Spotlight Falls on State **Street Lights**

BELLE FOURCHE - The strings of lights between the lamp posts lining State Street in downtown Belle Fourche was the subject for discussion at the City Council's meeting on August 5th.

Mayor Gloria Landphere stated she had some input from citizens concerned that some of the lights were not working and either needed to be repaired or replaced.

The lights were installed a little more than two years ago following a \$2,500 funding effort by the Revitalize Belle Fourche Committee. The city Public Works Department

installed them and the council is responsible for their function.

But some of the light strings have gone out at times recently.

"It's my feeling that we need to do a good job with the upkeep of the lights," said Mayor Landphere. "They need to be on all the time if we're going to keep them up."

"There have been a few times when someone has had to go up on the pole and reset the GFI to get them turned back on," Councilman James Ager said. "Over time some of them are starting to sag a little. The discussion was maybe we should go to a more seasonal option, putting them up in the fall and down in the spring."

each fall sport team parents are asked to either bring a side, dessert or salad.




At 7:00pm a special presentation is planned featuring Proactive Coaching motivational speaker Rob Miller. According to the school's activities page calendar, that event is open to the public.

Mother Nature seemed to take away the steer roping opportunity at the 100th Black Hills Round up in early July. The ground was so soggy that the judges, stock contractor, and PRCA event director elected to cancel....unless... they could find another rodeo to tie it to before the season ended. The solution came when Range Days Rodeo in Rapid City gave their blessing on having the rodeo under their banner, but held in Belle Fourche. I won't go into the reasons and the wherefores, but suffice it to say, all the sponsors, Round Up Committee and personnel will be there in Belle Fourche on Thursday August 22, 9:00 AM.

There are only ten regular season steer roping remaining to qualify for the Finals in Mulvane, KS on the weekend of Nov 22-23. The top 15 advance to the Finals.

These standings aren't right up to date because of a busy weekend, but essentially here's whats at stake:

The Gold Buckle: Normally at this point in the season Trevor Brazile is staking his claim on the title, or Scott Snedecor, or Rocky Patterson. Those three men have accounted for

the past 11 championships; 3 by Snedecor, 4 by Patterson and 4 by Brazile. But this year Vin Fisher is trying to break into that world champion class for the first time. He has a narrow

lead over Brazile, with Snedecor in 5th and Patterson 10th. Vin has had a good season winning 5 times, while Trevor has won 4 and Snedecor only once.

Anticipate about 4 dozen steer ropers at Thursdays event because Monday and Tuesday last saw a high dollar Stand Alone roping in Deadwood hosted by the Days of 76. After Belle Fourche, the next steer roping competition

will be at Vinita, Oklahoma on the 27th.

Qualifying for the Finals: Only the top 15 make it and right now only \$5000 separates Rocky Patterson in 10th place and Jess Tierney in 18th. Nine guys looking for every dollar, every advantage in these last 5 weeks before the times up. Shay Good is 16th and only \$330 behind Cody Lee in 15th. and Roger Branch is only \$14 ahead of Cody in 14th place. Badlands Circuit: The season

is over for 2019, but this rodeo counts for 2020 and the Badlands battlers will be trying to set an early pace. Ora Taton of Rapid City has 3 of the last ten years...Brian Garr of Belle

Fourche has 2 titles in that period as does Jess Tierney. Coy Thompson will also have something to say about who wins the Circuit title next summer. His last title was in 2012.

Scott Snedecor won The Black Hills BHRU STEER Round Up in 2018...it paid him nearly \$2000 to win the 3 head battle. That could Roundup Grounds make a big difference in somebody's plans for November.

Rocky Patterson holds both the fastest time record with 9.0 seconds in 2011 and 33.3 on 3 the same year.

when do we start? He loved the family cabin in Spearfish canyon where he spent most weekends.




Last week's front page headline in the Beacon titled, "Proposed Changes in Response Time Policy Sparks Debate" was an understatement of the reality of the discussion. The story had

I'll give you a hypothetical applicant response: "I love your city. I want to work to help main-

This week's Pastor's Perspective provided by Pastor Jean Helmer, retired.

I had the privilege of attending a lecture given by Tom Osborne, former Cornhusker coach. Osborne said, "Most people are not aware of their strengths. Research has shown that discovering one's strengths leads to an increased level of hope about the future and about one's ability to accomplish great things with their life." In a nation and world where despair abounds, where people feel desperate, wounded, and helpless, we need hope. Hope begins with an awareness of our strengths and skills. This awareness brings confidence and the courage to move forward. My wish for the 2019-2020 school year is that all people discover what their skills are so they can focus on honing those skills into strengths. In other words, let's switch our focus from what is weak or lacking and focus on what skills are present and how we can use those skills for success. Humor me. Join in this exercise. You have the Belle Fourche Beacon in hand. Grab a writing utensil and spend the next two minutes listing your talents and skills in the margins of this paper. When time is up, count the items on your list. Write that number in



the left-hand corner of this page. How did you do: five skills, twenty-five skills? Most will manage only a short list. Let's refocus our perspective slightly. Consider for a moment the things that we hire others to do for us: operate a vehicle; answer calls; clean houses; care for pets; plan and prepare meals; make videos; write reports; grow plants; deliver packages; operate electronics, share information-the list is endless. How many of these things are in your skill set? Spend fifteen seconds adding to your skills list. Recount and write this number in the upper right-hand corner of this page. You likely doubled your score in those fifteen seconds-and this was on the first assignment of the year! "Please point out my faults and weaknesses," says no one ever. That business model of evaluating employees' weaknesses to improve their performance pervades all aspects of our society. It is defeating. We already know what we struggle to do. What we need help doing is recognizing our abilities. As Tom Osborne points out in his book Mentoring Matters, we each need someone to identify our strengths, to identify what



we do well and to tell us what we are doing well. Then we can capitalize on the strengths we have been given. Osborne calls that someone a mentor.

more to do with Belle Fourche city employees not having to live in Belle Fourche.

First of all, a very hearty congratulations and "good job" to Councilperson Monte Talkington for being astute enough to remove the item from the Consent Agenda (an area where items placed can be acted on by the council with no discussion or possibility of revision.)

Topics of business as important as "qualifications for employment" with the city of Belle Fourche should never be on a consent agenda in the first place. Begs the question of how the decision to place it there was made and why?

As a business that collects sales tax in Belle Fourche, in a building that property tax is paid in the city of Belle Fourche, we stand in full agreement with Councilperson Talkington that anyone who has employment with the city of Belle Fourche should have as a condition of that employment the requirement to live in Belle Fourche. The three mile extension beyond city limits is mildly acceptable because it is included in the category that can be referred to as "Belle Fourche is growing." In years past the requirement did stipulate, "reside in the city limits."

An applicant for employment should be asked if they are aware

tain it; improve it; and help it grow. The salary, benefits, and job growth opportunity are excellent. I just don't want to live here." They should not be employed if they aren't willing to live here.

We agree with the comments that we have become "a more nomadic society" and "the trend is toward regional economies" problem is it is a one way street.

Belle Fourche can provide the jobs, the opportunity, the salary, and the employee benefit package, but the City of Belle isn't able to share taxing authority outside of our city's jurisdiction. If they can exit, the city pays out, but cannot in any way recoup.

Our "pool" of employees isn't just those people who live here, the employee pool is everyone else who doesn't live here, but has an interest to be a part of our community (seeks employment).

As Councilperson Travis Martin stated, "I think we need 100% of our focus to be on drawing people to this community."

We encourage everyone to talk to their council representatives and ask them to protect your Belle Fourche taxpaying interest and Belle Fourche business interests and keep the employee requirement to live in Belle Fourche. Don't be silent or neutral on this issue. Voice to the Mayor and Council on how you feel. Speak up Belle Fourche!

Aladdin General Store Update

When 14-year-old Trent Tope stood before the counter of the Aladdin General Store to purchase his first ever hunting license, little did he know that 20 years later he'd be standing behind that same counter as the new store owner.

Now with close to three months of store ownership behind him, Trent has some pretty strong ideas about the direction the business should go. And he has begun to accomplish this by focusing on 'Made in America' merchandise.

Trent also wants to bring in more locally-made products which include everything from Wyoming-brewed beer (Black Tooth Brewing out of Sheridan) and Wyoming Whiskey out of Kirby to handcrafted leather sheaths by Justin Doudna of Sturgis and Black Hills Honey Farm Products from Spearfish. Born into a local ranching family dating back to 1892, Trent has a strong connection to his Wyoming roots. His great grandfather transported logs from the Bear Lodge to fuel the railroad turnaround at Aladdin for the coal tipple to the east of town.

Emphasizing this strong connection, he stresses that he doesn't want to see local customers disappointed when the store runs out of certain staples such as milk and bread and, as a result, has begun stocking an increased inventory of these items.

The popular upstairs Antique Attic has been refined room by room, concentrating solely on antique and western themes, many on consignment. Trent has also expanded the bar area with striking handcrafted stools by Greg Williams of Sundance and has plans to remain open later on Fridays and Saturdays, primarily to provide locals with their own watering hole. Down the road, he hopes to begin stocking some ranch supplies.

A welcome upcoming addition for all store patrons – real indoor restrooms, which Trent had planned on opening before the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally but for which Mother Nature had other plans. When nature calls...

As for the day 20 years ago when Trent bought his first hunting license, the person who sold him that license was Pearl Jensen, who began working at the store in 1976, and is still going strong. Trent knows some things are better left unchanged!





Council President Monte Talkington said the original plan was to keep the lights up for one year and see how things went. Now that they've been up two years he says it's time to review how they've been used.

"Anyone who's had Christmas tree lights knows you gotta take care of them or you'll be replacing them," he said. "I don't think we're going to want to be buying new lights every two years, they're not cheap. I

think if we put them up with the Christmas decorations and take them down when it's over and take care of them, they'll last 3 or 4 years. "

Input from downtown businesses was limited but when last surveyed the owners were split pretty evenly on whether to leave them up all year or put them up seasonally.

The council voted unanimously to leave the lights up through Christmas and take them down after the holidays in January 2020. After that they would review how to move forward with the lights next year.

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Palmer Fills Summer Intern Position at NICC

NISLAND – Ty Palmer hails from Springview, Neb., and is heading into his senior year at Frontier School of the Bible in LaGrange, Wyo. But since May 18, he has been fulfilling a summer internship, which is part of his program at FSB, at the Nisland Independent Community Church, at Nisland. Essentially, he has been the shadow of Pastor Doug Clark.

Palmer graduated from Keys Paha County High School. Along with his parents he has two brothers, one older and one younger.

His younger brother Zak, was recently diagnosed with leukemia, so Palmer made a couple trips to Sioux Falls during his internship to see him. And that is part of what he also learned by shadowing Clark; how to tend to those who are in need medically, as well as spiritually and emotionally.

Palmer participated in all areas of the church including preparing and presenting a sermon, counseling sessions for maritage preparation and for marital distress, as well as visiting a man who was terminally ill and passed away during the time Palmer was at the church. He ended up helping with the funeral preparation and service.

"I decided to do this internship (when he was encouraged to do so) because I wanted to see whether I felt God's calling me into the pastorate," said Palmer. At the end of the time he was involved in the internship, he did not come to that conclusion, but felt open to the idea should he feel the Lord is calling him to that.

The internship originated as part of the Elijah/Elisha program facilitated by Village Missions. The church at Nisland is a VM church, so they were contacted to ask about hosting a summer internship candidate.

"We prayed about it and felt it was a good thing to do," said Pastor Clark. The full board was in on the decision, but Clark was the one who would take on the task, providing opportunities for Palmer to grow through the experiences. Although Palmer did not have the option of getting to decide where to go, he said he felt Nisland was a good fit.

"I built a pretty good relationship with Doug," he said. "I learned a lot from him, and about how hard it is to be a rural pastor."

Palmer said he didn't really feel that there was any undesirable portion of the internship, even though he was constantly on the go, working alongside Clark through a variety of experiences. He helped with Rodeo Bible Camp where Clark was speaking, helped mow and weed whack the church properties, which the pastor and his wife LeAnne, take on as part of their ministry to the church.

"That wasn't real fun," said Palmer. "But it's part of what he (Clark) does so, that's what I did. It was all part of the learning."

As far as Palmers future plans once he graduates from FSB, he plans to be a ranch cowboy. "But it depends on how the Lord leads," he said.

Greater volume of annual business has been done in years when Thanksgiving fell far enough ahead of Christmas to permit 4 full shopping weeks.

In opening round games Vale defeated Hamblin-Nickelson of Belle Fourche 5-1 where Pauley gave up a total of only 5 hits in the 4 games he pitched in the tournament. He tossed a no hitter at the Boy's Club and his teammates collected 5 hits off the losing pitcher Sorensen. All games were played on the Newell lighted field under coaching of Jake Bossert.

from the June 25, 1914 Bee told us that a new church bell arrived here for the Methodist Church. The bell was branded "Cowboy"and "Rev. Gardner will use it to round up his flock at meetin' time." It is believed that this is the same bell which is used to this day.

There are very few pictures of the inside of the old church. But on Sept. 7, 1958 Bonnie and Floyd Westland were married there and these pictures show a little of the inside. Bonnie is today still an active member of the church.

123 years ago Belle Fourche Times Aug. 22, 1896 Attempted Hanging Owl Creek

"Curly" Rainey reports that while out on Owl creek Tuesday morning, he was held up by two men and hung to a tree and left. The limb bent sufficient to permit his toes to touch the ground. His pocket knife had been taken from him, but a penknife in his watch-pocket had been overlooked, his hands tied behind him, but not so tight as to prevent his securing the knife and cutting first the rope round his wrists and then the one round his neck. We have not learned further particulars nor the cause of the difficulty.

Shooting at Sturgis Roy Sewell, who was arrested and bound over to the fall term of court for cattle stealing about two months ago, was killed Tuesday morning by Fred Willard, a butcher at Sturgis. It seems that Sewell requested the jailer to permit him to step out into the yard for the purpose of getting a drink, as he been in the habit of doing, and after reaching the yard made a break to escape. He went to Knight's butcher shop, where it was generally known was kept a Winchester rifle. He secured this and stepped out, telling Willard that if he made a move he would kill him. At the door he met Policeman Beaver, telling him also that if he moved an eye he would shoot him. Willard secured another Winchester and followed Sewell. As the latter came out of a building, Willard said: "Sewell, throw down that gun." At this Sewell raised his rifle and fired, Willard shooting at about the same time. The latter was missed, but the former received a ball through the neck, proving fatal as stated.



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Newell Hunter Wins National Honor

Fred A. Lamphere of Newell, SD, was recently honored by the Boone and Crockett Club, the nation's most prestigious conservation and big game hunting organization. Fred was presented a Third Award for his Central Canada barren ground caribou at the Boone and Crockett Club's 30th Big Game Awards Banquet in Springfield, Missouri on August 3, 2019.

Every three years, the finest North American big game trophies accepted into Boone and Crockett Club's big game records-keeping program are assembled for public display followed by a banquet and award presentations. A Judges Panel comprised of Boone and Crockett Official Measurers verified each trophy's final score, which is the sum total of a comprehensive series of measurements taken of antlers, horns, skulls, and tusks, depending on the species. Trophy size is a direct reflection of habitat quality, age, and low mortality.

The Boone and Crockett system of scoring big game trophies originated in 1906 as means of recording details on species thought to be disappearing because of rampant habitat loss, market hunting, and unregulated harvest. Science-based conservation efforts led and funded by license-buying hunters brought those species from vanishing to flourishing. The existence of large male specimens remains a classic gauge of successful game management and conservation strategies.

In addition to its prestigious history and tradition, the Boone and Crockett Club's records program is strongly associated with the highest tenets of Fair Chase and ethical hunting. Fred's Central Canada barren ground caribou scored 366-5/8 Boone and Crockett points and ranks number 226 all-time for that species. It will be listed; along with 4,462 other outstanding trophies in the Boone

Several years and two knee operations later he found himself on a trip of a lifetime in Manitoba, more than 1,000 miles form home. Lamphere's son Brian and friends Jerry and Ryan Pflaumer accompanied him on the guided hunt.
