# Fireworks and Cannabis in Butte County

BELLE FOURCHE - The use of fireworks in Butte County topped the discussion of the **Butte County Commissioners** this week. Deputy Jason March explained that the sheriff's office checks with the Chief Meteorologist to check the conditions for fireworks to get a recommendation for the county. He commented that it is likely to get drier, but with caution, fireworks could be discharged. The commissioners voted on a resolution that fireworks can be discharged July 2-5 from 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. Belle Fourche city has a separate resolution and fireworks cannot be discharged or possessed at the Belle Fourche Reservoir.

"Have fun, be responsible," said Deputy March.

State's Attorney Cassie Wendt was front and center to give further explanation of the Medical Marijuana Ordinances. She had met with Kittrick Jeffries, owner of Dakota Cannabis Consulting in Rapid City. He brought several items of interest that should be addressed in evolving the present ordinances to correlate with the state statutes that are being formulated.

One of the biggest points to consider, she pointed out, is that rather than state a time, place, and manner, the limit should be on the number of facilities. The limit could be within a specific distance or limitation, i.e. feet, yards, miles-a limit of geographies.

Also, a mandatory restriction that the permit/license must be activated within a specific time-frame.

Wendt indicated several other ideas Jeffries had listed and told the commissioners that with this information it was important to start working on drafts and changes of the present ordinances. The changes would make the process clearer and address issues that will make the process more coherent.

"We have time. So how do you want to proceed?" she asked the commissioners.

Commissioner Kim Richards sees the need to make the changes, but wants to be thorough.

"Why get in a hurry? We need to make changes so let's not work backwards," he said.

"We should keep it on the agenda. Keep track and see what the state does," said

Commissioner James Ager would like to set up work sessions so that all the nuances can be understood about medical marijuana.

"We must be diligent," he said. There is a county lien against property previously owned by Leonard Toohey that has been purchased through a

# State of the State Flags at Issue at CON Monument

BELLE FOURCHE - Wind

and weather have taken their toll on the fifty state flags on display at the Center of the National Monument in Belle Fourche. Now you can add COVID to that list.

Over the past two years the flags have become torn and faded, as they normally would, but replacing them has been a challenge according to Kristi Thielen, Director of the Tri-State Museum and Visitor's Center.

"The vendor that we have been working with for years is having trouble getting the material to make the flags," she said. "They tell us it is related to COVID in getting the supplies from overseas."

Thielen says the flags normally last about 16 months before they must be replaced. According to the vendor, the soonest they could expect to see new flags would be by the end of July. In the meantime

discussion was heard during last week's City Council meeting about the possibility of just taking the flags down until the new ones arrive.

"We've been getting about one complaint per day no about the flags," Thielen said. Public Works Director Dirk Hoffman added that the complaints are coming from local citizens and not visitors.

Thielen and Hoffman told the council that the suggestions have been made just to take the flags down until the new ones arrive.

"I think if we don't see

anything we might just take them down in the next week," Thielen said.

"I agree that sometimes it would be better to just take them down," said Ward 1 Councilman Monte Talkington.

### **Temporary Medical Marijuana Ordinance Passes Second Reading**

BELLE FOURCHE - Medical marijuana (cannabis) laws are due to go into effect in the state of South Dakota, tomorrow, July 1st but don't expect medical marijuana to be available just yet. The state Department of Health still must announce its rules to govern the distribution and sale of medical cannabis and they have until October

29th to do so.

Already at least one local citizen has voiced interest in medical cannabis. During last week's City Council meeting, during community input, Mike Driessen appeared at the meeting to tell of his and his business partner's interest in establishing a medical marijuana dispensary and a grow facility in Belle Fourche. He invted questions from the council of which there were non.

Although medical marijuana will be legalized this week it won't be available until the DOH has done its work and announced the regulations. In the meantime, the city of Belle Fourche has adopted city ordinance 3-2021; A Temporary Ordinance Regarding the Issuance of Local Medical Cannabis Establishment Permits and/or Licenses. The second reading on the measure was held last week. There were no

citizens present to speak for or against the ordinance and it was passed without objection by the council. This means the ordinance has been adopted and will go into effect upon date of publication.

The ordinance says that anyone who wishes to open a medical marijuana dispensary within the city must apply for a permit and/or license from the city. But any licenses will not

### New Crow's Nest Installed at Roundup Grounds

BELLE FOURCHE - A new crow's nest has been installed at the Black Hills Roundup grounds just in time for the 102nd annual event.

Four Aces Contracting and Fabrication from Sundance, WY, was the lead contractor of the project. Crews from the area placed the new crow's nest, on the supports between the two bucking chutes early last week. The new unit is both larger and has more visibility than the old structure.

"It just goes along with the improvements we've been making at the Roundup Grounds the past couple of years," said Keith Anderson, Roundup Committee Chairman.

The cost of the new crow's nest was close to \$20,000 according to Anderson. And there may be more improvements on the far side of the arena to come.

"We have some plans to maybe put some VIP boxes on both sides of (the crow's nest) to go with the other improvements and make it all blend together," he said.

Improvements to the brackets that frame the banners above

made last week.

"We like to put a little money back into the grounds each year so it doesn't become rundown as it has in the past," Anderson added. "If you put that stuff off it costs a lot to repair. But if you put in a little at a time as you go

There, Verona and her siblings attended school and helped in the shop. Frieda passed away in 1937. Esther came home from college to help her Dad care for the family until Eugene was remarried in 1938 to Louisa. With this marriage, Verona gained step-siblings, Russell and Virginia Jo.

Verona was 13 when she accepted the Lord, was baptized, and attended the Church of God. Her unwavering faith and relationship with God was of utmost importance to her throughout her life. She graduated from Gettysburg High School in 1945, and the family moved to Mitchell, SD. While visiting her sister, Esther Wammen, in the Slim Buttes, she met Bill. The two wrote letters and dated for about a year before they married on November, 7, 1947 in Mitchell, SD. Verona's specialties included packing picnic lunches, cheering and keeping score at the numerous rodeos the kids competed in. She also timed at the Regional High School Rodeo for several years.



### Pastor's Perspective

This week's Pastor's Perspective is provided by Stephen Carson, Belle Fourche Connection Church

"Trust His Heart"

When I was a kid, I enjoyed watching the Bob Ross painting programs on television. I have no artistic ability at all, but I think that was one of the main reasons I enjoyed watching his show so much. It amazed me to see how his paintings always seemed to come together in the end. Every episode I can remember watching had a point in it where I thought he had made a mistake and ruined the painting! The scene in the painting would be coming together perfectly and then he would add something into it that seemed

completely out of place! It looked to me, from my untrained and untalented perspective, that he had made a terrible mistake! But, by the end of the painting, everything would come together beautifully! The end result would be a masterpiece! In fact, the very thing I thought had ruined the picture had actually become an integral part of it!

God often works just like that in our lives as well. Unlike God, we don't know the beginning from the end. We don't see the whole picture of our lives, but God absolutely does. There are times when things happen to us that we simply do not and will not fully understand this side of eternity. Everyone has experienced tragedies in their lives. We have all tasted the bitterness of trials. We have all experienced seemingly unfair pain in our lives. And we are often left asking the question, "Why?" In the midst of tragedy and trial we struggle to understand what God is doing and why God is allowing certain things to happen. I have experienced this many times. But I can say that as I look back over the years of my life, I can see God's hand and plan so clearly through all of that pain and confusion. God can take the things in our lives that we think have destroyed us and turn those things into vital, beautiful parts of the story that He is weaving

I want to encourage you today with Romans 8:28. It reads, "And we know that for those who love God all

things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose." This verse is a great reminder for those who have trusted Christ. God's plan in our lives may not go as we have planned, but His plan is always best. We may not fully understand why as we don't see the big picture, but God does! And God is good and He is rich in love and mercy. Therefore, we can trust Him, even when we don't fully understand everything that is happening in our lives.


Charles Spurgeon was a British pastor in the mid to late 1800's. He was a faithful man of God who was used greatly in his day and is still being used today through the legacy of his teachings. Despite this, he was a troubled soul who battled deep depression and discouragement. He had some really rough patches in his life of intense pain and trial. One of his most famous quotes that was borne out of his anguish is, "When you can't see God's hand, trust His heart." What a wonderful reminder! Our God is good! He isn't haphazard! He is purposeful and redemptive. Whatever is going on in your life today, run into the arms of Jesus and trust His heart!

Now, there is a caveat in this. In order to experience this kind of closeness with God and help during trials, you must know Christ. Despite our sin and rebellion, God loved us enough to send His Son, Jesus, into this world to live among us. And He came on a mission. His mission was to die on a cross in our place as our substitutionary sacrifice. And three days later He rose from the dead conquering the grave and death. And if a person will call on the name of Jesus in faith and repentance, believing that Jesus is the sinless Son of God who can forgive their sins and give them new life, they will be saved. That person will be made new. Their sins will be forgiven and eternal life will be granted to them. The only way you can experience Romans 8:28 is if you know Christ. And I pray that you do.



#### Bull rider Parker McCown Back After Shoulder Injury

After being sidelined for six months with a right shoulder injury, bull rider Parker Mc-Cown, who made his Wrangler National Finals Rodeo debut as a rookie in 2020, is back on the trail.

McCown returned at the Parker County Sheriffs' Posse Frontier Days Xtreme Bulls in Weatherford, Texas, June 8.

The Montgomery, Texas, cowboy has made seven rides since his return and made the whistle three times. He had an 81-point ride in Gladewater, Texas, June 9 and another 81-point trip in Pleasant Grove, Utah, June 16.

"Everything feels good," said McCown, 21. "I did a bunch of rehab, physical therapy and

working out. It feels back to normal. I feel a little rusty, but I am feeling better. The hardest part is just getting back in the groove every day.

"My approach is simple. I just want to try and ride all my bulls and have fun. I am blessed to be back, and I just want to cap-

italize on my opportunities. I am glad to be going to a bunch of rodeos and am glad to be back out here after sitting at home for six months."

McCown suffered a right (riding) shoulder separation and right AC joint fracture during his 88.5-point ride on Vold Rodeo's Bar Fly in Round 4 at the NFR at Globe Life Field in Arlington, Texas, Dec. 6.

McCown finished second in the round and sixth in Round 5. As a result of the injury, he missed the last four rounds. He finished 11th in the PRCA | RAM World Standings with \$98,138.

"I had surgery with (Dr. Tandy Freeman) a couple of days after the NFR," McCown said. "They repaired my rotator cuff, my biceps and my AC joint."




# Mick B. Harrison's Artists License ...and other wonderments.






from it.



be granted until the South Dakota Department of Health has put forth the regulations for such as required by SDCL 34-20G-72. An application received before the DOH makes the regulations known will be denied.

The ordinance states that the city will make a further study on the effects of medical marijuana establishments on the community and its zoning laws.

The Dept. of Health has until the end of October to announce the standards for medical cannabis. They are currently assessing local zoning and licensing requirements needed to approve local permits. And no licenses will be issued before that in order to provide predictability in the licensing process to potential investors. The temporary city ordinance

will be a vehicle that bridges the gap between the July 1st legalization and the DOH's announcement of its rules and regulations.

Also during the city council meeting the item of the removal or renovation of the Wyler Park skating rink was moved from the consent agenda to the regular agenda at the request of Councilman Randy Sowers. Sowers then asked that the item be referred back to the

Public Works Committee for further action. According to the committee the skating rink is in need of repair or renovation. If the old rink is repaired the cost may be around \$15,000. If the rink is rebuilt with a concrete base for the liner the cost would be closer to \$25,000, according to Public Works Director Dirk Hoffman. The matter was due to be discussed June 28th during the Public Works Committee

Approved on the council's consent agenda was the application for a grant for playground equipment at Herrmann Park and to place "Children at Play" signs on 11th Avenue near Jones Park, the site of the new city splash pad.

The council also approved the hiring of Jordan Fischer as an Officer I for the Belle Fourche Police Department. Also, a quote from Porterfield Electric was approved in the amount of \$9,500 for improvements to the baseball field lights at the Roundup Grounds.

During the informational period of the meeting Councilman Vern Hintz brought to the council's attention the need for improvements on 5th Avenue at the railroad crossing. "It's pretty pathetic. What do we need to do?" he asked.

Hoffman said that the Rail Authority and the DOT are the parties that need to be contacted. No further action was taken on the matter.



123 years ago Belle Fourche Times July 7, 1897 Local News

A scheme to dam the Belle Fourche river is being considered by some of our progressive citizens. The object is primarily to obtain a boating place. The land occupied by the old lake on Hay creek is getting too valuable, and the townsite company intends soon to drain the same. It is calculated that a blind dam could be built across the river just above the mouth of Redwater for \$200 or less. There is very little fall in the river for a half a mile above that point, and a four-foot cribbed of still water for pleasure boating. If built substantially a four foot dam would not be impaired by the spring floods, it is figured, as the high water would flow over the top and also spread over the flat on the north side. It certainly looks feasible and would be a splendid enterprise to carry out.

103 Years Ago Northwest Post Belle Fourche July 11, 1918

The net receipts from the July 4th auction sales were approximately \$14,500 (\$258,498.51 in 2021 dollars), while \$340 were taken in by the young ladies in charge of a lunch and flower booth, and an equal amount was realized from the big bowery dance on the opening night. The gross receipts at the fair grounds, including grandstands and auto stalls, totaled about \$8,500. The program opened Thursday morning with a grand street parade headed by the Deadwood Home Guards band. The first item in the Red Cross auction was a small silk flag, by little Miss Kiddle, and the bidding continued until it reached \$100 at which figure George Sletton and E. M. Clarkson of Harding county bought





On last Thursday and Friday Belle Fourche entertained the largest crowd of visitors ever assembled in any city in Western South Dakota, the occasion being the first annual Tri-State Round-Up, under the direction of the Belle Fourche Commercial club, and new history was made in this wonderful little city of real achievements.

> 103 Years Ago Belle Fourche Bee July 14, 1918

The bucking horses were perhaps the best ever assembled in an arena in this part of the west not one refused to buck, and all gave their riders a busy few minutes. Tip Top, "Tipperary's understudy, belonging to Chas Wilson of Harding, was at his best, and the first day gave an exhibition of lunging, twisting, jumping and bucking that made his rider bite the dust. It was proposed to have Sam Brownell ride this horse as the last event for the first day, but in the drawing Mr. Brownell drew another and Garrett Stockey fell the honor of matching wits with Tip-Top. Mr. Brownell's mount "High Moon," was a good one, but no match for the rider, who is a past master in the art of staving on the hurricane deck of a brone, that dislikes riders and everything pertaining to them. The carpenters of Belle Fourche showed their loyalty and willingness to assist the Red Cross

### More to Truly-Local Than Shopping and Eating

I recently saw a simple, yet excellent marketing campaign by Americas Newspapers that said, "Shop Local, Eat Local, Read Local". Nothing could be more critical for a local community than this simple statement. After all, keeping as many dollars local as possible is what keeps pumping the lifeblood throughout a community.

Ironically, that same day I saw a piece in the MediaPost publication indicating that more people than ever are consuming and paying for news and information. That may seem to be a great trend if you are a media company, but the "rest of the story" as Paul Harvey might have used with this piece seems to indicate a troubling trend. The lion's share of this shift is benefiting national news and information outlets, not local

While we don't downplay the need for national news and information, one must wonder why communities would neglect information in one's own backyard. One of the biggest issues facing most every local community is the ability to convey needful and timely information. I would argue being locally informed is every bit as critical as being nationally informed. I might even go as far as to say, it is even more critical. Additionally, I would suggest that a well-run local newspaper or media company is able to move a community forward

during these challenging economic times.

Before we touch on the need for communities to support their local news and information products just as they would support shopping,

dining, and overall spending locally, let's look at why this trend might be so. Let's start internally, we have two groups of local media companies. In the first group, we must take an honest look at many of the local products being shoved off as local newspapers. They are run by out-of-town media owners who have no presence. Their staff has been cut to the bone. With staff cuts, content is more cookie-cutter, regional, and less about their community. Publishers or the face of the community have been eliminated. They have simply allowed their local media company to become a nameless entity in the community, throwing out information most could care less about.

We certainly don't want to paint with broad strokes, lumping all newspapers in group one. Mismanagement pointed out in group one isn't the case everywhere. In group two, there are many local media products where money, time, human capital, and much more are being poured into the local community. Whilst the first poorly managed group of media companies deserve their fate, this second group deserves and needs the support of their communities in much greater ways.


For these truly-local media companies in group two, we must understand the need to shop and dine locally, but we all must catch the greater vision as to why we need to read locally as well. I have yet to consult with any communities and/or media companies that have an outstanding community information network. It isn't a lack of informational tools, it is an over-abundance of these informational tools. In the world of information fragmentation, that includes traditional media such as newspapers, TV, radio, and so forth, we now can add digital outlets, social media, cable TV, and so much more. Without a comprehensive community vision as to how information will be shared far and wide, it will be shared in multiple fragments where no one in the community gets the whole information feed.

I would challenge every community leadership team to sit down with their local media company and carve out a communitywide communication strategy moving forward. Media companies in the second grouping are in a unique position to assist in accomplishing this task.

Throughout the United States, we are seeing an abundance of what is referred to as a 'news desert'. These are communities that have lost their media representation. In a very competitive community environment, communities can ill afford to be a news or information desert. These deserts lose their identity and ability to compete. Don't let your community be an information desert. By working together with your media company you can be an oasis in the desert that has impacted over 2000 communities in the

### **One Step** Closer to Assisted Living **Facility**

Commission has first reading of medical cannabis ordinance.

NEWELL - The group desiring to set up a new assisted living facility could be one step closer to that dream following the regular city commission meeting Monday, June 14. Spokesperson Kurt Hocking spoke to commission members giving a brief background of their pursuit to build the facility.

Plans started in 2018 as the group began searching for property. Hocking pointed out that they had reached a level of frustration with the poor communication with the city and was hoping that an agreement could be reached to obtain the property lots located near the north end of Newell, lots 13-32 of block 47. The group could not go forward with any grant writing or other financial pursuits without knowing if the property was for sale.

"We need an intent to sell," said Hocking.

Following discussion, it was decided that the property mentioned would be transferred to Newell Economic Development Corporation. That organization has the option of selling the property and giving a large share of the proceeds back to the city.

Mayor Wetz specified that the time frame of when the property would be sold was out of the city's hands and it was up to the Economic Development Corporation.

During the October 2020 city commission, following an executive session and further discussion with the group, the Newell City Commission had decided that no action would be taken at that time.

The first reading of Ordinance 05-2020, A Temporary Ordinance Regarding the Issuance of Local Medical Cannabis Establishment Permits and/or Licenses, was done.

Briefly, the ordinance states that "a medical cannabis establishment desiring to operate in the Municipality shall be required to apply for a permit and/or license from the Municipality.'

The licenses will not be accepted until the South Dakota Department of Health has promulgated regulations. Also, any application received prior to those regulations will be denied.



tion water for 516 9th St. and 913 Dartmouth Ave. ended with any decision being tabled until next month. Belle Fourche Irrigation District Manager Tristan Clements explained that owners Paul Erk and Todd Komes would like to surrender approximately seven acres of irrigation allotment to Newell so that they would have a garden turnout under the city's allotment. BFID is satisfied with the request as all the paperwork has been filed, but the final decision must be made by city officials.

Foreman Larry Parker informed the commission members that it could cost around \$3,500 to \$4,000 to put pipe from the present underground pipe to the two residents. It would take a considerable time to recoup that cost he said.

A lengthy discussion ensued dealing with location and cost. Mayor Wetz suggested that more time was needed to investigate cost and need and called for tabling the decision.

Commission members and residents of Newell have voiced concern with the unfinished splash pad in the North Park. Newell Improvement Corporation representatives Betty Bruner and Judy Dague were available to explain the delays

that have hounded the organization. Presently, construction is on hold while the group is endeavoring to find a plumber. NIC has contracted with an electrician, concrete contractor, and a general contractor.

Bruner proposed that the group put up a fence to discourage vandalism and keep people safe. The commissioner accepted that and expect it to be done soon. She also assured members that the organization is attempting to do everything they can to finish the project.

Foreman Parker asked that a person be hired for a part-time position, usually half-days as needed. He said that with repairs to irrigation lines, etc. he and Verl Tifft could not accomplish everything that needed to be done. It was decided that someone should be hired in a seasonal position working less than 19 hours per week at \$12 per hour.

Animal tags and mowing were discussed by the commissioners. Finance Officer Jennifer Parrow disclosed that letters had been sent to legally licensed animal owners. Out of the 181 animals listed by the city, only 66 animals had been licensed at this point. Finance Clerk Sheila Smith will call owners to verify ownership. The situation will be checked next month.

Mayor Wetz suggested that

any animal that is running loose should be picked up and is it isn't licensed it should be forfeited and either adopted or euthanized. According to Parker, when an animal is in the care of the city the sheriff is called.

Written complaints are important to get control of the running animals, said Parrow.

There are several lots within the town's limits that are not being taken care of, according to Parrow. Eleven letters had been sent to various property owners, but only four had complied and mowed. Parrow had done some investigation concerning what other cities were charging to mow. Mayor Wetz suggested that a minimum charge of \$200 plus \$35 per hour for the labor would be reasonable per the city attorney's approval. A motion was made and approved by the commissioners.

Parker is checking on the water usage this past two and half weeks since over 1.5 million gallons have been used. He is not sure if there could be a leak or where the water is going but it is substantially higher than normal, nearly double in fact Parker stated. He will continue to investigate.

The next regular commission meeting will be held July 12 at 6 p.m.

# SD Highway 34 Road Work Underway

RAPID CITY, S.D. - The South Dakota Department of Transportation says a chip seal and fog seal application will be applied to S.D. Highway 34 in the Rapid City area beginning Monday, June 21

The chip seal will take place on Highway 34 from the intersection of S.D. Highway 79 east of Sturgis to the Belle Fourche River and will take approximately six days to complete

with an additional two days for the fog seal.

Traffic will be reduced to one lane and guided through the project with the use of flaggers and a pilot car. A delay of up to 15 minutes can be expected while traveling through the work area during daytime

Loose gravel will be present for a period of 36 to 72 hours after each day's chip seal application. Traffic should travel at 40 mph or the posted speed limit if it is less than 40 mph during this time frame. The permanent pavement markings are scheduled to be applied within 14 days of completion of the chip and fog seal applications.

The prime contractor on this \$1.4 million project is Bituminous Paving, Inc. from Ortonville, Minnesota.

### **Biden's Backdoor Death Tax**

Over the past year, our farmers and ranchers went to work every day to feed this country during a time of great challenge and uncertainty for millions of Americans.

How does President Biden plan to thank them? By raising their taxes.

The so-called "American Families Plan" would create a backdoor death tax on family farms and millions of other small businesses.

For decades, our tax code has protected farmland from being double-taxed when it is passed on to the next generation by ensuring that a capital gain is not realized at the time of death and transfer – otherwise known as a step-up in basis. But President Biden needs more money to pay for his \$1.8 trillion wish list of big government programs, and he's expecting hardworking Americans to pick up the check. His tax plan would eliminate step-up in basis and impose a capital gains tax of up to 43.4 percent on unrealized gains valued at over \$1 million. President Biden claims that this

will only impact the wealthiest Americans. Unfortunately, that's not the case.

Farmers and ranchers tend to own large amounts of valuable land, equipment, and livestock that makes them appear wealthy on paper, but they often have very little cash on hand. They spend years incurring great costs to make their land more productive, but they never know each year whether they will make any money. By the time that land is transferred to an heir at death it likely will have increased greatly in value, and under President Biden's plan this would trigger a significant tax burden for the person who inherits it.

I experienced this firsthand when my dad died in an accident on our family farm and ranch. Our family was dealing with a tragedy, and suddenly we were faced with a massive death tax bill. We had land, machinery, and cattle, but we didn't have any money in the bank. Thankfully, we had support from our small community and were able to borrow on our land and pay off that debt. But it took ten years and a lot of sacrifice. Those less fortunate

than us would have been forced to sell the family farm to pay

that tax.

That's why I got into politics in the first place. And when I was in Congress, I worked with President Trump to repeal the death tax for most family farms in the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act.

Our farmers and ranchers face challenges every day that few of us can imagine. They work and sacrifice to feed the world while building something that they can pass on to their kids and grandkids. Another death tax will only make it more difficult for young farmers and ranchers to acquire the land and equipment needed to pursue a life in agriculture. As a result, we will see more farm consolidation and the loss of vibrant rural communities.

Prosperity is not created by higher taxes and bigger government. Leaders like Ronald Reagan and Donald Trump knew that. The American people create our shared prosperity through their independence, hard work, and ingenuity. Washington, D.C. should learn to leave that well enough alone.

### Roadside Mowing: Hold off Until July 10 attracted to the vegetation in

PIERRE, S.D. – The South Dakota Departments of Game, Fish and Parks (GFP) and Transportation (DOT) want to remind individuals there are laws and rules governing when mowing right-of-way ditches can begin on the state highway


"Roadside ditches provide valuable nesting cover for upland birds, especially in portions of the state where there is limited upland habitat," stated Tom Kirschenmann, GFP Division of Wildlife director. "Our department is asking the public to consider delaying having and mowing activities along roadside ditches as long as possible. These areas play a critical role in providing nesting habitat for pheasants. Even the delay of a week or two will result in more successful nest attempts."

While current rules addressing roadside ditch mowing is only applicable to state highways, GFP asks landowners to consider postponing mowing on all roadside ditches and follow the same dates that apply to state highways.

In the spring and early summer, hen pheasants seeking suitable nesting locations are

roadsides. Pheasant production in roadsides is diminished when roadsides are mowed prior to completion of nesting activity. Incubating hens nearing their hatch dates can be struck and killed by mowing equipment. Peak hatching generally occurs in mid-June. Hens and newly hatched broods remain susceptible to mowing equipment for another two weeks after hatching due to the restricted mobility of chicks and the tendency of the hen and young to hide from approaching danger rather than flushing to escape.



### **LEPC Looks to Improve Fire Protection Efforts**

BELLE FORUCHE - The Local Emergency Planning Committee met for the regular quarterly meeting June 16 and heard from Rob Holso, Senior Field Representative for ISO Mitigation. ISO is a company whose main function is designed to help municipalities to improve fire protection efforts.

Holso comes into a community about every five years to evaluate Public Protection

Classification, which sets the risk of fire loss. He follows a Fire Suppression Rating Schedule by evaluating dispatch, fire departments, water systems, and community risk reduction. Standards are set by the National Fire Protection Association.

Holso said that it helps communities to see what needs to be done and what has been accomplished by following guidelines given by his evaluations. It benefits the community by reflecting on the community's involvement in fire protection.

His evaluation also helps to set insurance ratings. Communities can see where improvements can be made and that can enhance property owners' insurance rates.

There are several things that can be done to improve a score. Water flow is checked for adequacy. A community can do an annual hydrant check, document what is done and when, and do a flow test on hydrants. This can raise the score.

A fire department's training, organization, and record keeping all aid in raising a score. Holso checks the software used in dispatch and the overall system. Butte County is kept upto-date regularly and receives good marks.

The role of LEPC is to form a partnership with local governments and industries as a resource for enhancing hazardous materials awareness and vigilance. Local governments are responsible for the planning and response within their area. Butte County LEPC strives to coordinate the readiness of the Belle Fourche, Nisland, Newell and Vale Fire Departments and works with dispatch and law enforcement by forming documentation of hazardous materials in the area.

The local committee is made up of law enforcement, city officials, dispatch members, and other concerned citizens of Butte County. A local entity that may have hazardous materials on site usually speaks at one of the quarterly meetings held at the Butte County Courthouse. The next meeting will be September 15, 2021 at noon.

### Farm Service Agency Now Accepting Nominations for County **Committee Members**

HURON – The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) began accepting nominations for county committee members on June 15. Elections will occur in certain Local Administrative Areas (LAA) for these members who make important decisions about how federal farm programs are administered locally. All nomination forms for the 2021 election must be postmarked or received in the local FSA office by Aug. 2, 2021.

"We need enthusiastic, diverse leaders to serve other agricultural producers locally on FSA County Committees," said Joseph Schultz, Acting State Executive Director for FSA in South Dakota. "Now's your time to step up and truly make an impact on how federal programs are administered at the local level to reach all producers fairly and equitably."

Schultz said agricultural producers who participate or cooperate in a USDA program, and reside in the LAA that is

up for election this year, may be nominated for candidacy for the county committee. A cooperating producer is

someone who has provided information about their farming or ranching operation to FSA, even if they have not applied or received program benefits. Individuals may nominate themselves or others and qualifying organizations may also nominate candidates.

USDA encourages minority producers, women and beginning farmers or ranchers to nominate, vote, and hold office.

Nationwide, more than 7,700 dedicated members of the agricultural community serving on FSA county committees. The committees are made up of three to 11 members who serve three-year terms. Producers serving on FSA county committees play a critical role in the day-today operations of the agency. Committee

members are vital to how FSA carries out disaster programs, as well as conservation, commodity and price support

programs, county office employment and other agricultural issues.

LAAs are elective areas for FSA committees in a single county or multi-county jurisdiction. This may include LAAs that are focused on an urban or suburban area.

More Information Producers should contact their local FSA office today to register and find out how to get involved in their county's election. They should check with their local USDA Service Center to see if their LAA is up for election this year. To be considered, a producer must be registered and sign an FSA-669A nomination form. The form and other information about FSA county committee elections

are available at fsa.usda.gov/elections. Election ballots will be mailed to

eligible voters beginning Nov. 1, 2021. To find your local USDA Service Center, visit farmers.gov/service-locator.
