A Question of Residency

Butte County Commission

BELLE FOURCHE-The question of what constitutes residency in the county was brought up at the regular September County Commission meeting held on Tuesday. During Public Comment, Sue Broadhurst brought some research she had done on the board members' residence of GLP LLC manufacturing and cultivation facilities.

According to Butte County Ordinance #2021-02, Section 3 (4)(c.v), a permit application must have "A certification that at least one officer or board member of the prospective cannabis establishment is a resident of Butte County, South Dakota." Under the initial application Rod Woodruff had initialed each item that testified that at least one board officer was a Butte County resident and that application was approved last year. However, according to Broadhurst, none of the officers held legal residence in the county. She concluded by encouraging the commissioners to not renew GLP licenses for manufacturing and cultivation.

South Dakota codified law (SDCL 12-1-4) the "term residence means the place in which a person is domiciled as shown by an actual fixed permanent dwelling, establishment, or any other abode to which the person returns after a period of absence. A person is considered to have gained residence in any county or municipality of this state in which the person actually lives, if the person has no present intention of leaving."

As Broadhurst pointed out, none of the board members of GLP Custer had a residence in the county where they lived or had any intention of living, although Woodruff does own a house in the county. He does not, however, have a vehicle

licensed in Butte County or is registered to vote in the county.

The vote to renew GLP Custer Manufacturing and Cultivation later in the meeting was unanimous to deny renewal.

Commissioner James Ager first moved to accept so that there would be discussion of the renewal license, pointing out that because of the residency requirement the license should be denied. That motion was met with all votes Nay.

Commissioner Chad Erk then moved to deny the renewal. The Roll Call vote came in with all

Grossenburg Implement invests \$6M in new Belle Fourche location

news@bellefourchebeacon.com Grossenburg Implement is hard at work building a new, 20,000 square foot state-ofthe-art building west of Belle Fourche.

With nine locations – Phillip, Belle Fourche, Pierre, Winner, Beresford, Sundance, Wyo., Bloomfield, Neb., Hartington, Neb., and Wayne, Neb. – the reinvestment made in the Belle Fourche community by Grossenburg is substantial.

Patrick Olson, store manager for the Belle Fourche and Sundance locations, said that he oversees about 50 staffers between both locations and approximately 20 of those are employed in Belle Fourche.

The new location, situated just west of Belle Fourche on U.S. Hwy. 212, will provide new opportunities and a larger upgraded space - approximately 34,000 square feet in total between the new main building and a cold storage just to the west.

Sitting on a 27-acre lot, the company will have ample room to better serve the community's ag population.

The upgrade is substantial enough that Olson said it is difficult to compare the old building to the one currently under construction.

"Our old location is so small, we can't get anything inside (due to ceiling height)," he said. And that's not all. The old location created more problems related to attracting and retaining staff, due to the cramped size of the shop.

"We're limited to what we can do because we can't hire enough guys ...," he added. In the shop area alone, Olson estimated that the new building will give the crew 75% more room to work with, and higher ceilings to accommodate larger equipment. When the new shop is up and running, he said the company will have more shop positions available to fully

utilize the space.
"We'll probably add 25%
more workforce in the shop,"
he said, to supplement the five
technicians they currently have.
"We'll probably have to hire at
least three more."

"The hardest aspect of our business is the mechanics," Olson said. "It's hard to find good help, it's hard to keep them." For parts storage, he said they'll have 50% more area inside the new building, as well. And that will be in addition to the approximately 5,000 square-foot cold storage building being

That is essential, Olson said, because as the agriculture industry has evolved over the decades, equipment has become much more customizable for each individual need. Much like the automobile industry, that leads to less commonality between models and a need for space to accommodate a larger variety of parts on hand.

"With different options, there's so many different parts for one machine," Olson said. "They're all painted green, but that doesn't mean they're all the

same."
The main building, boasting about 29,000 square feet, will house a front office space, a two-storied parts department, and shop.

Work on the new location has been ongoing for approximately a year, preparing the property for its new usage. Olson said the work on the new location is expected to be wrapped up in January.

Checking in on the building's progress as often as he can, Olson said he's eager to have the new space and accommodations for the company.

"They're doing a great job," he said. "Everybody (the contractors) out here's doing a great job."

Barry Grossenburg, president of Grossenburg Implement Incorporated, started working for the family business in 1972. He said the new shop is an exciting addition to the company.

"It's been a long process," he said. "Every John Deere dealer is building a new dealership. The John Deere network is way, way stronger than anybody else. The competition ain't doing nothing."

With the new spot almost directly across the highway from the Belle Fourche Livestock Market, Grossenburg said he couldn't be happier with the opportunity.

"Livestock and implement works really well together," he

With an estimated 480 semitrucks passing by the building daily, Grossenburg said they're taking advantage of another opportunity by utilizing a portion of the building's shop to offer truck tire repair services to get the operators back on the road quickly.

"We're going to work hard on the tire business," he said.

Now, it's a short waiting game until the new location is in full operation and the company will plant roots even deeper into the Belle Fourche community.

"It's really exciting," Grossenburg said.







Despite only a few returners on the roster, the Broncs have shown they are not to be underestimated.

The Belle Fourche Volleyball team started their 2023 season 2-0, clean sweeping Sturgis Brown and Lead-Deadwood. Both matches were played in the Edwin Petranek Armory before the team spent the next two weeks on the road. The season record tallies in at 5-3.

Another full Senior class for the Broncs include Outside Hitters Mataya Ward and Sloan Young, Setter Reese Larson, Middle Hitter Jacie Baxendale, Libero Avery Cherveny, Defensive Specialist Olivia Nehl, and Senior Right-side Hitters Katelynn Lee and Sarah Juelfs. Senior managers are Morgan Kruhl and Chloe Schmoker. Kailey Nowowiejski and Bailey Moke are the Juniors and Denali Larson and Syd Pelster are the Sophomores to round out the varsity roster at the start of 2023 season.

Scores for the home opener against Sturgis Brown game were 25-21, 25-5, and 25-23.

R Larson contributed 34 assists while Ward and Young threw down 18 and 12 kills respectively. Young also led the defensive effort with 8 digs. Ward scored 4 aces from the

service line while Larson and Nehl each contributed 3 more.

On the following Thursday night the Broncs kept Lead-Deadwood from double digits in two of the sets, winning set one and set three 25-7. Set two wasn't much closer with a score of 25-11.

As the team's first server, R Larson had an impressive 8 aces from the line. She also contributed 20 assists and Juelfs added 4 more. For the defense, Cherveny had 7 digs and D Larson added 5 blocks. Ward reached a major career milestone, turning over her varsity kill count past the 1000th mark with one of her 11 kills.

The Broncs will traveled down to Mobridge-Pollock on September 1st for a rematch of last year's SODAK 16 victory that earned them their 2022 state berth. The tigers had unfinished business, stunning the less experienced Broncs 25-7, 25-, and 25-.

St Thomas Moore was the next opponent at the Cavalier's gym. Belle ballers dropped set one 19-25, but quickly rallied to secure the next three matches 25-19, 26-24, and 25-19. Nehl was 12 of 13 serving with 4 aces. R Larson added 5 aces on. Young had a stellar offensive night hitting +.255 for 19 kills. Cherveny led the defensive effort with 18 digs. Ward contributed a double double in 13 kills and 13 digs.

The West River Tournament took place at the Monument over last weekend, quickly doubling the Broncs' total number of matches played this season. Kadoka was the first scheduled opponent of which set scores favored the Broncs 25-11, and 25-21.

Double AA school Brookings traveled across the state to participate handing the Broncs with a 0-2 loss and scores of 19-25 each set. The final match up Friday saw Belle Fourche handling Conference rival Rapid City Christian 25-17 and 25-19 for another win. Saturday's bracket play in Summit Arena gave the Broncs an immediate chance to defend their win the night before, battling Rapid City Christian in first round play of the gold bracket. The Comets came away with the 2-0 this time. A third match up between the two teams will take place at Rapid City Christian's gym on the 19th.

The girls are scheduled to return to their own gym to play this Tuesday, September 12th. The Homecoming week matchup will be with Bowman, ND and start times are scheduled for 5, 6, and 7pm. They will then travel to Hot Springs on the 14th. Come out to support and cheer on the Lady Broncs!

Broncs Still in Search of First Win After Week Three

The Belle Fourche Broncs saw that early on in their game with St. Thomas More last Friday night as they came up short on Lou Grasslie Field and fell 46-0 to the Cavaliers.

The two Black Hills Conference rivals exchanged possessions early on in the first quarter and when STM got it back for the second time they drove 47 yards down to the Bronc six-yard line. That's when the Cavaliers were hit with a rare offensive pass interference penalty in the end zone, setting them back to the 21-yard line. Penalties inside the 10 plagued More all night long.

The Bronc defense buckled down, forcing a 4th and goal from the 23. Trevor Erwinson attempted a 40-yard field goal, hoping to put STM on the board but the kick was blocked by the Bronc defense. The ball when straight up and came back down into the hands of Cavalier RB/ LB Aaron Roach. He was surrounded by Bronc tacklers but managed somehow to pitch the ball pack to teammate Reeve

Ross who gathered it in and scampered 20 yards for the first score of the night. It was 7-0 with 4:22 left in the first.

Belle Fourche was it's own worst enemy at times during the night, suffering four interceptions and two fumbles. On the Broncs next possession QB Nolan Wahlfeldt was intercepted by Chase Donnelly.

As the second quarter opened, the Broncs got the ball back and looked to have some momentum but on the first play Roach tipped Wahlfeldt's pass and it ended up in the hands of STM's Josh Elder who took it to the six. On the next play Roach scored off the left side to make it 13-0 with 11:44 to go in the

The Broncs lost a fumble on their next possession and STM drove to a 4th and goal form the three but the Bronc defense rose to the occasion, pressuring STM quarterback Lee Neugebauer who threw it incomplete at the feet of Max Speed in the end zone.

STM couldn't get mush going through the air in the first half but had some success on the ground. The Broncs also enjoyed a stout running game with several counter plays netting 10 to 20 yards.

But with 4:53 left in the half

lightning caused a one-hour delay. When play resumed lightning of another form struck again. The Cav's added a short Roach TD to make it 20-0 and on the next play Wahlfeldt was picked off by Roach who returned it 22-yards for a score. The two touchdowns in the final:50 of the half made it 27-0 at the break.

After the Belle Fourche Rodeo Team was honored at halftime the Broncs came out with new life. Sophomore Gavin Pearson took the ball on an inside counter play and broke free for 22 yards as Belle Fourche penetrated Cavalier territory. But that drive ended a short while later with a turnover after a fumble.

STM added a score in the third and fourth quarter to make the final score 46-0. The Bronc special teams blocked two Cavalier extra points and a field goal to highlight their effort on the night.

After losing their opener to Douglas 34-16 and a tough road loss to powerful Dell Rapids 39-13, the Broncs are now 0-3. They will celebrate homecoming this week against a team that they've had some success against, Chamberlain. Kickoff on Friday night Sept. 15 will be at 6:00pm.

If, to subscribe to the Beacon, you would like us to send you a bill for the subscription we can do so.

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

Belle Fourche Beef to School Program Under Way

The Beacon was provided with information on what the Belle Fourche school district has in place for the "Beef in Our School" program.

The school lunch program uses about 14,000# of burger each year. That equates to around 4,600 pounds of beef each school quarter.

To generate this much burger it would require roughly the need for about 28-30 hd. (this would be mostly cows or bulls due to making hamburger out

To be able to use in the program the beef needs to be processed in a state or federally inspected facility.

Austin Bishop contacted the local butcher shops who were unable to accommodate this requirement. They next contacted Wall Meats and they have set up two butcher times for us to kill seven head each time. Seven on Sept. 14th and seven on Sept. 21st.

This will supply the district with about 1/2 of its needs. Wall Meats will also have slots for the district in Nov. and Dec. as

At this time the District is looking for donations to fill the butcher slots in Sept.

They can drop off any butcher livestock at either the Belle Fourche Sale barn or the St.Onge Livestock sale barn at any time and they will be kept and fed their until the delivery

Rollover auctions are being planned at each sale barn prior to the butcher dates in order to help offset the processing costs.

Saint Onge Livestock will be Sept. 15th during the world champion auctioneering contest. The school is advising that they would appreciate any support people may provide at that time.

If anyone would like to donate a livestock or an item for the rollover auction, or donate cash for processing, have them contact Scott Reder 605-641-3435 Austin Bishop 605-390-5403 or Chad Mckabben 605-484-8709.

Also the meat that is donated will be valued at the market price the day of delivery to Lunch time solutions and that value will be credited to the school food account and those extra funds will be put towards purchasing more fruit, vegetables and healthy foods for a healthier variety.

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J.D. Struxness stays course for big win in Ellensburg, Wash.

PRCA News Release

J.D. Struxness knows the Ellensburg (Wash.) Rodeo is a marathon, not a sprint. It didn't bother him when he placed eighth in the opening go-round of the steer wrestling competition, earning a mere \$79.

The Milan, Minn., cowboy knows it's not how you start, but how you finish. And finish is exactly what he did.

Struxness followed his 4.7-second first-go with a run of 3.8 seconds to win round two and 4.8 seconds to place third in the finals. Combined, Struxness' aggregate time of 13.3 seconds was good enough to secure the victory, his first since the opening weekend of August.

"Being a little longer on your first one, it never takes you out of it in Ellensburg," Struxness said. "If you have a good chance to come back on a good steer, you just take the opportunities to set yourself up and see how the cards fall."

Bouncing back has been Struxness' mantra for some time now. The four-time qualifier for the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo placed third in the average at the Deadwood, S.D., Days of '76 Rodeo in late July and then won the first round of the Big Sky Pro Rodeo in Great Falls., Mont. the following weekend.

From that point on, things have been a bit difficult. Struxness' primary horse sustained an injury that has sidelined her for an extended period of time. To keep pace, Struxness has been riding other horses, but nothing has felt exactly right.

Since that Big Sky win, Struxness has made runs at 10 other rodeos, failing to place at eight of them, resulting in about \$2,600 in earnings.

"There after Deadwood, I had my horse get hurt and I really

went on a dry spell, and I've been trying to figure out and get in a groove with other horses. That was probably a huge part of my dry spell there," Struxness said.

"Finally, I've been able to get on Bridger Chambers' horse for a week or two and really have been getting along with him good and getting a good feel for him. It was awesome that it finally came together this week, and we got a big win."

With a dry spell snapped and almost \$9,700 earned in Washington, Struxness has shored up his position in the PRCA World Standings, jumping up to seventh place with more than \$100,000 earned for the season.

His success in Ellensburg is the latest step forward for Struxness in securing his fifth NFR qualification. It would be his second straight trip to Las Vegas after placing fifth in the world last year.

"Coming into this month, a guy is always wanting to lock it down and have the wondering part over with," Struxness said. "So, anytime you can win money and make yourself feel a little bit more comfortable it's great this time of year."

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From A1 County Commish breaking their license agreements since the facilities are not being inspected.

"You don't know if they are in compliance," he said.

"Roads are not in good shape and are not safe," said Dale Simanton when he spoke during Public Comments. He encouraged the commissioners to think about putting money into road improvements rather than look at the idea of new court and law enforcement buildings.

Jake Johnson, General Manager of Redwater Cannabis, asked that the hours of operation be considered again and that the ordinance be amended. He wanted to clarify that no other similar business has restricted operating hours and that there is no legal precedent to restrict

Johnson challenged anyone in the Commissioners' Room to offer a logical reason for any restrictions.

According to Johnson, medical cannabis is less dangerous than aspirin due to no documented deaths due to THC overdose. Research shows that there are cases, but none are officially documented and are ambiguous as to the result of using canna-

Johnson appealed to the commissioners' decision and is willing to bring more information that will clarify any questions.

Bill Kluck introduced the commissioners to a petition asking for support for the sheep industry in the United States. It is an attempt by American sheep ranchers to limit Australian and New Zealand lamb imports into the US. The petition was developed by R-CALF USA Sheep Committee.

The project petitions the US Trade Ambassador Katherine Tai for relief from lamb and mutton imports that the group claims has decimated the US commercial sheep industry.

Kluck was asking the commissioners for a letter of support for the petition stating that because the sheep industry is a large part of Butte County ag economy, it is important to show support. Sheriff Fred Lamphere reported on the progress of the possi-

bility of using the old Shopko building for law enforcement. He said that he should have a cost analysis and more information by the September 19 meeting.

Lamphere stated that there was a surplus of firearms in evidence and would recommend trading them to a reputable dealer.

He is looking for a 24/7 technician. The position would be under 20 hours per week.

The next regular commission meeting will be September 19 at 6 p.m. in the County Courthouse. If the crowd is large, the meeting will possibly be moved upstairs.

After I woke, in my groggy state of mind, my thoughts tumbled and rambled and that is what made me realize that I wasn't going back to sleep for awhile so I should go ahead and get up, and write down my thoughts.

Why couldn't we get these cattle to move? Woody should have been trying to bite them, as he was want to do when cattle didn't do as he wanted, under my direction. Why was I thinking it was Iyn Tyson, who was a cowboy/ folk singer from Canada, but really not that well known for his abilities working cattle and horses, the guy who was trying to do a demonstration? Neither made any sense.`

As my thoughts coalesced and I was not yet truly awake, it dawned on me that it had to be Ray or Tom or someone like them, and this demonstration was taking place in Elko, Nevada, Probably at the Grand National Cowboy Poetry event. I studied on it and finally came to the conclusion that it all came about because of an incident that happened this past week.

We had a couple young men come and look at all of our older and younger horses teeth, that I thought might need attention. When the dust all settled, the guy, named Cody, worked on three different horses and got all their teeth fixed up. While he and his helper worked, we visited and in the course of this visit I mentioned cowboy poetry and asked if they knew who Baxter Black was? They didn't, he and his young helper were too young. For those who don't know, who the names of any of these people I have mentioned, Baxter was a veterinarian, better known for his scalding wit and ability to write and perform Cowboy

poetry. He was my generations Will Rogers. (If you don't know who he was, look him up!) Ray Hunt is sometimes referred to as a horse whisperer, and was a man who did clinics and workshop, about communicating with horses. He learned much of what he taught from brothers Bill and Tom Dorrance. Much like Temple Grandin, they revolutionized an industry. Temple's was with cattle, mainly and Ray and Tom and Bill, were thought of more with horses. In actuality, none of them were the only ones who'd did what they did. But they all garnered mass attention and became widely known because of media. Yes, just like what this paper produces and puts out, week after week.

Baxter was not the first person to come up with poems about the cowboy and ranching life. Iyn wasn't the first one to sing and write songs about that same life. But because of media, they all garnered lots of attention.

I never met Tom or Bill or Temple, tho' I did get to meet Iyn and Baxter and Ray, for a bit. But how I work and relate to cattle and horses today, has been impacted by all of them, to a large extent. Many of the songs I sing came about from either Ian's mind or from what I heard him sing. And I truly believe that if it wasn't for him, and Baxter, there would be no Elko Poetry gathering. 125 years ago

- BELLE TIMES August 25, Rough Riders Dissatisfied Camp Thomas, Aug. 23 – There is a great deal of dissatisfaction among the men of Col. Grigsby's regiment over the attempt that is being made to force them into garrison duty. Life as they find it in camp is not exactly a dream of Eden. Now that the war is over and nothing remains but the life of a regular soldier, nine out of ten of the men who gave up good position to enlist want to go back to their positions, and some of them to their business, as the matter of \$13 a month never had any allurements for them in the first place – it was their patriotism. A petition was started among the privates asking that the regiment be disbanded, setting forth that they did not feel that this was unbecoming good soldiers in view of the close of the war for which they had enlisted. This petition got quite a number of signers, but some of the officers heard of it and immediately had the men who were circulating it arrested and placed under guard. There the men were kept until Captain Seth Bullock heard of their plight. He took steps that got them out of the guard house in short order. Then a long telegram was sent to the war department by some of the same men. This stirred up something of a sensation, and it evidently had some effect, for the men next had Major French upon them. He arraigned them in the severest terms telling them they were guilty of cowardice and applying other similar terms. Capt. Bullock has shown himself a model officer and a perfect gentleman with his men, and has often interceded, not only to the advantage of his own, but men from other companies. The other Black Hills officers are also well like, and most of them are with the men in this matter. There is a strong dislike noticeable towards other officers of the regiment, however, and the cowboys say that, never having had better than \$50 jobs in their lives, they are exceedingly loth to throw up the jobs they have now. It is stated that Colonel Grigsby's recent visit to Washington was for the purpose, if possible, of inducing the war department to

MOUNT ROOSEVELT

I think the greatest inspiration of life came the other day when I accompanied the editors of the state on a trip up Mr. Roosevelt in the north Black Hills. I have stood on the slopes of Shasta, in California, with my cheeks bathed in salt air, and have looked into the vine-clad dells on every side, I have climbed

to the top of Punchbowl in the Hawaiian Islands, and standing on its stone-capped summit I have looked down over the Edenic city of Honolulu nestled in a bed of flowers at its feet. I have strolled up Arayat in the Philippines and have watched our little brown cousins on the plains below, inundating their paddies of rice until their fields looked like great sheets of decorated linoleum. But, I am willing to confess that when I stood on the top of Mt. Roosevelt for the first time the other day and, facing northward, looked over into the Centennial valley kissed by large patches of warm sunlight that had screened themselves; loved over into the centennial where savagery had given way to civilization; looked into that charming valley lying there like a real checker-board whose squares were composed of intermittent field of corn, alfalfa and wheat, interspersed with clusters of deep-hued ever greens and dotted hither and thither with beautiful farm building I became enraptured, and, turning to Editor Smith of the Belle Fourche Bee, I said "This is the greatest inspiration of my life!" Then, my companion, Mr. George Dutbsie, supervisor of the Black Hills national forest in which Mt. Roosevelt is situated handed me his binoculars and said: "Focus them onto the low range of hills along the northern horizon, and you will be looking into North Dakota. Train them onto those two buttes far distant to the northwest and you will be looking into Montana. Survey that second line of hills to the west, and you will be looking over into Wyoming. You are standing here on the sentinel of four states over which Theodore Roosevelt once roamed." And

SPEAKER STRESSES DEVELOPMENT OF STATE **RESOURCES**

A. H. Thornton, Sloux Falls, Spoke to Chamber of Commerce Tuesday Noon A. H. Thornton, Sioux Falls, who is acting as executive secretary of the Natural Resources Commission board of South Dakota, was a speaker at the Tuesday noon luncheon meeting of the Belle Fourche Chamber of Commerce. His remarks was confined to the work and study which the Commission is making into the development of natural resources in South Dakota. Mr. Thronton stated that so far as agriculture was concerned South Dakota's production of farm and ranch produce ranked high in the nation, but "in the case of making use of its natural resources the state has barely scratched the surface. In its agricultural production, many of the by-products are wasted due to the fact that we have not taken time to develop industrial possibilities.

Out in this part of the state, sheep and wool production, has been a major business, but there is not reason why Belle Fourche and other west-river communities should not have woolen mills. The present piles of sawdust could be used in manufacturing sweeping compounds. He also mentioned the industrial possibility of using wasted corn cobs for the making of nylons, fur cleaning products and polishes. "Those of you who are planning to visit the State Fair this year, "stated Mr. Thornton, "are invited to pay a visit to the booth of the Natural Resources Commission and see for yourself what may be developed in the way of new industries within our own state to make use of our waste products." He also invited all communities of the state

To Replace Barbecue PLAN FALL FESTIVAL It's going to be a Fall Festival, complete with dancing and food, and it's all free. The affair will be held Saturday, Sept. 8 at Belle Fourche. There will be a street dance with two bands - one rock and one country. That was the decision of the Community Unity Barbecue committee Tuesday night as they finalized plans for the replacement for the Community Unity Barbecue which was cancelled this year. Committee members, searching for something new to replace the Barbecue, decided the Fall Festival idea would be worth

They plan to start the event about 8 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 8. The bands will start playing at 9 o'clock. Plans call for setting up a lunch stand at the corner of State and Sixth. Free whimpies, pickles, potato chips and soft drinks will be served. South of the lunch stand on Sixth Street will be the country and western band – The Poor Boys from Camp Crook. West of the lunch stand on State Street will be The Shells of Time. Everything will be free.

The event will actually replace two other affairs - the Barbecue and the second annual harvest dance staged by the Belle Fourche High School Spirit Club. The Barbecue, an annual June event for more than 20 years, was dropped this year because of a decline in the number of contributors. Committee members felt the affair had run its course and that perhaps a new idea was in order.

The Fall Festival idea was proposed last May and subsequently adopted by the committee for this year. Prolonged Electrical Storm Batters Belle Area One of the most prolonged electrical storms the area has seen in years hung over Belle Fourche Tuesday night, keeping the sky streaked with light and the heavens reverberating with thunder for almost an hour. In spite of the intensity of the storm there was limited damage. Several trees were reported hit and at least two fires started by the storm. Black Hills Power and Light Company lines suffered minor damage. With the storm however, came pelting rain that brought 1.71 inches of moisture to the Belle Fourche area. The rain was spotty, however, with areas to the west reporting amounts up to three inches, while points to the north and south reported little moisture.

The Belle Fourche office of the Black Hills Power and Light Company reported two residential transformers were damaged by lightening and there was some trouble along with some outages in the Redwater area. Some of the Belle Fourche street lights were knocked out. Manager Mahlon Alden said service to those would be restored Wednesday night if necessary parts are obtained in time. Belle Fourche's volunteer fire department battled two blazes east of town on the old Fruitdale road. One blaze, burned about an acre of grass and was smothered by firemen before the rain reached the spot. Another blaze, on the same road, but closer to town, burned until the rain put it out.



to Reub's cousin Roxie Finck at White Drug and she told us that they got just a little over three inches of rain at their place.

The guys sorted off a bunch of lambs Thursday morning and then hauled them down to the sale barn at Newell. Reub went up to spray weeds at our Horse Creek pasture again, but ran out of spray so we had to go to Reeder to get some more that afternoon.

September 9, 1943

Alex Meyer has received notice that his application for a Class B truck license was approved and a permit granted on September 2nd. A hearing on the application was held in Newell on August 10th before a 2-member board of the Utility Commission.

While enroute to their new home in San Diego from Newell, Clint McBride and daughters Joyce and Faye were involved in a Railroad accident at Gallup, New Mexico. Joyce sustained head injuries, a sprained back and went into severe shock. Clint and Faye escaped with a shaking up. The 30-car passenger train they were riding on was slowing down at the Gallup depot; the locomotive went through an open switch and plowed into the rear of a stalled train, derailing 2 of that train's cars, 1 loaded with ammunition. Six coaches were damaged; the McBride's were about in the middle of the train. Mr. McBride hopes all are OK in Newell and that the grasshoppers have all jumped into Orman Lake and it is a lonesome world after having lived and had a swell time in Newell.

Fire in a honey truck, driven by Howard Clark, destroyed a new truck, 12 supers of honey, some canvass and other articles last Saturday while enroute from Vale to Newell. The driver's attention was distracted by the gesticulations of a farmer in the field near the Van Loan place. The truck was only

slightly damaged. Dr. Clark estimated his loss at about \$100.

September 3, 1953

Mr. J. W. Grimes, District Manager of the Missouri Oahe District, Bureau of Reclamation, office at Huron, announced today that Belle Fourche water presently stored in Keyhole Reservoir would be released at the rate of 250 c.f.s., beginning on September 8, at present the water is being released at the rate of 75 c.f.s. This increase in flow in the Belle Fourche River and farmers and ranchers living along the River are urged to take the necessary precautions to safeguard their equipment and livestock during the time this release is being made.

Shortly Schroeder of Newell sprayed cattle for Alfred Lindell near Castle Rock Tuesday. The former has cattle at the Lindell ranch also.

Sale of his pool & recreation parlor in Newell to J. B. (Bart) LaFayette was announced this week by Walt Neisess, who operated same in Newell for the past 8 years. Formerly known as Walt's Place, along the east side of Main Street, the business name will change to Bart's Place effective the first of the month. Neisess will assist LyFayette for several weeks before moving with his wife to a new location due to health concerns. La-Fayette ranched in the Castle Rock community for many years before moving to Newell where he has been employed as Secretary of the Newell Livestock Exchange Bank. He will continue in that capacity for the present.

September 5, 1963

Wm. Swint, a Boeing Company flight Superintendent, formerly of Georgia, now of Newell, was one of the 3 men killed in a helicopter crash six miles northeast of Deadwood yesterday afternoon. The others were the pilot and E. Edmuson of the Mississippi Valley Helicopter Service of Rapid City and a Boeing engineer out of Belle Fourche. The crash apparently occurred as the 'copter was making a landing and the rotor flew off. Mr. & Mrs. Swint and family moved to Newell this summer and have been living in the Belle Fourche Irrigation District house on
