New Fun at the Butte-Lawrence County Fair!

NISLAND - Monday and Tuesday of the Butte/Lawrence County Fair are pretty much entering exhibits and the annual 4-H, FFA and Open Horse Show; then things begin to kick off in a big way on Wednesday.

This year there were tons of added attractions in celebration of the 100th anniversary of the

Tuesday saw the entry of all horticulture and non-livestock (static) exhibits as well as the sheep weigh-ins.

On Wednesday weigh-ins occurred for meat and dairy goats, swine, poultry and small animals and beef, as well as the wool fleece judging. Shows included the dairy cattle, dairy and meat goats and swine.

The afternoon events saw a otal of five different bouncy houses for the enjoyment of the kiddos. A blood drive, which started with a bang and ended with a bust when the generator running the mobile unit went down, saw that event end prematurely.

Fun started in a big way with the Belle Fourche FFA hosting a watermelon eating contest, corn hole tournament and turtle races. There were a couple different age groups for the watermelon contest and those participating had to eat a pretty big slice of melon down to the rind, all the while keeping their hands behind their backs. Bennett Gordon came away with a bucket filled with all sorts of treasures.

Immediately following that was the corn hole event with a number of teams participating. The turtle races were postponed due to heat.

At 4 p.m. the sheep dog trial kicked off and organizer Mary Ann Warns made a special presentation to Art Ollila. This sheep rancher had provided the ewes for the annual event which

has been held for the last six years running. Warns rewarded Ollila's large donation with a custom made cane with a Jacob's sheep horn as the handle.

Fondue for Youth saw elegant dining with deep fried steaks coming hot off the pitchfork to the buffet table. This was a reserved event and according to organizer Holly Main, they served around 100 people.

Two of the 4-Hers interviewed briefly by Jim Thompson were Eve Jensen of 9-mile Guys and Gals and Sydney Baker of River Riders who were in shooting sports events during the year. Also speaking was Danika Gordon. A drawing for businesses who had donated to the event saw Pioneer Bank and Trust rewarded with a

\$500 credit toward next year's Fondue event. They generously donated it back to the organi-

Pig wrestling was a new event this year at the fair with all sizes of pigs donated for use by Bridget Howell Pigs of Colony, Wyo. The muddy pit was surrounded by a large number of spectators, most of which lining the inside row got a little muddy themselves as the kids splashed and fell in their efforts to snag a piglet and put them in a bucket. The evening wrapped up with bingo in the hospitality tent, a concert by Mark Mowry and Chelsea D and Company playing for the nightly show. There was also a movie at the pavilion.

Dear Motor Medics,

I have a 2005 Dodge grand Caravan and the power operated side door doesn't always work. Sometimes when you close the door it will almost move to the full closed position then it reverses and fully opens. If I try it several times it sometimes closes. I have been told by two dealerships that it needs a new ribbon cable and its hundreds of dollars. Is this common?

Margaret in Fargo North Dakota

Dear Margaret,

This is a common problem in many of the vans using a power sliding door system. They have to make a connection between the door and the body and many do it with a cable. The cable moves back and forth every time the door slides and with enough time it can be rubbed through or break one of the wires in the cable. If either of these things happens it can act just like yours is operating. Other issues like programming can be a factor and less expensive than a new cable so make sure that they give it a proper diagnosis and guarantee their work. A good thing to remember is the most expensive repair is always the one you don't need. Make sure that the shop doing the repairs has had experience with the system used on your vehicle. If it is a cable they are expensive to replace mostly due to the time involved for the labor which can take several hours of work.

Dear Motor Medics,
I listen to Under the Hood Here is Salida Colorado and I drive a Chevy S10 with a manual transmission. Recently the transmission has become hard to put into reverse and also first gear unless the engine is turned off. When I try to engage it the gears grind and if I force it I can get it to go eventually. Once it is in gear it seems to work ok. What can you tell me?

Dear Kelly

It sounds like the clutch is not completely disengaging. To smoothly engage without gear clash, the input shaft of the transmission needs to stop moving and this occurs when the clutch is pressed down. Many things can cause it to keep moving like a warped clutch disc or pressure plate or the pilot shaft dragging on the crankshaft but the most common item is worn clutch hydraulics. The vehicle will need to be properly diagnosed to verify which component is the cause before repairs. The one thing to note is that if that if it is being operated in this condition it can cause damage to occur to the transmission very quickly and increase repair costs. The grinding can cause gear wear internally and if the clutch is dragging due to a hydraulic problem then heat will be built up which can burn up clutch friction parts or cause warpage which will mean having to replace the clutch parts.







123 years ago Belle Fourche Times Aug 5, 1897 War on The Range

A week ago last Thursday the CY and Ogallaia roundups which were working together in the Hole-in-the-wall country in Wyoming met three rustlers and a fight took place, which resulted in the killing of Bob Smith of the rustlers, and slightly wounding Bob Devine, foreman of the CY outfit, and his son, Lee Devine. Another of the rustlers, Bob Taylor, was disarmed and captured and taken to Casper, where he was lodged in jail. The roundup was gathering cattle near the Hole-in-the-wall, which is known as the rendezvous of the rustlers of that part of the country. There has been frequent trouble between the cattlemen and the rustlers and, it is said, the rustlers were especially bitter toward Devine and had threatened to kill him. The editor of this paper personally interviewed one of the CY boys who was present when the shooting occurred and his story was that the roun've got yodup met the three men and when they had passed by a few feet Bob Smith turned and drawing a gun said, "I've got you now vou --- ---" fired, hitting Bob Devine in the side; the ball glanced and striking his horse knocked it down. The fireing became general and in the melee Bob Smith was killed, Bob Taylor captured and Lee Devine shot through the arm. Al Smith was shot through the right hand, but he escaped capture. Devine seems to be accompanied by the sheriffs of Johnson and Natrona counties, with warrants for the arrest of the Belle Fourche bank robbers, who are now supposed

Cloud Burst Results In Two Deaths Flood Came at Beulah, Wyo., Without Warning During Night - Some Damage To Town A cloud burst in the vicinity of Beulah, Wyo., twenty-five miles southwest of Belle Fourche, Wednesday night of last week caused the death of Mrs. William Bowers of Missouri alley, Ia., and her grandson, a small boy, son of Dr. and Mrs. R. L. Bowers of Chadron, Nebr. A wall of water, said to have been four to six feet high, came rushing down Bear creek, and a dry draw that empties into Sand Creek at Beulah, sweeping everything before it. On account of the newly constructed road grade through Beulah, the natural drainage of the stream was congested, preventing the water from spreading as it usually does. Across the creek from the town, in camp near the flour mill, were several parties of tourists, one composed of William Bowers and wife of Missouri Valley, Ia., and Dr. R. L. Bowers and wife and two children of Chadron. The wall of water stuck their camp without warning



76 years ago Belle Fourche Bee Aug 1, 1946 Record Number Tourists Visiting Mt. Rushmore

J. Estes Suter, acting superinterdent, reports that a record number of tourists have been stopping over and paying a visit thus far this summer to Mount Rushmore. In the first eighteen days of July, a total of 52,719 persons visited the Shrine of Democracy. The heaviest day so far this year was July 2 when 3,924 visitors were counted. During the month of June the registrations were 48,373. This was seven times greater than the number of registrations during June, 1945. A total of 6,904 visitors were counted in that month. Supt. Suter says tourists have come from every state in the union and even from such distant places as the Philippines, Puerto Rico, Hawaii and China.

"Building Main Street, not Wall Street"

The Critical Nature of Balance

Many may believe by

the title of this weekly column I am down on the chains and big boxes that make up the corporate world of Wall Street. Nothing could be further from the truth. What I am against is the lack of balance and understanding communities have when it comes to the steps of incorporating these entities into their community mix. Most go about it in a backward way, thus making the transformation of their downtowns into the 'heart' and 'soul' of their com-

munity very difficult. What makes a community desirable for locals and attractive to outsiders is the uniqueness they feel when visiting a community. I have yet to experience a thriving community that doesn't have a thriving and somewhat unique downtown. Creating the ambiance and uniqueness that accompany downtowns must be the communities #1 objective and goal. When you create a vibrant community built around local businesses and a creative and unique theme, you are then able to begin the process of adding other components to the mix that might aid in the overall convenience that comes with chains and big boxes – but, it must be done in a methodical and systematic way.

How does a community achieve this balance? The path may vary by community, but the general and most success-

ful approach is similar in every successful community. That similar path will always involve dedicating the lion's-share of early resources to transforming your downtown. This

is done by building up local businesses of all types, encouraging local entrepreneurship, incentivizing local community members to grow existing businesses downtown and building the infrastructure needed to assure a vibrant downtown. This infrastructure goes beyond power, sewer, water and so forth. Downtown infrastructure includes outdoor music venues or band shells, numerous benches, adequate green space, ample art, and robust entertainment

abilities. Once you have all that in place, or at least planned and underway, then you can address the other amenities such as chains and big boxes you may want to include in your community. Let me caution however, while many big boxes can bring expanded choices to your community, always weigh the damage that can be done when they arrive. Communities never need financially court national food chains, you can always find local entrepreneurs willing to take the same incentives you offer to chains and build something comparable with a local twist.

I am often able to travel and visit many communities around


711 State St. Laundromat, 710 8th Ave. the country, some transforming the right way and some, well, not so right. This week we were able to return and spend a few days in Marquette, MI. As we spent time in the community, it was refreshing to see how the community has transformed themselves from a somewhat sleepy small college town to a community that has become a year-round destination point for vacationing tourists from around the country.

They have nurtured a vibrant downtown along with several downtown events that draw over ten thousand locals and visitors alike to their downtown. They have rebuilt their waterfront offerings taking advantage of the beauty and location. Over the past decade, they have drawn interest from the chains and big boxes, but due to taking care of their core or 'heart' of the community first, those have become complimenting assets in lieu of entities that rob them of their character. Their payment for having the right balance is tens of millions of tourism dollars flowing through the community each year. An example might be finding a nice hotel room for less that \$200/night, oftentimes exceeding \$300/night due to high demand.

Finding the right balance is critical. Know that you will never have balance without a laser focus and dedication to your downtown first. Your downtown is a must if you are to succeed as a community over the long haul. When you neglect your downtown, know that you are doing so at your own risk and peril. Just as our body needs a heart to stay alive, so does your community, for a community

The recognition event will be held in conjunction with the Belle Fourche Chamber of Commerce

Sept. 23 at the Community Hall and will be under the auspices of the Chamber. Among features of the program will be a slide show arranged from pictorial records found in the Bureau of Reclamation office at Newell. A tour of the dam, with the old timers as guests is also being considered. The Black Hills Roundup office will serve as a central meeting place where the old timers can rest and visit that day. Tapes are to be made to record some of the first-hand history of work on the project. Tentative plans call for a banquet at \$4 per plate, which will make it possible to provide free tickets to the pioneers who will be guests of the Chamber. The event is a county-wide project, with the Orman Pioneer committee made up of representatives from all parts of the county. This group has met with Chamber representatives to work out plans for the special

observance. Residents from all parts of the county are invited to attend the recognition event. Editorial Although the construction of the dam began only 65 years ago, the term "pioneers" is appropriate in the sense that the men working on the project actually were pioneers. They were pioneers in the field of earthen dam building. At the time of its construction, Orman was a landmark in earthfill dams. It was the largest of its kind undertaken to that time and difficulties and heartaches marked the path of contruction. The job proved too much for the initial contractor. New ideas had to be tried. Mistakes were made. Year after year went by and finally the water was turned in to what was then known as the Owl Creek dam. It was quite an occasion and for years people traveled hundreds of miles to see the project, to fish and boat on the lake. For a time,

even the diversion dam backed up enough water to provide romantic boating facilities. Orman was, for a time, the biggest body of water in western South Dakota. Orman brought irrigation farming to the Belle Fourche valley and created the town of Newell and the U.S. Field Station. No single project has had as much effect on the economy of the area as the big earthen dam on Owl Creek. We hope the upcoming occasion honoring the pioneers of the Orman project will serve a dual purpose... that it will provide recognition to those men and women who played a part in the construction of this pioneering project, and that it will revive in today's generation a new interest in the dam and the lake so that can encourage and promote further development and improvement of the project which has almost been forgotten in the Bureau of Reclamation records.



August 3, 1911

Five springs have been discovered near Vale, flowing from the bank above Y. Baldwin's house from which they can irrigate their garden and also pipe it to the house.

John Blatchford came over from Nisland Wednesday to visit his sister and brother-in-law, Mr. & Mrs. Hugo Behrens and to shake hands with several of his old school mates who are living here. He returned home Thursday. His visit was a short one but he says he had a splendid time while it lasted.

August 4, 1921

The Irrigator again delayed this week due to failure of the power practically all day Monday. This with the fact that they were laid up a couple of days last week has kept them humping to keep up with the work. On top of that came in an unexpected batch of legal publications, but everything is now cleared for action. For during the rush they managed to knock out all their jobs and if nothing further happens, they will have a clean field for the next issue.

Some of the neighbors have already had corn and ripe tomatoes. E.M. McLennen's is one family. Go to him if you want to find out how to raise a nice garden. Rain and then more rain and if it were not for the grasshoppers, corn and vegetables of all kinds would be plentiful.

August 6, 1931

Frank Long, tax collector for Butte County, was in Newell Wednesday and advised us that tax collections were much better than he had anticipated. Mr. Long calls special attention of delinquent tax payers to the fact that he will be in Newell on August 15 for the purpose of receiving delinquent tax payments. By seeing Mr. Long, here in Newell a considerable saving can be made by the taxpayer.

T.J. Litsheim, Superintendent of schools at Nisland, was a business visitor in Newell Monday and joined several Newell golfers in a round on the Newell course that evening.

August 7, 1941

Playing in a 4-team meet at Sturgis the past Sunday afternoon, the Newell Horseshoe Pitching team won first honors, dropping only 2 of 14 matches. Members of the local quartet were: Captain Ernest Gardner, Lyman Bruce and Jolly Kuronen with Ben Ganz of Piedmont filling in. Their only matches lost were to Lead and Deadwood who placed 2nd and 4th respectively with Rapid City 3rd. Except in two contests, the Newell team won all their victories by large margins. Next horseshoe events in this territory will include a Tri-state meet at Rapid City on August

10 and a tournament at Newell on Labor Day.

Friends of Robert Flaigg of the Hoover community and Gottlieb Sinner of east of Newell will be glad to hear they are both some better at this time. The 2 men were brought to Dr. O.H. Clark at the local hospital last Saturday and have been quite ill with Para-typhoid.

Dick, son of Mr. & Mrs. Spencer Godfrey, was badly hurt on day last week while driving the stacker team. The double-tree broke, striking the lad and broke his pelvis bone. He will be confined to his bed for at least 6 weeks.

August 9, 1951

Mr. & Mrs. Walter Harman, Mr. & Mrs. Francis Jacobsen and children, Mr. & Mrs. Charley Roberts and Garland Nelson all Castle Rockets attended the horse race at Spearfish last Sunday. Mrs. Louis DeJaeger of Hoover looked after the Castle Rock Store while Mr. & Mrs. Harman were away

They told me that it is mostly rural areas that are targeted and most of the scams are about grandparents receiving a call from someone who claims to be their grandchild in jail asking for money to get out of jail.

A Border in Crisis Needs Solutions and Action

GOV. KRISTI NOEM Commentary

America is the land of opportunity. We're a nation where anyone can make anything of themselves if they work hard and play by the rules. But when those rules are abandoned when we lose respect for our Constitution and the rule of law – that's when the system breaks. And that's exactly what is taking place at our Southern border. Rule of law has collapsed, putting our border in crisis and risking our national security.

I recently sent 48 South Dakota National Guard troops – all volunteers - to support Texas in its efforts to secure our Southern border. This past week, I visited those troops and surveyed their observation posts. I got a briefing from them and from Border Patrol. I saw what they're seeing, and they told me what they need. And I gained a greater understanding of how unsustainable the situation is at the US-Mexico border.

Coyotes are smuggling people into our country. They know that if their group has a child under 7, they will be let into this country, turned over to a non-governmental organization, and relocated to someplace within our nation. They're

smuggling people into our nation – and they're using these migrants as pawns to distract from the cartel's aggressive drug smuggling operation. That is fundamentally contrary to everything for which this nation stands.

Here are some alarming numbers from the Border Patrol's most recent dispatches: More than 20,000 immigrants were stopped in a single week just in the Rio Grande Valley zone where our National Guard is deployed;

Fentanyl seizures are up 455% compared to last year; and Meth seizures are up 85%.

And that's just what Border Patrol is catching; imagine how much more is slipping through.

Those drugs don't stop at the border. They're being sent to our communities throughout the country. In South Dakota, the cartels bring these drugs to our cities, towns, and to some of our tribal reservations.

South Dakota has worked diligently to fight the drug epidemic in our state, and as a result, we were one of only two states in America to reduce the number of deaths from drug overdose last year. New Hampshire saw a small decline; South Dakota's overdose deaths decreased by almost 16 percent. I'm not going to let the tremendous progress we've made collapse because the Biden Administration refuses to secure our border.

What's worse is the bureaucracy of DC politics is stalled while more and more of these migrants die while attempting to cross the border. We can and should do better. Unfortunately, the reports I received this week indicate the politics of DC are likely to make this border crisis worse.

If President Biden won't step up and do his job, then Republican governors will continue to do what they can to address the border crisis. We're evaluating options to extend the deployment of the troops already at the border and asking Texas Gov. Greg Abbott to fund those extended engagements. We'll be sending an additional 125 troops there later this year as part of a 9-12 month federal deployment. And we will continue to evaluate how else we can help in this important effort.

Our nation is one of opportunity. We welcome people to come into our country, but they have to do it legally. We are a nation of laws. If we lose respect for those laws, we lose the foundation of our country. And I refuse to let that happen.

Governor Visits with SD National Guard Troops at Border

MCALLEN, T.X. - Today, Governor Kristi Noem heard from 48 South Dakota National Guard troops stationed on the southern border. The troops briefed the Governor on what they've seen and heard during their deployment.

"Our South Dakota National Guard is proving they can serve with excellence at the southern border. Border Patrol and the Texas National Guard made clear the soldiers we sent are providing critical support for this border mission," said Governor Kristi Noem. "I asked our guardsmen what their needs are and what more we can do to help. They asked for more time to complete this mission, and we are evaluating the possibility of extending their deployment."

Governor Noem was briefed on the situation at the border by her South Dakota National Guard troops, as well as the Texas National Guard and Border Patrol. During the briefing. both Texas and South Dakota

National Guard members made clear the deployment is having a positive impact addressing the crisis. The Governor surveyed three observation posts manned by South Dakota guardsmen and witnessed Border Patrol intaking migrant families at the border wall.

The troops departed for the border on a 30- to 60-day initial deployment on July 6th. Governor Noem subsequently announced that South Dakota will be sending an additional 125 members of the National Guard to the border for a 9 to 12-month deployment at the behest of the federal government. That subsequent deployment will be made later this year.

"I am grateful to these soldiers, who have volunteered for this deployment. The message I have received is clear: this deployment is working, and our Guard is committed to strengthening our border security," Governor Noem said
