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Council Swears in New Member, Approves Land Transfer

BELLE FOURCHE – Heidi Parker was sworn in as the Belle Fourche City Council's newest member during the council's regular meeting July 19th. Parker won the Ward One special election on July 13th with 18 votes to Faith Goehring's 7. Parker has been assigned to the Legal & Finance Committee, Rec Center Committee, and the Public Relations Committee. She replaces Lu-Ann Trudo who was presented a certificate of service in recognition for her time on council.

Also during the council meeting Mayor Randy Schmidt conducted the swearing in ceremony of Jordan Fisher as the Belle Fourche Police Department's newest officer. Fisher took his oath of office during the mayor's report at the beginning of the meeting with family and friends presents.

With a motion by Vern Hintz and a second by Bob Somervold the council unanimously approved the transfer of two lots in the Belle Fourche Rail and Industrial Park from the city to the Belle Fourche Development Corporation (BFDC). Kellen Willert, of the city's legal firm, told the council that the city has an agreement with the BFDC that the land is held by the city and then transferred to BFDC when that organization feels they are close to finding a purchaser for the property. The motion approves the transfer of Lot 2 and the remainder of Block 4 (except Lot 3) of the Busfield Addition #3, to the BFDC.

During new business the council approved a grant from the South Dakota Land and Water Conservation Fund for the new Gay Park playground equipment. The amount of the award is not to exceed \$74,500.

The council also authorized Mayor Schmidt to sign a DOT agreement allowing the city to extend funding for the resurfacing of the Roundup Street bridge until 2025. According

Mystery of the Markers Mostly Solved

BELLE FOURCHE – The mystery of the origins of several military grave markers found discarded near Beulah, WY, has, for the most part, been solved. Earlier this year two motorcyclists discovered the abandoned markers along I-90 just west of the town.

Belle Fourche resident Vernon Davis of the Society of the Black Hills Pioneers said that the matter was turned over to the Crook County Wyoming sheriff's office who brought in

experts from the Black Hills National Cemetery (BHNC) near Sturgis to investigate and it was confirmed that the markers had been made originally to honor veterans buried there.

"They did a bunch of research and found out that those stones had been damaged or mis-marked in some way," Davis told the Beacon. "In the 1960's they made new stones for those and put them in the National Cemetery and put the old (markers) in a pile."

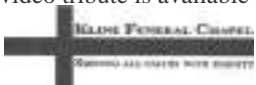

This Another Perspective is from the archives of Foursquare pastor Dr. Jack Hayford

“The Grace to Be Wrong”

I am becoming increasingly sensitive to the need for grace in believers which will allow them to be wrong.

Not to do wrong. But to be wrong.

There are far too few who simply acknowledge their own humanity when their own doings, calling, efforts, or sincere goals are called into question.

This past week I encountered three occasions where this grace was needed: at a gathering of men who were consulting together over a specific ministry to the Body of Christ; in a conversation over the radio, in which I was being interviewed on the subject of the believer and his willingness to acknowledge his failures; and in a private counseling session in which we discovered a man's preoccupation with his sense of God-given mission, to the point that he couldn't see the need for balance. He was too taken with his sense of the importance of what he felt he was supposed to do.

Somehow, being right isn't as easy as one thinks. Our own sense of dimension on a matter is the key to balance, and the fact is that when something seems important or necessary to me, it tends to become ALL important... ABSOLUTELY necessary. And the time for the answer to this important/necessary matter is always NOW! Especially if God and His will are involved in the matter.

Thankfully, I am discovering a small but growing band of folks who are willing to trust the Lord to cover their imperfections whether it be in timing, in understanding, or in sense of urgency. They are gaining the capacity to be wrong in their perspective, as right as they might be in their purpose.

I find that grace was powerfully present in the early Church. I hear the apostles and elders at Jerusalem say, concerning a decision that would reshape the Church's future, It seemed good (Acts 15:28). Before they invoke the ultimate of divine authority, they simply



says, We thought a lot about it. It seemed good to the Holy Spirit and to us. History confirms the decision they made, but I am most impressed by the non-authoritarian air with which the judgment was communicated.

Paul says twice in 1 Corinthians 7 that his counsel is offered as a concession, not as a commandment (v. 6); and that his directives concerning marriage and the single life were according to [his] judgment (v. 40). He does affirm that he believed himself to have the mind of the Holy Spirit on the subject, but again, the authority is exercised with wisdom. There is an apparent willingness to hearing others out on the subject.

I love Peter's capacity to not know as much as another brother, and still to love and trust that brother's words toward him. Second Peter 3:15,16 manifests a readiness to receive the gift of another's wisdom and expertise, without denying or having to hurriedly insist that you have received much already yourself.

Somehow, you and I experience a painful reluctance to utter the words, I don't know. Or, I may not be entirely right. Or, I need your balancing counsel on this, my friend. It's hard for us to say these things and mean them with a truly teachable spirit.

Some matters, of course, are not negotiable. But my personal inclinations, however sure I might feel about them, must be kept available to modification within the circle of those who love me in Christ.

Such vulnerability is the only safety valve against the recurrent problems which rugged individualism has wrought in personal and family lives, in business and government matters, and in the Church of the Lord Jesus throughout history.

Let's keep hands joined in trust. Mine and yours may not be perfectly clean, but keeping hold will sure help us keep our balance.

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**Ask The Motor Medics®**

From the Hosts of the Under The Hood® radio show.

Dear Motor Medics,

There's smoke coming from near my steering wheel at times right out of the column. It's not a lot of smoke but I can see it and smell it and it scares me. All my vehicle systems seem to be working fine now but a few months ago my turn signals were acting up. The car is a 2001 Buick Regal. Is this something I should be concerned about or can I let it go?

Dear Robert,

Your car is smoking... There is no way we would let that go without a thorough check out for safety. Without seeing the car hands-on it's hard to say but we have seen smoke generated in this way due to failing turn signal switches. The switch can fail simply because it is old or it can be stressed by things like shorted wiring, failed bulbs or adding an extra load to the system such as a trailer which has an added load of extra lighting that has to be carried by the cars wiring. The first step will be verifying where the smoke is coming from. That will require someone experienced with the system to open it up and inspect the parts. If any parts are found to be burnt they will need to be repaired then the rest of the effected system will need to be diagnosed to make sure that what caused the first failure does not happen again.

Dear Motor Medics,

I listen to your Under The Hood radio show here in Branson almost every week and you guys have some of the most useful car advice I have ever found, and it's free which is the best kind in my book. I read your column each week too and a while back you had talked about readers car that had a fueling issue. When the car was being filled with gasoline it would not fill quickly, it would fill for a few seconds then click off the pump and it would do this over and over again. My 2008 Impala is doing this now. What was it and could it be the same thing with my car?

Dear Doug,

It is common on many cars especially GM cars and trucks to have this happen and it is often caused by a failure in what is called the evaporative emissions system. The fuel system is a closed system which prevents fuel from evaporating into the atmosphere which would cause pollution and also be a waste of your money as your fuel would simply disappear over time. The system does need to vent at times for things like filling the tank and also when fuel is being consumed by the engine or it would back up like yours does. Also, in the case of the engine using fuel the tank would eventually collapse. This is just one possible problem.

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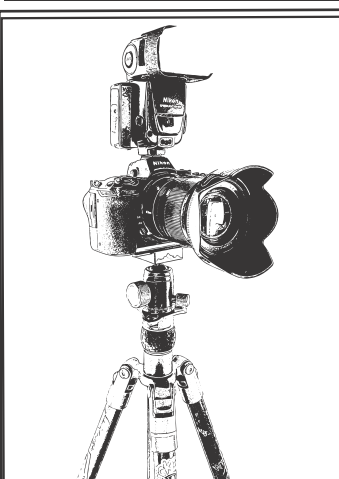

NFR Payout Climbs to a Record

\$13.3 Million this December

CO SPNGS, Colo. – The Pro-Rodeo Cowboys Association®’s 2021 Wrangler National Finals Rodeo® will see an increase in the payout at the world’s largest rodeo in December.

The Wrangler NFR, which returns to Las Vegas Dec. 2-11, will have a record-setting competition payout of \$10,257,048. This amount includes guaranteed prize money of \$1.2 million for all NFR qualifiers and \$9,057,048 in competition prize money.

Between 2015 and 2020, the NFR paid out a total of \$10 million – \$8.8 million in competition prize money and \$1.2 million in guaranteed prize money to qualifiers.

The increase will see round winners take home \$26,997 per round and average winners earn \$69,234. Each go-round will pay a total of \$87,087, while the average total will pay \$261,261 per event.

The stock contractor pay

– which is 30% of the contestant payout – is increased to \$3,077,114.

After taking place at Globe Life Field in Arlington, Texas, in 2020, the Wrangler NFR will be back at the Thomas & Mack Center in Las Vegas this year.

Known as the richest and most prestigious rodeo in the world, the Wrangler NFR attracts the top 15 contestants in bareback riding, steer wrestling, team roping, saddle bronc riding, tie-down roping, barrel racing and bull riding to compete for a share of the increased purse and the coveted PRCA Gold Buckle.

Tim O’Connell wins Calgary

During a career that includes three PRCA bareback riding world championships, for Tim O’Connell one thing was missing- A crown from the Calgary Stampede.

The Zwingle, Iowa, cowboy registered a 93.5-point ride

aboard Calgary Stampede’s Xplosive Skies in the finals Sunday to finally check off a long-awaited box.

“This was on my bucket list,” O’Connell said. “This is a world-renowned rodeo. This means more than the money.”

That score was the second-highest scored bareback ride in ProRodeo history.

There are five riders who are tied with the highest-scored bareback ride in ProRodeo at 94 points, including O’Connell twice. O’Connell’s first 94-point ride came in 2020 aboard Northcott Macza’s Stevie Knicks in 2020 in San Angelo, Texas. He then had a 94-point ride on Frontier Rodeo’s Gun Fire in Weatherford, Texas, April 3.

The rest of the 94-point bareback riders consists of Wes Stevenson on Kesler Rodeo’s Cover Girl in Dallas, 2002; Will Lowe, on Kesler Rodeo’s Sky Reach in Omaha, Neb., 2003;

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Ryan Gray on Carr Pro Rodeo’s Grass Dance in Eagle, Colo., 2009; Tilden Hooper on Classic Pro Rodeo’s Big Tex in Silver City, N.M., 2009.

The \$50,000 check for winning the final round will lift O’Connell up (half of that counting toward the PRCA | RAM World Standings), as well

as earnings from winning the first and fourth rounds in Pool A, along with the four-head aggregate, to put him in the No. 1 spot in the standings. He also gained valuable ProRodeo Tour points with the win.

On Sunday, he had to wait through a re-ride to finally realize a long-awaited goal.

“This was the first final four I’ve made since then, so I was 100% nervous,” O’Connell said. “The level of riders and horses in that round, anything can happen.”

O’Connell, who had a 90-point ride in the 10-man semifinal round to secure a spot in the finals, ended up one point clear of Bennett, who finished runner-up with a 92.5-point ride.

Other winners in the \$1,500,000 rodeo were: steer wrestler Stetson Jorgensen (4.7 seconds); saddle bronc rider Brody Cress (94.5 points on Calgary Stampede’s Special Delivery); tie-down roper Cory Solomon (7.3 seconds); barrel racer Bertina Olafson (17.247 seconds); and bull rider Jordan Hansen (87.5 points on Calgary Stampede’s Diamond Back).

But what many who are not involved in ranching, in this area need to remember is, the small family rancher spends their money in these smaller local towns. When the rancher is gone, so will most of the business be. Truman supposedly said, the buck stops here.. well with rancher, the buck starts here.. and if they can't make a buck, they can't spend it. If you are the praying sort, please pray for wide spread rain all across this big area. We all need it. And Praise the Lord for what we have gotten! Here is hoping we all get a good soaking by the time I write another of these.z

Rain!!!

As I write this we just had a wonderful rain come thru'. Not sure how much we got, but I am happy for any amount. I hate to be greedy, but I am not sure how much we'd have to get before it would make me unhappy! From what I have read there are over a 1000 pair a week leaving North Dakota. Ranchers with no more feed to graze and no prospect of winter feed supplies are shipping their herds. It's terrible!

Our postures are very short, the hoppers have eaten so much of what little feed was available... bleak prospects. But with enough rain, we can make it until fall. With enough rain, someone will make a hay crop. Whether any of us can afford it is another question.

There is the possibility of shipping cattle to another region where feed is more plentiful, but for no more than they are worth, you have to wonder if it is justified. Out neighbors in the southern states have faced this. Problem with shipping cows

is sending cows not acclimated to another area and how they will do. I have a friend in Missouri and he tells me hay is cheap. Problem is, it is very low quality so cows need a huge gut to make it work. Not like in this area where it is higher protein feed. And the cost of trucking, with the price of fuel is terrible also. Just the ramifications of shipping pairs and then trying to get them mothered back up, even with calves ear tagged, is daunting.

This isn't a new problem. Many have faced it in the past. Just one more problem ranchers face. I am sure there will be government programs to help, the problem is, will they really do much good? As a neighbor said to me after the Atlas blizzard, when I said I bet there would be low interest loans available for those who had lost livestock, "I don't need any more loans. I don't know if I can pay back what I have now!" Most will survive. Some will not. It is all part of the deal. If we could get a decent price for the cattle we sell, it

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did some tree trimming. Jake Reynolds came for Arlie on Sunday morning. They ate a late lunch at Ronda's before Chad and Debby headed home. Four grandsons stayed with Gramma to spend a few days.

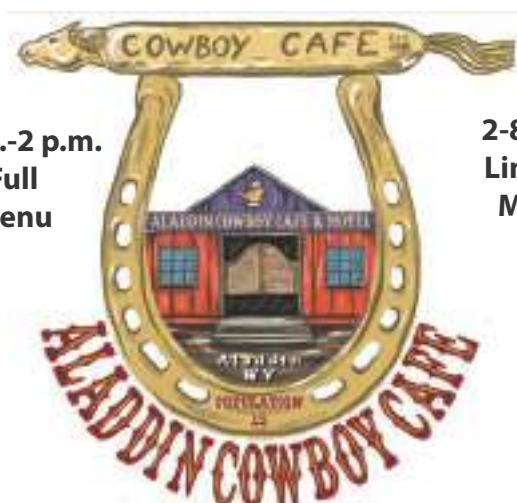
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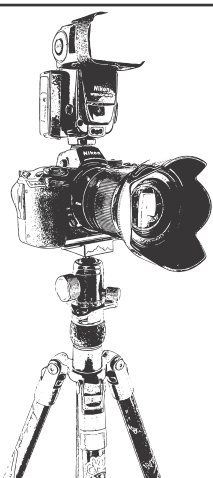

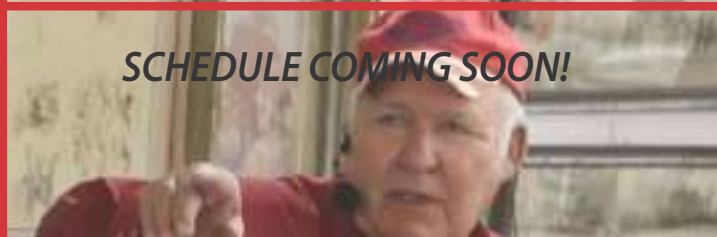

to Steve Nafus, Assistant City Engineer, the project was already on the books for 2021 and should be complete this year. However, he said, elsewhere in the state COVID may have caused construction delays due to material shortages which most likely led to the state extending the time frame for Bridge Improvement Grants (BIG) to be used. The resurfacing project is being partially funded with BIG funds from the state.

In other council actions approval was given to Belle Fourche Rec Center Director

Nathan Velander's recommendation to close the Rec Center from 6:00 to 8:00 P.M. on Wednesday, August 4, 2021, for All-Staff Training that includes emergency and safety trainings, announcements, and team building activities.

From Public Works approval was given to obtain a quote for extending Splash Pad buffer area with additional concrete. Approval was also given for the purchase of a 2015 Jeep Grand Cherokee in the amount of \$17,000 to replace the current vehicle which is 23 years old. The vehicle will be used for custodial maintenance.

Council approval the withdrawal of \$3,488.40 from the

Tri-State Museum Memorial Fund to pay Johnson Electric to install exhibit case lights in the mercantile, medicine, music, and laundry exhibits at the museum. This is the second phase of the lighting project previously performed by Johnson Electric.

The schedule for the introduction and adoption of the annual municipal budget was also approved. The first reading will happen no later than the first regular meeting in November. The second reading will happen at least five days after the first reading. The annual budget is then required to be published prior to December 31st following adoption.

took those stones out of that pile and transported them 36 miles west to a point about a half mile west of Beulah. There they were left along the north side of the interstate on top of a small hill near a billboard. That is where they were discovered earlier this spring.

"We still don't know who took them over to the hill there and just threw them out on ground," Davis said.

But there were replacement markers made for those veterans 50 years ago and Davis said they are in place at the National Cemetery. The abandoned markers have subsequently been destroyed and the modern-day policy of the BHNC is to destroy markers which have been damaged or mis-marked.

The Society of the Black Hills Pioneers paid a cash reward to the citizens who discovered the markers and brought them to the attention of officials.

The Society of the Black Hills Pioneers promotes respect for cemetery grounds and guards

against defacement. And Davis says theft of items from cemeteries is an on-going problem.

"Hundreds of items are taken out of cemeteries each year across the land," Davis said. "Things like little lambs, statues, monuments and everything you could think of. It just absolutely not right that we'll

probably never know who took the stones from the cemetery to start with."

But Davis says the Society is grateful to those who discovered the abandoned markers and brought it to the attention of authorities. "That was the right thing to do," he said.

Belle Fourche Times
July 29, 1897
The State's Shame

It seems almost incredible that a state office should be used for wholesale blackmailing purposes. It brings blush to the state to know that her officers have been guilty of the most flagrant offenses and have excused themselves on the ground that "it did not cost the state anything." We have had Taylor and Ruth and their friends who have plundered the state at pleasure; now comes an other public office where the power of the position is used to plunder others. The state paid the auditor's office in full for the discharge of all the duties connected with it, yet from companies which have reported we find that republican officials have collected more than \$5,000 blackmail money. They claimed that they had arbitrary power under the law and unless a company "put up" from \$25 to \$1,773.10 they would refuse license. The alleged examinations in most cases were never made and no reports are on file to show that any one of them was ever made. It is not pretended by the auditor's office that they were made for any purpose other than blackmail. Mr. C. H. Anderson, the late insurance examiner, is still employed in the auditor's office. It has been charged over and over again and has never been denied that a deal was made between Anderson and Mayhew, prior to Mayhew's nomination, to the effect that Anderson should work for Mayhew's nomination and that Mayhew, if elected, should retain Anderson in his employ. It is known that Anderson approached other prospective candidates and told them there was a nice thing on the side in the auditor's office. There can be little doubt that he had given the same tip to May-

hew. That alone can explain the narrow and mean way in which Mayhew has treated silver officials when opportunity offered. The fusion legislature destroyed the "nice thing on the side" and Mayhew has been as cross as a foiled highwayman ever since. Right on the starts the committee discovered enough to justify an examination and there are strong indications of more to follow.

Atomic Bomb Sends Water Soaring 9000 Feet; 3 Ships Lost Off Bikini Atoll, July 24

– Admiral W. H. P. Blandy has announced that the 29,000-ton battleship USS Arkansas, a concrete oil barge and a tank landing craft were sunk by the test Baker atomic bomb. Aboard the USS Mount McKinley, July 24- The fantastic power and heat of mankind's greatest weapon of destruction – an atomic bomb – churned the waters of Bikini lagoon into a cauldron of flame, smoke and steam today. The bomb was detonated on schedule – at exactly 3:35 and its tremendous force apparently sank the battleship USS Arkansas. The explosion sent a vast waterspout clawing its way almost two miles into the air. As the cloud descended and began disintegrating over the fleet, a wave about seven feet high swept into the torn coral beaches of Bikini atoll, 3 ½ miles distant.

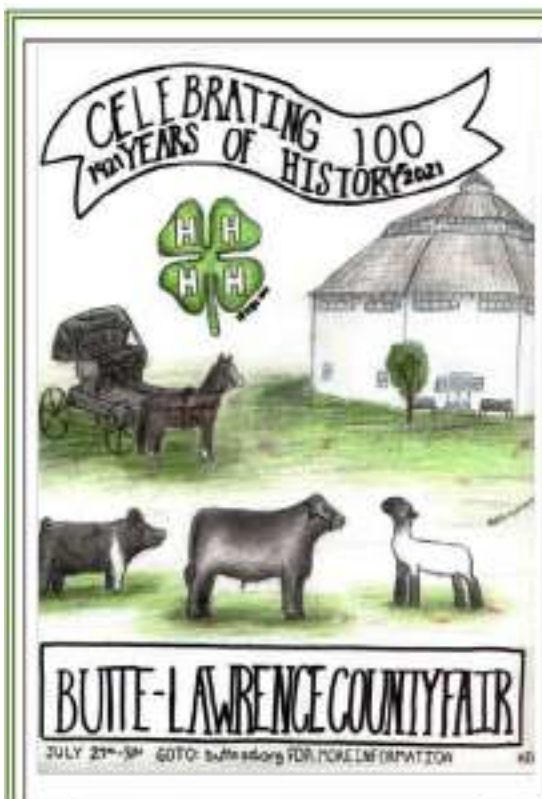

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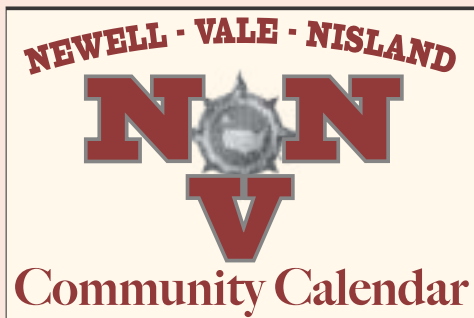

“Looking Forward to our Past” by Linda Velder

July 27, 1911
John Havrum and William Laurie answered the cry of “bones wanted at Newell” by scouring the prairie and hauling several loads to town at \$8 per ton. If you know of any stray bone piles and need the money you’d better get busy.

Nearly everyone in the neighborhood is putting in his spare time hauling water. Many are now hauling their drinking water from Newell. L.C. Hodges put down another 14 barrel cistern Saturday. He now has one for household use and one for the stock. If it doesn’t rain soon the water proposition will prove a very serious one.

July 28, 1921
The Newell Hospital is undergoing a complete renovation and redecorating, preparatory to re-opening. The work has progressed so well that it will only be a short time until patients will be admitting.

Several autoists have voiced their wrath over the condition of the road west of the Owl Creek Bridge on the way to Nisland, which has been made almost impassible by irrigation water. We have noticed a few places where irrigation water was being wasted on the highway, with no measure of improvement to them.

July 30, 1931
Friends of the Wilson families are much concerned over the condition of Grandpa Wilson, who this week has suffered spells during which he is unable to recognize immediate members of the family and mind is imbecilic. Dr. Clark is in attendance. Mr. Wilson is at

the home of his son Henry.

William Sly, Manager of Sly’s Grocery at Nisland, was a business visitor in Newell Tuesday, interviewing merchants who are giving Red Stamps to their customers. While here Mr. Sly arranged to place the stamps with Ed Bushnell at the Newell Garage, where they will be given on repair work, auto accessories and gasoline.

July 31, 1941
Plans for the Second Annual Amateur Contest to be held at the Newell Labor Day Celebration were announced this week by the committee of the Newell Junior of Commerce, sponsors of the event. The contest is open to anyone from age 1 year to 100 year’s of age, except professional entertainers. Acts will also be limited to not more than 10 minutes each and may include anything from singing, dancing and playing of musical instruments to whistling, acrobatics, and imitation of comedy skits by single individual or groups. The contest, one of the most popular events of last year’s celebration in which young people from all parts of the Northern Hills competed. Prizes will be awarded. Entry blanks can be obtained from Ray C. Johnson.

Gov. Noem Announces Results of Nest Predator Bounty Program

PIERRE, S.D. – Governor Kristi Noem and the South Dakota Department of Game, Fish & Parks (GFP) have announced the results of the 2021 Nest Predator Bounty Program. 53,642 total nest predator tails were turned in by 2,773 participants. The Nest Predator Bounty Program reduces local nest predator populations as a way to enhance pheasant and duck nest success.

“South Dakota is one of the only states that hunts our state bird. The nest predator bounty program began in 2019 as a key component of my Second Century Initiative,” said Governor Kristi Noem. “It’s a great way to encourage youth and families to get outside and ensure trapping remains a part of South Dakota’s long-standing outdoor heritage. And it’s leading to higher nest success, which

means more beautiful ringnecks for our hunters.”

2021 marked the third year of the program. A total of 81,000 tails were turned in between 2019 and 2020. The strong 2020 pheasant season proved the success of the program, so the bounty was doubled this year to \$10 per-tail.

In 2021, 29% of the program participants were under the age of 18, up from 16% in 2020. These 812 South Dakota youth handed in 12,108 tails. 91% of all tails were turned in East River. Each week, a drawing was held for youth participating in the program. Winners of the drawing received three live traps, a trapping booklet, and a knife. Photos of drawing winners can be found here.
