Troy Shockey Off Council; **Special Elec**tion Sept. 8th.

The Ward 1 seat vacated by Troy Shockey for violation of the City's meeting attendance ordinance was left unchanged by the City Council at its June 15 meeting. A special election to fill the seat will be held September 8, 2020.

The Mayor and council made provision on the agenda to hear from Shockey regarding the issue. During his remarks the exchange between Shockey and Mayor Gloria Landphere became heated at times.

Ward 3 councilor James Ager made a motion to go into executive session to discuss the matter, but was told it was not legal to do so.

The hearing began with Landphere reading a statement that outlined the reason for the vacating of the seat.

"This is on the request for the council to retrospectively excuse the absences from a council meeting or committee meeting pursuant to Ordinance 2.004050C. It's my position that Mr. Shockey resigned from his Ward 1 council seat

School District Gathering Ideas for Re-Opening This Fall

BELLE FOURCHE - The Belle Fourche School District has begun a pre-planning phase aimed at re-opening schools this fall. According to District Superintendent Dr. Steven Willard there are three options that are under consideration as planning moves forward.

"There's still a lot of unknowns out there," Willard said. "We don't know how the 4th of July Roundup or the rally will impact western South Dakota but we need to have different things prepared."

At present the district will be making known to the public several options and then seeking feedback from staff, teachers, daycare providers and parents before finalizing those options to present to the school board within the next few weeks.

"We may attempt a parent survey or a parent meeting to gather input once our plans are out there," Willard said.

The parent meeting may take the form of a live get together in the high school gymnasium with chairs spread out, a Zoom call, or a combination of both, according to Willard.

"We don't have all the answers and I don't think anybody will," he said. "As we go along we'll adapt. Right now we're concerned about the safety of our children, our community and our teachers. And that will be the important thing as we move along, balanced with a lot of common sense.'

One change that the district says will take place regardless, is a requirement that if your child is ill, don't send them to school. If they come to school and are ill and have a temperature, they will be sent home. "So if both parents work they will have to have a place to take their child if they are ill."

The first option would be to open school on time on Wednesday, August 19, with the hope of returning to as much normalcy as possible. If the district is allowed to run buses they will and they will allow parents the option of dropping their children off if they don't wish to ride the bus. There will be an increased emphasis on hygiene with hand sanitizers and frequent disinfecting of surfaces as students leave classrooms. Wearing of masks will be up to the parents of each student and would not be mandatory.

"Anyone who knows kids, any age kids, to have them wear a mask all day will be a challenge," Willard said. "So we're

not going to mandate masks but it sure will be an option."

Under this plan parents who are just not comfortable will their child coming back to school will have the option of distance learning for the first month or two or even the entire school year. Curriculum will be available online at no charge to the parent.

"We will have a better online component than we did this spring because we're preparing for it," Willard said. "And there will be a better ability to contact the teacher, that was a component that needed to be strengthened."

A second plan would be a

record and release new music. Up until March, the Judd



slight modification of the first. This would involve starting the school year after Labor Day.

"That would give us a chance to see if there's any impact from the rally," Willard said. "It would give us a two-week window."

The third option would be a full on-line distance-learning platform with schools remaining closed. This option would involve a state mandate, as did the previous one in March.

"The Governor is doing a great jog trying to gather as much information as possible," he said. "I would think that if we have a huge spread it might become an option. But as a people in South Dakota we're being pretty careful so hopefully that won't happen. At the same time, we don't know the impact of the rally just yet."

Already the district has reopened some athletic facilities and its summer after-school programs are up and running. According to Willard this has been going very well and the district was just approved to begin phase two of it's activities re-opening plan this week. That plan includes increased hygiene, physical distancing protocols and daily temperature checks.

"It's kind of a litmus test for what the fall's going to look like. And it's going really well," he said.

Belle Fourche schools were closed in mid-March and already students have had the equivalent of a summer break. And if all continues to go as planned, some students may have the opportunity to begin the upcoming school year a bit

Willard says they are looking at what is known as a "Jump Start" program. This would involve a 2 to 4 week session on

the school campus within a July to August timeframe.

"This would allow our elementary students the ability to come in and prepare for their next grade level," he said. "And it would be a good way for us to practice our new procedures."

Willard said that 4th grade students who are moving up to Middle School would be able to tour the new campus and become familiar with their surroundings, much as they would have, had school not been closed.

"We are also looking at expanding our credit recovery sessions for older students in order to allow them to stay on track for graduation," he said.

All plans will have to be approved by the school board. "We'll present our ideas and the board will tell us what they want to accept and what they don't want to accept," he said.

Any type of fall athletic schedule is still up in the air as the district waits for guidance form SDHSAA. By nature, the various falls sports require differing levels of physical distancing.

"The activities association

hasn't determined what their policies will be on that," he said. "You can social distance in the stands but you really can't in a huddle."

Willard says he feels it is important to get children back in school, if it can be done with common sense and safety. Not only for learning but also for the social and emotional needs of students who need to be assured that they don't have to fear one another.

"Sometimes we miss a big part of this whole world situation we're in right now. It is the mental and emotional side." Willard said. "Children need to have a routine and see a trusted adult every day in front of them that can give them encouragement and answer questions. It's not just the curriculum they're learning but it's having the children in school where they can talk things through with their teachers about what's going on in the world. That's huge.

"Children need hugs. And I think if a parent doesn't want their student to be hugged they need to tell us," Willard continued. "Otherwise we're gonna hug them."

due to his failure to attend three consecutive meetings," she began.

She went on to say this was an opportunity for Shockey to be heard to request excused absences or give any other reason why he has not resigned his seat. She added the council enacted the ordinance in question as a way for the council to hold itself accountable to the people of Belle Fourche by ensuring council members attend meetings they are supposed to attend in order to represent taxpayers. Under subparagraph B the ordinance mandates that any council person who has failed to attend three consecutive council or committee meetings or combination thereof shall be deemed to have resigned their

There are two separate ways for a council member with excessive absences to be heard: One way is the member in question is required to meet with the mayor to discuss their continued service. The second is if the council as a body may excuse the absence from a meeting for good cause. Good cause is defined by Black's dictionary as a legally sufficient reason. The burden to prove good cause is placed on the council member in question to show why a request should be granted or an action excused.

The result of all of that is to ensure the council member has ample opportunity to avoid resigning.

Shockey was said to have missed a council meeting May 18, a Center of the Nation **Business Committee meeting** May 19, and the June 1 council meeting.

The vacancy was said to have begun after the June 1 council meeting was adjourned. Landphere stated it was important to address the issue now so there is no question for the public as to Shockey's status.

Shockey did meet with council president Vern Hintz and Vice President Annie Reich on June 5 and was supposed to meet with Mayor Landphere June 9 to talk about his continued service on the council. He did not attend although he was served with notice to attend the meeting. Landphere did attend and waited for 12 minutes.

The council is in this position solely due to Mr. Shockey's actions. In the event there is a

misunderstanding as to whether Mr. Shockey missed three consecutive meetings subject to the ordinance, Mr.Shockey could have brought this to my attention or the attention of the council President or Vice-President. Unfortunately, Mr.Shockey has not communicated with me about any potential misunderstanding and failed to attend the June 9 meeting," said

Immediately, Ward 3 Councilor James Ager made a motion to approve the retrospective excusing of the absences. He outlined that the Center of the Nation **Business Committee receives** no city funding as far as he knows so it isn't really city business. Also, he mentioned that Shockey did let council President Vern Hintz know he wouldn't be attending the June 1 meeting, so that should be excused as well. A motion was made to that effect. Randy Schmidt seconded the motion and discussion followed. Mayor Landphere asked if they would withdraw the motion so discussion could proceed with Troy Shockey, at which time Shockey was allowed to speak. He began by saying the effort amounted to a witch hunt, but then he began to outline his reasons for wanting to remain on the council. He explained that the May 18 council meeting was said to be on Zoom, of which he could not sign in but then found out it was an in-chamber meeting. As for the Center of the Nation Business

Committee? 'I met with Mayor Landphere on May 20 to respectfully decline the appointment to this committee. There's nothing in state statute or city ordinance that states I must accept committee appointments. And at no point did you ask for my schedule or availability to attend committee meetings," said Shockey.

He asserted that the June 1 meeting was missed because of work and he was told work was excused. He further stated he should not have to ask for a retrospective excuse for his absences.

"I didn't have to meet with Vern Hintz and Annie Reich, but I went about it through protocol of the ordinance. I refuse to answer to the Mayor. I refuse to and I still refuse to answer and sit down in a meeting with her counsel. I don't answer to her. I answer to you guys,

my colleagues and the city of Belle Fourche citizens. Period. I won't stand for anything less. I will not answer to her. Ever!" he said.

He asked about the cost for every meeting Mayor Landphere met with legal counsel Kellen Willert. "For what? It's a witch hunt is what it is, a serious witch hunt. Why? Is it a public spanking or persecution of character?" he asked. He added that this a control issue on the part of some on the council and he hoped the voters see that for what it is and make necessary changes for Belle Fourche in the next election. "What did this witch hunt cost the people of Belle Fourche, Mayor, Councilman Talkington or Mr. Willert? What did your office charge the people of Belle Fourche for this cha-

rade?" he asked. The question was then called, and the meeting became a dizzying series of motions, legal opinions and comments. It was a back-and-forth about the three absences and how they were viewed, if Shockey informed the right people of his missing a meeting, and the procedures involved in all of it. The comment was made that Shockey didn't even want to have his absences excused. since he feels he didn't have three in a row.

The discussion centered on protocol and proper procedure, whether Shockey or even other councilors have followed such. At that time the conversation between Shockey and Mayor Landphere became heated.

"Is this how you're going to persecute an active member of your board? Everybody here and those on the camera know I"m an active member of this board and this is how you're going to persecute me? Seriously?" he demanded. Mayor Landphere interjected,

"Just a moment. We're not persecuting you," she began. The exchange between the two eroded to the point that Landphere sternly gaveled Shockey; "We're going to have order here," she said. She told Shockey that he had

been given all the information relative to the issue and all aspects of the ordinance.

At this point, City Attorney Kellen Willert stated that there was a motion to close the discussion of which it would take a two-thirds majority for it to pass.

And then they would vote on excusing the absences. It failed so discussion continued. Landphere asked that the conversation get back to the real reason they were there; for Shockey to state his case.

The question was raised about who is responsible to inform the council when one is going to be absent. Mayor Landphere responded it is up to the councilor to have absence mentioned as part of the agen-

Shockey was asked by James Ager if he wanted to remain on the council, to which he said he would like to finish his term. Ward 2 councilor Annie Reich asked Shockey if he would just

ask for excusing the absences, to which he said that was not possible since he didn't feel he had missed three in a row.

Finally, a motion was made to retrospectively excuse the absences, and the vote was 4 to 3. The motion required a majority of five, so it failed, and Shockey's seat was officially vacated. Council president Vern Hintz read a proclamation that stipulated that because of the three absences on the part of Troy Shockey, his seat had been vacated and a special election will be held to fill that vacancy. The council then approved the special election for September 8, 2020.


The Power of the Arts and **Culture in Revitalization**

For years, I was an art skeptic, as I couldn't see the how the numbers would add up. But my numbers mentality led me into a trap as I was not taking into consideration or quantifying the



While Covid-19 has slowed events down. they will return. One need look no further than a successful concert, a successful art show, a successful play or theater event, a successful food, dance or music festival to begin to piece togeth-

er a financial picture worth a thousand words. When one factors in the indirect or intangible value to the community derived from those events, one can then begin to better understand or quantify numbers that paint a far different picture.

Here are but a few examples of indirect value. When you have an art show that may only break even or even lose a few dollars on the surface, what is the value to the community of tens of thousands dollars changing hands in the support of local artists? If a concert breaks even, what is the value of visitors and tourists that attended that event and stayed over-night, bought food and maybe even shopped? If you create an art district, what is the value of the repeated visits by out of town visitors to your city? While those are all somewhat quantifiable, we are still missing a very important piece of the puzzle; that of the creativity and uniqueness aspect that arts and culture bring to your community.

It is that creativity, uniqueness, passion and culture that ultimately bring the heart and soul to the community. Sure, you can attempt to do that through unique retail and dining experiences and those are very important as well. But ultimately, to achieve the maximum success, it is the combining of retail and dining experiences

with the various components of art and culture that make sense for your community. The combination of those will propel your community to it's ultimate level of achievement. One without the other will always leave you short of your potential.

I am still a numbers guy, that hasn't changed. What has changed is that I now am willing to evaluate the merits of intangible benefits and create an equation factoring those in. That would be my challenge as well to the arts and culture community. When building your case, build it on the strength of the numbers, not the strength of hope. Hope makes for a very poor business strategy and relying on hope will only bring despair in today's economic realities that communities are faced with. There are many intangible assets, use them to your advantage and your community will benefit.





BELLE FOURCHE - The centennial Black Hills Roundup was one for the record books last year but the 101st will not be far behind. A record number of contestants have entered the event this year, featuring world champions in nearly every

"We have a total of 1,275 contestants entered this year," said Keith Anderson, Roundup Committee Chairman. "We even had to turn hundreds away because we were at capacity."

The number of contestants entered in 2020 represents about 400 more than were in attendance last year for the 100th. There are only about 6 PRCA

rodeos happening July 4th weekend when normally there would be around 30, according to Anderson. He expects an all-star lineup, barring turnouts.

"We will have two days of slack on July 1st and the 3rd with steer

roping on the 2nd," Anderson said. "We'll begin at eight in the morning and you'll see world champions in the slack."

Entrants thus far include most of the champion Wright brothers from Utah who have excelled in Saddle Bronc riding, Jacobs and Sterling Crawley, bull riders Sage Kimzey, Trey Benton III and Boudreaux Campbell, bareback riders Tim O'Connell and Kaycee Field, Clayton Bigelow, and Richie Champion. Others who have en-

tered include Cort Scheer, Isaac Diaz, Zeke Thurston, ropers Shad Mayfield, Tuf Cooper, bronc rider Cody DeMoss, Chet Johnson and local favorites like

Shorty Garrett and Cole Elshere who are ranked in the top ten. Top barrel racers include local favorites Jessica Routier and Lisa Lockhart.

"We actually have 274 barrel racers entered when there's usually 90 to

100. And we're maxed out at 60 bareback riders. It's really a who's who like we've never seen before," Anderson said. "Of course it is all contingent on call backs and turnouts but it's really gonna be something to see.'

Also for the first time the Belle Fourche event will be live-streamed on the Cowboy Channel. Jeff Medders, President of the Network, told the Beacon that they would be working with Western Sky Media to provide a live feed of all

four rounds of the event. There is also the likelihood that the ranch rodeo on June 30th will be shown as well.

Specialty acts include Slim Garner with his airplane act, chuckwagon (hopefully without the mud) and Dana Bowman will making a jump on July 4th. Also, according to Anderson, a B1 flyover will precede the parade on Saturday morning at 10am. The flyover will be contingent upon mission availability and any last minute changes and directives from the Air Force.

Anderson says that the number of vendors who will be at the rodeo grounds this year is close to 25. That is four times more than there were last year.

"From jewely, leatherworks, hats and boots there will be a lot of options," Anderson said. "It's kind of neat."

Fans are encouraged this year to buy tickets online if possible. This will make COVID compliance easier when entering the event. The Roundup begins with the ranch rodeo on Tuesday, June 30th and continues with 4 PRCA rounds from July 1st through July 4th.

Northstar Carnival to Return

The carnival will be back once again for the Black Hills Roundup. Due to COVID there will be a few changes.

First, Northstar Amusements will be bringing slightly fewer rides in order to provide more space for physical distancing

Also, the carnival workers will be disinfecting ride surfaces in between loading. So be prepared for a bit of a longer wait in between rides.

With a little patience and a few safety measures we can still have a safe, enjoyable and fun carnival!

The carnival is scheduled to open June 30th at 5:00PM and run through July 4th.

The Black Hills Roundup Set to Open its Second Century

The 101st Annual Black Hills Roundup in Belle Fourche will take place June 30 - July 4, 2020. The event includes four days of rodeo action, a NorthStar Amusement Carnival, concerts, food and more. The Roundup will celebrate 101 years with a Ranch Rodeo, two nights of fireworks and a parade.

The Black Hills Roundup started when 15,000 people gathered in a field in Belle Fourche, S.D., to raise money for World War I in 1918. At the time, the population of Belle Fourche was 1,410. The next year marked the first time the rodeo took place.

Belle Fourche is a little town just north of the Black Hills of South Dakota, founded in 1892. Celebrated cowboy and Sheriff Seth Bullock let with his elbows to get the railroad to come to Belle Fourche; it soon exploded with activity into the national hub for the shipping of

cattle and sheep.

The Black Hills Roundup is one of the oldest continuously held outdoor rodeos in the country. The rodeo has come a long way since its beginning as a ranch-style rodeo to the four-performance PRCA event with top ranked cowboys and cowgirls.

The historic rodeo which is 100 percent volunteer-run, also boasts that President Calvin Coolidge attended in 1927. The Black Hills Roundup is still one place where rodeo fans are treated to a live cowboy band. Large crowds continue to support the rodeo at the time of its induction, with an estimated 10,000-15,000 attending a parade during rodeo week in the town of about 6,000.

Strong roots in the western tradition - and a powerful patriotism - spurred the community to hold the first Black Hills Roundup in 1918, as a fundraiser for the Red

Cross and the American boys fighting the great War. Enthusiastic ranchers, locals and cowboys from throughout the west gathered for the event, which raised \$20,000 and included auction items ranging from a pet antelope

In 2020, the Black Hills Roundup will celebrate its 101st year. Doing the math? It seems 2020 should be the 102nd year, but the event took a year off during World

God's Simple Plan of Salvation

My Friend: I am asking you the most important question of life. Your joy or your sorrow for all eternity depends upon your answer. The question is: Are you saved? It is not a question of how good you are, nor if you are a church member, but are you saved? Are you sure you will go to Heaven when you die?

God says in order to go to Heaven, you must be born again. In John 3:7, Jesus said to Nicodemus, "Ye must be born again."

In the Bible God gives us the plan of how *to be born again* which means *to be saved*. His plan is simple! You can be **saved** today. How?

"... God commendeth His love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, **Christ died for us.**" (Romans 5:8).

Although we cannot understand how, God said **my sins and your sins** were laid upon Jesus and **He died in our place**. He became **our substitute**. It is true. God cannot lie.

across the torrent of water, they finally secued the rest of the half-clad, but wholly scared, cowpunchers. Beds, saddles and camp euippage were stewn for miles down the creek. "Under the express requirements of the mining laws and the decisions of all courts, discovery of mineral has been the sole basis for the location of a mining claim.

Mrs. Robb was a familiar figure in Belle Fourche Roundup parade in the late 1930's and up into the 1950's riding on horse back, on a side saddle, which was the custom in early days. Wearing a sunbonnet, and with her long skirt reaching below the stirrup, she rode beside the covered wagon entry of the Black Hills Half Century Club which she was a charter member.







New Provisions for Teen Drivers

PIERRE, S.D. – Provisions which strengthen South Dakota's current graduated driver's license laws for teen drivers between the ages of 14 and 18

The changes were part of Senate Bill 113, which was approved by this year's state Kristi Noem.

*** Changes the require length of time to hold a car or motorcycle instruction permit from 180 days to 275 days;

*** Adds a new requirement for 50 hours of parent/guardian supervised driving, including 10 hours of which must be during inclement weather and another 10 hours

of time a minor who has passed

on an instruction permit from 90 days to 180 days;

*** Changes the age for a mandatory restricted minor's permit from 16 to 18; and,

*** Prohibits passengers outside the immediate/ family or household for the first six months driving on restricted permit, and one non-family/ household member second six-







cording to Michelle May, 4-H Youth Program Advisor for Butte and Lawrence Counties, there are four reasons for putting the brakes on any further fair-related endeavors.

The reasons, outlined in a recent letter to 4-H members, include: 1) Unity between the fair board, livestock superintendents and the static committee, 2) Potential of low participation levels and feedback, 3) Inability to have and host a show near 'normal,' and 4) Potential lack of a true learning experience and lack of social interaction.

A previous letter spoke of opportunities to submit virtual entries for static exhibits, and a limited livestock show. But that was before and this is now, after the 4-H livestock superintendents and the local static committee met and after announced the official decision to table all 4-H Livestock and Static shows until 2021.

"This sentence has not been typed without a ton of time. work, discussion and detail from so man of our loyal leaders," said May in the email.



"It could affect the load rating on that bridge by adding

concrete," he said, referring to the expected 114 tons. "Most counties are getting away from asphalt, because they put so much salt on it and it deteriorates so badly. I can check it and get back to you at the next meeting."

Heidrich also sent in a request to go look at a Contour Road Groomer at Bowman, N.D. This would be used in place of the disk the crew is currently using to pull the ditches.

Then and Now in Newell

June 30, 1910

Quite a number from Newell attended the baseball dance given at Vale Saturday evening. They all report a good time and say that the Vale bunch are the best lot of entertainers that they have ever met. The Fisk Bros and Mr. Ely furnished the music. Editor Barnes, Will Melena, Rudolph Radak and Jeff Unruh along with "Met" McClung and Henry Richman were in attendance.

Miss Suzie Crosley and Bradley Weir were united in Marriage June 14 by the Justice of Peace in Meade Co. The young people are honyockers from Fairfax, SD. The wedding supper was cooked on a campfire in the shadow of the pines. The groom's father and brother-in-law were guests. An old hen was placed in the wagon by chivareers, unknown to the wedding party and was taken on the honeymoon and was brought safely home none worse for the long journey. The rain overtook the bridal party on the gumbo.

This is the year that the 17year locust is due again and in a few weeks he will make his appearance on the farms in the west. At least the authorities on locust lore and superstitions are sure he will and they have never been mistaken in the past. No one seems to know exactly where the 17-year locust comes from, but it is a matter of record that he does show up regularly just the same. Farmers and old timers are interested in whether he will bring a "W" or a "P" on his wings. It is hoped a "P" for peace and no "W" for war. Records show 1893 the last

time the locust was here, the US got into war in Spain, 1859 the Civil War followed, 1842 Mexican War and all the cycle years with "P" were quiet.

June 24, 1920

George Boal of the firm Barrett & Boal has sold out his interest in the business to Jack Barrett and expects to engage in the store business with C.M. Simons at Stoneville. The Valley Irrigator wishes Mr. Boal success in his new location.

Ambrose King, who has been holding down the job as prescription druggist at the Smith-Doherty Drug Store in Nisland for the last 2 years, resigned his position and quit the store Monday morning. We have not learned what his intentions are, but hope it will be some business that will keep him in Nisland for he is too good a man to lose.

Several of the Vale neighbors came to Newell Saturday only to be caught in the heavy rain in the afternoon. Horse Creek is up again and running over the road. This makes the 4th time this season. It is certainly poor encouragement to fix roads to say the least.

June 26, 1930

H.H. Brown and Frances Jacobsen are going to be in business in Belle Fourche during the celebration, running a hamburger stand. Mr. Brown went to Belle Fourche to make the necessary arrangements for the concession.

Mrs. R.E. Nichols suffered a painful injury Monday when her hand caught in a wringer of an electric washing machine.

June 27, 1940

Nearly a hundred friends and relatives gathered at the home of Mr. & Mrs. Ypparila northwest of Newell Sunday to give them a pleasant surprise on the occasion of their 25th wedding anniversary. The event was planned by friends here and from the Hills and a most pleasant afternoon of visiting and games was enjoyed with the honored couple presented a number of beautiful gifts and congratulations. Special guests attending from a distance were Mrs. Ypparila's sister Mr. & Mrs. John Nummivuori and son of Astoria, Oregon and Mr. & Mrs. Math Seppanen and family of Watertown.

More than a dozen people in but one group of vehicles were stranded for 5 hours along US Highway 212 east of Newell late Saturday afternoon following a general rain in the territory. The scene of these "mud" vehicles was at the end of the gravel, where 5 cars and 2 trucks found themselves 5 hours in progressing but 4 miles. In one of the cars were Mr. & Mrs. Frank Munroe and daughter of Phoenix, Ariz, who were enroute to visit Mr. & Mrs. Chas W. Munroe and other relatives in Newell, agreed that this highway in its present condition would be a disgrace to a Township, let alone on entire

June 29, 1950

Cecil Guerrero received his diploma last week in watch making and chronograph repairing as a graduate of the American Academy School of Horology in Denver, Colo. Guerrero, a graduate of Newell High School, is a son of Felix Guerrero, formerly of Horse Creek, now of Lead.

With a bid under \$5,000 and much less than first expected, the Fish & Wildlife Service has let a contract to recase the well at Bear Butte, which feeds Bear Butte Lake. The repairs would be started very soon, in time to save the popular fishing lake where lowering water levels have threatened loss of a big fish supply.

June 30, 1960

The annual school election and meetings in Common School Districts last Tuesday produced a number of changes in Butte County schools for the coming year, according to County Supt. Naomi Spaulding: Empire School (5 Miles east of Vale) voted to close their school and send their 30 students by bus to Vale; Langdon School (in the Owl Creek District) will not operate, the children will be sent by bus to Newell and Vale; Winkler School, will close and those children will attend Horse Creek and Newell for the coming year; Red Water area

children have been sent by bus to Spearfish for years; the Hay Creek School will furnish bus transpiration for the 10 children to Belle Fourche School and the only change in the northeast part of the county, Fish Draw will re-open, which has been closed for 4 years instead of the O'Bryan School.

Christopherson. The ladies each told about their arrival in Newell in the early days and visiting was enjoyed, after which lunch was served.

Plans for building a 24x30 fire hall were made at a meeting of the Mud Butte Volunteer Fire Department held Thursday at that place. The building would be a frame construction. Besides housing the fire equipment, includes a pick-up with a pump, tank and 2-way radio, it would also be used as a town hall for community meetings and etc. Sam Sundstrom was named to direct the building project. The Mud Butte Fire Department was organized a year ago and has already made considerable progress in securing equipment and it would not be possible without excellent support from the Mud Butte Community, from Hoover, Zeona, Cedar Canyon, Sulphur, Maurine, Newell and other areas.



"W" OR A "P" - Folklore of the early 1900's and before said if the 17-year locust had a "w" on it's wings it would mean war would follow. If there was a "p" it would mean peace. It is not known in 1910 if the N-V-N area locust emerged with a "w" or a "p" but World War I followed 8 years later in 1918.

Road Work on Hwy 85 in **Butte County Underway**

BELLE FOURCHE, S.D. -The South Dakota Department of Transportation says crews will begin replacing culverts under Highway 85 at mile markers 57, 62 and 68, north of Belle Fourche the week of June 22, 2020.

Highway 85 will be reduced to one lane at mile markers 57 and 62 with traffic controlled by flaggers. A gravel surface will be in place until asphalt pavement is placed.

Highway 85 will be reduced to one lane at mile marker 68 with traffic controlled by stop signs. A gravel surface will be in place until asphalt pavement is placed.

Motorists are reminded to slow down through work zones and be aware of suddenly slowing and stopped traffic, as well as construction workers and equipment adjacent to the driving lane.

Additional culvert repairs and asphalt resurfacing will be completed throughout the year on this area-wide project.

The overall completion date for the project is Oct. 30, 2020. The South Dakota Department

of Transportation says crews will begin asphalt resurfacing on Highway 85 between mile markers 99 and 112, south of Buffalo, on Monday, June 22,

The work includes milling the asphalt surface and placing a new asphalt surface.

During the milling and asphalt resurfacing, Highway 85 will be reduced to one lane during working hours with traffic controlled by flaggers and a pilot car.

Motorists can expect up to 15-minute delays, suddenly slowing and stopped traffic, uneven or rough surface, and construction equipment and workers adjacent to the road-

The overall completion date for the project is Oct. 30, 2020.


