### County Commissioners **Take Road Tour**

news@bellefourchebeacon.com BELLE FOURCHE-Three of the Butte County commissioners, along with county highway employees, took a tour of several of the county's rural roads and bridges Monday. The tour's first stop was on 3V Road west of Belle Fourche and ended at Palo Road bridge near Newell. 3V Road is now fully graveled and maintained as the last four miles to the Budmayr ranch. Also, along the route on Rehorst Road, the road shoulders were graded and the road spot graveled.

The Helmer Road Bridge has been completed with the county paying 10% of the cost. A grant paid for the 80% of the bridge cost. Lawrence County paid the remaining 10% since the bridge is shared by the two counties. It took approximately two months to build

Watching the movie, The Cowboys under the stars in the soft summer air at the Tri-State Museum with friends and neighbors is timeless entertainment. It's even better when the original cowboy cast members

# "Invisible Attributes"



For the wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness of people who suppress the truth by their unrighteousness, because what can be known about God is plain to them, because God has made it plain to them. For

since the creation of the world his invisible attributes his eternal power and divine nature – have been clearly seen, because they are understood through what has been made. So people are without excuse. (Roman 1:18-20) NET

The apostle Paul stated in the scripture passage above that invisible attributes of God are evident in His creation. He is correct, and we're blessed to live where access to the wonder and beauty of nature is only minutes away. Sadly, the hectic schedules and busyness of our lives often prevents us from taking time to enjoy

the handiwork of our Creator and the chance to marvel at its diversity and excellence.

A couple weeks ago I was invited to go fishing at a private pond near Belle Fourche by a fellow generous enough to share his secret fishing hole with me. I sat on the bank looking across the glass-like surface of the water reflecting blue sky being pushed westward by the purples of dusk advancing from the east. A thunderstorm towered over the distant Black Hills. A hawk circled silently overhead. Minnows darted about the shallows near my feet. The scene contained every color

of the rainbow. I took in a deep breath, as if to absorb it all into myself, and exhaled a quiet prayer. "Thank you, God, for calling me to serve here and letting me enjoy the beauty of your creation."

The Bible tells us that Jesus often withdrew from his disciples and the crowds following him to go into nearby remote areas and pray. King David comments on the majesty of the heaven's several times in the Psalms, and we can envision him standing on a palace balcony marveling at the same stars he saw as a shepherd boy lying in a field on a still night. When is the last time you did such a thing?

Are you stressed? Worried? Fearful? Depressed? In my sermon last Sunday I shared studies from CNN Health and Psychology Today providing overwhelming evidence that regular time in prayer dramatically reduces all of these. And prayer alone before God in a quiet place where the evidence of His creative genius is everywhere is a remarkable, low-cost medicine that nourishes the soul and recharges the spirit.

My challenge to you today is to schedule a time right now when you will do as Jesus did - withdraw into nature and pray. Do not pray to nature, which is idolatry, but let God's divine attributes minister to your heart through what He has made at a time you set aside for just you and Him. Not everyone has the quick access to nature that we do here in Belle Fourche, so let us avail ourselves of the blessed gift God has graciously given



# **Bronc Cross Country Season Opener**

Friday August 26th, the Broncs competed in their first races of the season at the Douglas Early Bird Cross Country Meet at the Prairie Ridge Golf Course Ellsworth Air Force Base.

Senior Sawyer Clarkson came out strong setting a new course record and earning a first place finish with a time of 16:26.

Coming across the line in second place was, Junior, Lane Krautschun, making his debut in a Bronc jersey this fall, a former State B champ previously from Bison, SD coming in with a time of 17:17. 8th grader,

Lennon Clarkson was next across the line for the Broncs with a thirteenth place finish and a time of 18:50, followed by Junior, Harley Rivera with a twenty-seventh place finish in 19:48, Junior, Aiden Voyles in thirtieth place with a time of 20:02, Junior, Justus Funk in thirty-fifth place with a time of 20:31, Freshman, Sern Weishaar in thirty-eighth place, with a time of 20:42, Sophomore, Darian Pesicka in forty-fourth place with a time of 21:16, and rounding out the boys Varsity team with a fifty-fourth place finish was Senior, Dustin Kolb with a time of 23:34.

For the girl's side, returning

runner, Junior, Ava Allen was the first Lady Bronc across the line in twenty-sixth place with a time of 23:10, followed by Shaine Weishaar in thirty-fifth place with a time of 23:43, Junior, Allison Hayes in forty-eighth place with a time of 25:12, Sophomore, Lily Nore in fifty-fifth place with a time of 26:01, and Alanah Pomrenke in sixtieth place with a time of 30:18.

JV Runners had a great showing with Freshman, Adeline Hayes coming in seventeenth with a time of 15:37 on the girls' 3k (1.86 miles) course. On the boys' side running a full 5k (3.2 miles) course,

Freshman, Carsyn Hahne earned a first place finish with a time of 19:56, followed by Sophomore, Zach Tonsager in twenty-first place with a time of 22:09, Freshman, Teagan Fredrickson in twenty-second place with a time of 22:15, Freshman, Odin Walding in thirty-first place with a time of 22:45 and Freshman, Malachi Funk in fifty-second place with a time of 25:14

The Bronc middle school boys team saw six runners in grades 6th-8th in a race of sixty-six competitors on a 3k course (1.86 miles). 8th grader, Nathan Hudson was the first Bronc across the line in twelfth place with a time of 13:01, followed by 8th grader Tucker

Olson in twenty-third with a time of 14:08, 7th grader, Jaxson Bach in twenty-fourth place with a time of 14:12, 7th grader, Thad McKenney in twenty-eighth place with a time of 14:20, 6th grader, Revin Audiss in thirty-second with a time of 15:04, and in forty-eighth place with a time of 16:12, 8th grader, Prosper Knappen.

For the Lady Bronc middle school team, first time racer, 8th grader, Misty Drieling came in first with a time of 13:31, followed by 7th grader, Rhys Pearson in second place with a time of 13:44, 6th grader Lia Mundt in twelfth place with a time of 14:48, 8th grader, Mya Bush in twenty-fourth with a time of 15:48, 8th grader, Aurora Voyles in 31st with a time of 16:31, 6th grader Rhyan Knapp in fortieth with a time of 18:36, and 7th grader Katie Blair in forty-fifth with a time of 19:23

Next week the Broncs are split between races at Lead-Deadwood's Mile High Preview race on Tuesday August 30th and attending the Augie Twilight run in Sioux Falls on Friday September 2nd. 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# **Broncs Boys Soccer Go 1-2** in Weeks Contests

The Belle Fourche Broncs Boys varsity soccer team had three tough games in the past week. The Broncs

stretched their record to 2-0 by defeating AA Douglas 6-2 before falling to Sioux Falls Christian 8-0 and AA Sturgis 6-2.

Against Douglas Drake Sutter, Anthony Staley, and Isaac Voyles found the net in the first half and the Broncs nursed a 3-2 lead at the break. Freshman Keagan Walker dropped in two scores and Sutter added another as the Broncs broke out to claim the victory. "I thought we clicked well and our boys played with a lot of drive and passion. We moved the ball well especially after Douglas scored the first goal," commented head coach Lucas Trimble after the win.

Belle had their home opener against top seeded Sioux Falls Christian and fell to the Chargers 8-0. "We played pretty well against a very good team, but our depth just couldn't keep up with them. But I was proud of the way we hung with them," Trimble said about the contest. Christian scored four goals in each half to secure the win. Broncs goalkeeper Josh Brill recorded 14 saves in the box.

The Broncs hosted the Scoopers on Tuesday evening. Sturgis opened the scoring by finding the net at the 16 minute mark, but Bronc Sophomore Drake Sutter answered about two minutes later with a goal of his own and it was 1-1. Sturgis snuck another goal in with three minutes in the first half to lead 2-1 at intermission.

Sturgis got on the board again with 10 minutes gone in the second half to make it 3-1. Six minutes later the Broncs narrowed the gap when Issac Voyles assisted a header by Anthony Staley in front of the Sturgis goal and it was 3-2. Sturgis managed to wear down the Broncs in the remaining 20 minutes of play to notch the 6-2

The Broncs were scheduled to host James Valley Christian on Friday night in an important game for both teams, but the lightning and thunderstorm caused the match to be can-

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# **Broncs Open Football Season with Road Win**

Victory comes in new head coach Justin Walker's first game

news@bellefourchebeacon.com BOX ELDER – The Belle Fourche Broncs overcame a 90-minute lightning delay and a third quarter deficit to finish strong last Friday night in a 27-

strong last Friday night in a 27-16 win over the Douglas Patriots at Patriots Stadium in Box Elder. The win gave brand new head coach Justin Walker a victory in his debut game with the Broncs.

"I tell you it's fantastic," Walker said. "I really believed in these kids and we had some things we didn't do well defensively but they stepped up and stuck it out through the lightning delay and all."

The Broncs showed improvement over last year in a couple of areas. They did a decent job of controlling the line of scrimmage and kept penalties to a minimum. Also, the team finished strong in the later stages of the game scoring two touchdowns in the game's final 12 minutes while holding the Patriots scoreless to secure the win.

Junior quarterback Nathan Wahlfeldt ran for two touchdowns and finished the night with 192 yards passing, completing 10 of 19 attempts. Leading the ground game was

Junior running back Kyren Nulle who was the workhorse on the ground, pounding out 60 yards rushing on 23 carries. In all the Broncs recorded 305 yards of total offense and held Douglas to 199 yards.

Belle Fourche struck first in the opening quarter. After a short Douglas punt the Broncs set up at the Patriot 35-yard line. Six plays later, including a 4th down conversion, quarterback Nolan Wahfeldt rolled left to throw, but instead headed for the open field and scored on a nice 22-yard run. Anthony Staley's extra point made it 7-0 Broncs.

The Belle Fourche defense stepped up by stopping the Patriots at the 12-yard line on 4th down. Jayden Sechser halted Douglas' Morgan Sandal in his tracks to give the Broncs the ball deep in Patriot territory.

On the ensuing drive Wahlfeldt made perhaps his only major mistake of the night. Dropping back to throw, rolling to his right, he held on for a bit too long and was sacked in the endzone for a Douglas safety.

Douglas added a touchdown at the end of the quarter on an Aiden Russell to Marcus Woods 23-yard touchdown pass to the left corner of the end zone. The extra point failed and Douglas led 8-7 after one.

But Belle Fourche took back

the lead in the second quarter. From his own 42-yard line, Wahlfeldt found Tatin Yackley at the Patriot 32-yard line. Yackley then broke a tackle and outmanuevered two Douglas defenders on his way to completing a 59-yard touchdown pass, the longest of Wahlfeldt's career to date. The PAT made it 14-8 with around six minutes left before halftime.

But before halftime, bad weather moved in north of the stadium. With lighting in the area the game was delayed for more than an hour.

When play resumed, the two teams played the remainder of the half to a draw with Belle Fourche taking a 14-8 lead into the shortened halftime break.

Douglas came out strong in the third. The Patriots' Tyler Dumdel scored on a 12-yard touchdown run with 7:26 to go in the period and combined with the two-point conversion, gave Douglas a 16-14 lead. But it would be their last lead.

A few minutes later, after the Broncs stopped the Patriots on 4th down, Belle Fourche put together it's most impressive drive of the night. They started on their own 20 and eight plays later Wahlfeldt rolled out to his left and cut inside to score from 3-yards out. The drive was highlighted by a third-down conversion pass from Wahl-

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feldt to JT Hahne for 21-yards. Hahne, moving left to right at midfield on a crossing route, made a one-handed grab with his left hand, in stride, and ran out of bounds at the 43 of the Patriots. A couple of plays later Wahlfeldt hit Carter McKenna on a 27-yard connection down to the 3-yard line, which set up the Wahlfeldt touchdown.

Turns out McKenna wasn't done. Three plays later with the Patriots on 3rd and 7 from their own 33, Russel dropped back to throw. He didn't see McKenna who had crept up to the line of scrimmage and quickly dropped back into coverage just in time to step in front of a past intended for Douglas' Logan Huber. McKenna hauled it in at the 38, broke a tackle and returned it

down the left side for a touchdown. The extra point failed but Belle Fourche took a 27-16 lead.

From there the Broncs stopped the Patriots on fourth down after they had driven to the Belle Fourche 16-yard line. The Broncs moved the ball all the way back down the field to the Patriot's 15-yard line before time expired. The final score, 27-16 Belle Fourche.

It was the first time in four years the Broncs have won a season opener as they extended the Douglas losing streak to 16 games. Next up for Belle Fourche is a home game this Friday night at Lou Grasslie Field against Dell Rapids. The Quarriers opened their season with a win at Madison 33-14 last Friday night.



We are

always amazed at his talents in sculpting.

The following is from his Facebook page:

"I could fill a gallery with pieces that I have made as proposals for projects that didn't happen or where my work wasn't ultimately chosen.

Sometimes I find another place to use them and sometimes they are just waiting for the right time and place. This is one of the latter.

I made this piece as a memorial sculpture for a town which started a rodeo in 1918 as a way to raise money for the Great War effort, much the way that the Black Hills Roundup got going in Belle Fourche.

The organizers wanted to show a cowboy taking off his hat and putting on a Doughboy helmet and heading off to war.

It was a California town, so I gave him the accoutrements fitting that time and place.

Also, I learned that the recruits in WWI were a bit older that in later wars, and I wanted that to come through in his features."

Had a meeting with what I'd consider a working man. As we were talking he pulled a can of Copenhagen snuff out of his pocket. It was a gesture seldom seen in public these days.

I politely asked if I could have a smell. He looked at me a bit puzzled and obliged.

I took the round container and breathed in deeply its pleasing aroma.

You see I am one of those people who in there past have enjoyed the habit. My father and my grandfather both indulged, and I at a quite young age embarked and continued the habit for close to 30 years.

If you pull a can out in front of me I won't bum a chew, but I may need a smell!

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

# **Stetson Wright Breaks Regular Season All**around Earnings Mark Again

In just his fifth season of Pro-Rodeo, Stetson Wright continues to rewrite the record books.

After earning \$17,927 over the weekend at three NFR Playoff Series presented by Pendleton Whisky rodeos, the Milford, Utah, cowboy has now broken the PRCA record for the most money won in the all-around in a single season again with \$332,023 in saddle bronc riding and bull riding.

Last season, Wright broke the record that was previously set by Trevor Brazile in 2015, when he ended the 2021 regular season with \$320,482. He would then go on to set the all-time single season earning record after the NFR with \$686,513.

At 23 years old, Wright is showing no signs of slowing down anytime soon. In 2020, he was the PRCA World Champion in the all-around and bull riding. Last season, he added his fourth and fifth gold buckles by winning the all-around yet again and capturing his first saddle bronc riding world title.

He currently sits No.1 in the PRCA | RAM World Standings in bull riding and second in saddle bronc riding. His 2022 season has been spurred by 21

all-around, 11 saddle bronc riding, and 11 bull riding wins so far this season.

Wright will have a golden opportunity to add to his regular season earnings total with still five weeks remaining in the Pro-Rodeo regular season, which concludes on Sept. 30.

at the Washington State Fair, Sept. 8-11 will play a key role in catapulting athletes into the 2022 Wrangler National Finals Rodeo presented by Teton Ridge with a \$1 million payout.

# **Brody Cress Wins Xtreme Broncs Finals in Rapid City**

The standard exists for Brody Cress. His resume remains bloated with accomplishments. At 26, he has won the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo saddle bronc average title three times, including last season, and qualified for the sport's top event five times.

He defines consistency. So, the performance he delivered on Sunday night at the Xtreme Broncs Finals in Rapid City, S.D., should come as no sur-

Against a loaded field, Cress posted a 93.5-point ride on Sutton Rodeo's South Point, besting a group that included three other scores in the 90s at the Central State Fair Grandstand Arena.

By finishing with a flourish, Cress captured the two-head average with 180 points, netting \$14,382 for the average and \$23,059 for the event. Back in 2019, Cress split the win at the inaugural Xtreme Broncs Finals with Wade Sundell.

"It was definitely a good night. Those events are amaz ing with the competition, and I knew it was going to take something good," Cress said. "I couldn't have gotten a better horse. He gives you a chance every time. He had been hurt and we didn't know if he would compete. But he healed up. So, to ride a horse of that caliber, it was really hard to lose. I was pumped up after that ride.'

It represented a dramatic rally for the star. Cress had an 86.5-point ride on Bailey Pro Rodeo's Capone in his first ride, placing him last among the eight cowboys to make the short round. That left him going first. He set the tone.

It unfolded like this. With the big crowd ready to roar, Cress left the chute on standout horse South Point, who was ornery.

The horse kicked its back legs violently into the air 11 times as he made his way forward. The public address announcer bellowed, "You've got to be kidding! Oh, my goodness!" as Cress stayed in rhythm, hopped off onto his feet and into the prize money.

That's how you set a new arena record and top the likes of Ryder Wright, Lefty Holman, Sage Newman, and Dawson Hay, who won this event last year on South Point.

Cress has said in the past that when he draws a good horse, then "it's up to me to do my job, to stay positive." He learns and moves forward from his runs, which prevents slumps. He also credits his support group for keeping him focused with the right mindset. He's always ready to compete. And triumph.

Cress winning has become a tradition across the country this season – well, really every sea son since he bought his PRCA card in 2014.


The Rapid City effort represented his 10th victory of the season, joining a list that features; The Daily Record Xtreme Bares and Broncos in Ellensburg, Wash., and La Fiesta De Los Vaqueros in Tucson, Ariz., over the winter.

# Finding the Road to Better Roads

Germany Kent once said, "We are all on the road to success. Some people just act like they want it more than others." It is rare that I visit a community where "roads" are not a hot topic. Every community believes they have the worst roads in their State, or even country. When someone makes a "roads or potholes" post on social media, it is sure to contain one of the longest string of comments that week. Suffice it to say, roads are usually a topic that brings out the passion in everyone.

Not long ago, I was on social media where someone had posted how bad the roads were in their community. As is predictable, dozens of comments followed, all chiming in with comments mirroring the original author of the post. Ironically, in the very next post, one of the commenters on the previous roads post was indicating how they were looking for things to do that upcoming weekend and thought they would be going to a community 45 minutes away for dinner, shopping, and maybe a show. Others from the previous "roads post" chimed in with like sentiments.

The answer, while simple, is not very well known. In many states, fixing the roads within the state or within the communities comes down to a very basic equation. The equation is this. The funds used to repair and maintain roads typically

come out of the sales taxes generated in those communities. counties, and state. As go the sales tax revenues, so goes the road upkeep. Nothing more, nothing less. Yes, the allocation of road funds is subiect to debate within

local governments, balancing the need for police, fire, and so forth is never easy. But it is still very basic, spend local, improve your roads. Spend out of town, pave the roads of where you are spending your money.

Want better roads, find ways to spend more dollars locally. When we factor in the 3X compounding impact of locally spent dollars, the impact is huge. If each resident in a community of 20,000 people spent just \$25 additional dollars locally each month, that would equate to an additional \$18,000,000 circulating through the community each year. With a 10% local sales tax, that is \$1,800,000 additional dollars for police, fire, AND roads. Not to mention how many jobs that will help to save or create. Certainly, there is a little more to it than this simple example, but the point remains – want better roads, spend more locally!

There is a catch. Most of us aren't wired in such a way to be constantly thinking about spending locally or building our internal local DNA. With that being the case, we really can't place the blame on the residents


for not spending enough locally. The blame lies with the community leaders in that they are failing to educate the community about this critical component needed to have a successful community. City leaders, Chambers, Main Streets, Media, and others should be constantly educating 24/7, year-round. Studies indicate a person must hear a marketing message at least seven times before it really begins to resonate internally. Most convey this message once or twice and believe the job is complete. Nothing is further from the truth – the job has only just begun.

Every community must begin communicating more effectively. Every community must begin to market the various messages that are needed to change the mindset of each resident. Every community must start thinking how they can encourage business growth, after all that is the foundation of your sales tax dollars. Communities that communicate a strong local message, are business friendly, and work to grow their business base have a chance to survive. Those unwilling or unable to do those simple things are simply biding their time on the road to oblivion.

Let me close with a quote by Oscar Bimpong, he said "Where you are coming from doesn't matter but where you are going does. Hence look forward and not backwards. Your eyes are placed in front of you for a reason. Your eyes only look backwards for special references. Keep your eyes on the road." May each of us choose to keep our eyes on the path of success as we build better communities, and roads.

BELLE FOURCHE-Saturday morning saw more than 30 young people gathered at the Center of the Nation Sportsman Club west of Belle Fourche. The youth were eager to begin an adventure honing their shooting skills as part of South Dakota Youth Hunting Adventures. SDYHA consists of youth ages 11-17 years who are mentored by adults who desire to share their love for hunting

and fishing. The group, made up of boys and girls, was divided into smaller units and sent to various areas at the shooting range. The distinct areas were rifle and shotguns, an area of identifying pelts and bird wings, and a written test. From beginners to more adept hunters, the young people sharpened each skill. The morning was topped off with quesadillas made by Specialty Quesadillas from Spearfish. The quesadillas were prepared on an outside grill by owner Scott Leite and co-worker Brett Harrowa.

The Black Hills chapter of South Dakota Youth Hunting Adventures is the brain child of Jim Scull, Rapid City businessman. The organization was started in 2007 in Rapid City with the Big Brothers/Big Sisters. The goal was to give kids an opportunity to do something outdoors.

Through organizations like Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Youth and Family Services, and Girls/ Boys Club, SDYHA gained it's 501c3 and began to operate in the Rapid City area. It soon expanded to the Northern Hills and now includes a chapter east

The organization furnishes mentored youth with guns, clothing, and hunting and fishing equipment.

Landowners work with SDY-HA, helping to provide places to hunt and fish. According to Scull, this imparts a high-quality experience for kids who would not have that hunting or fishing experience.

Scull's enthusiasm overflowed as he explained matching kids and mentors. A Match Specialist matches each young person with a mentor after visiting the child, the family, and prospective mentor. Once paired, the Match Specialist checks on them at least once a month. The family of the youth must also be engaged in the process. The young person must be between 11 and 17 years old, usually with a single parent, who wants to enjoy learning about the outdoors.

Mentoring is the key to the success of SDYHA. Mentors are experienced hunters and fishermen with knowledge, passion, and have something they want to share. They desire to help mentees to develop a love for the outdoors and all that can be found. Above all, mentors

aspire to aid in fulfilling a young person's potential and future endeavors. According to the SDYHA website, www.sdyouthhunting. com, mentors must be at least 21 years old, serve as a positive role model to the child, submit to a background check, and commit to spending quality time with a child as they learn the process of becoming a responsible, safe hunter. They

must also be free of drug and

alcohol abuse or treatment for

three years. There is no require-

ment for how much time should

be spent with each individual. The point is, according to Scull, to enjoy being with them. South Dakota Game, Fish, and Parks has been highly supportive to the group and has given grants for projects. Scull added that statistically, it also benefits SDGFP because 26% of the mentored youth go on to buy licenses and promote the sport. Not only do the youth learn to hunt and fish, the game that is bagged is processed and given to the family or to another family in need. Many of the participants learn to take care of the game themselves and taste the "fruit" of their adventures. There are two main events during the year help to finance the efforts of the organization, adding to any donations and grants received. The Black Hills Sports Show and Black Hills

The cowboy actors were required to attend school while on the set for three hours a day and to have a parent present on the set. Few of the cowboys remembered what they learned from school on the set, but they do recall the positive life lessons camaraderie and being treated with respect they gained from the experience.

The Cowboys is a rites of passage story for the real life actors as well as one for the characters. The characters in the film face many challenges that help them grow into healthy adults who value integrity, hard work, the ability to follow through with a task and other qualities that we wish more kids would learn. The challenges in the movie are clear, attainable, appropriate, although not always fair, but of course life is not always fair.

The Cowboys reflects our western regional values. To a significant extent, people in this region are cowboys by birth, experience or inheritance. Cowboy culture is lived experience, familiar and to some extent glorified.

Perhaps we belong to a society where challenges of becoming an adult are more uncertain, less attainable, and even more dangerous then they were

# Then and Now in Newell

### "Looking Forward to our Past" –

August 29, 1912 The joists for the new school house at Nisland have arrived Wednesday and the carpenters have them in place. The brick layers started laying brick Thursday afternoon. We understand all the material for the building is now on the ground and work will be pushed until it

is completed. Several weeks ago the Peter Mintener Lumber Company moved up from near the depot his warehouse and placed it on their lots in the Fire District. Also this week N. M. Bratton Mercantile Company has started the erection of a large warehouse on the company's ground on Black 31 in violation of the Fire Ordinance. The Fire Ordinance was passed last March. If the Fire Ordinance is not to be enforced, it should be at once repealed.

August 24, 1922 Wm. Wise of Castle Rock was arrested last week by Sheriff Lefores and Deputy T. F. Stevenson of Newell, for operating an illicit distillery at his ranch home. The still and a quantity of "hooch" was confiscated. Wise was arraigned before a Belle Fourche Justice and bound over to Circuit Court for trial. He furnished bonds in the sum of \$1,000.

The first floor of the Richard's House is rapidly being transformed from a large single room to a series of bedrooms and a lobby for the accommodation of the traveling public. Ten good sized bedrooms are provided, which still leaves about 30 feet of the front end for the hotel office. An open stairway will lead from the lobby to the upper floor.

Mr. & Mrs. H. J. Christian of Newell, Mr. & Mrs. C.E. Brown, and family and the Getty Brothers were visitors at the W. L. Burk home on Lower Horse Creek Sunday. On Wednesday evening, the W.L. Burk's were callers at the Henry R. Johnson home.

August 25, 1932 A meeting of rural teachers of the county was held in the Newell High School building Wednesday for the purpose of acquainting teachers with the new course of study. County Superintendent Lillian Schafer arranged the meeting and consulted a similar one in Belle Fourche. The rural schools are expected to open on Monday, September 5 and she listed the teacher's by name and the school at which she will teach.

In addition to the agricultural exhibits at the Butte County Fair, there will also be a racing program on the track for the 3 days, sponsored by the various towns of the county, according to fair officials. The quality of entertainment will compare favorably with former years in spite of the fact that no admission will be charged this year.




