Commission Discusses Emergency Egress

news@bellefourchebeacon.com The need for an emergency egress for the Hay Creek Ranch subdivision was explained to the commissioners during the July 27 meeting. Sheriff Fred Lamphere had written to the Planning Board that he felt an emergency egress should by Commissioner Stan Harms noted that the best solution would be to authorize the use of the Right of Way and limit it to emergency use only with minimum maintenance.

Commissioner Kim Richards voiced his support on a second exit and recommended vacating the section line as the best option. There began further discussion regarding forming a work group to modify the Subdivision Ordinance. Harms stated that commissioners should be setting policy and then passing it onto the Planning Board. "We are the final approval of plats," he said. "We are responcommissioners.

Commissioner Karol Herman summed up the discussion by stating, "We are in agreement to form a group and move forward."

The Butte County Commissioners fielded procedural matters at recent commission meetings held in July and August Former Butte County Commissioner Ed Goss had several questions for the commissioners during the July 23 meeting and Lacey Peterson, representing the BH Pioneer, had several comments during the August 3 meeting pointing to irregular commission procedures. Goss asked why commission meetings are not on YouTube or Zoom as many other counties have begun to do. Also, he pointed out that the county

From A1 **City** of just under \$42,000 with an incentive and bonus program that could push that to \$50,000. "I'm ready and looking forward to it," Neisant said. The city of Belle Fourche was also recognized by the state for the quality of the city municipal water supply. The Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources (DANR) awarded the city with a Drinking Water Certificate of Achievement Award. "We cannot live without access to safe and reliable drinking water," DANR Sec. Hunter Roberts said. "This award is a testament to the hard work and dedication of South Dakota's drinking water system operators and their efforts to ensure their customers have access to clean drinking water."

Roberts singled out the Belle Fourche system's operating specialists for their work. Certificates were presented to Steve Nafus, Dirk Hoffman, Ryan Stedillie, Kim Smoot, Ryan Reeves, Danyel Nixon and Karl Hulin.

"I want to thank these guys for keeping our water safe," Mayor Randy Schmidt said. To qualify for the award, public water systems and their operations had to meet all compliance monitoring and reporting requirements, drinking water standards and certification requirements for 2020, according to Roberts.

On the consent agenda the council approved several items from Public Works. They approved the replacement of approximately 12 sewer services

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


Saddle bronc rider Dawson Hay didn't win the event but stole the spotlight with his world record-tying 95-point ride on Calgary Stampede's Wild Cherry in the short round.

"She's a really crazy good horse," said Hay, who was competing about five hours from his home in Wildwood, Alberta. "The hardest part of her is spurring her out. It hasn't really sunk in (tying the ProRodeo world record)."

Zeke Thurston and Kirk Thomson shared the rodeo title with 182 points each in the twohead average. Hay was third with 181.5 points.

Hay, who qualified for the 2019 National Finals Rodeo, was aboard Wild Cherry for the third time in his career, but he'd had no luck the first two trips. "This was my first time to

stay on," Hay said. Hay, 23, now shares the saddle bronc riding ProRodeo world record with Doug Vold, who had a 95-point ride on Franklin's Transport in Meadow Lake, Saskatchewan, in 1979, and ProRodeo Hall of Famer Glen O'Neill, who had a 95-point trip on Franklin's Airwolf in Innisfail, Alberta, in 1996.

Dear Motor Medics,

I have a Nissan Titan and it has a ticking noise in the engine. It has had this for about a year and it doesn't seem to get any louder, but it makes me nervous

about taking it on trips far from home. When I have my engine oil changed my shop says it's just lifters and they probably are noisy because I tended to change my engine oil every 10k miles, I know, that's too long between changes. I recently put in an additive that cleans the engine oil system and the noise stopped for two weeks then came back. Should I try two cans at the same time?

Carry in Hills Minnesota

Dear Carry,

NO! That's the best way we can answer that last question. Never use an additive in a way not directed by the manufacturer of said product or you risk permanent damage. Additives have their place and if used as directed sometimes can fix a problem and save you a ton of money, but they are also some of the most abused products out there. With your extended oil changes, you probably clogged up some oil passages and using the cleaner helped restore them. Most of those cleaners are meant to be installed, then the engine oil changed within a few minutes of running. If that works then you may be able to repeat every 1000k miles for a few months and you may save the engine.

Dear Motor Medics,

Hey, what gives with the low tire pressure monitors? I am so sick of these things. It seems like every vehicle I drive has the low tire light on and even when I add the correct amount of air the light still stays on. How do these things work and how can I shut the light off permanently so that I don't have to worry about it. Derik in Osage Beach Missouri

Dear Derik,

Yikes! It's never any fun having a light come on and taunt you like that. Check Engine lights, ABS lights and Low Tire lights are some of the most annoying things on a car, but they all are there for a reason. They either are trying to save your life or the cars life. In the case of a low tire light it is the former. Low tire warning systems were made mandatory by the government for safety a while back due to so many accidents caused by tire failure from under inflation. The system uses pressure sensors mounted in the tire usually on the valve stem and they contain batteries and a transmitter to relay the pressure and tire temp to the vehicles computer where it determines if it is a safe pressure and either illuminates the warning lamp or not. The system can't be bypassed, and it would not be legal to do so. Get it diagnosed. Most shops can repair them at a reasonable price.

webpage is not up to date. According to Goss, the webpage should be kept current or done away with.

"I not surprised things have not changed in the last 20 years," he said as he observed that the commission's methodology has not seemed to have changed.

However, a resident from Lawrence County with a business in Butte County voiced his defense for the commissioners. He said that all the commissioners are accessible and are ready to give any information that they have available.

During public comments on August 3, Peterson produced a letter from Managing Editor Mark Watson that outlined several items showing concerns that have been noted over the last several weeks.

The letter respectfully asked that minutes be posted according to state law. And pointed out that the agenda had been strictly followed concurring with times listed. Finally, it was pointed out that news media is to have documents that are included in the commissioners' packets unless it relates to contractual items or personnel.

The comments were accept-

ed by the commissioners and assurances were given that the procedures would be remedied. Business done Aug. 3 included: *Highway Superintendent Dwayne Heidrich informed the commission of the need to repair/replace a John Deere tractor. Replacing the tractor may be the better choice but Heidrich said he will do more checking.

*The bridge north of the feedlot on Ruby Road will be replaced by box culverts at the cost of approximately \$62,000. The work will start the end of September.

*Black Hills Energy was granted a Right of Way on Wood Road and Lower Redwater Road. They will be replacing underground wiring with overhead wiring.

*Golden West was granted a Right of Way to put in a trench on Old Highway 212.

*The commissioners discussed putting in removable speed bumps in Fruitdale. It was decided that speed bumps would not be feasible at this time, but stated that deputies should be encouraged to write more tickets.

The next regular commission meeting will be held August 17 at 1 p.m.

lication of the Belle Fourche Beacon.

The city will soon be having a community tire cleanup. To help with the cost the council approved participation in a DANR grant to help cover the cost. The state will pay 80% of the tire cleanup with the city responsible for 20%. The 20% will be covered by those who drop off tires for disposal at the landfill. The DANR typically sees these programs last from 6 weeks to 3 months. The city has until December 31, 2021 to incur costs eligible for the 80% reimbursement. In 2018 the city's cost for tire cleanup was \$40,000 of which the state covered \$30,000.

A new city budget adoption ordinance passed its second reading and will now go into effect. It states that the annual municipal budget be submitted to council for first reading no later than the first regular meeting in November. The second reading shall be held five days after the first.

The council approved Mayor Schmidt signing of a letter endorsing NeighborWorks Dakota Home Resources of the Black Hills for their application to



#6 Companies are moving to places where employees want





Elaine Jensen opened the Special Commission meeting with a few words to the commissioners and department heads gathered in the Commissioner Room. She acknowledged that the minutes were behind for June and July, due to personal reasons including shoulder surgery and a shortage of personnel in the Auditor's Office.

"The provisional budget was not done by July 31, but shortly after that date," she said. Sandy Heidrich has been hired

as an Office Manager which will alleviate much of the workload.

Jensen assured the commissioners that a Deputy Auditor would be hired by August 12 at 5 p.m.

Following her remarks, the commissioners looked over the Provisional Budget and discussed several items. An additional \$225,000 was added to Dispatch for new radios. Also, three per cent was added for COLA for county employees. Taxes paid to the county were listed as being increased by 1.2% as approved by the State. No American

Rescue Funds were figured into the Provisional Budget since the Federal Government is to provide more guidance on permitted expenses in late August. The Final 2022 Budget can be adjusted during the commission's budgeting process as more information becomes available.

Adjustments can be made to the Provisional Budget during the commission's budget process as they meet with Department Heads. The Provisional Budget is published twice, then with changes, adopted September 24.

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Then and Now in Newell

"Looking Forward to our Past" by Linda Velder

August 10, 1911 One load of lumber went through here Saturday for a shack in the Castle Rock vicinity. Does it not seem strange when others are going with their household goods the other way? Many settlers are leaving for the winter and some never to return again. Yet we see some land seekers nearly every week. One gentleman came in on Friday's stage who has been spending considerable time looking over several states and yet he expects to locate in Butte County.

Rev. D.M. Brown, the new pastor of the Congregational Church has moved his family from Lead and is occupying the little building by the church. The family consists of Rev. Brown, Mrs. Brown, a son Charles W., a lad of 18 who will teach school this season on Dry Creek near Orman and a daughter, Mrs. Ernest Farrington at the Experiment Farm.

August 11, 1921 Earl Wilson, who has the contract for putting up the buildings at the Butte County Fair grounds, has moved onto the grounds, built a camp and is now putting in the concrete foundations. Lumber and other material that is being hauled out so the large force of workman he has with him will be kept busy until his contract is finished. There have been some changes made in the plans. for small pox and immunizing against diphtheria, safety-first measures advised by the state board of health.

August 14, 1941 Pvt Albert Lee Carroll, 30, of Starbuck, Minn died in the Army hospital at Ft. Meade Thursday night of internal injuries sustained earlier in the day while engaged in field maneuvers along Willow Creek, about 6 miles east of Newell. The inductee, a member of Troop A of the 4th US Cavalry, was charging over a hill when his horse tripped and fell on him. He was inducted into the Army on March 27.

Included in the variety program planned for the Newell Labor Day celebration will be a talk by Lt. Governor A.C. Melter of Kennebec. The popular state official will talk at 1:15 in the afternoon following a free street performance by the Olympia Boys. The celebration will began Sunday evening with additional shows, baseball game between Newell and Sturgis and concert. Monday morning will bring children's; pets and floats led by the Sturgis band; afternoon band concert; amateur contests followed by the dance at the City Hall music by "Sam & His City Fellas", KFYR Radio artists.

With the dry weather, we did a lot of checking water and cows near Ludlow and Lodgepole. I'm writing this early because some of the newspapers need it by Friday because of the motorcycle rally in Sturgis.

Taz got home Sunday afternoon and he and Casey went up to our Horse Creek pasture on Monday to pull the bulls out and bring them home. Reub and I went over to Cow Camp to check the water there and we stopped to visit Tricia and Cody Herman on the way over there to meet their new baby boy. Little Jacob Don is a real sweetie! Casey went to Bowman Monday afternoon to get some buck lambs while Amanda and the kids took Taz to Bowman that afternoon to meet his traveling partners to head to rodeos in Glasgow, Great Falls, and Bozeman Montana and Heber City Utah.

Casey hauled the last of the hay bales off the creek bottom on Tuesday. Reub and I went in to Buffalo that evening for the community gathering to pray for rain at the Rec Center. Tom Johnson led the meeting and Pastor Mike Smith, Pastor Cliff Claypool, Father Bryan Sorenson, and Pastor Henry Mohagen spoke and led us in prayer. Please keep praying for rain because we really need it. Casey went to check water at Horse Creek on Wednesday. Reub and I went to Hettinger that morning and then down

to check water at Cow Camp, getting home just in time to eat lunch. I got the gardens watered again that afternoon before the wind came up hard. We were hoping the heavy clouds would bring us rain, but we only got a few drops that didn't even

leave anything in the rain gauge.

Reub's cousin Billie Dee called me Wednesday afternoon about the Olson family reunion that she and some more of his

cousins are planning to have at his cousin Brenda and Jim Hoiland's place in Eugene, Oregon on August 13 & 14. Billie is the daughter of Lester and Suzie Olson. Her mother was a sister to Sylvia Doll so Elaine Doll-Dunn's Olson kids are her double cousins! Reub and I aren't going to be able to go because of all the water and cow checking, but we'd sure love to go. The last time there was an Olson reunion was 1998 at our ranch, which is where Delos and Hattie raised 14 kids just north of our house along Olson Creek. Delos settled here in 1898 when he was riding for some of the big cow outfits and Hattie and the rest of the family moved up here from Red Fern in the Black Hills right after their 5th child, Claude Olson was born in 1899.

Our great grandson Knox Olson turned 3 years old on Thursday and Amanda had a birthday party for him that evening with both sets of his grandparents and his aunt and uncle Kami and Jace Jenson brought his little cousin Keen down to help Knox celebrate his birthday.

We had to make a run to Hettinger Thursday afternoon to get

parts for Reub's side-by-side and on the way home we came on an awful semi wreck north of Valloff's place. The semi was tipped upside down in the ditch, the trailer behind it was blocking all of the highway and the Hettinger ambulance was taking the driver to the hospital. Sheriff Wyatt Sabo was on the north side of the wreck and we met the new Harding County deputy, Henry Head, who was stopping traffic on the south side of the wreck. Randy Valloff called his son Vance to bring the firetruck up in case the wreck should start a fire and we met Vance after we put the pickup in 4-wheel and got around the wreck through the ditch to head home. This was the first wreck on highway 79 this year, but until the highway department puts shoulders on the highway, it probably won't be the last wreck we see this year.

With the motorcycle rally going on, I'll leave you with this: A State Patrol sees a motorcycle puttering down the middle of the highway at 14 MPH & he says to himself, "This is just as dangerous as speeders!" He turns on his lights and pulls the bike over. Approaching, he notices it is an elderly gentlemen with a wide eyed, white as a ghost biker chick on the back.

The old biker obviously confused, says to the officer, "I don't understand, I was doing the speed limit! What seems to be the problem?"




