Butte County Commissioners **Reluctantly Close** 2 More Bridges

ALEXA ALTHOFF news@bellefourchebeacon.com The Butte County Commission meeting was held on Tuesday, July 21st in the Belle Fourche Courthouse. Commissioners addressed pressing issues to Belle Fourche including the recent drowning at Orman Dam, a possible purchase of property within the city, and two additional bridge closures.

Commissioner Stan Harms had requested Butte County Sheriff Fred Lamphere address the council about the level of authorities at Orman Dam in order to better educate the commissioners if questions from citizens arise. Sheriff Lamphere explained a complex, but reciprocal relationship between the Bureau of Land Management, South Dakota Department of Game, Fish, and Parks, and the Butte County Sheriff's Department.


BLM has the law enforcement contract and the Butte County Sheriff's Department works with them as backup. Sheriff Lamphere explained, "There are crimes they can't arrest on like simple assault, or sexual assault. The Fish and Game does primary investigations and makes arrests under their areas of jurisdiction. We're basically both of their backups out there'

The Fish and Game Department also keeps a boat on site which is ready to respond at any time. Sheriff Lamphere used the example of a recent kayaker who requested assistance due to large waves and the SDG-FP was able to immediately respond. "It's a multi-faceted patrol out there," the Sheriff added.

Finally, the BLM responds primarily to crimes on federal property, some driving offenses, vandalism, and issues dealing with artifacts.

Next to update the commissioners was Butte County State's Attorney Cassie Wendt. Wendt stated her office had remained busy with drug crimes in Butte County. She has also seen a rise in other areas of criminal behavior within the county. "A handful of sex crimes since we've been on lockdown due to Covid," Wendt said. "It's more of the same." In addition to a report on crimes within the county, Wendt aided the commission in providing legal advice to a possible land acquisition for the county. The commissioners expressed interest in purchasing two buildings across the street from the courthouse which include Dakota Pawn and the house next to it. Commissioner Frank Walton expressed the buildings could be purchased for a reasonable sum and it could be desirable parking locations for

The final major issue addressed during the meeting came from Highway Superintendent Dwayne Heidrich. A state inspection of two bridges yielded the recommendation to close Gaver Bridge and Viken Bridge at the intersection of Hope Road.

Commissioners requested the department look into any possible repairs to keep the bridges open, but ultimately decided to close the bridges by Friday, July 24th. A unanimous

vote was taken on pursuing two additional grants which would help provide funding for bridge repair.

Heidrich stated Gaver Bridge is 100 years old, and is not the bridge known as Minnesela Bridge which is also on Gaver Road. The vote to close the bridges saw hesitation from all commission members and no one readily made the first motion. Commissioner Stan Harms said, "Those people are going to have to go out the other way, maybe for 3 or 4 years."

Senior Center Plans New Dining Experience

lining in the midst of this pandemic, many of you may very well find it at the appropriately named Belle Silver Lining. At the helm of the senior center since late 2018, Executive Director Laura Bennett is

beyond enthusiastic in announcing plans for a new senior food service to be inaugurated at the center in early September.

This is when the dining room, aka the ChuckWagon Café, will be opening for sit-down meals, carry-out and home delivery. Fully aware of the impact on area seniors once Covid-19 necessitated closure of the center, most importantly the dining room, Laura and the Silver Lining board have been working tirelessly to create a localized in-house senior food service operated by Belle Silver Lining at the center seven days a week/365 days a year (including holidays).

Laura emphasizes there will be no need for reservations at the ChuckWagon Café -"just come on in" - while acknowledging that all of this is contingent on the Covid-19


situation at that time. But being the positive person she is, Laura is hopeful that on September 8, the ChuckWagon Café will

have its grand opening under the supervision of a newly-hired kitchen manager and two staff support personnel.

A 501 (c)(3) non-profit, Belle Silver Lining depends on ongoing,

critical local funding and is tremendously grateful for the financial support already received. The center, in turn, unequivocally supports the Belle Fourche community's culture stressing the importance of buying local. The center has been doing its part and will continue to do so by buying as many supplies and as much food as can be obtained from area farmers, ranchers and local businesses.

Although the dining room has been closed since March 19, the Silver Lining is again open from 9-5 weekdays and 9-4 Saturdays for access to the thrift store and the loan closet (medical equipment). Social distancing is encouraged although the occasional hug sneaks by. And when numerous seniors within as well as outside the

"Surely, the LORD is in this place, and I didn't even know it." Genesis 28:16

As a young child in Sunday School, I was a bit unsettled to learn that Jesus wanted to come and live in my heart. 





local community found themselves isolated at home at the onslaught of the pandemic, often alone, Laura and a dedicated group of volunteers began making up to 300 weekly calls to check on their welfare. And as though she's not busy enough, Laura will occasionally roll up her sleeves and bake the center's famous caramel rolls (24 dozen at last count) and serve them in Herrmann Park. This was a weekly Friday event at the center until the dining room closed and will be reinstituted as soon as possible once the dining room reopens. "Meanwhile," smiles Laura, "we're being creative with social distancing in the park while enjoying each other's company, something we've all

sorely missed since the dining

room closed."

When Laura and the board began laying down plans for the center's new dining experience, their research enabled them to develop menus that will be implemented at the Silver Lining with Laura highlighting "made from scratch." And since the center's make-up encompasses multiple generations and thus a variety of food preferences, these menus will reflect that. "With new generations coming into the senior population, it's critical that we adapt not only to nutritional preferences but to generational differences as well," emphasizes Laura. "In essence, we need to reinvent the traditional idea of the senior center."

Above all else, Laura wants to stress that once the ChuckWagon Café opens, EVERYONE is welcome. Donations are strongly encouraged but no one will be turned away.



Mayor Hopes to Soon Complete Projects

The regular Belle Fourche City Council meeting on Monday, July 20th, included a brief update on several projects from Mayor Gloria Landphere and the unanimous approval of ten items.

Mayor Landphere stated the grant for a community splash pad was coming along, the pickleball court was awaiting new striping, and the Redwater water line was moving forward as well. "We're just trying to get as much done as we possibly can," Landphere said. "Budget time is coming."

Additionally, Landphere stated that she had been working with Butte County to construct emergency plans for inclement weather and other issues. This will include a draft of procedures which will eventually be finalized and given to city departments and buildings.

One resolution was passed during the Tuesday night meeting. The City of Belle Fourche established a new procedure and purchasing restriction for goods and services. According to the old ordinance, the Public Works Directer was approved to spend up to \$6,500 without council approval. The new ordinance authorizes all departments to make up to a maximum purchase of \$2,500 without prior approval from the Finance Office. Finance Officer Breanna Schaefer noted, "But this is what they [Public Works] have been doing, so it's not really a change at all."

A short series of payment approvals for infrastructure followed which were unanimously approved and the meeting adjourned shortly after.

Travis Martin, Ward 2 Councilman, was not in attendance.

One might rightfully ask, how does this famous quote by a Founding Father relate to myself and our community today? Let me explain.

It is no secret that local media is a tough business, in fact, since the outbreak of Covid-19 earlier this year, most local media companies have lost a significant portion of their revenue and many are nearing a breaking point. Hundreds of communities around the country have already lost their local media voice. When a community loses their media voice, they lose a valuable local information conduit for the community. Additionally, they also lose the messenger that spreads local information to the outside world. This is the same local voice our Founding Fathers referred to when considering the value and importance of assuring freedom

Business and Community Loyalty Is the Same Thing

In response to the current pandemic and crisis in local media, Francis Wick, one of the brightest young minds in the news-media industry and CEO of Wick Communications worked with his local congressional representatives in Arizona to create what has become known as the "Local Journalism Sustainability Act". This powerful bipartisan piece of legislation is actually simple. This legislation empowers local communities to stand-up and provide support to their local media companies in a community-wide way saving them money at the same time. Without boring you with extensive detail, let me summarize this legislation. 1) It provides tax credits (much better than a deduction) to local media supporters for simply supporting their local media company by subscribing to their service. This now makes supporting the local media financially appealing for subscribers. 2) It provides small local businesses tax credits for advertising in their local media. Many small businesses have very tight budgets. Due to this, advertising, marketing and branding are difficult without those deep pockets of financial resources. This legislation provides a shot in the arm to any local business with fewer than 1000 employees. This will be a huge benefit for local businesses and thus the community. 3)It provides tax credits for your local media companies to employ local journalists in their markets. In order to provide accurate and timely news, it takes a dedicated staff. This legislation allows local media companies to invest in the communities in which they serve. Often, we ask ourselves, how can I make a difference? I am only one person and one person really hasn't much of a voice in government. Nothing could be further from the truth. When a local media company folds, studies have shown the cost of local government increases 30% within 4-5 years, civic pride diminishes, voting numbers drop, economic vitality declines and

volunteering fades away. This is a unique opportunity that allows just a few voices to make a dramatic impact in the future of your local community.

What can I do now? That is very simple, reach out by

sunshine patriot that Thomas Paine mentioned. Now is the time to move quickly and take action that can be the difference between your community losing the freedom of the press or maintaining it. Being a patriot doesn't always mean fighting a war or placing yourself in harm's way, it can also be the little, yet powerful efforts of the hidden few that save a community - now is one of those moments. Work on the North Park Splashpad Underway

NEWELL - The Newell Improvement Corporation finally began construction of the North Park Splashpad this week. On Monday, Dan Goeders, owner of Bo's Landscaping in Belle Fourche and his employee Sam Brost, starting digging the hole for both the 1200-gallon recirculation tank and the splashpad itself. They used a backhoe donated to the cause from Dakota Equipment Rental and trucked in by Bryan Culver at no charge. The donation was for three free days of digging. Bo's Landscaping will be discounting their services and the PVC pipe came from Well's Plumbing at a 10 percent discount as well.

"It's wonderful to see the project finally begin," said NIC Secretary Judy Dague. The group started the process of constructing a splashpad in the town back in October of 2018 with a five-member group meeting to brainstorm ideas. At first, they worked under the auspice of the Newell Community Club, raising funds to events, donations and grants.

They decided, that since this was not going to be the only project they planned to do to improve infrastructure and amenities for the

NVN area, to begin the process of applying for their own non-profit status from the IRS.

Monday was a red-letter day for the organization, which meets monthly. Not only did they start the actual construction, but they also received notice from the IRS that they had been approved for 501c3 status.

"It was pretty exciting to see the construction taking place at last," said Colleen Brunner, the treasurer for the group and the member who actually did the groundwork to apply for the status. "I think Cassie (the postmaster at the Newell office) thought I was crazy. I actually squealed when I got the letter notifying us of our status." Brunner said it was exciting to share with the group, which has grown to nearly 10 members who make plans. They also have those in the community who have helped out by holding fundraisers and supporting the group.

Newell Girl Scouts Present "Survival" Bags to Law Enforcement



Mrs. Emma Yoder, lately of Castle Rock, is back on her claim after spending the 4th in Newell. She is having her Claim all fenced in. The new water mains have been undergoing a test the past week and a few leaks discovered. The heavy rains caused the ditches to cave in and covered up the mains before a test could be made. A test of the fire hydrants was made and the pressure was found to be very favorable. A full stream was thrown for a distance of considerably over 100 feet.

An exploding cream can caused a little excitement at the depot yesterday and Will Chase and Otto Rothe are carrying, bandages to attest that they were in the immediate vicinity when the durned thing went off. The can was in the shipment from one of the inland towns and as it was boosted into the Railroad car, is when it exploded; the can landed right side up. The lid catching Rothe on the lower lip and ricocheted to Chase's forehead. Both men are deeply cut and required medical attention. They are congratulating themselves that it was not worse then it could have been.

Another freak of nature has been discovered in the Hills. It is a natural refrigerator, 175feet underground, which freezes ice in the summer and is warm enough to store potatoes and fresh fruits in winter. The place is connected with the gypsum plaster mill at Black Hawk. When the plant closed the hole filled with 8 foot of water, in the summer the water freezes and is coated with a layer of absolutely clear crystal ice and so transparent one can read a newspaper through it. Through some mysterious law of chemistry, this natural ice factory only functions in the summer and is especially active when the temperatures are high. In the winter there is a reverse to the natural phenomena, it gets so warm in the tunnel one could store potatoes, canned fruit and other perishables.

The strong winds here early last Thursday evening literally blew the Justice Romain & Co. tent out of Newell and completely out of the state. The large tent was blown down and torn beyond immediate repair. Showings here for the balance of the week and Custer had to be cancelled and before leaving, Mr. Justice announced that the show was closing up for the summer and the players returning to their homes in Kansas. Newell is one of the best show towns on the entire route and they desire returning here again next year.

Mrs. Byron Schipke and little daughter Sharon were overnight guests Saturday at the home of the formers parents, Mr. & Mrs. O.E. Milberg. Sunday forenoon Mrs. Schipke and Sharon and Mrs. Milberg called on Grandma Fredlund and Mrs. Eichler. Byron came in time for dinner and Mr. & Mrs. Hans Breckenfeld also were callers.

The Wm Marty ranch house, located near Strool, was completely destroyed by fire last Thursday evening after being struck by lightning. Valued at \$11,000, the fine ranch home was beyond saving by the time the blaze was first sighted. Mr. & Mrs. Marty were visiting a daughter in Montana at the time of the conflagration and were immediately notified of their loss. Mr. Marty is a widely known rancher in the northwestern part of the state and a director of the Bank of Belle Fourche.

August 3, 1950







temperatures are in the upper 50s on the plains and the lower 50s in the Black Hills.


The Climate Prediction Center's (CPC) 8-14 day forecast for the period July 31 through August 6 is above average temperatures and below average precipitation. During this period, the daily average temperature is in the lower 70s on the plains and the upper 60s in the Black Hills.

The monthly and seasonal drought outlooks call for drought persistence across northeastern Wyoming, with southwestern South Dakota.

Both the one-month and threemonth climate outlooks call for equal chance for below, above and near normal temperature with an increased chance of above average precipitation.



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
