. We'll have the Shriners of course too."

There is one safety issue Leverington wanted to point out to those riding in the parade. "If you're throwing candy, please make sure to throw it as far as you can. If it lands in the street it's too tempting for the kids to run out and get it. That can really be a safety issue."

At the end of the parade, participants and floats will turn west on Jackson. The larger and longer trucks and vehicles are asked to proceed on Jackson straight to 5th Ave. (Hwy 85) and disperse. Others may turn south at 7th Avenue and head back toward National Street.

The honor of grand marshal for the centennial parade actually goes to a group of individuals. All of the past Roundup committee chairmen that are able to attend will share in that role. Leverington has a list of at least 14 he expects to ride on the Grand Marshal's float. The committee chairman this year is Clay Crago and he is expected to ride in the traditional chairman's vehicle.

The parade will have its customary contingent of local and city politicians along with statehouse representatives. As for national and state level dignitaries those are usually a last-minute addition according to Leverington. Governor Daugaard and Representative Kristy Noem were late additions last year.


So, will newly elected Governor Noem make an appearance this year?

"We'll have to wait and see. We've certainly invited all of them to participate," he said, adding that it's a non-election year so the number of politicians is usually down. "But with this being the 100th, we may still see a few."

So what will Leveringon miss most about not directing the parade? That's easy he says. "It's the people I get to meet and work with. Every year I meet people who've never been here before and they tell how much they enjoyed the parade. That makes it worth it. We want to make lifetime memories. I know serving in this capacity has certainly been one for me."

B1 Flyover to Signal Parade Start

looking up, it will be too late. "I can guarantee you everyone will hear the B1 fly overhead but if they look up when they hear it, they will have already missed it," he said. "It flies over at low altitude at high speed and by the time the sound gets to your ears, the bomber has already flown by. So get your eyes to the skies before 10:30am."

The B1 from Ellsworth Air Force Base will approach the city from the south and fly along 13th Ave. Then it will make a slight left turn and exit the skies over the city heading to the north-northwest.

Last year the flyover, although approved, was cancelled at the last minute.

"It was a big disappointment in 2018 when the flyover was cancelled," Leverington said. "On July 3rd last year, a "stand down" was issued worldwide and all B-1 Bomber aircraft were ordered to stay on the ground. It was due to a safety concern in the ejection system. Unfortunately, I was made aware of that command the night before the parade and it was impossible to communicate what happened to the spectators. Just this past February, another "stand down" was ordered and I thought 'here we go again'. But this past April it was lifted. So hopefully that means we'll have no roadblocks

to the flyover this year in 2019."
For several years during the second term of the past administration a sequester was placed on military funding which

did not allow for the flyover demonstration. In 2017 that was lifted and the flyovers were approved once again.

It is an expensive display of American might. Fueling the bomber, getting a crew in place, firing it up, taxiing and takeoff

can cost close to \$100,000. To maximize the expense the Air Force tries to combine flyover trips with the B1. The bomber and four-person crew has flown

over Custer, Belle Fourche and Roundup, Montana, in the past on July 4th. And the bomber crew will always conduct a training mission to justify the expense while they are in the air.

"It's an honor that they would give up their holiday to do a training mission and add something this spectacular to our event," said Scott Reder, past Roundup Chairman. Reder, who is a pilot himself, used to coordinate the flyover for the Roundup. In fact, he taught a young Col. James Ellis how to fly his single engine airplane when Ellis was a high school student at Newell High School. Later Ellis enlisted, was stationed at Ellsworth, and even piloted his B1 over the Roundup Grounds several years ago. "Yeah, that was really special," Reder said.

The flyover used to take place over the Roundup Grounds. But recently the Pentagon wanted the flyover experience to be maximized for the general public instead of only for those who were able to buy tickets to the rodeo. It takes a lot of paperwork to make it happen.

"There were times when we had to submit paperwork two or three times before we were approved," Reder said. "You just have to keep trying."

"It's become a fantastic way to begin a parade on July 4th," said Leverington. "It's worth the effort to make it happen."





100th Roundup Fireworks May Be Best Yet

BELLE FOURCHE - It wasn't so much that Fritz Carlson liked to play with fire when he was kid- it's more like he was captivated by the majesty, color, spectacle and the boom of watching fireworks. That ineterst has led him today to be the Pyrotechnic Director of the Black Hills Roundup. And for the second year in a row, he will be directing two nights of fireworks, Wednesday July 3rd and Friday July 4th.

"I really want each show to be the same type of show but not the same show," Carlson said. "We will have some new stuff this year and we hope to make each show just a little different for people to enjoy."

Carlson takes a lot of pride in his work. And every year the Roundup fireworks show draws rave reviews from the hundreds of spectators who watch from the rodeo grandstands and the thousands that watch perched on lawn chairs throughout the city. Three years ago it even caught the attention of 'USA Today' which ranked the Belle Fourche spectacle as the 11thbest 4th of July fireworks show in the nation.

And, as you can imagine, it doesn't happen by accident.

The planning for the shows begins months in advance with the fireworks ordered usually

in early spring. Carlson will purchase the shells through a clearinghouse in Richland, Illinois. Some of shells are American made and others are imported from China. "Historically they seem to have always had a knack for making great fireworks," Carlson said.

And it takes a lot of help and a lot of time to organize the halfhour program and make sure it goes off without a hitch.

"We usually have a crew of five to six people helping us every year," he says. "There's a lot of behind the scenes prep that happens. It takes about 12 hours to pre-wire the shells and another 12 hours the day of the show to run the miles of wire to the shoot board where we control when the shells are launched."

And then there is the safety of the public and the workers. There is a rule that says you must have a 70-foot diameter safe zone from the launch pipe for each inch diameter of the shells. "The largest shells we shoot are 6-inches in diameter so we have to have a 420-foot circle safe zone."

Carlson says he likes the variety of shots with some high and some low, and the ground displays he uses are a riot of color. But he is perhaps known for one thing; his false finales.

'Yeah, I guess that's sort of been my signature," he says with a grin. "I guess I do build the show where you think it's

over and then it starts up again and I blow your socks off. That's what makes it fun."

Carlson's favorite displays are called willows. "Those are the ones that open up like a palm tree and sort of just hang in the air forever with trails that come almost to the ground." They look like a willow tree and they cover a large expanse of the

Color in fireworks is created by the minerals that are used in manufacturing the shells. The most difficult color to create

he says is blue. Pyrotechnic aficionados look for the blue ones to judge the quality of the shells and programs that contain blue colors are usually top flight


As for the cost of the Independence Day celebration, Carlson says they will spend \$30,000 to put on the two shows. Sources of funding include the F.L Clarkson Family Foundation, the Black Hills Roundup and private donations, which can be a challenge to collect. Carlson is placing donation buckets

throughout town this week to help raise more funds to keep the show growing.

The hardest part for spectators is waiting for the show to begin. Carlson says he likes to wait until it is dark enough to get the full effect, usually around 10pm. "Sometimes if the rodeo ends early the fans have to be patient and wait. But we make a visual judgment call on that and it usually ends up right around 10 o'clock."


But one thing is for certain, it is always worth the wait.
