Tackling Neighborhood Works Projects

Adam Nowowiejski, Belle Fourche High School Activities director is a gregarious team leader with a firm handshake. Last week, Adam and a group of student volunteers painted a house on the north side of Belle Fourche. The students (see photos) are participants in various activities at Belle Fourche High School. Despite temperatures in the upper 90s, the kids turned out in impressive numbers as part of a partnership with NeighborWorks in Deadwood. They completed the project in just two days. "The kids rocked." Adam proudly complimented the crew at the

The local South Dakota NeighborWorks, located in Deadwood shares a mission with the larger national organization: to provide housing assistance to those in need and in doing so, improve the quality of life for individuals and their larger communities.

Paul Kuhn has served NeighborWorks in Deadwood since 2015. Among his various roles,

he is a community outreach coordinator and grant writer. Paul explained the "Paint the Town" program that the NeighborWorks organization initiated 29 years ago. Altogether 151 houses have been painted in the area, including 8 houses in Belle Fourche.

"We find homes to paint in local communities. Sometimes

we drive around and look for houses that need painting. Then we follow up with the owners to a small non-profit agency with

see if they qualify." He said. To qualify for the Paint the Town program, applicants need only to prove that the home is owner-occupied, and that they are financially and physically unable to paint the house them-

Paul Kuhn, noted that NeighborWorks in Deadwood is only limited staff and funding. The Paint the Town Program is funded through grants and volunteers. He would like to have more resources available to help the many victims of hailstorm damage resulting from the devastating storm in June. Although those resources are not presently available, he encouraged people to reach out to NeighborWorks. "We can work with anyone."

Paul enjoyed relating the story about how the Neighbor-Works Paint the Town program and the High School Activities kids came together. "I love this story." He explained. Last year's Belle Fourche Paint the Town project was a house owned by a retired widow. Through a series of small town connections, it turned out that the home-owner was the widow of the football team bus driver. The Belle Fourche football team was immediately on board. They painted the house for their bus driver's widow and since then, the entire high school activities association has become involved. "They are taking the project over." Paul said.

NeighborWorks Plans to Build More Homes in BF

Down payment assistance, gap financing program gets boost from city.

news@bellefourchebeacon.com BELLE FOURCHE- NeighborWorks Dakota Home Resources plans to build up to five additional homes in Belle Fourche by the spring of 2023. Executive Director Mike Walker told the City Council at its July 18 meeting that the organization hopes to break ground on the first two homes in the next 30-60 days. In addition, NeighborWorks was able to secure a letter of support from the city to bolster its ap-

plication for additional funding from the South Dakota Housing Opportunity Fund to replenish NeighborWork's depleted Gap Financing pilot program.

NeighborWorks has built five homes in the city over the last two years, three of them completed in 2021 along Aurora Drive on the city's north side. These homes are intended for first time homebuyers or lower income residents who qualify. Due to the ongoing housing shortage in the community they plan to ramp up their efforts as land, labor, and supplies allow.

Walker also reported to the council that his organization has completed two home rehabilitation projects in areas of the city

designated by the 2020 community housing study as redevelopment districts.

"Both of those were roughly \$40,000 home rehab projects that were in the city's redevelopment district and allowed the homeowners to stay in their homes as life safety issues were taken care of."

One of the biggest programs that NeighborWorks is involved with right now, according to Walker, is the down payment assistance and gap financing program. With the increase in housing costs and, more recently, the increase in interest rates, many families who had

Leet Fowler 87

Leet E. Fowler, 87, of Belle Fourche, SD, passed away on July 18, 2022 at the Spearfish Regional Medical Center in Spearfish.

Obituaries

Funeral Services for Leet were held on Friday, July 22, 2022 at the St. James Lutheran Church in Belle Fourche. Pastor Kari Webb officiated the funeral services. Visitation for Leet was held at the church prior to services. Burial was held at the Buffalo Cemetery, Buffalo, SD, with Pastor Jean Helmer officiating the burial.

Leet Ellsworth Fowler was born February

10, 1935 in Camp Crook, South Dakota, to Bertha and Charles Fowler. He was the youngest of their five children, though he never got to know his father, who passed away when Leet was 14 months old.

Leet spent the first years of his life living in Buffalo. When he was five his mother married Ted Matson and the family moved to the ranch. His brother, James Matson, was born in 1941. Leet worked hard at a very young age, and was given responsibilities beyond his years.

He attended a one-room schoolhouse with several neighboring children, including his future wife, Maurine Brengle. He completed high school in Brookings, South Dakota, an agriculture-based school, and attended some college there. He also attended Black Hills College. He won the saddle bronc riding at the Buffalo Labor Day Rodeo in 1954. He served four years in the U.S. Navy. He was stationed on the USS Oriskany and then the USS Lexington in several locations around the Pacific.

A pivotal point in his life came when he married Maurine Brengle on June 18, 1961. They celebrated 61 years together and were excellent partners. Early on, he worked for Lloyd and Helga Gilbert. Later he had a trucking business for several years.

In 1972, the Fowlers moved back to the family ranch. In 1976 they formed Grubbing Hoe Ranch, Inc., with Matsons and Fowlers as shareholders. Ranching was Leet's life work and legacy, and he proved himself an astute businessman. He worked extremely hard, he thought constantly about ways to improve the operation, and strategically grew the ranch.

Due to his brother, Chuck's influence, he was an early adopter of computers. Leet admired Chuck greatly. Beginning in the early 1980s, Leet used the computer for ranch bookkeeping. He embraced technology whenever he could, from weather radars, to live camera feeds

monitoring calving heifers, to smart phones and online banking.

In 2006 Leet and Maurine began spending part of their time "semi-retired." They split their time between their home in Belle

Fourche and on the ranch.

Leet was a lifelong learner. If he wanted to know how to do something, he learned how. He was naturally ingenuitive. He was a cowboy; he was a carpenter; he was a plumber; he was an electrician; he was a heavy equipment operator; he was a trucker; he was a barber; he was woodworker; he

was a pilot; he did much of his own veterinary work. He played cards and cribbage. He was a self-taught musician, playing piano, accordion, and guitar. He collected clocks, and built a grandfather clock. He liked to get all the clocks wound and ticking, creating a cacophony of noise that he enjoyed immensely.

He respected people who knew and did things, and as much as he liked talking about cattle, he was happy to learn about others' area of expertise. He loved to laugh and tell stories; he loved to tease. He loved hitting various coffee stops around Belle, and going to the sale barn on Thursdays. He also enjoyed naps in front of the tv "watching" Gunsmoke and rodeos. He could be a little intense; he wasn't shy about saying what he thought. When the rubber met the road, he had a remarkable ability to tap into a reserve of calm and patience. He could sleep through a calf-killing blizzard so he was rested and ready to work the next day. He had a rough exterior but could also express his love and affection.

He loved Maurine. He loved his family and was proud of them. He loved his friends and continued to make new ones his entire life. He was a 59-year member of the Masonic Lodge, serving as Master of the Cedar Branch Lodge Number 179 in 1985, and was a Naja Shriner. He was a member of St. James Lutheran Church. He was a member of Harding County Stockgrowers and served as a director for the South Dakota Stockgrowers Association.

He is preceded in death by his parents; sisters Marion, Eleanor and Kay; brothers Charles and James; and his dear friend Pat Coffield. He's survived by his wife, Maurine; sons Ty (Melissa) and Aaron (Tricia), and daughter Teddi; four grandchildren, one great-grandchild, several nieces, nephews, and friends.



Austin Post 90

Austin Post, age 90 of Belle Fourche, and formerly Newell, died Monday, July 18, 2022 at Monument Health Rapid City Hospital, with his loving family by his side.

Austin lived a life devoted to service – to his country, his community and his family. He spent most of his life in Newell where his dedication to the community made him a well-known fixture in his hometown. He put in countless volunteer hours and over the years served in leadership positions for the Newell City Council, the Newell School Board and the First Lutheran church. His hard work also came with a healthy dose of humor that kept everyone around him entertained.

Austin will also be fondly remembered by a generation of youngsters who received Tootsie Rolls from him when they visited the Newell Post Office where he worked for nearly four decades.

Born in Rodman, Iowa in 1931 to Guy and Mabel Post (Sloan), he moved to Newell, South Dakota with his family at a young age. After graduating from New-

ll High School in 1949, Austin joined the U.S. Navy. He served two tours of duty aboard the destroyer USS Rupertus as a fire control technician during the Korean War. In 1953, Austin returned to Newell and took a job as a postal clerk at the Newell Post office. He was named Postmaster in 1977 and served in that position until his retirement in 1992 at age 61. His 39 years of service was marked by a large community celebration. Oct. 3, 1992 was declared "Austin Post Day" in South Dakota in his honor. Retirement didn't last long for Austin. To keep busy, he worked at

Newell's grocery store, at the Newell golf course and finally as a bus driver for the Newell School District for nearly 20 years. Austin married Donna in 1965. The couple spent many years in their beloved Newell, raising a family, enjoying time with friends, serving sideby-side in the community and enjoying many rounds of golf and walks around Newell. The couple moved to Belle Fourche in 2018 and celebrated their 57th wedding anniversary shortly before Austin's passing.

Austin is survived by his wife, Donna of Belle Fourche; daughters, Tina (JayCyn) Ager of Belle Fourche, and their children: Kennedy (and boyfriend Jack), and Brody; daughters, Lori Magelky of Sturgis, Reesa Stahl of Lead; son, Tim (Jen) Post of St. Paul MN and their children: Maddie and Janey; sister, Bobbie (Bill) Clark of Richarson TX; sister-in-law, Geraldine Post of Sioux Falls; 14 grandchildren; 17 great grandchildren; and many nieces and nephews.

Pastor's Perspective

This week's Pastor's Perspective is provided by Jean Helmer, Joy Fisher Ministries.



Theologian Henri Nouwen in "Following Jesus," states "if we know that first love [the love of God], if we dwell in the House of God, then the presence of God

in us can recognize the presence of God in [others]." He continues by saying that we are to do concrete acts of forgiveness and service. "Contrary to popular opinion, we are not called to imitate Jesus. We are called to form a community of people who, through different ways, reflect the great love of Jesus." Nouwen reminds us that, "to follow Jesus means that we do the walking. We are the ones doing the talking, living life, getting involved. We are the ones struggling, the ones who need to work hard." He continues with "Following Jesus means to live our life in companionship with the One who understands us fully."

"Companion," comes from the Old French compaignon and literally means 'one who breaks bread with another." It is based on the Latin com, meaning "together with", and "panis," meaning bread. Following Jesus means living life in communion with others and with Jesus as our guide.

At the Belle Fourche Arts Council's Concert in the Park recently, I observed a concrete act of service and forgiveness. It was truly a moment of living Nouwen's description of "life in communion with others," and it was a form of table communion as Jesus practiced it when he "ate with sinners."

Five unattended youngsters had wandered into Hermann Park. One wore inline skates. Another had a scooter board. They paused on the benches along the west side of the band shell, with the boys on one bench and the girls on the other. The children gave scant consideration to the music. They were clearly outsiders. It was then that I saw a lady put Nouwen's

"living life in communion with others" into practice. I had noticed a lady, a Belle Fourche educator, glance at the children a few times during the concert. She rose, approached the two girls, spoke to them, and then held out her hand. The girls' eyes grew large as they stood. The older girl, perhaps 8, took the younger girl's hand and listened closely as the lady continued speaking softly to them. Then, with a huge grin, the girl gestured to the boys to join them. They were led

to a table where the UCC had dishes of ice cream for a donation. The youngest child, a boy of perhaps 4 and clearly a "tag-a-long" to the others, held back. Again, the lady spoke softly to the oldest child whose jaw dropped then whose face lit in a radiant smile. The girl turned and began racing toward the littlest boy while gesturing for him to join them at the ice cream table. The boy said, "Me?" She nodded, and he sprinted gleefully to join the others. Ice cream bowl in hand, the five children returned to the benches to enjoy their treat. The real story, however, is in the transition that took place.

The children settled onto the benches. As they ate their treats, they were also studying the adults in front of them. As the concert continued, the children's actions began mirroring the adults' behavior. They were quiet during the musical numbers. They watched adults applaud and applauded tentatively as they tried on the behaviors they were observing. It was a communion service in its purest form. The children had been welcomed to the table, welcomed to the community of concert goers. They were a part of the community, not apart from the community.

At the next concert, I approached the teacher to thank her for what she had done. My assumption had been that the oldest child had been one of her students. Not so. She explained that it all had been her sister's idea. The children were getting noisy. The noise was disturbing to those seated nearby. Her sister said, "I'll donate for the ice cream if you'll take the kids to get it." The deal was made.

It was simple act, however, it was also a rare act. Generally, in such a situation we respond by growling "You kids quiet down," or "Whose watching you kids? You need to go home." Those phrases definitely do not put into practice Jesus' model of always seeing the Holy present in those whom society would dismiss as unwelcome, unworthy, and unacceptable. The ladies' actions were concrete acts of forgiveness (for the noise) while being acts of service and acceptance. Their actions reflected the love of Jesus. Our community is blessed.




Years later, when Tim and Ree returned to the Belle Fourche Community, fair involvement began with their children's 4-H Club booths and showing livestock and various static exhibits.

qualified for down payment assistance are now priced out of the market.

Housing Help

"Last October were right at about 3% on mortgage rates and now we're closer to 6%," Walker said. "Your average home in the Belle Fourche market with a \$200,000 purchase price has now seen that homebuyer's monthly mortgage payment go up by an additional \$350 per month."

Walkers says with that \$350 increase that one quarter of all homebuyers in their coverage area who had prequalified to purchase a home last fall, no longer qualify. Neighbor-Works was able to implement a pilot program, known as Gap Financing to help homeowners who had been priced out to have the ability to access additional capital, up to \$30,000 per homeowner. This allowed them to once again qualify for a purchase.

The program does have an income limit but Walker says they were able to extend that limit to 115% of the median income for Belle Fourche. A family of four with a household income of \$90,000 in Belle Fourche would probably not qualify for a traditional mortgage but with the Gap Financing it puts homeownership back within reach according to Walker.

"For example, you have a homebuyer who was looking at a \$200,000 home, and they only qualified for \$170 - \$175,000, which was very common last year," Walker said. "This program allowed them to get a 30-year deferred, no interest. no payment loan as a second (mortgage) to cover the gap between what they qualified for and the actual purchase price."

As a Community Development Financial Institution (CDFI), Neighborworks was able to secure a \$1.3 million grant from the US Treasury to fund this pilot program. Walkers said their original projections were that the money would last 24 months. That will not be the case.

"If all the loans that have been approved come through and closings occur we will be out of that money by the end of August," Walker said. "That's an eight-month period instead of 24 months."

NeighborWorks is going back to the South Dakota Housing Opportunity Fund and asking for additional CDFI money, up to \$2 million, to continue to program. Walker is collecting letters of support for the effort from the mayors of the communities that NeighborWorks serves, including Belle Fourche.

"It is with a great deal of personal pleasure that I once again endorse the work of Neighbor-Works Dakota Home Resources. To say that their efforts are important to our communities would be a gross understatement. The services provided are of a great value to all of us here in Belle Fourche," the Mayor's letter read in part. "The city of Belle Fourche supports NeighborWorks application to the SDHDA Housing Opportunity Fund...these funds will be of tremendous help to the residents of Belle Fourche."

The council unanimously approved the submission of the city's letter of support as part of the grant application. Councilman Larry Schmaltz, who also sits on the Belle Fourche Development Corporation's Housing Committee with Walker, complemented the job that NeighborWorks is doing in the community.

Walker also highlighted other programs NeighborWorks is involved with including Homebuyer Education Classes, Paint the Town, financial counseling services and foreclosure prevention services.

Walker says NeighborWorks is also closely involved with the new Modesto Ranch Estates project on the city's south side. Up to 80 lots will be made available for lowpriced new homes and Walker says NeighborWorks plans to commit to purchasing five to ten lots per year to build new homes. He says those will be from a smaller 700-square foot, one bedroom, one bath, up to 1,400 square foot homes.

"Up to this point I always thought the 700-square foot home was a crazy idea," Walker said. "But we tried it in Rapid City and found a lot of local teachers, a nurse, a local insurance agent, and young professionals who found they could buy that one-bedroom, one-bath for about what they were paying for rent. So now we kind of changed our mind on that idea."

The SDHDA currently has a \$50-million Infrastructure Financing Program that they are putting together to help new housing developments put in streets, sewers, sidewalks and other needed infrastructure. Walker says they are in the midst of a public comment period and expect to have an allocation plan ready by early August. It's not clear if these funds would be available for land purchase but Walker says the Modesto Ranch Estates has expressed interest in the possibility of using this program in lieu of setting up Tax Increment Financing (TIF) to pay for infrastructure.

lieves is needed by the Sheriff's Department. There is a need for upgrade to much of the physical equipment used by the department. The total cost could come to \$60,000 to \$65,000.

Auditor Annie Reich reported that cyber security continues to be an issue. It seems that most cyber threats are generated from China. A recent report handed out by Reich states that People's Republic of China influences operations by manipulating support hidden in PRC agendas. It continues by stating "...with seemingly benign business opportunities or people-to-people exchanges sometimes making PRC political agendas. They can also threaten the integrity of the U.S. policy-making pro-

Reich said that it is important to be aware of cyber security issues and to pass on anything that may be suspicious.

The Provisional Budget was

gone over by the commissioners. The budget must be submitted to the State by July 31. Mandated expenses are listed according to last year's budget, along with potential income. The commissioners approved the budget with an increase in the property tax income. The budget will be further discussed in the future before being finalized by the end of September. A new Veterans' Service Officer has been hired. Jason Saivong will take over the position on August 1.

After hearing from Dannica Percevich on her concerns at Gaver Bridge, the commissioners decided to look into her queries and place the item on next month's agenda. Percevich named several incidents that allegedly were happening at the bridge including drug use, an escalation of break-ins at the nearby trailer court and suspicious activity. Gaver Bridge has been closed for some time due to safety issues.

Lummus got the job done thanks in large part to Clayton Hass' horse. In fact, Dakota Eldridge and Ty Erickson used the same horse, and fattened their wallets, too.

"We had the horse up here we needed. It was a good week for all of us," Lummus said. "You get to ride a horse like that, it makes it really easy. We just gotta do our job."

Erickson also made it to the final four, and in fact set the table for Lummus' effort.

"Ty went 4 flat right before me," Lummus said. "We feed off each other, and I fed off that energy. It was awesome."

With such a solid steed under him, Lummus said he wasn't surprised at the strong result at the NFR Playoff Series presented by Pendleton Whisky stop.



Scott Snedecor Holds on to No. 1 Spot With Sheridan Title

With more than \$1.5 million won in his career, it doesn't seem like steer roper Scott Snedecor has endured too many slumps in his career. But Snedecor is riding a hot streak during the 2022 summer run that is welcome to the four-time PRCA

World Champion.

"It's been a while since I've been on a winning streak, where things are fun and easy instead of feeling like you're working hard," Snedecor said after winning the Sheridan WYO Rodeo on July 16, for 52.4 seconds of work on four steers.

Snedecor earned \$6,296 after placing in all four rounds and taking the average win by half a second over Garrett Hale. He posted runs of 12.2, 14.2, 11.8 and 14.2 seconds.

"It was really good this year," Snedecor said. "My first one was good, and I got seventh in that round. I bobbled my hooey a bit on the second one, that probably cost me placing higher on that one."

Snedecor is now ranked first in the PRCA | RAM World Standings, chasing his fifth world title after two straight years of finishing as the reserve world champ.

At 47 years old, Snedecor admits to having moments where thoughts of retirement creep in.

"My wife just tells me, you still like it and you're having fun so keep doing it," Snedecor says with a chuckle. With his youngest daughter Kallyn headed off to Tarleton State University to compete for the rodeo team, Snedecor says he and wife Kelli are empty nesters and enjoying the chance to head out on the road together.

"She and I can take off and go if we want to," he said. Sheridan is a favorite stop for Snedecor, who thinks he may have split the title there years ago. "I honestly can't remember for sure, but I've had success there in the past.

"I love that rodeo," Snedecor said. "I like rodeos like that where we go and hang out all week, enjoy the rodeo atmo-

sphere.
"We really appreciate committees like Sheridan that really welcome us all week."

Other winners at the \$323,437 rodeo were all-around cowboy Taylor Santos (\$9,950, tie-down roping and steer roping); bareback rider Cole Reiner (89.5 points on Sankey Pro Rodeo & Phenom Genetics' Bronc Riding Nation); steer wrestlers Blake

Knowles, Will Lummus, Rowdy Parrott and Dalton Massey (8.4 seconds on two head); team ropers Clay Tryan and Jade Corkill (12.4 seconds on two head); saddle bronc rider Tanner Butner (92.5 points on Sankey Pro Rodeo & Phenom Genetics' Black Tie); tie-down roper Taylor Santos (16.6 seconds on two head); barrel racer Stevi Hillman (17.09 seconds); breakaway roper Erin Johnson (7.6 seconds on two head); and bull rider JR Stratford (86 points on Sankey Pro Rodeo & Phenom Genetics' Cash Is King).



Sen. Mike Rounds' Week in Washington

We had another busy week in Washington! I met with South Dakotans from across the state, attended hearings and briefings on topics ranging from the war in Ukraine to combating homelessness and visited with a number of military leaders. There's always a lot to be done in Washington, and no two weeks are ever the same. Here's the Weekly Round[s] Up, a glimpse into my week:

South Dakota groups I visited with: South Dakota's FFA State Officers, Dakota Provisions, Hybrid Turkeys, Hendrix Genetics, South Dakota Poultry Industry Association, as well as students and parents from the Waubay and Webster schools. Additionally, I helped facilitate a briefing between Air Force officials and leaders in western South Dakota about the upcoming of the arrival of the B-21 raider bomber. It's important that we are prepared for the growth that will be experienced in the Ellsworth Air Force Base area. We included language in this year's NDAA to make certain school districts like Douglas, in Box Elder, are able to get the resources they need so that our kids can get a quality education.

Other meetings this week: Israeli Ambassador to the United States Michael Herzog, the CEO of Bel Brands (I was disappointed that he didn't bring any Babybel Cheese with him!), Senate Prayer Breakfast (Senator Alex Padilla from California was our speaker) and Senate Bible Study (our verse of the week was Psalm 111:10). Additionally, I had three meetings with nominees whose confirmations are being processed in the Armed Services Committee.

Met with South Dakotans from: Huron, Beresford, Waubay, Webster, Salem, Oral, Hoven, Aberdeen, Sturgis, Rapid City, Spearfish, Box Elder, Pierre and Dell Rapids.

Topics discussed: The B-21 Raider bomber and its impact on western South Dakota, the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO), the hot weather back home in South Dakota and of course, 9.1% inflation.

Votes taken: 11 – Most of these votes were on nominations for positions in the executive branch or on a judicial court. I try to walk back and forth between my office building and the Capitol for each vote, which adds to my step count!

Hearings: Senator Foreign Relations Committee - we advanced the ratification of Sweden and Finland to be part of NATO. This now moves to the Senate

floor; Senate Armed Services Committee – we held a hearing for the nominations of LTG Michael E. Langley to be the next commander of U.S. African Command and LTG Bryan Fenton to be the next commander of the U.S. Special Operations Command; Subcommittee on Housing, Transportation and Development – I served as ranking member of a hearing on opportunities and challenges in addressing homelessness. Jamie Kirsch of Rapid City testified. Jamie is a board member at Journey On, a Rapid City based non-profit focused on homeless street outreach.

Classified briefings: I had a classified briefing on the ongoing situation in Ukraine as part of my membership on the Senate Armed Services Committee. I also attended a classified cybersecurity education session.

My staff in South Dakota visited: Aberdeen, Red Owl, Watertown, Vermillion and Elm Springs.

Staff happenings: I took my summer interns in our Washington, D.C. office to breakfast on Thursday morning to thank them for all of their hard work. (No government funds expended!) They each ordered eggs benedict - my personal favorite.



stifling growth. It might be a soft labor market where jobs are hard to fill. The list of economic reasons is practically endless.



There are many activities each day for many people to enjoy. Take in as much of the fair as you can. Fairbooks are available all around Butte and Lawrence Counties in numerous locations.





There was only 1 bid presented to the board and as it was too high, the board worked on the plans several hours trying to make changes in them to reduce the cost. After considerable time spent, they concluded to get more carpenters to figure on the work and the meeting adjourned subject to the call of the president.

July 21, 1932

F.H. Newell, for many years Director of the US Reclamation Bureau, died suddenly in Washington, D C on July 6, at the age of 72. He was the godfather at the christening of our city, 22 years ago.

The Irrigator is this week printing the official list of the names of owners of dogs in Butte County who neglected to obtain licenses for their pets before July 1st. A state statute requires that the list be published and owners are given until July 30th to show cause why the defaulted license fee. penalty and costs should not be assessed against their property of the delinquent as a tax.

July 23, 1942 The county AAA office at Belle Fourche announces the Commodity Credit Corporation has completed 26 steel grain bins, with average capacity of 2,300 bushels. To date they have taken in 30,000 bushes of grain. To further relieve the situation they have constructed 50 wooden bins for sale to farmers. Further information as to sale of these bins may be had at the Butte County AAA Office

in Belle Fourche. Birth certificates to prove American citizenship for persons who want jobs in plants where work on secret or confidential government contracts is being done, will no longer be required. A new procedure developed jointly by the Army and Navy, the Manpower Commission and the US Employment Service, calls for merely a simple declaration


